TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Chesterfield on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next at 6:30 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects: (Polls will open at 3 P.M.—Close not earlier than 10:00 P.M.)

Article 1. To vote by Australian Ballot for all necessary Town Officers.

Article 2. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 4. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums, as approved by the Budget Committee, for:

1. Town Officers' salaries	\$3,085.50

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,200.00 for street lighting. (Approved by the Budgett Committee.)

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$475.74 (six cents per \$1,000.00 of the Town's equalized valuation) to the Monadnock Region Association, an agency to advertise, promote, and preserve the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the other 37 Towns of the Monadnock Region. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$617.00 as its fair share of the operating cost of the Elliot Community Hospital. (\$300.00 approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,120.75 for Town Road Aid, thereby receiving an additional \$7,471.64 from the State.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$12,000.00 for Winter Maintenance of Roads. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,000.00 for Summer Road Maintenance. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to build the bridge and re-open the road leading from West Chesterfield to Cobleigh Corner, and raise and appropriate the money by authorizing the Selectmen to withdraw the W. C. Bridge capital reserve fund of \$2,500.00 plus interest, and to borrow the sum of \$4,000.00 on long term notes to be paid in two yearly payments;

and to raise the balance, not to exceed \$1,000.00 by this year's taxes. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$3,000.00 to continue the Road Improvement Plan on our Town Highways. The location of the work to be under the supervision of the Selectmen in cooperation with the Road Committee. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum not to exceed \$16,000.00 for the purchase of a Four Wheel Drive-Front End Loader, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 this year. The balance to be borrowed on long term notes and to be paid in five yearly payments of \$2,700.00. (Not approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum not to exceed \$3,500.00 for the purpose of installing a furnace, new toilet facilities and insulating the ceiling in the Town Hall. (Submitted without recommendation.)

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed one thousand dollars to be used for reduction of the grade and correction of the hazard which exists on that portion of Welcome Hill road fronting on the property of Ralph Yeaw. (Not approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a new Fire Truck of Class A specifications like the one purchased last year. Cost not to exceed \$15,700.00 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,700.00 this year. The balance to be paid in ten yearly payments of \$1,400.00. (Not approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the repair and improvement of the "Old Swanzey Road," beginning at the intersection of the road leading to Stone's Mill (left) down to Hines Meadow. (Not approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following amendment to the Zoning Ordinance:

(1) To add Section C to Article II, to read as follows:

"C. After a public hearing, and subject to approval of the Board of Adjustment, use of land and /or buildings for a commercial business or enterprise may be

permitted provided such use will meet the following requirements:

- (1) It will not create local traffic congestion.
- (2) It will not be offensive to surrounding property owners in the form of lights, noise, smoke, dust, odors or fumes.
- (3) Any new commercial building or structure will not block the view of surrounding property owners."

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following amendments to the Zoning Ordinance:

- (1) To add, as a second paragraph in Article III, Section D, the following:
"No Trailer or Mobile Home will be permitted in this area."
- (2) To revise the first sentence of Article IV, Section B, to read as follows:
"B. A single Trailer or Mobile Home may be located anywhere in the Town, except in the area specified in Article III, Section D, provided it meets the minimum standards as follows:"

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following amendments to the Zoning Ordinance:

- (1) To add Section E to Article III, to read as follows:
"E. Subject to the approval of the Board of Adjustment, a home occupation may be permitted within the area specified in Section D, provided:
 1. It is conducted by a resident of the premises.
 2. Not more than one person not residing on the premises is regularly employed in connection with such use:
 3. Adequate provision is made for off-street or off-road parking."
- (2) To add Section E to Article X, to read as follows:
"E. Home Occupation means any use conducted entirely within a dwelling or an accessory building which use is clearly incidental and secondary to the use of the dwelling for dwelling purposes and does not change the character thereof, and in connection with which there is any emission of noise, vibration, dust, fumes or smoke beyond the lot line. Any goods sold at retail shall be those manufactured on the premises."

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to ratify, approve and confirm the action of our Fire Departments in joining

our Town to the Southwestern New Hampshire District Fire Mutual Aid System in 1958, and in agreeing that our Fire Departments may give and receive outside aid as provided in RSA 154 as amended.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to repair and reset head stones and markers in the Town Cemeteries. The sum for this purpose to be taken from the interest of the Etta Hubbard Trust Fund left for the upkeep of cemeteries; commencing with the Atherton Hill Cemetery.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to have three new members appointed by the Moderator to fill the vacancies in the Historical Committee. This committee to carry on with their program of locating historical sites within the Town, as recommended by them in their report of 1948, and bring an article in to the 1964 Town Meeting regarding the placing of a suitable marker at the roadside near the site of the home of the first settler.

Article 26. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to the selling of old equipment; such as Highway or Fire equipment, for which the Town has no further need; the action at this meeting to be in force until otherwise rescinded.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to have the Moderator appoint a Committee to work with the Selectmen to get information on facts and figures to obtain a tract of land from John C. Orr, situated between the residence of said John C. Orr and the Chesterfield Gorge on Route 9 in Spofford. This land to be developed as a Cemetery. The Committees report to be brought in at the next Town Meeting.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Mrs. Ida Rotgers, the income from same to be paid to Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of Hubbard-Tisdale burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Allen F. Worrell, the income from same to be used for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Joseph Worrell burial lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Sadie Hewett Snowling, the income from same to be used for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Charles Hewitt burial lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$300.00 from the Albert Amidon Estate, the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Albert Amidon burial lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$250.00 from Mrs. Harley F. Sheldon, the income from same to be used for the perpetual care of the Wilhilmina and Harold Post lot No. 34 in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Britton McKinster, this sum to be added to the Fanny and Raymond Chickering Trust Fund, the income from same to be paid to C.W.C.A. for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Fanny and Raymond Chickering lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 34. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

TOWN MEETING, 1962

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire, called at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 13, 1962.

Because of wind damage to the Town Hall chimney the night before and therefore there could be no heat in the Town Hall, the meeting was called to order at 3:10 o'clock in the afternoon in the Chesterfield Central School Auditorium by the Moderator, James E. O'Neil.

Norman L. Amidon as Assistant Moderator and Mildred W. Gauthier as Assistant Clerk took their Oaths of Office before the Clerk.

The Moderator then read the Warrant through Article 1 and declared the meeting opened for balloting for Town Officers.

At 6:30 o'clock the meeting was again called to order by the Moderator and the remainder of the Warrant read by the Clerk.

The Articles of the Warrant were then disposed of as follows:

Article 2. Voted by voice vote on motion by Harry E. Winn and supported by Winford Chickering to use the same method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year as in the past. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clifford Chickering and supported by George Joslin to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. The report of the Budget Committee was given by Arvid W. Pearson in the absence of the Committee Chairman. He stated that they had held four meetings, one of which was a public meeting at which there was a very poor attendance; that the Committee had worked hard and put in a lot of time. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Stephen Henchey to accept the report as given. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

The Moderator then requested that the one who makes a motion should stand and also the one who supports it should do the same.

Article 5. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid W. Pearson and supported by Winston H. Cray to raise and appropriate the following sums of money for:

Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and said sums raised and appropriated.

Article 6. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George E. Joslin and supported by H. Claude Mowry to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,200.00 for street lighting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winston H. Cray and supported by Dexter Thomas to raise and appropriate the sum of \$240.00 (1/100th of 1% of the valuation of the Town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southwestern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George E. Joslin and supported by Robert Woodman to raise and ap-

propriate the sum of \$300.00 as approved by the Budget Committee as our fair share of the operating cost of Elliot Community Hospital. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clifford E. Chickering and supported by Ronald Guyette to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,122.83 for Town Road Aid, thereby receiving an additional \$7,485.55 from the State. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 10. A motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by Paul E. Welcome to raise the sum of \$9,000.00 as approved by the Budget Committee for Winter Maintenance of Roads was withdrawn by both after discussion.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Robert Woodman to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 for Winter Maintenance of roads. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winston Cray and supported by Myron Ingalls to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Winnie Cray to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,000.00 for Summer Road Maintenance. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 13. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by H. Claude Mowry to raise the sum of \$3,000.00 to continue the Road Improvement Plan on our Town Highways. The location of the work to be under the supervision of the Selectmen in cooperation with the Road Committee. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 14. Motion made by Paul E. Welcome and supported by Harry E. Winn to amend the Article to read "To purchase two new chassis for \$15,700.00 to be equipped with 1,000 gallon tank each with a 500 gallon pump and appoint a Committee to work with the Firewards on purchase of this equipment and ask for a paper ballot.

Motion made by Dexter Thomas and supported by Paul Welcome to amend the Amendment to raise and appropriate

the sum of \$2,300.00 this year, the balance to be paid in payments of \$2,000.00 until the cost is fully paid.

A vote by paper ballot on the amendments resulted as follows: Whole number of ballots cast 157. Necessary for choice 79. "Yes" had 38, "Nos" had 116 and there were 3 invalid. The Moderator declared the Amendment carried in the negative and therefore was lost.

Voted by paper ballot on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Ronald Guyette to purchase a new Fire Truck of Class A specifications, cost not to exceed \$15,700.00 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,300.00 this year. The balance to be paid in five yearly payments of \$2,000.00 each. The Fire Truck Reserve Fund of \$3,425.63 to be used to make the total amount. This ballot resulted as follows: Total number of ballots cast 148. Necessary for choice 75. "Yes" had 114, "No" had 33 and there was 1 blank. The Moderator declared the vote carried in the affirmative.

Article 15. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winford Chickering and supported by Lawrence Thomas to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for a new roof on the West Chesterfield Fire Station. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 16. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Ross Anderson and supported by Robert Woodman to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 to participate in Tone Control for the Southwestern New Hampshire Fire Mutual Aid System. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 17. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Lawrence Thomas and supported by R. Willard Beebe to pass over the Article. The Moderator declared the "Nos" had it. A show of hands was asked for which resulted as follows: "Yes" 48, "No" 36. The Moderator declared the Article passed over.

Article 18. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul E. Welcome and supported by Lawrence Thomas to pass over this Article concerning raising and appropriating the sum of \$1,500.00 for drainage and black top surface on Welcome Hill Road, beginning where the present reconstruction ends and continuing up the hill as far as the appropriation will permit. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and therefore passed over.

Article 19. Voted by paper ballot as requested by Marjorie Stoddard on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported

by Russell Johnson to pass over this Article concerning opening the road leading from West Chesterfield to Cobleigh Corner, and building a bridge for light traffic with the \$2,500.00 appropriated in 1960 and also form a committee to look into this situation. The vote resulted as follows: Whole number of votes cast 131. Necessary for choice 66. "Yes" had 102 and "No" had 29. The Moderator declared the vote carried in the affirmative and therefore the Article was passed over.

Article 20. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Ross Anderson and supported by Donald Moore to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for the advancement of Civil Defense and maintaining the Auxiliary Police Force. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 21. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Oscar Ericson and supported by R. Willard Beebe to pass over this Article concerning raising and appropriating the sum, not to exceed \$5,000.00, to hire a full time Police Officer, to be known as Chief of Police, Town of Chesterfield. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and therefore passed over.

Article 22. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Lawrence Thomas and supported by Ross Anderson to pass over this Article concerning raising and appropriating the sum of \$3,000.00 to maintain the Police Department. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and therefore passed over.

Article 23. Paul Lawton explained in answer to a question that limited Commercial applies in this case to a parking lot on that one piece of land. Voted on motion made by Robert Goodell and supported by Ross Anderson to rezone from residential to limited Commercial for specific use as a parking lot a triangular parcel of land across the channel from the so-called "Bud and Dolly's Restaurant" with frontage of approximately 250 feet on the channel and approximately 300 feet on the North Shore Road. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 24. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Oscar Ericson and supported by George Joslin to accept the sum of \$15,664.45 from the Etta L. Hubbard Trust, said Trust to be deposited with the Trustees of Trust Funds, the income to be paid at the end of each year to the Treasurer of the Chesterfield Library for the support of Town Libraries. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 25. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winston Cray and supported by George Joslin to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Maurice L. Amidon, the income from same to be paid to C.W.C.A. for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Lorenzo S. and Maurice L. Amidon Burial Lot and to be known as the Lorenzo S. and Maurice L. Amidon Trust Fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 26. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Winston Cray to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Francis W. Oakes, the income from same to be paid to C.W.C.A. for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Amidon-Stewart Burial Lot. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

At ten o'clock the Moderator closed the ballot box and recessed the meeting for a public hearing on the revised zoning and building ordinances recommended by the Planning Board to supersede the ordinances now in effect, and called on Paul Lawton as Chairman to conduct the hearing. After the hearing the Moderator called the meeting to order and continued the Articles of the Warrant.

Article 27. Voted by voice vote on motion made by R. Willard Beebe and supported by Susan Fleisher to adopt the following revised zoning and building ordinance recommended by the Planning Board to supersede the ordinance now in effect as follows:

ZONING ORDINANCE

In pursuance of authority conferred by Chapter 31, Sections 60-89 H.S.A. the following zoning ordinance is hereby proposed to the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire:

Article I

DISTRICTS

For the purpose of this ordinance the Town of Chesterfield is divided into two districts as shown on the official zoning map filed with the Town Clerk and dated.

1. Residential District No. 1, namely all lands to a depth of five hundred feet on each side, from the center line of all paved Public Roads and Highways in existence within the Town of Chesterfield.

2. Residential District No. 2, all other lands within the Town of Chesterfield.

Article II

The following provisions shall apply to all Districts:

A. No owner or occupant of land in any district shall permit fire or other ruins to be left, but within one year shall remove or refill the same to clear ground level or shall repair, rebuild or replace the structure.

B. All dwellings and sanitary systems shall be constructed and maintained in accordance with standards set and enforced by the N.H. State Department of Health and the N.H. Water Pollution Commission.

Article III

Residential District No. 1

A. The minimum land area for each dwelling shall not be less than 10,000 square feet with a frontage of no less than 100 feet.

B. Every new building of any sort hereafter erected in Residential District No. 1 shall be set back from the center of the nearest right of way a distance of fifty (50) feet, but said minimum setback may be less than fifty (50) feet if in conformity with the setback of buildings on adjoining lots. No building shall be located within ten (10) feet of the side and rear property lines.

C. No junk yard or place for the storage of discarded machinery or vehicles, or other scrap material shall be maintained in said area.

D. No building, land or structure within 500 feet of the center line of the road around Spofford Lake, or at any other location between the road and the lake, shall be used for any commercial purpose nor shall any business be conducted therein, except this provision shall not apply to any building or structure being used for commercial purposes at the time of the passage of this regulation.

Provision: Any change in the use of commercial property within the area specified in Section D shall be subject to approval of the Board of Adjustment.

Article IV

Trailers and Mobile Homes

A. Trailer Parks or Mobile Home Parks will be permitted in Residential District No. 2 and shall conform to the following specifications:

1. None shall be smaller than (5) acres or larger than (10) acres in size.

2. The individual lots within the Park shall be no less than 40 x 60 feet in size.

3. The Parks must be screened on the two sides and the rear by a vegetable buffer 20 feet wide, composed of trees or shrubs or a combination of both.

4. All Trailer and Mobile Home Parks shall meet the minimum standards of sanitation as set forth by the New Hampshire State Department of Health.

B. A single Trailer or Mobile Home may be located anywhere in the Town provided it meets the minimum standards as follows:

1. It shall be located on a lot with a minimum of 10,000 square feet, with a 100 foot frontage.

2. It must be placed on a permanent foundation or continuous supporting wall of masonry, masonry units, concrete or other similar materials, extending at least 3 feet below normal ground level.

3. It shall conform to the minimum standards of sanitation as set forth by the New Hampshire State Department of Health.

4. Such Trailers and Homes shall be considered buildings or dwellings within the terms of this ordinance.

C. The temporary parking of a single trailer or mobile home outside a Trailer or Mobile Home Park, or the use of such trailer or mobile home as temporary living quarters within the town shall be permitted for a period of not more than 30 days in any one year.

Article V

Non-Conforming Uses

A. When any existing non-conforming use of land or buildings has been discontinued for one year, the land and building shall thereafter be used only in conformity to this ordinance, except that the Board of Adjustment, after a public hearing, may permit the resumption of said non-conforming use.

B. Any existing non-conforming use shall not be changed to another non-conforming use.

C. No motor vehicle and machinery junk yard may continue as a non-conforming use for more than one year after the effective date of this Ordinance, except that a motor vehicle and machinery junk yard may continue as a non-conforming use if within that period it is maintained in accordance with the

standards set and enforced by the N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, Chapter 267, Sections 1-4, and also in accordance with the standards required by the Town Board of Selectmen.

Article VI

Enforcement

Upon any well founded information that this Ordinance is being violated, The Board of Selectmen shall take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance by seeking an injunction in the Superior Court or by any other legal action.

Article VII

Board of Adjustment

Within thirty days after the adoption of this Ordinance and thereafter as terms expire or vacancies occur, the Board of Selectmen shall make appointments to a Board of Adjustment of five members conforming in duties to the provisions of Chapter 31 of the N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955. Thereafter as terms expire or vacancies occur, the appointing authority shall be responsible for filling vacancies and maintaining full membership on the Board of Adjustment. The Board of Adjustment here provided shall conform in membership and term of office to the provisions of Section 67, Chapter 31, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955. In addition to the general powers granted said Board of Adjustment by said Chapter 31, it shall have the power in harmony with and subject to its provisions:

A. To hear and decide appeals either by the applicant or other property owner in the vicinity where it is alleged there is error in any order, requirement, decision, or determination made by an administration official in the enforcement of this Ordinance.

B. To hear and decide appeals for exceptions to the terms of this Ordinance.

C. To authorize, upon appeal, in specific cases, such variance from the terms of this Ordinance as will not be contrary to the Public interest, where, owing to special conditions, a literal enforcement of the provisions of this Ordinance will result in unnecessary hardships, and so that the spirit of this Ordinance shall be observed and substantial justice done.

D. The Board of Adjustment shall make rules as to the manner of filing appeals or applications for exemptions or

for variance from the terms of this Ordinance. A payment of the estimated cost of giving notice is herein required by the applicant.

E. Upon receipt of an appeal or an application for exceptions from the terms of this Ordinance by the Board of Adjustment, the Board shall fix a reasonable time for the hearing of the appeal or the application for exception, give public notice thereof, as well as due notice to the parties in interest and decide the same within a reasonable time.

F. The said notices shall state the location of the building or lot, and the general nature of the question involved.

G. In exercising the above-mentioned powers, the Board may, in conformity with the provisions thereof, reverse or affirm wholly or partly, or may modify the order, requirement, decision or determination appealed from and may make such orders or decisions as ought to be made, and to that end shall have all powers of the officer from whom the appeal is taken.

H. The concurring vote of three members of the Board shall be necessary to reverse any action of administration officials or to decide in favor of the applicant on any matter upon which it is required to pass under any such Ordinance, or to effect any variation in any such Ordinance.

Article VIII

Amendments

The provisions of this Ordinance may be amended or changed at any regular or special Town Meeting by a majority of the voters present as provided by law.

Article IX

Other Provisions

Section 1. *Validity.* Should any section or provision of this Ordinance be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole or of any other part thereof.

Section 2. *Interpretation.* In interpreting and applying the provisions of this Ordinance, they shall be held to be the minimum requirements for the promotion of the health, safety, morals and general welfare of the Town of Chesterfield and its citizens.

Section 3. *Penalties and Remedy for Violations.* Whoever

violates any provisions of this Ordinance shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars a day for each day of violation.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage.

Article X

Definitions

A. A Trailer coach or Mobile home, within the terms of these regulations, means any vehicle or similar portable structure used for sleeping or living purposes.

B. A Mobile home or Trailer Park is land upon which two or more mobile homes or trailers are parked and occupied for living purposes, regardless whether or not a charge is made for such accommodations.

C. Frontage means the length of the lot bordering on the public right of way.

D. Junk means any used metal, used bottles, solid textile mill waste, unfinished cloth, or other textile mill yarns, old paper products, old rubber products, old plastic products, wood wastes, two or more unregistered motor vehicles which are unfit for use on highways, used parts and materials of motor vehicles and other secondhand or waste articles, the accumulation of which is detrimental or injurious to the neighborhood.

BUILDING ORDINANCE

To promote the health, safety, convenience, and general welfare of the community by regulating the construction of building thereon in the Town of Chesterfield.

Article I

Restrictions

All land shall be subject to the following regulations, restrictions, and conditions:

Section 1. No building or structure shall be erected, and no structure shall be altered, maintenance excluded, without a building permit from the Building Inspector, to whom adequate plans and specifications of proposed building or alterations shall be submitted. The fees for permits shall be according to the following schedule:

Over \$10,000.00	\$15.00

Section 1a. All Building Permits shall expire One Year from date of issue.

Section 2. The Town Building Inspector shall base his approval or rejection on the provisions of this ordinance. The requirements are as follows:

A. Every dwelling house or camp to be established shall have a minimum ground floor area of six hundred square feet, approximately 20 x 30 feet, for each family unit.

B. Foundations shall be constructed of solid concrete, brick, cement-block, or stone or other similar materials, extending at least three feet below normal ground level. Accessory buildings may be set on brick, stone or concrete piers.

Exception: This provision shall not affect motels or cabins used for guests staying overnight or by the week, and cottages not used the year around.

C. Every dwelling house, camp, other building, or addition to presently existing dwellings or buildings, is to be finished on the exterior in a permanent manner and is to be painted on the outside whenever the same is of wood or a material customarily painted.

D. All chimneys and fireplaces shall be constructed of stone, brick, concrete or cinder block to the ground, excepting pre-fabricated chimneys bearing the approved label of the National Board of Fire Underwriters shall also be allowed; each shall be lined with tile and extend at least two feet above the roof to which it belongs and shall have a cleanout opening at the base. All entrances to chimneys shall be of fireproof construction. Chimneys shall not be used to support beams or timbers in any manner. No smoke pipe shall be installed so as to be within twelve inches of any combustible floor or ceiling unless amply protected with non-combustible material. No smoke pipe shall be installed which passes into or through partitions or walls of combustible materials, except when guarded by a double collar of metal with air space of at least five inches or by at least five inches of brick or other non-combustible material between the pipe and the combustible material.

E. No roof of any building shall be covered or recovered in whole or in part save with non-combustible or fire-resistant roofing material.

F. Sewerage: All newly constructed dwellings and buildings in public and private use shall be equipped with flush toilets, septic tank, and adequate disposal facilities.

G. All electrical installations shall be in accordance with the

requirements of the latest edition of the National Electric Code, the same being the standard of the National Board of Fire Underwriters for electrical wiring and apparatus.

H. All Oil Burning Equipment shall be installed in compliance with rules and regulations No. 5001 issued by N.H. Board of Fire Control.

I. All construction unless otherwise covered by this Ordinance or the Chesterfield Zoning Ordinance shall be in accordance with the minimum requirements of the latest edition of the Federal Housing Administration book entitled "Minimum Property Requirements." Any exceptions to these requirements must be approved by the Building Inspector.

Article II

Exceptions

Article III

Town Building Inspector

Section 1. For the purpose of this Ordinance the Board of Selectmen shall annually appoint a Town Building Inspector who shall perform the duties pertaining to his office as designated in the provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 2. The Building Inspector shall make known his decision within ten days from the date he received the application and he shall make inspections of all buildings in a process of construction and report in writing any or all violations to the Board of Selectmen.

Section 3. The Town Building Inspector shall retain each application fee which shall constitute full compensation for his services.

Article IV

Administration

Section 1. Applications and Permits.

A. It shall be the duty of the Selectmen, and the Board is hereby given power and authority to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance.

B. The Board of Selectmen shall require that the application for a building permit include a plot plan and contain all necessary information to enable the Building Inspector to ascertain whether the proposed building or structure and its intended use comply with the provisions of this Ordinance.

C. No building permit shall be issued until the Building

Inspector has certified that the proposed building or structure and its intended use comply with the provisions of this Ordinance.

D. It shall be unlawful for any person to commence work on erection of any building or structure until a permit has been duly granted for such erection or alteration by the Building Inspector.

Article V

Board of Adjustment

Section 1. The Selectmen shall appoint a Board of Adjustment of Five Members as provided in the N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 31.

Section 2. The Board of Adjustment shall have the following powers:

A. To hear and decide appeals either by the applicant or other property owner in the vicinity where it is alleged there is error in any order, requirement, decision, or determination made by an administration official in the enforcement of this Ordinance.

B. To hear and decide appeals for exceptions to the terms of this Ordinance.

C. To authorize, upon appeal, in specific cases, such variance from the terms of this Ordinance as will not be contrary to the Public interest, where, owing to special conditions, a literal enforcement of the provisions of this Ordinance will result in unnecessary hardships, and so that the spirit of this Ordinance shall be observed and substantial justice done.

D. The Board of Adjustment shall make rules as to the manner of filing appeals or applications for exceptions or for variance from the terms of this Ordinance. A payment of the estimated cost of giving notice is herein required by the applicant.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage.

Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative, and the revised zoning and building ordinance recommended by the Planing Board to supersede the Ordinances now in effect to be adopted.

Article 28. There were no reports of Standing Committees to be given and acted upon.

Article 29. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul Welcome and supported by Harry Winn that the Selectmen be authorized to dispose of the old Model A Fire truck in

Center Village less equipment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

For Fireward. Winston H. Cray had 284 votes, and Lyle B. Chickering, Paul M. Penning, William Mitchell and Lawrence Chickering each had 1 vote. Winston H. Cray was declared elected.

For Auditors. George R. Barrett had 273 votes, Warren G. Allen had 54 votes, Carl A. Johnson had 9 votes, George Marrow had 9 votes and there were 43 scattered votes. George R. Barrett and Warren G. Allen were declared elected.

For Budget Committee for Three Years. Glenn B. Chickering had 205 votes, Harry E. Winn had 231 votes, Forest Hall had 11 votes, William Mitchell had 10 votes, Arvid Pearson had 14 votes, George Barrett had 9 votes, Paul Welcome had 7 votes and there were 73 scattered votes. Glenn B. Chickering, Harry E. Winn, and Forest Hall were declared elected.

For Budget Committee for One Year. William Mitchell had 9 votes, Myron Ingalls had 7 votes, Carl Johnson had 6 votes, Grace Welcome had 5 votes, Glenn Chickering had 4 votes, Arvid Pearson had 4 votes, Joseph James had 4 votes, George

For Spofford Constable. Glenn B. Chickering had 187 votes, Laurence W. Clayton had 88 votes, John McKeon had 19 votes, Ray Patmos, Robert Goodell and James Plifka each had 1 vote. Glenn B. Chickering was declared elected.

For Center Constable. Henry C. Chickering had 210 votes, James L. Humphrey had 73 votes, William Mitchell had 2 votes, Ralph Dick and Henry C. Chickering Jr., each had 1 vote. Henry C. Chickering was declared elected.

For West Chesterfield Constable. Bernard A. Chickering had 186 votes, Charles C. Hills had 97 votes and Lawrence E. Thomas and Paul E. Welcome each had 1 vote. Bernard A. Chickering was declared elected.

On the question "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano be adopted in this town?", "Yes" had 166 votes and "No" had 61 votes. The Moderator declared that "Yes" won. Meeting declared adjourned by the Moderator.

2. To determine and appoint the salaries of school board members, and the truant officer, and to fix the compensation of any other officer or agents of the district.

3. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To choose agents, auditors and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

5. To see what action the district will take in regard to the anticipated June 30th balance in the new addition building fund.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT TO THE CHESTERFIELD SCHOOL DISTRICT

The district voted last March to build a four-room addition and a bond issue of \$100,000.00 was voted to be used for this purpose. The new facilities were occupied on November 9th and an Open House was held on November 15th. The addition is the result of the joint planning of the School Board and building committee working with the architect. Their many hours of deliberation produced the plans that became Chesterfield's four-room addition. These additional facilities should give excellent service to the children of Chesterfield in the years ahead. The change from having classes in the auditorium and hallway is appreciated and should materially improve the learning process.

A study of expected first grade enrollment in April led to the conclusion that forty first grade pupils were expected to be enrolled in September. The School Board met with the Budget Committee with the result that the Budget Committee voted approval of a \$1,000 deficit appropriation that allowed the School Board to employ an additional first grade teacher.

The entering first grade enrollment in September was 38. As a result of families moving away, the enrollment dropped to 34 at one time but is back to 36 at this time. Small first grade classes are educationally sound, financially, they are expensive. The children who get a good start in their educational life are worth the investment in their future.

Our reading program was extended this year to include grades three through eight with good results. In addition, the same procedures of grouping were instigated for the teaching of mathematics in grades four through eight. These improvements can be effected because of the increase in the number of teachers on the staff.

The United States Office of Education published, in 1957, a handbook of school financial accounting. The State Board of Education issued a School Financial Accounting Handbook that incorporated, wherever possible, the practices recommended in the national handbook. The change in accounting for school district monies, the preparation of budgets and reports became effective July 1, 1962. The purpose of the change is directed toward the achievement of standardization that will give better accounting and reporting practices plus the ability to make more accurate comparisons.

The actual expenditures report for the school year 1961-62 is given according to the previous method of accounting as is the current budget for 1962-63. In addition, the current budget is also printed as converted to the new method. The proposed budget is in accordance with the changes that became effective July 1, 1962.

Monthly financial reports are submitted to the School Board which keep the members informed as to the current status of money spent in relation to the appropriation.

Keene and Brattleboro High Schools submit a report of attendance and grades for each tuition pupil attending their schools. This enables the School Board to ascertain if the pupils are in attendance and to what extent they are availing themselves of their educational opportunities.

Your School Board investigated the probable schedule of payments for the new addition and as a result determined that temporary investment of funds in treasury notes would result in additional income. The investments netted \$310.47 which will add to the amount that can be returned to the district as a balance. The estimated balance from the building fund is approximately \$14,000. This balance could be utilized to make the principal payments on the bond issue for two years and most of the payment for the third year if the district so voted at the annual March meetings.

Chesterfield teachers participated in a successful Social Studies three-day workshop with the teachers of Supervisory Union No. 60, on August 30th and 31st, and a follow-up day October 25th. The workshop study was directed toward determining strengths, weaknesses and trends of our social studies curriculum, teaching techniques and methods. Professor Emeritus Dr. Linwood Chase from Boston University was our consultant.

It appears that elementary enrollments will continue to increase which ultimately means an increase in tuition pupils. Tuition cost is the second largest single item in the budget and will probably become the largest.

The decision at the annual meeting last year was to continue as a grade one through eight system and to continue to send high school tuition pupils to both Brattleboro and Keene.

A part of the job of superintendent is to provide information about educational problems that are or will be affecting the educational system in his districts, and to make suggestions as to possible ways and means of solving these problems. The suggestions are given, not with the view that the community must or should accept them but rather that they be considered as first steps toward ultimate solutions that will give adequate educa-

tion in keeping with economy, and a sound long-range program.

Chesterfield's problems as I see them are two-fold: (1) A decision as to whether to continue as a Grade 1-8 system versus a Grade 1-6 system. The former or Grade 1-8 system would eventually result in another building addition. (2) Arranging long-term tuition contracts for high school pupils or joining a cooperative school district.

The New Hampshire 1961-62 Interim Commission on Education preliminary report recommends area school systems that would eventually lead to formation of cooperative districts or the formation of cooperative school districts.

It is my suggestion that a study be made and reported to the district that will give information to the citizens in order that suitable plans can be made in the near future to insure adequate educational opportunity for the youth of Chesterfield.

CHESTERFIELD SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

REPORT

July 1, 1961—June 30, 1962

The Hot Lunch Program opened September 5, 1961, with Mrs. Louise Leu as Manager and Mrs. Elli Herrick as her assistant. Mrs. Louise Leu resigned on April 2, 1962. I was put in charge of the Lunch Program with Mrs. Elli Herrick as my assistant.

The rate of reimbursement from Federal Funds remained at 5¢ for each Type A meal served. Under the Special Milk Program, we received 4¢ reimbursement for each ½ pint of milk served. Each day we served from 185 to 210 balanced meals.

Menus are made up in advance for the entire month and copies are given to each child and teacher; thus the parents know the menu of each day. Children are served normal portions in the presence of their class teachers. Those with good appetites can return for seconds.

During the school period, we received surplus commodities from the United States Government which made it possible to keep up the present rate of 25¢ a meal. We also received a generous supply of eating apples and apples for salads from one of our good neighbors.

Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners with all the trimmings were served, with the extra help of Mrs. Ethel Mills.

The following surplus commodities from the government were received during the school period: butter, processed cheese, pea beans, apricots, peanut butter, frozen chicken and turkey, cranberries, cherries, peas, flour, green beans, corn, peaches, tomatoes, applesauce, frozen ground beef, pork in gravy, pumpkins, seedless raisins, powdered milk, rice and potatoes.

Mr. Bellavance, our principal, and his staff as well as Mr. Davis, our custodian, were always helpful when needed. I wish to thank them both and also Mrs. Elli Herrick, my assistant, at this occasion for helping to make the Lunch Program a success.

The School Lunch Program was managed this year without any financial help from our township.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the citizens of Chesterfield:

On September 5, 1962, the Chesterfield School opened its doors to 280 students, slightly less than the previous year. As they entered, some found themselves facing new teachers. This was true in Grade I where Miss Dorothy Martin replaced Mrs. Eleanor Scripture. The previous first grade, which since had moved to the second grade, created a need for an additional teacher at this level. To fill this position we were fortunate to find Mrs. Blanche Morse. In the intermediate grades we had two changes, both caused by teachers either leaving to raise a family or to fill a position in another school. Here we found Mrs. Barbara Mackey being replaced by Miss Judy Parody and Mr. John Letourneau being replaced by Mrs. Susan Corning. The only other staff change was an additional half-time teacher in Grade VIII. Mr. Kenneth Houghton of Keene was hired to fill this position. With changes and additional teachers the staff at the Chesterfield School numbered 10 full time teachers and one half-time teacher.

New Addition

When the opening day of school arrived, the new addition was in the process of being built. Because this additional space was not ready for occupancy, it was necessary to continue one class in the front hall and two others in the auditorium. In order to arrange this the auditorium was divided with a wooden partition. This change, made necessary by the lack of space, caused problems in scheduling, student movement, lunch periods, and in the actual teaching of these children.

However, it was only a matter of time before the new addition would be available and in use. This day arrived on Friday, November 9. With the cooperation of the children, the movement into the new building and the adjustment of other classes were accomplished in one day. Shortly after the occupancy of the new addition, an open house was sponsored by the School Board and the Chesterfield P.T.A. This proved to be successful for both the parents and the teachers.

Christmas Program

Our Annual Chesterfield School Christmas Program, which is under the direction of Mrs. Azalea Wilson, was held on

December 20 in the school auditorium. Grades 1 through 8, under the guidance of their teachers, spent many hours making materials, practicing their lines, and rehearsing their movements until it was felt that the children were ready for the program. On the selected day each grade put on its part of the program for the student body. This not only was a dress rehearsal but also a school assembly. That evening the children put on the same program to the delight of the parents. As usual, the little children were the highlight of the evening.

Physical Education

The school year 1962-1963 saw the continuation of the Physical Education Program in grades 7 and 8. However, it was felt that much more could be done for the children in this respect. With this thought in mind, the Chesterfield P.T.A. was asked to sponsor such a program for the school year. Presently, plans are being made and equipment being built to formulate such a program in the near future. With the added equipment and facilities, it will be possible to establish a working program which will not only be directly helpful to the children now but also aid them to adjust to such a program in high school.

School Maintenance

Through the efforts of Mr. Merton Davis, our school custodian, the building was made ready for the beginning of another school year. In the preparation for the opening day, much time was spent on cleaning windows, cleaning and waxing floors, repairing broken or damaged equipment, painting floors, and many other necessities which had to be done.

However, it was realized that in order to keep the building in excellent condition it would be necessary to hire some additional help when the new addition was opened. This position was filled by Mr. Wilkins. With the interest and effort of these two men, the building has been kept in excellent condition.

N.D.E.A.

Each year the town has appropriated funds to match the N.D.E.A. funds from the government. This year these funds have been used to improve our science program by purchasing a laboratory table for the science room, microscopes, charts, magnets, and many other such items. In addition to science equipment we hope to be able to purchase a tape recorder for our language program and a great deal of arithmetic equipment which will be used in grades 1 through 8. We

hope that the added equipment will improve our program and help give your children a better education.

Curriculum

With the passing of every year, we find ourselves trying to improve our program. This year it was done by expanding our Joplin Reading Plan to include Grade III. By doing so we were able to add more groups and thereby place more students according to their reading abilities.

In addition to the above plan, we established the Chesterfield Arithmetic Plan in grades 4 through 8. This was formulated in order to help those who were having difficulties with arithmetic and for those who were thought to be capable of doing work beyond the arithmetic offered at their grade level. In both cases we found that we could help the students more by ability grouping than by any other way. If the program continues to be a complete success, we hope to be able to show much greater gains in student achievement by the end of the school year.

On the other hand, reading and arithmetic were not the only new programs improved or formulated. We were also able to offer French to grades 7 and 8 as a means of enrichment. This particular course was offered on a voluntary basis to those who had maintained a B average during the previous school year. Even then, 21 students applied and entered this new phase of our program for the first time. Presently the program is functioning very well, and we hope to continue it for another year.

SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

School District Meeting
Chesterfield Central School
Chesterfield, New Hampshire

March 10, 1962

The meeting was called to order at 3:02 p.m. by the Moderator, Harry Winn, and the warrant through Article 1 was read by the Clerk.

Article 1. To bring in your votes for the election of the following officials:

A moderator for the coming year.

A clerk for the ensuing year.

A member of the school board for the ensuing three years.

A treasurer for the ensuing year.

Two auditors for the ensuing year.

The moderator then declared the polls open for balloting by Australian ballot for the necessary school district officers.

Esther D. Bevis, Phyllis Henchey, and Anna C. Hubner, ballot clerks, appointed by the school board, took the oath of office for Moderator, Harry Winn. Otto S. Schlichting was appointed moderator pro tem and Warren Allen was appointed clerk pro tem. They took the oath of office from the moderator.

At 8:00 p.m. the moderator again called the meeting to order and the Clerk read the remainder of the warrant.

The Moderator called for a statement of its position from the Budget Committee. Warren G. Allen spoke for the committee.

Article 2. To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board members and the truant officer, and to fix the compensation of any other officer or agents of the district.

James E. O'Neil moved that the Article be accepted as printed in the budget. Seconded by Clara B. Wellington. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Clara B. Wellington moved that the Article be passed as read. Seconded by James E. O'Neil. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. To choose agents, auditors, and committies in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

James E. O'Neil moved that the Article be passed over. Seconded by Clara B. Wellington. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 5. To see what sum of money the district will vote to

raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers, auditors and agents, for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of any sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, together with other income, the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Grace Welcome moved that this Article be laid on the table until Article 6 be acted upon. Seconded by Clara B. Wellington. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 6. To see if the district will raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$100,000. for the design, construction and equipment of an addition to the Chesterfield Central School, and in order to provide these funds authorize the school board to issue serial notes or bonds on the credit of the district for all or any portion of the amount so appropriated, further authorize the school board to determine the time and place of payment, the rate of interest, and to do any or all acts as they deem necessary to their issuance in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Financial Act RSA 33 and any amendments relating thereto and to authorize the school board to enter into all contracts for the design, construction and equipment of the addition.

Paul Welcome moved that this article be accepted as read. Seconded by Mildred Gauthier. A paper ballot was taken with the following results: 100 votes were cast. Needed for a 2/3 choice 67 votes. There were 79 "yes" votes, 20 "no" votes, and 1 spoiled ballot. The Moderator declared the Article had passed with more than the 2/3 majority vote.

Article 5. James E. O'Neil moved that the school district raise and appropriate \$159,915.72 and to authorize and direct the school board to apply against said appropriation such income as is estimated by the school board exclusive of state aid, and upon determination of the amount of state aid to be received by the school district during the next fiscal year, to authorize and direct the school board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received from state aid and with the school district Clerk to certify to the selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the town for school purposes. Seconded by Barbara Hall. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to enter into a tuition contract with the Keene School Board for the tuition of Chesterfield's Grades 7 through 12 and furnish transportation. (Add to the basic budget \$17,751.)

James E. O'Neil moved that the article be passed over. Seconded by Clara B. Wellington. Motion carried.

Article 8. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to enter into a tuition contract with Keene School Board for tuition of Chesterfield's Grades 7 through 12 and furnish transportation for 7th and 8th grades only. (Add to the basic budget \$13,101.)

James E. O'Neil moved that the article be passed over. Seconded by Fred Korradi. Motion carried.

Article 9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to enter into tuition contracts with Brattleboro School Board and Keene School Board for the tuition of Chesterfield's Grades 9 through 12 and with Keene School Board for tuition of Grades 7 and 8 and furnish transportation for the 7th and 8th grades only. (Add to basic budget \$18,379.)

Fred Korradi moved that the article be passed over. Seconded by George Barrett. Motion carried.

Article 10. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to enter into tuition contracts with Brattleboro School Board and the Keene School Board for tuition of Chesterfield's Grades 7 through 12 with transportation for 7th and 8th grades only. (Add to basic budget \$23,765.00.)

Fred Korradi moved that the Article be passed over. Seconded by Clara B. Wellington. Motion carried.

Article 11. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to enter into tuition contracts with the Keene School District for tuition at Keene High School at the rate of \$515 per pupil, and the Brattleboro School District for tuition at Brattleboro High School at the rate of \$645.50 per pupil or any other approved high school.

James E. O'Neil moved that the Article be amended to include the Alley Hicks and Austine School. Seconded by Fred Korradi. Motion carried in the affirmative.

George Barrett moved that the Article as amended be accepted. Seconded by Dorothy Thomas. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) as its share of the Supervisory Union contribution to the New Hampshire Educational Television Channel WENH.

James E. O'Neil moved that the Article be amended to read that the district authorize the School Board to make a payment to Television Station WENH, Channel 11 in Durham, New Hampshire. Seconded by Anna Hubner. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 13. To see if the district will vote to raise and ap-

appropriate the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600.) as matching funds for funds available under provision of the National Defense Education Act and to authorize the School Board to accept and use, in the name of the district, any Federal funds for public school education.

James E. O'Neil moved that the district vote to authorize the expenditure of the sum of (\$600.) as matching funds available under provision of the National Defense Education Act and to authorize the School Board to accept and use, in the name of the district, any Federal funds for public school education. Seconded by Glen Chickering. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 14. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to allow the Chesterfield Tiny Tot Kindergarten to use an empty room in the school, if available, rent for the classroom space to be determined by the School Board.

Dexter Thomas moved that the Article be passed over. Seconded by Dorothy Thomas. On a voice vote the motion was declared lost.

Kenneth Wiggin moved that the Article be accepted as read. Seconded by Myron Ingalls. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 15. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to employ a part time teacher for the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2500.).

Arvid Pearson moved that the Article be passed as read. Seconded by Belle E. Damon. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 16. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate eight thousand dollars (\$8000.) to be made available prior to June 30, 1962 as a deficit appropriation for teacher's salary caused by the employment of two teachers to assist with heavy pupil enrollment during the present school year.

James E. O'Neil moved that the district vote to authorize the expenditure of eight thousand dollars (\$8000.) to be made available prior to June 30, 1962 as a deficit appropriation for teacher's salary, caused by the employment of two teachers to assist with the heavy pupil enrollment during the present year. Seconded by Avis Gauthier. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 17. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Warren Allen moved that the School Board and the Moderator appoint a Building Committee of at least 6 members to work with the School Board on planning and building an addition to the Chesterfield Central School. Seconded by Glen Chickering. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Elliot Keach, Superintendent elect, introduced by James E. O'Neil, received an ovation.

A standing vote of appreciation was given to Superintendent Paul Clark and Teacher Consultant Kenneth Huett who will leave the district employ as of July 1, 1962.

At 10:23 p.m. the meeting was recessed by the Moderator.

At 10:24 p.m. the Moderator declared the polls closed. A count of the ballots showed 111 ballots cast, resulting as follows:

For Moderator: Harry Winn had 100 votes, Paul Lawton, H. Claude Mowry, James E. O'Neil, Warren Allen, Paul Welcome, and George E. Joslin each had one vote. Harry Winn was declared elected Moderator for the coming year.

For Clerk: H. Claude Mowry had 105 votes, Dexter Thomas and Anna Hubner each had 1 vote. H. Claude Mowry was declared elected Clerk for the ensuing year.

For member of the School Board for the ensuing three years: Clara B. Wellington had 80 votes, Kenneth Wiggin had 10 votes, Jane Allen had 5 votes, and Gerald Knickerbocker, Warren Allen, Barbara Wiggin, Mrs. Warren Allen, Corrine Goodell, and Bertha Willette each had one vote. Clara B. Wellington was declared elected a member of the school board for the ensuing three years.

For treasurer for the ensuing year: Evelyn Winn had 99 votes and was declared elected treasurer for the ensuing year.

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Preventing Forest Fires Is Our Responsibility

Costs of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires in New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545.00. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such fires for which no responsibility could be placed cost another \$24,634.00. What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and esthetic values in the 2200 acres burned. Residences, farms, and other business places were threatened with possible total destruction.

Carelessly set man caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his responsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can keep our fires low by remembering these simple rules.

1. Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.
2. If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain a permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites.
3. Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late in the day.
4. Have something to keep the fire under control — pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.
5. Be sure your fire is dead out before you leave it.
6. If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives.

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never too early for parents to instill in the child's mind a respect for fire.

Keep our town safe from fire.

In 1962 we had 6 fires.

We burned 1 acre.
