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### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Danville in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Health Department.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Vital Statistics.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Maintenance—Summer.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Winter Maintenance.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Road Aid, necessary to obtain State Aid.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Libraries.

15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Poor.

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.

17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Aid to Soldiers and their Families.

19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Cemeteries.

20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Old Meeting House Assn.

21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the County Tax.

22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Schools.

23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Abatements.

24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civilian Defense.

25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street Lighting.

26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Yield Taxes.

27. To see how much of the Parsonage Funds the town will vote to spend for preaching for the ensuing year.

28. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

29. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell Tax Title Property.

30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for defraying expenses involved, for a committee of three to work with the Selectmen in regards to locating an industry in the town.

31. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Committee of three to handle all the business of the Fire Department.



32. On Petition of ten and more voters;

To see if the town will vote to accept a Street extending from Route 111A, 30 ft. wide and 604 ft. long to the residence of Mahlon Demaine, on deed having been conveyed to the Town of Danville by Ruth Thorsen.

33. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

## TOWN MEETING — MARCH 11, 1958

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At two o'clock in the afternoon March 11, a legal meeting was called to order by the Moderator for the purpose of acting on the Town Warrant.

The Warrant was read by the Moderator who then declared the polls open for the election of officers for the ensuing year.

### BUSINESS MEETING

The business meeting was called to order at 8:00 P. M. The chairman, Melton Sanborn read the report of the Budget Committee.

Article 2. It was voted to pass over the Article.

Article 3. Voted to raise and appropriate \$1,700.00 for Town Officers' salaries.

Article 4. Voted to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for Town Officers' Expenses.

Article 5. Voted to raise and appropriate \$400.00 for Election and Registration Expenses.

Article 6. Voted to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for the Town Hall and other Town Buildings.

Article 7. Voted to raise and appropriate \$300.00 for the Police Department.

Article 8. Voted to raise and appropriate \$1,150.00 for the Fire Department.

Article 9. Voted to raise and appropriate \$25.00 for the Health Department.

Article 10. Voted to raise and appropriate \$20.00 for Vital Statistics.

Article 11. Voted to raise and appropriate \$2,500.00 for Town Maintenance—Summer.

Article 12. Voted to raise and appropriate \$1,670.66 for Winter Maintenance.

Article 13. Voted to raise and appropriate \$230.78 for Town Road Aid, necessary to obtain State Aid.

Article 14. Voted to raise and appropriate \$300.00 for Libraries.

Article 15. Voted to raise and appropriate \$2,500.00 for Town Poor.

Article 16. Voted to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 for Old Age Assistance.

Article 17. Voted to raise and appropriate \$60.00 for Memorial Day.

Article 18. Voted to raise and appropriate \$100.00 for aid to Soldiers and their Families.

Article 19. Voted to raise and appropriate \$250.00 for Cemeteries.

Article 20. Voted to raise and appropriate \$50.00 for the Old Meeting House Association.

Article 21. Voted to raise and appropriate \$2,065.00 for the County Tax.

Article 22. Voted to pass over.

Article 23. Voted to spend the income and interest of the Parsonage Fund for preaching for the ensuing year.

Article 24. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

Article 25. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to sell Tax Title Property.

Article 26. Voted to raise and appropriate \$450.00 for having had State Tax Commission to assess property in Danville.

Article 27. Voted to raise and appropriate \$50.00 for defraying expenses involved for a committee of three to work with the Selectmen in regards to locating an industry in the Town.

Article 28. Voted not to have the State Tax Commission assess all new and renovated property.

Article 29. There was much discussion on this Article, the Amendment which follows was carried. There is hereby created a Board of Fire Wards whose authority, duties and responsibilities shall be to oversee the conduct and affairs of the Fire Department agreeably to the laws of the State. The Board of Fire Wards shall consist of the duly appointed Chief of the Fire Department and two other legal voters to be appointed by the Selectmen for a term of one year and until their successors are appointed and qualified.

Article 30. Voted to pass over the Article. It was voted under Article 7 to install a street light at the intersection of Rt. 111 and Brown Hill Road so called.

Article 31. Voted to pass over.

Article 32. Voted to have the Selectmen see that our Town Pound be cleared of trees and brush and make the entire plot clean and presentable to the passing public, under this article Mrs. Mabel I. Spencer, Auditor, made the following report.

In as much as we did not have the Town Report in our hands at the School Meeting on Thursday, March 6, and many of you were not at that meeting when I gave my report, I would like to call your attention to the top of page 54. Auditor's Certificate. This statement is not true and I object to its being printed over my name without noting the exception I wrote on the books which I examined; namely, check #1906 through error overpaid by \$2.00. It was drawn for \$296.18 instead of \$294.18.

All members of the School Committee were notified of the error and have had since last summer to correct it. To date it has not been corrected.

In this connection I am reminded of a story about Abraham Lincoln which I believe was in the history book I studied as a child in Danville.

You will recall that as a very young man Lincoln went to work as a clerk in a store. It so happened that one day a woman came in and made a purchase. After she had gone, he noticed that she had given him six cents too much. That night after his job was finished he walked five miles to the woman's house to return her money. I may add that I have always found the Town officers—Selectmen, Tax Collector,

Treasurer and Town Clerk very cooperative and happy to correct any mistake which have been called to their attention.—Mabel I. Spencer, Auditor.

Mr. Spencer and Mr. Butters reported for the Industrial Committee. No progress yet but still hope some industry may be induced to come to Danville.

It was suggested if we cleaned up and made the town more attractive, it might help.

An Auxiliary Police Force was discussed.

The business meeting adjourned at 10:10. The balloting was declared closed at 10:15. There were 353 names on the check list. 243 ballots were cast.

## FOREST FIRE WARDEN REPORT

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### YOU CAN HELP PREVENT FOREST FIRES

Twenty-five percent of all forest fires in New Hampshire are caused from careless debris burning — brush, paper, leaves, grass, etc. Most of them are started without the required permit from the local forest fire warden. The cost of extinguishing these fires annually runs into large sums of money.

According to law, responsible parties must pay the cost of putting them out. In addition, violators may be subject to court prosecution with fines running as high as (\$200) two-hundred dollars.

In the interest of fire prevention why not eliminate burning at home? Use your town dump. It has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place for the disposal of dangerous inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around the home and local stores; brush, etc. cut on your property. Eliminate the hazard of burning yourself. It will be easier for you—personally and financially.

If, however, you do burn on your premises:

1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden —the law requires it.
2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.
3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 9th day of March 1959, at two o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to

the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the District will vote to hereafter use a check list for the election of officers, beginning with the 1960 Annual Meeting, and will adopt as it's school check list the Town Check List, as provided in R.S.A. 197:12A as inserted by Laws of 1957, Chapter 57.

## SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

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To the Superintendent, School Board Members, and citizens:

The school health program of 1958-59 began with three pre-school clinics at the Town Hall. These were held in conjunction with the State Dept. of Health. Parents of pre-school children were given the opportunity of bringing them for physicals, various shots, and vaccination for small-pox. Attendance was good.

Eye and ear testing are nearly completed. These programs have been greatly facilitated by the up-to-date pieces of apparatus which were recently purchased by the school Union.

Opportunities for informal health teaching were taken advantage of, and home visits were made by the nurse concerning physical defects.

Commendation is due Mrs. White for the fine lunch program which she is carrying on.

Mr. Demming is continuing his scrupulous care of the physical plant. All of us who are interested in the health and well-being of our children are grateful to him for his part in the maintenance of these.

Parents and teachers as usual have been most cooperative, helping to make Danville a pleasant place in which to be school nurse-teacher.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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Many parents have asked how homework fits into the educational picture of Danville. Although there are many people who denounce all home assignments and will continue to denounce them, home study has had and continues to have a traditional place in our American educational system. Though it may change form from time to time and from generation to generation, it seems likely that some form of home study will be maintained. Most school systems throughout the country continue to give home assignments in one form or another.

When homework is assigned, it is important for the teacher to check upon this work, to see that it is actually accomplished, and to note that something is achieved thereby. Regardless of whether it be a home study assignment or a classroom assignment, the assignment made by the teacher must be called for by him. Little or no desirable learning is achieved when teachers make assignments and then rarely hold students responsible for them.

The amount of time that a child is expected to spend in home study varies greatly in different localities. In Danville, I believe that a maximum should not exceed two hours in the upper grades, and one hour in the intermediate grades. None should be given in the primary grades.



When homework involves writing or study, it is highly important that the child have a definite place to do it. He certainly will not get much accomplished if home assignment must be made in the family living room with other people either televiewing, listening to the radio, or carrying on different types of conversation.

Once the child realized that homework is his own responsibility, it will be wiser for the parents to allow him to arrange the time he wishes to provide for it, and then observe whether he holds to the time agreed upon. If the child learns to budget his time, he will see to it that the home study is not neglected.

When work is assigned to be written it is of the utmost importance that the child do the work himself, rather than copy it after someone else has worked it out for him. When the latter occurs, little, if any real learning takes place. The child only learns to get others to do his work. If the child has difficulty with a certain problem or other point in the assignment, a parent might help him over a difficulty by explaining the matter to him. This is entirely different from copying out answers worked by someone else, without understanding how they were achieved.

Homework can greatly aid in the development of the child's character and personality as well as his academic achievement. Properly assigned and properly fulfilled, home study can build habits of self-reliance and responsibility

and, when group assignments are made, of co-operation and working with others. Again, when the nature of the assignment is such as to permit it, a considerable amount of learning in related areas can be achieved.

Our school lunch program under the direction of Mrs. White is one of which we can be proud. Mrs. White is providing well balanced meals for your children. This is evidenced by the large number of children who partake of these meals.

In closing, I thank the children, Principal and teachers for their efforts in making the educational program successful. I also thank the Citizens and School Board for their part in making my task a pleasant one.
