#### TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Andover in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Andover on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year

ensuing.

2. To vote (Official Ballot) on the following question: "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano be adopted in this town?"

3. To raise such sum of money as may be necessary to defray the expenses of town government for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same (Estimate \$5,200).

a. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate any sum in addition to the above for the purchase of

additional chairs for the town hall.

4. To see if the town will continue to insure its liability to its employees under the provisions of the N. H. Work-

men's Compensation Law.

5. To see if the town will take any action to secure new snow plowing equipment to replace the tractor snow plows, and to raise and appropriate money for this purpose.

6. To raise and appropriate money for highways and

bridges under the following items:

- a. General town road maintenance. (Estimate \$9,000)
- b. General highway expenses. (Estimate \$3,000) c. Blacktop and asphalt. (Estimate \$2.500)

d. Town Road Aid. (\$739.92 for 1952)

- e. Street lights. (Present contracts: White Mt. Power Co., \$675; Public Service Co., Flaghole District, \$120)
- 7. To raise and appropriate money for the protection of persons and property under the following items:

a. Police department. (Estimate \$75)

- b. Fire department, general. (Estimate \$400)
- c. Precincts for fire protection. (Estimate \$1 000) d. Civil defense expenditures. (Estimate \$100)
- e. White pine blister rust. (State requests \$400)

8. To raise and appropriate money for the care of the cemeteries. (Estimate \$400)

9. To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day

flags. (Estimate \$35).

10. To raise and appropriate money for the use of the town libraries. (\$500 was raised in 1951)

- 11. To raise and appropriate money for defraying the expenses of the town health department, as follows:
  - a. General expenses, which cover dump maintenance, vital statistics and miscellaneous. (Estimate \$500)
  - b. Salary of district nurse. (\$2,000 in 1951—\$200 increase has been requested)

c. Maintenance of nurse car. (Estimate \$400)

d. Contributions to support of Franklin and New London Hospitals. (\$125 each in 1951)

- 12. To raise and appropriate money for taking care of the poor, including old age assistance and aid to soldiers and their families. (Estimate \$5,000, which is \$1,000 less than 1951)
- 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 to provide a picnic area near the approach to the bathing beach at Highland Lake.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

- 15. To see if the town will vote to have one trustee of trust funds instead of the present three trustees, to avoid the necessity of bonding three officers, said trustee to be elected annually.
- 16. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Polls open for voting, 9 a. m. to 6 p. m. Voting on appropriations, 10 a. m.

#### SELECTMEN'S SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

1951 has been a trying year for your elected officials, and the ordinary routine of carrying on town business has been upset most of the season.

Your selectmen felt last April that an upward revision of assessed valuations was called for to bring them more in line with present values of everything else, and to keep the local tax rate down to a reasonable figure. Valuations on real estate and personal property were raised generally from 10 per cent to 12 per cent, and the 1951 rate held to \$4.70. Otherwise the tax rate would have been approximately \$5.25.

Stock in trade assessments, always one of the most difficult items for selectmen to handle, were set by an expert of the tax commission, and scaled down by us to the same relative value applied to other classes of property. The net result was a 70 per cent increase in stock in trade inventory.

The effect of the general raise in assessed valuations was greatly misunderstood. Very few individual tax bills were any larger than they would have been under the old valuation and a higher tax rate, but many were the complaints received by the selectmen and tax collector from persons who seemed to feel that their particular property had been singled out for a tax increase.

The record breaking long session of the legislature added to the confusion. Your selectmen were unable to determine the 1951 assessments until mid October. When the legislature adjourned at last it was nearly another month before the tax commission cleared up the detail and confusion in its office and gave final approval to the local rate.

Our tax collector then found everything dumped in her lap almost at the end of the year, with over one thousand property tax, timber tax and head tax bills to make out and mail immediately. We feel that she can be forgiven if some confusion took place at that time.

The long delay in the legislature also made it necessary to borrow nearly twice as much money to carry on town and school business until taxes finally began to come in. Tax anticipation loans last year were \$40,000, as against \$22,000 in 1950.

Road maintenance was also a problem in a very wet season. Only three weeks after town meeting the heavy downpours of April 2 and 3 did damage to town roads estimated at \$3,800. Shaw Hill, Paterson and Lorden roads at the west end were hardest hit. As the cost of repair was too great to handle with town funds alone your selectmen elected to draw on \$2,000 of T. R. A. funds, which was set up as a "Flood Disaster" program. Using heavy equipment and more culverts to provide better drainage for the future the damage was finally repaired, but continued rain dragged the work out for weeks.

Most back roads were rough travelling all summer, when it rained so often they could not be graded up and kept in any kind of shape. The same rains curtailed the blacktop program. Except for patching and a new asphalt surface on Flaghole Hill little was accomplished, and the rest of the blacktop appropriation was transferred to repair storm damage.

Once more, after the normal season for road work was all over in December, the unusual late thaw brought more trouble. Gravel was hauled all over town to fill up deep ruts and make roads passable again before the final winter freeze. This money was not wasted, for the gravel will be there to help out in the spring mud season.

In spite of these highway difficulties, and extra heavy road agent payrolls, there still remains an unspent balance of \$90.48 in all road appropriations taken together.

For 1952 we recommend the same highway appropriations as last year. If snow plowing and sanding is required all winter at the rate it has been to date it may be necessary to revise the figures upward by town meeting time.

Poor Relief. One bright spot in the 1951 financial picture has been the poor relief account. Old age assistance is still the largest item, and shows a slight increase. We feel that this type of relief has about leveled off now, and probably will continue about the same unless grants are raised again to meet a higher cost of living. Other poor relief amounted to less than one half that of 1950, and in addition the town recovered nearly \$1,600 of aid granted in 1951 and previous years.

While we cannot guarantee that this favorable situation will continue, and there is no prospect of further recovery

now in sight, we do feel that the appropriation for poor relief can be cut from \$6,000 to \$5,000.

Town Dumps. As most of you know, the town has two public dumping places, one in Andover village beyond the railroad station, and the other in the old sand bank on Andover plains. The former gave little trouble in 1951, thanks to Mr. Frank Parks, who has done a splendid job of keeping things under control by part time supervision. We hope you will continue to cooperate with him.

The one on the plains is another story and a continual headache. None of us like the unsightly mess beside the main highway through our town, and the litter which blows out of it is a constant and irritating problem to the state patrol-

man and his men.

There seems to be no wholly satisfactory answer to the problem. If a better location were available we would recommend closing this plains dump entirely. We know of none, where control would be easier, the fire hazard less, or one accessible enough so that people would use it. Closing this dump without providing a better one would invite rubbish piles almost anywhere along our town roads.

The best solution, a fenced-in area with gates, regular hours for dumping, and a paid caretaker to supervise it, represents a great deal of expense. Whether the results would be worth such an investment is for you as voters to decide.

As a half-way measure, which might help some, a high wire fence could be erected along the highway openings to catch papers, and a bare strip bulldozed around the back of the dump as a safety fire break. At present the District Fire Chief has refused permission for any summer burning. If a forest or brush fire escaped from the dump the state would pay no part of the cost of fighting it.

So many of you have complained to us about this dump on the plains, and have demanded that something be done about it, that we are bringing the matter before the town meeting.

What do you want done, and how much are you prepared to appropriate for the purpose?

Town Bathing Beach. The single new appropriation which we suggest for 1952 is one of \$100 to grade in and provide a picnic spot near the parking area at Highland

Lake. Last summer the boys' and girls' 4-H Clubs at East Andover did a splendid job in keeping the bathing beach clean, and so many townspeople now use the area that we feel an investment of \$100 for improvements well worth while.

Trustees of Trust Funds. Under New Hampshire law it is now mandatory that trustees of trust funds be bonded in the same manner as other town finance officers. Since the annual interest from all of Andover's cemetery trust funds is only about \$100, it would seem poor business to purchase three bonds annually from this small income. New legislation permits towns having few trust funds to elect single trustees. Article 15 offers an opportunity for the town to approve this change.

Snow Plowing Equipment. What we said one year ago about replacing our tractor snow plows with something faster on the highway still holds good. Both are still giving service as this is written. Both are one year older, and beginning to wear out.

Whatever type of equipment they are eventually replaced with will come high in price today, whether it be a power grader, a four-wheel-drive truck, or the newer Hough Payloader with plow. We are repeating Article 5 of the 1951 warrant to keep the matter open for discussion and possible action by the town.

Other Appropriations. As 1952 is a presidential election year, with two primaries as well, an additional \$300 should be raised for election and registration expenses, making the total recommended for town government purposes \$5,200.

Except for the purposes already discussed we have made in the budget little or no change in the amounts of money to be raised and appropriated for various town purposes. The sums raised in 1951 were sufficient for needs, with small balances left over in some cases.

We suggest that the town continue the insurance approved last year to protect its liability under the N. H. Workmen's Compensation Act.

Due mainly to the favorable relief situation there remains a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$3,106.48 at the end of the year, as compared with an overdraft of \$1,058.84 for 1950. In a late mail, after the 1952 budget and warrant had been worked out, we have received notification from the White Mountain Power Company that it will not renew Andover's street lighting contract, which expires on March 31st, at the \$675 figure. The new rate for the same service will be \$960.50, an increase of \$285.50. If the town does not wish to appropriate this extra amount the only alternative will be to eliminate enough of our outlying and less important street lights to keep the cost down to the present level.

The audit of the 1951 accounts was not completed until February 4th this year, so that the auditors' report may not be received from Concord in time to print in this report.

If not it will be read at the town meeting.

As this goes to press your selectmen are investigating the possibility of covering employees and officers of the town with social security benefits under the terms of new legislation passed by the 1951 legislature. This would mean the deduction of 1½ per cent from all wages and salaries paid, with the town making a similar contribution, costing approximately \$200 annually. We hope to have a full report on this matter in time for the town meeting.

### WOOD AND TIMBER TAXATION Report on Yield or Severance Taxes for the Tax Year Ending September 30, 1951

Your selectmen find that many woodlot owners and operators fail to understand what is required of them whenever cordwood, pulpwood or timber of any kind is cut by them for sale.

Briefly, the owner intending to cut any wood or timber, except that purely for his own use on his own land, shall give written notice of his intention to do so to the selectmen, before beginning such cutting, and not after the work is underway or has been completed. When the operation is done he has another form to fill out, stating the actual amount of wood, pulp or timber which he has cut, due within 15 days after the job is finished.

The selectmen have blank forms for both reports, which are called for by Chapter 295 of the Laws of 1949 and its

amendments.

It has been the policy of your selectmen to require from each out of town timber operator doing business in Andover an amount of security sufficient to cover any yield tax which he may owe the town on the following October 1st. When such a tax becomes due the selectmen then give the tax collector an order on the treasurer for the amount assessed, and the balance is returned to the operator. The selectmen may require the same security in advance from any local operator, if they have reason to doubt his ability or intention to pay the tax when due.

Anyone who wishes to pay his yield taxes in advance, or by the week as he operates, rather than in one large lump sum after October 1st, may make such deposits with the selectmen and receive their receipts. Some have found this

a much easier method of meeting their obligations.

On November 1, 1951 the Tax Collector was given a warrant for the collection of \$1,893.06 in yield taxes for the year from October 1, 1950 to September 30, 1951.

The State of New Hampshire paid the town in addition the sum of \$484.27, to make a total income of \$2,377.33 for loss of taxes upon growing wood and timber, which are no longer taxable under the new law.

#### YOUR 1951 TAX DOLLAR

As citizens and tax payers we should all be interested to know what becomes of the money which we annually turn over to the tax collector, and the purposes for which it is spent.

Few, if any, tax bills amount to exactly \$100.00. If you are interested to figure out your share of the cost of any of the above services multiply each figure in the table by the amount of your own 1951 tax bill in *dollars* (forget the cents for easy figuring), and point off four decimal places.

For example, if your taxes were \$136.10 in 1951 your share of maintaining our town roads for the twelve months was \$24.78, you paid \$4.52 toward the district nurse and other health services, and your contribution to the school program was \$72.88. If you happened to be sending three children to Andover schools the tax cost of their education to you would be \$24.29 each. If you have no children at all or they are past school age you still pay \$72.88 for local schools, and will continue to do so just as long as New Hampshire laws throw most of the cost of education on local property taxation.

# REPORT OF VICTOR E. PHELPS FOREST FIRE WARDEN

The year 1951 was rather uneventful as to forest fires. Last May a small brush fire in the Colby Brook area was apparently started by careless fishermen. This did little damage, but the cost of suppression ran to \$106. After this one spring dry period the plentiful summer and fall rains kept the forest fire hazard to a minimum for the rest of the year.

Your warden and four deputies attended a warden instruction meeting at Bristol in April.

Andover Village District has added a portable Gorman-Rupp 100 G. P. M. fire pump to its equipment, which should prove very useful on forest fires.

One big town problem is our dump on Andover Plains. We are fortunate that few fires have started at this dump during the open season, and because of its hazardous location no burning permit can be granted by the District Fire Chief. Under the law the state would pay no part of any bill for a brush fire which might originate in this dump.

Since there seems to be no other suitable and convenient place to relocate this dump it might be wise for the town to appropriate money to bulldoze a fire break around it and possibly to erect a wire fence along the highway to catch blowing papers. This will come up at town meeting.

Fire permit regulations remain the same—NO OUT-DOOR BURNING WITHOUT A PERMIT FROM THE WARDEN, except on snow covered ground. The penalties are severe if fire escapes control.

Please co-operate with us again in keeping our record clean for another year.

# REPORT OF MARGUERITE S. HEARN DISTRICT NURSE

I hereby submit my report for nursing services rendered

during the year.

The year brought an increased demand for home nursing calls and as a result there is a smaller grand total because school children had not been weighed or measured before Christmas vacation, but classroom inspections and first aid treatments were given. The visits are classified as follow:

There has been an increase in chronic illness and I believe much is due to the tension and nervous exhaustion of the country being at war for the past 11 years. Due to lack of employment in Andover and neighboring towns there is a movement of younger people out of town, and retired families replace them. This year I was called for several accidents on our highways as well as in the home. Among communicable diseases which were severe this year were chicken pox, measles, mumps and upper respiratory infections.

During the past year I treated many more people at my home, and had more night, Saturday and Sunday calls. For weeks at a time my last call was completed at midnight.

In January all basketball players at the High School had chest X-Rays at the New London Hospital, under the auspices of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association.

In April at the Parent Teachers' Association a very interesting lecture on "The Atom Bomb and Biological Warfare" was given by Dr. Oliver S. Hayward of New London.

On June 26 at the Andover Village School a New Hampshire State Preschool Physical Examination was given by Dr. Norton and Mrs. Marshall. A total of 14 children were examined, and a few children were referred to family doctors for treatment of defects.

October 8th the Rummage Sale was held at the Town Hall, and I wish to thank all the people who helped to make this a big success this year.

1 attended the N. H. Teachers' and School Nurses' Convention in Manchester, October 18th, and new forms for school children's health reports were discussed.

On November 20th the film "Human Growth" was shown at Parent Teachers' Association, which with parents' approval was also shown to the pupils of Junior High and High School. School children were very favorably impressed with the film.

The Nursing Association was helped some families when clothing was needed. Medicine has been purchased for others, and medical supplies; also eye examinations as needed. Kleenex are provided in the grammar schools and first aid supplies to all schools.

I want to thank the many town people who have donated nursing equipment, which is available for those needing it, and the medicines which I have used. Also those who have helped with transportation services and with other work, which has enabled me to devote more time to the sick.

My sincere thanks for the cooperation and help of the townspeople and doctors during this very strenuous year.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of the Andover School District:

In submitting this very brief report as your Superintendent of Schools I will limit myself to the suggestion of some needed improvements which I feel sure your local School Board will act favorably upon.

Improvements

At the village school it is necessary to provide a better drainage system to take care of the overflow of seepage. It is also necessary to paint the floors; otherwise the build-

ing is in good condition.

At the high school some work should be done to improve the appearance of the grounds and walks. The entrances at both ends of the school should be given a surface coat of "blacktop." The steps at the front entrance are in need of repair also. A coating of "blacktop" on the back side of the building at the lower end where the eaves drip is also needed.

The appearance of the grounds around the building would

be improved by a good lawn.

The interior of the building is in excellent condition and reflects the excellent custodial service it received. The floors should be treated during the summer. Maintenance work done immediately whenever the need arises is a good way to exercise prudence in this essential spending.

At the East Andover School some blackboards were added this year. The teachers were grateful for these necessary additions. At some time in the near future oil heat should be installed in this building. It would be an improvement at

not too great a cost.

Although I have been here but a short time, I am impressed with the high quality of your schools. You have good administrative leadership, adequate and purposeful learning procedures, all of which tends to produce better instruction.

I am grateful to the School Board for its help and cooperation, to the teachers for their loyal service and to the citizens of the community for their continuing interest and support of the schools.
