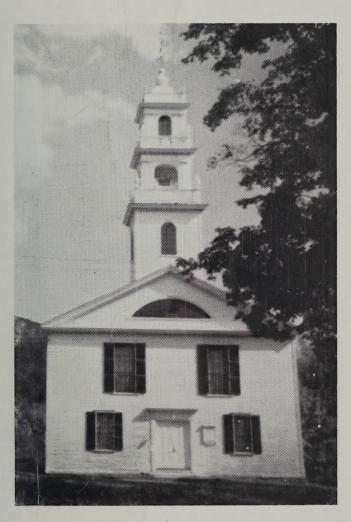

TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wentworth in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Wentworth on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for town highways and bridges for the ensuing year. (summer and winter).
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept T.R.A. for construction, maintenance and reconstruction of rural post roads and Class V highways, and raise and appropriate, or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$544.06, the State to contribute \$3,627.06.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$660.00 for street lights.
- 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Library.
- 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Wentworth Volunteer Fire Department.

- 8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of a town dump.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for Trail Work, the State to contribute an equal amount.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 11. To see what action the Town will take relative to playing games of Beano.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of a Christmas tree.
- 13. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Common.
- 14. To see what vote the Town will take in regard to the disposal of the sum of \$100.00 received from the State Highway Department for the land taken from the Hamilton Memorial Field by the right of eminent domain.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$26.00 to help pay Plymouth Grange for the rent of their hall for unemployment meetings.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money, if necessary, in anticipation of taxes.
- 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

FOREST FIRE PREVENTION

Is Everybody's Business

New Hampshire faces a continuing challenge in its forest fire problem - 97 percent of all our forest fires being man-caused and preventable - a serious indictment of interest in our own welfare and that of our neighbor. Both the State and the towns are striving diligently to effectively meet the challenge through education of the public to the threat fire presents to our woodlands; by maintaining a well trained corps of wardens and deputy wardens in every community and by providing ample opportunity for all who wish to dispose of unwanted waste materials. Carelessness and perverseness, however, continue to be the big hurdles.

Thoughtlessly discarded lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles, by hikers, hunters and fishermen; careless burning of debris during hazardous periods in dangerous locations; illegal burning; improperly extinguished debris, camp and cook fires - all result in serious loss of property, disruption of industry and farm work and unnecessary expenditure of town and state funds.

To meet the challenge successfully, the state, your community and your local forest fire warden need YOUR thoughtful and cooperative efforts - The rules are simple.

- 1. Don't burn at home use your town dump and avoid all fire problems.
- 2. If you do burn, be sure to secure a written permit from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow. Permits are required for open debris fires, home incinerators, outdoor fire places and camp fires. Your warden is instructed to permit burning if weather conditions, site and type of burning are safe.

- 3. Be sure that all lighted material cigars, cigarettes and matches are completely out before discarding them. Use ash trays in automobiles.
- 4. Make certain that your debris, camp and cook fires are completely out before leaving them.
- 5. Insist that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
- 6. Call the warden promptly when fire is detected and aid him to extinguish it.

REMEMBER - the fire you prevent might be the one which could burn YOUR property.

REMEMBER Forest fire prevention is everybody's business and our most important undertaking.

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Wentworth qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 14th day of March, 1958, at 8 o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Hereby submitted is my annual report as your Superintendent of Schools:

Since my last report, your school in Wentworth has continued to operate very satisfactorily. The same staff in the same grades as reported last year has returned and with the permanent addition of Mrs. Arline Wilson as music supervisor, your program of studies has been strengthened.

In view of the great interest in science, new science books of which there were few or none, have been purchased for Grades 3 through 8 and new social studies books that more nearly conform to the new New Hampshire Social Studies Guide are now being used. Next year with the addition of middle grade social studies books and some upper grade readers we should be well equipped with textbooks.

I am sure there is some question concerning whether or not it is absolutely necessary to have three teachers in your Wentworth School. There is no question in my mind that your children benefit a great deal with the addition of the extra teacher and I would strongly advise keeping the three teachers there if you feel you can afford it.

Undoubtedly you are also interested in the article in your school warrant regarding a Helping Teacher. Several years ago the New Hampshire Legislature made it legal for some New Hampshire school districts to secure the services of a specially trained teacher to work with other teachers and children to make school systems more efficient. It was agreed that if such a person of whom the school districts approved were employed, the state would pay \$2,500 toward the salary of this person. The

remainder of the salary would be prorated among the several towns in the supervisory union on the same basis as other union expenses. Supervisory Union No. 48 has now become eligible for this service if it is desired. One law relating to this matter states that certain designated unions may employ a helping teacher so-called in accordance with Chapter 186, Section 24 of the New Hampshire School Laws when the majority of districts in said union vote for it in their annual meeting and towns so voting include at least 85% of the pupils in said union. If this article is voted in the affirmative, it merely gives the Supervisory Union Board power to act and money to act with if they desire and the district approves. The definition of a Helping Teacher is as follows: Helping Teacher, as referred to in paragraph XXIII, is defined as a teacher with specific training and experience which will enable her, or him, to give helpful advice, counsel, and assistance to teachers, pupils, and parents of a school system as a constructive means of improving the educational growth and development of children, solving pupil problems of retardation and maladjustment, adopting the program of studies to meet the needs of the children and the community, bringing resources outside of the school to classroom teachers, pupils, parents, and community, and in general acting as consultant to the entire staff and community in recognition of the educational needs.

Insofar as I can determine, there are no major repairs necessary on your school this year. I think it might be well to see what could be done to overcome the problem of pipes freezing during the cold winter months. As most of you know, a freeze-up occurred this winter which if not discovered when it was, could have cost several hundred dollars worth of damage to your building. I am not sure whether overhead installation would help but something should be done.

You may be further interested to know that tuition rates in Orford and Plymouth where you send your high school pupils have been established. The rates are \$367 per pupil in Orford and \$325 in Plymouth for the 1958-1959 school year.

May I take this opportunity to thank the school board and teachers in Wentworth for their cooperation during the past school year.

Please feel free at any time to contact me either through your school board or directly on matters of education as they concern your children.

SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire, requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent as per the following quotation:

"REPORTS. Each superintendent of a supervisory union shall annually prepare a report showing the total salary paid to the superintendent, which report shall show in detail the amount derived from the per capita tax and the amount paid directly by each school district in the union."

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the schools for the previous school year ending June 30th. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union No. 48 during 1956-1957 received a salary of \$6,150 which was made up as follows: \$2,500 paid from the per capita tax and \$3,650 prorated among the several school districts. Allowance of \$900 for travel within the union was also prorated as stated above.

The table below shows the portion of salary and travel charged to each school district.

Superintendent's salary for 1956-1957 based on the above figure is reconciled as follows: \$3,650 paid by the various districts, plus \$2,500 received from State per capita tax, equals \$6,150 superintendent's basic salary. This, plus \$900 travel allowance as indicated above totals \$7,050—amount received from State Treasurer for salary and travel of the Superintendent of Schools.
