TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hillsborough, County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Hillsboro-Deering High School Auditorium in said Town on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon. Election of officers and balloting on Article 2 will take place between ten o'clock in the forenoon and six o'clock in the afternoon. Articles 3 through 21 will be taken up at 7:30 p.m.

Article 1. To choose one Selectman for three years; Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Highway Agent, Town Clerk for one year; Trustee of the Fuller Public Library for three years; Trustee of Trust Funds for three years; and all other necessary Town officers or agents for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt Chapter 406, of the Session Laws of the State of New Hampshire, 1963, providing for the dissolution of the Hillsborough Bridge Village Fire Precinct and the creation of a Fire Department of the Town of Hillsborough and a Water Department of the Town of Hillsborough, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 3. To hear the reports of the town officers to the Auditors, the reports of the Auditors, Agents, Committees or other town officers heretofore chosen or appointed and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' salaries, Town Officers' expenses, Town Building, appropriations for Street Lights, and all current expenses of the town. — Sponsored by the Selectmen.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-one Thousand, Thirty-five Dollars and Seventy-five Cents (\$41,035.75) for the building and repairing of highways, bridges, culverts and sidewalks. - Sponsored by the Selectmen and Highway Agent.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to be applied to the Capital Reserve Fund for the future purchase of Highway Equipment. — Sponsored by the Selectmen and the Highway Agent.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the

Board of Selectmen to sell and convey by deed, under such conditions and to such persons as the Board may consider proper, the title to real estate taken by the Town in default or redemption from tax sale. — Sponsored by the Selectmen.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to instruct and empower the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the Town and in anticipation of taxes. — Sponsored by the Selectmen.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) for the purpose of purchasing, or acquiring options to purchase, land within the Loon Lake water shed, for the purpose of preserving the same, upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen may determine, or take any action thereto. - Sponsored by the Zoning Commission.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Ordinance Regulating Trailer or Mobile Home Parks of March 8, 1966, Section 5. PERMANENT USE - by adding thereto, "Subsection A. Permanent use shall consist of the location of a travel trailer or mobile home in Hillsborough for an excess of fifteen (15) days." - Sponsored by the Zoning Commission.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Five Hundred Twenty-five Dollars (\$5,525.00) for the purpose of purchasing a Truck for the Highway Department, or take any action relating thereto. - Sponsored by the Selectmen and Highway Agent.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand, Nine Hundred Dollars (\$2,900.00) to be applied upon the account of the Hillsboro District Nursing Association. - Sponsored by the Selectmen.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900.00) to aid Concord Hospital in Concord, New Hampshire. - Sponsored by the Selectmen.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) for operating a recreation program for children. — Sponsored by the Selectmen.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a street to be named Blair Avenue, a certain parcel of land described in a deed of Benjamin E. and Marjorie A. Farr

to the Town of Hillsborough dated April 13, 1967, or take any action thereto. - Sponsored by the Selectmen.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Subdivision Regulations of the Town of Hillsborough as adopted at Special Meeting, held December 6, 1966, as follows:

A. Amend Section IIB, by striking out of the first sentence thereof, "and requiring: (1) the extension of municipal utilities, or (2) the creation of one or more new streets, public or private, or (3) the extension of existing streets:" and the last sentence thereof: "It shall not include a division of land where each resulting parcel fronts on a public street previously accepted or taken by the town." So that said section shall read as follows:

"B. SUBDIVISION shall mean the division of a tract or parcel of land into two or more lots for the purpose, whether immediate or future, of sale or building development, provided, however, that development for agricultural purposes is expressly excluded. When appropriate to the context of these regulations, the term subdivision shall relate either to the process of subdividing or to the land or area subdivided."

B. Amend Section IV by adding thereto the following paragraphs:

"G. LOTS: Lot size, width, depth, shape and orientations shall be appropriate for the location of the subdivision and for the type of development and use contemplated. Residential lots with Town Sewage shall be not less than 15,000 square feet in area. Residential lots served by on-site sewage disposal systems shall not be less than 30,000 square feet in area. Residential Lots fronting on Public water shall be not less than 100 feet wide nor less than 15,000 square feet in area. Lots for commercial and industrial purposes shall be at least 40,000 square feet where there is no public sewer, and shall include adequate area for off-street service and parking facilities required by the type of use and development contemplated."

"H. Lots shall be laid out and graded to eliminate flood or stagnant water pools. No water shall be permitted to run across a street on the surface but shall be directed into catch basins and piped underground in a pipe of not less than 12 inches in diameter."

"I. All buildings in any subdivision shall be located not closer than 30 feet from any street right-of-way line, and not closer than 15 feet from any lot line."

"J. Before approval of a subdivision by the Planning

Board, it may at its discretion require that there shall be filed a bond by the sub-divider in an amount sufficient to cover the cost of the preparation of the streets and the extension of public water and sewer lines if available. This bond shall be approved as to form and sureties by the legal counsel of the Town of Hillsborough, and conditioned on the completion of such improvements within a period specified by the Planning Board and expressed in the bond."

C. Amend Section VIB, by adding thereto subsection 3 as follows:

"3. Where required, that the said subdivision has been approved by the State of New Hampshire, Commission on Water Supply and Pollution Control."

D. By adding a new Section VIII, as follows:

"Section VIII, SMALL SUBDIVISIONS

A. Where a proposed subdivision is of such small size (less than four lots) as to present no engineering problems (and requires not streets to be created, extended or widened; proposed utilities are individual on-lot systems) and few, if any, planning problems (no parks or other public facilities are required) the Board may waive the filing of the preliminary plat and may require only, a general drawing or a final plat. The Board may also approve the final plat at the time of initial Planning Board hearing."

E. By adding a new Section IX as follows:

A. Whoever, being the owner or agent of the owner of any land located within a subdivision, transfers or sells any land by reference to, or exhibition of, or by other use of, a plat or subdivision, before such plat has been approved by the Planning Board and recorded or filed in the office of the appropriate Register of Deeds, shall forfeit and pay a penalty of one hundred dollars for each lot or parcel so transferred or sold; and the description by metes and bounds in the instrument of transfer or other documents used in the process of selling or transferring shall not exempt the transaction from such penalties. The Town, through its solicitor or other official designated by its Selectmen, may enjoin such transfer or sale or agreement and may recover the said penalty by civil action.

B. Any building erected, constructed, altered, or reconstructed in violation of any of these regulations, shall be deemed an unlawful structure, and the building inspector or other administrative officer, charged with enforcement of the regulations, or the solicitor of the Town, may bring action to enjoin such erection, construction, alteration, or

reconstruction, or cause such structure to be vacated or removed, or both. It shall be unlawful to erect, construct, alter, or reconstruct any building or structure or part thereof in violation of these regulations. In case any building or structure or part thereof is, or is proposed to be erected, constructed, altered, or reconstructed, or any land is, or is proposed to be used in violation hereof, the administrative official charged with the issuance of building permits, or the solicitor of the Town, or the owner of any adjacent or neighboring property who would be specially damaged by such violation, may, in addition to other remedies provided by law, institute injunction mandamus, abatement, or other appropriate action or proceeding to prevent or enjoin or abate or remove such unlawful erection, construction, alteration, or reconstruction."

Or take any other action relating thereto. - Sponsored by the Planning Board.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Eight Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$1,850.00) for the purpose of purchasing a Police Cruiser for the Police Department, or take any action relating thereto. - Sponsored by the Selectmen and the Chief of Police.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to file in behalf of the inhabitants of the Town, an application in form and manner required by the United States Government, and in conformity with P. L. 560, 83rd Congress as amended, and do whatever else may be required to obtain an advance, in the amount of Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$80,000.00) to be made by the United States to the Town of Hillsborough to aid in defraying the cost of final plans and specifications for the construction of sewage and waste collection and treatment facilities, and, further, to see if the Town will make the necessary arrangements to provide such additional funds as may be required to defray the cost of final plans and specifications. - Sponsored by the Selectmen.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) for the reconstruction of Cross Street, Preston Street to Depot Street, John Street, and Maple Street. - Sponsored by the Selectmen.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Dollars (\$800.00) for

the support of Band Concerts for the coming season. - Sponsored by the Selectmen.

Article 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Included in the annual reports for 1967 are reports of the Planning Board, Zoning Study Committee, and Conservation Commission, all of which merit careful study as to their comments and recommendations. The Zoning Study Committee has completed much of the basic studies preliminary to a final report, and has requested continuance for another year, by which time we should expect a final report on their conclusions and recommendations.

The reappraisal of all property in the Town of Hillsborough, by the State Tax Commission, is now under way, and will be carried on during the next several months. The men assigned to Hillsborough are experienced, and are highly recommended. We hope that our property owners will provide every assistance in enabling them to complete the task, so that we may achieve a well developed base for our future tax structure.

As the result of our long term efforts, the "Old Grammar School" lot is now an attractively developed center for some of our Town activities, with the Post Office completed and landscaped, and a well arranged Town parking area available at all times.

Action last June resulted in approval of the construction of our much needed Fire and Police Station, and progress towards completion of the building is now well along, with the expected finishing date still May 1. We have every expectation that the completed cost will be within our appropriation, and that we will have a building of which the Town may well be proud.

With the Town's assumption of the responsibility for the Fire and Police Station, the need for continued separation of the Town and Precinct functions is further reduced, and your Selectmen, together with the Fire Commissioners and Water Commissioners, are recommending the adoption of Article 2 in this year's warrant, which permits the merger of these Town functions, and the establishment of a Town Fire Department and Town Water Department.

Elsewhere in this report (Page 61) is the summary and recommendations of Anderson Nichols in connection with the sewage treatment plant, and extension of the sewer system in Hillsborough, all as needed in the elimination of the pollution of the Contoocook River. The river has been classified, and the eventual compliance is probably not more than 4 or 5 years away. The cost is such that Hillsborough cannot do the job alone without Federal and State Financial

assistance.

At the present time, the immediate availability of such assistance is doubtful. However, we feel that the program must eventually be completed; that complete plans and specifications should be prepared, and proper applications for all available funds be made now, so that when funds do become available, we shall be near the top of the list of those to whom allocation of funds will be made. For this reason, we recommend the additional interest free loan be obtained at this time.

Continuing our program of rebuilding streets, the Highway Department plans to reconstruct Cross Street, John Street, Maple Street, and Preston Street as far as Depot Street. In addition, the T. R. A. rebuilding will be completed on the road from the Upper Village towards East Washington, and resealing of several of the rebuilt roads will be done.

We are asking for the usual two-year replacement of the police cruiser, and this year we are also asking for approval of an additional truck for the Highway Department. The old truck will not be traded in, but will be kept for additional use as may be necessary.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING 1967

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the town of Hillsborough qualified to vote in town affairs on the 14th. day of March 1967, at ten o'clock in the forenoon at the High School, the meeting was called to order by the moderator.

Article 1 Voted that the voters of the town of Hillsborough proceed to ballot for the Selectman for three years, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Highway Agent, Town Clerk for one year, and all other necessary Town Officers or Agents for the ensuing year.

Article 2 Voted that the reports of the Town Officers to the Auditors, the reports of the Auditors, Agents, Committees and other Town Officers heretofore chosen or appointed be accepted as printed in the Town Report, with page 19 amended unclassified blank damages and legal expenses \$6.00. Certificate of Deposit \$50,000.00, taxes bought by town \$3,227.90, discount abatements refunds \$97.47. Retirement and Social Security \$2,613.86.

Article 3 Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy eight thousand seven hundred twenty five dollars for Town Officers Salaries, Town Officers Expenses, Town Building appropriations for Street Lights, and all other current expenses of the town as follows:

Article 4 Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty seven thousand eight hundred seventy eight dollars and eighty three cents (\$37,878.83) for the building and repairing of highways, bridges, culverts, and sidewalks.

Article 5 Voted to appropriate a sum not exceeding Nine thousand four hundred dollars (\$9,400.00) for the purpose of making improvements to the following class road within the town. East Washington road such sum to be raised through the issuance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 241, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 1955, as amended by laws of 1957, Chapter 272-3 and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the date and place of interest thereon, and to take such other steps as may be necessary to negotiate such bonds or notes as shall be to the best interest of the town of Hillsborough. An amendment "And Town equipment to be used as much as feasible" was defeated by a hand count 57 to 42.

Article 6 Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Two thousand (\$2,000.00) to be applied to the Capital Reserve Fund for the future purchase of Highway Equipment.

Article 7 Voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell and convey by deed, under such conditions and to such persons as the Board may consider proper the title to real estate taken by the town in default or redemption from tax sale.

Article 8 Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of One hundred dollars (100.00) for the purchase of equipment for the Hillsboro Civil Defense Program.

Article 9 Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Two thousand nine hundred dollars (\$2,900.00) to be applied upon the account of Hillsboro District Nursing Association.

Article 10 Defeated by hand vote 83 to 72 the appropriation of \$992.00 to aid Concord Hospital, Concord, New Hampshire.

Article 11 Voted to accept as a Street to be named Edgebrook Road a certain parcel of land described in a deed of Manchester Savings Bank to the town of Hillsboro dated December 7, 1966.

"Bounded and described as follows".

Beginning at an iron pin in the ground at the intersection of the southerly line of the highway known at Route 9 with Northeasterly corner lot No. 2 as shown on a plan entitled

“Edgebrook Plan, Plan No. 1, Proposed Lot Development, dated December 6, 1962, made by Dufresne Henry Engineering Corp., recorded as Plan No. 2375(3-35), thence proceeding along the easterly boundary of said lot No. 2 for a distance of one hundred thirty-eight (138) feet to an iron pin, thence continuing along the easterly boundary of lot No. 3 as shown on said plan for a distance of one hundred nine (109) feet to an iron pin, thence proceeding easterly at a right angle to the previous bound for a distance of forty (40) feet to a stake, thence proceeding in a northerly direction along the westerly line of land now or formerly owned by David Titcomb and Joseph A. Garofoli Jr. along a course which is parallel to the original bound to an iron pin situated on the southerly line of said highway known as Route No. 9 in a westerly direction to the point begun at Meaning and intending to convey a portion of right of way called Edgewood Road, as shown on a plan attached hereto.

Article 12 Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) for operating a vacation program for children.

Article 13 Voted to instruct and empower the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the town and in anticipation of taxes.

Article 14 Voted to establish a town Conservation Commission as set forth in New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated Chapter 36-A.

Article 15 Voted to accept a deed from Raymond Hooper of a certain tract of land known as Gleasons Falls, to be managed by the Hillsborough Conservation Commission as established.

Article 16 The motion to construct a combined Fire and Police Station to appropriate the sum of One hundred ten thousand dollars (\$110,000.00) therefore to be raised by an issue of serial notes the terms and conditions thereof to be determined by the Selectmen, was defeated by written ballots 108 to 91.

The second motion under Article 16 was passed as follows: “Moved that article 16 be considered at an adjourned session of this meeting to be held on the 27th. day of June 1967 at 7:30 p.m. in the School Auditorium and that the Committee be advised to present definite plans and specifications for the proposed building at that time.

Article 17 Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of One thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to purchase a radar unit for the Police Department.

Article 18 Voted to authorize and empower the Selectmen

to contract with the State Tax Commission for a re-appraisal of all real estate in the town of Hillsborough and raise and appropriate the sum of Eight thousand dollars (\$8,000.00) for said expenses.

Article 19 Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Six thousand five hundred dollars (\$6,500.00) for the reconstruction of Park Street, Summer Street and Old Henniker Road.

Article 20 Voted that the town adopt as an ordinance of the town of Hillsborough the following regulation: "No septic system shall be constructed within one hundred fifty feet (150) of Loon Pond Shores or the waters entering therein without the prior approval of said system by the Board of Health of the town.

Article 21 Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight hundred dollars (\$800.00) for the support of Band Concerts for the coming season.

Article 22 Voted that the minutes of the Town Meeting be printed in the succeeding Annual Report.

Meeting recessed until 6-27-67 at 7:30 p.m. Polls were closed at 6 p.m. and in the presence of the Selectmen and Town Clerk and assisted by them, proceeded to sort and count votes. At the close of the count made public declaration of the votes as follows:

The adjourned session opened at 7:30 p.m. at the High School Auditorium by the Moderator on June 27, 1967.

Article 16 Voted that the town construct a combined Fire and Police Station on land on Central Street, Hillsborough and that One hundred twenty thousand dollars (\$128,000.00) be appropriated therefore of which Eight thousand is to be raised by taxation in 1967, and the balance raised by an issue of serial notes, the terms and conditions therefore to be determined by the Selectmen.

The vote on the above motion was 97 yes 10 no, by written ballot. That more than equalled the required two third majority

Voted that the present building committee be continued as the Building Committee to supervise construction of said Fire and Police Station, said committee to prepare and complete plans and specifications and obtain bids for the construction of said building and subject to the approval of the Fire Commissioners and Board of Selectmen.

A motion that specifications contain the requirements of 100 per cent performance bond and final payment not be made until thirty days after completion was defeated.

The building committee was tended a round of applause for their good work.

Meeting adjourned at 8:30 p.m.

ANDERSON - NICHOLS SEWER SURVEY

PROJECT COST AND ESTIMATED FINANCING

The estimated financing is based on the entire cost of the project and consists of cost estimates for land acquisition, rights-of-way acquisition, legal, administrative, etc., added to the estimated cost of constructing the proposed work. The total cost estimated for these additional items is \$102,000, and when this amount is added to the estimated construction cost of \$1,248,000, the resulting sum of \$1,350,000, is the estimated cost of the total project and represents the amount to be financed.

Both the federal government and the State of New Hampshire have established grants-in-aid to assist communities and districts in financing the costs of pollution abatement projects. The State of New Hampshire, under Chapter 149 as amended of the Revised Statutes Annotated, will provide a grant up to 40 percent of the cost of constructing interceptor sewers, pumping stations, force mains, and treatment plants. These are known as "eligible items" and do not include the sanitary sewer lines. The federal government, under the "Clean Waters Act of 1966" will provide a grant up to 50 percent of the cost of constructing these same "eligible items".

There is also a section in the federal government's Farmers Home Administration law which provides for grant assistance for sewerage systems to small communities and districts of an amount up to 50 percent of the total project cost, within the limit that the total of all federal funds shall not exceed 50 percent of the total project cost. Only one allocation under the provisions of this law has been granted in

New Hampshire, so the following estimation for financing is shown with and without a FHA grant, but, prior to any construction, applications should be made for such a grant.

Of the estimated project cost of \$1,350,000, an amount of \$800,000 would be the value of the "eligible items" upon which the State of New Hampshire and "Clean Waters Act" grants would be computed. From this, tabulations are presented to determine the estimated amount to be financed by the Town:

It should be noted that, although these totals are the estimated amounts to be financed by the Town, the municipal bonding must include the State grant amount since this is paid annually (principal and interest amortization charges) over the life of the bond issue.

Financing all, or a portion, of the cost of any extensive public improvement by borrowing is common practice because most communities cannot finance them on a cash basis. By establishing debt limits, State statutes control the extent to which municipalities can finance needed public projects. The New Hampshire Statute (RSA 33:5) provides for money borrowed for sewerage and sewage purposes to be outside the specified legal debt limit. Therefore, funds borrowed to

install the proposed facilities would not restrict the borrowing capacity for other needed town expenditures.

Borrowing for sewerage projects may be accomplished by the issuance of (1) general obligation bonds (serial bonds); (2) special assessment bonds; (3) revenue bonds; or by a combination of these.

The usual method is the issuance of general obligation bonds which are based on the credit and taxing power of the town or district. To secure these issues, the credit of the town or district, backed by its taxing power, is pledged; the amount borrowed becomes a general obligation and must be paid without regard to any specific fund. General obligation bonds are not considered "risk" capital and generally carry a low interest rate.

Proposed bond issues must be presented to the voters for approval and, if approved, and if legal procedure has been followed, the bonds may be sold and the money becomes immediately available for construction.

The legal procedure required to grant the local officials the necessary authority to make the covenants should be reviewed by the town's attorney and bond counsel, thus preventing any errors of proceedings that might affect the validity of the bonds and delay construction of the project.

Serial bond issues have definite amounts maturing each year over the life of the issue, so that the debt is liquidated on the last payment. It is advisable, from the bond market point of view, to have the yearly payments in multiples of \$5,000 when this type of bond is used. It is also of financial advantage to absorb the odd amounts in the early years of the issue.

The current rate of interest on 30-year bonds is about 4 percent. A savings of approximately one-half of 1 percent might be realized on the interest rate by writing the bonds for a 20-year instead of a 30-year period.

The annual cost of financing the town's share (\$630,000), not including a FHA grant, of the estimated total project (\$1,350,000) over a 30-year period at 4 percent interest, is estimated at \$33,600. The total annual cost which would include not only the interest and amortization of the bond issue but also the costs for pumping, operation, and maintenance of the proposed facilities is estimated at \$45,000. With also as FHA grant, the interest and amortization of the bond issue is estimated at \$19,000 annually, and the total annual cost including operation would amount to about \$31,600.

It is recommended that matters of annual payments, bonding period, interest rates, timing and marketability of any bond issue, be discussed with the banker who will

handle the issue. The bank or a bond council can provide financial advice and recommend the bonding procedures that will best serve Hillsborough's needs.

METHODS OF FINANCING

Municipal sewerage and sewage treatment facilities are usually not operated for a profit, but are generally organized to serve the public on a cost basis. Then, the revenue required is the amount needed to meet the annual costs. The total annual amount required consists of the principal and interest payments of the bond issue, maintenance and operation costs of the facilities, and other contingent costs. The method of financing that will best serve the needs of the Town and meet with public approval remains to be selected.

Construction of sewerage and sewage treatment facilities is usually financed by general taxation of the entire community, or taxation of a bounded sewer district, if one exists. The health and welfare of every community depends upon the satisfactory disposal of all industrial and household waste water. Adequate sewer facilities will benefit the entire town, including residents located outside of the area directly served by the sewers. Installation of the sewer system improves the sanitary conditions and eliminates public health hazards and nuisances created by existing raw sewage outlets. Property would be more attractive and have more appeal for industrial, business, and residential use, thus resulting in high property values and possible population increase. Therefore, it has generally been considered equitable to meet the annual expenses by general taxation of the entire town.

Service charges for the use of sewers is another method sometimes employed to obtain the funds required to pay for operation and maintenance of sewage facilities and to retire bonds. These charges may be based on the amount of water used, type and number of plumbing fixtures, foot frontage of property, assessed property value, fixed entrance fee per connection, or on some other equitable basis. The first, sometimes called sewer rental, is a method frequently used. People who enjoy the benefits of the sewers are assessed a graduated rental charge based on the amount of sewage contributed to the system. Generally, these charges are established on the basis of the water bill and are often billed together.

Because there are the general benefits to the community as a whole, it is suggested that the Town assume, by taxation, about 50 percent of the annual costs. The remaining annual costs, about 50 percent, could be collected by assess-

ing a sewer usage charge on those persons directly served by sewers.

Without a grant from FHA, to raise the annual cost of \$45,000 by this method would increase the Town tax rate by about \$0.25 per \$100.00 value, based on the 1966 Net Valuation of the Town. The use charge, to raise the remainder, is estimated at \$26.00 per connection per year. With this tax increase and service charge, a home assessed for \$6,000 without sewer service would pay about \$15.00 per year, and with sewer service about \$41.00 per year.

Should funds be available and a grant also be made by the FHA, the tax increase on a home assessed for \$6,000 out of the sewer area would be about \$11.00 per year, and in the sewer area about \$29.00 per year.

Although it is our opinion that this method of financing offers a satisfactory and equitable way, it appears advisable to have the local officials or a special committee review the possibilities. They could consider and evaluate any of the fourteen methods of financing presently used in New Hampshire, or various combinations, in terms of influencing local factors and economic conditions, and make recommendations for a financing program that is in the best interest of the town.

CONCLUSIONS

This study has resulted in the following conclusions:

1. That the abatement of pollution by the installation of an added sewerage system and treatment facilities could stimulate further development of Hillsborough and serve to attract new industries.
2. That the population trends indicate a design population of 3,100 is reasonable.
3. That the public water supply is ample to satisfy the requirements of a sewage disposal system.
4. That there is no serious storm water drainage problem.
5. That the need for adequate sewerage facilities is not only self-evident, but has reached a condition where it should be considered imperative.
6. That completion of the proposed project during initial construction would be the most economical and satisfactory recommendation.
7. That portions of the sewage must be pumped in the collection process and that all of the sewage must be pumped to the treatment plant, since it cannot be collected by gravity and since a treatment plant cannot be located to receive the

sewage flows by gravity.

8. That sewage lagoons offer the best method of sewage treatment because they offer an economy in construction, operation, and maintenance, and because a suitable site (of presently owned town land) is available easterly from Grimes Field.

9. That, should the town desire to use a portion of the land easterly from Grimes Field for industrial development, then it is concluded that oxidation ditches offer the best method of sewage treatment because they offer a financial advantage in construction and operating cost over a conventional plant and because of their smaller land requirements than sewage lagoons.

10. That the proposed sewers and sewage treatment facilities offer a reasonable solution to the sewage disposal problem of the Town of Hillsborough.

11. That financing the local share of the project cost by taxation and use is the most equitable; however, a local committee should review and consider the financing methods in order to select the one that serves the Town's needs the best.

RECOMMENDATIONS

As a result of the study and conclusions, it is recommended that:

1. A public sewerage system and sewage treatment facilities be installed in accordance with the proposed plans.

2. Immediate action be taken toward the acquisition of land and rights-of-way for new sewer lines, interceptors, pumping stations, force mains, and treatment plant, so that final plans can proceed without unnecessary delay. This should be in the form of a written option that is legally binding or an outright purchase.

3. The Town authorize and proceed with final planning (preparation of construction drawings and specifications) so that construction can be started without delay when state and federal grants are made available.

4. The Town proceed with the applications required for federal loans to assist in financing of this planning.

5. The Town proceed with application for federal and state grants to assist in the financing of construction of the project.

6. The proposed project be completed during initial con-

struction rather than performing the work in stages.

7. Sewer taxes based on assessed property valuation and sewer use be the method used to finance the project; however, the methods of financing should be reviewed and considered locally in order to insure selection of the one that serves the interests of the Town the best.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

During 1967 the Planning Board's major concern has been the application of the new Sub-Division Regulations adopted by the Town at the Special Town Meeting, held in December 1966. Preliminary plans submitted by two developers for approval have enabled the Board to assess the strengths and weaknesses and to judge the present effectiveness of this yet untested regulation.

A partial preliminary plan submitted by Emerald Lake Shores was considered by the Board in early summer and rejected. Subsequently meetings were held with representatives of the Emerald Lake Corporation and an on-site survey of the development was made by the Board. The Board has taken the position it cannot and will not grant the substantial exceptions to the Sub-Division Regulation requested by the Emerald Lake Corporation.

A preliminary plan for subdivision of the former Merrill land on Old Henniker Road by Double Dave, Inc. has also been received. Some changes were suggested by the Board and have been accepted by the developer pending submission of a final plan this spring.

The experience of the Planning Board with these two applications under the Sub-Division Regulations has demonstrated the desirability of certain changes in the regulations to strengthen and enhance the Town's ability to enforce them effectively. These are incorporated in the Warrant Article drawn up by the Board for public approval at this year's Annual Meeting.

In April the State Highway Department announced its intention to rebuild Routes 202 and 9 in 1969 from Henniker to the outskirts of Hillsboro but indicated that no Hillsboro by-pass would likely be constructed within ten years. The Planning Board felt that serious traffic problems, particularly in the Square, might be the consequence of this program. Accordingly two meetings were held with representa-

tives of the Highway Department. The Highway Department recognized the problem. They agreed to make a traffic survey and analysis — which has been done — and to make recommendations for forestalling anticipated traffic congestion in the Town.

At the request of the Zoning Commission, the Planning Board held two meetings to discuss the work being carried on by that group.

A joint meeting was held with the Antrim and Deering Planning Boards for consideration of common or overlapping problems and it was agreed to hold joint meetings at least once a year.

Late in 1967 the Deering Planning Board requested a joint meeting with this Board and the Selectmen of both towns for the purposes of considering possible merger or consolidation of public services of the two towns. The exploration committees resulting from this meeting reported such a venture impractical at this time but suggested the possibility be kept open and reviewed periodically by officials of the two towns.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

Since the members of the Commission were appointed in June, 1967, there have been eleven meetings.

The first gift to the Town, through the Commission, was Gleason Falls. Generously given by Mr. and Mrs. Raymond J. Hooper on a contingency basis, arrangements for acceptance have been completed.

All existing Town and County maps have been located and listed. Arrangements, at no charge, have been made for base map work with the State Department of Resources and Economic Development and the State Highway Department; also for a wetlands map from the U. S. Soil Conservation Service. A property map, on the same scale, is being filled in from many sources. With the completion of these maps, it is felt that a fair understanding and appraisal of the Town's open space (particularly around and along its water bodies) may be made in the coming year.

Cooperation has been established with one Federal, six State, and five Town agencies, as well as with the Society for The Protection of New Hampshire Forests. Materials of mutual concern have frequently been shared through this

Commission, in meetings, or by mail.

A list of free films on the use and mangement of natural resources has been selected and given to twenty organiza-tions, several school departments, and other potential users. Arrangements for showing are being filled by request. Talks on Hillsboro, illustrated by color slides, are also being offered by members of the Commission.

On the basis of an outline of present and future plans and needs, the sum of \$230.00 for running expenses has been granted by the Spaulding-Potter Charitable Trusts in Con-cord, N.H.

After an initial meeting with the Planning board it was decided that the group would individually tour the town and list problem areas, health hazards, Statutes or Town Ordin-ances in effect at this time and obtain State laws that con-cern sanitation and water. We felt that it was mandatory for us to know the development of Hillsboro, all problems and conditions effecting it's growth and al problems and condi-tions because of its growth. We also needed to know both town and state laws to determine whether Zoning is needed in Hillsboro, or if town ordinances were sufficient to pro-tect the town from undesireable condition.

A meeting was held with the Assistant Planning Direc-tor to discuss Zoning and to determine what problems Zon-ing would have an effect on. The group has held meetings with the Planning board, the Selectmen, Water Commission-ers, Public Health officials, (including information obtained from the State Water Pollution Board), Conservation Com-mission, and attended meetings of the State Water Pollution Board in Milford, N.H. to discuss new septic tank laws and

the first open hearing of a proposed Zoning Ordinance in Henniker, N.H. Members also attended a public meeting in Hillsboro to view films on Subdivisions, and Water Pollution.

One fact seemed vital to us. A lack of knowledge of the laws, a need for copies of the laws to be readily accessible to people buying or building, and a definite need for Hillsboro people to know what their community problems are and offer any possible lawful solutions. Laws are only as good as their enforcement and it seemed pointless to propose numerous new laws when improvement in existing laws might net the same results and penalty clauses could control offenders.

It should be made known to everyone the difference between Town Ordinances, Permits, Subdivision regulations, Zoning, Building Codes, and Housing Standards. They are NOT one package, they are individual laws and adopting one does not necessitate adopting the others.

It became evident that a prime problem for the Zoning Study Commission was to determine what is Zoning, what can Zoning control, and of what benefit would it be to Hillsboro?

Zoning is defined as the creation by law of districts in which regulations varying between different types of districts control the use of structures and land. Its purpose is to control these uses in such a way as to be in the best interest of the town and in accordance with the towns over all plan. Zoning regulations control essentially only three factors:

1. Use of land and structures
2. Area of land and structures
3. Height of structures

Zoning regulations DO NOT control:

1. Cost of construction
2. Type of building materials
3. Architectural design of structures
4. Public use of land or structures

There are definite problems facing the town such as:

1. Water and air pollution
2. Protection of the town's water supply
3. Undesirable lakeshore development
4. Land subdivisions
5. Preventing construction of substandard housing
6. Building in flood hazard areas
7. Preservation of historical sites and areas
8. Locating desirable commercial establishments and industry

Existing legislation such as the town Subdivision regula-

tions, Ordinance Regulating Trailer or Mobile Homes and Trailer or Mobile Home Parks, Sewage regulations etc., which are now in existance should do a great deal to protect and promote the health, safety, general welfare, and morals of the citizens of the town. However there appears to be reluctance to enforce these regulations by those who are charged with this legal responsibility. Strengthening of existing regulations by adding definitions, specifications, adequate lot sizes and definite enforcement clauses could go a long way toward solving some of the before mentioned problems.

Regulations other than Zoning could be enacted to protect our town water supply. A Zoning ordinance could compile all these desirable factors rather than have the town books crammed with a hodgepodge of various overlapping rules and regulations. In short, Zoning is the only known legal means of preventing the occurrence of a nuisance. Without Zoning there is usually no protection of property values. It should be remembered that one of the important purposes of town government is to protect ALL property rights and to promote the general welfare. It is only because some people do not abide by the principle, that a property owner may not use his property in a way harmful to others, that Zoning need be considered at all. We feel that there are problems and we have informed you of these in weekly newspaper articles.

Therefore if you would like to help Hillsboro to become a better place in which to live and to work, and would like to see rational progress into the future, then we recommend that you approach land use planning and zoning as a creative process worth much time, intelligence and study.

In conclusion, we do not feel that a one year study enables us to give a yes or no answer to Zoning.

To the Inhabitants of the Hillsborough Bridge Village Fire Precinct in the Town of Hillsborough, qualified to vote in Precinct affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the High School Auditorium in said Precinct on Monday the 18th day of March, 1968, at seven thirty o'clock in the afternoon. Election of officers and balloting on Articles 1-5 will take place between 7:30 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. Articles 6 through 12 will be taken up at 7:30 p.m.

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To choose one Water Commissioner to serve five years and one Fire Commissioner for three years.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer, Auditors and other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to adopt Chapter 406 of the Session Laws of the State of New Hampshire, 1963, providing for the dissolution of the Hillsborough Bridge Village Fire Precinct and the creation of a Fire Department of the Town of Hillsborough and a Water Department of the Town of Hillsborough, and to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 6. To hear the reports of the Fire Commissioners, Water Commissioners, Clerk, Treasurer, Auditors and other Officers and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any other vote relating thereto.

Article 7. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for paying the current expenses of the Precinct, the debt of the Precinct, and any other charges arising within said Precinct.

Article 8. To see if the Precinct will vote to instruct and empower the Fire Commissioners to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the Precinct and in anticipation of taxes.

Article 9. To see if the Precinct will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) for the purchase of Fire Fighting Equipment.

Article 10. To see if the Precinct will vote to raise and

appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to add to the Capital Reserve Fund for the acquisition of Fire Equipment.

Article 11. To see if the Precinct will vote to appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) from the Water Department income for the purpose of operating the Water Department for the year 1968. Or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Precinct will vote to appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) from the Sewer Department income for the purpose of operating the Sewer Department for the year 1968. Or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Precinct will vote to appropriate to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of capital improvements to Water System, the surplus of the Water Department, if any, and to withdraw therefrom prior deposits for capital improvements during 1968-1969. Or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Precinct will vote to appropriate to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of capital improvements to Sewer System, the surplus of the Sewer Department, if any, and to withdraw therefrom prior deposits for capital improvements during 1968-1969. Or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.
