

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TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Clarksville in the County of Coos in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Clarksville on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town.
5. To vote by Non-partisan ballot, to see if the Town will vote to discontinue that part of the road leading from the West Road to Wilma Bunnell's now not in use, and exchange the land involved, with Wilma Bunnell for the land now used for the new road built in 1968.
6. To vote by Non-partisan ballot to see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$191.20 for the North Country Community Services.
7. To vote by Non-partisan ballot, to see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purchase of a radio for the police to be used with other money available from State and Federal sources.
8. To vote by Non-partisan ballot, to see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$87.95 for the White Mountain Regional Association.
9. To vote by Non-partisan ballot, to see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint the Road Agent.

10. To vote by Non-partisan ballot, to see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 to the Upper Connecticut Valley Hospital Association.
11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and the Citizens of the School District of Clarksville:

The concept of shared services and facilities is increasingly becoming the most practical method by which individual school districts can meet the current demand and challenges of education. The recent ruling by the State Department of Education allowing dual enrollment, a method by which a student in one school district may attend school in another district for the purpose of taking a course or courses not offered in his own school, certainly is a logical step in reducing the demanding cost of education and in the duplication of services and facilities within immediate school districts.

This past year the five school districts comprising Supervisory Union No. 7 agreed to share the costs of a junior and senior high guidance counselor. Students attending school in Colebrook, Pittsburg and Stewartstown now have available to them the services of a counselor for vocational and college plans, as well as obtaining assistance in securing part-time or summer employment. This position is now capably filled by Mr. Jason Sibulkin, who has had a number of years experience working with young people in a social worker capacity and as an educator in the Colebrook School District.

This year, voters in the towns of Supervisory Union No. 7 will be asked to support the guidance counselor service on a Supervisory Union level. Since no new service may be added to the Supervisory Union without consent of the majority of the school districts, as specified in RSA 189:47, voters will be asked to support this service beginning with the 71-72 school year by means of a special article in the current school warrant. It should be noted that the "grace" period allocated to Supervisory Union No. 7 was given with the stipulation that the State Board of Education would re-examine in June of 1970 the services originating from the Supervisory Union Office. Realizing that each district is financially incapable of supporting this service alone, the decision by local school board members to initiate and maintain this needed and worthwhile service until it could be placed on a Supervisory Union level through voter action is to be commended.

The possibility of sharing specialists and creating a quality multi-media center is now being investigated by seven Supervisory Unions in the north country, Designated the North Country Shared Services Project, school Directors from North Conway to Pittsburg will be investigating what services, materials and equipment can be feasibly shared at a reasonable cost. These districts now have available to them a shared Central Arts Library which developed out of Project Arise. Each School may now count the books, records, filmstrips, etc. in this library as part of its own library in meeting library standards.

With the ever increasing cost and demand for quality education and services, the concept of sharing, either by local districts or at a Supervisory Union or Inter-Supervisory Union level, certainly appears to present the most practical solution and one that should be earnestly considered and investigated for the improving and expanding of the educational process.

SUPERVISORY UNION NO. 7 GUIDANCE

Guidance is that part of the total educational program which assists the individual student in developing a realistic concept of himself and society and in setting and achieving goals consistent with his potential. The guidance process helps the student to understand his abilities, interests, and special aptitudes; to acquire information about educational and vocational opportunities within a changing society; and to make appropriate adjustments and wise choices.

Guidance is based on the philosophy that no two students are alike. Each has his own pattern of growth. This pattern governs to a large extent the direction and rate of growth for each. The good teacher and counselor will provide the appropriate environment for the unfolding of this pattern.

Guidance is a continuous process which, from the school's standpoint, begins with the child's first contact with the school and continues as long as the school can be of service. This concept indicates that guidance is developmental in nature rather than merely remedial or preventive. Each student needs continuing assistance in assessing previous and present situations and in planning for the future.

Guidance emphasizes assisting students in making their own choices rather than having decisions dictated to them. Guidance is a school-wide responsibility requiring close working-together of teachers, administrators, counselors, and other school personnel. All of this is based upon the cooperative efforts of the school, the home, and the community.

SCHOOL HEALTH

The purpose of a school health program is to perform the necessary duties to maintain and promote good health of the pupils in our schools.

The following services are performed each year: checking heights and weights, vision and hearing; physical examinations for all students in grades 4, 8, 11, and athletics; T.B. skin tests as recommended by the state T.B. Association; necessary immunizations; pre-school clinics every spring for in-coming first graders; and continuous supervision of general health.

In May, a Lazy-Eye Clinic was held for pre-school youngsters under the sponsorship of the Grange. The response to this clinic was very gratifying and very few youngsters were found to have vision defects.

The overall program of school health in this area is adequate, but there is always chance for improvement. By everyone working together, it is hoped that these improvements can be realized to the mutual benefit of our students and community as a whole.
