TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Boscawen in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Boscawen on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

- (a) Town Officers' salaries.
- (b) Town Officers' expenses.
- (c) Expense Town Hall and Other Town Buildings.
- (d) Police Department.
- (e) Fire Departments.
- (f) Health Dept., including District Nurse.
- (g) Vital Statistics.
- (h) Town Poor.
- (i) Old Age Assistance.
- (j) Cemeteries.
- (k) Interest on Notes.
- (1) Insurance Premiums.
- (m) Libraries.
- (n) Moth Extermination.
- (o) Sewer Maintenance.
- (p) Street Lighting.

3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highway Maintenance.

4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day and Other Celebrations.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Sidewalk and Sewer Projects built under PWA supervision.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$440.00 to take over unsold histories of said Town of Boscawen which are now in the hands of the Committee of Publication.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,350.00 to pay for the New Snow Equipment recently purchased by the town.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,650.30 to reimburse the town for Flood expenses.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for Blister Rust Control.

10. To see if the town will accept State aid for construction of the Class 2 road known as Water Street and raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of \$1,980.00; or will accept State aid for construction on Class V roads, and raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of \$551.62.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for payment on Town debt.

12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to allow 3 per cent discount for early payment on property taxes for the year 1937.

13. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, not exceeding \$20,000.00.

14. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to transfer money from one appropriation to another. 15. To see if the town will vote to adopt a Zoning Board of five members and vote to authorize the Selectmen to make said appointments.

16. Through a resolution adopted by the General Court, the voters of the town are requested to vote upon the following question, to wit: Is it expedient to revise the constitution?

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

BOSCAWEN PUBLIC LIBRARY

The schedule at the library maintains these hours the year around, namely:--Tuesdays 2:00-4:30 and 6:30-8:00 o'clock. Saturdays 2:00-4:30 o'clock.

Penacook Branch is now open Wednesdays 3:00-8:00 o'clock. The change in hours was made to accommodate the high school pupils and the general public. This change has made a gain of 52 borrowers.

The Vacation Reading club was conducted as usual with 20 registering at Boscawen and 28 at Penacook Branch. Previous to Book week, the librarian visited all the schools in town in the interest of the library. Every pupil in the Main St. school, Miss Marian Dickson, principal, became borrowers of the branch library. Sub-stations have been established in the Water St., and High St., schools. Books for adults have been added at Water St. school. National Book week was observed at Penacook Branch with an attendance of about 150. Mrs. Marjorie Sturm of Concord gave a chalk talk; group of interesting stories by Miss Edna Ballard; and a play, read by Mrs. Marjorie Emery, with the children impersonating the characters. Mrs. Emery presented the certificates to the boys and girls who completed the work required in the vacation reading club; games followed the program.

In the town hall at Boscawen the program included a chalk talk by Mrs. Sturm, followed by games conducted by the Recreational Advisor of Strafford County. The boys and girls received their certificates from Edward Webster, treasurer of the Board of Trustees. Approximately 150 were in attendance. The Penacook Congregational Church enrolled in the reading contest.

Our librarian attended the District Neighborhood meeting

at Warner. She was accompanied by two of the trustees, Mr. Buxton and Mrs. Hall, also Mrs. Buxton and Mrs. Ben Little, a trustee of the library at Webster. Mrs. Emery was re-elected secretary and treasurer.

The librarian, accompanied by Mrs. Hall and Mrs. Camilla Hildreth, a member of the board of trustees at Canterbury library, attended Alumni Day at the New Hampshire Library School at New Hampton.

Mrs. Emery attended the meeting of the New Hampshire Library Association at New London and was re-elected secretary of the Association. She was also appointed chairman of the membership drive for the State Association in our district.

The librarian and her assistant, Mrs. Emma Flanders, had an attractive booth at the Community Fair sponsored by Ezekiel Webster Grange, which portrayed the library as the main factor in Adult education.

Miss Holly Knowlton, employed under the National Youth Administration, has mended 624 books, and 21 were sent to the bindery.

Total circulation this past year has been 14,799; an increase of 1586 over last year. Adults-fiction, 9,120; non-fiction, 1,302; Juvenile-fiction 3,045; non-fiction, 1,322; magazines 967.

502 books have been added—273 by gift and 229 by purchase. We would express our thanks to the donors, Boscawen Woman's Club, Mr. and Mrs. Moses T. Cavanaugh, Jonathan D. MacIntyre, Louise Taitron, Marion Dickson, John Lancaster, Dorris L. Bassett, Mrs. Lewellyn Fletcher, Carl Glover, Sammy Littlefield, Elizabeth G. Hall; also to the school teachers in town for their cooperation during Book Week observance. We also appreciate an interesting collection of flood pictures which we have on record.

The library received a gift from the late Alvin B. Cross, of 471 volumes, in memory of his wife, Elizabeth May (Gage) Cross, a native of Boscawen and deeply interested in the history and welfare of the town.

Book-cases have been added to the branch and public library, also a new desk for the librarian. The library was attractive with two decorated trees and wreaths during the Christman holidays.

To the Inhabitants of the Town School District of Boscawen qualified to vote in District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 13th day of March, 1937 at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To hear and act upon the reports of the school board and of the treasurer for the past year.

4. To choose a member of the school board to hold office for three years to fill the vacancy arising from the expiration of the term of office of Nathaniel M. Flagg, and to fill any other vacancies that may occur in said board.

5. To choose a treasurer, one or more auditors, and all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

6. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of elementary schools for the ensuing year.

7. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the repair and improvement of school buildings during the ensuing year.

8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the salaries of its officers and for other expenses of administration for the ensuing year.

9. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate to pay high school and academy tuition and the per capita tax for the ensuing year.

10. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for insurance and new equipment for the coming year.

11. To see if the district will vote to transport children living less than two miles from school and to raise and appropriate money therefor.

12. To see if the district will authorize the school board to contract with academies and other districts for high school tuition in excess of the average cost of instruction per pupil.

13. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate to replace the flush toilets in the Plains school.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens:

Since the last report was written the Boscawen Schools in Penacook have been entirely separated from the other Penacook schools and are all located on the first floor of the old Academy building.

We have an excellent teaching force, each of the four teachers having two grades under her care.

During this year of reorganization we have been, I believe, wisely conservative in policy and expenditures. We shall enter the next school year with a pretty definite knowledge of the situation there.

The other schools in town are being conducted successfully. The Supervisor of Music is now, for the first time, teaching in High Street and Water Street schools.

The Board is asking the district to provide for needed improvement of the toilets at the Plains. These toilets were installed nineteen years ago.

The rooms used by the Penacook school are fairly satisfactory for elementary schools, except that some of them are deficient in light. In the two front rooms the window area is about half of standard requirements. When the High School was moved to this building it was considered that these rooms would pass as recitation rooms with a well lighted study-room on the second floor. The budget makes no provision for adding windows during the coming year, but I do believe that the district should plan for a remodelling of the building in the near future, to provide adequate natural light in every room used.

After this year of readjustment Boscawen School District will be well started as a new and bigger social and political unit. The policies formulated now will affect the children and the community for years to come. The community and especially the parents should realize that it is

most important to start right, for in the long run it is community sentiment that makes or breaks public institutions.

If there is in the community any man or woman who is outstanding in his interest in young people, his intelligent yearning for social betterment, his freedom from petty personal prejudices, his high personal ideals, and withal his practical common sense in financial matters, that one should be drafted to serve on our school board, the most important office within the gift of the local electorate.
