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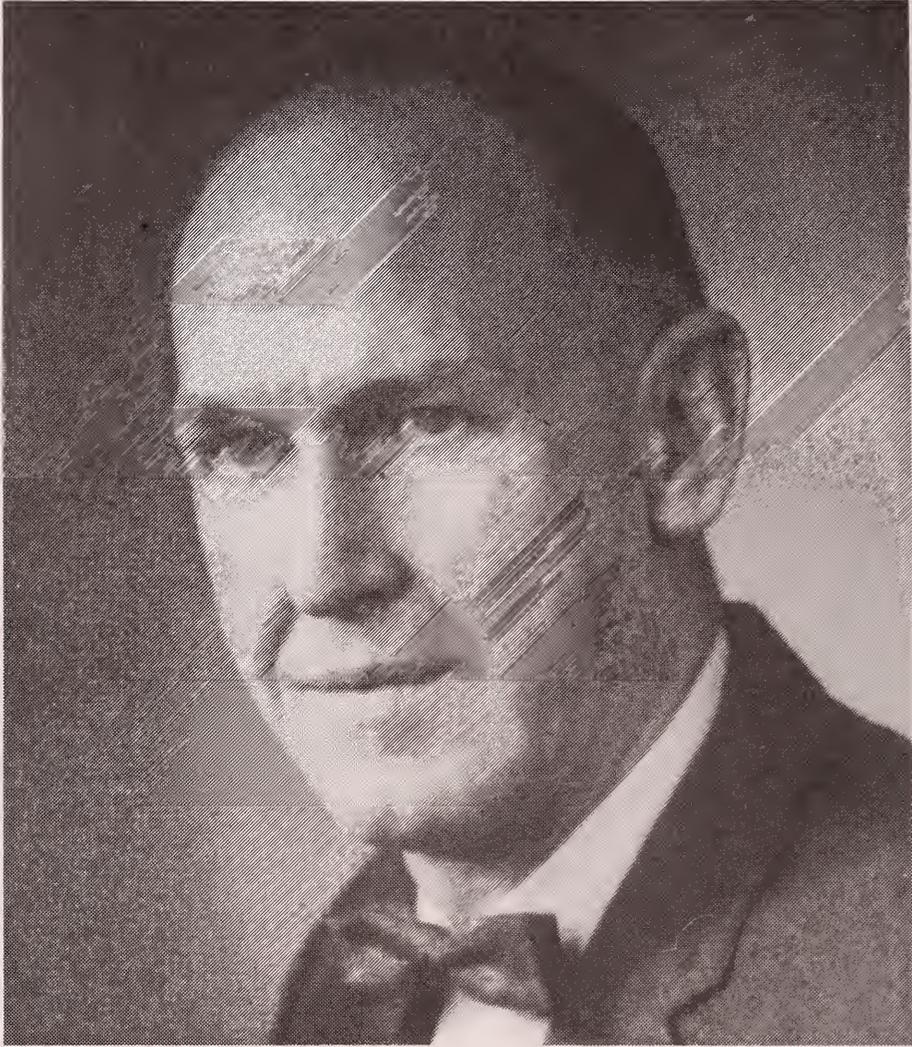

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10:00 AM TO 7:00 PM.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Weare in the county of Hillsborough in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Weare Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday the 14th day of March, next at 10 of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1: To choose all necessary Town Officers for the following year. (By Official Ballot)

Article 2: "Shall we adopt optional adjusted elderly exemptions from property tax? The optional exemptions, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers shall be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$20,000.00; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$25,000.00; for a person 80 years of age or older \$30,000.00. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$10,000.00 or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$12,000.00; and own net assets of \$30,000.00 excluding the value of the person's residence." (By Official Ballot)

Article 3: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article XVII, Permitted Uses and Restrictions for the Residential (R) District and Rural/Agricultural (RA) District by only permitting municipally owned and operated educational institutions in said zoning districts, and to further provide that private educational institutions will be allowed by special exception in the Residential and Rural/Agricultural Districts? (By Official Ballot)

Article 4: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article XVII to permit privately owned gravesites in the Rural/Agricultural (RA) District and to create a new section of the zoning ordinance to regulate the establishment of privately owned graveyards requiring a survey of any proposed private gravesite be submitted to the Planning Board for hearing and approval? (By Official Ballot)

Article 5: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article XIV, Table 1-1, and the footnotes thereof, by clarifying the intent of the ordinance to specify that proposed uses of land must have a minimum of 50,000 square feet of contiguous non-wetland soil and to further clarify that proposed uses of land in Class V soils may be required to submit a high intensity soil survey? (By Official Ballot)

Article 6: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article XVII, subparagraph II, permitted uses for the Planning Board to require at its discretion that all subdivisions or developments of more than 12 lots or dwelling units be arranged in a cluster development under the requirements of the cluster development section of the ordinance, Article XXVI? (By Official Ballot)

Article 7: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 5 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article XXVI, subsection II (J), the cluster housing provisions of the ordinance, by only requiring central water systems in developments of 15 or more dwelling units, and to further provide that individuals wells can be permitted by special exceptions? (By Official Ballot)

Article 8: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 6 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article XXVII, Wetland Zone Land Planning Ordinance, subsection IV (B), by clarifying the Wetland Zone boundaries by providing that the limits of the wetlands district will be areas of wetland of 1/2 acre or more in size, or of any size contiguous to surface waters such as lakes, ponds and streams? (By Official Ballot)

Article 9: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 7 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article XVII permitted uses in the Residential (R) and Rural/Agricultural (RA) Districts by permitting lots which do not meet the minimum lot size and/or road frontage requirements so long as those lots are dedicated to conservation purposes, subject to deed restrictions or conservation easements granting to the Town of Weare or a nonprofit organization the right to limit the use of the property? (By Official Ballot)

Article 10: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 8 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article XXV, Multi-Family Housing, by requiring that multi-family uses have 200 feet of frontage on a Class V town road (By Official Ballot)

Article 11: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 9 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article III, General Provisions, by inserting a new subparagraph that will delegate to the Planning Board the authority to assign section number to the zoning ordinance so long as there is no substantive change to the ordinance? (By Official Ballot)

Article 12: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 10 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend the Town of Weare Building and Permit Ordinance by adopting by reference the following national codes: The BOCA Basic Building Code, Tenth Edition/1987; NFPA 101 Life Safety Code, 1988; The BOCA National Plumbing Code/1987; The BOCA National Fire Prevention Code/1987; The BOCA National Mechanical Code/1987; The CABO One and Two Family Dwelling Code, 1986. The National Electric Code/1987? (By Official Ballot)

Article 13: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 11 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Section A of the Weare Building and Permit Ordinance by rewriting the fourth paragraph clarifying when a permit would no be issued if a proposed structure is not in the interest of the general health, safety and welfare of the community? (By Official Ballot)

Article 14: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 12 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article II, Zoning Map 11, Lot #1409, from Residential (R) District to Commercial Zoning District? (By Petition) (APPROVED by the Planning Board) (By Official Ballot)

Article 15: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 13 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article II, Zoning Map, by changing Weare Tax Map 11, Lot #1024, from Residential (R) District to Commercial Zoning District? (By Petition) (DISAPPROVED By Planning Board) (By Official Ballot)

Article 16: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 14 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article II, Zoning Map, by changing Weare Tax Map 11, Lot #1447, from Residential (R) District to Commercial Zoning District? (By Petition) (DISAPPROVED by Planning Board) (By Official Ballot)

Article 17: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 15 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article II, Zoning Map, by changing Weare Tax Map 11, Lot #599, from Residential (R) District to Commercial Zoning District? (By Petition) (APPROVED By Planning Board) (By Official Ballot)

Article 18: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 16 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article II, Zoning Map, by changing Weare Tax Map 11, Lot #2840, from Residential (R) District to Commercial Zoning District? (By Petition) (DISAPPROVED By Planning Board) (By Official Ballot)

Article 19: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 17 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article II, Zoning Map, by changing Weare Tax Map 11, Lot #1410, from Residential (R) District to Commercial Zoning District? (By Petition) (DISAPPROVED By Planning Board) (By Official Ballot)

Article 20: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 18 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article II, Zoning Map by changing Weare Tax Map 5 and A, Lot #996, from Rural/Agricultural (RA) District to Commercial Zoning District? (By Petition) (APPROVED By Planning Board) (By Official Ballot)

Article 21: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 19 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article II, Zoning Map, by changing Weare Tax Map 8, Lot #1582, from Residential (R) District to Commercial Zoning District? (By Petition) (DISAPPROVED By Planning Board) (By Official Ballot)

NOTE: IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE VOTE OF TOWN MEETING OF MARCH 6, 1973, ARTICLES 22 THROUGH 71 WILL BE TAKEN UP AT AN ADJOURNED SESSION OF THIS MEETING ON MARCH 18, 1989 AT 10:00 AM IN THE WEARE SCHOOL GYMNASIUM.

Article 22: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$527,100.00 for the purpose of constructing a solid waste transfer station and recycling facilities near the site of the present landfill and for engineering and permitting fees associated with a Clean Waste/Demolition Debris Landfill near the site of the present landfill, the sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes in accordance with New Hampshire R.S.A. 33:8, and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds and notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Weare. (By Ballot)

Article 23: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 24: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend Federal and State grants which may become available during the course of the year, and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money, provided that such grants and other monies do not require the expenditure of other Town funds; and that a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and monies, all as provided by RSA 31:95b.

Article 25: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's deed by public auction, advertised sealed bid or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require, except for any parcels of land larger than five acres if land only, or larger than ten acres if a dwelling is present. Any and all sales are to follow the provisions of RSA 80:42, Sale of Tax Liens/Tax Deeded Properties, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 26: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any used or surplus Town equipment or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 27: To see if the Town will vote to accept gifts, bequests and trust funds, including but not limited to perpetual care funds, received during the year, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 28: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to accept prepayments of property taxes, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 29: To see if the Town will vote to enact the following ordinance: To avoid any conflict of interest, no person may serve as a Police Commissioner while employed by the Police Department, in accordance with RSA 31:39a, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

That the provisions of this Ordinance shall exempt affected Commissioners and employees who are in office or who are employed at the time this Ordinance is adopted until July 1, 1989, at which time this Ordinance is shall apply to those individuals as well as any other Police Commissioner or employee of the Police Department.

Article 31: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$427,262.00 for the operation of the Highway Department, including \$235,000.00 for winter and summer maintenance and \$192,262.00 for the general expenses of the department, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 32: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$160,000.00 for reconstruction and resurfacing of roads. Of the \$160,000.00, the sum of \$108,000.00 would be received from Highway Block Grant Funds from the State of New Hampshire, pursuant to RSA 235, and the sum of \$52,000.00 would be raised by taxation, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 33: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 as the Town's share for the relocation and repair of Center Woods Road. The State of New Hampshire, upon passage of this article, will grant State Matching Funds of \$30,000.00 to assist in this project, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 34: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,690.00 for the purpose of purchasing two dump trucks, two stainless steel sanders, two plows, two two-way radios and an air compressor for the Highway Department. Of the \$35,690.00, the sum of \$10,004.00 would come from the December 31, 1988 General Fund Surplus and the sum of \$25,686.00 would be raised by taxation, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 35: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of a Grader Maintenance Fund, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to be placed in this fund, and to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 36: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of a Highway Bridges Repair/Maintenance Fund, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 to be placed in this fund, and to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 37: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of a Highway Grader Fund, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 to be placed in this fund, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 38: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,200.00 to reconstruct a portion of River Road (Clough Park Section) to the Dunbarton town line or to take any other action in relation thereto. The State of New Hampshire, on passage of this article, will grant State Matching Funds of \$8,400.00 to assist in the reconstruction project, while the US Army Corps of Engineers will contribute \$30,000.00 in services to assist in this project.

Article 39: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of a Sugar Hill Road South Repair Fund and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,999.00 to be placed in this fund. The sum of \$15,999 would be transferred from the December 31, 1988 General Fund Surplus, or take any other action thereto.

Article 40: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of a Mountain Road Repair Fund and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,001.00 to be placed in this fund. The sum of \$6,001.00 would be transferred from the December 31, 1988 General Fund Surplus, or take any other action thereto.

Article 41. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 for the purpose of developing a professional plan for the repair and reconstruction of Town roads and bridges, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 42: To see if the Town will vote to make the position of Road Agent an appointive one by the Board of Selectmen pursuant to RSA 231:62. The effective date of the appointment of Road Agent by the Board of Selectmen shall be March, 1992 or upon the vacancy of the office, whichever shall first occur, or take any other action thereto.

Article 43: To see if the Town is in favor of having a three year term for the Road Agent. The Selectmen shall appoint the Road Agent for the designated term of years commencing in March, 1992 or upon the vacancy of the office, whichever shall first occur.

Article 44: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$108,341.00 for the Weare Police Department including \$88,229.00 for the general operations of the department and \$20,112.00 for dispatching services through the Goffstown Dispatch Center, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 45: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000.00 for a computer, software and support for the Weare Police Department or to take any other action in relation there to.

Article 46: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be added to the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund previously established. Of the \$1,000.00, the sum of \$500.00 would come from the December 31, 1988 General Fund Surplus and the balance of \$500.00 would be raised by taxation, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 47: To see if the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen to sell the oldest police cruiser currently in service (1982 Ford LTD), or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 48: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$85,947.00 for the operation of the Weare Fire Department, including \$59,967.00 for general expenses; \$2,500.00 for repair and maintenance of the Town Fire Stations; \$9,000.00 for new and replacement equipment; \$12,480.00 for the operation of the Red Network, and \$2,000.00 for the closing of water holes, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 49: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60,000.00 for the purpose of erecting a new two-bay fire station to replace the current South Weare single-bay station. Of the \$60,000.00, the sum of \$24,000.00 would come from the Emma Sawyer Trust as allocated by the Trustees of Trust Funds and the balance of \$36,000.00 would be raised by taxation.

Article 50: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,000.00 to be added to the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Funds previously established, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 51: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be added to the Rescue Squad Vehicle Capital Reserve Fund previously established. Of the \$5,000.00, the sum of \$500.00 would come from the December 31, 1988 General Fund Surplus and the balance of \$4,500.00 would be raised by taxation, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 52: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$107,039.00 for solid waste disposal operations including \$40,000.00 for the operation of the landfill; \$57,539.00 for participation in the Concord Regional Resource Recovery/Solid Waste Cooperative; \$9,000.00 for the operation of a transfer station/recycling center; and \$500.00 for the Town's share of Central New Hampshire Solid Waste District expenses, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 53: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 to be added to the Landfill Closure Capital Reserve Fund previously established, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 54: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to make by-laws governing the Solid Waste Facility and establish rates as required, all in accordance with the provisions of RSA 149-M:13 (II), subject to the following requirements:

- A. A public hearing is conducted by the Board of Selectmen prior to the enactment of any by-law regulating solid waste disposal.
- B. Considerable weight shall be given by the Board of Selectmen to public comment during these hearings.
- C. Not less than two weeks prior to the public hearing, a notice shall be posted in at least two places and advertisements shall be placed in one newspaper of general circulation listing the location, time and date of the hearing. A brief summary shall be included describing the points of consideration of the hearing.

Article 54 (Cont.)

D. Copies of the enacted Solid Waste Disposal By-laws shall be available for the public, without cost, at the Town Offices and the Transfer Station at all times.

Article 55: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$90,000.00 for the purpose of beginning the revaluation process of the Town of Weare to be implemented in the 1990 tax year. Of the \$90,000.00, the sum of \$70,000.00 would come from the December 31, 1988 General Fund Surplus and the balance of \$20,000.00 would be raised by taxation, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 56: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provision of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of a Cemetery Surveying Fund, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to be placed in this fund, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 57: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$51,068.00 to be added to the Library Addition Capital Reserve Fund previously established. Of the \$51,069.00, \$1,068.00 would come from encumbered funds from a 1987 appropriation for Library Architect fees and \$50,000.00 would be raised by taxation.

Article 58: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of a Town Hall and Stone Building Restoration Fund, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 to be placed in this fund, and to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend. Of the \$15,000.00, \$9,886.21 would come from encumbered funds from a 1985 appropriation for Town Hall restoration; \$555.00 from encumbered funds from 1987 appropriation for Stone Memorial Building roof repairs; \$2,455.00 from the December 31, 1988 General Fund Surplus; and \$2,104.00 would be raised by taxation, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 59: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,500.00 for captial improvements and/or expenditures for the ensuing year:

Master Plan Update	\$6,000.00
Town Office Building Repairs	\$2,000.00
Cemetery Restoration	\$2,500.00

Article 60: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the annual fireworks display on July Fourth, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 61: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,800.00 to be added to the Chase Park Erosion Control Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The \$2,800.00 sum would come from the December 31, 1988 General Fund Surplus, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 62: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to execute and deliver to Douglas Burnett, Jr., a quitclaim deed conveying to him any interest the Town may have acquired in certain property know as "47 -acres Alvah Gove Land" owned by him and taxed to him since 1964, but previously conveyed to the Town by tax deed for \$3.63, provided however that all taxes, interest and costs to the Town have been reimbursed, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 63: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of a Town Hall and Town Office Building Parking Lot Paving Fund and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be placed in this fund. Of the \$1,000.00, \$515.00 would come from a special account currently held by the Town Treasurer for this purpose, while the balance of \$485.00 would be raised by taxation.

Article 64: To see if the Town will vote to amend Article 51 of the 1988 Annual Town Meeting with respect to the withdrawal of approximately 25-acres from the Felch Farm Town Forest so as to provide a specified area of land for the Highway Department to utilize and for the Landfill and Transfer Station, by adding the following conditions thereto:

- A. Lumber cleared for these purposes will be sold, when possible, and the money from said sale will be placed in the Town Forest Account. The principle and interest of these funds will be applied to the costs associated with restoration of the acres described and to the standards contained in the Town of Weare Earth Products Ordinance and the stipulations below. Should these proceeds not cover the costs associated with the restoration, a future Town Meeting shall determine how the difference will be funded.
- B. Topsoil will be stockpiled and reapplied to the site when it is restored.
- C. As gravel is removed, no more than 2.5 acres can remain unclaimed without restoration. The restoration shall meet Town standards for slope and replanted to White Pine at a rate of 450 trees per acre (10' x 10') and two State Wildlife Packages per acre.
- D. The Conservation Commission and Board of Selectmen are jointly charged with overseeing the restoration of this area and an annual report shall appear in the annual Town Report to keep the citizens abreast of progress.

Article 65: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,750.00 to have mapped and marked on the ground with painted blazes the approximate 25 acre parcel [formerly a part of Felch Farm Town Forest] which was assigned to the Town Highway Department, Landfill and Transfer Station in 1988. The sum of \$1,750.00 is to come from the Town Forrest Account, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 66: To see if the Town will vote to amend Article 30 as adopted by the 1986 Annual Town Meeting which allowed skidder use in the Weare Town Forest only in the winter months, by allowing such use during the dry months of summer and fall as well. That the bylaw as amended shall read as follows:

"That the Town of Weare approves skidder use in the areas designated as Weare Town Forest during the winter months and the dry months of summer and fall as conditions allow, with supervision by the Weare Conservation Commission and consulting local and state foresters."

Article 67: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to reconvey to P&G Construction Co. Inc. a portion of the Beaver Pond Road Easement that was conveyed to the Town from said company prior to the relocation of the road at the demand of the State of New Hampshire, the conveyance to be on such terms and conditions as the Selectmen may deem to be in the best interest of the Town.

Article 68: To see if the Town will vote to discontinue a section of Balch Hill Road, where the road is abutted on both sides by the Poor Farm Town Forest, and assign the management responsibility of this discontinued road to the Conservation Commission as part of the Town Forest. (By Petition)

Article 69: To see if the Town will vote to request that there be a moratorium for a period of two years relative to having the Town reevaluated in order to allow real estate market values to stabilize to a more equitable level. (By Petition)

Article 70: To see if the Town will vote to accept a certain private Road located at the northerly end of Craney Hill Road, so-called, said road being known as "Bob's End"; or take any other action in relation thereto. (By Petition)

Article 71: To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

RECORD OF TOWN MEETING

March 8, 1988

The annual Town Meeting of the Town of Weare was called to order by the Moderator, Neal M. Kurk, at 10:03 a.m. The pledge of allegiance to the flag was led by Harold O. Hall, Selectman.

The Moderator read Articles 1 and 2 of the Town Warrant and the return of posting. Harold O. Hall moved to adjourn the Meeting after balloting and the counting of ballots until Saturday, March 12, 1988 at 10:00 a.m. in the Weare School Gymnasium. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The Moderator read the Weare School District Warrant and the John Stark School District Warrant for the election of officers.

Selectmen Harold Hall and Gordon Brown examined the ballot boxes and declared them to be empty. The Moderator announced that absentee ballots would be opened and cast at 11 a.m. in accordance with the law. The polls were declared open at 10:10 a.m. by the Moderator. The Meeting proceeded to ballot for Town and School District officers and to vote on Article 2 of the Town Warrant.

The polls were closed at 7:15 p.m. and ballots were counted. At 8:30 p.m., Raymond Kelly, School District Moderator, announced the result of the vote on Article 2. At 10:30 p.m., the School District Moderator announced the Weare School District results. Neal Kurk, Town Moderator, then announced the results of the Weare voting on the John Stark School District ballot. At 11:20 p.m., the Town Moderator announced the results of the Town election.

At 11:25 p.m., the Moderator adjourned the Meeting until Saturday, March 12, 1988 at 10:00 a.m. in the Weare School Gymnasium.

At 10:08 a.m., Saturday, March 12, 1988, the Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Neal M. Kurk. The pledge of allegiance to the flag was led by Harold O. Hall. The Meeting was asked to stand to hear the reading of town residents who have died since last Town Meeting. This was followed by a moment of silence.

The Moderator read the results of the Town and Weare School District and John Stark School District elections held Tuesday, March 8, 1988 and the result of the vote on Article 2 - Zoning Ordinance. He announced that those who were elected may come forward at the close of Town Meeting to be given the oath of office.

The Moderator stated the rules for today's Meeting would be Garfield Jones' Parliamentary Procedures at the Glance as interpreted by the Chair. This will be supplemented by ten specific rules as follows:

- 1) You may address the Chair or may address another through the Chair.
- 2) If you wish to be heard, please stand or raise your hand so that the Chair may recognize you. When recognized, you should approach the nearest microphone, give your name and proceed with your remarks. It is important to use microphones for two reasons: first, to allow everyone to hear remarks - the acoustics in this gymnasium are not the best - and second, to permit remarks to be recorded through the public address system.
- 3) If you proposed an article, you will be recognized first. After you have spoken, the person who rises and addresses the Chair first after the floor is yielded will be recognized to speak. If you make a motion, you may claim the floor in preference to others.
- 4) You are not entitled to the floor a second time in debate on the same motion as long as someone who has not already spoken desires the floor. You may speak a third time only by permission of the Meeting.

- 5) Motions to reconsider will be entertained only while the article to which they pertain is properly before the Meeting.
- 6) Lengthy or complex motions or amendments must be presented in writing.
- 7) In addressing the meeting, you should keep your remarks to the subject currently on the floor. Remarks which are not germane to the subject at hand or which involve personalities will be ruled out of order.
- 8) Legally registered voters only shall be recognized. They should be displaying voter identification badges passed out at the door by the Supervisors of the Checklist. Those who are not legally registered voters may not address the Meeting without its consent.
- 9) After each article dealing with the raising and/or appropriating of monies has been moved and spoken to, the Chair will recognize the Finance Committee so it may present its recommendations to the Meeting.
- 10) There will be no smoking in the gymnasium during the Meeting. Smokers are advised that smoking is permitted in the anteroom just outside the door at the rear of the gym.

The Moderator introduced the Town Officers and Robert Bossie, Legal Counsel for the Town. Thomas Ring, Chairman of the Finance Committee, introduced members of the Finance Committee who were present. The Moderator asked if there would be any objection to hearing from Town Counsel on any legal opinion required during the Meeting. No objection was made, and Mr. Bossie was granted the privilege of addressing the Meeting, if necessary.

The Moderator recognized William Herman, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, to hear the State of the Town address.

William Herman moved the reading of the Warrant in its entirety be waived at this time and that each article be read as it is taken up. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Harold O. Hall moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend Federal and State grants which may become available during the course of the year, and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for the purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money, provided that such grants and other monies do not require the expenditure of other Town funds; and that a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and monies, all as provided by RSA 31:95b.

Harold O. Hall moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's deed by public auction, advertised sealed bid or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require, except for any parcels of land larger than five acres if land only, or larger than ten acres if a dwelling is present. Any and all sales are to follow the provisions of RSA 80:42, Sale of Tax Liens/Tax Deeded Properties, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Gordon Brown moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to dispose of Tax Collector deed acquired property to not-for-profit groups or corporations for the purpose of it being used for the building of low cost or affordable housing, the definition of which shall be determined by the Selectmen.

William Herman moved to dismiss the article. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. Article 6 was dismissed.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell a piece of Town land on the north side of Gould Road (former salt shed property) to the highest bidder by public auction, advertised sealed bid or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require or to take any other action in relation thereto.

William Herman moved the adoption of the article as read. The motion was seconded.

Mary Elizabeth Wilson, a relative of the original owners of this property, made a substitute motion that the salt shed land be sold to the present owners of the Wilson property for \$1.00. The motion was seconded by Howard Ineson.

After a lengthy discussion, a motion was made to move the question. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The vote on Mrs. Wilson's substitute motion was affirmative by a unanimous vote.

The vote on Article 7 under Mrs. Wilson's motion was affirmative.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any used or surplus Town equipment or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Gordon Brown moved to adopt the article as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept all gifts, bequests, and trust funds, including but not limited to perpetual care funds, received during the year or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Harold Hall moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to accept prepayments of property taxes, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

William Herman moved the adoption of the article as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 11. Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 80:58-86 for a real estate tax lien procedure? These statutes provide that tax sales to private individuals for non-payment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with a real estate tax lien procedure under which only a municipality or county where the property is located or the state may acquire a tax lien against land and buildings for unpaid taxes. (By Petition) (By Ballot)

Janet Brown moved Article 11 be adopted as read. The motion was seconded. After a short discussion during which the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen stated the Selectmen support this article, a written ballot was taken on Article 11. The result of the ballot:

Yes - 119

No - 11

The vote was affirmative and the provisions of RSA 80:58-86 adopted.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Board of Selectmen, to appoint a deputy treasurer as authorized by RSA 41:29-a, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

William Herman moved the adoption of the article as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$335,000.00 for the operation of the Highway Department, including \$183,611.00 for winter and summer maintenance; \$11,000.00 for repairs to bridges; and \$140,389.00 for the general expenses of the department, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Wilfred Foote moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee recommended passage of amount as read.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150,000.00 for reconstruction and resurfacing of roads. Of the \$150,000.00, the sum of \$101,599.00 would be received from Highway Block Grant Funds from the State of New Hampshire, pursuant to RSA 235, and the sum of \$48,401.00 would be raised by taxation, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Wilfred Foote moved to accept the article as read. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee recommended passage of this article as written.

William Herman stated this would be used on approximately 6 miles of road from Quaker Street, where reconstruction stopped previously, to Thorndike Street - to Hodgdon Road - to Route 149 and also 2 miles on River Road. The entire Highway Block Grant is to be dedicated to the reconstruction of our roads, not only this year, but also in future years.

The vote on Article 15 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$58,916.00 to reconstruct Hatfield Road, with \$45,660.00 of the expense coming from off-site improvements from private developers and the balance of \$13,256.00 being raised by taxation, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Terry Knowles moved adoption of Article 16 as read. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee recommended passage of this article as written.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$71,500.00 from the December 31, 1987 General Fund Surplus for the Capital Reserve Fund to be used toward the replacement of two bridges on Reservoir Drive, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

William Herman moved adoption of the article as read. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee recommended passage of this article as written.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 as the Town's share for the reconstruction of River Road (Clough Park section) to the Dunbarton town line, or to take any other action in relation thereto. The State of New Hampshire, upon passage of this article, will grant State Matching Funds of \$100,000.00 to assist in the reconstruction project, while the US Army Corps of Engineers will contribute \$30,000.00 in monies or services to assist in this project. Upon the completion of the reconstruction project, the Board of Selectmen are authorized to accept that portion of the road on behalf of the Town from the US Government Army Corps of Engineers in accordance with the 1959 signed agreement between the two parties, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Gordon Brown moved adoption of the article as read. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee concurs with this article.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 as the Town's share for the repair of Center Woods Road (Center Street) or to take any other action in relation thereto. The State of New Hampshire, upon passage of this article, will grant State Matching Funds of \$30,000.00 to assist in this project, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

William Herman moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee concurs with this article.

After a short discussion, Keith Lion moved the question. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The vote on Article 19 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$34,877.00 for the purchase of a backhoe for the

Highway Department, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Gordon Brown moved to adopt this article as read. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee concurs with this article.

The vote on Article 20 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing truck(s) and sander(s) for the Highway Department, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Wilfred Foote moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee concurs with this article.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provision of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of a Highway Department Truck Fund, and to raise and appropriate the proceeds from the sale of used and surplus Highway Department equipment to be placed in this fund, and to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

William Herman moved the adoption of the article as read. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee concurs with this article and, in fact, the Committee in general concurs with capital reserve funding as a good way for the Town to go.

The vote on Article 22 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Highway Department Vehicles Capital Reserve Fund created in 1987. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, to be transferred to the Highway Department Truck Fund, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

William Herman moved adoption of the article as read. The motion was seconded. The vote was affirmative by unanimous vote.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to make the position of Road Agent an appointive one by the Board of Selectmen pursuant to RSA 231:62, to become effective in March, 1989, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

William Herman moved adoption of this article as read. The motion was seconded.

Mr. Herman stated this is in no way a reflection of the job Wilfred Foote is doing. The Board of Selectmen feel Mr. Foote will have his job for as long as he wishes, whether it is an appointed or elected position.

After a short discussion, Walter Brennan moved that this article be dismissed. The motion was seconded.

After further discussion, Jon Osborne moved the question. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The vote on dismissal was affirmative. Article 24 was dismissed.

The Meeting recessed for 1/2 hour at 12:45 for lunch and resumed at 1:15 p.m.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote that Planning Board members shall be elected. (By Petition)

Leonard West moved that the Town vote to have the Planning Board members elected. The motion was seconded.

Terry Knowles moved to dismiss Article 25. The motion was seconded.

After a lengthy discussion on the pros and cons of electing a Planning Board, Keith Lion moved the question. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The vote on the dismissal of Article 25 was affirmative. Article 25 was dismissed.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate th sum of \$79,900.00 for the Weare Police Department, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

William Herman moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$79,900.00 for the operation of the Weare Police Department and the hiring of a full-time Police Chief. The motion was seconded.

The Finance Committee did not make a recommendation on Article 26.

After discussion, the vote was taken. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$28,150.00 to enable the Town to connect to the Goffstown Police Dispatch Center for full-time professional coverage of the Town of Weare, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

William Herman moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$28,584.00 to enable the Town to connect to the Goffstown Police Dispatch Center for full-time professional coverage of the Town of Weare. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee concurs with this article.

The vote was affirmative.

Gordon Tiffany moved a sense of the Meeting vote to show its' appreciation to Florence Wheldon for the many years she has served as police dispatcher. The Meeting responded with a resounding round of applause.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 for the purchase of a new police cruiser for the Weare Police Department, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

William Herman moved the adoption of the article as read. The motion was seconded.

Mr. Herman stated that this cruiser would go to the police chief, the newest cruiser that we currently own would go into rotation for the department, and the oldest cruiser would be sold under Article 29.

The Finance Committee concurs with this article.

Henry Burke suggested a 4-wheel drive vehicle be considered for the Police Department. The Police Commissioners will take this suggestion under consideration.

Royal Richardson moved to amend Article 28 to read that the vehicle be identified for reasons of safety.

The original motion was changed to read "for the purchase of a new 'marked' police cruiser". The seconder agreed to this change.

The vote on th amendment was affirmative.

The vote on the amended article was affirmative.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the oldest police cruiser currently in service (1982 Ford), and to appropriate the proceeds of the sale to the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund previously established, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Gordon Brown moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded.

The Finance Committee concurs with this article.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75,812.00 for the operation of the Weare Fire Department, including \$50,111.00 for general expenses; \$4,200.00 for repair and maintenance of the Town Fire Stations; \$11,000.00 for new and replacement equipment; and \$10,501.00 for the operation of the Red Network, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Chester Rhodenizer moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$77,312.00 for the operation of the Weare Fire Department, including \$50,111.00 for general expenses; \$4,200.00 for repair and maintenance of the Town Fire Stations; \$11,000.00 for new and replacement equipment; and \$12,001.00 for the operation of the Red Network. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee concurs with this article.

The vote was affirmative.

Gordon Brown moved to see if the Town will vote to establish a committee, to be appointed by the Moderator, to come back next year with a cost to the Town of Weare to go to a central dispatch communication system for the Fire Department. The Committee shall consist of one member of the Fire Department, one member of the Rescue Squad, one member of the Board of Fire Wards and two members from the list of registered voters.

The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be added to the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Funds previously established, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Chester Rhodenizer moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded.

The Finance Committee concurs with this article.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70,000.00 for the purchase of a new Rescue Squad vehicle, and to authorize the withdrawal of \$14,375.00 for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund plus accrued interest to date of withdrawal. Of the balance of \$55,625.00, the sum of \$20,000.00 would come from the Emma Sawyer Trust as allocated by the Trustees of Trust Funds, and \$35,625.00 from the December 31, 1987 General Fund surplus, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Chester Rhodenizer moved to accept the article as read. The motion was seconded. Chief Rhodenizer stated they are asking for a 4-wheel drive vehicle.

The Finance Committee concurs with this article. Mr. Ring stated this purchase will not affect the tax rate.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the current Rescue Squad vehicle and to appropriate the proceeds of the sale to the Rescue Squad Vehicle Capital Reserve Fund previously established, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Gordon Brown moved to accept the article as read. The motion was seconded.

After a short discussion, a division vote was taken. The result of the vote:

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 for the operation and maintenance of the Landfill, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Wilfred Foote moved to accept the article as read. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee concurs with this article.

After discussion, the vote on Article 34 was taken. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 to be added to the Transfer Station Capital Reserve Fund previously established, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Jack Dearborn moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee concurs with this article.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 to be added to the Landfill Closure Capital Reserve Fund previously established, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

William Herman moved the adoption of the article as read. The motion was seconded.

The Finance Committee concurs with this article.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$130,000.00 for the Phase I closure of the Landfill and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose.

Gordon Brown moved to accept the article as read. The motion was seconded.

The Finance Committee concurs with this article.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$19,500.00 for capital improvements and/or expenditures for the ensuing year:

Harold Hall moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded.

The Finance Committee agrees with this article.

The vote was affirmative.

Ed Piscopo asked if any thought has been given to changing the place of the fireworks display. Mr. Herman stated that any suggestion anyone may have would be well received by the Fire Department.

ARTICLE 40. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,625.00 for the expansion of the computer hardware

and software in the Tax Collector's and Selectmen's offices and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

William Herman moved the adoption of this article as read. The motion was seconded.

Mr. Herman stated that \$5,300.00 would be for expansion of the computer system in the Tax Collector's office and the remainder would be used by the Selectmen's office for a similar system for the financial bookkeeping of the Town.

The Finance Committee agrees with this article.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 41. To see if the Town will authorize the establishment of a Capital Reserve Fund (pursuant to RSA 35) for the future revaluation of the Town and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 towards this purpose, and to appoint the Selectmen as agents to administer the fund, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

William Herman moved the adoption of the article as read. The motion was seconded.

Mr. Herman stated the tentative plan is to have the tax map work (updating and correcting) done in 1988 and to begin re-evaluating the Town in 1989 to be completed by 1990.

The Finance Committee agrees with this article.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 42. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of a Library Addition Project and to appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 to be placed in this fund, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Keith Lion moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded.

The Finance Committee concurs with this article.

After discussion, Ed Piscopo moved to amend this article to read \$100,000.00. The motion was seconded.

After further discussion, Edith Foote made a motion to move the question. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The vote on the amendment was negative and the amendment failed.

The vote on the original motion was affirmative.

At this time, the Moderator introduced Senator Jack Chandler and Representative Betsy Moore who were attending our Meeting.

ARTICLE 43. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,000.00 for the erection of street signs in the Town of Weare, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Margo McLeod moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded.

The Finance Committee agrees with this article.

After discussion, the vote was affirmative.

William Herman moved a sense of the Meeting vote to show its' appreciation to the members of this committee who worked on this project. The Meeting responded with a hearty round of applause.

ARTICLE 44. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board, pursuant to RSA 674:43, effective upon adoption of Subdivision Regulations, to review and approve or disapprove site plans for the development of tracts for non-residential uses, or for multi-family dwelling units, which are defined as any structure containing more than two dwelling units, whether or not such development includes a subdivision or resubdivision of the site. The Town Clerk shall file a certificate of notice with the Hillsborough County Registry of Deeds which shows that the Planning Board has been so authorized on this date, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Terry Knowles moved the adoption of this article as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 45. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to cover the costs of the Town's participation in a local Household Hazardous Waste Collection in 1988. These monies are to be supplemented by State Matching Funds in the amount of 15 cents per capita from the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services, Waste Management Division. Any unused monies are to be returned to the General Fund, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Craig Knowles moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to cover the cost of the Town's participation in a local Household Hazardous Waste Collection in 1988. The motion was seconded.

The Finance Committee recommended \$3,000.00 be raised under this article and Chairman Tom Ring moved to amend the amount in Article 45 to \$3,000.00. The motion was seconded.

The vote on the amendment was affirmative.

The vote on the article as amended was affirmative.

ARTICLE 46. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to continue the access road within the Felch Farm Town Forest, and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum from the Town Forest account, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Craig Knowles moved the adoption of the article as read. The motion was seconded.

The Finance Committee agrees with this article.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 47. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue winter maintenance of Saw Mill Road between Route 149 and Mt. Dearborn Road, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Wilfred Foote moved the adoption of this article as read. The motion was seconded.

Neal Kurk requested William Herman take over as Moderator as he, Mr. Kurk, wished to speak on this article.

After discussion, Edith Foote moved to make Saw Mill Road between Route 149 and Mt. Dearborn road a Class VI road. The Moderator declared this motion to be out of order.

Keith Lion moved the question. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The vote on Article 47 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 48. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue a portion of the roadway known as Nichols Road from Tiffany Hill Road past the former Osborne farm to the intersection with New Quaker Road with the ownership of this section of road to be given to the abutters. Provided, however, that such discontinuance is conditioned upon the following additional terms and conditions. The road would be given up in exchange for a new road, constructed under the supervision of the Selectmen and Road Agent. Upon the developer's completion of the new road construction, the Selectmen shall be authorized to accept its ownership on behalf of the Town. Under no circumstances will the transfer of titles, road acceptance, land acquisition, construction, signs, culverts, etc. cause any expense to the Town of Weare, and all such expenses are to be borne by the developer.

Gordon Brown moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 49. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of a Septic Lagoon Improvement Fund, and to raise and appropriate the revenues from septage dumping at the Landfill to be placed in this

fund, and to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

William Herman moved to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of a Septic Lagoon Improvement Fund and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,500.00 to be placed in this fund, and to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend. The motion was seconded.

The Finance Committee agrees with this article.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 50. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of Chase Park Improvements, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be placed in this fund, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Howard Ineson, Sr. moved to adopt the article as read. The motion was seconded.

The Finance Committee recommended approval of this article.

William Herman moved to amend the article to read "Chase Park Erosion Control Fund". With the approval of the mover and seconder of this article, the words "Chase Park Erosion Control Fund" were substituted in the original motion.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 51. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of approximately 25 acres from the Felch Farm Town Forest to provide a specified area of land for the needs of the Highway Department, Landfill and Transfer Station, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen, with consultation and input from the Conservation Commission, to establish the bounds of the tract of land.

William Herman moved the adoption of the article as read. The motion was seconded.

Craig Knowles moved to amend the article by adding the following: "providing that any excavation for the above needs will not intrude upon the glacial ester in the Town Forest as defined and delineated by the Hillsborough County Conservation Services".

The mover and seconder of the motion had no objection to this phrase being included in the original motion. It was, therefore, added to the original motion.

The vote on Article 51 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 52. To transact any other business which may legally come before this Meeting.

Craig Knowles moved to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to accept private donations of land, interest in land, or money to be deposited in a conservation fund for the purposes of contributing to the local matching portion required for acquiring conservation land or interest in land and other costs associated therewith for permanent conservation use under the NH Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP) RSA 221-A, and authorize the Selectmen to apply for and accept the State matching funds under the LCIP for the purposes of acquisition of the fee or lesser interest in conservation land. Said appropriated or donated funds and State matching funds may be expended by a majority vote of the Conservation Commission and the Selectmen.

The Moderator stated this is not a motion that can be accepted under Article 52.

Forrest Esenwine stated a great deal of time had been spent in the preparation of this Meeting by the Selectmen and the Finance Committee, and he congratulated them for a job well done. The Meeting responded with a round of applause.

Henry Burke moved to see if the Town will select a study committee to examine and report to the Town at the next regular Town Meeting or a Special Town Meeting called for that purpose, the feasibility of a limited building moratorium in the Town of Weare until an impact study can be conducted to determine suitable goals. The motion was as seconded.

After discussion with the Moderator, Mr. Burke changed his motion to read a study committee of five citizens to be appointed by the Selectmen.

William Herman stated that the Planning Board should be the ones who study this rather than a committee. Keith Lion asked Mr. Burke to withdraw his motion and leave the Planning Board and Selectmen to do their job.

After further discussion, Mr. Burke amended his motion to read as follows: That the Meeting request the Planning Board to study the issue of growth control and bring forward appropriate proposals.

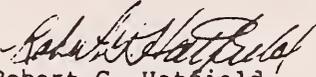

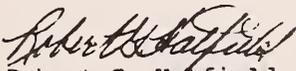

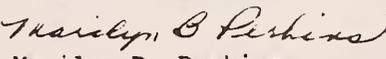

The Center Square Cemetery fence is nearly completed. It was decided to run chain link fence in the back of the cemetery which would last longer than wood. The portion of the fence along East Street, however, will remain wood to preserve the rural appearance of the cemetery. The Poor Farm Cemetery was cleared of brush and leaves and a new fence was erected at the Quaker Cemetery on Quaker Street by Fred Drewry.

The Trustees have noted an increase in the sale of grave lots and at the present time all two-person lots have been sold. The Trustees are in the process of establishing a Capital Reserve Fund for purposes of having additional grave sites surveyed and marked.

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CONCORD REGIONAL SOLID WASTE/RESOURCE RECOVERY COOPERATIVE

In 1988, the construction of the 500 ton per day refuse to energy facility by SES Concord (Wheelabrator Technologies) in Penacook has proceeded. The construction of the facility is nearing completion, with the initiation of shakedown operations scheduled for this April. During the spring and early summer months, refuse deliveries by the Cooperative to the plant are anticipated to be intermittent as start-up operations proceed. Full commercial operation is anticipated to begin in the late summer/early fall of 1989.

The power generated by the refuse to energy plant is to be sold to Public Service of New Hampshire (PSNH) under the terms of a rate order previously issued by the NH Public Utilities Commission. The impact, if any, of the PSNH bankruptcy on the price to be paid for power is not yet clear. The Cooperative, which entered into financial obligations on the basis of the PUC rate order, continues to maintain the position that the PUC specified rates are in place. Significant progress has been made in dealings with PSNH and Concord Electric Company on finalizing and constructing electrical distribution system improvements.

CONCORD REGIONAL SOLID WASTE/RESOURCE RECOVERY COOPERATIVE (Cont.)

In March 1988, the Cooperative was apprised by the NH Department of Environmental Services that the Concord Landfill, which had been approved for disposal of ash residue from the refuse to energy plant, would not be available for use. The Cooperative was successful in acquiring a 38 acre parcel in Franklin. Obtaining permits, securing long term financing, designing and constructing a double lined secure residue landfill in ten months. The landfill was constructed using intensive quality control procedure and, despite the aggressive schedule, was completed at a cost under budget. The landfill is substantially complete and will begin operation in April.

The member municipalities need to ensure that arrangements are made to allow full delivery to the refuse to energy plant by no later than August, 1989. The Cooperative requests that each community make arrangements for the storage and disposal of unacceptable waste, including motor vehicle batteries which constitute the greater source of lead in municipal solid waste. Such batteries are not to be delivered to the refuse to energy plant. The Project Director further encourages all communities to consider and implement materials recycling to reduce anticipated excess tonnage.

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CONCORD REGIONAL VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association continues to offer three major health services to the residents of Weare: Home Care, Hospice, and Health Promotion.

Home Care Services respond to the health care needs of those patients with acute or chronic illnesses that require skilled professional and paraprofessional care so they may return to or remain in their homes. Emphasis is on promoting independence and maximum functioning of the patient within the least restrictive setting.

CONCORD REGIONAL VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION (Cont.)

Hospice Services provide professional and paraprofessional services to the terminally ill patient with a limited life expectancy. The goal is to enhance the quality of the patient's remaining life by helping he/she remain at home in comfort and dignity. Emphasis is on pain and symptom management and skilled intervention to meet the patient's special physical and emotional needs.

Health Promotion Services focus on the low and marginal income families and individuals to prevent illness by professional assessment and screening for health risks and needs, by early intervention to prevent, eliminate, or minimize the impact of illness and/or disability, and by anticipatory guidance and health teaching. Services rendered in the clinic setting are: child health, family planning, sexually transmitted disease, adult screening, immunizations, and HIV testing and counseling. Home visits are made in crisis situations or when needed health care cannot be given in the clinic. Senior Health services are provided at congregate housing sites. Professional and paraprofessional hourly home services are provided on a private fee-for-service basis. Emphasis is on promoting healthy children, families, and individuals through early intervention and health teaching.

Health Education and Instruction is part of each home visit or clinic visit.

Anyone in Weare may request service; patient, doctor, health facility, pastor, friend or neighbor. All requests are answered, but continuing home care will only be provided with a physician's order.

A call to the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association (224-4093) between the hours of 8:00am - 4:00pm seven days a week is all that is necessary to start services or make inquiries. A Hospice nurse is on call (224-4093) 4:00pm - 8:00am daily. Federal regulations specify a charge is applicable to all visits. Fees are scaled for that person, without a health plan, who is unable to pay the full charge. However, for fee scaling, federal regulations require a financial statement be completed by the patient or responsible person. Town monies subsidize those visits that are scaled or that no fee is collectible.

This agency is certified as a Medicare/Medicaid Provider, licensed by the State of NH and is a member agency of the United Way of Merrimack County.

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CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The past year has been one of significant change for the Weare Conservation Commission. Although the year started off on the right track with all vacancies filled, the resignations of two key members, including the chairman, were regretfully received. Our one remaining veteran member was indisposed for a while and was unable to participate in Commission affairs. Subsequent appointments, by the Board of Selectmen, resulted in a new Commission of diverse backgrounds, including a geologist, civil engineer, construction project manager, conservation officer, and developer. The net effect is a broad representation of people committed to the conservation of natural resources in the Town.

Specifically, we are concerned with continuing conservation efforts in the following areas:

1. The preservation of wetlands, monitoring dredge and fill activity, and making recommendations to the State Wetlands Board.
2. Promoting the establishment and maintenance of conservation districts and easements.
3. Continued management of the Town Forest under the guidelines of the master plan.
4. Sponsorship of interested high school students to the Youth Conservation Camp, run by the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests.
5. Becoming increasingly involved in the establishment of a Groundwater Protection Ordinance for the town as mandated by federal and state law.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION (Cont.)

The dramatic population increase in recent years makes it very important to provide for the proper disposal of hazardous wastes generated by households in the Town of Weare. Materials such as paint remover, drain cleaner, pesticides, battery acid, etc., if disposed of improperly, can pose a serious threat to public health and our environment. To meet this rising need, members of the Commission are working towards establishing a Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day. Residents will be asked to bring their hazardous substances to a controlled collection site on a chosen day, to be removed by a licensed hazardous waste transporter to an authorized disposal facility. Since this one day project can be costly, the Commission will explore the possibility of obtaining partial funding through a grant from the State of New Hampshire's Department of Environmental Services. Also, if we are able to coordinate such a program with a neighboring town, costs could be shared.

The Conservation Commission plans to resume publishing a newsletter this year, with the first issue scheduled for mailing in the first quarter of 1989. Every boxholder in town will receive a copy.

Possibly our most significant immediate and long-term goal is our involvement with the Trust for New Hampshire Lands/Land Conservation Investment Program. This program represents the State of New Hampshire's most comprehensive land conservation initiative ever. The goal of this program is to protect the most scenic and sensitive areas which our state has to offer. These may include: recreational land, scenic vistas, wildlife habitats, prime wetlands, shorelines and high yield aquifer sites. This program is available to towns on a matching fund basis.

We strongly urge the people of our town to get involved with the Commission. We need your suggestions, help and support in order to keep Weare a great place to live.

TOWN FOREST

Last winter's timber cut yielded approximately 65,000 board feet of lumber. The cut ended on a somewhat sour note, with the Town roads being closed suddenly in the spring, so that the logger moved off the lot with many logs on the landing and in the forest. While the logs were ultimately retrieved from the forest, there remains several loads of pulpwood on the landing. The icy conditions this winter have so far prevented their removal.

We continue our preparation for the road down the steep hill to the crossing point of Trout Brook as indicated in the Master Plan. We will be asking for a large expenditure from the Town Forest Account in order to complete this section of the road, thus gaining access to over 1 million board feet of mature white pine that will be selectively cut.

We are also asking the voters to permit the use of skidders during dry months of summer and fall. The roadway into the forest is now so long that keeping it cleared of snow is a factor of winter harvesting that the Town is penalized for in the price paid per thousand board feet (either long skids to the landing or long trips for the log truck.) Also, the mineral soils in the Town Forest regenerate white pine far more successfully when the soil is partially exposed. The key issue here is supervision, for the skill of the operator, summer or winter, determines erosion problems and damage to the residual stand of trees.

We have continued our wildlife habitat improvement work. This includes releasing wild apple trees and planting wildlife food (trees and shrubs) available through the NH State Nursery.

Lastly, it should be noted that the esker referred to in the amendment to Article 51 from the 1988 Town Meeting has been marked by the Conservation Commission to eliminate any confusion.

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DOG OFFICER'S REPORT

The Selectmen appointed a Dog Officer in 1981 for the purpose of picking up stray (unlicensed) dogs. The number of calls and responses has steadily increased since that time.

Approximately three-hundred-six calls were received by the Officer pertaining to animal problems: lost & found, complaints, pickups, and general information. Complaint calls were directed to the Police Department and Selectmen's Office.

A total of sixty-two dogs were picked up during 1988. Thirty-two were transported to the Animal Rescue League after attempts to find their owners proved negative, two were transported to Russell Animal Hospital, one was transported to Russell Animal Hospital for treatment and then to the Animal Rescue League, six were deceased and twenty-one dogs were retrieved by their owners.

The Dog Officer also conducted lost and found service and urges all owners to have their dogs licensed.

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BOARD OF FIREWARDS REPORT

The Board of Firewards have managed, for another year, to stay within their operating budget and to put a few unsettled matters to rest. Some with the help of the Selectmen. Internal matters along with financial matters.

We are continuing with our plan of replacing outdated equipment. This year we will be asking the residents to vote yes or no to replacing the existing South Weare Fire Station. The present building is not large enough, or high enough, to accommodate the modern equipment necessary to provide proper fire protection for this rapidly growing area. Also, we will be asking to set aside, in a capital reserve account, monies to replace the oldest fire truck. This goes along with our long range planning.

We have worked with developers and the Town Building Inspector to obtain satisfactory water systems for fire fighting purposes.

The fire department budget has been reviewed by the Selectmen and the Board of Firewards and so far, it is acceptable to all parties.

Moral in the Department is high, which results in a cooperative effort between the Rescue Squad, Fire Department and Board of Firewards in regard to procedures, expenditures, and long range planning.

I would like to remind all residents that the Board of Firewards is elected to serve the best interests of the Town of Weare. We are interested in any input we can receive from town residents.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

During the year of 1988, the "Red Network" received seven-hundred-seventy-one phone calls. These are broken down into the following categories:

- 2-spares bottles for self contained breathing apparatus

75 M-1 has been in service for a full year. This new truck has worked out well in providing excellent help in fire fighting for the Town of Weare.

REPAIRS AND ALTERATIONS TO TRUCKS: All vehicles received thorough bi-annual inspections, tune-ups, grease jobs, oil changes, and complete check of all working parts.

INSPECTIONS: Inspections were conducted for the schools, day care centers, and American Legion Hall, through the Weare Fire Department, Building Inspector and State Fire Marshall's Office.

SUPPORT: Numerous committees have been developed this past year in order to improve the Fire, Rescue and Dispatch services provided to the Town. We would like to thank all of those people involved with these committees. We would like to thank the Ladies Fire Auxiliary for its continuing support, the Highway Department for their continued help and plowing of the stations, the Police Department for their assistance at fires and accidents, the Building Inspector for keeping an eye on cisterns and fire ponds and inspecting numerous businesses and programs, and the Board of Firewards for their continued support. We would also like to thank the "Red Network" workers for their services. Thank you to local merchants for their donations and time allowed for employees to answer calls. Thanks to town officials, their staff, and the townspeople for their continued support in making the Weare Fire Department one of which they can be proud.

As Fire Chief, I would like to thank all the members of the Fire Department and Rescue Squad for their continued support and services to the Town and myself.

HIGHLIGHTS: This past year we conducted a search for a lost hunter in old East Weare Village. The search lasted for approximately one hour. The hunter was found and returned safely by the Fire and Rescue Departments and Fish and Game Warden.

A Building Committee has been established to determine the Town of Weare Fire Department's needs, fire station designs and locations.

The Town has two engineered fire ponds and three workable cisterns in service.

Cooperation between the Weare and Henniker Fire Departments has worked very well in providing services to the John Stark High School.

BURNING PERMITS: We would like to thank the Town's people for notifying the Fire Department while burning brush on snow covered ground. This helps to prevent any false fire reports. The following people are available to issue burning permits: Raymond Eaton, Sr., Everett Stone, Kenneth Ward.

We would like to encourage people to install smoke detectors in their homes and keep them in safe working order, for their personal protection and the protection of their property.

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REPORT OF TOWN FOREST WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1987 and June 1988, we experienced more brush fires than normal. The three leading causes of forest fires were again children, fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden and debris burning. All causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden, Concord Forest Protection Headquarters at (603) 271-2217, or local Forest Ranger.

On January 1, 1989, the Deceptive Forestry Business Practices Law (RSA 224:54) goes into effect. This law, in summary, states that a person is guilty of a misdemeanor if, in the course of buying or selling a forest product, uses a false weight or measure for falsely determining any quality or quantity of a forest product. For more information, contact one of the persons mentioned above.

We would like to remind everyone that the only time to legally burn without a permit is when the ground is completely covered with snow.

The Forest Fire Warden and Deputy Warden attended a Regional Training at Bear Brook State Park this past year.

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HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The Highway Department began the year with a winter wonderland of snow. The roads were maintained with 7 plow trucks, 2 graders and 5 sanders. The excess of frost not only damaged the dirt roads but also damaged some tar roads. We had to limit and post more than we generally do for off limits during the mud season. It was quite a busy and stressful year trying to keep up with the new subdivisions, regulations and changes in Town.

Roads the Highway worked on are: Hatfield Road which was up-graded and tarred; Walker Hill up-graded and tarred; Salmen Road tarred. Rockland Road, now named Walker Hill Road, dirt section was graveled and hopefully will be tarred according to the 5 Year Plan. Buxton School Road had trees removed and shoulders excavated to widen. On Colby Road, trees were cut, a section was widened, some gravel hauled in and culverts put in place. Center Street had trees cut and banks sloped.

This work was being done while the Town Roads were being maintained, which consisted of grading and raking, patching potholes, removing trees, doing bridge work, putting up signs and hauling gravel.

The Town purchase of a backhoe was a very useful piece of equipment. The end of the year was an open winter with ice causing the costs of overtime and salt bills to add up in order to maintain the roads. With the addition of eight new roads in December 1988 we expect to up the budget for maintenance of these roads. The Highway Department has a good crew and we all wish the residents a good year and I thank you for your support.

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LANDFILL REPORT

Realizing that changes had to be made, the Landfill Department implemented the following changes. We set up the metal pile, to be separated by grades, relocated the brush pile and resumed use of the trash compactor. We also set up recycling of aluminum cans and newspapers on a trial basis. The Septic Lagoons were cleaned out and fenced around.

We have two full-time employees and during the summer we needed another person due to the excessive amount of vehicles that use the landfill.

Phase I has been completed by a contractor. The cooperation of people not coming on closed days would be appreciated. Per State Operating Regulations, when open, the Landfill must be maintained.

The future disposal of household waste will be in question at the 1989 Town Meeting. This will not eliminate the operation of the present Landfill for tires, metal, stumps, wood brush and septic waste. The Landfill will be here to take anything that does not go to the Transfer Station except chemicals. Chemicals will be your responsibility.

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HISTORICAL SOCIETY

1988 was a significant year for Weare. Our first modern bank opened its doors, and the tramp house was finally moved. Energetic Jan Smith led a crew of dedicated workers who loaded, transported, re-silled, repaired and painted the late 1800's structure. It now rests about 50 feet behind the carriage sheds, behind the Town Hall, and is visible from Route 114. It needs further restoration, including a new roof and chimney, which we hope to do in 1989. Bob Smith and Lee Kavanaugh did much of the moving and initial repairs. Jan Smith, Carole Wigsten and Liz Whittier did the first-coat painting on the only warm day in December. The moving of the tramp house was the subject of feature articles in several newspapers and a brief report on Channel 21.

The Society put on a summer and winter series of programs for its members and the public. In the summer, three evenings of old-time movies were presented, including free popcorn, to the delight of the children (and the adults) in the audience. In the winter, Betty Straw fascinated all with the history of the Clinton Grove Academy Building in conjunction with the Society's annual meeting in October. George Hollis showed his collection of photographs of early Weare people and places, followed by Terry Knowles' slide show on Weare's history, for our November program.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY (Cont.)

The Society's board of directors was substantially enlarged this year. The board is a working board; members work on committees that are responsible for individual projects of the Society, and they do much of the physical work, as well as the planning and organizing required. The addition of more board members will make it possible for us to accomplish things we could only dream of before. The board adopted a five-year plan for the Society, with committees working on projects as diverse as the tramp house, a bandstand for Weare Center, a historical survey of each house in town and a school outreach program. Other committees focus on essential requirements of the Society: publicity, fundraising, membership, our museum, and our summer and winter program series.

One unusual effort this year: Carole Wigsten and Jean Anglim put on a cordon bleu fundraising candlelight dinner for ten people. It was so well received that others have decided to continue the effort, much to the delight of the diners and the coffers of the Weare Historical Society.

The Weare Public Library was the proud recipient of a \$1,500 Prudential Partners Grant. It was given "in recognition of the exemplary volunteer community service provided by Prudential Agent, Keith L. Lion", who nominated the Library for the award. The money is earmarked for furnishings to be used when the expansion program is completed. Mr. Lion is the Chairman of the Library Trustees.

The Trustees are working with the Selectmen and the Finance Committee to comply with the budget growth parameters and capital reserve planning. The building of the library addition awaits more money to be raised for the capital reserve fund.

Friends of the Weare Public Library are in their early stages of organization. Volunteers from this group are planning, as one of their projects, to bring books to shut-ins.

Book circulation has increased again this year with a 17 percent combined increase over the last two years. Equipment has been added and updated in order to speed the processing of materials as they are acquired.

The Library staff endeavors to serve the public with its continually growing need for more services and reading and reference material.

Our thanks to the Goffstown Lions Club which provided funds for 14 large print books for the visually impaired. We are also grateful to our Library Volunteers who render much needed services and to those who made donations of books and money.

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PARKS & RECREATION COMMISSION

Chase Park's main gate opened two weeks earlier than scheduled to prevent a parking situation on the highway. Due to the summer's everlasting heatwave that came in early and lasted almost to Labor Day, many weekends were about filled to capacity and there was much activity all summer. Our records show that during the summer 265 non-resident boats were launched; 1,146 adult admissions and 110 for children were paid; 31 resident Senior Citizen passes were issued; and 800 resident passes and second car stickers were sold. The average temperature, May 27 to September 4, 1988 was 84 degrees.

All trees and brush were cut or trimmed back and the grounds were mowed regularly and kept raked. The boat dock was replaced in the ground.

New parking signs were made and freshly painted. Two handicapped signs were placed near the Snack Bar for their convenience.

Several loads of gravel were brought in for the exit driveway which was built up to level, and sand was put in for washed out trenches along the beach area.

PARKS & RECREATION COMMISSION (Cont.)

The Snack Bar was leased this season, and although it had a late start and was limited to what could be sold due to new State Health regulations, it was successful. We hope to make improvements to overcome many of the obstacles with which we were confronted.

Eroding conditions still exist. We plan to correct the drainage to control water runoff in the parking area, loam and reseed the grassy areas, so as not to allow washouts. This being planned later in the season.

We had a costly situation with the running water for the rest rooms, and some vandalism. It was not safe for the women on the Commission checking and closing the gate in the late evening. Therefore, we hired a security officer for this purpose and to be visible on weekends.

We offer both Red Cross and private swimming lessons.

The ball park on Route #77 East was reconstructed. Rototilled, leveled, fertilized, reseeded and base lines stone dusted, with the finishing touches to be done in the Spring. Many thanks to the Weare Athletic Club, who donated their time and labor in making this effort possible and reducing the cost practically in half. The Commission has moved to assist the Club in purchasing playing equipment and new facility equipment which is badly needed.

We have about 190 Little Leaguers but are limited in playing facilities. Weare is badly in need of land to construct playing fields on a long term planning basis. At present we are working in conjunction with the school and private facilities.

The tennis courts are a fine facility, and we hope this coming season to stimulate an age group tournament. A new sign was erected for rules and regulations. Thanks to Doris Brown, who's floral display and new wood chips freshened up the surroundings.

Senior Citizens meet twice a month at the Legion Hall and have a wonderful program under the direction of Forrest Dearborn. These expenses come under the Parks and Recreation Commission's budget.

PLANNING BOARD

The Weare Planning Board met a total of thirty-three times in 1988 to consider eighty-one plans ranging from major subdivisions to lot line adjustments and bona-fide gifts.

The March, 1988 town meeting passed a zoning ordinance for the first time in Weare's history and also gave the Planning Board the authority to regulate non-residential site plans. The Board drafted site plan review regulations and received seven site plans for consideration during the year. The Board is pleased to report that several businesses are interested in locating in the Town and that two banks, a shopping center and restaurant have already been built.

Under the final article of the March, 1988 town meeting the Planning Board was asked to study the problem of growth in the town. In response to this directive, the Planning Board appointed a study committee chaired by Robert Fryer. The Planning Board also asked the Finance Committee to prepare a draft of the Capital Improvement Plan for review and adoption by the Board. Chairman Tom Ring has submitted this draft to the Board and it will be the subject of public hearings in the near future.

There were several changes in the composition of the Planning Board during the year. The Board accepted with regret the resignation of James Nevins, Murray Wigsten, and Sandra Rigazio. Gordon Brown was appointed the Ex-Officio member from the Board of Selectmen replacing William Herman. Francis "Chuck" Bolton, Jr., was moved from alternate to full board status and new appointments for alternate positions included Ed Sanborn and Carolyn Zielinski. There are two unfilled alternate positions at the present time.

The Board will be busy with new projects during 1989 including the drafting of new subdivision regulations, the adoption of minimum road standards, and the drafting of an amendment to the Master Plan relative to water resources in the Town of Weare.

We look forward to serving the town in 1989 and invite all interested citizens to attend our meetings and public hearings. Your input is important to the Board.

POLICE COMMISSION REPORT

This is the first Annual Report of your Police Commission. Two years ago the Town voted to have their Police Department overseen by a three-member Police Commission. Last year they elected their Commissioners, and voted to hire the town's first full-time Police Chief with an eye to developing a professional, full-time department.

It has been an extremely busy year for the Commission. Many hours have been expended in establishing the Town's Police Department as an efficient, smooth-running organization. There are still many things to be done because although we now have a full-time Chief, the rest of the police force is still part-time.

The Commission has been meeting on a weekly basis since it's election in order to get the department in smooth running operation as quickly as possible to best serve the people of Weare. The first order of business was to advertise and search for candidates for the newly created full-time Chief's position. Over thirty candidates applied, and the Commission selected David Mason, an experienced career police officer, for the new position. Chief Mason served as Chief of Police in Berkley, Massachusetts prior to accepting the position as Weare Chief of Police.

An extensive amount of time has been expended in formulating a uniform set of Rules and Regulations in regards to the operation of the Department. These will insure that proper procedures will always be followed in the execution of police duties.

A comprehensive listing of job descriptions for the various ranks and positions within the department is still being formulated with completion expected very shortly.

A six-year plan for the department has been formulated in regards to the future of the Weare Police Department. With town growth a continuing probability, serious thought must be given to the security the town will require as that growth occurs. This includes capital purchases as well as increased full-time personnel.

The commission would like to establish a Space Needs Committee to study the future space needs of the Police Department. This could, and perhaps should, include other safety-oriented departments as well.

In addition to these important functions of the Commission, it has tried honestly and conscientiously to oversee the department, understanding it's needs and problems, but always with the needs of the Town of Weare as it's main concern.

POLICE COMMISSION REPORT (Cont.)

Although the many hours, and departmental improvements, are not always readily nor highly visible to the general public, the records show that police protection in our town has steadily improved since Chief Mason assumed the reins of this department. Several letters of appreciation have been received from citizens commending the department for their action. It is the intent of your Commission to see that improvement, professional efficiency, and town safety continues to grow.

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POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Police Department was reorganized by Town Meeting vote with the election of a three member Police Commission and a full-time Chief of Police. I was hired in July of 1988 with the specific task of organizing and staffing a full time Police Department for the Town over the next 5-6 years.

This year again the Police Department experienced a high turnover of part-time officers (there are no full-time). Four regular and two auxiliary officers left and we hired four new officers in order to fill in the shifts. This required additional costs for training and equipment. During the last five months I attempted to schedule officers to patrol from 6 PM to midnight and on weekends while I covered 6 AM - 6 PM on weekdays. This has been only partly successful due to the part-time officers all having other jobs.

The rules and regulations for the Police Department were approved and signed by the Police Commissioners. I instituted a formal Field Training Program for new officers as well as a bi-annual performance evaluation for all employees. I have continued the in-service training at the Police Department and some officers have attended special courses at NH Police Standards and Training on their own.

We hired a part-time clerk to work three mornings a week to do filing and routine tasks such as, report requests and pistol permits. I have attended the weekly meetings of the Police Commission and together we developed a six year plan of growth which was turned over to the Planning Board.

A new police radio and a generator for the fire and police radios was installed. A contract was signed with Goffstown Police to handle our dispatching of emergency calls. A fully equipped 1988 Ford cruiser was purchased and put into service.

POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT (Cont.)

Robert and Margo McLeod made map cards for every street in Weare. These were copied by the Police Department and distributed to the Fire Department, Town Office, NH State Police and Dispatch. The Selectmen had street signs installed for your convenience and to aid emergency services. Already, five street signs have been stolen. Anyone who observes suspicious activity, a theft taking place or knows the location of stolen property, please call the police immediately.

Numerous complaints have been received about speeding cars and trucks on residential roads in Town. All drivers are reminded that the speed limit, unless otherwise posted, is 35 MPH and is being enforced by State and Weare Police.

It was still necessary for the NH State Police to handle many criminal cases because the department does not have sufficient manpower to conduct the required investigations.

The drug problem facing our country is also present in Weare. It is affecting our children and we must work together in our schools and town to change their attitude on drug use.

For 1989, the Police Department has been given the additional task of animal control. Police Officers will enforce complaints against dog owners for all noise, nuisance and other dog violations. There is a dog control law in Weare. Please control your dog and obtain the yearly license from the Town Clerk.

In keeping with the six year plan approved by the Police Commission to staff a full time department and in order to give the Town guaranteed coverage and patrol on weeknights, I have requested a full time officer in next years budget. This officer will work the weekday evenings which are the most difficult to schedule for the part-time officers. He will also give continuity to the department and our investigations.

A computer is required for proper record keeping in the Police Department. With the dispatching being done in Goffstown, our present records are maintained entirely by hand filing. A computer will provide accurate and timely, monthly activity reports plus efficient storage and fast retrieval of criminal information, reports, daily log, payroll, street listing, inventory, and many other tasks.

I thank all the Town Officials, employees and citizens for making my job easier by giving their assistance and support. I have committed myself to serve the citizens of Weare for many years and plan to work with you to provide a professional Police Department at an affordable cost to the taxpayer.

OVERSEER OF PUBLIC WELFARE

During the year 1988, eleven applications for temporary, general assistance were approved.

There was a marked decrease in the amount of expenditures for the Town Poor program, from \$19,439.33 in 1987, to \$10,230.05 for 1988. Additionally, \$2,789.90 was contributed to the Elderly Nutrition Program, Contoocook Valley Counseling Services and miscellaneous expenses bring the total to \$13,019.95.

The holiday season was particularly busy. Eighteen families received food baskets at Thanksgiving and Christmas.

"Operation Santa Claus" in its 2nd year, was even a bigger success for 1988. A total of 41 needy children received gifts of clothing and toys. 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RESCUE SQUAD REPORT

The Rescue Squad answered a total of one-hundred-sixty-five calls from November 1, 1987 to October 31, 1988. These are broken down into the following categories:

This total includes calls from the "Red Network", Police, radio and walk-ins. This is an increase of 7% over last year.

This year the Rescue will be receiving a new ambulance to replace the 1978 van. It is expected to arrive in February. The money was appropriated at last year's Town Meeting.

The Rescue Squad is looking into purchasing a cardiac monitor for the ambulance to provide better care for the people in the Town of Weare. This monitor will show a tracing of the contraction of the heart and enable Rescue Squad personnel to provide the needed treatment and also the tracing will be given to the hospital.

In February of this year the Rescue Squad will be sponsoring another EMT course in an effort to recruit new members. We do need people especially during day time hours. We have had to have mutual aid assist us at times. We currently have 14 active members. These members include:

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CABLE TV STUDY COMMITTEE REPORT

Inquiries from cable television companies and Weare citizens, prompted the Selectmen to appoint a Cable TV Study Committee in April of 1988. The committee was asked to investigate laws and minimum requirements that the Town should require of any company proposing to sign a franchise to serve our community.

Throughout various meetings that convened during the year, the committee spoke with representatives of cable companies as well as recipients of cable programming and planners from surrounding communities. The areas addressed dealt with technical specifications, community service, bonding and construction standards. In October, the committee presented, to the Selectmen, recommendations for a "Request for Proposal for the Town of Weare." This proposal was sent to any and all companies expressing interest in providing our community with a Cable TV franchise. Detailed in this proposal are negotiable and non-negotiable requirements expected of any company that would receive the Cable TV franchise in the Town of Weare.

As requested by the Selectmen, the Cable TV Study Committee will remain active for the coming year. The committee expects to receive and examine proposals returned from cable companies, and make, when appropriate, recommendations to the Selectmen for the granting of a cable TV franchise.

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FIRE DEPARTMENT DISPATCH STUDY COMMITTEE REPORT

During the 1988 Town Meeting, it was decided to create a committee to study future dispatching for the Town of Weare Fire & Rescue Departments by an external service. The members of the committee are: William Boisvert, Cynthia Foley, Keith W. McElman-Secretary, Robert McLeod, Chester Rhodenizer-Chairman.

It is the general opinion of this committee that Florence Wheldon, our present dispatcher, is performing a fine job and has done so for many years. The town and the committee are concerned about the dispatching needs for the departments when Florence retires.

The committee has conducted several meetings over the past year to discuss these concerns. A list of key questions has been drafted by the committee that will be utilized to determine the benefits and cost of an external dispatch service to the Town of Weare.

FIRE DEPARTMENT DISPATCH STUDY COMMITTEE REPORT (Cont.)

The committee sent a letter to the various dispatch services in our area to determine if any of them are interested in providing service to the Town. On January 10, 1989, the committee visited Capital Area Mutual Aid Fire Compact, located in Concord, New Hampshire and met with the president and coordinator for what was an educational and interesting meeting. More meetings with other dispatch services will be scheduled.

The committee has learned a great deal as the 1989 Town Meeting draws near; however, we believe that the task assigned to the committee has not been completed. There are other services that we would like to meet with as we did on January 10, 1989. We have also met with Police Chief David Mason to discuss the possibilities of the Town providing its own dispatching service, as well as combining the police and fire dispatch within the Town. The initial opinion of the committee is that the town would not be able to afford the costs at this time. These situations also present additional problems that would have to be discussed.

The committee would like to recommend that the study be continued for one more year to allow time to complete the study. The members of the committee believe that a comprehensive report could be delivered to the Town by the 1990 meeting.
