

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Epsom in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Epsom on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon until six of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see what action the Town will take upon the Budget submitted by the Budget Committee.
- 3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$601.46 for the maintenance, construction or reconstruction of Class V Highways, the State to contribute \$4009.72 as provided in Chapter 83, Laws of 1951 as amended by Chapter 31, Laws of 1953.
- 4. To see what discount, if any, the Town will allow on property taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time of taking the annual inventory.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Concord Hospital to help offset an estimated operating deficit for the year 1954.

- 8. Pursuant to the provisions of the Laws as revised Chapter 292, Section 7, 1949. The following Article is submitted: Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town?
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and put a basement under the Town Hall thereby providing —rest rooms—adequate heat by central heating plant and making space to house 3 fire trucks and for such purpose vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000.00) (Put in by Petition).
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 and authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sum not exceeding \$4,000.00 for the purchase of a new Huber Grader and attachments or act in any other way relating thereto.
- 11. To transact any other business that may be legally brought before this meeting.

# REPORT OF EPSOM VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

For the year ending December 31, 1953

Following is submitted the annual report of the Epsom Volunteer Fire Department.

Total number of calls of all kinds — 58

With — 5 bad building fires

- 8 chimney fires
- 3 electrical fires
- 3 oil fires
- 3 car fires
- 12 woods fires
- 4 grass fires
- 2 dump fires
- 2 false alarms
- 4 investigations.

There were 12 regular and one special, well attended meetings held.

The June meeting was held at the Ralph E. Towle Farm, through his kind invitation.

The November meeting at I.O.O.F. Hall had its usual success, with several visitors present, including the State Fire Marshal, Aubrey Robinson.

The Dept. has purchased from their own funds a portable pump at a cost of approximately \$400.00. A semi-automatic alarm board, to blow alarms and code signals, is being constructed at practically no cost to the taxpayers. All the labor and nearly all the material being donated.

We have added to the Dept., Wet Water, Foam, Fog Nozzles, Foam Nozzles, Chimney Brushes, Extinguishers and 200 feet of hose, all things we did not have one year ago.

We, the members of the Dept., feel that we are doing everything possible to keep abreast of the times, by working together in the care and maintenance of the equipment, using what we have to the best advantage, thereby making it last.

From a rough survey of the town, there appears to be, since the Dept. started in 1933 (20 years), an additional 90 to 100 new homes. They are places 12 ft. square or more, occupied by families; including summer cottages, etc. An estimated 13 new businesses, some 15 overnight cabins and an estimated 31 places which have made additions and improvements costing \$2,000 and over, such as hen houses, etc. There have been 2 barns burned down and four new and better barns built. There have been 16 bad fires with 11 of them being restored as good or better than before.

There is an ever increasing number of electrical appliances, bottled gas tanks, bulk storage of inflammable liquids and a continuous stream of tank trucks on the highway, etc. All this increase in progress is an added responsibility of the Fire Dept.

There has been spent for improvements over and above regular maintenance during this 20 years:

#### REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

People Play a Vital Part in Our Forest Fire Problems

A review of the 1953 fire season proves the vital part people play in the never ending battle to prevent forest fires.

In this fire district there were 133 fires in 26 of the district's 30 towns; 409 acres were burned over and it cost \$9,499.97 to extinguish them. This figure was reduced somewhat through payment of fire costs by persons responsible for illegal fires, fires which escaped from control and fires caused by their carelessness. Costs were abnormally high this year due to protracted periods of dry weather which increased the difficulty of extinguishing fires.

Eighty-eight percent of the 133 fires were mancaused and could have been prevented. They tell a story which needs to be carefully studied. Some people were careless in disposing of smoking material and camp fires; others burned without the required warden permit — disregarding weather, forest conditions and the normal safeguards recognized and considered by the warden in issuing permits. Other fires resulted from children playing with matches, carelessly handled fireworks, faulty railroad and truck equipment, etc.

These fires cost a lot to extinguish, most of which could have been avoided — this affects taxes; local business was interrupted by men leaving their jobs to extinguish the fires; trees that might otherwise have built houses, repaired bridges and supplied raw materials for local industries were destroyed; seedling growth — the future timber crop was wiped out.

This picture can, however, be reversed if people who offend could be impressed with the importance of

observing the simple but essential common sense safeguards that will prevent forest fires. They are:

- 1. Care in disposing of lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches in and near woodlands.
- 2. Care in selecting camp fire sites and completely extinguishing them.
- 3. Consultation with the local forest fire warden before burning to secure the required permit.

People play a vital part in our forest fire problem. It is EVERYONE'S job to HELP PREVENT FOREST FIRES.

Above is one possible arrangement for five classrooms in 1958-59. Five classrooms could well be used from 1954 on, and would certainly be needed in 1957.

A new building of 4 classrooms and a general purpose room with size of 2 classrooms and the unpartitioned corridor, with a smaller room for the use of the nurse and other administrative purposes, together with toilet facilities, lunch kitchen, and rooms for storage and for heating equipment, would be none too large for 4 classrooms of pupils. On the other hand, by using the general purpose room, a fifth classroom could be provided for, or even a sixth (by adding temporary or permanent partitions). On the district's equalized valuation, 5% could be appropriated without exceeding the debt limit, and up to 8% on recommenda-

tion of the Board of Investigation set up by N. H. Laws of 1953, Chapter 9.

Among the advantages of such a building would be better staff organization, possibly with a teaching principal, and better facilities, including automatic heat regulation, running hot and cold water, modern plumbing, more adequate working space in the classroom, better arrangements for preparing and serving the school lunch, better lighting, and increased use by the community. Classrooms should have a minimum of 850 square feet of floor space. Many other school building features are regulated by special standards. Many schools have direct exits from the classrooms to the outside. Some have sinks and drinking fountains within the classrooms, with toilet rooms entered directly from the classroom. Such arrangements make for safety and good order. Much excellent material on school planning, financing, and construction, is contained in a small book, "Guide for Planning the Construction of School Buildings," published by the State Department of Education. The general purpose room could be used for a lunchroom, supervised play, assemblies, dramatics and visual education, and community gatherings, and when necessary for classroom purposes.

Many community groups have been active on this project during the year, including the P.T.A. and the district Planning Committee. Meetings for consideration of the subject, including one addressed by Mr. Paul E. Farnum, Director of Administration for the state department of education, have been very well attended by citizens. Considerable sentiment urging immediate action has been expressed. Several school buildings have been visited. The school board of Nottingham has been helpful in consulation.

One alternative to a new building in Epsom would be to join one or more neighboring districts in a "cooperative district" with a centralized school in Epsom or a near-by town. In a similar manner, Lee is about to become a part of Oyster River Cooperative District. Replacing Lee, the school district of Milton is about to be added to Supervisory Union No. 44.

New teachers this year are Mr. Frederick A. Johnson, Boston University College of Music, B. Mus. '51 replacing Mr. Viggiano as music supervisor, and Mr. Robert T. Andrews of Pittsfield, Montclair, N. J. Teachers College, A. B. '33, succeeding Mr. Huggins.
