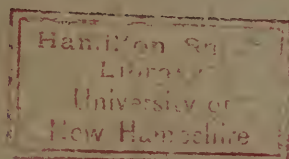

## ORGANIZATION OF CITY GOVERNMENT

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Tuesday, March 25, 1919.

At ten o'clock in the forenoon of the above date, members-elect of the city council for the municipal year of 1919 and the members from the previous council met for organization at the city council room agreeably to the provisions of the city charter.

The oath of office was administered to the mayor-elect, Hon. John A. Mitchell, by the retiring Mayor, Hon. Clarence E. Rowe.

# INAUGURAL ADDRESS

OF HON. JOHN A. MITCHELL, MARCH 25, 1919

*Gentlemen of the Council:*

One of the greatest history making years the world has ever known has passed since the last inauguration and we in our quiet city can hardly realize the magnitude of it, but Laconia has not been idle and has responded nobly to every call to help carry on the war. She furnished 577 men and thirteen nurses out of which I am happy to say only two were killed in battle, one died from wounds and thirteen died from disease, and a committee from this body has in charge the procuring of a suitable memorial in memory of the dead and in honor of the living who risked their lives to make the world safe for democracy. In all of the Liberty Bond drives she exceeded her quote by thousands and in all other drives went way over the top; the ladies are entitled to a share of the credit having done good work in all of the drives as well as making a vast amount of clothing, bandages, etc., that was called for by the Government.

In assuming this office as the 14th Mayor of your city, I am not unmindful of the responsibilities and cares which it carries with it and I ask your fullest cooperation to make the business of the coming year one of satisfaction to the tax payers as well as to ourselves, and that can only be done by your constant attendance at our meetings leaving out all prejudice and partiality and deciding all questions on their merits, keeping the good of the city as a whole constantly before you. We have two new faces among us this year, Councilman Bridges from Ward One and Councilman Stevens who has had a previous experience in the Council from Ward Three; we greet them heartily and we are sure that in the work of the year they will take their full share.

You will notice by the financial report that we exceeded our total appropriation by a small amount last year. That was caused by circumstances over which the Council had no

control, the epidemic of Influenza, the very bad condition of the Fair Street bridge, the extra expenses of finishing the state road, etc.; otherwise the several departments would have kept well within their appropriation. Very little work was done on our streets last year, as the shortage of labor and material made it impossible, but we hope that conditions will be much improved the coming year so that we may be able to do what is necessary to keep them up to their usual high standard. Fair Street and Canal Street should have our early attention as well as the finishing of a short strip of block pavement necessary to complete Water Street to the B. & M. Railroad track; we have the block pavement on hand to do the work. Our motor truck has proved to be a good investment especially in long hauls and without doubt a smaller one for collecting garbage could be used to good advantage in conjunction with it.

I am sure it is a great satisfaction to us all to have City Engineer French back with us again as his reputation for good work and good roads is more than state wide. It is understood that if we will appropriate \$10,000.00 the U. S. Government and State will each do the same for the completion of the macadam road on the Boulevard. This would complete our state road from the Belmont to the Meredith line giving us \$30,000.00 worth of road for \$10,000.00, a good business proposition, and I recommend that you make the appropriation.

#### FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Our fire department is in first class shape and has kept up its high standard of work the past year under the direction of Chief Spring, and his able assistant engineers. It having been my privilege to be a member of the fire committee for the past two years, I have kept in close touch with the department and while I do not claim perfection I think I make no mistake when I say that there is not a better call department in the state and I am glad that the last City Council recognized their efficiency by raising their pay.

The Fire Alarm System has been put in first class shape and several new boxes have been added. Our Hydrant System is not just what it should be as the city is growing away from those already installed, requiring in some instances a very long stretch of hose to reach the fire, and

we are in hopes this will be remedied in the near future. The Combination Pumping and Chemical Truck has proved its worth and the outlying districts are now having fire protection. There was a little trouble at the start caused by faulty construction, but it has been put in first class shape by the builders at no expense to the city and is worth today much more than the original cost. We hope and expect in the near future to get a revision of our insurance rate by being put in a higher class; the matter is now in the hands of the commission.

As it had been suggested by a good many that our Main Street was not properly lighted, the Laconia Gas & Electric Company have installed thirty-two 200 Candle Power lights from the junction of Union Avenue to the B. & M. R. R. track and across Depot Street and twelve 200 Candle Power lights on a part of Union Avenue and Elm Street at Lakeport in the place of the old lights so as to give the public an opportunity to see if they liked the change and we expect these lights will be so satisfactory that they will be a permanent fixture.

#### LEGAL.

Our legal cases through the persistent and efficient work of Solicitor F. M. Beckford have narrowed down to one case, that being the one between the City and Mrs. H. C. Wells to determine the street line next to her property and there is every indication that this case will be settled at this term of Court.

The finishing of the book on the revision of the City Ordinance, City Charter and Amendments has taken a large amount of the Solicitor's time and is a book that every citizen should own who wants to keep in touch with City affairs. Only a limited number have been published and the price is within the reach of all.

The Board of Health report that we had approximately three thousand cases of Influenza and four hundred cases of Pneumonia during the terrible epidemic that we have passed through. We were wholly unprepared for it when it started and are still unprepared should it come again.

The Trustees of the Laconia Hospital at first gave over the hospital to the epidemic patients but were unable to continue the service which left the city without a suitable place to take the patients, as our Isolation Hospital is without sewerage or running water and is not a fit place to handle disease.

I heartily concur in the recommendation of the board in regard to the building by the city of a new hospital on the grounds adjoining the city hospital which I understand the trustees are willing to donate, so that we may have a fit place to handle contagious cases in the future. The old hospital can be sold and the proceeds used in building the new one.

The State Tax will be much larger this year than last and the new Education Bill if passed will cost the city it is estimated about \$4,500.00. We have a certain amount of fixed charges which must be provided for each year so that in making up the balance of the appropriations we should be as economical as is compatible with good sound business, realizing that we are spending other people's money who expect value received, and there is no reason why they should not get it.

The result from our War gardens last year was most encouraging. There was a good demand for them, about one hundred one-eighth of an acre lots being plowed. They were much better taken care of than before and in most cases yielded a good return; where they were not a success was from poor care.

Applications are coming rapidly for lots for the coming season and the National Food Administration urges us to furnish as many Victory Gardens as possible.

One thousand dollars was appropriated last year for the work which was not all expended and as quite a number paid the city for the cost of plowing, the net cost to the city was about \$400.00, so I recommend that the sum of \$600.00 be appropriated that the good work may continue.

To the public I would say, attend our meetings. They are open to everyone and your presence would be an inspiration to us so that your criticism, if any, would be from the facts rather than from rumors. We ask your cooperation in our work of making Laconia one of the cleanest and up-to-date cities in New Hampshire.

I am sure that we are all proud of the new and up to the minute Post Office that has just been completed and I hope that when business has been readjusted and things resume a normal condition that we may be able to widen Church Street to accommodate the constantly increasing traffic.

Gentlemen of the Council, I thank you for your attention, and we will now proceed to the business of the session.

## FOR PAYMENT OF BILLS AGAINST THE CITY .

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All bills against the city must be approved by the persons authorizing the charge; and unless this is done, no action can be had upon the bill by the committee on accounts and claims, and no order will be given for its payment.

*When bills are certified to as above, and left with the city clerk not later than Thursday at 12 o'clock m., preceding the last Monday of each month, they will be audited by the committee on accounts and claims, and if approved by them and allowed by the council, will be ready for payment on the following Wednesday, at the office of the city treasurer.*

Meetings of the committee on accounts and claims are held on Friday preceding the last Monday of each month at 7.30 o'clock p. m., at the city clerk's office.

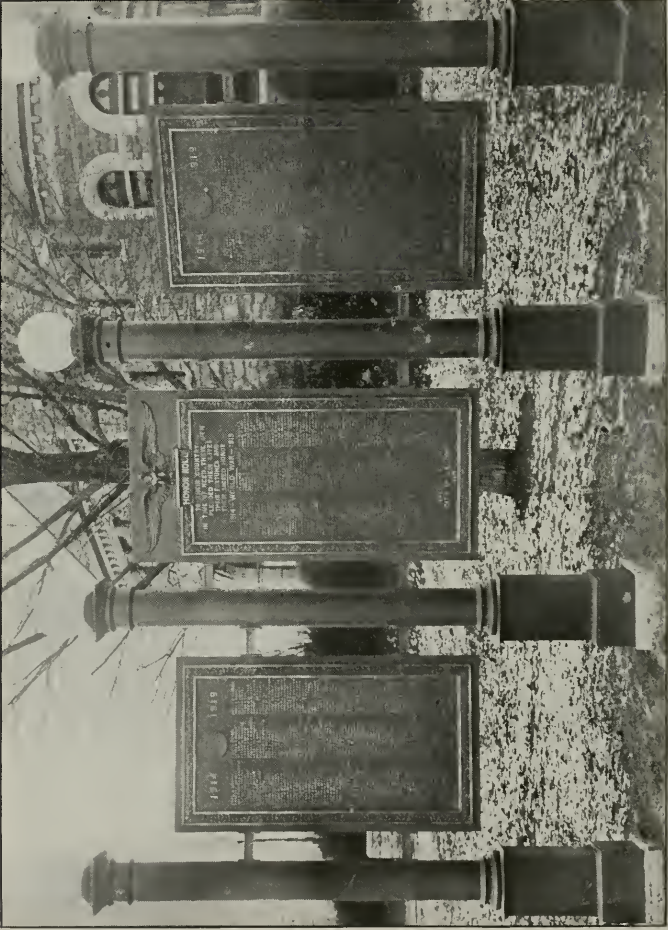

A RESOLUTION raising money by taxation for the year ending February 15, 1920.

*Resolved by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:*

That there shall be raised and there is ordered to be raised on the polls and the estate liable to be taxed within said city, the sum of two hundred twenty-three thousand one hundred eighty-seven and twenty-six hundredths (\$223,187.26) dollars to defray the necessary expenses and charges of the city for the financial year ending February 15, 1920.

# NINETEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS.

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Laconia, N. H., Feb. 12, 1920.

*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:—*

The nineteenth annual report of the Board is now due; and accordingly, we desire to submit the same, together with the detailed reports and recommendations of the City Engineer, Street Commissioner and Superintendent of Sewers, as presented to us.

At the outset we would express our appreciation of the hearty co-operation of your honorable body in all matters of mutual concern, during the year.

Sharing with other communities, the handicap imposed by the general unsettled conditions prevailing, particularly as regards the advancing cost of labor and the ever increasing prices and uncertainty of delivery of materials, we have suffered much; still we feel that we have had a successful year in many respects, and much substantial work has been accomplished.

The grading and preliminary work upon the Federal Aid Project in improving the Weirs boulevard; the North Main Street Special Appropriation construction done in conjunction with the State; the paving of Fair Street; the Canal Street Improvement; the grading of a sidewalk on Union Avenue from Clark Avenue to Bayside Cemetery, are projects which have been worked upon during the year, each of which has seemed to have the approval of our citizens generally.

On account of the lateness of the season, when we were

enabled to commence operations on the Federal Aid project on the Boulevard, and our subsequent failure to secure broken stone in any quantity, our work was necessarily confined to grading, widening the Langley Brook Bridge and other preliminary operations. Since then, between periods of freight embargos and during suspension of labor difficulties, we have been able to secure probably three quarters of the stone required for the project, the greater part of which has been unloaded at the Messer Street yards and it is hoped by the time the work can be resumed in the spring, that we may secure the balance.

We would ask your attention to the statement of the Street Commissioner relative to the situation as regards bridges.

The changes required in the waterway under the bridge at Davis Place; the construction of a suitable foot bridge at Gold Street, and the Main Street bridge which the Commissioner says is unsafe for heavy traffic, are problems upon which we would recommend that favorable action be taken as soon as possible, in line with his suggestions.

Relative to the matter of recommendations for new construction work for the ensuing year, we hesitate, realizing the present financial conditions render necessary most careful consideration of new projects, the cost of which must be borne by the city alone.

The macadamizing of Academy Street, South Main Street, Bowman Street, Messer Street from Church Street to Union Avenue, Gilford Avenue, Franklin Square, Elm Street and other streets we are urged to undertake not only by the sections of the city immediately concerned, but by a strong general demand; but how these projects are to be financed at this time, no one arises to explain.

With the increasing valuation and the tax rate made necessary to produce revenue to cover the enlarged appropriations demanded by all departments, it is our belief

that new burdens should be assumed only after careful consideration.

The proposition of issuing bonds for street improvement is strongly urged by some citizens, while others argue that this city has a well established pay as you go policy, from which it would be unwise to depart at this time.

For such new construction, as it is determined can be provided for, however, we have the organization and equipment and the disposition to do what may be authorized to do with funds appropriated.

We desire to renew our recommendation of last year, of the purchase of another motor truck to be used in connection with the one now owned by the city, which has done efficient service.

We also endorse the recommendation of the Street Commissioner relative to the purchase of a portable crushing and screening outfit and also a power wagon loader which would enable us to handle crushed stone and gravel to advantage; many of our streets that suffer so much from surface mud during rainy periods could be treated with a proper grade of gravel, which it is now expensive to obtain.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF STREETS

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*To the Board of Public Works:*

GENTLEMEN:—Present the following as the annual report of the Street Department for the year ending February 15, 1920:

### BRIDGES.

The following table enumerates and gives in a general way the condition of all our bridges of ten feet or more span.

The Beacon Street bridge was removed upon completion of Perley Canal extension and we have one less wooden bridge to maintain.

The water way at the Davis Place bridge should be enlarged to correspond with the brook channel improvement made by Scott & Williams Company, and the small wooden bridge removed and its water way filled.

The Gold Street bridge should be removed and a foot bridge constructed in its place. It is now used by pedestrians, although discontinued, and is rapidly becoming unsafe even for persons on foot.

The Main Street bridge requires constant repairs and it is not safe for heavy traffic. It should be replaced as soon as possible with a reinforced concrete structure.

The Union Avenue bridge at Black Brook was widened about 12 feet to accommodate the reconstructed street at that point.

#### COLLECTION OF ASHES AND WASTE.

There was collected 3,427 loads of ashes and waste during the past year, at a cost of \$1.59 per load.

The cost of this service is constantly increasing and the amount of material handled has nearly doubled in recent years.

Coal ashes collected are taken to dumps on the outside roads during the winter and are used in the spring for road surfacing.

Other material is taken to the dump at the Messer Street yard and already a considerable area of storage yard has been made by filling into the lake. This land is so situated

that it is not only valuable now but must in the future greatly increase in value.

#### SURFACE WATER DRAINS.

The Fair Street drain from Court Street to the railroad was badly filled with tree roots, which gained access at the pipe joints. It was found necessary to take up and relay this whole section previous to the installation of the street pavement.

A drain was built on Winter Street from Jewett Brook to a point above Harlan Street, and a branch built in Autumn Street.

The usual amount of maintenance work was done on drains and catch basins and the system is in general good repair and condition, but as usual a great deal of trouble is caused by the roots from Carolina Poplar.

Drains are urgently needed in the following places. Gilbert Brook improvement with a branch through Jolliet, Baldwin, Lovell and Merrimack Streets. High Street to Beaman Street. Walker Street from Union Avenue, Union Avenue from Clark Brook to a point north of Clark Avenue.

#### FAIR STREET IMPROVEMENT.

Fair Street from Court Street to the B. & M. Railroad was improved by relaying drains, grading street and sidewalks, and paving with a bituminous macadam.

#### GENERAL REPAIRS AND MAINTENANCE OF ROADS.

An additional patrolman was added to that force for the season making seven in all who worked part or all of the time through the season.

The cost of this patrol was approximately \$8,000 for labor and teams, but the results obtained seem to justify this expenditure.

Ashes were applied as road surfacing with the usual good results.

Many culverts were replaced with corrugated iron pipe.

#### MAINTENANCE OF MACADAM ROADS

The cost of maintenance on 74,865 square yards laid previous to 1919, exclusive of State Roads, was \$3,634.66 or \$0.049 per square yard.

This is double the cost of three years ago but is principally due to the increased cost of labor and materials.

It will be necessary in the near future to scarify and re-treat some areas of tarvia macadam laid twelve years ago.

A section of tarvia macadam on Main Street opposite the Eagle Hotel was resurfaced with bituminous concrete.

#### NORTH MAIN STREET IMPROVEMENT.

North Main Street from Oak Street to the N. H. School for Feeble Minded Children was laid out as a State Aid Road and \$4,000 was appropriated by the New Hampshire Legislature together with \$4,000 from the City for improvement of the same. This road was graded, drains and sidewalks repaired and 6,261 square yards of bituminous macadam pavement laid.

#### SIDEWALKS.

Sidewalks were built on the following streets: Bay Street, crushed stone; Davis Place, tar concrete; High and Avery Streets, tar concrete; McGrath Street, tar concrete; Strafford Street, tar concrete; Union Avenue near Mechanic Street, tar concrete; Union Avenue, South Bayside Cemetery, crushed stone; Whipple Avenue, tar concrete.

More than the usual amount of repairing and recovering was done to both tar, concrete and crushed stone sidewalks.

#### STATE ROAD CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE.

Under the head of Maintenance, \$4,716.54 was expended. One half of this amount being furnished by the State.

The work covered consisted of dragging gravel sections, patching, tarring and oiling macadam sections of state road.



Under the head of Construction, \$21,865.84 was expended.

Two projects were appropriated for, North Main Street, and the incompleated section of the Weirs Boulevard. For the Boulevard \$10,000 was appropriated by the City, \$5,000 by the State and \$15,000 by the Federal Government. The work done consisted of grading, installation of culverts, building guard rails, enlarging bridge at Langley's Cove and shifting about 300 feet of the street railway's track at this point. It was found to be impossible to get enough crushed stone to build the pavement during the fall of 1919 and the work was discontinued. Materials are now being slowly received and stored for use this coming season.

The amount of the appropriation, \$30,000, is not enough to complete the unpaved section of the Weirs Boulevard and it would seem advisable to institute another project and make an additional appropriation to complete this road, if possible, during the season of 1920. That portion of the State Road from Stark Street to near Black Brook Bridge, built of water bound macadam in 1908, is now badly out of repair and should be picked up, reshaped, and resurfaced with bituminous macadam.

#### CANAL STREET IMPROVEMENT

Canal Street from Main Street to Beacon Street was laid out as a highway and it was determined to construct the same in a substantial manner. As a portion of the street as laid out lay over the Perley Canal, it was decided to enclose the canal in a reinforced concrete conduit of the same style and dimensions as existed under Bank Square, and to continue the conduit through and beyond Beacon Street so as to do away with the Beacon Street bridge.

This work was successfully accomplished by this department; the Beacon Street bridge removed and the hole graded to street level within the limits to be occupied by the streets.

The cost of this project to date was \$7,833.52 which included \$1,142.58 paid Laconia Car Company for power to replace power lost by reason of shutting off canal and \$228.90 paid for water used by Car Company.

There remains the following work to be done to complete the street, setting curbing, concreting sidewalks, removal and alterations of buildings and street pavement.

This work should be done as soon as possible this coming season.

The Car Company has promised the city a deed of the land occupied by the canal, 3,681 square feet in area, which lies outside of the streets, and this land should be available for building purposes.

#### GENERAL.

The department was able to spend about \$1,400 for new equipment, but is in need of many things which are labor savers and which would save money if they could be purchased.

An order has been placed for a scarifier attachment for our steam roller to break up old road surfaces, which must be paid for out of coming appropriation.

A power wagon loader to handle crushed stone, sand and gravel would be an economy.

A portable crushing and screening outfit is badly needed in view of the fact that crushed stone is very hard to obtain over the railroads, and the price is about three times what it was a few years ago.

Any delay in the arrival of construction materials when a gang of workmen are waiting for them is very costly and with conditions as they are, and are likely to continue to be, orders must be placed a long time in advance of the planned starting of a piece of work.

The appropriations for construction work should be decided on immediately after the inauguration of each new City Council so that plans could be made and materials provided.

Another motor truck should be provided.

The regular personnel of the department has remained about the same for several years and are entitled to the thanks and appreciation of our citizens for their faithful and intelligent service.

The following table shows the amount and kind of pavements existing on our streets and the year they were built.

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## REPORT OF THE CITY ENGINEER.

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*To the Board of Public Works:*

GENTLEMEN.—This department is back again on a normal basis as its personnel has returned from military service and taken up the work where it was left.

Lieut. J. H. Killourhy, 23rd Engineers, and William Blanchette, 603d Engineers returned from overseas service in June and took up their work in this department.

Eighteen men who have been employees in this department in recent years were in the military service of the United States during the late war.

Plans were made and lines and grades given for all the pieces of work undertaken during the season. Plans and estimates for all contemplated work were made.

A topographical survey was made of Opechee Park and a plan made for suggested improvements which is ready to be submitted to the City Council for adoption.

The cost of doing work in this department, as in all others, has about doubled in recent years, and an increased appropriation should be given to care for the necessary work.

Our records and plans are in good shape and stored in a fire proof vault. They are exceedingly valuable now to the city and many of them will be more so in future years. Very few cities of the size of Laconia have such valuable plans and records as has this city.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SEWERS.

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*To the Board of Public Works:*

GENTLEMEN.—The Opechee Park, Chester Court and Jackson Street sewer project was completed during the season.

There was laid 456 feet of 8 inch pipe and 1,198 feet of 6 inch pipe, 3 manholes and 4 lamp holes were built, at a total cost of \$3,106.55. A portion of this work was very expensive as there was in places a twenty foot cut through a hard gravelly clay formation and considerable ground water.

There are several streets unsewered which should be attended to as soon as possible.

The maintenance work was carefully attended to, the whole system thoroughly flushed, roots removed, new manholes built and repairs made. Much trouble was encountered from the roots, especially from the roots of Carolina Poplars, which are an unmitigated nuisance in public streets.

Thirty permits were issued to connect premises with the public sewer as against four issued in 1918.

### PLUMBING.

The Board of Examiners of Plumbers gave one examination to an applicant for a journeyman plumber's license and, he having passed a successful examination, a license was granted him.

One hundred and two permits to do plumbing were issued.

# PARK COMMISSION

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LACONIA, N. H., Feb. 6, 1920.

*To the Honorable Mayor and Council of the City of  
Laconia:*

GENTLEMEN.—The 6th annual report of the park commission is herewith presented for your consideration.

The commission has not as much to report of general development of park property as it would be glad to, owing to the absence of any income which can be expended on Opeeche Park, and to a lack of funds to acquire, or develop, bits of land throughout the city, which in a few years would so enhance its beauty.

Leavitt Park, owing to the forethought of its generous donor, has sufficient income to provide for a certain amount of permanent improvement each year, and \$570.18 has been expended the past season for the use of teams and labor for the necessary grading.

The working plan for Opeeche Park, authorized by your honorable body on May 27, 1918, has been prepared by City Engineer C. A. French, and all improvements will hereafter be made in accordance with this plan. Before much can be accomplished, it is necessary that a drain be laid, running the entire distance of the park, at an expense estimated at \$2,400.00. It is a permanent improvement, and one that must be made, not only because the deed of the property makes the maintenance of a drain obligatory, but because the natural drainage of the contiguous streets is into this area.

The park commission would, therefore, respectfully sug-

gest that you give this matter your careful consideration, and recommend that you appropriate the sum of \$2,400.00 for the same.

Few cities are so fortunate as to have a park so rich in natural resources as to require a minimum expenditure of money; a suitable entrance is, however, a much to be desired requisite; a grand fete held there on some holiday, might be the means of furnishing sufficient money to make a beginning, or some loyal Laconian might like to perpetuate his name through the coming generations, by leaving an enduring monument in the form of a stone gateway, built under his direction now, instead of under his executors' orders, years hence; and the work once started, would "carry on" by its own momentum.

Up to the present time every improvement made there has been possible only through the interest and generosity of the local horseman's association, which in August sent a check for \$141.72. This is in addition to what they have contributed in previous years. A portion of this money was used to paint the grand stand, to cut bushes and clear away the underbrush, and to provide for the playgrounds many things, which otherwise, the children would have had to have gone without, as the appropriation from the city of \$500.00 is absorbed by the salaries of the directors, leaving nothing for the many little expenses incidental to the work. Owing to the increased wage demand by all workers now, the commission feels, that in order to pay the expenses next year, that there should be an increase of at least \$100.00. They therefore, recommend an appropriation of \$600.00 for the playground this coming season.

The experimental stage of this work has long since passed, and its value to the community is generally recognized. Last season, the 6th for Opeeche and the 5th for Leavitt Park, showed no diminution in interest or attendance, although at the former playground, the average age of those attending was much younger than heretofore.

The problem of securing suitable directors, which at first seemed most difficult, was most happily solved in the securing of Mr. Ivan J. Martin from Springfield Y. M. C. A. College, and Miss Beatrice Clark, one of our own girls, and a student at Bates College, for Opeeche Park, and Mr. Albert Magee, who had just returned from overseas, and had had previous experience in the work, for Leavitt Park. At the latter playground, which had an eight weeks' session only, the grounds were supervised (voluntarily by Mr. Magee) two evenings each week in order that the older boys and young men might use the equipment, which while considered quite adequate, was added to during the season, through the efforts of the committee, Mr. and Mrs. Hollis Perkins and Mrs. Wesley Abbott, through whose interest this playground was originally started, and who had direct supervision over the work this year.

A drinking fountain has been installed (at the expense of the horseman's association) and, during a portion of the winter, the low land of the park was flooded, to provide a safe place for the smaller children to skate.

Both playgrounds furnished floats in the 4th of July parade, and were awarded a prize of \$5.00 each. Mr. Arthur D. O'Shea, who won a prize of \$25.00 on the same occasion, donated it to the playground, and the management of the Colonial Theater entertained about 500 children of the two playgrounds at a moving picture matinee on August 13. Both of these practical methods of showing interest in the work was much appreciated. Each playground held numerous picnics, in fact, every Tuesday was picnic day at Opeeche when the children were allowed to take their lunch and make a day of it, and no one but an overworked mother can understand the boon this was to them.

Hotly contested ball games between Opeeche and Leavitt furnished much excitement, and a Mother's afternoon, athletic meets and a lawn party has brought out large au-

diences; the latter has been especially successful as a money raiser, but the lighting has not been adequate to warrant many evening events. It is hoped that before another season opens this will have been remedied. The commission feel that the enthusiasm which the directors brought to their work is especially commendable.

The annual fair of Belknap County Pomona Grange has come to be an event looked forward too with interest by all, and was held in September, as heretofore, with the same gratifying success.

The commission heartily endorse any legitimate move looking toward a more general use of its parks, and will give any assistance in its power.

# FIRE DEPARTMENT.

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## REPORT OF FIRE CHIEF.

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*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:*

I have the honor of submitting for your consideration the annual report of the condition and operation of the Fire Department for the year ending February 15, 1920.

During the past year the department responded to one hundred and twenty-six Still Alarms and twenty-nine Box Alarms pulled in from various boxes. The insurance value of buildings endangered by fire was \$768,453.00. The total insurance paid on fire loss was \$14,696.95. The largest fire loss being the fire in Sanders Block, occupied by L. L. Philbrick Company, of \$5,468.00.

The department was called upon from Center Harbor on the night of June 21st to help save the town when the Colonial Hotel burned down. We sent 1,200 feet of fire hose, the auto pumping engine and twenty men.

On August 12th the town of Sanbornton sent a call for help. The Spaulding summer house burned down. December 10th, Tilton, N. H., called for help at midnight stating that their water supply had given out. The auto pumping engine responded with twenty men. The Thompson Block was destroyed by fire.

On April 21st at 7:40 a. m., a lady from Vermont, visiting some friends in Jackson Street, tried to mail a letter in the Fire Alarm Box, ringing in the alarm and bringing the whole department to the scene. The letter was taken out and mailed in the post office.

April 16, Box 25, at 3.45 p. m. Fire in auto at Page & Bushman Garage. Damage about \$25.00, covered by insurance.

April 19, Box 28. Fire in rubbish at Cooks Lumber Company yard. No damage.

## DIRECTIONS FOR GIVING AN ALARM.

To open the box break the glass and turn the key. In each box there is a small bell called a telltale, designated expressly for the purpose of informing you whether an alarm is being transmitted the instant you open the door.

Open the box and if this bell is not heard, pull down the hook the whole length of the slot once only and let go. But if this bell should be heard, it would indicate that another box had been pulled and it would be useless to attempt to pull another until the one already pulled had performed its mission. Unless your presence is most urgently required at the scene of the fire, remain at the box to direct the department.

Never open the box or touch anything pertaining to it except in case of fire.

Never give an alarm for a fire seen at a distance.

Be reasonably sure that there is a fire before giving an alarm.

Never give an alarm for a chimney fire unless there is imminent danger of the building catching.

The fire alarm system is under the direction of the Chief Engineer.

I would submit for your consideration the following recommendations:

The heating apparatus at the Central Station. The boiler is worn out. A new one should be installed this year.

The motor apparatus has done excellent work the past year but we must provide for Horse Drawn apparatus during the winter months. I would recommend the purchase of another Motor Truck. The Hook and Ladder equipment at the Lakeport station should be put on a motor driven truck. We are depending on a horse from the livery stable to haul this apparatus to fires, the horse furnished being too light for this work. The members of the Company get discouraged with this good for nothing outfit

The personel of the Department is first class. The equipment is well cared for.

In behalf of the members of the Department I wish to thank His Honor the Mayor and City Council for the interest taken in us, also for the support we get from City Engineer, Mr. French, when we call on him for assistance from his Department. Also we appreciate the help from the Police Department for their assistance in responding to night fires.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF FIRE ALARM SYSTEM.

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The fire alarm system is in fairly good condition at present. During the past year owing to the high cost of material no new additions have been added.

During the coming year new wire will have to be strung in Union Avenue from Casino Square to Junction of Messer Street and must be changed across the street on the new poles. Several places in the circuits must be repaired changing from different poles. It will cost about one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to put this fire alarm system in good condition.

Also repairs must be made to the electrical apparatus in the Fire Station as a volunteer fire department is dependent upon the alarm system wholly for responding to fires. We must try to keep this system in good working order all the time.

Hoping this will receive your careful consideration during the coming year.

## REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

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*To the Honorable Board of Trustees of the Laconia Public Library:*

Gentlemen: I have not been able to prepare my usual detailed report for the year 1919 in season to have it printed with the reports of the other departments. Only the table of statistics of circulation and registration was ready when the last call for copy came. I have worked ten hours a day during the past four months, but the routine work devolving upon me has left no time for preparing the report.

Eleven years ago, I stated that a second floor of stacks should be added in the summer of 1909. The cost at that time would have been about one-third what it would be now. It could have been added then without greatly deranging the library. The shelving is now so crowded that at least one room will be closed to the public, and thousands of books will be unavailable while the work is being done. Several thousand books, all the pamphlets, and nearly all the periodicals are now in the basement. About one thousand new books are added each year. For every new book added, an old book must be sent to the basement. About two thousand books, pamphlets, and periodicals were brought from the basement for reference use in 1919. The loan-desk attendant can not leave the desk to get these, so someone else must go. During the noon hour, and after 4:30 p. m., I must stop my own work and get what is wanted. I must also do much of the reference work during these, the busiest, hours of the day. As a result, I have not been able to do my other work. The

conditions must grow worse continuously until an assistant can be provided who will keep order, do the reference work, and bring what is wanted from the basement. Mrs. Davis has done some reference work, but her other duties do not permit her to do very much for the library. She has greatly assisted me by reading book reviews and preparing lists of books for purchase.

A great improvement in the lighting systems was made at each library. All table lights were removed, and the Phenolite system of semi-indirect lighting was installed. Both libraries are now so well lighted that newspapers may be read in any part of any of the rooms.

Fourteen hundred and seventy-two unbound periodicals were loaned during the year, a gain of 78 per cent. Periodicals constituted almost exactly three and one-half per cent of the loans for home use. The total circulation of fiction fell below 80 per cent for both libraries for the first time. No other class of books furnished as many loans as periodicals.

The usual statistics of growth and use will be compiled as soon as practicable, and may be published separately.

# CITY SOLICITOR'S REPORT.

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*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:*

I have the honor to submit my report as City Solicitor of Laconia. During the year last past, the City has been entirely free from any new litigation and the City has not been named as a defendant in any action nor have any suits been instituted by the City. At the October, 1919, Term of the Superior Court for Belknap County, there were only three cases on the Court Docket in which the City was involved being:—E. P. Thompson vs. Laconia being an appeal from the layout of a highway known as Cook's Court, which appeal is still under consideration; G. H. Tilton & Son vs. Laconia, is another appeal from a layout of a highway to which much attention has been given but in which no trial has taken place; and Claribel Clark vs. Laconia, is a bill in Equity relating to a drain at Lakeport which has been on the docket since 1914, but at present no adjustment has been reached. During the past year I have attended to the legal services of the City in the matter of all tax titles and deeds, and made the proper papers for the same. A great many questions demanding legal opinions have arisen during the year which have also been attended to. Much time has been spent in carrying on and adjusting criminal cases in the Laconia Municipal Court in matters which concerned the welfare of the City. All cases which have been submitted to the Law Department of the City have received careful attention.

# VICTORY GARDENS.

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## REPORT OF SUPERVISOR.

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*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:*

Gentlemen: In consideration of my report and recommendation of last year, your Honorable Body saw fit to appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars with which to finance the preparation of victory gardens for the season of 1919.

There were ninety-one gardens, of about one-eighth acre each, prepared and allotted, as compared with about one hundred, the year before. The cost of labor in preparing the gardens was three hundred and ninety-three dollars and ninety-three cents, of which amount two hundred fifty two dollars and seventeen cents has been repaid by those having the gardens, leaving a balance of one hundred forty-one dollars and seventy-six cents, net cost to the city by reason of the undertaking.

The enthusiasm in the garden work did not run quite as high as it did during the year previous, owing, I presume, to the close of the war, and people returning to normal conditions.

A great majority of those having the gardens, report a reasonable crop in return for their efforts, and some have already expressed the desire for the continuance of their gardens.

Owing to so many of the gardens having been planted for three successive seasons, and as a majority like to plant at least one half to potatoes, it does not seem to me the

same ground would be advisable for potatoes, as the crop usually does best on new or broken-up land; consequently, I cannot recommend the continuance of the gardens under city supervision for the coming season.

The park land that was used quite extensively for gardens would serve more people for recreation purposes, and as the scarcity of food will not be felt so keenly as during the war, I would recommend that the land taken for gardens be re-seeded to grass this year.

If there are those who care to continue the gardening, I would recommend that they club together and operate such land as they need, using similar methods as was used in preparing the municipal gardens.

Hon. Henry B. Quinby and Arthur D. O'Shea very generously contributed the use of their land again last season, and in behalf of the gardeners and myself, I wish to express our sincere appreciation.
