TOWN WARRANT

(L. S.) STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Enfield, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Whitney Hall in said town of Enfield, on the eighth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose by ballot, to serve for three years, one Selectman, one Trustee of Trust Funds, one Library Trustee; to serve for one year, one Treasurer, one Clerk, one Tax Collector, one Highway Agent, one Overseer of the Poor, One Police Chief, Two Auditors and such other necessary town officers, required by law to be chosen for the ensuing year.

Polls will open at 9:30 A. M. and not close before 6:00 P. M.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, the sums so borrowed to be paid before the end of the fiscal year, in which the debt was incurred.

Article 3. To authorize the sale or lease of any or all, of such parcels of real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds for non-payment of Taxes, and to authorize the board of selectmen to execute and deliver, in the name of the Town, suitable deeds or leases of such real estate, subject to such conditions or restrictions, as may be voted by the meeting.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,683.00 (the 1948 requisition of the State Highway Department) for State Aid construction, to receive an equal amount from the State; or act thereon.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,799.00 (the 1949 requisition of the State Highway Department), for State Aid construction, to

receive the sum of \$5,598.00 from the State; or act thereon.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$856.05 for Town Road Aid, to receive \$3,424.20 from the State; or act thereon.

Article 7. Upon request of the State Forestry Department,—To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$400.00 to be used for the eradication of Blister Rust.

Article 8. To see if the Town will raise or appropriate the sum of \$100.00 as its contribution to the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association, or act thereon.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of \$1,123.97, the net earnings of the town truck during 1948, from Surplus to a special fund dedicated to the purchase of a new truck.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of \$582.08, the unexpended balance of the 1948 appropriation for the Planning Board, from Surplus to the use of the Planning Board, or act thereon. ✓

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Budget and raise or appropriate the various sums recommended and posted by the Budget Committee, or act thereon.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote, that,—If the purposes or objects, hereinafter designated, for which appropriations for the year, 1949, may have been made; have not been fully accomplished during the fiscal year; then, the funds so appropriated, or unexpended on the unfinished portion of said object, shall be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund, dedicated to the object of its conception, until such time as the Board of Selectmen, acting as agents for the town, shall have the opportunity, or occasion for the fulfillment or completion of-for the purpose or object, for which said appropriation was created.

The especially designated purposes for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1949, are as follows:

- Funds for purchase of a new truck,
- Funds for purchase of Fire Department equipment.
- Funds for sidewalk construction,
- Funds dedicated for use of the Planning Board.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Sections 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, and 13, of Chapter 441, Revised Laws of 1942; relating to Curfew Regulations.

Article 14. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Officers or Committees heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 15. To take any vote or transact any further business that may legally come before said meeting.

Report of the Librarian

The book circulation of the Enfield Library remains approximately the same as last year, about 6500 volumes, with 390 registered adult borrowers and 360 juvenile borrowers. A Branch library was again opened in Enfield Center in October 1948 under the charge of Mr. Charles Heath. Over 300 books have been added to the Library collection and special thanks is due to those residents of the town who have made the Library gifts of so many fine books during the year. A number of interesting volumes have been added to the Historical collection including a History of Lebanon, a History of Hanover, the first volume of The Masonic Casket which was printed in Enfield around 1820, and several genealogies of old families of Enfield. Exhibits of such material were on display several times and the collection has also been used by several Enfield students away at school as basic material for term papers, etc. Books and pamphlets have been borrowed from The State Library Commission, from Dartmouth College and from the Howe Library at Hanover to supplement our own. A collection of dolls in costume from many countries has been started and Mrs. Alice Follansbee has loaned a glass exhibit case for them. The Librarian would be very grateful for gifts of similar dolls and wishes to thank Mrs. Ernest Woodwell and Mrs. Harold Goodwin for their gifts of a "Santa" doll and a Scotch doll respectively. Sincere appreciation should also be given to the Library Assistants, Mrs. Tarney, Miss Eastman and Mrs. Cattabrigga for their interest and cooperation particularly in helping the younger readers. The librarian will be glad to receive suggestions with regard to book purchases or ways in which the Library can be of more service.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ENFIELD PLANNING BOARD, 1948

The Board held regular monthly meetings at Whitney Hall. During the year the Board considered and investigated several bathing beach sites, but found none of them able to meet the town's standards of accessibility, safety, health, parking facilities and future development.

It is the opinion of the Board that further action on this project be deferred until such time as the state pollution program is established, at which time nearby sites within walking distance from town could be considered and a final report made to the town.

The next project undertaken by the Board was the Boston & Maine R. R. bridge on South Street. In our efforts to correct the dangerous condition existing here, we have received definite assurance from the Chief Engineer of the railroad that his engineering department will conduct a thorough survey in the near future, and he expressed

his intention to cooperate with the town in eliminating this condition.

Plans are under way to accomplish the beautification of the town dump by recommending the planting of suitable shrubbery.

The Board has initiated a long range program to be carried on over a period of time. The information obtained is to be used as a basis for recommendation in special studies as well as for the gradual creation of a plan of development. Basic facts will involve:

1. The preparation of base maps of
 - a. Village precinct
 - b. Entire township

These base maps will show all existing roads, streams, lakes, ponds and topography. Following the preparation of the base maps, the following basic studies will be made:

2. Population distribution
 - a. The location of all the people
 - b. The location of school age children
3. Land use—designating agricultural use by indicating cropland, pasture land and woodland, and designating urban use by indicating location of residences, business and industry, and designating all recreational lands existing and potential, such as commercial recreational places, summer homes, etc.
4. Property tax map—Although this information is not essential to special studies, it will be considered as part of the long range program for the town and should be started as soon as possible.

Special studies are to be carried out as time permits. These studies will involve immediate problems confronting the town and will be made for the purpose of making immediate recommendations to town meeting. These studies will consider such problems as:

1. Fire protection
2. Extension of electrification

3. Extension or abandonment of roads
4. Water supply
5. Sewage disposal
6. New areas for residential development
7. Parks and recreation
8. Zoning study

In relation to the long range program the Board has started work on the preparation of basic maps, and is now engaged in collecting information necessary for the study of a zoning ordinance.

The Board meets on the second Tuesday of each month at Whitney Hall at 8 P.M., and would welcome the attendance and suggestions of all interested citizens of the town in order to help us make Enfield a better place in which to live.

Report of the Forest Fire Warden

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equalling at times those of 1947 when great losses

were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year have been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing cooperation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year, over 90% of all fires are caused by carelessness and that all of these man-caused fires are preventable.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen will help, as follows:

- (1) Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground is not covered with snow.
- (2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use ash trays.
- (3) Report fires and smokes to warden without delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your cooperation in this way is earnestly solicited.

SYNOPSIS OF FOREST FIRE PERMIT LAW

(Chapter 233, Revised Laws)

No person shall kindle a fire upon the land of another without permission from the owner, agent or caretaker thereof.

No person shall kindle a fire or burn any material in or near woodlands, pasture, brush, sprout, waste or cut over lands, or where the fire may be communicated to such land, except when the ground is covered with snow, without the written permission of the Forest Fire Warden or the presence of the warden or person designated to superintend such burning.

Any person, firm or corporation causing or kindling a fire without a permit, when a permit is required, **and also any person by whose negligence or the negligence of his agents any fire shall be caused**, is liable to the town for all expenses incurred in attending or extinguishing such fire.

Every person who shall set fire on any land, that shall run upon the land of another, shall pay to the owner all damages done by such fire.

When permission has been obtained from the land owner, camp or cooking fires may be kindled without permission of the Forest Fire Warden (unless such permission is required by city or town), at suitable times in suitable places where they will not endanger woodland. Upon failure to totally extinguish such

fires the parties responsible are subject to the same liabilities and penalties as are prescribed for other fires.

Penalty for kindling a fire without a permit, \$200, or imprisonment not more than thirty days.

Penalty for kindling a fire willfully, or in a careless or imprudent manner, \$500, or imprisonment not more than one year, or both.

**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT
OF SCHOOLS**

To the School Board and Citizens of Enfield:

It is a pleasure to have this opportunity to submit my first annual report as your superintendent of schools. I have enjoyed working for the town of Enfield, where the school board and parents are so interested in maintaining good schools.

The school board has a definite program of constantly improving the school plant. As you know, in previous years the classrooms were painted in light pastel colors and new fluorescent lights were installed. This year an exit was built so the lunch room could be used by outside groups. The girls of the home economics classes redecorated this lunch room and their kitchen as a special school project. Next year we plan to redecorate the hallways and the principal's office.

A serious problem of overcrowding occurred in the first grade this fall with 42 pupils in the room. This is far too many pupils for any room and particularly so for a first grade. For this reason the group was split in two and conducted in two sessions. This seemed to meet with favor with everyone except the parents of pupils who were carried to school by bus. The board had no money to carry these pupils home at noon time. However, we agreed to allow these pupils to remain for the afternoon session if the par-

ents could not come for them. Next year the same problem will probably exist and the 1949-50 budget includes money to take care of this transportation.

As mentioned in the previous paragraph the incoming classes are too large to be placed in one room. If present census figures in Enfield continue this will probably be true for some years to come. At present it is generally believed that a good class size is 25 pupils and that a maximum should be no more than 30. If these conditions prevail it will soon be necessary to have $1\frac{1}{2}$ rooms per grade instead of one room per grade as we have at the present time. A planning committee of the town has been working for some time on the problem and should have a definite report ready for the annual school meeting. These plans will also include a much needed gymnasium-auditorium for the use of all the pupils and an improved home economics and hot lunch room. Such improvements are absolutely essential to produce a modern type of education suitable to the present day needs of boys and girls. I might also mention that along with this improved building program is a need for more playground space than exists at the present time.

Sometime soon I hope it will be possible to provide the headmaster with a part-time secretary. She would post records, keep school accounts, type letters, prepare statistical reports and do other similar work. At present the headmaster, a specially trained and experienced individual, is doing these things when he should be free for the purpose of supervision, administration, planning, organizing, guidance, meeting parents and related activities. Having him do secretarial work is hardly an economical expenditure of the school's money.

There are several other phases of a modern school system which should be considered by Enfield as they gradually improve their whole program. At present we have one teacher who acts as helping teacher, remedial reading teacher, music teacher, art teacher, substitute teacher and several other things. This is more than one person can do

adequately. The beginnings of a program of guidance have been started but much more work should be done in this field. Also the program of physical education needs more teacher time than is possible under present conditions. Not to be forgotten is the ever present possibility that some time in the future it may be desirable to place in operation a public kindergarten.

For some years it has been realized that the rapidly rising costs of education cannot be entirely met by the property taxpayer. Because of this, programs of state and federal aid to education have been considered and some have been placed in effect. For the past two years Enfield has received \$14,488.12 in state aid, and will receive \$17,385.74 in the next two years if the recommendations of the State Board of Education are carried out by the current legislature. Two federal aid bills are under consideration in Congress, one for general aid and another to assist in new school building programs.

All schools are bothered by the problem of unnecessary tardiness and absence. Enfield is no exception. Pupils are often absent to go hunting, to work, to visit friends, to go shopping, to help at home and because they were out too late the night before. Pupils are tardy for other minor reasons. There is a continuity to school work which is broken up when pupils are absent. Teachers willingly assist pupils who are absent because of illness, to bridge the gap, but are somewhat reluctant to do so when other reasons are offered. Training in good habits is a definite part of the modern school program. Promptness is one of these good habits. I would sincerely appreciate the cooperation of all parents in helping us to overcome unnecessary tardiness and absence.

From actual personal experience and from studies made by my fellow superintendents, I am quite convinced that a substantial saving could be obtained by having the school district own its own school buses. One reason for this is the fact that the school district does not have to pay for gasoline taxes and registration.

Basically Enfield has an excellent school system. Through the years consolidation of all schools has been effected so that now all pupils come to one building where a more coordinated program can be evolved. This building, though old, is gradually being modernized. A fine group of teachers maintain an excellent esprit de corps and, by their willingness to work, and interest in the pupils, produce a good program. I have been amazed at the large turnouts at Parent Teacher Association meetings and the real interest shown by these people in their school. With such encouraging backing it is a real challenge to go ahead and work hard to assist you in developing better schools.

In closing I want to take this opportunity to thank the school board, teachers, parents and janitor for the splendid manner in which they have cooperated in producing the type of school that Enfield desires.

Article 7.
