

NOTICES

Please note that a description of the property which will enable the assessing officials to locate and identify each parcel is necessary. A phrase such as "Same as last year" or "no change" is not sufficient.

VETERANS should understand that it is *their responsibility* to request forms for tax exemption, and that these must be in the hands of the Selectmen by April 15th, if they are to receive consideration.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampstead in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

16. To see if the town will vote to amend Section I of Article II of the Building and Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hampstead which now reads:

“No building or structure shall be erected, or moved to a new location, and no existing structure shall be altered or repaired to an extent affecting more than 30% of the total area of the original building or structure, without first obtaining a permit duly granted by the administrative authority, to whom adequate information and plans of the proposed building structure or alteration shall be submitted.”

To be amended as recommended by the Planning Board in the following manner:

“No building or structure shall be erected, or moved to a new location, and no existing structure shall be altered or repaired to an extent affecting more than 10% of the total area of the original building or structure, without first

obtaining a permit duly granted by the administrative authority, to whom adequate information and plans for the proposed building structure or alteration shall be submitted."

17. To see if the town will vote to amend Section II of Article III of the Building and Zoning Ordinances of the Town of Hampstead which now reads:

"Every dwelling shall have a minimum floor area of 500 square feet outside measurement for each family unit. Steps or ground level terraces shall not be considered a part of the dwelling for the purpose of this section, but all porches and other similar elements, suitable for year round occupancy, shall be considered a part of the dwelling."

To be amended as recommended by the Planning Board in the following manner:

"Every dwelling shall have a minimum floor area of 750 square feet outside measurement for each family unit. Steps or ground level terraces shall not be considered a part of the dwelling for the purpose of this section, but all porches and other similar elements, suitable for year round occupancy, shall be considered a part of the dwelling."

18. To see if the town will vote to amend Section II of Article IV of the Building and Zoning Ordinances of the Town of Hampstead which now reads:

"Every dwelling shall have a minimum ground floor area of 400 square feet. Steps or ground level terraces shall not be considered a part of the dwelling for the purpose of this section, but all porches, piazzas, and other similar elements shall be considered a part of the dwelling."

To be amended as recommended by the Planning Board in the following manner:

"Every dwelling shall have a minimum ground floor area of 400 square feet. Steps or ground level terraces of the dwelling, porches, piazzas, and other similar elements shall not be considered a part of the dwelling, for the purpose of this section."

19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed Forty-Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800.00) and to approve the use of Thirty-Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.00) unexpended from the 1963 appropriation, for the purchase of a nineteen acre tract of land on Island Pond to be used as a municipal bathing beach and recreation area, the purchase to be contingent upon approval of the State Department of Health.

20. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee to investigate and make recommendations to the Selectmen for the possibility of establishing new businesses in town.

21. To see if the town will vote to accept the donation of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) made to the town by Cohen Foundation Camps, Inc.

22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to have the State Tax Commission appraise all new properties and additions in Hampstead.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The Selectmen are pleased to present this report for the year 1963 to the people of Hampstead.

The Selectmen represent the Executive branch of our form of government. Their specific duties are to see that those things requested by the March Town Meeting are carried out, to hold all departments to their budgets, to pay out of the common treasury for services rendered, and to make sure that full value is received.

We must listen to all complaints, small or large, and act upon the same. Many of them are of a personal nature, and of necessity, should not be made public.

Out meetings are held the first Saturday of each month in the office behind the High School. The meetings are called at 7:30 P.M. and are open to everyone. Much of the business is in paying bills of the previous month. No cash is handled by the Selectmen, and payments are made by the Town Treasurer only with a signed voucher from our office.

It was thought that with the State Tax Commission doing the assessing this year, our duties would be less. However, just the opposite happened. We put in many hours finding places, owners of property, and answering questions both from the assessors and property owners.

We believe that the booklet put out by the State, giving the property owners' assessed value for 1962 and 1963, has filled a long-felt need. It has certainly made for some good reading on cold winter nights.

We are as much alarmed as our neighbors at the roaring tax rates in this area, with people demanding more services and at the same time complaining about the cost.

The following should interest all of us. The State Planning Division estimates that Hampstead will have a 90% increase in population following the completion of Route 495.

It has been brought to my attention that individuals are using the Red Network telephone number to inquire as to the location of a fire. I ask you to please refrain from doing this unless an emergency exists! If you continue to use the Red Network for this purpose a very serious consequence could result.

The Board of Engineers of the Hampstead Fire Department are very grateful to the following: Dr. Alden George, for the land he so generously gave in order that we could have a water hole dug on the North Salem Road in West Hampstead; The Hampstead Civic Club for their donation of \$150.00 for firemen's helmets; and to the Volunteer Fire Association, for their donation of \$333.00 for rubber boots and duck coats.

We sincerely thank the Hampstead Police Department for their cooperation in preventing traffic to congregate at the scene of a fire.

Our appreciation and commendation goes to the Hampstead Firemen, including East and West Hampstead, for their interest and enthusiasm in serving their community.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN
AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

During the past year New Hampshire faced the greatest forest fire threat to its woodlands in more than sixty years. The continued drought brought home to our citizens, as never before, the potential threat of destructive fires to their beautiful and valuable forests, homes and livelihood. In true American tradition of meeting a common threat by volunteer effort, this fire danger was minimized by active prevention, patrol and a relinquishing of personal rights for the common good. It was the greatest demonstration of public cooperation ever experienced by those responsible for local and state fire control. The ready forces of volunteer fire services kept the losses low. For their effort and public response the general fire service expresses its heartfelt thanks for a job well done.

Prevention however, is not just an activity for the bad fire years. It must be practiced until it becomes a part of our public conscience — a habit. Just plain carelessness with fire causes too many of our fires.

The following practices and suggestions will help:

1. Always have a permit for outdoor burning and burn within the terms of the permit and in a safe place. Burn late in the afternoon when the wind is down or on rainy or damp days. Check your fire and if winds develop, extinguish it promptly.
2. Carry your rubbish to the public dump—it's safer. A neglected backyard incinerator causes many fires.
3. Never discard lighted cigarette or match. Make this a year-round habit regardless of the safety of your surroundings.
4. Children caused fires are now a major concern. Keep matches away from them and teach them to respect fire and not make it a subject of play.

Let's all join with "Smokey the Bear" and "Keep New Hampshire Green" and growing in 1964.

REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

It is with sincere pleasure that at this time I am privileged to present to you my seventh annual report as Chief of the Hampstead Police Department.

The 1964 proposed budget request remains the same amount as the prior year. We are glad to state that it is

our desire to fulfill our duties as economically as possible commensurate with efficient law enforcement. The amount of expended time compared with the monetary reimbursements to the officers of the department tends to stress beyond doubt that the desires of the Hampstead Police Department are good law enforcement, devotion to duty and at the same time providing such service with as little effect on the tax dollar as possible.

The amount of court complaints are on the increase. Officer-in-courts total 56 cases during the year with a majority of convictions. This record stresses well-prepared cases by the officers and proper presentations to the court to result in a large percentage of convictions.

We are proud to announce that one of our officers attended a two-week course in police work at the University of New Hampshire finishing with a commendable mark and also the right to wear a marksman medal as part of his uniform. Taking into consideration the fact that the majority of officers undertaking this training were either full-time officers or troopers, this officer set for himself a record we as a department as well as a town can justly be proud. This is only a small part of the training the officers of this department undergo in an ever-present task of fulfilling our obligations to the town.

For the second year your department participated in the annual Memorial Day Parade. The cooperation of the Volunteer Emergency Corps (VEC) of Plaistow makes this possible by fulfilling our traffic tasks during these exercises. The town's people can look with esteem on a group of officers that pride themselves in their devotion to duty and their personal appearance.

The amount of patrol work, especially during the summer months from Memorial Day until Labor Day, is constantly on the increase. The results can justly be determined by the lack of one major auto accident during the year. We have on record 19 minor auto accidents with little or no resulting personal injuries and property damage.

Several new radio units have been purchased by the Police Relief Association, giving us a total of six mobile units and one fixed unit. One new rifle and several pieces of lesser equipment has also been purchased. The Police Association is anxious to relieve the burden of such purchases from the town and only by continued support of the annual association functions can we continue to make such equipment procurements.

The early months of 1964 will find us with a police department telephone. We anticipate two such phones in the homes of the chief and deputy chief. We feel that this will give the people of the town an easier method of securing an officer than it is at the present using our private home phones. Such a number will be published and cards will be distributed as has been done in the past by the fire department.

Again we wish to point out a considerable amount of our annual police appropriation is expended on the delinquent licensing of dogs. It is stressed that the receipts of the town on dog licenses are offset considerably by the fact that the dog officer is forced to call on these delinquent dog owners at least two or three times. It is urged that this matter be cleared up as soon as possible. A greater portion of dog owners are reminded that they call on the town clerk annually before April 1st to procure their auto registration permits and this time could be used to great advantage to secure their dog licenses.

Our younger folks are reminded that registration permits are required for their bicycles on or before April 1st. The fee of 50 cents for this service is small and barely covers the cost of preparation of the plates. All bicycles are to be inspected by any police officer and the plate can be secured at the office of the town clerk.

A note of personal thanks goes to the officers of my department for the unselfish performance of their duties. Their willingness to answer calls on a twenty-four hour a day basis tends to bring out a sense of pride in the depart-

ment. Cooperation between the fire department and this department has resulted in a much greater efficiency in the task of fire fighting. Greater control of vehicular traffic during fire emergencies gives the fire department a more rapid access to the scene of the fire with an inevitable result of less damage, for which they so diligently strive.

Sincere appreciation is extended to the State Police, Sheriff's Department and local nearby departments. Close cooperation between this department and the Atkinson Police Department both in radio communications and investigations during the past year has been most gratifying.

Our Sub-Committee on street naming have partially completed their survey and these proposals will be presented for your consideration at Town Meeting.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Memorial Gymnasium in said district on the ninth day of March, 1964 at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees, or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

2. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.

3. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

4. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private agencies.

5. To see if the district will vote to construct and equip an addition to the Central School, to authorize the School Board to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary and proper or advisable in connection with the construction and equipping of such an addition and authorize the School Board to issue bonds or notes in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Fifty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$155,000.00) for the purpose of financing such construction.

6. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Eighteen Dollars and Seventy-Five Cents (\$2,518.75) to meet the first interest payment on the notes or bonds authorized in Article 5.

7. To see if the district will vote to construct and equip an addition to the Central School, to complete four rooms downstairs and complete the shell only for four rooms upstairs, to authorize the School Board to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary and proper or advisable in connection with the construction and equipping of such an addition and authorize the School Board to issue bonds or notes in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Seventeen Thousand Dollars (\$117,000.00) for the purpose of financing such construction.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISORY
UNION NO. 55 BOARD

New Hampshire School Districts are grouped by state statutes into some 47 Supervisory Unions, ten of which are single of "city" unions. As the name implies, these unions enable the individual Districts to enjoy as a group, supervisory advantages and functions, which they would find difficult or impossible to enjoy as individual Districts.

Our Union, No. 55, is comprised of the towns of Salem, Plaistow, Hampstead, Atkinson and Newton, with present estimated populations of 16,000, 3,200, 1,600, 1,500, and 1,600 respectively. Union No. 55 has an annual growth rate of approximately 15 per cent and is in the fastest growing area of the state. It is seventh from the top of the 47 unions in the number of teachers employed. (Five cities and one Union have more teachers.) It is fifth out of 47 in the number of pupils enrolled. (Four cities in the state enroll more students than we do.) It is eighth out of 47 in the size of the tax base. (Seven cities have greater real estate valuation than does Union No. 55.)

During the past three years, the growth has been phenomenal in all five towns. The enrollment during this time in Salem has increased over 800 students in grades 1-12, in Plaistow over 60 in grades 1-8, in Hampstead over 80 in grades 1-8, in Atkinson over 80 in grades 1-8 and in Newton over 40 in grades 1-8. The PHAN towns (Plaistow, Hampstead, Atkinson and Newton), all of whom tuition their high school students outside their district, now have 64, 23, 19 and 38 new high school students respectively, for a total 3-year increase of 144 new students. "In-district" students in the Union have increased 36 per cent, and "out-of-district tuition students have increased 42 per cent, during the three year period from September 1960 to September 1963.

Our Supervisory Union No. 55 Board is comprised of the three School Board Members from each of the member

districts. The normal business which comes before this Board consists of establishing and approving the administrative and salary budgets for the Union office and staff. This business is done in the fall of each year, before the individual district budgets are established. The PHAN towns share several educational services, such as Nurse-teacher, Special Education Class, and Music Supervision. These services, and related teaching aids and equipment are also budgeted by the PHAN portion of the Union Board. Each line item in these budgets is debated, and either approved or disapproved by a vote of the Union Board. In budget matters, each Union Board member has one vote. The school board members from your town are your representatives in all Supervisory Union Board business.

Each spring, usually in April, the Union Board holds another regular meeting. At this meeting Union Administrative personnel are elected for the following fiscal year, and their salaries are established.

At the regular board meeting in April 1963, it had become evident to most Board members that something must be done to relieve administrative congestion in the office. As a result, a meeting was held in October of the Board Chairmen from each of the individual districts, the Supervisory Union Board Chairman and the heads of the administrative staff. The key subjects discussed at the meeting by the Chairmen were:

1. Change in Administrative Staff functions.
2. Feasibility of machine accounting, for at least vendor and payroll accounting.
3. Inadequacy of present office housing.

As a result of this meeting, a job analysis was initiated of all administrative functions, present and proposed.

On November 6th, and again on November 12th, the full Union Board met to budget for the '64-'65 school year. Before the meeting temporarily adjourned on the 12th, the Union Board directed the Chairman to appoint a study

committee of three Board members to investigate feasibility of:

1. Realignment of administrative staff functions.
2. Acquisition of some basic machine accounting equipment.

Mr. Perri, of Atkinson, Mr. Schmidlin of Salem and Mr. Swasey of Newton were appointed to serve on the study committee. The Board directed that they report back to the full Board in January 1964.

At the November 12th meeting, the Board authorized acquisition of larger administrative quarters. As a result some 2,200 sq. ft. of new space will be available for occupancy on July 1st, 1964. This doubles the office space with a rental increase from \$150 per month to \$265 per month.

On November 26th, the PHAN portion of the Union Board met for a third budget session, involving those items relating to the four PHAN districts.

In January, the study committee reported. Their report was excellent, and well presented by their chairman, Mr. Perri. Their unanimous recommendations were as follows:

1. Installation of a basic IBM system, to alleviate the severe load in the area of statistics and financial accounting.
2. Establishment of a position of Assistant Superintendent of Operations, and to budget \$8,500 for this position. A request to the State Board of Education for approval, should establish state support, to the extent of \$2,500 of the \$8,500, leaving a net cost to the Union of \$6,000.
3. Request a change in title of Teacher Consultant to that of Assistant Superintendent of Instruction.
4. Appoint a committee of the five individual district chairmen, to meet on call of the Superintendent to interview and select not more than three candidates for

the position of Assistant Superintendent of Operations. The candidates selected by the screening committee shall be interviewed and one of them elected, by the full Board, at a date to be set later.

5. Appoint a committee to report recommendations at the regular April meeting on a proposed salary schedule, sick-leave allowances, absence provisions, and any other fringe benefits for Supervisory Union Administrative and office personnel.

These recommendations were adopted by the Union Board except the title change of Teacher Consultant to Assistant Superintendent of Instruction was tabled. The Board stressed that the Teacher Consultant position shall hold the same level of responsibility as that of the new position of Assistant Superintendent of Operations, and further, that it is their intent that this recommendation should be taken from the table at a future meeting upon the recommendation of the Superintendent of Schools. The Union Board Chairman was instructed to appoint a salary study committee. The appointments made by the chairman were: John Wood of Plaistow, Chairman, William Letoile, Jr., of Hampstead and Mrs. Lucile deBesche of Atkinson.

It is hoped that through the reading of this report, each citizen of all Districts in Union No. 55 will obtain a better understanding of the New Hampshire Schools' supervisory structure, and in particular, the underlying reasons which have necessitated the budgeting action taken during the 20 to 30 hours of effort expended by your Union No. 55 Board. The gains we are striving for, by our actions, can only result in greater efficiency, more service, a better informed public, and the resulting better education for all of our children.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Hampstead:

I am presenting herewith my Eighth Annual Report as Superintendent of Schools in Hampstead. Reports from the Principal and Supervisors will discuss more in detail the activities of the school. Statistical reports are listed separately.

Personnel

Richard Gray, a graduate of Northeastern University with a Master's Degree in Education, is the new Principal of the Central School. He has taught and been the assistant principal in Seabrook, N.H. as well as teaching principal in Hampton Falls, N.H.

Five teachers joined the Central School staff this current year. They were: Carol Dispenza, grade 2, a graduate of Lowell Teachers College with experience in Haverhill, Mass. and Munich, Germany; Floreen Maroncelli, grade 2, a grad-

uate of Keene Teachers College; Margaret Roehrig, grade 3, a graduate of Keene Teachers College; Mrs. Norma Nelson, grade 4, a graduate of Keene Teachers College with teaching experience in Glastonbury, Conn.; Harry Price, grades 7 and 8, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College.

All teachers have continued membership in local, state and national professional organizations.

It is true that teachers' salaries have increased during the past few years in Hampstead. However, it is also true that teachers' salaries and all salaries have increased noticeably in other communities. We must accept the fact that for the present they will continue to increase. At least if we wish to compete with other school districts for qualified teachers, we will have no other choice but to pay more. There is still an acute shortage of teachers. I believe that the people of Hampstead wish to continue to provide a better education for their children. If the salaries are not attractive the poorer teachers will apply in this area.

Curriculum

The reports of our various supervisors on the following pages gives you some idea of what is being accomplished in our school system. We are proud of what is being done. Our achievement test results bear out this thinking. We have attempted and have been successful, due to the foresightedness of our School Boards, in keeping our class sizes to a minimum. The children have received more individual instruction and consequently the results are better.

Our graduates, who have gone on to secondary schools, are doing well. This speaks well for the fundamentals that they have received. We still do not provide a full curriculum for the seventh and eighth graders in the areas of home economics and industrial arts but for the present I see no immediate solution.

We wish to continue helping children with their speech problems. Speech therapy was supported this year through

public donations. It is recommended that the school district absorb this cost.

The School District takes advantage of funds provided by the Federal Government under the National Defense Education Act for special projects in mathematics and science.

Housing

Our elementary school enrollment continues to rise. Projections up to 1969-70 predict a need for sixteen elementary classrooms. We will need one or two new classrooms for 1964-65 depending on the size of grade 5. We must have an extra third grade.

In order to keep our former cafeteria free for television instruction, music and any other activities needed, we can partition either the second floor room in the high school or use the old home economics room in the high school for eighth grade classes, or do both if needed and thus manage for next year. However, our enrollment projections show that additional rooms are needed and the Building Committee will propose an addition to the Central School. We must be prepared and should build a school large enough to handle the next few years.

Credit should be given to our custodian for the work that is done to keep our buildings well maintained.

Support Quality Education

We have asked in the past to have you support quality education. What is quality education?

When we speak of quality education we mean **qualified teachers** in uncrowded classrooms, with the books, supplies and equipment they need to do a good job.

We mean **supervisory and special help** for teachers in these days of changing and expanding knowledge, so that they will continue to grow in their teaching skills and keep up-to-date in their knowledge of subject matter.

We mean a **curriculum** which is constantly being improved.

We mean **guidance services** that help parents and children to find what is suited to the child's needs and abilities, so that he may progress toward a useful, satisfying life.

We mean **administrators** who are competent and up-to-date in their knowledge and who are leaders.

We mean **maintenance** which assures cleanliness and safety which protects your investment.

We mean **informed citizens** who understand the importance of good education to their children, their community and their country.

Warning to Parents

Do you know that school dropouts have twice as high a rate of unemployment as high school graduates?

Do you know that early marriage seems to be related to the high dropout rate for women?

Do you know that frequent absences and truancies lead to early dropouts?

Encourage your children to stay in high school and keep regular attendance.

Appreciations

Appreciation is expressed for the continued support and cooperation of the Parent-Teachers Association, the Civic Club and all other organizations.

I wish to thank the School Board, Teacher Consultant, Principal, teachers and children for their cooperation in working at all times for a better educational program.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

To the School Board, Superintendent of Schools, and citizens of Hampstead:

It is with a great deal of pleasure that I submit my first annual report as Supervising Principal of the Hampstead Central School.

In the fall of 1963, several changes and additions were noted. The high school building was reopened to house grades seven and eight. A considerable amount of work was done to prepare the two large rooms for classroom use. Our junior high classes use a partially departmentalized program.

During the '62-'63 school year the Hampstead Central School was represented by both a basketball team and a baseball team in a league made up from surrounding towns.

A Science Fair was held on April 8, 1963, in the Central School. Prizes were awarded to the following pupils:

- First place — William Blaine — Transistors
- Second place — Elizabeth Webster — Water cycle
- Third place — David Lamb — Steam turbine

The following class trips were taken as enrichment activities in relation to subject matter developed in the classrooms:

- Grade 1 — Benson's Wild Animal Farm
- Grade 2 — Benson's Wild Animal Farm
- Grade 3 — Lawrence Airport and The Haverhill Gazette
- Grade 4 — Salem, Massachusetts
- Grade 5 — Salem, Massachusetts
- Grade 6-7-8 — Museum of Fine Arts, Glennies Dairy, Lexington and Concord, Massachusetts
- Grade 8 — Class Outing — Old Orchard Beach

All trips were under the supervision of teachers and parents.

Graduation exercises were held for twenty-seven eighth grade pupils on Monday evening, June 17, 1963, at the Hampstead Congregational Church. The theme of the graduation was "Selecting a Career." The following awards were given:

Scholastic achievement — Frank Smith, Jr.

Citizenship — Elizabeth Webster

Science — Frank Smith, Jr.

Safety patrol — Stephanie Lowes

A low voltage inter-com system was installed to provide communication between the two school buildings.

In the area of curriculum, the most noteworthy change has been the addition of modern mathematics to the programs in grades one, two, three, and five. Supervisory Union No. 55 is now in the process of evaluating a number of new mathematics programs. When a final decision is reached, the program selected will be used in all of the school districts in the union.

During the month of October, health examinations were given to pupils of grades 1, 3, 5, 7, and new pupils. These exams were given by Dr. Raymond E. Moore, and Dr. William Hart, assisted by Mrs. Gwendolyn Banks and Mrs. Wanda Scholl, school nurse-teachers. In addition, sight and hearing tests were given by the nurse-teachers to all pupils during the month of December.

In the area of testing, readiness tests and mental ability tests were given to pupils of grade one in September. Mental ability tests were also given to pupils of grades 2, 4, 6, and all new pupils. During October, achievement tests were administered to pupils of grades 2-8, and pupils new to the system.

The annual New England reading conference was held at Bretton Woods on September 29, 30, and October 1, 1963. Attending from the Hampstead Central School were Mrs. Charlotte Zimmer, Mrs. Sandra Jameson, and Mr. Richard Grey.

National Education Week was observed during the week of November 11-15, 1963. A night session program was held on Tuesday, November 12, 1963, with a large number of parents in attendance. Open house was held during the day on Wednesday and Thursday of the same week.

The Book Fair was also held during the week of November 11-15, 1963.

The school library was reorganized by a group of parents at the beginning of the year and is now functioning with mothers of Central School children acting as librarians. Our thanks go to these women for their fine work.

In addition, several families have donated books to our library which is greatly appreciated. Also, the Hampstead P.T.A. has very kindly donated funds for library books. A sincere thank you to all who have helped our library to improve and grow.

A speech clinic has been developed under the direction of Mr. Seth O'Shea, teacher consultant, for the towns in Union No. 55. Children from Hampstead in need of treatment receive the benefits of this clinic.

Again this year the Central School will participate in the annual national spelling bee sponsored by the Manchester Union Leader. The schedule is as follows: January - March 1, School Champion selections; March 21 - April 12, Regional winners chosen; May 3 - State Championship finals; May 31 - June 6, National Spelling Bee Week; June 3, Opening Rounds National Contest; June 4, National Championship Finals.

REPORT OF SPECIAL EDUCATION CLASS

To the Superintendent of Schools and the School Boards of
Plastow, Hampstead, Atkinson and Newton:

I hereby submit my fourth annual report as teacher of the PHAN Special Class.

The Special Class is located for the second year in Atkinson Academy where we have a light, well ventilated room conducive to good physical health.

At present there are 13 pupils in the class whose September ages ranged from 7 to 15. There are 6 girls and 7

boys in the class with 2 girls and 3 boys in the 7 to 11 age group and 4 girls and 4 boys in the 12 to 15 age range. We have 2 pupils from Plaistow, 1 from Hampstead, 5 from Atkinson, and 5 from Newton. This year the pupils from Plaistow, Hampstead and Newton are transported directly from their homes to the Academy and returned to their homes, which is a more satisfactory arrangement than being left at the various schools.

This year's class presents a vast difference in mental development and ability as well as age, making it necessary to have six reading groups and 5 arithmetic groups so less time can be devoted to social studies and science than previous years. In these areas our emphasis is on preparation for daily living.

Handwriting lessons are held almost every day to develop this necessary communication skill and to help those with poor motor control.

We do not have an opportunity to take advantage of educational television programs this year because of conflict in program with the available television set. We hope to have a set of our own next year to again use this medium of modern education which is so beneficial to the retarded, who often grasp more by seeing and hearing at the same time.

Our health lessons of necessity emphasize personal hygiene and the care of our bodies.

Mr. Williams, our music supervisor, spends one-half hour with us every other week and two of our older girls are members of the seventh and eighth grade chorus.

Each day we spend time on our arts and crafts program, developing skills which may contribute to the ability to earn a living. New craft projects this year have been the use of plaster of paris in the making of plaques which are painted and presented as gifts to the parents. Oval and round baskets were made of natural reed. We made styrofoam of our own and moulded star, bell and ball shapes which were

decorated with glitter and sequins for our Christmas tree and later to adorn the trees at home.

It is the task of the special class teacher to build confidence in the pupils—some of whom have spent several years in regular classes and known nothing but failure. Work has to be simple enough at first to give confidence in ability and then work to develop the individual as far as possible at his own pace. The special class is not a remedial class; it is not designed to force growth in academic skills, but to enable the retarded child to get enough out of the usual academic skills to lead a happy and effective life. A child has to learn his own limitations and assets in order to avoid continual frustration. He needs the opportunity to grow in emotional areas besides developing academic and motor skills and vocational training.

The special class teacher, with the help of test results, diagnoses the need of each child and deals with the individual accordingly.

Special class teachers in New Hampshire are required to complete a minimum of 12 units of study beyond a Bachelor's Degree dealing specifically with the mentally retarded and the work of the special class teacher. The courses I took this summer gave me an opportunity to meet other special class teachers and discuss our mutual problems. Our special class, in spite of the vast age range, compares very favorably with the others in the state.

I hope to develop a more extensive manual training and home economics program, especially for the older pupils, when facilities are available.

I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the entire staff of Atkinson Academy for their splendid cooperation and understanding these two years in Atkinson and many thanks to the Union staff for their continued guidance and support.

REPORT OF THE REMEDIAL READING TEACHER

This report marks the fifth year of Remedial Reading in Central School. For the most part results have been very good. The annual Stanford Achievement tests show that the Junior High pupils, today, are better readers — and more avid — than the Junior High pupils were five years ago. A possible explanation is that poor readers of today's Junior High group are few, because they were given help in the second, third or fourth grades, when the difficulty presented itself. Our program is built on that theory.

When a child's achievement in reading remains low, even though tests show that his potential is high, usually that child needs help from the Remedial Reading teacher. Upon careful study of the child's records, it has often been found that the following reasons are responsible for his not being able to reach his potential: — namely,

1. Prolonged illness causing a long absence has made him lose the presentation of many vital reading skills.
2. Moving from one part of the country to another causes frustration due to different methods.
3. Leaving first grade without the proper foundation of sight words and skills.

In a small, relaxed reading group of four pupils, the teacher works with the child, stressing the skills with which he is having trouble. When good results are forthcoming, he is tested, to prove that the improvement has brought him up to grade level. If so — and when — he is released from remedial classes, another child who needs help, comes to take his place.

This past year, forty-eight pupils from grades 2-5 came to me for remedial reading. In September and October the Lyons Carnahan tests and also the Stanford Achievement tests were given to determine in which reading skills, de-

ficiencies occurred. Results showed that all children scored low in phonetic analysis. Other areas needing help were structural analysis; dictionary skills; and emotional reactions, in that order. Then work in these skills was stressed. Oral reading lessons, at least twice a week, helped to show if difficulties were being cleared up. Special attention had been given to word attack skills which I hoped would carry over when the pupils met new words in oral reading. For Basal Readers, I use: 1. Ginn & Company Grades 1-6 complete. 2. Reader's Digest Skill Builders Grades 1-6.

Classes in Remedial Reading began the last week in September. Groups of 4 or 5 children came to me, every day, for a period of twenty minutes. Better results might have occurred if I had been able to have had classes for thirty minutes. That was impossible because I also taught seventh and eighth grade regular reading classes for two hours every day.

In January, Durrell-Sullivan Reading tests, and Lyons Carnahan tests, were given to determine progress. Eight children had reached their grade level and were released from remedial classes. Of the forty remaining pupils, all showed a gain of from two to seven months.

The May tests given were the Iowa Silent Reading tests, and Durrell-Sullivan Reading Tests. The marks of all forty-eight children showed that about one-half of the class had made a gain of one year or more. Thirty-nine percent of the students reached grade level.

I discovered many changes had taken place in these children, after they began to see that they could read. Parents told me that the greatest change for which they were grateful, was that children were reading many books at home. Before, it was often impossible to get a child to read just one book. Report cards, in many instances, showed better marks in reading. Teachers volunteered the information that the content subjects, too, were showing improvement as the children began to "love to read."

It is a well known fact that children become proficient pianists by constant practice. In like manner, children become better readers by reading — and reading — and reading. To help them, it would be an ideal situation if each child always had a library book of his own choosing, in his desk. Upon completion of an assignment the child could read. Our school library is in its infancy, with a pitifully small number of books. To boost that number, I sponsored two Book Fairs this year. The net gain was \$62.00. 25 books, for different grade levels were purchased.

I am deeply interested and very happy in my work as Remedial Reading teacher. Every day has its special interest. To the faculty goes my sincere appreciation for their fine cooperation. Together, we try to see that the children get the right help at the right time — so that for the rest of their lives they may be able to enjoy reading.

Audio-visual program and Health Talks in classrooms at teacher's request are part of the nurses's work. These are on Nutrition, Posture, Pronated feet, Personal Hygiene, Cleanliness in classrooms, corridors and lavatories — drinking fountain, etc.

Pre-school registration, clinics, Parent, Teacher and Principal and Nurse conferences also Principal and Nurse and Teacher and Nurse conferences.

Nurse-teachers are in Hampstead on Thursday—Mrs. Banks, Mrs. Scholl Tuesday mornings. They can be reached through the Superintendent's office other days in emergencies.

It would be most helpful if parents would report to school any sickness or reason for absence of a child. Report to the school and the nurse all contagious and communicable diseases. It is noted that some dentists do not believe in corrections of first teeth; however, notices to the parents of defects found on the Health and/or Medical Examinations are to acquaint the parent with what the doctor or nurse have found and not in any way a complaint. It is to help the children. Noted also is the belief that corrections for posture and postural difficulties and flat and pronated feet are best done by exercises.

REPORT OF THE MUSIC SUPERVISOR

As music supervisor in the Town of Hampstead, I submit the annual report for the year 1963.

During the four years as music supervisor, in the Town of Hampstead, it has been my responsibility to provide an education in music to meet the needs and abilities of all students. Every child has been given several opportunities to express himself musically through one or more of the five basic activities: Singing—playing—creating—rhythmic—listening. Classroom teachers have greatly aided in enthusiastic follow-up of this five-fold program of music education, thus strengthening the entire system.

A music festival was held in Salem, N.H. on May 4, 1963 in which approximately 600 students participated. New

Hampshire school organizations from Pembroke, Raymond, Deerfield, Candia, Plaistow, Atkinson, Newton and Salem, as well as Hampstead, were in attendance. The program included selections for chorus as well as band.

The culminating activity for the junior high chorus was a trip to Boston for an evening at the Pop's Concert at Symphony Hall.

All grades were active in preparing a Memorial Day observance. The program was held outside in front of the school.

A Christmas program was held on Friday, December 20th in the Hampstead gymnasium. Parents were invited and all students participated.

Besides the many performing areas in which music is cultivated, continued emphasis was and still is being developed in the classes in order to integrate the music program with other areas of the school, home and community life.

In closing I would like to thank Mr. Davis, teacher-consultant, School Committee, and the teachers, for the progress which has been made in music education during the past year.
