## PICTURE ON COVER OF WILTON TOWN REPORT 1970

Photo on cover, taken by William W. Cleaves of Livermore Falls, is one of Wilton's beauty spots situated off Route 101 near the Robert Ring home and one of Wilton's old landmarks, which came into being during the Revolution when Rev. Jonathon Livermore built a sawmill on Gambol Brook, for the making of staves and shingles and water power was needed. It is believed that the original granite stones of the dam, which are still there, came from the Hesselton quarries of "French Village" better known now as the Intervale Road.

The mill was operated for many years by Rev. Livermore's son, Nathan, and his family and was sold to the late Orville Frye and Philip C. Heald, Sr., in the early 1920's and later sold to the late Mrs. Marjory Moors who retained Leslie Frye, son of Orville, as operator until a few years ago.

# WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

## The State of New Hampshire

*To the inhabitants of the Town of Wilton in the County of Hillsborough and the State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in town affairs:*

You are hereby notified to appear at the Town Hall in said Wilton on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at ten A.M. to choose all necessary town officers, and vote on the Zoning Ordinance, including the Zoning Map, as proposed by the Planning Board (polls will not close before six P.M.); and at 7:30 P.M. at the School Auditorium to act upon the following subjects:

1. To hear the reports of Town Officers, Agents, and Committees and to pass any vote relating thereto.
2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
3. To see what action the Town will take in regard to real estate taken over by the town for non-payment of taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as prepared by the Budget Committee or make any alterations relating thereto.
5. To see if the Town will authorize the Tax Collector to appoint a deputy or deputies, under the provisions of Chapter 41, Section 38, of the Revised Statutes Annotated of New Hampshire, or take any action relating thereto.

6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the disposition of Municipal Records in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 33:A. N. R. S. A. 1970 or take any action relating thereto.
7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Wilton School District to elect its officers at the annual town meeting under Chapter 197. R. S. A. of N. H., or take any action relating thereto.
8. To see what action the Town wishes to take regarding the town pound.
9. To see if the Town will vote for the revaluation of all taxable property by agents of the State Tax Commission and raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000 for said purpose, or take any action relating thereto. (By petition.)
10. To see what sums of money the Town will raise to defray expenses for the ensuing year.
11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## SELECTMEN'S REPORT TO THE CITIZENS FOR 1970

### A Comprehensive Look at 1970-71

Your Wilton Board of Selectmen this year tried to aim towards what was consistent with economic and social forces, and sound in the public interest. Our perspective not only included the present but our sights were always set toward the future. Foundations for the future are made in the present, and progress in bringing plans into reality involves a day to day sorting and sifting process and the selection of the best moves with reference to the prevailing economic climate of our community.

Master Plan or not, goals or not, things have been moving ahead in Wilton with an overriding concept of the future. Action may seem to come about by fits and starts, progress may seem uneven, and phases of our planning may to some, seem far from comprehensive, but in the past few months we have tried to develop single purpose plans covering some of our most pressing community problems.

A great deal of our time has been spent on the problems of keeping abreast of state and federal programs amidst shifting priorities in our rapidly changing environment. Experience in other communities indicates that the realization of community goals is closely related to the knowledge of the leadership coupled with the interest of the citizens. No amount of federal or state prodding, financial incentives, or technical assistance can substitute for civic interest and dedication.

We, as your Board of Selectmen, realize that during the past year some of our statements of priorities and actions taken have inevitably led to latent conflicts between groups in the community and ourselves and might have encouraged some Boards to substitute bold rhetoric and token actions for definite goals, however actions initiated and followed through by our Board in this past year were all taken following extensive study, consideration of the effects on all our citizens, and a look to the future. Herein is our detailed report:

A. *Zoning*: Zoning is, and will continue to be, a controversial matter. It is sometimes controversial because it can affect the profit from the utilization of land and it will, therefore, be of great interest to those who are hoping to gain personally from the growth of the community. A citizen who is interested in not only protecting his own investment and what happens to the property surrounding his own, but also wants to see his community grow in an orderly fashion without wholesale exploitation by developers should realize the benefits that can be derived from a well developed zoning plan submitted for consideration by a dedicated Planning Board of local citizens. Properly executed, zoning can be the greatest protection of the small lot owner and so called, "little man", which can be provided by legal statute today.

B. *Police Mutual Aid System*: During the past year your Board has attended numerous meetings held to formulate a local Police Mutual Aid System along similar guidelines to our highly successful Fire Mutual Aid System. Details are still being worked out with the area of financial responsibility for equipment during times of disturbance a prime source of concern to member communities at this time. Our Board has expressed the opinion that proper safeguards to each community for insurance coverage or a change in responsibilities should be agreed upon prior to final agreement.

C. *Dump*: With the final date on open dump burning approaching closer each year, our Board has attended various meetings to keep current on new legislation and new methods of disposal. The Board has discussed the issue with various state agencies and has studied the newly activated system in Conway, N. H. At this time the Board is working with a local group and state officials to try and develop a site acceptable for one of Wilton's most perplexing problems.

D. *Flooding*: One of the most disheartening setbacks to the Board during the entire year was final notice in December that the Army Corps of Engineers finally had determined, after months of study, that the Forest Street project to help alleviate spring flooding wasn't a big enough

project for them to take on under existing government regulations. The members of the Board had held numerous meetings with state and Corps of Engineers officials, had toured the site many times with these officials, had written a multitude of letters to State Agencies, the Corps of Engineers, and our Congressional Delegation, and had worked on the project without letup from last April until this past December when final rejection of the project was received. The matter is now being further investigated but local disappointment has been strongly noted by your Board to our Congressional Delegation.

E. *Fire Protection*: Whereas we are trying to solve a water problem in one area of the community, we have alleviated a potential fire hazard through the installation of waterholes in two other sections of the community. New waterholes have been installed complete with dry hydrants at the Four Corner Farm on Abbot Hill, and in the central section of West Wilton. Both sites, although not necessarily fire prevention items, nonetheless now afford the people of those areas with a better source of water and fire protection.

F. *County Communications*: Over the objections of the Wilton Board, who alone have expressed disagreement with the concept at every meeting attended in the County, Hillsborough County, utilizing Federal funds, is in the final stages of establishing a County Police Communications network. The Communications Center will be located in Goffstown and will be a highly sophisticated and computerized system utilizing the newest in communications systems and tape recording equipment. It is the considered opinion of our Board that this is the first step by the County Government towards the establishment of a Countywide Communications system for both Police and Fire as pointed out to the citizens of our Community at the Town Meeting of 1969 when the project was still in the planning stages.

The question of whether or not to join the system is really not a matter of debate as the project has already been approved and is being installed. The expenses of running

the Communications Center will be a part of the annual County Tax and therefore paid for by every community whether they use the service or not, however, at this time it seems that it will be necessary for most towns to remain with their respective communications sources also until such time as the County adds fire service to their network, which at this time seems only a step away. It seems improbable that any local communications center in the County will be able to continue services in the coming years as the County service becomes more sophisticated and the costs of operation increase resulting in increased cost to each town in the county. It will be hardly worthwhile for any town to pay for the costs of supporting two communications systems.

G. *Regional Planning:* Our community is a member of the Nashua Regional Planning Commission with Mr. Paul Warner and Mr. F. Stanley Hallet serving as our Representatives on the Commission. The United States Congress, through its legislative and funding process, has made Regional Planning a prerequisite to many of the Federal grant-in-aid programs. In particular, federally funded programs relating to the development of sewer, water, etc., all require the coordination of local projects with a comprehensive regional plan. Thus, belonging to such a Regional Planning Commission becomes an absolute necessity to those communities who will be looking for any federal funding at local projects such as our Wilton sewage project.

The past few years have seen a rapid growth of the Federal "carrot on the stick" routine to have communities comply with new responsibilities and burdens. As a smaller community, we are not in a position to hire a well paid staff to exploit the potential of federal programs, however, we can, and have tried, to keep abreast of all new developments, programs, and requirements, through Board action and the Nashua Regional Planning Commission.

H. *Our New School:* With the rising cost of construction, and operation after construction, coupled with the necessity of raising more and more taxes to meet the costs of education, our Board has taken a deep interest in

the construction of our new 1.2 million dollar school. The expenditure of public funds in such an amount is an element of legitimate concern to our Board and we have therefore forwarded our thoughts to the Wilton-Lyndeboro School Board on several occasions. Our thoughts have centered in two areas, that of more public dissemination of information relative to the construction and the fact that a sprinkler system has not been contemplated at this time in the construction. We realize that our Board has no right to pass upon or review school building plans, however, in examining the unfortunate experience in a nearby community, and reviewing information supplied by the National Fire Protection Association relative to unsprinkled school buildings, it was our thought that serious consideration should be given to proper and full fire protection in this new community building. Our real element of concern is to make certain that both our Board and our Wilton-Lyndeboro School Board recognize that we have a common goal, the achievement of which should be uppermost in our minds — that is, making our community and school system a better and more efficient place in which to live and learn. Whether lines of prerogative are slightly crossed in achieving these goals is certainly a small item in the future of our town.

I. *Sewage Project:* It appears on the surface that perhaps Wilton shall find it more economical to participate in a regional system of intercepting and treatment facilities rather than building its own treatment plant. The previous deadline date of July 1, 1970 has not been met and your Board received a one year extension until July 1, 1971 to initiate action on this project. The delay has been caused primarily by a lack of preliminary grant funds which were turned down because our community lacked a comprehensive plan and did not belong to a Regional Planning group, and further compounded by the uncertainty of the implementation of a regional system now under investigation. In January 1971 our Board forwarded a letter to the Town of Milford indicating intent to deliver sewage from Wilton to interceptor sewage system and waste treatment facilities currently under



Preliminary Planning, subject to the approval of the voters of both towns. The current policy of most Federal agencies is that consideration of integrated, or regional facilities must be studied before the approval of a pollution control project. If such study indicates a regional system to be the more economic to the region as a whole, grant-in-aid funds will be available only for a regional system.

The basic laws for grant-in-aid programs expire on June 30, 1971, however it is quite likely that legislation will extend the program. Proposed legislation now before Congress has changes in it that are important, however, in as much as new legislation might revert from direct grants to reimbursement to the local government for the principle of its bonds over the period of financing, while other legislation would remove the tax exempt status of such bonds. In either case it will be extremely important for the Board to keep well informed in all aspects of the legislation and work closely with the Wilton Board of Sewer Commissioners.

J. *Community Improvements:* During the past year our community appearance was greatly improved through the installation of new, handpainted street signs. This 4-H Project under the direction of Mrs. Pat Clement was a very important one and well appreciated by all our citizens. New street lights were installed in some areas following citizen requests from the area while general improvements in the community lighting were made in necessary areas.

One of the Town's most historic and beautiful buildings, our Wilton Town Hall, was renovated this year by Board action. A new oil-fired furnace was installed to replace the coal stoker which had become a continual problem for over a year, and the Main Hall has been completely washed and painted thereby restoring much of the original beauty of the wood and magnificent structure of the inside hall.

#### *1970-71 CONCLUSIONS:*

Too often Boards of Selectmen are thought of as adversaries by citizens of the community. In theory all of us in

the community are rather like partners within our respective spheres in the paramount undertaking of making our community a pleasing place to live, work and play in. No matter how small a part of the system we may feel, each of us has a continuing part to play in the successful programs of our community. Whatever else the definition of a town may be, the one essential ingredient for better government, better living conditions, or to be recognized as a fine town to live in, is people . . . people who believe in their community, and who are willing to work for its continued improvement. Every citizen has to get himself concerned about the solution to the problems which growth, even slow growth, is bringing and will bring to our community. No citizen can remain or prefer to be passive or un-interested in the problems of our town. Your Board of Selectmen has a responsibility to keep themselves well informed of every program, or new statute that will have an effect on our community, however each citizen must develop the necessary convictions to fulfill our needs and goals. What needs doing, what is at stake, what resources are available within our community for getting the job done, are all questions each citizen should ask of themselves before forming a hard opinion on any community problem. Our community will be, for better or for worse, what we make of it as individuals and collectively. Not only have we the responsibility to make it the best that we possibly can but to do so makes good sense . . . good sense for us and for those to come.

We cannot honestly complete this report without offering our sincere thanks to all who have helped our Board in any manner during the past year. Interested citizens and dedication in our town departments have all contributed to making 1970-71 a year in which it was a pleasure to serve as your Board of Selectmen.

## WILTON HIGHWAY REPORT – 1970

### Winter

The winter months of 1970 were above average in snow amounts for this region. January had only five inches; February, 15 inches; March, 21 inches; April, four inches; December, 44 inches; a total of 89 inches of snow; and several ice storms which caused very slippery conditions in March and April.

The new sander has worked very well. It has been on the go pretty steadily, but has considerably reduced the time required to cover the roads with sand and salt.

### Summer

This year much work was done on replacing and/or relaying culverts, due mainly to frost action being unusually heavy in the spring months. Other work consisted of grading, gravelling, cutting brush, repairing railings and painting lines and railings.

### Resurfacing

A large amount of cold patch was used this year, due largely to spring storms in late March and April, which tend to break up asphalt pavements. Mather Lane and Robbins Ave. were covered with enough gravel for a mix in place of asphalt surface. This was then sealed with asphalt. Eight miles of road was resurfaced in Wilton Center; also one mile of road was mixed in place and sealed on Abbot Hill. The new sander was used on these roads and worked very well.

### Bridge Maintenance

This work was mainly repairing and painting railings and replacing a few planks. Considerable damage was done to the red bridge on Russell Hill Rd. when a large truck hit the side.

## Dump

The Wilton dump has never looked better than it has since a custodian was placed there. We have enough room at this site for a couple more years; however, everyone must cooperate with the person on duty if we wish to continue using this area.

I wish to thank all town officials who have aided me this past year and also my employees for their cooperation and devotion to the Highway Department.

**REPORT OF THE  
FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF**

The 1970 forest fire season was a quiet one in this area, quiet in part because of your continued cooperation and favorable weather conditions.

Fires that did occur were, for the most part, caused by debris burning, children and smokers.

The elimination of these three causes of forest fires would drastically change this picture-to bring about this change we make the following suggestions:

1. When the ground is not covered with snow a permit to burn must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden. This permit covers waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, as well as garden trash and brush burning, such burning is restricted by regulation prior to 9:00 a. m. and after 5:00 p. m. with the following exceptions:

Commercial or Industrial burning is permissible at any time under normal conditions but only with the approval of the District Chief and a written permit from the Forest Fire Warden.

2. Fires caused by children can be prevented only with the complete cooperation of parents in the supervision of their children, keep matches out of reach of children, this action will help to prevent fires and may save a life, the life of your child. Try to explain this to your child, won't you?

3. Forest fires caused by smokers can be reduced in number by the exercise of more care in the discarding of matches and smoking material whether from a vehicle or by a hiker. In all cases, make sure that the butt or match you discard is out, dead out. Smokey says, "Thanks for your help", and invites you to join with him in setting a good example for others in the prevention of fires and the protection of our environment.

## WILTON YOUTH CENTER COMMITTEE REPORT

1970 was a year in which your Youth Center Committee strove with determination to control costs, without sacrificing the quality of its offerings to our young people. It was a difficult balance to maintain, and promises to be even more difficult in the future.

Our skating program again relied heavily upon the generosity and efforts of the community at large, with Abbott Industries providing the space, and the local fire department the time and effort to build and flood the rinks. Miss Karen Lane returned to instruct youngsters on Saturday mornings during favorable weather.

The summer swimming and general recreation program at Goss Park was supervised by a staff headed by Mr. Robert Pano, and he was assisted by Miss Virginia Holt, Mr. Ronnie Tuttle, and Miss Marcia Tuttle. Some 224 young people from Wilton and Lyndeboro registered for the comprehensive swimming instruction, while countless others, young people and adults, made use of the pool and park facilities. The arts and crafts program was considerably enriched this year, and, through the efforts of the Abbot Hill Extension Group, limited story reading was introduced for the younger children.

Competitive swimming, largely due to the initiative of an interested parent, surged ahead in a season of intensive activity. This interest and initiative has carried forward, and the Youth Center team is now able to participate in limited winter swimming at the Nashua YMCA, with the hope that league competition will develop on a year-round basis. Over thirty youngsters have been involved in competitive swimming, and they are to be commended for their determination against larger, more experienced teams coming from larger population bases.

Our tennis offering has been far short of what we would like, being limited this year to the month of August at the hardtop area at the Wilton school. The Committee has no

current means of raising the capital required for court construction.

The Committee was enthusiastically unanimous in its decision to make the Goss Park athletic field available to the Wilton-Lyndeboro Cooperative High School soccer team for its practice work.

Like most other arms of society, your Youth Center Committee found its aims and ideas loftier than its financial resources. While this in no way downgrades the ideas or devalues the aims, it does make it difficult to provide what the committee believes to be desirable and beneficial. 1971 will test the Committee's capacity to utilize Wilton's human and financial resources for the continuing development of recreational opportunities for our young people.

Due to the time necessary for counting the ballots after the close of the polls, the evening meeting at the Wilton High School Auditorium was not convened until 8:40 P. M.

The following appointive officers were named: Auditor, Miss Helen Ring; Library Trustee, Roy Smith; Corders of Wood, the old board; Surveyors of Masonry, Brickwork and Stonework, the old board; Surveyors of Lumber, the old board.

Article No. 1. The reports as printed in the Town Report were accepted, with the addition of one paragraph to the Old Home Day report.

Article No. 2. The matter of real estate taken over by the Town for non-payment of taxes was left to the Selectmen.

Article No. 3. It was voted to take up the acceptance of the Budget with Article No. 7.

Article No. 4. The Tax Collector was authorized to appoint a Deputy or Deputies.

Article No. 5. This article, relative to an additional charge on Poll Taxes unpaid by September 1st, was declared illegal, and not passed.

Article No. 6. Relative to the Town maintaining an answering service for the police and fire departments, located within the Town of Wilton. The Town Council's legal opinion was given that the voters could not pass any article binding the Selectmen to any definite course of action, but after the opinion was given that the people should have an opportunity to vote and express their wishes and be recorded legally. This article was approved on a voice vote.

Article No. 7. After the defeat of a motion to take up the budget item by item, the budget was accepted as prepared by the Budget Committee, with the addition of \$300 for Town Officers' Salaries, to provide pay for a Building Inspector and Trustees of the Trust Funds, and an additional \$1,500 for the Dump, as under new dump regulations it would have to be manned.

Article No. 8. The matters of the Building Inspector and his problems, and the lack of the article to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money were discussed under this article.

Moderator Raymond F. Batchelder announced this would be his last Town Meeting, and he was given a vote of appreciation.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:23.

## SPECIAL TOWN MEETING May 18, 1970

A special meeting was held at the Town Hall at 7:00 P. M. on May 18th, with the only article in the warrant being to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

This was passed on a voice vote by the 20 voters present.

**REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

**Carl E. Bowers**

According to custom, I am presenting my first annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

I arrived on November 30, 1970, just in time to start working on the 1971-72 budget. My first concern is in the area of instruction. If we expect to attract and keep outstanding teachers, we must give special salary recognition for quality performance.

With the opening of the new high school in September of 1971, our space problem will be eliminated and the classes that are now housed in the Town Hall, Library, and the Red School will be housed in what is now the present high school. This arrangement should afford better supervision and improved facilities.

Much work will be necessary in renovating the present high school for elementary classes. However, due to budgetary costs, it would behoove us to work out a preventive maintenance schedule and divide the costs over a period of years thus enabling you to keep your school buildings in good shape.

Serious consideration should be given to extending the Cooperative School District from Kindergarten through Grade Twelve. Under such an arrangement, we could eliminate some duplication in the area of transportation.

Having been on the job for such a short period of time, I am not aware of the activities of your schools of the complete year. However, I have called to your attention the areas, I believe to be most important at this time.

As I conclude this report, I wish to extend my personal appreciation for the advice and guidance given me by the School Board and Town Officials; and also, the citizens of Wilton for their interest and splendid cooperation in the support of your schools.

According to custom, I am presenting my first annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

I arrived on November 30, 1970, just in time to start working on the 1971-72 budget, and also had to familiarize myself with your new school presently under construction.

Needless to say, we will experience growing pains in our new facility. The budget will be an estimate, at best. However, after a year's operation, we should be able to budget the expenses for the new school with more accuracy.

With the new facility opening this coming September, our first problem will be to adequately staff the school. To do this, we must give special salary recognition for quality performance, if we expect to keep outstanding teachers and to attract new teachers to the system.

Our new facility will allow the expansion of our Industrial Arts Department, so that the 7th and 8th grades will have more time for this instruction. The same will be true for the Home Economics Department.

The Art and Music Departments had to curtail some of their programs due to the crowded conditions this year. However, in September, we should see gains; especially, in the Music Department including instrumental music.

As I conclude this report, I wish to extend my personal appreciation for the advice and guidance given me by the School Board and Town Officials; and also, the citizens of the Wilton-Lyndeborough Cooperative for their interest and splendid cooperation in the support of your school.
