



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# In Memoriam



Thomas Fowler Owen
October 1, 1878 - July 8, 1969

Our thoughts go back to our departed friend and former Town Father, Thomas F. Owen, who served the Town so well as a Selectmen for 33 years, having been first elected in 1902 and last serving in 1958. He had also been a Representative to the General Court of New Hampshire and a member of the School Board.

He was a lifelong resident of the Town and graduated from the Putnam Free School of Newburyport, Mass. in 1896. He was at one time a teacher at the South School, later working in the Shoe Industry and as a Mail Carrier.

His passing was a deep loss to us all and we shall miss his companionship and the knowledge which he had about the history and affairs of the Town he loved so well. This report does not include the Auditors

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN OF SEABROOK TOWN WARRANT FOR 1970

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Seabrook in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the lower hall of the Seabrook Firemen's Association Building, Route 86, on Tuesday, March 10, 1970, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon and to cast ballots from that hour until at least 6 o'clock in the evening of the same day and to act on the following articles:

ARTICLE 1. To elect by Non-partisan ballot; One Selectmen, Assessor and Trustee of the Trust Funds for a term of Three (3) years; A Tax Collector for a term of Three (3) years; A Chief of Police; A Chief of the Fire Department; Three (3) Constables, Two (2) Members of the Budget Committee for a term of Three (3) years, a Member of the Park Commission for a term of Three (3) years, A Road Agent; and any other officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE II. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and to renew and refund Town notes.

ARTICLE III. To see what action the Town will take regarding the balances of the Special Appropriations: New Land \$1,984.97; Cross Beach Layout \$4,285.00; Street Survey, \$305.00; Mosquito Control \$1,165.39; Selectmen's Assistant \$7,000.00; Base Radio Station \$1,200.00; Reappraisal Special \$1,918.84.

ARTICLE IV. To see if the Town will vote to revise the salaries and wages of town officials and employees.

ARTICLE V. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund to be known as the Town Waste and Disposal Capital Reserve Fund, to deposit the funds derived from the sale of the Town Dump in said Capital Reserve Fund, and to authorize and empower the Selectmen to withdraw and apply said funds for the purchase of a new Town Dump.

ARTICLE VI. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$88,000 for the purpose of constructing a new Town Garage, \$80,000 to be raised pursuant to ARTICLE VII of this Waarrant and \$8,000 to be raised from town funds; to construct said garage; and to authorize and empower the Selectmen to enter into such contractual relationships as may be necessary for the construction of a new Town Garage, to purchase, lease or otherwise acquire the land upon which said garage will be constructed, and to execute such deeds, notes, contracts and other documents as are necessary for the accomplishment of the same in such form and on such terms and conditions as they deem to be in the best interest of the Town.

### (Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE VII. To see if the Town will vote to issue a note or notes of the Town in an amount not to exceed \$80,000 for the purpose of the construction of a new Town Garage; the discretion of fixing the date, maturities, denominations, the interest rate or discount rate, the place of payment, the form and other details of said notes and of providing for the sale thereof to be delegated to the Board of Selectmen.

### (On the Official Ballot)

ARTICLE VIII. To see if the Town will vote to require a building permit for the construction of new buildings, for renovations and/or additions to existing buildings and for the placement of mobile homes if the cost of said building, renovation, addition or mobile home exceeds \$500.00, said permit to be issued in such form as the Selectmen may determine; and to authorize and empower the Selectmen to promulgate regulations requiring a fee for said permit and imposing a penalty if such regulations are not obeyed or said permit is not obtained where required.

ARTICLE IX. To see if the Town will vote to establish a salary for the Special Justice of the Seabrook Municipal Court.

ARTICLE X. To see if the Town will vote to convey to Warren S. and Viola M. Frothingham all of the Town's right,

title and interest in and unto the gravel pit situated at Collins Street in the Town of Salisbury, County of Essex and Commonwealth of Massachusetts, and to execute such deeds or other documents necessary to accomplish the same.

ARTICLE XI. To see if the Town will vote to ratify the Selectmen's action in accepting assistance from the Public Service Company of New Hampshire for testing an additional water supply for the Town's water system, and to authorize and empower the Selectmen to continue testing for said water supply and to install such wells, pumps, mains and other equipment and acquire such real estate as is necessary for the addition of said water supply to the Town's water system; to add said additional water supply to the Town's water system; and to authorize and empower the Selectmen to enter into and execute such agreements, including agreements with Public Service Company of New Hampshire whereby the Town would agree to supply water to Public Service Company of New Hampshire and Public Service Company of New Hampshire would provide financial assistance for the construction of said well and the addition thereof to the Town's water system, and to execute such contracts and other documents necessary to accomplish the same.

ARTICLE XII. To see if the Town will authorize and empower the Selectmen to sell and convey those premises owned by the Town, whether acquired by Tax Collector's Deed or otherwise, which are within the perimeter of the following bounds:

North of the Mill Creek,
South of Brown's River,
East of a line which is perpendicular
to the end of Rocks Road,
West of Route No. 1A.

at private sale, upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen, in their discretion, deem to be in the best interest of the Town, and to execute such agreements, deeds, or other documents necessary to accomplish the same.

ARTICLE XIII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to be paid to the Portsmouth Mental Health Clinic, Inc. as the Town's cost of participation in the program of the Portsmouth Mental Health Clinic, Inc.

(Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE XIV. Upon Petition by Arnold Knowles and twenty (20) others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the purpose of improving the Farm Lane Dock, such money to be used to deepen, widen, clean up debris and abandoned boats, provide ramp facilities, improve roadway and parking area, provide bulkheads where necessary, and whatever else the Selectmen deem would be for the betterment of the area, and if approved this project would be implemented as early as possible in the spring and summer months of 1970.

(Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE XV. Upon Petition by Simeon H. Brown and twenty (20) others: That the sum of \$1,200.00 be raised and appropriated for the erection of a chain link fence to completely enclose the Little League Baseball park at Governor Weare Park.

(Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE XVI. Upon Petition by Robert A. Beal and thirteen (13) others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to complete the hot topping of Dwight Avenue.

(Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE XVII. Upon Petition by Melvurn A. Morgan and nineteen (19) others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,600.00 to put a culvert across Lakeshore Drive, the culvert to be a three (3) foot culvert, also to build the road up higher and place a guard rail.

(Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE XVIII. Upon Petition by Joseph E. Bartly and twenty-seven (27) others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,500.00 to grade and refinish the surface of approximately 1,400 feet of Black Snake Road, starting at the Massachusetts State Line.

(Submitted by Budget Committee Without Recommendation)

ARTICLE XIX: Upon Petition by Jerry W. Brown and sixteen (16) others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,500.00 to be used for drainage and to hot top Pine Street from Lafayette Road Westerly to the end of the improved section thereof.

(Submitted by Budget Committee Without Recommendation)

ARTICLE XX. Upon Petition by Rose Fowler and twenty (20) others: That the Town of Seabrook appropriate sufficient sums in order to join the already existing compact that exists between the County Commissioners, the New Hampshire Distributing Agency and the United States Department of Agriculture, and various Towns throughout the State, to bring surplus food to Seabrook.

(Submitted by Budget Committee Without Recommendation)

ARTICLE XXI. Upon Petition by Marvin A. Dow and fourteen (14) others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the purpose of installing a drain on South Main Street near the residence of Francis Eaton and for underground piping to connect the same to the drain near the Frank Goss property.

(Submitted by Budget Committee Without Recommendation)

ARTICLE XXII. Upon Petition by Ernest Owen and thirty (30) others: To see if the Town will vote to purchase a Police Cruiser, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 to purchase and equip the same.

(Disapproved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE XXIII. Upon Petition by Walter I. Randall and forty (40) others: To see if the Town will vote to change the wage schedule of the Town to provide that if a permanent employee is out of work for more than two (2) weeks, any person filling said position shall be paid at the same rate as the permanent employee.

ARTICLE XXIV. Upon Petition by Anthony T. Randall and forty-nine (49) others: To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to investigate the legality of the action by which the State of New Hampshire took over the Clam Flats in the said Town and if said takeover is found to be illegal, then the Selectmen are ordered to secure the return of the Clam Flats to the Town by whatever means are necessary. The use of the Town Counsel is hereby authorized in the above matter.

ARTICLE XXV. To hear the report of the Zoning Study Committee and to act thereon.

ARTICLE XXVI. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to cause a new Zoning Ordinance to be prepared for submission to the Town.

ARTICLE XXVII. To hear the report of the Planning Board and to act thereon.

ARTICLE XXVIII. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the expense of the General Government, for the protection of persons and property, for health and sanitations, for highways and bridges, for support of the Town Poor and for all necessary expenditures for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE XXIX. To transact all other legal business that may come before said meeting.

#### ADJOURNED TOWN MEETING

March 13, 1969 Seabrook, N.H.

Meeting called to order at 7:40 P.M. Moderator Carroll B. Pineo in Passaconaway Hall, Seabrook, New Hampshire.

Salute to the Flag led by the Moderator. Invocation by Rev. Neil Iverson of the Trinity United Church of Christ.

The Moderator requested the check-lists be brought to the hall. The Moderator stated any amendments will be in writing with his or her signature.

Warrant read by Moderator on March 11, 1969, day of election.

ARTICLE 2: - read by Moderator: - "authorize Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes".

Motion by James S. Eaton, second by Emery N. Eaton that the Selectmen be Authorized and empowered to borrow money inanticipation of taxes and to renew and refund Town Notes.

MOTION CARRIED.

ARTICLE 3: - read by the Moderator: - "action of balances of Special Appropriations".

Motion by Emery N. Eaton, second by James S. Eaton, that thebalances stated under Article 3 be carried forward and used as originally intended.

MOTION CARRIED.

ARTICLE 4: - read by the Moderator: - "vote to revise the salaries and wages of the Town Officials and Employer's ".

Motion by James S. Eaton, second by Emery N. Eaton, to revise the wages and salaries as follows.

Salary of the Selectmens Clerk be increased from\$ 60.00 weekly to \$70.00 weekly

" Clerk of Court be increased from \$245.00 P.Y. to \$400.00 P.Y.

Page 2 - March 13, 1969 ADJOURNED TOWN MEETING

Salary of the Chief of Police be increased from \$125.00 weekly to \$135.00 weekly.

" " Full Time Police Officers be increased from \$ 90.00 weekly to \$105.00 weekly.

" Senior full time Fireman be increased from \$112.00 weekly to \$122.00 weekly.

" No. One Fireman be increased from \$107.00 weekly to \$122.00 weekly.

" No. Two Fireman be increased from \$ 97.00 weekly to \$112.00 weekly.

" Highway Agent be increased from \$125.00 weekly to \$135.00 weekly.

" Full Time Public works employeesbe increased from \$ 90.00 weekly to \$105.00 weekly.

" Water Dept. Foreman be increased from \$125.00 weekly to \$135.00 weekly.

" Water Dept. full time emp. be increased from \$ 90.00 weekly to \$105.00 weekly.

" Salaried Cemetary Workers be increased from \$85.00 weekly to \$105.00 weekly.

All other Town hourly employees to be paid at a RATE of \$2.20 PER HOUR.

All salaries and rates of pay not covered by this motion, to remain as previously established.

ARTICLE 5: - read by the Moderator: - "vote to accept a deed from the State of New Hampshire of a parcel of land bounded Northerly by the land of the State of New Hampshire; Easterly by the land of the Town; Southerly by the Folly Mill Road and Westerly by U.S. Interstate Route 95.

Motion by James S. Eaton, second by Melvurn Morgan that Article 5 be adopted as read, and we accept deed from State of N. H.

#### MOTION CARRIED.

ARTICLE 6: - read by the Moderator: - "to see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell to Spherex, Inc. by private sale that parcel of land acquired from the State of N. H. bounded as follows:

#### FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF REPORT

Less fortunate than our northern towns, we had too many fires. Carelessness in burning trash and discarding smoking material and children playing with fire caused most of the fires. Your Forest Fire Warden;s job would be easier if everyone understood the State laws that govern the kindling of outdoor fires. A synopsis of these laws follow:

#### FIRE PERMIT

A <u>fire permit</u> is needed for all outdoor fires in or near woodland anytime the ground is not covered with snow. This included household waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, garden trash as well as brush burning. Such burning is restricted by regulation to be <u>prior</u> to 9:00 a.m. and after 5:00 p.m..

#### EXCEPTIONS

Commercial or industrial burning is allowed anytime under normal conditions with permission of the District Chief and a permit from the Fire Warden.

Camp or cooking fires are allowed on your own property with permission of the Fire Warden. On another's property with written permission of the landowner and permission of the Fire Warden. The Warden can forbid such fires if in a hazardous area. Permits for cooking fires in the White Mountain National Forest can be obtained from the Laconia Office or at the Ranger Stations. Permits are not required in public camp or picnic grounds where fireplaces have been built for this purpose.

### PENALTIES

- 1. For kindling a fire without a permit. Maximum of \$200.00 fine; or imprisonment for not more than 60 days.
- 2. For kindling a fire by any means wilfully or recklessly that shall endanger woodlands, the maximum fine is \$500.00 or one year's imprisonment.
- 3. For failure to totally extinguish a camp or cooking fire before leaving it the same penalties as in (#1) above.
- 4. For dropping inflammable material in or near woodland, maximum fine is \$25.00.

Fire prevention is a personal matter and a good habit. Keep our town free from smokes in 1970.

#### SEACOAST HOME HEALTH ASSOCIATION

Your visiting Nurse Association has been in operation since July of 1969.

To date, we have made 1157 active calls. We started in with one full time nurse and a part time Supervisor nurse. In August, our office was staffed four days a week, and by December, we found it necessary to hire another part time nurse.

In the fall, we assisted at two Clinics. The measles Clinic was held in October and 63 Hampton children from kindergarten through eighth grades received the vaccine. There were 19 children from North Hampton, 21 in Seabrook, and 9 in Hampton Falls. In December, we held the German Measles Clinic for kindergarten through first grade. 49 North Hampton children received this vaccine, 213 Hampton children, 38 from Seabrook, and 20 from Hampton Falls. There is a great shortage of the German Measles vaccine, so the State designated the age group to receive this. When more in available we plan to continue the immunization program.

The largest number of our patients are in the Medicare age group, though we have made 76 visits to new mothers and their babies. Many of our patients have cardiac problems or are CVA victims. We provide many and varied services such as baths, injections, dressing changes, any nursing ordered by your Doctor, and health instruction for all age groups.

### REPORT OF THE ZONING STUDY COMMITTEE

As a result of the last annual Town Meeting on March 13, 1969, Article #10 was approved by the voters, authorizing the Selectmen to appoint a committee, the function of which was to "study the problems with the previous town zoning ordinance and the zoning needs of the Town in the present and the future, and to report their findings, when completed, to the Town in order that the Town may instruct the Selectmen as to whether or not a new zoning ordinance should be prepared for submission to the Town." This committee, to be known as "The Study Committee for Zoning, was formed about May 1, 1969.

It was decided by this committee to hold publicized public meetings, hoping for a large turnout of interested town voters, so they could share their views, thoughts, likes, and dislikes with us; and guide us in our study. This attempt was unsuccessful, as we never had more than ten people show up at any one of these meetings.

It was then thought that the best way to contact the voters was by a mailed questionnaire. We then sent out a questionnaire to each legal male and female voter in town, a total of 1649 voters. At the end of this report we have included a copy of this questionnaire's results. Of those sent out, 421 (or 25.5%) were returned for evaluation. Of the 421 returned, 25 (6%) were blank; 172 (41%) had comments; 224 (53%) had no comments. Of the 172 with comments: 102 (59%) were for zoning; 58 (34%) were opposed to zoning; and 12 (7%) were indifferent.

A breakdown of our findings is as follows. The answers to question #1 seem to indicate that the majority (69%) thought the ordinance was basically good, but in need of amendments. On 22% called it "no good". 35% of those who answered question #2 formed their opinions by personal experience and 33% by study of the ordinance. Therefore, at least 68% must have been well informed. In the next question, (#3) 196 had read all the ordinance, but 212 understood it. It is difficult to see how there were more who understood it than there were who read it!

On question #4, which dealt with the administration of the ordinance, 56% did not like the way the ordinance was being enforced, and 59% did not like the adjustments granted. This clearly shows a great dissatisfaction with the administration. Although the Board of Selectmen was the sole enforcing body, over half of those answering question #5 believed some other board had that power. This shows a great misunderstanding on this subject. Question #6 shows much dissatisfaction with the administration and poor regu-

lations in fourth place. The Master Plan was not as great a factor as expected.

In conclusion, it seems quite evident that the vote to abolish the zoning ordinance was not wholly caused by dislike of the regulations themselves, but to a great extent by concern about the need of amendments and corrections that were perhaps long overdue, and, by the lack of satisfactory administration by all officials involved. It also seems very possible that had an active program in defense and in support of the ordinance been conducted by the Town officials, the ordinance might not have been voted out.

This committee's prime goal has been to take a "Middleof the Road" unbiased approach, with an honest analysis of all the opinions received, by taking the most logical methods to get everyone's reaction.

Since the Zoning Ordinance was abolished, the Town has had an increase of approximately 90 single dwellings, including 48 mobile type homes. There have been two 12-family apartment units completed and rented, with two more under construction and another two planned, all on one parcel of land. Approximately one large shopping complex and five new commercial or industrial operations have been constructed, with several more proposed. At least one new subdivision has been opened and another greatly expanded. One trailer park (meaning an area of land rented for trailers) has been opened and another is under construction, with more planned.

There is a proposed development of 120 new lots on the ocean side of the beach, and approximately 60 acres of beautiful undeveloped beach land on the west side. An amusement project has been proposed in this area.

The school board has reported a net increase of approximately 24 new families with 2 to 5 school-aged children per family during the past two years, and the School Building Advisory Committee has decided and recommended that an addition is necessary to control the impending situation.

This all adds up to a considerable rate of increase in both buildings and population, with everything indicating that this growth will continue at probably a faster pace for an unpredictable time.

Furthermore, the proposed \$200 million power plant has already acquired a large area of desirable land and if completed as planned could be a valuable asset to this town.

Several new dwellings have been placed on unfavorable locations and the ability of the land to absorb sewage wastes in some cases is at least very doubtful. The Town

could very easily become involved in a very extensive and costly sewage system, in addition to our current rubbish disposal problem.

We now have at least 6 junk yards within the town limits. Without controls, the situation could become intolerable.

Also, some owners of residential properties are becoming very much concerned about being drawn into commercial areas.

Therefore, in view of these facts, this Committee firmly believes that in order to control the expected growth in a manner that will protect and hopefully improve the favorable conditions and advantages that now exist, and in order to protect the health and welfare of the people as well as maintain a favorable tax rate, some sort of control will be absolutely necessary, and does hereby strongly recommend that the Town of Seabrook, at its' earliest convenience, adopt some sort of protective ordinances, especially in the area of land use control.
