# TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Dublin qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 12th, 1946, at nine o'clock in the forenoon until five o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

First: To bring in your ballots for Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Selectman, Road Agent, Tax Collector, Water Commissioner, Library Trustee, and Trustee of Trust Funds.

Second: To choose all other necessary Town Officers, Agents, Auditors and Committees for the ensuing year.

Third: To hear reports of Agents, Officers, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Fourth: To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to apply for Town Road Aid.

Fifth: To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to erect an Honor Roll.

Sixth: To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the erection of a Christmas Tree and to decorate the Village during the Christmas season.

Seventh: To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to cut trees on various highways in Town, or to take action relating thereto.

Eighth: To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the completion of culverts on Mechanic Street, or take any action relating thereto.

Ninth: To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the purchase of highway equipment, or take any action relating thereto.

Tenth: To see whether the Town will vote to extend Street Lights on the Monument Road, or take any action relating thereto.

Eleventh: To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and for any other purposes as may be mentioned in the Budget.

Twelfth: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deeds.

Thirteenth: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Fourteenth: To see whether the Town will vote to discontinue the road leading past the Frank Frothingham residence to Waite Corner.

Fifteenth: To see whether the Town will pass a resolution favoring the construction of a bypass of Dublin Village through Harrisville Depot to be constructed by State and Federal funds in accordance with a plan laid before the New Hampshire Highway Commissioner.

## REPORT OF ROAD AGENT

I herewith submit my annual report.

All roads were dragged and scraped several times, all culverts and ditches cleaned.

The Bonds corner - Harrisville road was chloride treated also the South side of lake, ten tons being used.

Brush was cut on several roads, stones blasted from several.

All tar roads were resurfaced and honed except west side of lake road. Upper Jaffrey road was treated with coat of asphalt and pea stones 1.7 miles being done this year. The cost was equally divided between state and town for this work.

The road beyond Spelman garage was widened and gravelled to entrance of Schoepf residence, 125 yards being used on same. L. C. Gerry road gravelled using 285 yards. The road to Dayspring farm also gravelled, 320 yards used on same, also first hill and the hill approaching the farm and several other places were widened and stones removed. The Old Harrisville road was gravelled and all these roads dragged several times during summer. Other roads were gravel treated where needed.

Due to the severe winter this past year the town equipment was taxed to the limit and found to be in poor condition causing several serious breakdowns making replacement of parts necessary in order to use the equipment. The large tractor was found in worse condition than at first thought and numerous parts had to be replaced including tracks. All worn parts were patched as long as possible, then replacements were the only possible solution. This was expensive but necessary. The smaller tractor had to have entire running gear and tracks. This total replacement, including parts and labor amounted to \$3056.78.

The town is in need of new equipment very badly as present equipment is worn out. The need is for a road maintainer also a truck. Would suggest a two to three ton truck of some reliable make including snow plow and wing. These two items would assist greatly in maintaining the roads.

To those who have helped in any way during this year my grateful thanks.

To the Citizens of the Dublin School District:

We submit the one hundred and twenty-fourth annual report of the School Board.

Again we are grateful to have retained the present teaching staff at the Dublin Consolidated School. The faculty works with diligence and efficiency in their delegated subjects.

During the past two years, obsolete school equipment has been traded in or reconditioned and put into constructive use in the various school activities.

Last July the transportation contracts were posted for bid. Mr. Pellerin's bid was accepted for the transportation of High School pupils. Mr. Clukay is again transporting the Elementary School children. One new bus is in operation, owned by Mr. Clukay. All buses were inspected by State Law and pass the necessary qualifications.

The possibility of having a much longer noon lunch program from November through March is under consideration. We hope very much that this project can go into effect for the next school year.

We regret very much that Mr. Andrew, who has served on the School Board so faithfully for a number of years, resigned in August.

The Dublin School Board wishes to express its appreciation for the cooperation of the teachers, janitor, superintendent, and townspeople in the year just past.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS TO THE DUBLIN SCHOOL BOARD

I submit herewith my twelfth annual report of the Dublin Consolidated School together with the statistical table and summary, and also the report of Miss Margaret E. Harris, R. N.

The enrollment of the schools for the present year shows little change from a year ago. At the end of twelve weeks last year the enrollment was 78 and the average membership was 74.71. This year at the end of 12 weeks 80 pupils had been enrolled with an average membership of 77.29.

The number of Dublin pupils attending Peterborough High School shows a slight decrease from last year. Twenty-three were enrolled in September and twenty-two were in attendance for the first semester.

For the third successive year Dublin has been fortunate in having no teacher changes. When so many towns have been having numerous changes it is gratifying to have a school of this size where all the teachers have stayed through during these uncertain times.

The work of the grades in the Consolidated School has been encouraging. With a well arranged program carried out by experienced teachers good progress is being made.

The meeting of the State Teachers Association planned for October 18th and 19th was cancelled, and thus far no arrangements have been made for a county institute. It is possible that one may be held in Keene before the close of the school year.

During the present school year as was the case last year increasing attention is being given in visual education in our schools. Films suitable for all grade levels are being shown and the pupils show keen interest in this part of their school life.

Noon lunches are being carried on as in recent years. This is important in a school where so many of the pupils are transported.

During the period of reconversion that we are now entering it is imperative that our schools keep in step with educational progress—not by taking on new fads but by improving our teaching and giving our boys and girls better opportunities for advancement.

At this time I wish to express my appreciation to the school board, teachers, pupils and parents for their loyal support during the past year.
