Second: To see if the Town will vote to incur debt for Temporary Loans in anticipation of taxes.

Third: To see if the Town will vote to accept such Trust Funds as may have come in during the year and such Trust Funds as have not been previously accepted.

Fourth: To see if the Town will vote to use the income of the H. B. Burnham fund for schools or library.

Fifth: To hear the report of the special committee voted at last town meeting to study salaries and act thereon.

REPORT OF THE AUBURN WAGE STUDY COMMITTEE

COMMISSIONED BY THE PEOPLE OF AUBURN
TO STUDY WAGES FOR TOWN OFFICIALS

This committee, after a thorough study of the wage situation respectfully submits the following report and recommendations:

GENERAL:

The salaries of town officials, paid either at an hourly rate or a flat annual basis, should be determined by the Budget Committee.

These salaries should be submitted to the townspeople for approval in the budget report along with the total appropriation for each department.

The Budget Committee, in turn should be guided in its conclusions by the following:

All town officials and department heads will submit a request for salaries and a detailed estimate of expenses to the budget committee for the ensuing year.

The hourly rate of one department head should in no way be tied to that of another, either in fact or by inference.

The budget committee must arrive at departmental rates based on the merits of the office.

Department heads are not to assume the authority to incur expenses or services beyond the budgetary amount determined in advance.

The Budget committee should make recommendations on how to meet emergency expenditures not provided for in the regular budget.

INDIVIDUAL OFFICES

Town Clerk:— Money paid to the town clerk is on a strict fee basis as follows: Auto registrations at 50 cents per permit; dog licenses at 20 cents a license; \$25.00 for copying the selectmen's report, a duty required by law; Twenty-

five cents per 125 words for recording the town records; Five cents per mile for official travel.

The town clerk does not receive any other salary for doing additional duties connected with the office. These include: keeping track of town records, preparation of the voting ballots, recording of papers filed by local candidates for political office as well as acting as an information center for residents.

In view of the continued growth of the town's population, this committee feels the town clerk should receive at least a token salary. A figure of \$75.00 a year is recommended.

Police chief:— The police chief should continue to be paid at an hourly rate to be set by the budget committee. This rate should remain in force for the town's entire fiscal year and be subject to review at the request of either the police chief or the board of selectmen prior to drawing up the budget for the coming year.

In addition, the duties of the police chief should be clearly defined so the townspeople will know what they are getting in the way of police protection and what the cost is. An itemized report of police department expenses and salaries should be included in the town report.

Road Agent: — Also to be paid at an hourly rate which will run for the entire fiscal year. This will be subject to review at the request of either the road agent or the board of selectmen prior to drawing up a new budget.

However pay for workers, other than the road agent, employed by the highway department, should be kept flexible. Adjustments to be made by the road agent, subject to the approval of the board of selectmen. This proposal is based on the fact that wages in the construction industry are subject to seasonal variation.

The committee believes that pay for other town officials, treasurer, tax collector, court officials, etc. should remain at the present rates as their duties are more or less standard from year to year.

Other Recommendations

In connection with its study of the wage situation, this

committee learned that the records of the town of Auburn are not being kept in a safe central location. This is required by law and we therefore strongly urge the Board of Selectmen to take immediate steps to see that this is done.

The committee also recommends that a rotating committee, to include the road agent be appointed by the moderator to draw up a long range program of highway construction and repair. Such a plan would enable the road agent to layout his work and assure the people of the town an organized system of road construction. The committee feels the present system of roads by petition is unfair in many cases and works a hardship as far as operation of the highway department is concerned.

This study would include such things as making provisions for the purchase of new equipment and repair of old.

The committee stresses the following facts:

The Board of Selectmen by virtue of their office, are commissioned by the citizens of Auburn to establish policy in town affairs and are the final authority in policy matters.

Department heads, while subject to the board of selectmen in policy matters, are solely responsible for the operation of their departments.

In view of this we recommend that the Board of Selectmen submit to the people of Auburn, at each town meeting, a report on town conditions, coupled with their recommendations for improvements and analysis of the town's economic condition.

This procedure, we believe, would minimize dispute between townspeople and town officials, greatly smooth operation of town affairs and result in a more informed citizenry.

The actual enrollments as of Jan. 31, for the past 10 years indicate the problems that the district has had to solve in the field of elementary education. The enrollment increase induces several problems that involve the financial structure of the district.

Housing is one problem that has been met as far as the current enrollment is concerned. However, a glance at the chart indicates that this may be temporary. The current enrollment Grades 1-3 is sufficiently high so that additional housing would be necessary if the enrollment in succeeding years is as high as it is now in grades 1-3. An average enrollment of 30 per grade would mean an enrollment of 240.

With the increase that has already taken place in the schools the transportation problem is increased. The actual increase in number of pupils transported is 70 in the 10 year period. This is an increase of over 100%

Staff must be increased as enrollment increases. Purchases in all areas increase in direct ratio to the increased enrollment. With an inflationary trend affecting both goods and services the increased enrollment has an impact on the financial structure that is proportionately greater than the increase in enrollment.

The increased enrollment at secondary level is a serious problem financially. The enrollment has doubled and the legal financial responsibility has nearly tripled so that over the 10 year period the cost of secondary education has been increased six fold. This becomes quite a financial problem when there is not a corresponding increase in valuation.

Personnel

There was but one change in teaching personnel in the Auburn Schools. Mr. Clarence Craggy resigned and accepted a position in Massachusetts.

Mr. Roland Pressey was transferred from Severance to the Village and Mr. Gerald Weibel, a graduate of Slippery Rock (Pa.) Teachers' College, was secured for the vacancy at Severance.

The supervisory union, because of its size, was one of the first authorized by the State Board of Education to have a helping teacher. This position was filled as of Oct. 1st by Mr. E. Russell Raymond formerly supervising principal in Franklin, N. H. His work was of inestimable value in aiding pupils and in assisting teachers to make the work more practical and meaningful to the pupils. The wisdom of the legislature in providing funds to make this additional service available to improve the educational opportunities of New Hampshire children will be proven in the immediate and distant future.

The district has been and continues to be exceedingly fortunate in the teaching personnel that has been staffing the Auburn schools. Teachers, well trained and experienced, are not readily obtainable in the present period. It may seem trite and redundant but teacher recruitment is one of the most critical educational problems of the day. It is one of the three major problems facing American Public Education.

The other two most critical problems are housing and finance. The lack of room on a nation wide basis is a serious problem. As was pointed out earlier in the report the

problem of housing has been met as far as the present is concerned at the local level. The necessity for additional housing can become a problem if current trends continue.

With the increased enrollment at elementary level and its concomitant problems involving finance and the increased expenditures on the secondary level, the fact that finance is a problem of education is almost self evident.

The tax structure of the state should be scrutinized closely with the thought of alleviating some of the burden of real estate taxation. The state should assume a greater proportion of the educational costs. This legislative year a more realistic approach to the solution of the financial needs of school districts throughout the state would result in an increased appropriation for state aid with a resulting decrease in the amount of money raised by local taxation.

Budget

The gross increase in the recommended budget is \$3,919.84. There are small increases in almost all areas to account for the increase. An analysis of each area shows the reasons for the increase.

Auxiliary Activities

This area accounts for over $\frac{1}{2}$ the increase. One item, high school tuition, accounts for \$2,080.00. The anticipated enrollment increase with an anticipated increase in rate will necessitate this increase in the amount of this item. The salary of the school nurse (Auburn's share) accounts for the balance of the increase.

Instruction

The salaries of the staff account for the increase in this item. In light of the teacher situation this increase is not unexpected and unless the supply of teacher more nearly equals the demand the situation is not likely to improve.

Repairs and Replacements

This figure is increased to be more realistic. The expenditure over the past few years have been approximately \$1,000.00. An expenditure to preserve and protect the district's investment in school buildings of \$1,000.00 is a sound one. Repairs to save future major repairs is well worth while.

As a result of the action of the budget committee the repairs and replacements item was increased by \$100.00 to cover the amount requested by petition.

The other areas show increases in the vicinity of \$200.00 and are directly or indirectly connected with the increase in enrollment.

The tax levy shows approximately the same increase on the basis of current income figures. An increase in state aid with a resulting increase in the district's share could reduce the levy materially.

The opportunity of working with all concerned with the operation of schools in Auburn is a profitable and pleasurable one. All are sincerely concerned with improving the educational opportunity for the children. I appreciate being a part of a group that does so much for the pupils.
