**TOWN WARRANT**  
**THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

---

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Kensington in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Kensington on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. The Selectmen's estimate of expenditures for the ensuing year is \$27,257.81.

3. To see if the Town wishes to allow a discount on taxes paid within 30 days or 60 days after presentation of tax bills.

4. To vote on the basis of payment and the amount thereof to be paid the Tax Collector for the collection of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will grant the Selectmen authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not exceeding \$6,000.00 (Six Thousand Dollars) for the purpose of making improvements to the following Class V roads within the Town; Osgood Road and Blake Road, such sum to be raised through issuance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 241, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, as amended by Laws of 1957, Chapter 273:3, and to

authorize the Selectmen to determine the date and place of payment of such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other steps as may be necessary to negotiate such bonds or notes as shall be to the best interests of the Town of Kensington.

7. By petition of David C. Engel and nine others. To see if the Town will vote to require the Selectmen to submit to public bid all town projects for the construction, maintenance and/or repair of town roads or town buildings and structures in which the estimated cost of such projects exceeds \$100.00 (One Hundred Dollars) all bidders to provide a bid bond, and a performance bond.

8. By petition of George O. Cole and eleven others. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the purchase of a new tanker and pumper fire engine with necessary equipment, said engine to meet specification as drawn by the Board of Fire Engineers; and for this purpose, to raise a sum not exceeding Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) by issue of serial notes of the Town, under and in accordance with, the provisions of Chapter 33 (Municipal Finance Act) of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated as amended, the discretion of fixing the date, maturities, interest rate or discount rate, the place of payment, the form and other details of said notes to be delegated to the Selectmen.

9. By petition of Gustave Lambert and fourteen others. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 (Four Hundred Dollars) for the purpose of increasing the annual salaries of the three selectmen and the town treasurer \$100.00 (One Hundred Dollars) each.

10. By petition of Gustave Lambert and nineteen others. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 (Seven Hundred and Fifty Dollars) for the purpose of purchasing four fireproof



cabinets for the use of the selectmen, town clerk, tax collector and treasurer.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Business meeting starts at 7:00 P.M. Polls will close at end of business meeting.

The total circulation increased 1651 over the 1961 circulation figure. The greatest increase was in the juvenile fiction but nearly all the categories showed an increase. There was also an increase in the number of people using the reference books. Circulation remained gratifyingly high all through the summer months.

There were 190 books added to the library during 1962. Seventeen of these books were purchased with funds left in memory of Helen R. Webster and 3 children's books were purchased with funds left in memory of Mr. James A. Wiggins. The library has been fortunate in receiving many gift books this year. Mr. Walter Hoffman of Exeter was the largest donor and while the books were not new they were of excellent quality and were predominantly non-fiction in the history and science classification. The Exeter Library has been most generous in giving Kensington first choice when they have surplus books and some new fiction was

obtained this way. The Hampton Falls Library and the Kensington Library were able to swap some of their gift books to mutual advantage. Many town's people have given generously to the library. The Goodale Family presented 12 issues of American Heritage, John and Andrew Tuthill gave "The Christmas Mouse" as a Christmas gift to the Library, Mrs. Henry Shute gave a Christmas check to purchase "North of Monadnock" (adult) and "The Boy Who Would Not Say His Name" (juvenile). Many children in town have given books from their own libraries to increase the children's collection. Charles Kimball gave a book in memory of Nellie Hilliard and Martha Kimball gave one in memory of Helen Webster.

Forty-three new borrowers signed the register in 1962. Twenty-two of these were elementary school age, 6 junior or high school age and 16 were adults.

In August 1962, Kensington joined with the libraries of South Hampton, Newton, Kingston and Brentwood to form a Book Purchasing Cooperative. Each library is entitled to deposit a portion of its book budget with the State Treasurer and receive the benefit of the State Library discount for books ordered against this money. Every two months the group meets and is able to examine new books before purchasing. This group has been awarded the Shieling Trust grant for 1962. With the Shieling money, books are purchased by unanimous consent to be owned in common by the five libraries. The books will rotate among the libraries until the money has been all spent and all the libraries have had the books in rotation, a division will then be made among the members libraries. Each library will finally have a number of the books on a semi-permanent basis. Each library will have catalog cards for each book in their catalog. The books will be loaned freely among members of the group even after division is made.

The Kensington PTA has sponsored a group of volunteers who are helping the librarian to weed, re-catalog and reorganize the library. The weeding has been completed and much cataloging has been done. A complete inventory will be taken and all uncataloged books will be cataloged. The volunteers have been tireless and enthusiastic and their help is greatly appreciated.

Improvements have been made to the interior of the library by the Social Library Trustees during the past year. A section of railing was removed to allow better access to the stacks. A new top was put on the circulation desk and shelves built for each side of the desk for storage of supplies. During Christmas week, the entire floor was sanded and refinished. The appearance of the library has been greatly improved.

The librarian attended her second session of the Public Library Techniques course at U. N. H. and has now qualified for a temporary Librarian's Certificate. Upon completion of the four summer sessions she will receive a permanent certificate.

During the year the Department has responded to 12 alarms as follows:

Of these alarms, 1 dwelling and 2 woods fires were Mutual Aid calls to assist other Towns. An average of 14 men and 4 officers responded and used the following equipment, the figures below are totals for all fires.

The value of the property involved, (excluding land value), was slightly over \$25,000 and the damage estimated at \$1,700.

An average of 8 men and 4 officers attended 12 regular Drills and a total of 528 man hours were expended on Drills and Fires.

During 1962 we in Kensington were most fortunate. While the National death, injury and damage tolls from fire have risen, we have shown a decrease. This should not lull us into a false sense of security as fire does not respect the old saying, "it can't happen to me". It can and will unless constant vigilance is maintained.

To further stress the need for complete information,

be sure to give your full name, street address and Town. Both telephone exchanges that serve this Town also serve several others, some of which have identical street names. Persons who have recently moved to Kensington should further identify themselves. For example: my name is John Jones, on "X" street, next door to "Mr. Old Timer". This will aid in securing a prompt response of the Fire Department.

## FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

---

### Preventing Forest Fires Is Our Responsibility

Costs of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires in New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such fires for which no responsibility could be placed cost another \$24,634. What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and esthetic values in the 2,200 acres burned. Residences, farms, and other business places were threatened with possible total destruction.

Carelessly set man caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his responsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can help to keep our fire loss low by remembering these simple rules.

1. Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.
2. If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain a permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites.
3. Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late in the day.
4. Have something to keep the fire under control — pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.
5. Be sure your fire is dead out before you leave it.
6. If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives.

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never too early for parents to install in the child's mind a respect for fire.

Keep our town safe from fire.

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Kensington qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the ninth day of March 1963, at 7:30 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.



9. To see if the District will grant the School Board authority to use the money received from Federal Aid (P. L. 874) to defray the added expense of tuitions and maintenance of school plant.

10. By petition of Leslie C. Briggs and nine others: To see if the School District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to increase the salaries of School Board Members.

11. By petition of William H. Wadleigh and nine others: To see if the School District will vote to hold the annual School District Meeting on the same day as the annual Kensington Town Meeting, the School District Meeting to precede the annual town meeting.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

**REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

---

To the School Board of Kensington:

It is with pleasure that I submit my fifteenth annual report.

Two additions were made in the teaching staff for this year. Mrs. Alfreda Gallo was elected as the additional teacher to teach Grade 2 and Mrs. Virginia Holder was chosen as the additional school nurse for the Supervisory Union.

This is an experienced and dedicated staff.

The addition to the school was completed so that school opened on schedule in September. It provides the facilities and space which should take care of the school plant needs for many years to come. I believe the citizens of the town are to be congratulated for providing these fine facilities for the young people to use so that they may have the best possible educational opportunities while in the elementary school.

The tuition rates for 1963-1964 as announced by the Exeter School Board after approval by the State Board of Education are as follows:

\$475 for senior high students which is the same rate as for last year.

\$405 for junior high students which is an increase of \$30.

These rates are based on the estimated per pupil costs for 1962-1963 plus the 2% rental charge of \$22.17.

The additional school nurse has made it possible to give the usual health examinations and also to provide a health education program as well. One of the nurses spends a certain amount of time per week in each school in addition to being on call always in case of an emergency. A Health Committee consisting of a representative from each school district in the Supervisory Union was formed last spring and it meets regularly with the nurses to advise them and to determine needed policies for the school health program. We now have one of the better programs in the state.

A part of this report is devoted to a statement by Mr. Frederick King, Teacher Consultant for Supervisory Union No. 16, who replaced Mr. Donald Elsemore last August. He outlines some of the work which he is doing in his role as supervisor of elementary education. He reports as follows:

It has been my pleasure to begin work this school year in the area as teacher consultant. I have found the first few months very interesting, and I feel also a sense of belonging in the way teachers have accepted me as one of the "educational family".

Probably the chief concern of the teacher consultant is instructional improvement. Education has many demands placed upon it. The modern space age and educational research have constantly produced proposed changes on what we teach and how we teach it. There must always be a continued evaluation of what we can use of the new, and what is worth keeping of the old. We never can stand still. Education, like any other profession, is constantly looking for better ways to achieve more as we work with the girls and boys of this area.

A program of instructional improvement is only as good as those involved. Any program's worth can be measured by the desire of each worker to bring to the job the best he has to offer. I have found excellent cooperation from all the teachers as we examine what we are doing, and look ahead to what we need to change.

My role this first semester has been chiefly one of getting acquainted with the schools and their staffs. I have tried to make frequent visits to the classrooms in order to view the teaching process, and to familiarize myself with teachers and pupils. By careful analysis of what is happening in the classroom, ideas for working with teachers can be gathered.

Other techniques that I have used include the individual conference. The conference is an exchange of thinking regarding the many phases of eaching children. I would hope these conferences would help in encouraging the teacher toward future professional growth and in reaching for continued improvement of teaching skills.

Group meetings have been held. I feel teachers should have a share in the responsibility for building philosophy and establishing the instructional program of the

school. In these meetings we talk over local school problems and exchange ideas toward their solutions.

Each month I have released a bulletin. It is usually two pages long and gives concrete ideas that the teacher may use in her classroom. I also try to include suggestions on free and inexpensive materials that are available for classroom use.

The teaching demonstration by the consultant of new methods and materials has also been utilized. This method focuses attention upon one special skill in an actual classroom situation. The teacher observes this, and later we can exchange views on its value.

These, then, are some of the ways I have used as consultant and teacher work together in the important task of helping children learn. Throughout this report three words stand out: growth, improvement, and achievement. These are verbal symbols used to express what I am trying to do as I seek to do service for and with the teachers of this area.

The Parent-Teacher Association continues its interest in the school program.

I call your attention to the reports and tables which follow.

I express my sincere appreciation to the citizens, the members of the School Board and to the teachers for their continued support and cooperation.

The entire class is benefitting by the lessons in weaving given by Mrs. Howard Swain. From these lessons have come talks and demonstrations by the class to other students throughout the school.

Folk dancing with Mrs. Jean Tufts, an ever popular recreation, has proven its social and physical value and has become a part of the weekly schedule.

Extras plus the daily routines have shown the Union Class to be good contributors as well as excellent participants in the total school population.

## SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

---

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Although there is much to be done in school health services, some accomplishments can be reported.

With the coming of the third nurse on a school union basis, we have been able to set a day and time to visit each school. More time has been made available to set up procedures for remedial handicaps, such as vision and hearing problems, more home visits made, time available for teacher conferences.

Another accomplishment has been in the field of health education. Wherever routine work has been completed, such as in hearing and vision tests, we were able to follow on with a program of talks, film strips, movies, demonstration of health and safety topics. This has been met with approval of teachers, pupils and parents. There is much to be done in this field but at least a start has been made.

The needs still unmet in health services are:

1. Dental programs for low income groups.
2. Child Guidance Clinics

Although the above services are needed the one that affects the school as well as the individual child and his family the most is the emotionally disturbed child. The numbers that fall into this group are increasing at an alarming rate. Some areas have found it necessary to start their own services for these children either in the schools or in their communities. We in Union No. 16 are



in as great a need as any other area. The help we can get is scattered and wholly inadequate. Yet the child with an emotional problem can be quite distracting to the whole school as well as his or her own classroom.

There is a glimmer of hope, at present still far over the horizon, that some day we in Union No. 16 can obtain such services through a contemplated family service agency or by buying services from neighboring areas where such services are in the process of being formed.

We feel convinced that a full school year of nursing services with a staff of three will bring increased benefits to the individual school as well as the Union as a whole.

We extend our thanks to all - parents, teachers, organizations, that have helped us in carrying out school health services during the past year.
