TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Derry, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby instructed to meet at the Adams Memorial Building in said Town on the second Tuesday of March next, at Ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To elect one selectman for three years, Town Clerk, Collector of Taxes, Library Trustees, Trustee of the Trust Funds, Auditors, and all other necessary Town officials for the year ensuing.

2. To vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, maintenance of the poor, for laying out and repairing highways, for building and repairing bridges, for the maintenance of trunk line and state aid roads, for the suppression of moths, for the police department and municipal court, for hydrant service and electric lights, for salaries of town officials, for the Board of Health, for the expense of town halls, for the support of libraries, for payments to the sinking fund, for state and county taxes, for the use of Upton Post No. 45, G. A. R., for aid to the Derry Visiting Nurse Association, for cooperating with the state and federal governments in control of the white pine blister, and for all other necessary charges arising in said Town and pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To hear the reports of agents, auditors and committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to sprinkle or oil the streets and pass any vote relating thereto.

5. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 117, Laws of 1917, on a section of the Derry-Raymond Road, so-called, and appropriate, or set aside from the amount raised for highway work the sum of \$400.00 for this purpose, and pass any vote relating thereto.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of cooperating with the State in the construction of a portion of the Derry-Raymond Road, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes on the negotiable notes of the Town and pass any vote relating thereto.

8. To see if the Town will direct the Collector of Taxes to allow a discount to all persons paying their taxes within such period as the Town shall limit, to fix the rate of such discount, and pass any vote relating thereto.

9. To appoint any necessary committee on any article embraced in this warrant.

10. To see if the Town will vote to have two public toilets and a man and woman to take care of them and pass any vote relating thereto.

11. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that part of the highway leading from the Gratteau place, formerly known as the Charles Rand place, easterly to Drews Corner and pass any vote relating thereto.

12. To see what action the Town will take relative to completing that section of the Rockingham Road between Fairview Avenue and the Catholic Church; to raise and appropriate money for the same and pass any vote relating thereto.

13. To see if the Town will vote to issue serial notes or bonds of the Town for the purpose of carrying into effect any action it may take under article twelve of this warrant; to fix the kind and denomination of such notes or bonds; the time and place of payment; the rate of interest and the time when such interest shall be paid and the manner of payment, all to be done in accordance with the provision of the Statutes of New Hampshire, and pass any vote relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town will vote to elect its road agents by the voters of the Town and pass any vote relating thereto.

It was deemed prudent to close schools in Spring also public places as we considered it the best course. We also have had Sewerage conditions to remedy and this Town will soon be obliged to put in sewer system to take care of all the waste matter that now contaminates the soil. We have had no sickness from our drinking water supply and the State Board reports show we have a safe water for our use.

The general health of population is better than in many Towns of same population. There is at present a few cases of measles and mumps in Town but they are not of a serious nature. We wish that it might be possible to establish a good sewer system as we certainly need it. I wish to thank all for their cooperation with this board although we realize it has not been pleasant at all times to conform to the recommendations. Let us all try to clean up and keep clean our town in every way and we all will enjoy a healthy and sanitary Town.

We wish to express our thanks to those who have so kindly donated books, subscriptions to magazines and papers; and also to the local newspapers for giving generous space to notices and book lists

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

Feb. 1st., 1926

To the Trustees of the Derry Public Library:

The 21st. annual report is herewith presented:

I thought when a 15% gain was reported last year that we would do well to maintain the same record but instead we have again gone ahead, and in spite of being closed for four weeks in June, on account of scarlet fever. We have made up the 2,200 lost at that time, gained 582 and today I report a circulation of 43,420, which is a daily average of 154.5 against 140 last year.

From these figures you can see that our need for more room is even more pressing. We are overcrowded both in the reading room and the stack room. More shelving must be provided in order to have space for our present books when the quieter season of reading comes. It is inconvenient to get about the rooms and stacks during the busy hours on account of the large number in the rooms. Boys of 10 to 15 years of age seem to predominate in the use of the rooms, and this class as you well know are hard to deal with. Often twenty or more are in the reading room at one time and this is more than there are chairs to accommodate, and as many more are standing about the stacks. This overcrowding leads to disturbance and means extra service to preserve order. The need of discipline is ever present and is one of the hardest features of the library work. This problem of increased room should have your immediate attention.

The whitening and strengthening of the ceiling has added to the appearance of the rooms but new paper is sadly needed as the walls are water stained in many places and the settling of the building has cracked the plaster and torn the paper in other places. The patch of new plaster put in several years ago has

never been covered, and presents an unsightly spectacle to all who enter the room.

An addition has been built, by a local cabinet maker to the picture cabinet which will give us room for several hundred more mounted pictures.

During the fall we began the practice of loaning two books on each card to adults. Only one of these was to be a seven day book. The privilege was very welcome and many have availed themselves of it.

In July I was enabled by your grant of time to take a three weeks course in Library Science at Simmons College. My time was spent studying cataloging and classifying. The course was very satisfactory to me giving me information as to latest methods and new ideas.

Your Librarian also attended the New England meeting of Librarians at Swampscott, Mass., in June; the New Hampshire Library Association at Laconia, in October where she was accompanied by Mrs. Howe, assistant librarian; and a neighborhood meeting at Nashua, at which Mr. Clement, trustee, was also present. The inspiration gained at these gatherings is very helpful and tends toward the betterment of the Library service.

Routine work has gone on much as usual. Publicity has been given the library through frequent newspaper items, lists of new books and special subject lists. The work has been kept before the children by Children's Book Week, visits to the school rooms and assistance in making out the lists for supplementary reading whenever the teacher has given the opportunity. A close co-operation in the compiling of these list is a very material help to the pupil as well as to the library, and the librarian always welcomes the occasion to give information in regard to the material the library affords.

During Children's Book Week prizes were given

to the poster contestants as follows: 1st. prize, Margaret Wilson; 2d. prize, 8th. grade, Louis Page; 7th. grade, Frederick Wood; 6th. grade, Muriel Hawkins; 5th. grade, Chin Lung Fung.

The yearly bulletin was issued in March and the bulletin boards at the library have been kept filled with attractive jackets of the new books as they have been added to the library.

The library is indebted to Mrs. Ellie Huse for the gift of a fine set of Encyclopedia Britannica with American supplement. This is in 30 volumes. A case to contain the same was also given. Others who have given one or more volumes are Mrs. E. S. Kelley, Miss Edith Hall, Mrs. James Weston, Mrs. A. T. Holmes, Mrs. Alice Watson, Mr. Carl Cotton, Mrs. Weaver, Harmony Club, Mrs. E. H. Baynes, Mrs. F. E. Tewksbury, Derry Woman's Club and Carnegie Endowment for International Peace.

Magazines subscriptions have been given by International Correspondence School, N. H. Anti Saloon League, Christian Register, W. C. T. U. of Derry, N. H. Library Commission; Jewish Tribune, Society for the Prevention of the Cruelty to Animals, Daughters of the American Revolution of Derry, N. Eng. Tel & Tel Co., Salesman News, Derry News and Enterprise.

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Derry School Board:

In presenting this, my sixth annual report, it gives me pleasure to summarize briefly the recommendations of the superintendent that have been adopted by the school board and other improvements contributed to the school system. The customary statistical reports and recommendations for the current year follow this summary. In presenting these facts it is only right for me to say that without your hearty co-operation so much progress would not have been possible.

HEALTH

The health service, fostered by the local Red Cross, was taken over by the school department in 1920. Its function at first, was diagnostic in character. Gradually, this branch has taken on remedial work until we now have a tonsil clinic, a dental clinic and a nutrition clinic. All of these clinics have proved to be very popular and a great blessing to the children.

First aid kits and the inauguration of the nutrition clinic are due to the efforts of the Women's Club. The Dental Clinic was promoted by the Red Cross and the Farm Bureau. It is now operated by the school department. The first year over fifteen hundred teeth were filled and this year nearly four hundred dental operations have been performed.

SCHOOL BUILDINGS

All of the outlying schools, with the exception of the Kilray school, have been remodeled so that the light, heat, ventilation, and toilet facilities are now adequate. All of these schools, except one, have been provided with new furniture. Without doubt, some of the increased rural population is due to these improved school facilities. The townspeople may well be proud of these schools.

The centralized schools have been put in a good state of repairs. All of them, except the Floyd School, have been thoroughly renovated, inside and out. The Oak Street School and the West Side School may be improved by better lighting arrangements. Electric lights should be installed throughout both these schools. Toilet facilities should be improved at Oak Street.

At Derry Village, the building has been remodeled by the addition of toilets, hardwood floors, additional heating apparatus, electric lights and storm doors. The building has been refurnished throughout.

JUNIOR SCHOOL

The problem of uniting the upper grades and unifying the work of these schools has been solved to the satisfaction of all, even the opponents of this measure. The children are happier in the association with pupils of their own age. The scope of the work in these grades has been widened. The teaching and the materials of instruction have been improved. The organization of the school has been systematized by the introduction of special classes and a semi platoon system.

The gap between the eighth grade and the high school has been much abridged. While the number of failures in the ninth grade this year remains approximately the same as in previous years, about 25%, these have shifted in the subjects of failure. Formerly, English was the main subject of failure. Now, it is mathematics. Of eighty pupils taking the work of the first year seven failed in bookkeeping, nine in English, eleven in history, eighteen in foreign languages and twenty-eight in mathematics. The only criticism made is that the elementary pupils do not get hold of fractions and common decimals. Further mention of the elements that contribute to the prog-

ress through the elementary grades is made under the caption Age-Grade Statistics.

This plan of the Junior High School organization has enabled proper standards to be fixed, essentials of the program of study to be clarified, the course of study to be unified, the grading of pupils more flexible and has produced a better means of motivating the work of the school-room.

Shop work and Domestic Science have been introduced in these grades through the influence of the Parent-Teachers' Association. By means of the operation of these courses it is hoped to develop, ultimately, try-out or finding courses, features of school work mentioned in last year's report. In a recent conversation with one of our Congressmen, it was suggested that it is our duty to ascertain what the children's talents are as early as possible, educate them along that line and they will "shine in life."

CURRENT EXPENDITURE PER PUPIL

The cost of these elementary schools include expenses of administration, fixed charges, per capita tax, costs of instruction, operation, maintenance, health and transportation. The items enumerated in these statistics represent the total cost of education with the exception of the cost of high school instruction and the unpaid bills of the previous year.

The total expenditures for elementary schools in 1924-1925 was \$50,193.82. There were 808 pupils. The per capita cost for the education of these pupils was \$62.14. The best figures I could find for comparison with the expenditures of this year were secured from the statistical report of the State Board of Education, which summarizes the statistical reports of 253 cities and towns for the school year of 1924-1925.

Comparing the cost per pupil for the elementary school pupils in Derry with the average cost of the 253 N. H. school districts the average cost per pupil in Derry is \$10.62 less than the average cost per pupil for the state.

One of the standard tests for the efficiency of the school system is the ratio of the amount of money expended for teachers salaries bears to the total expenditure of the whole budget. In 1925-1925 the pupil cost for teacher hire in Derry was 60% of the whole budget. Comparing this with the per pupil cost of the whole state, Derry is expending 12.6% more than the average of the state per pupil. It would, therefore, appear that our teachers are approximately 20% more efficient in teaching power than the average of the teachers in the remaining 253 school districts of New Hampshire. I believe these figures to be true since other statistics enumerated in this report confirm the validity of this index of efficiency.

Derry's per pupil cost in all the other items of this statistical table, with the exception of janitors' salaries, is approximately 50% less than the average state cost per pupil. A close examination of the above

table shows a high degree of efficiency in budget-making. This table shows that the school board are spending a large amount of the school budget where it properly should be spent, for the salaries of teachers.

CHARACTER TRAINING

Can arithmetic be taught by preaching? Should arithmetic be taught the child by preaching about doing the examples or is such instruction divided into problems? No one thinks now of teaching arithmetic by the inspirational or lecture method. On the contrary, the teacher presents concrete problems for solution. She then relates the fundamental numerical processes to the solution of the problem.

Likewise in character-training, we have the conduct problem. How shall the teacher deal with a noisy boy who disturbs the whole school? Too frequently, such a boy is condemned and suppressed. The teacher's duty, however, is to deal justly with him, giving him the assistance and guidance he needs in the development of the qualities which make up his personality and character. Such a boy has qualities that may be turned to good account. He has initiative, mental alertness, courage, self-reliance and other qualities that, when properly used, may be turned to good account in the development of his personality. This boy will recognize and appreciate any analysis the teacher may make for the purpose of improving defective qualities of character that may need development along other lines. The noisy boy may turn his energetic qualities to good account in such characteristics as public spirit, patriotism, reverence and use his initiative in the solution of his daily problems.

Our aim in character-building is not only to give the child practice in such qualities as honesty, courtesy, kindness, love, perseverance, judgment, self-reliance, initiative, open-mindedness, loyalty, courage, reverence, persuasion, patriotism and public spirit, but, also,

to analyze these various traits and present the analysis to the child whenever it appears expedient to do so. Such records are not available for inspection as is the report card. Teachers are, however, ready at all times to discuss with parents any problems that may arise in character-training.

Tastes, aptitudes, interests, attitudes, capacities and abilities of children enter into both character-building and the selection of a vocation. The earlier in the life of the child these elements are determined the better it is for the education of the child. Character-building and vocational training are assuming such an important position in the instruction of the child that the time is now ripe for special supervision in these related fields of educational endeavor. Such a teacher was advocated in last year's report. The writer is attempting to do this work in his general supervision. The results are necessarily much more superficial than they would be if a special teacher was available. Those who are interested in the local aspects of vocational guidance should read the vocational survey in the report of 1924-1925.

I do not wish to infer that in character-training we entirely neglect the inspirational phases of instruction such as poems, readings from emotional literature, selected passages of a spiritual nature from the Bible or fail to conform to the customary formalities of a Christian community.

I wish to report, however, that I find, contrary to the opinion prevailing among many people, the teaching of these ethical principles is the big thing in the curriculum that claims the attention of our teachers. I find them keen to grasp every opportunity to teach the essential qualities that contribute to the formation of high character. They are limited in the performance of this task effectively by the immaturity of the child and a lack of accurate knowledge of whether

training in honesty, courtesy, kindness, reverence, etc., will carry over from one field of activity to another. We are, however, teaching all of the precepts of the moral code as well as we know them with the conviction that such instruction will function to a large extent in other fields of activity not closely related to the field in which the instruction is given. As I have observed the work of the schools, character training takes precedence over other features of the teaching.

HEALTH

The reports of the school nurse disclose that all pupils have received a thorough physical examination, including tests for sight, hearing, weight and height. Dr. Ralph Barker and Dr. Walter Sanders have generously contributed their time in a more critical examination of the pupils in the West Side and Derry Village schools. Other physicians have promised to give their services when they can conveniently arrange it. The results of the health work this year show that an unusually large amount of corrective work has been done the past year. Parents are realizing the importance of keeping their children's health in perfect condition. Forty-seven cases were successfully operated upon in the tonsil and adenoid clinic at the Floyd School, during the summer vacation. The dental clinic, under the direction of George E. Danforth, has completed work upon 225 pupils. In the tubercular clinic, which is operated by Dr. R. Kerr under the auspices of the N. H. Tuberculosis Association, 105 pupils have been treated.

The school nurse finds the sanitary conditions generally good in all the schools except at Oak Street. It is very urgent that steps should be taken to improve the sanitary conditions in this building. It is suggested that an entirely new system of sanitation be adopted in this school.

It is with much regret that I have to report Miss Daley has resigned her position as school nurse to accept a position as state health nurse with the Michigan State Board of Health. Miss Daley has spared no time or pains to make our health program the best possible.

AGE-GRADE STATISTICS

A study of the age-grade table shows that we have eliminated a large number of over-age children in all grades. In 1923 we had several children in the first grade with ages of eight and two with ages of nine and one-half. In the third grade there were two children five years over age, three children four years over age and four children three years over age. In the fifth grade there were seven children three years over age and thirteen children two years over age. In other grades there was a similar distribution of over-age pupils.

This year, Sept. 1, 1925, we have no children of eight or nine years in the first grade. In the third grade there are only five children three years over age and none four or five years over age. Thus the age-grade table for this year records but one child three years or more over age. That child is in the second grade. A study of the age-grade table for the past six years shows a constant improvement in elimination of over-age pupils from the school system.

Another feature in connection with this table, worth mentioning, is the fact that only one child is repeating the work of a grade for the third year. There are nine repeating the work for the first grade, twelve the second grade, twelve the third grade, three the fourth grade, three the fifth grade, none the sixth grade, one the seventh grade, none the eighth grade and nine the ninth grade. Our teachers are to be congratulated upon reducing to such an extent the number of pupils repeating the same grade.

It is through figures such as these that we are enabled to derive standards that confirm the good judgment of school officials in spending school money where it may be used most effectively namely, upon teachers' salaries, and the materials of instruction. The results of this policy are manifested in these stat-

istics which disclose substantial improvement in the progress of the children through the grades.

METHODS OF INSTRUCTION

Our teachers are so much encouraged by these improvements that they are planning to eliminate the repetition of the work of any grade. This we plan to accomplish through the introduction of methods of instruction that will produce a keen feeling of the need of such instruction on the part of the child. We hope to accomplish this through a larger amount of individual instruction and through the use of improved forms of the materials of instruction. We plan to motivate the work of the school room by a selection of such materials as will be most helpful to enable the child to express himself. The teacher will guide the child in the selection of his problems and materials but the pupil will work the solution of his own problems. It is through this work that he educates himself. Ample opportunity for group expression will be afforded in class discussions, dramatizations, and plays. It is through these activities that the individual instruction of the child is related to his own life, and life in general.

PARENTAL CO-OPERATION

In order to produce a keener desire for the need of instruction on the part of the child the teachers are asking for co-operation of parents, not for the purpose of assisting them directly in the instruction of the child but to assist the teacher in checking up the performance of the requirements of the course of study. It is not expected that parents will know details of the instruction in the various courses offered. It is, however, believed that parents may do much to tie up the instruction given in school by making judicious inquiries relative to the meaning of the various

achievements by the pupils as indicated on their report cards.

The writer firmly believes that parents may contribute in no small way to the success of the child in school and in after life by stimulating a keen desire on the part of the child for the needed instruction. With the proper motivation of the parent, the skilful guidance of the teacher and the proper selection of the materials of instruction the child will be more effectively educated than ever before.

MUSIC

The music supervisor, Miss Flora Ridlon, reports the music instruction in our school system to be of high quality. Miss Ridlon came here last fall highly recommended. She is living up to her former reputation as a music supervisor by stimulating the teachers in the use of new methods and features of work. Among these are a Christmas cantata, an operetta, a quartette of young men, a demonstration of elementary school music and a primary band. This work is being well done. The town was fortunate in securing the services of such an excellent supervisor.

CONCLUSION

In closing this year's report I am glad to say that the work of the schools has never been so well done. The teachers, individually, and through committees, have been active in vitalizing and readjusting the curriculum so that it will better express their own lives and give every pupil a chance to do his best. I wish to thank the teachers, members of the school board and many interested citizens for their active and hearty co-operation in conducting the work of the schools.
