**TOWN WARRANT**  
**THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

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To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hebron, in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Hebron Community Hall on Tuesday, the tenth of March next at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriations of same.

3. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to maintain the Police Department.

4. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to maintain the Volunteer Fire Department.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Blister Rust Control for the ensuing year. The State requests \$400.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for payment of premiums on insurance on Town Buildings, Workmen's Compensation, Bonds for Town Officers and Trustees of Trust Funds and for a Money and Security Policy if still wanted.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for maintenance of the Town Dump.

8 To raise and appropriate money for the maintenance of Town Roads and Bridges.

- a. Summer Maintenance
- b. Winter Maintenance

Note: The Town is required to raise and appro-



priate not less than one-quarter of one percent of assessed valuation of taxable property; but the Town is not required to raise more than fifty dollars per mile for this purpose. (Laws of 1945—Ch. 188).

9. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Street lighting.

10. To see if the Town will accept Class V Highway Aid and raise and appropriate \$154.00 as our contribution. (Last year the State's contribution amounted to \$1,025.51).

11. To see what sum the Town will raise and appropriate for the Village Library. The Trustees request \$250.00, which includes an increase in salary for the Librarian of \$50.00.

12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$200.00 for Old Age Assistance.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Memorial and Old Home Days.

14. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for maintenance of the Town Common.

15. To see if the Town wishes to raise and appropriate a sum of money over and above the carry-over of \$238.70 for maintenance of the Village Cemeteries.

16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$65.00 to be paid to the Newfound Region Chamber of Commerce for publicity.

17. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$400.00 to be added to the carry-over of \$300.00 for the purchase of a road machine.

18. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

19. To see if the Town will vote to give two percent cash discount on taxes if paid ten days from date of tax bill.

20. To see what action the Town wishes to take in the matter of the Hebron Memorial Chapel and to

raise and appropriate a sum of money for legal work should the Town authorize the Selectmen to take steps for the modification or removal of deed restrictions that prevent the Town from spending money for the maintenance of the Building.

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Other articles may be added before the Warrant is posted.

## REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

---

The Fire Department was called upon four times during the year, with only one of the calls demanding any actual fire fighting. That was the burning of a car in Groton. The response of the men in each instance has been encouraging; and the adequacy of the equipment at the Groton fire gives us hope. The amount of equipment and especially the items which will increase the safety of the men have improved the Department. We still need more men who will be in town during the day who will receive training in the operation of the pumps.

The one great lack has been a proper alarm system, but in the budget for 1953 is an item for that. This year, too, should see the completion of construction of the tank truck.

Time and available water are our two major problems. The alarm system is to remedy the former; if property owners can give some thought to water holes where possible, it would help the latter.

But a fire which is prevented is better than one which has been fought. So we urge that you take every precaution to remove fire hazards in and about your buildings. Check wiring, remove rubbish, keep grass and bushes around buildings cut, watch out for oily rags, have an extinguisher handy, protect open flames.

Do not hesitate to call the Department out, even though it may not eventually be needed. Time is important.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

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Now that there is a lull in material gains in the form of buildings it might be well for us to take "time out," catch our breath for a second, and review what we believe are the basic aims of education in Supervisory Union No. 4, what has been done, and what might be done. We should preface this by saying that there is wide disagreement in the basic educational philosophies of those engaged in education and real differences in operating methods. Rather than be alarmed about this we should consider it a very wholesome occurrence for when people cease to disagree intelligently democracy disappears. The preservation of democracy and all its signifies is a primary aim of our education. We must watch attempts under the guise of democracy to ferment unreasonable differences of opinion in order that subversive elements may assume command once these differences have so weakened our morale that internal conquest becomes easy. There are many ways of doing this.

We spend most of our efforts in this school union teaching fundamentals in the tool subjects in elementary grades with much emphasis on reading skills. In spite of contrary opinion we go on record as saying that we are doing a good job as a whole, and we have many excellent results. Every year some nationally standardized achievement tests are given, the Metropolitan last year. In only one subject taking the nine towns together did we have an average score below national standards. That was 5th grade spelling with .2 of a year below, largely due to one very poor grade in a small school. Our average in reading was .2 to a full grade above with some individual grades being two to three grades above. To cite more would serve little purpose but to summarize let us say we know where we stand and others guess about it. Furthermore we take conscious steps to improve the weak spots.

Teaching fundamentals and tool subjects is, however, only one aim of education whose real object is to teach the individual to live a better life in the world



of today and tomorrow. It is when we get into this problem that we get into serious differences. How should we teach democratic living? Let the pupils run the school? Some might say "Yes, to a large degree." I happen to say "No." This illustrates the point I believe. Hitting at this type of thing from another angle we may raise the question: "How much individual help does the child receive in school?" We all believe this to be important today. Can we do it with a first grade of 40 babies? Should we teach pupils to work and play together? Most people would say yes but might not agree that square dancing is a good method. "Should a child be given aid to like good music and art." Yes would be given most of the time. How well can this be done without teachers skilled in teaching appreciation of fine things, in part by actual participation? "Should religion be taught in school?" will start a mental massacre among otherwise intelligent people.

Certain it is that much Christian living can be, and is being, taught by teachers everyday without teaching any creed. This could go on forever but let's end this by asking ourselves how well are we doing in teaching each individual child all he can absorb in all things he may need as a good citizen living an enriched life in a world where a boy may be required to swap deer hunting in the hills of New Hampshire for a different quarry in hills on the other side of the world. Is the education of the rural school of 50 years ago and the high school curriculum of that time, "More Latin and less Greek," good enough or is the type of education of previous generations to be held responsible for the problems facing the children of today?

Only two of my nine towns have the services of a music supervisor, none has an art instructor, only one has expert handwriting supervision, none has a kindergarten, none has a physical education instructor, and none has a specialist in remedial reading. There is no thought of complaint in the above statement but rather proof of the fact that we are offering barely the most minimum education possible. I believe the

pupils, your children, could profit by some of these which will be found in really modern schools where the cost of education is not borne completely—practically speaking—by the property tax.

There is \$248.72 left from the sale of the East Hebron School after painting the Village School. We would like to apply this plus \$100 more to the purchase of new pupils' desks and one teacher's desk and chairs. Accordingly a special article appears in the warrant for this purpose. Hebron people should feel very proud of their school. New furniture would add a pleasing effect as well as serving useful and needed purposes.
