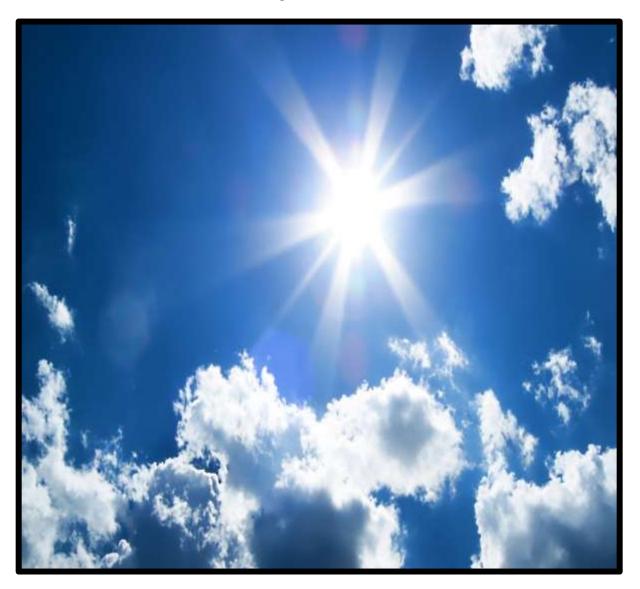

The Theme of our 2019 Town Report is "Nelson's Leadership in the Use of Clean, Renewable, Energy" from the Sun.

At the outset, we'd like to thank those folks in town who have allowed us to photograph and to include in this Town Report, pictures of the solar arrays that they have installed on their property. I'm sure that they will all tell you how pleasant it is to watch the sun shine on their solar array and the kWh's accumulate on their Eversource production meter. The folks who own their array can also tell you how pleasant it is to receive their electric bill from Eversource with the phrase "No Payment Due" in the upper right hand corner.

In the summer of 2016 the Town of Nelson had installed our first solar array on the roof of our library. Since that time that array has produced an average of 10,000 kWh annually, with a value of approximately \$2,000 per year. In this Town Report, you will find an Article developed by our Town Buildings Committee and wholeheartedly supported by your Select Board, to purchase and have installed a new solar array. This new array, in conjunction with the array already in place on the roof of our library, will provide all of the electricity that we need to power the lights and plug-loads in all of our town buildings. With your support at Town Meeting, we will be on our way to providing our town with clean, renewable, cost-effective energy, the benefits of which we all can share and enjoy.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Nelson Nelson, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Nelson, New Hampshire, as of and for the year ended December 31, 2018, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, which includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Nelson, as of December 31, 2018, and the respective changes in financial position thereof, and the budgetary comparison statement for the General Fund, for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the pension related schedules on pages 25 and 26 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's response to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

The Town of Nelson has not presented a management's discussion and analysis. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America have determined that the management's discussion and analysis is necessary to supplement, but is not required to be part of, the basic financial statements.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Nelson's basic financial statements as a whole. The combining and individual fund schedules are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. They are the responsibility of management and were derived from, and relate directly to, the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole

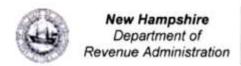

Article 01 Choose necessary Town Officers for year ensuing

To Choose necessary Town Officers for year ensuing.

This article appears on the Official Ballot.

Article 02 Purchase of New Grader

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$313,747 for the purpose of purchasing a new 2020 John Deere 672G Motor Grader. \$18,000 in offsetting funds to come from trade-in value of the Town Owned 1986 Motor Grader, and further to authorize the withdrawal of up to \$110,747 from the Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose, and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$185,000 of bonds,or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and to authorize the municipal officials to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon with a repayment term of 5 years. The Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2019 was approximately 113,445. The Road Agent recommends this article. The Road Equipment Committee recommends this article. The Selectmen do not recommend this article 3-0. (Two thirds secret ballot vote required)

Article 03 To defray the Town charges for the year ensuing

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$958,825 for general municipal operations of Town departments including Executive, Administrative, Cemetery, Fire, Police, Highway, Emergency Management, Health Officer, Conservation Commission, Agricultural Commission, Planning and Zoning Boards, for the year ensuing. This article has anticipated offsetting revenue of \$270,730.

The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article 04 Purchase and Installation of Grid-Tied Solar Array

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$135,000 for the purpose of purchasing and installing a grid-tied solar array with a size of at least 40 kW DC, to be installed on the East facing roofs of the Nelson Highway Barn and the Nelson Safety Building, or on the West facing roof of the Nelson Sand/Salt Storage Building. Further to include any modifications necessary to upgrade roof structural strength as well as the purchase and installation of any mechanical or electrical components necessary to complete service to all Town Buildings. The goal of this project will be to provide the energy needed to power the lighting and plug loads in all town owned buildings, except for the Town Hall which will be powered by the solar array on the roof of the library. Further to authorize the withdrawal of up to \$135,000 from the Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund created for such qualifying purposes with and no funding to come from taxes. The Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund Balance as of 12/31/2019 was approximately 138,692. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article 05 Support of Town Library

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,363 for the support of the Town library, \$35,363 to be raised by taxes and \$5,000 to come from Library Memorial Funds, gifts, grants, and other sources. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.



Article 06 Funding of Various Social Service Agencies

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,311 for support of social service agencies which provide assistance to Nelson residents. The agencies chosen to receive funds are: American Red Cross (\$350), The Community Kitchen Inc. (\$500), Home Health Care Services (\$550), Monadnock Family Services (\$911), Southwestern Community Services (\$500), Monadnock Region child Advocacy Center (\$1,500), Hundred Nights Inc. (\$500), and Casa for Children (\$500). In 2019, \$7,187 was paid in support of social service agencies and Nelson residents were provided over \$204,806 in food, services, discounts and direct assistance. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0

Article 07 Repair, clean and restore damaged headstones

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,500 to repair, clean and restore damaged headstones in the Nelson cemeteries. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article 08 Add funds to Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to be added to the Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund previously established. No withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the town. The Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2019 was approximately \$138,692. The Selectmen Recommend this article 3-0.

Article 09 Add funds to Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to be added to the Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established for the purpose of Fire Apparatus purchases for the Fire Department. No withdrawals may be made from this Fund except by vote of the Town and upon recommendation of the Fire Chief. The Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2019 was approximately \$227,202. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article 10 Add funds to Milfoil Prevention and Treatment ETF

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be added to the Milfoil Prevention Expendable Trust Fund previously established. The fund balance as of 12/31/2019 was approximately \$31,504. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article 11 Funding for fighting forest fires with anticipated

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the purpose of fighting forest fires. This sum to come as reimbursement from the NH State Fire Warden and no amount will be raised through taxation. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article 12 Add funds to Police Equipment Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the Police Equipment Capital reserve fund previously established. No withdrawals may be made from this fund except by vote of the Town and with the recommendation of the Police Chief. The Police Equipment Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2019 was approximately \$31,278. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.



Article 13 Add funds to Nelson Bridge Repair/Replacement ETF

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the Nelson Bridge Repair or Replacement Expendable Trust Fund previously established. Funds are to be used for the extensive repairs or replacement of bridges in the town of Nelson. The Selectmen are the agents to expend said funds.

The Nelson Bridge Repair or Replacement Expendable Trust Fund balance as of 12/31/2019 was approximately \$20,741. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article 14 Add funds to Road Equip. Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to be added to the Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established. No withdrawals may be made from this fund except by vote of the Town upon recommendation of the Road Equipment Committee. The Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2019 was approximately \$113,445. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article 15 Reclaiming and Repaving Center Pond Road

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum \$115,000 for the purpose of Reclaiming and Repaving Center Pond Road. It being understood that this project will be done in two stages. The "Reclaiming" process will occur in 2020, removing the existing asphalt to the road base, followed by a period of time to allow for complete settling and then final repaving to be completed in 2021. This special warrant article will be a non-lapsing appropriation per RSA 32:7, VI and will not lapse until the Repaving is completed or by December 31, 2021, whichever is sooner. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation 3-0.

Article 16 Pave Parking area at Granite Lake Fire Station

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,500 for the purpose of Paving the existing gravel driveway and roof drip line area at Granite Lake Fire Station. The goal is to prevent soil erosion and mitigate the migration of detrimental sediment into Granite Lake. The paving will allow water run-off to flow easily without picking up and carrying harmful sediment. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article 17 Fund other patrols/details performed by Nelson PD

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 for the purpose of patrols or details performed by the Nelson Police Department for the State of New Hampshire, Cheshire County Sheriff's Department, other municipalities or authorized private entities. The total sum to come from offsetting grants and/or revenues received for said patrols and details and no amount to be raised through taxation. The Police Chief recommends this appropriation. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Article 18 By Petition - Support for Nelson School Students

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,950 for the Game of Village Inc., a 501(c)3 non-profit organization, to support the expenses of Nelson resident school students in order to attend Village 2020 - a summer learning experience. All children who live in Nelson and are entering 5th-8th grades may attend. This is a "Petitioned Article". The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

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NELSON TOWN MEETING MINUTES

MARCH 12 & 16, 2019

The election portion of the Town Meeting was held on Tuesday March 12, 2019 and for the first time in 3 years it was a lovely early spring day. The polls opened at 11 am and closed at 7 pm. 152 voters cast their ballots.

Article 01 Choose necessary Town Officers for year ensuing

The business portion of the meeting was held on Saturday, March 16 and started promptly at 10 am. A cub scout from Pack 530 presented the colors and lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance. Lew Derby, the moderator went over the correct procedural rules for a town meeting as set down by the State of New Hampshire. The respectful and civil manner in which our town business is conducted was also stressed. The meeting began with Article 2 since Article 1 was decided by ballot votes on March 12, 2019.

Article 02 To defray the Town charges for the year ensuing

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$881,767 for general municipal operations of Town departments including Executive, Administrative, Cemetery, Fire, Police, Highway, Emergency management, Health Officer, Conservation Commission, Agricultural Commission, Planning and Zoning Boards, for the year ensuing. This article has anticipated offsetting revenue of \$234,185. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by David Upton and seconded by Lisa Sieverts. Selectmen Upton spoke to the article by going through the budget department by department. Questions were asked by various members of the audience and answered by Selectmen Upton. Mike Blaudschun then made an amendment to Article 2 to reduce the original amount of \$881,767 to \$869,767. This was seconded by Kelly French. Mike stated that the reduction he is proposing should be reflected in the Selectmen's salaries. There was much discussion around this topic from those who support the salary raise and those who don't A paper ballot was requested.

Amendment Failed

Further discussion ensured. A "call for question" was made by Lisa Sieverts

Article PASSED by a voice vote

Article 03 Support of Town Library

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$39,150 for the support of the Town library, \$34,059 to be raised by taxes and \$5,091 to come from Library Memorial Funds, gifts, grants, and other sources. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

The moderator recused himself from facilitating this article since he is a trustee of the library. Rick Church filled in for him. Motion to accept the article as read was made by David Upton and seconded by Gary Robinson. Susan Peery spoke to this article. Our library is in excellent condition with high participation and good circulation. She thanked the Librarian, her staff and the Friends of the Library for all the good work they do.

Article PASSED by a voice vote.

Article 04 Funding of various social service agencies

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,187 for support of social service agencies which provide assistance to Nelson residents. The agencies chosen to receive funds are: American Red Cross (\$350), The Community Kitchen Inc. (\$2,000), Home Health Care Services (\$550), Monadnock Family Services (\$911), Southwestern Community Services (\$586), Monadnock Region child Advocacy Center (\$1,500), Hundred Nights Inc. (\$500), MCVP Crisis & Prevention Center (\$290), and Casa for Children (\$500). In 2018, \$6,502 was paid in support of social service agencies and Nelson residents were provided over \$187,800 in food, services, discounts and direct assistance. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0

Motion to accept the article as read was made by David Upton and seconded by Maury Collins. David Upton spoke to this article.

Article PASSED by a voice vote

Article 05 Repair, clean and restore damaged headstones

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to repair, clean and restore damaged headstones in the Nelson and Munsonville cemeteries. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by David Upton and seconded by Sanda Romano. Elaine Giacomo spoke to this article.

Article PASSED by a voice vote

Article 06 Add funds to Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to be added to the Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund previously established. No withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the town. The Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2018 was approximately \$110,900. The Selectmen Recommend this article 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by David Upton and seconded by Maury Collins. David Upton spoke to the article A couple of questions were asked and answered.

Article PASSED by a voice vote

Article 07 Add funds to Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to be added to the Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established for the purpose of Fire Apparatus purchases for the Fire Department. No withdrawals may be made from this Fund except by vote of the Town and upon recommendation of the Fire Chief. The Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2018 was approximately \$197,529. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by David Upton and seconded by Gary Robinson. David Upton spoke to this article

Article PASSED by a voice vote.

Article 08 Add funds to Milfoil Prevention and Treatment Expendable Trust Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be added to the Milfoil Prevention Expendable Trust Fund previously established. The fund balance as of 12/31/2018 was approximately \$29,838. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by David Upton and seconded by Rick Church. Rick Church spoke to this article. Tom Newcombe explained the financial distribution from the Trust Funds.

Article PASSED by a voice vote

Article 09 Add funds to The Nelson Conservation Commission Irrevocable Expendable Trust Fund

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$127,017 to be added to The Nelson Conservation Commission Irrevocable Expendable Trust Fund as previously established for the purpose of funding costs associated with the acquisition, care, maintenance, protection, improvement and/or public use of Conservation/recreational land in the Town of Nelson. All funds (\$127,017) to come from a withdrawal of Conservation Commission funds currently held in the Nelson Conservation Commission checking account. Said funds being a portion of the grant received from the Land and Water Conservation fund Program exclusively for these purposes. No funds are to come from taxation. The IET fund balance as of 12/31/2018 was \$41.

The Selectmen recommendation this article 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by David Upton and seconded by Maury Collins. Tom Newcombe made an amendment to increase the sum of \$127,017 to \$132,017. David Upton seconded the amendment. David Upton spoke to this.

The amendment PASSED by a voice vote.

Article as amended PASSED by a voice vote

Article 10 Funding for fighting forest fires with anticipated reimbursement

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the purpose of fighting forest fires. This sum to come as reimbursement from the NH State Fire Warden and no amount will be raised through taxation. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by David Upton and seconded by Gary Robinson. David Upton spoke to this article.

Article PASSED by a voice vote

Article 11 Add funds to Police Equipment Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the Police Equipment Capital reserve fund previously established. No withdrawals may be made from this fund except by vote of the Town and with the recommendation of the Police Chief. The Police Equipment Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2018 was approximately \$20,676. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by David Upton and seconded by Maury Collins. David Upton spoke to this article and also mentioned the possible replacing of the police cruiser.

Article PASSED by a voice vote

Fund other patrols/details performed by Nelson Police Department

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 for the purpose of patrols or details performed by the Nelson Police Department for the State of New Hampshire, Cheshire County Sheriff's Department, other municipalities or authorized private entities. The total sum to come from offsetting grants and/or revenues received for said patrols and details and no amount to be raised through taxation. The Police Chief recommends this appropriation. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by David Upton and seconded by Gary Robinson. David Upton spoke to this article. Questions were asked and answered by Chief Richard Pratt.

Article PASSED by a voice vote

Article 13 Add funds to Highway Equip. Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to be added to the Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established. No withdrawals may be made from this fund except by vote of the Town upon recommendation of the Road Equipment Committee. The Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2018 was approximately \$86,190. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by David Upton and seconded by Gary Robinson. David Upton spoke to this article. The Road Agent, Mike Tarr was then called upon to answer some questions. He was greeted by the audience with heartfelt applause for all the hard work that he and Nick Barrett do to keep our roads safe during all kinds of weather.

Article PASSED by a voice vote

Article 14 Add funds to Nelson Bridge Repair/Replacement ETF

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be added to the Nelson Bridge Repair or Replacement Expendable Trust Fund previously established. Funds are to be used for the extensive repairs or replacement of bridges in the town of Nelson. The Selectmen are the agents to expend said funds.

The Nelson Bridge Repair or Replacement Expendable Trust Fund balance as of 12/31/2018 was approximately \$15,331.

The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by David Upton and seconded by Maury Collins. David Upton spoke to this article. Article PASSED by a voice vote.

Article 15 Asphalt paving for Henderson Road

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,000 for the purpose of paving Henderson Road. The selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by David Upton and seconded by Gary Robinson. David Upton spoke to this article. There was much discussion concerning this article. Mike Tarr provided a good explanation of why in the long run it's cheaper to pave a road.

Article PASSED by a voice vote

Article 16 Renovate & replace the Floor in the Town Hall

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 for the purpose of renovating and replacing the floor in the Town Hall, including the entryway, and associated closet areas. This article has anticipated offsetting revenue of \$10,000 by way of donation, however this article is not contingent on fulfillment of the donation. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by David Upton and seconded by Maury Collins. David Upton spoke to the article. After some discussion about the condition of the floor and in particular the Town Hall which was noted is on the National Land Mark Registrar.

Article PASSED by a voice vote

Article 17 Purchase a new Firefighting Pumper/Tanker Truck

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$220,000 for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a new Firefighting Pumper/Tanker Truck, and to authorize the withdrawal of up to \$192,000 from the Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. The balance of \$28,000 to come from taxes. The Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund balance as of 12/31/2018 was approximately \$197,529. This article is non-tapsing until December 31, 2020. The Nelson Fire and Rescue Department and the Nelson Fire and Rescue Equipment Committee support this article. The Fire Chief recommends this article. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by David Upton and seconded by Gary Robinson. Bob Lenox spoke to this article. Jason Walter, the Fire Chief responded to the questions and also thanked the Nelson Fire and Rescue Equipment Committee for their help in locating this piece of equipment.

Article PASSED by a voice vote

Article 18 Create new "Nelson Fire and Rescue Equipment Committee"

To see if the Town will vote to create a new "Nelson Fire and Rescue Equipment Committee" to replace the existing committee of the same name, with the purpose to work with the Nelson Fire and Rescue Department to evaluate and recommend Equipment needs of the Fire and Rescue Department and to aid and assist the Board of Selectmen in its consideration of funding said equipment. The committee will work with the Fire and Rescue Department in preparing its recommendations to the Board of Selectmen of short and long term capital equipment purchases by the Town, and to explore and recommend to the Board of Selectmen grant opportunities available for the acquisition of Fire and Rescue equipment by the Town. The Committee shall consist of three (3) members each elected for staggered three year terms by vote at the annual Town meeting and one nonvoting liaison from the Board of Selectmen. The Fire Chief shall be an ex officio nonvoting member. Further, to achieve the staggered term for election, approve the following as members: Robert Lenox for 3 years, Barbara Roland for 2 years, and John Bunce for 1 year to begin immediately. If this Article is approved, the existing Committee of the same name would cease. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by David Upton and seconded by Maury Collins. David Upton spoke to this article. Bob Lenox then came to the front of the room to speak against the article and made an amendment that was seconded by Mike Blaudschun. The amendment was a rewording of the original article mostly concerned with the writing and submitting of grants. Bob Lenox passed out copies of his amendment to the audience and gave a copy to the moderator. He spoke about his frustrations and his concerns. There was much discussion. Bob Lenox then decided to withdraw his amendment. Zack Byam made an amendment to add the word "write" to the following sentence: "The committee will work with the Fire and Rescue Department in preparing its recommendations to the Board of Selectmen of short and long term capital equipment purchases by the town, and to explore, (write,) and recommend to the Board of Selectmen grant opportunities available for the acquisition of Fire and Rescue equipment by the Town. This amendment was seconded by Mike Blaudschun.

The amendment PASSED on a voice vote.
The article as amended PASSED on a voice vote

Article 19 Purchase speed monitoring display sign

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for the purpose of purchasing a speed monitoring display sign including internal radar and associated accessories. The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by David Upton and seconded by Maury Collins. David Upton spoke to this article. Mary Cornog described the appearance and the functions of the display sign. There was much discussion on this topic, the problem with speeding in town and the possibility of having more police coverage. Chief Pratt mentioned a more expensive sign which he favored. Al Stoops made an amendment to increase the sum to \$12,500. Ed Schillemat seconded it. There was further discussion. Peter Smith called for a vote.

The amendment FAILED on a voice vote The article PASSED on a voice vote

Article 20 By Petition - Support for Nelson School Students

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,950 for the Game of Village Inc., a non-profit 501(c)3 organization, to support the expenses of Nelson resident school students in order to attend Village 2019 - a summer learning experience. All children who live in Nelson and are entering 5th-8th grades may attend. This is a "Petitioned Article". The Selectmen recommend this article 3-0.

Motion to accept the article as read was made by Tom Buttrick and seconded by Val Van Meier. Tom Buttrick spoke to the article and to how successful the "Game of Village, Inc" has been. Elizabeth Williams also spoke in support of this article.

The article PASSED on a voice vote

2019 REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES

In 2019, the five trustees and alternate Gretchen Ezell met monthly (except in July) with library director Kris Finnegan to discuss library matters, including programs, budget, personnel, and any other library-related items.

During the month of July, the library sponsored the weekly Summer Forums on Thursday evenings in the town hall. These popular talks, free and open to the public, focus on subjects of local or regional interest, and are often presented by local speakers. The talks for 2019 featured Marshall Davenson (on Nelson's geologic history), Steve Roberge (on ticks), Rick Church and Steven Lamonde (on using LIDAR to find lost landmarks), and Dr. Steve Hathcock (on hospice care). Thank you to our speakers, and also to the local musicians who start each program off with live music.

Trustees attended several workshops and regional meetings sponsored by the New Hampshire Library Trustees Association. These informative sessions keep us up to date on policies and regulations. In the course of the year, we also reviewed and updated library policies and the library director's job description. Judy Waterston shared her professional expertise on how to start a planned giving program. The trustees also approved the design and new URL for the library's website, nelsonlibrary.org.

The trustees thank Library Director Kris Finnegan and assistants Heidi Tompkins and Brenna Kucinski. They are dedicated to making our library a free and open community resource. We also thank sexton Wayne Fulton for cleaning and maintaining our building.

We are fortunate to have our beautiful library, an experienced and enthusiastic staff, and support from town residents, who can check out books, movies, and other traditional library materials, use the computers, attend programs, and socialize with their neighbors. We thank our many volunteers who donate time, books, landscaping and carpentry skills, and many other gifts. We especially thank the Friends of the Olivia Rodham Memorial Library for their generous support. This year, we also received many small donations and several unexpected gifts. Thank you to everyone!

2019 Report of the Olivia Rodham Memorial Library

The Olivia Rodham Memorial Library is striving to meet the needs of the Nelson community. Far from being a simple repository of books, today's library serves as an invaluable resource for everything from EBooks and downloadable audiobook collections, DVDs, and the State Library's Inter-Library Loan service. It is a community center with a weekly coffee hour, classes, get-togethers and lectures. The library actively engages the community and is filled with conversations about our latest interesting program, movies, people drawing, folding origami, using computers, and kids playing with match boxes, legos and puppets. The activities that take place at this public library are a direct reflection of this community's interests. Our new webpage nelsonlibrary.org contains a community events calendar listing and other community information. So visit your public library often, suggest a new book or activity, or volunteer.

What the Olivia Rodham Memorial Library offers you:

- Our library is open 18 hours a week, and is free and open to the public.
- Nelson residents may borrow books, audio books on CD, magazines, a telescope, DVDs, kids games and puzzles, puppets, craft kits.
- Online services include library computers, WiFi printers, and a scanner.
- More online services that can be accessed in the library or from home: downloadable eBooks, audio books, Kindle books, and EBSCO, a periodical data base.
- Special programs: author talks, summer forums, wildlife speakers, and Nelson history topics.
- Monthly and weekly programs: Coffee hour every Saturday, book group, cookbook book group with a potluck, summer reading program with activities.
- Webpage: nelsonlibrary.org with town events, a town events calendar, links to local groups and events.
- NH Humanities 2019 programs: <u>Songs of Emigration: Storytelling Through Traditional Irish Music</u> and <u>The Guitar in Latin America: Continuities, Changes and Bicultural Strumming</u>
- Origami, singing, movies, snap circuits, Lego, and gems and rocks.
- Art Shows and openings: Marina Powdermaker and Mary Cornog: local artists.

Events at the library, organized by the library: 135 events this year with 1,381 participants.

Books groups met 21 times with 169 people discussing.

Coffee Hour was held 54 times with 432 participants.

NH Humanities: 2 programs enjoyed by 56 in the audiences.

Art, crafts and genealogy: 8 meeting and 54 attendees.

Saturday morning speakers: 28 times with 411participants.

Summer Forums were presented 4 times and had a total of 199 attendees.

Kids Programs met 6 times and totaled 60 participants.

12 movies.

Use of the library meeting room and the library by groups: There were 175 meetings by 14 groups. The library meeting room on the lower level is used for meetings and events by the following groups: Agricultural Commission, Conservation Board, Shape Note Singers, Roads Scholar, Game of Village, Friends of the Library, Library trustee meetings, Monadnock Folklore Society, Cemetery Board, Nelson School Auction, and Library COOP, and the monthly book sale.

The library is thankful for the 148.5 hours that volunteers put in this year at the library. There were many other contributions and every one helps keep the Olivia Rodham Memorial Library the community resource it is today. Many donations are made also of actual books, audio-visual materials, and magazines. Al Stoops donated the subscription to *Northern Woodlands*, a magazine.

Friends of the Library

The Friends of the Library have two ways to raise funds for the library: the annual book sale on Old Home Day and the monthly book sale on the 1st Saturday of every month (9 am-11 am on the lower level of the library). This year the annual sale earned \$1000.32, reported treasurer Betsey Church. Book sales, \$590.32; with the remainder from memberships in the Friends. Donna Kidd, the president of the Friends, supervised the sale, which requires weeks of sorting and last-minute arranging and labeling on tables in the rooms in the library lower level. This could not be accomplished without the generous help of many volunteers.

NELSON SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

Date: March 8, 2019

Nelson Elementary School

The meeting was called to order by Moderator Lewis Derby at 7:00 p.m.

The meeting began with a demonstration from the Nelson School Robotics teams, who showed how they operated their robotic vehicles to collect or deliver ping pong sized balls. Following the demonstration, the children led those assembled in the Pledge of Allegiance. Moderator Lewis Derby read the rules of the meeting. In attendance were Nelson School Principal, Ron Upton; SAU 29 Superintendent, Robert Malay; Business Administrator for Towns, Scott Lazzaro; and Dotty Frazier, Assistant Superintendent as well as School Board members, Kelly French, Rich Popovic, and Eric Marean. 24 voters attended the meeting.

Article 1:

To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto. Kelly French moved to accept the article as read. Rich Popovic seconded, and the article passed unanimously by voice vote.

Article 2:

To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of \$2,171,305 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for the school district officials and agents, and for the payment for the statutory obligations of the district. This article does not include appropriations contained in special or individual articles addressed separately. (Majority vote required)

Kelly French moved to accept the article as read. Rich Popovic seconded. Kelly French moved to amend Article 2 to change the amount to \$2,013,655. Rich Popovic seconded. After a brief explanation for the amendment, the amendment passed by voice vote.

Kelly French explained the budget as amended. After some discussion, the article passed unanimously by voice vote.

Article 3:

Shall the District accept the provisions of RSA 195-A (as amended) for the Nelson School District to join an area school located in Keene which serves grade 6 in a plan which currently includes the school districts of Keene, Sullivan, Surry, and Stoddard, all in accordance with the provisions of the plan on file with the district clerk?

Kelly French moved the article be accepted as read. Rich Popovic seconded. After an explanation for the article and some discussion, the article passed by voice vote.

Article 4

To see if the school district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund established by the voters of the District at the March, 1972, District Meeting for the purpose of construction/ reconstruction of buildings and/or purchase of equipment, and/or the acquisition of land for school purposes. This sum to come from June 30 fund balance available for transfer on July 1. No amount to be raised from taxation. (The Board recommends this article) (Majority vote required)

Kelly French moved the article be accepted as read. Rich Popovic seconded. After a brief discussion, the article passed unanimously by voice vote.

Article 5

To see if the school district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be added to the Special Education/Middle and High School Tuition Expendable Trust Fund established by the voters on March 5, 1999, for the purpose of paying future year unanticipated special education/ and or middle and high school tuition's. This sum to come from June 30 fund balance available for transfer on July 1. No amount to be raised from taxation. (The Board recommends this article) (Majority vote required)

Kelly French moved the article be accepted as read. Rich Popovic seconded. After some discussion, the article passed unanimously by voice vote.

Article 6:

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Thanks was given to Paul Giacomo and Betsy Street for their roles in support of the Robotics Teams at Nelson School. Ron Upton and Joy Birdsey announced upcoming events of the Nelson School. Kelly French moved that the meeting be adjourned. The meeting was adjourned at 8:00 pm

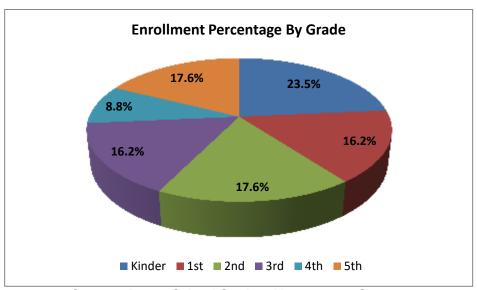
DISTRICT REPORT

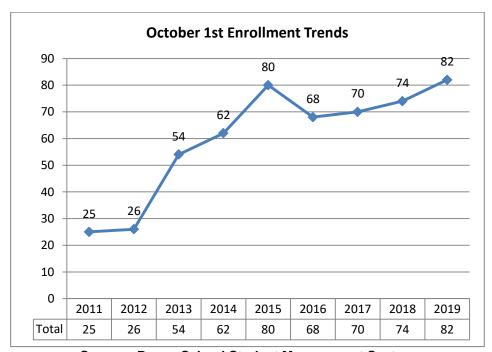
Enrollment

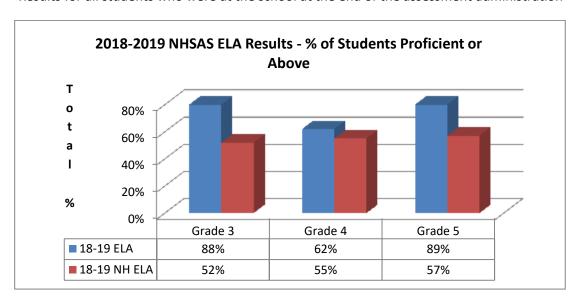
Facility / Maintenance

Last spring a new alarm system was installed. Electrical work has also been done to address some issues in the building. We are also working with a contractor to make repairs that are needed inside and outside of the building.

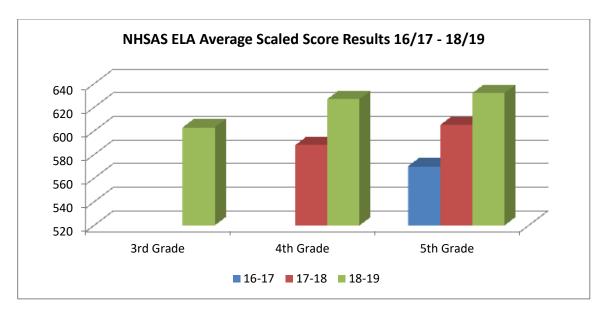
Community Support / Service/Volunteers

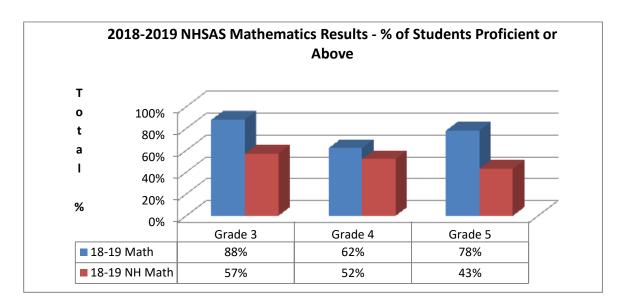
Results for all students who were at the school at the end of the assessment administration



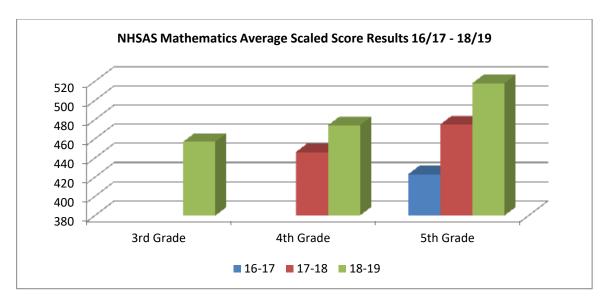

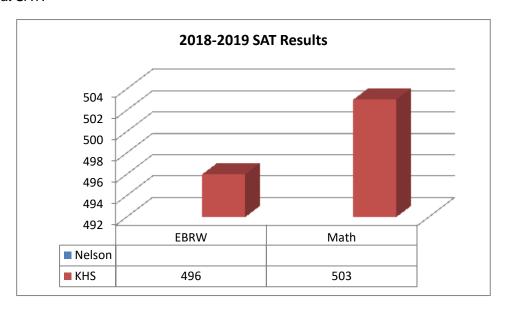

Academic Programs

We continue to use Eureka Math after adopting that program a few years ago. We are continuing to being trained and are implementing strategies from Keys to Literacy and Writing. Some staff members are receiving LETRS training and Developmental Design training and are implementing best practices from those programs as well. In addition to our regular classroom curriculum, we offer daily specials to all of our students. We continue to collaborate with the Harris Center which provides a Naturalist working with our students each week. Spanish, Art, Physical Education, and Music also meet one day a week in each of our classes. These teachers collaborate with our classroom teachers to ensure smooth transitions and themes or content that is appropriate to what is happening in their classrooms whenever possible. We are also implementing a social emotional curriculum called Second Step. Second Step is a research-based, teacher-informed, and classroom-tested program that focuses on social-emotional development, safety, and the well-being of students. Staff have also been working closely with educational consultant Mike Anderson, who has a Responsive Classroom background and has worked with many schools in SAU 29, on topics such as intrinsic and extrinsic motivation related to discipline and academic motivational systems.

Co-Curricular

We offer a wide variety clubs and activities that meet after school weekly at various times throughout the school year. Those clubs include: Sewing, Yoga, Dance, Community Service, Yearbook, and Technology. Our afterschool program continues to provide a safe and structured place for many of our students until 5:30 pm daily. Students are able to work on completing their school work, play games, have snacks, and participate in various activities. We are proud to be able to offer this self-sustaining program to our parents. We are fortunate again this year to offer musical instruction to our students each week. Mrs. Colleen Hartman provides instrumental lessons while Ms. Amy Cann instructs our strings program.

PTO

The Nelson PTO has continued to support our students in a variety of ways. Currently they have sufficient funds to support the programs and activities they offer (e.g. Fall BBQ, Halloween Party, Child Care evening, Toadstool, Cheshire Smiles, Colonial Theater field trips, yearbook printing and more!) and sponsor new programs as well (visit from the Vermont Institute of Natural Sciences) for this year and through at least 2022. They are planning to host the popular auction in the spring of 2021. The PTOs goal over the next year is to identify appropriate ways to designate the funds that align with the mission of the PTO: "supporting the education of children at Nelson School by fostering relationships among the school, parents, teachers and the community".

The structure or length of the school day will not change. With these changes taking place in Keene School District schools, there will be an impact on the sending towns. See transportation update for additional information regarding busing.

School Calendar Update

The School Calendar Committee begins meeting in October each year to initiate the process of drafting a proposed Keene School District calendar. Representatives from various schools across SAU 29 sit on the calendar committee and bring feedback from their colleagues to the committee discussions. Based on the recommendations received, the committee developed three options which were presented to staff in November via a survey. As a result of the survey, option 3 (includes August 26 first day of school, workshop day September 4 and last day on June 15 pending any snow days) was selected. Input from a larger stakeholder survey conducted during the 2017-2018 school year was also utilized. From the finalized Keene School District draft, each town district customizes the calendar to meet their needs. Each district board will now review and ultimately approve their district calendar. Once the calendars are finalized, they will be posted on the SAU 29 website (www.sau29.org).

Competency Based Education (CBE)

2019 - 2020 CBE work at KHS

This year the focus is on instructional practices to ensure standardization and transparency. This includes separating work-study practices from academic skills, assigning assessments to two categories, using common summative assessments, standardizing our curriculum framework, and communicating with all stakeholders. Departments are working together to use standards and performance indicators to define course curriculum. These performance indicators are aligned to the academic competencies and ensure consistency among courses and provide clarity for what students should know (content) and be able to do (skills).

Assessment Categories

All courses use two categories in PowerSchool to report on student progress: formative and summative. Standardizing categories for the entire school provides clarity to students and parents and ensures that students receive a similar experience across a course within a subject area.

- Formative Assessments are used to monitor student learning in order to provide feedback. They evaluate how students are learning material through the course. These may include quizzes, homework, reading checks, summaries, lists, conferencing, exit tickets, etc.
- Summative Assessments are used to measure skills at higher levels of learning and require students to show what they can do (performance) with what they know (content). They evaluate how much students have learned in the course. These may include presentations, essays and other writings, lab reports, skits, portfolios, exhibits, performances, art work, podcasts, videos, debates, Ted Talks, etc.

Common Summative Assessments

Teachers who teach the same course are using the same summative assessments. Using the same summative assessments enables teachers to evaluate data collaboratively in order to improve instructional practices that will support student academic performance.

Many staff members have participated in workshops, conferences, and trainings to deepen their knowledge of instructional practices and competency-based education. The professional development opportunities have led to extensive discussions within and across departments at KHS. Workshop time and ER days have and will continue to focus on deepening all staff understandings of curriculum development, formative assessment, performance tasks, and other elements of competency-based education.

2019 - 2020 CBE work at KMS and Keene Elementary Schools

Competency-based education is a K-12 initiative. Keene Middle School and each of the elementary schools (all of the SAU town schools as well) have begun to engage in work similar to KHS. Instructional practice is the focus. Similar to KHS, it is important that our K-8 staff has a firm understanding of content competencies and sound practices to support student achievement. Increased student achievement is our major goal. However, a K-12 comprehensive framework will provide opportunities for vertical conversations among staff, which is a secondary goal of this work. Continuity across schools will provide significant benefits to our students.

Graduation Policy

In recognition that there are multiple pathways to graduation, the Keene Board of Education approved a revised High School Graduation policy (IKF) on May 21, 2019. The new policy offers differentiated diploma options to students graduating from Keene High School beginning with the class of 2020.

School Safety Data

Data Collection Efforts:

- Employee Injury Data: When the districts of SAU 29 switched insurance providers, a concentrated effort was made to capture injuries that were taking place at the worksites for accuracy in reporting and planning purposes. Having clean, reliable data is an important part of fiscal responsibility. To that end, administrators throughout the SAU were trained by the insurance provider on the importance of reporting all workplace injuries, regardless of the perceived severity. Injury reports are shared with the insurance company as well as the Department of Labor in order to meet compliance with labor laws in the State of New Hampshire.
- Student Behavior Data: Through a SAU 29 wide effort, district administrators have been working collaboratively and consistently in developing reporting processes relative to student behavior in all buildings. Having a consistent reporting process enables all schools to become more attentive to individual student needs based on the behaviors that have been recorded. Each month, administrators review student behavior data to determine what trends may be emerging and what interventions need to be considered and implemented in order to help provide safe learning environments for all students and staff. This has been and will continue to be a standing agenda item for administrators during their monthly meetings.

Transportation Update

The member Districts of the Transportation Consortium are meeting the final week of January to finalize the transportation RFQ. The final draft of the RFQ will be available for public review and bidding the first week of February. The timing of the transportation contract bid aligns with the new Keene School District start time allowing for any necessary contract changes to be made for all SAU 29 Districts and further streamlining the process.

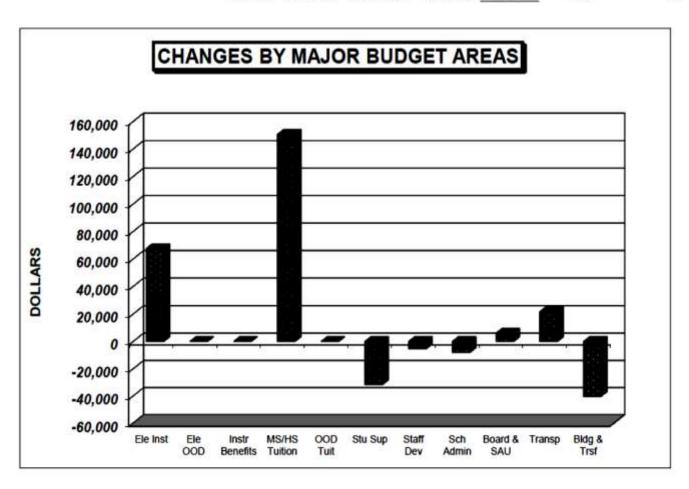

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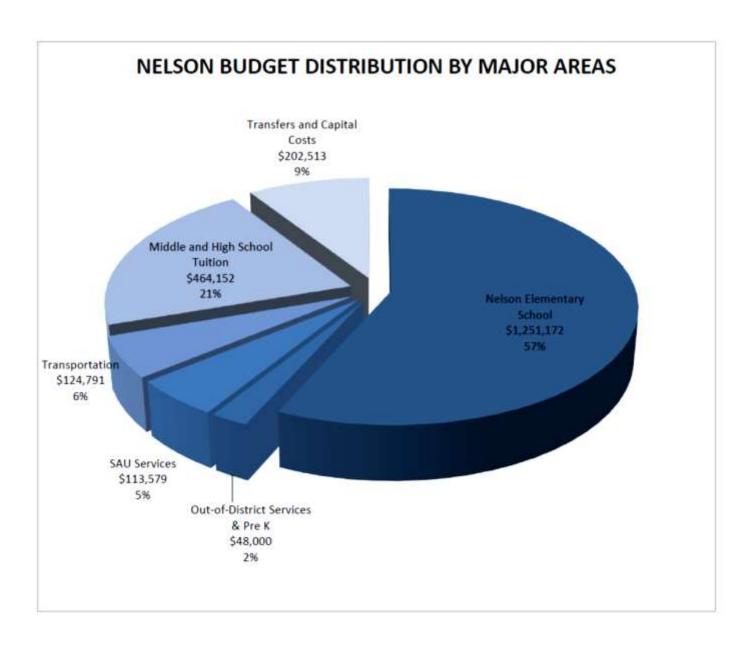

SELECTMEN'S REPORT 2019

Another year has gone by and it's time for us to report to you the results of your Select Board's work during FY 2019 As is true each year, the kinds of work that your Select Board does can be described in three general categories:

I. Preserve the Commons:

Preserve Air, Water, Land, Open Space, and Environmental Quality

II. Maintain Civil Order:

Develop and Enforce Rules and Regulations that Restrict Inconsiderate and Irresponsible Behavior

III. Provide Public Services:

Provide Administrative Services, Roads, Welfare, Fire and Police Protection

I. Preserving the Commons

Renewable Energy Project Development

As we reported last year, our Buildings Committee has been working on the development of plan for a grid-tied solar array that will provide enough energy to light and heat all municipal buildings. We had hoped to be able to bring this project for Town approval at our Town Meeting in 2019, but concluded that a more deliberate approach in system design development and public discussion to be appropriate. We now plan to conclude our energy studies and system design efforts during 2019. We intend to bring one or more warrant articles for renewable energy projects for a vote of the Legislative Body at Town Meeting 2020.

Our proposal for reducing our Municipal Carbon Footprint is as follows:

Goals for reducing municipal fossil fuel consumption

- a. Reduce purchased non-renewable energy consumption in municipal buildings by 90% by the year 2025.
- b. Reduce consumption of fossil fuels by town vehicles by 50% by the year 2025.

Actions completed for achieving established goals

- a. Accounted for all energy presently purchased for municipal use, both buildings and vehicles.
- b. Conducted professional energy audits of all town buildings.
- c. Completed sealing and insulating all town buildings making them more energy efficient.
- d. Reviewed sources of renewable energy available to the town; solar, wind, hydro. Concluded that solar PV systems are the best option.
- e. Developed plans for using electric energy from solar PV systems for lighting and heating all town buildings.
- f. Study and develop best practices, during 2019, for reducing use of diesel/gasoline by town vehicles in 2020 and thereafter.

II. Maintain Civil Order

Building Permits and Tax Exemption Application for Solar Arrays

Here's a reminder from our 2018 Report. Folks planning to have solar arrays installed on their property will need to apply for a building permit for the array in order to comply with our zoning ordinances. Also you must apply to the Select Board for a property tax exemption if you do not want the assessed value of your system to be added to your property tax bill. Building permits must be applied for and approved by the Select Board for both roof mounted and ground mounted solar arrays. For roof mounted systems, Article 5. Section 5:1 of our Zoning Ordinances requires that "No structure shall be erected or externally altered without a building permit having been issued by the Selectmen." Ground mounted

systems are considered to be structures and as such must be located so as to comply with the *Lot Dimensions and Setback Requirements* described in Article 3 of the Ordinance.

Anyone who has installed a solar system should apply for the property tax exemption for it. As you may recall, the Nelson Town Meeting voted to approve an Article allowing the Select Board to grant property tax exemptions for solar arrays. DRA regulations require that folks must apply to the Select Board for this property tax exemption in order for it to be made effective. Please also be aware that this exemption does not "follow the land" so if any change in ownership occurs then a new application must be filed with the Selectmen for approval.

1. Administrative Services

Tax Rate Reduction

We are pleased to report that we were able to authorize the use of \$200,000 from Fund Balance to reduce your property taxes for 2019. The resulting reduction in the Town Portion of the Tax Rate contributed to the reduction in the overall property tax rate.

2. Water Quality Tests for New Well

We are required by DES rule to test the water quality on a quarterly basis, 3 times per year for bacteria alone and once annually for all contaminants. A year's worth of test results have shown consistently that the water from our new well is acceptable for drinking.

As we reported last year the well is over 500 feet deep, produces approximately 8 gallons of water per minute, and has a static level of 20 feet below grade. Consequently there is plenty of water to meet the needs of the three buildings that it supplies. An additional advantage is that this well is on Town property. Also, we have created a layout drawing of all the water supply and drain pipes, and all other utility lines buried behind the Library, Town Hall and Brick Schoolhouse. This drawing will be very useful for future reference.

3. Fire Protection Services

The Board supported the recommendations of the Fire Chief and the Fire Equipment Committee and contracted with Fouts Brothers for the purchase of a new tanker for the use of the Nelson Fire Department using the funds that were appropriated for that purpose at our 2019 Town Meeting. At the time of this writing, the Fire Chief has not reported the status of the assembly of the truck to the Select Board.

4. Repaying the Henderson Road

Our Highway Department oversaw the repaving of the Henderson Road transforming what was one of the roughest roads in town to arguably the smoothest. Our thanks to Mike and Nick for their good work.

Closing Thoughts

Over the years, with your support, your Select Board has worked to assure that our Town Office operations are a model of professionalism and expertise, that our town financial condition is A⁺⁺, and that our town buildings and infrastructure are restored, sound, and well maintained. Your support of our Contingency Budgets and our judicial use of Unassigned Fund Balance has allowed us to achieve these accomplishments. We look forward to your continuing support for our efforts in 2020.

2019 NELSON TOWN ARCHIVES REPORT

The Archive is open every week on Tuesday morning to continue the collection and organizing of records that contribute to the understanding of Nelson's history. We welcome anyone interested in researching our records or looking for our help in finding family connections to visit at this time or make an appointment to come at a time that is more convenient.

This year we installed a display in the History Corner in the town office ante-room of Nelson village as it appeared in the 1840s with scale models of the buildings that were there at that time. Two structures that were present then are missing today. One was the very large

store/hotel that burned in 1894 and next to it was the center building that had various uses but seems to have just passed away by an unknown fate. Thanks to Gary Robinson he was able to make these two scale models by using old photos to complete the village.

A large collection of papers and photographs was offered to the Archives to organize and make available for research material collected by historian, John Armstrong, on the life and works of Margaret Redmond, a well-known stained-glass artist who was a summer resident of Nelson. John died before he was able to use the collection but his son, Andrew who still owns the family farm in Nelson presented it to us to house in the Nelson Archive because our storage conditions will better conserve the Redmond Papers which remain owned by Andrew Armstrong.

Records that contribute to the understanding of Nelson's history will be gratefully received. Please call or come to the Archives if we can be of help. Many thanks are due to Andrew Armstrong for making the Redmond Papers available for research, to Chick Colony for a copy of the Pennsylvania Settlement map and to Gary Robinson for making models of the 1840 buildings.

2019 REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS

The Town's continued participation in the New Hampshire Public Deposit Investment Pool (NH-PDIP) provided stable investment returns during 2019.

The NH-PDIP combines trust funds from all member Towns state-wide into a conservatively-invested portfolio which provides the security required by state law. Interest earnings on the Town's trust funds invested at NH-PDIP totaled \$ 20,276.10 in 2019.

Voters at Town Meeting approved a total of \$ 227,017 in contributions to existing trust funds in 2019.

Of this total, \$132,017 was a transfer of Conservation Commission funds previously received as a matching grant from the New Hampshire Land and Water Conservation Fund, to reimburse privately-donated funds used for the purchase of land now known as Partridge Woods. Voters approved the creation of a new trust fund for this money in 2016, but the funds could not be deposited until a second warrant article was approved in 2019 stating the actual amount of the grant money, once it became available.

The remaining \$ 95,000 of approved contributions were deposited into trust funds dedicated to future capital investments by the Town (subject to voter approval), and to the expendable trust fund dedicated to Milfoil prevention / treatment (expenditures subject to Conservation Commission approval).

There were no contributions during 2019 into the trust funds related to school purposes.

Details of all trust fund deposits, withdrawals, and year-ending balances are shown in the chart which appears in the Town Report. In addition, a binder containing paper copies of the NH PDIP monthly statements is available for review in the Town Office.

2019 REPORT OF THE NELSON CEMETERY BOARD

The Nelson Cemetery Board had a busy, productive year with important tasks completed and others in the planning stages. Many thanks to members Linda Cates, Harry Flanagan, Al Stoops and Marty French for all their hard work and invaluable input.

Michael Shawver continues to do excellent work maintaining our cemeteries. His efforts were evident at the Memorial Day service at the Nelson Cemetery. Reverent Dawn Garrett-Larsen conducted a moving service and the Nelson Town Band did its usual fine job playing patriotic tunes for the participants and onlookers. The Cub Scouts from Pack 530 planted geraniums at the graves of all Nelson and Munsonville veterans.

Work is progressing on developing the "new" cemetery, which will be located opposite Nelson Cemeteries 1 and 2 on Cemetery Hill Road. Al Stoop and Harry Flanagan walked over the property and established a rough idea of its borders. Using sketches provided to the Cemetery Board in the past, we are studying various layout designs.

At long last, Nelson Cemetery 2 once again has a gravel pathway extending from the stone wall border with Cemetery 1 to the road. Many thanks to Mike Tarr and Nick Barrett for doing such a fine job.

Peterborough Marble and Granite renewed our faith in them by repairing 17 headstones in the fall of 2019. If any residents see small orange flags sticking out of the ground in Cemetery 1, please leave them in place – they are markers for headstones that still need to be repaired.

Twice this year, Cemetery Board members continued their annual tradition of cleaning headstones. We use a pH-neutral product called D-2 that is used by professionals and will not harm the headstones. We are first focusing on headstones of veterans and those who no longer have descendants living in the area. Please feel free to take a stroll in Cemetery 1 to see the amazing results of our efforts. Many thanks to the Coughlins, who generously provided fresh water and a hose to clean the headstones, and to Bud French, who laid out and collected the hose. It made our job much easier.

The Cemetery Board is in the final stages of updating the Cemetery booklet. Linda Cates is overseeing the project, which the board considered necessary since the last update was in 1999. There will be a notice posted in the town hall when the new booklet is ready.

The Nelson Cemetery Board has changed its meeting day to better suit the needs of its members. We now meet monthly on the third Wednesday of the month at 6:00 pm in the Nelson Library conference room; we previously met on the third Tuesday. Guests are welcome.

Looking back on 2019 we have had the following events:

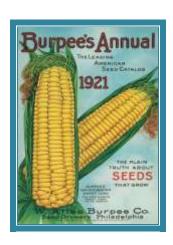
- Our Winter/Spring lecture series was well attended and covered the following topics. The art and science of field reclamation with Mike Tarr, Seed starting with Barbara Voymas, Wildlife research and habitat management of fields with Jeff Littleton of Moosewood Ecological LLC, Field management the Savory Institute way with Julie Davenson of Stonewall Farm.
- In March twenty bags of an experimental annual seed mix from the Xerces Society were given out along with a questionnaire to supply results at the end of the growing season.
- The Old Home Day display included an observation bee hive, miniature bee hive and beekeeping equipment, a Monarch chrysalis about to hatch and a sample of the Xerces Society seed mix, a sample of the flowering seed mix in a planter and photos of Mare-Anne Jarvela's beautiful flowering experimental patch.
- The Farmers Market in September was a joint venture with the Nelson School PTO. We had an increase in student vendors, one teacher and local growers and crafters. It was well attended with the Linda's Closet run that same morning with the finishing line at the school. The PTO supplied a BBQ.

Looking into 2020, we will be continuing the Winter/Spring lecture series and the ever popular Colonial inspired Kitchen Garden.

We are actively seeking out Cheshire county residents wishing to share their knowledge with the community.

2019 REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Nelson Conservation Commission has had a busy year. Most of the work we have done has revolved around the town land known as Partridge Woods. In the spring, we began working with Laura French, NH Licensed Forester of Meadowsend Consulting Company to prepare a forestry management plan for this property as well as the 11 acres of town land at the top of Osgood Hill, known as "Black Top." Laura met with members of the conservation commission on a number of occasions and took a group of conservation commission members and members of the Trails committee out on the land to show us some of the features of the forest and to teach us some principles of forest management. She has prepared a plan which identified the many natural features of the parcel and which, we believe, will serve the town well in its management. The plan is now complete and will be officially approved and incorporated into a stewardship plan as part of the conservation easement document with the Harris Center for Conservation Education. Laura will lead a public workshop in April of 2020, to share her findings and to help townspeople to get to know Partridge Woods as a forest. More information on the workshop will be forthcoming. All are welcome.

On October 5, the Conservation Commission sponsored a "Grand Opening" of Partridge at the Brickyard Road parking area and trailhead. Following cider and donuts refreshments, brief remarks from Kathy Schillemat, chair of the commission, Eric Masterson of the Harris Center, and Rick Church of the Trails Committee, and a ceremonial cutting of the survey tape, Partridge Woods was declared officially open. Two hikes on the land followed the festivities. Over 60 people attended the opening and the hikes. Hiking is just one of the many uses we imagine for this property. Partridge Woods is owned by all of us and is there to be enjoyed responsibly.

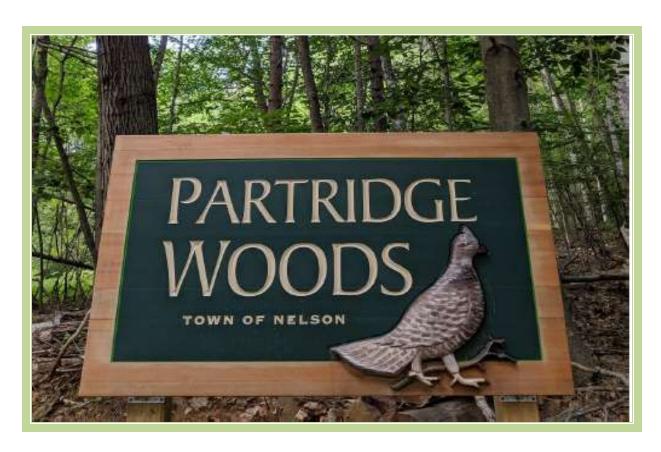
The conservation commission continues to keep watch over the town's water resources both through review of wetland permits and projects that may impact our beautiful lakes, ponds, wetlands and streams, and through strong support of the New Hampshire Lakes Association's Lake Host program. Our ponds and lakes are free from invasive plant and animal species thanks to townspeople's support of the Milfoil Prevention Expendable Trust Fund, many volunteers and paid lake hosts at Nubanusit, Granite and Silver Lake, and the diligence and care of all who use our lakes and ponds. It is your efforts to keep your watercraft clean and free from invasive plants and animals that make the greatest difference.

In the spring of each year, the conservation commission supports a roadside clean-up. This year, about 30 townspeople cleaned trash from almost all of the town's roads. We appreciate their help as we strive to keep Nelson beautiful.

Finally, we would like to give special thanks to the Nelson Trails Committee, the members of which have cleared and marked Trails on Partridge Woods, designed and constructed signs for those trails, and led public outings, and for their untiring work to create and maintain trails for public enjoyment throughout Nelson. We also express thanks to Rob Germeroth and Bill Dunn for their exemplary work on the two kiosks at the Partridge Woods parking lots on Brickyard Road and Homestead Lane.

We are grateful to be part of a town whose citizens appreciate the natural world and love to spend time enjoying the wonders of our hills, woods and waters.

TOWN OF NELSON ROAD AGENT REPORT 2019

In the early months of 2019, the Road Crew stayed busy. In January and February we experienced a moderate amount of snowfall. The cold weather hung on until the middle of March. Just when we thought the weather was never going to warm up, it did! With the strong March sunshine and the temperatures not freezing at night, we saw one of the worst mud seasons in my memory. In a usual mud season, we see only two or three really bad days. In 2019 it lasted over two weeks! Usually we know our trouble spots that we need to work during mud season; however, last year it became Town wide. We weren't the only town to experience a horrendous mud season, this was state wide. With the crazy weather pattern continuing, we then saw a snowfall as late as April.

The first phase of the Henderson Road project took place in the summer of 2018. This was a full depth reclamation with drainage work and the installation of new culverts. In 2019 the second phase concluded the project. In preparation for the outside contractor to pave Henderson Road, the Road Crew needed to add gravel and complete final compaction along with the fine grading. The hard work paid off with good results.

With the fall weather being quiet, we were able to get all of our fall maintenance completed. This included grading of roads, cleaning of ditches, upkeep of culverts, roadside mowing, the removal of any hazardous trees, along with the usual hauling and stockpiling of winter sand.

As always, thanks go out to Nick Barrett for his many hours of hard work this past year.

The Highway Department does appreciate updates on road conditions in your area. The Road Crew will respond to any problems in a timely manner using the tools and materials made available to us.

2019 REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

On January 10, 2019, the Mylar for the Nelson School/Bunce boundary line adjustment was presented to the Planning Board. After motion and second, the board unanimously accepted the proposed adjustment, and the chairperson signed the Mylar.

Board discussed producing updates for Nelson's master plan. Members agree to begin the process.

February 14, 2019: Copes of the updated Harrisville master plan were provided to give Nelson's board some general ideas about updating our own. Harrisville has given us permission to use theirs for this purpose.

April 11, 2019: Mary Cornog was elected chair of the Planning Board until Town Meeting, 2020. We have begun discussion of revised version of master plan; progress will be slow. We have agreed that changes should be reviewed and discussed by the community. We have obtained copies of the Nelson natural resource inventory for use in our deliberations.

May 3, 2019: Discussion of suggested revisions to master plan, and quickly produced a discussion of what we meant by 'affordable housing,' and to what demographic the term referred. We will discuss possibility of designing and distributing a survey/questionnaire soliciting ideas/suggestions on revisions to master plan.

October 10, 2019: the board unanimously approved a request for a voluntary merger of the three lots of a single owner that had been subdivided by a previous owner.

We also began consideration of a proposed subdivision of a single lot into two, each with house and driveway easement already existing. We agreed in principal. Mylar will be presented when ready.

2019 REPORT OF THE ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

2019 proved to be relatively quiet for the Zoning Board. There were only three variances brought before the board. Jim Bowen was approved to replace an existing garage which needed a variance for the setback from the property line. Edgar Hastings was granted a variance to replace a residence, and the Pepins were granted a variance to build a larger lean-to on their barn in order to house their tractor.

The board remained fully staffed with five members this past year. There is one- 3 year term expiring this year and we are always looking for an alternate as well. The ZBA encourages anyone with interest to consider running as it is very important to have a full board to successfully meet the needs of the residents of the town.

TOWN BUILDINGS COMMITTEE REPORT 2019

Highlights of 2019

Researched Solar options to meet all municipal energy needs

- Held three public information sessions covering: 1) data regarding global climate change; 2) New Hampshire municipal activities around the state to reduce carbon emissions; 3) overview of Nelson projects to add a new solar array to provide electricity to municipal buildings and convert oil and propane furnaces to Air Source Heat Pumps (ASHPs).
- Researched possible grants for solar array and/or ASHP conversion but were not able to find a good match for the Town of Nelson.
- Developed selection criteria and reviewed bids for solar array construction and ASHP conversion.

Town Hall

• Replacement of the Town Hall floor was completed in October of 2019. The Monadnock Folklore Society contributed \$10,000 to the cost and the contra dance community did much of the work.

The Nelson Town Buildings Committee serves as an advisory committee to the Nelson Selectboard, focused on the Nelson Town Buildings which include:

- Town Offices (Old Brick School House)
- Town Hall
- Library (responsibility shared with the Library Trustees)
- Safety Building
- Fire Stations in Nelson and Munsonville (responsibility shared with the Fire Chief)

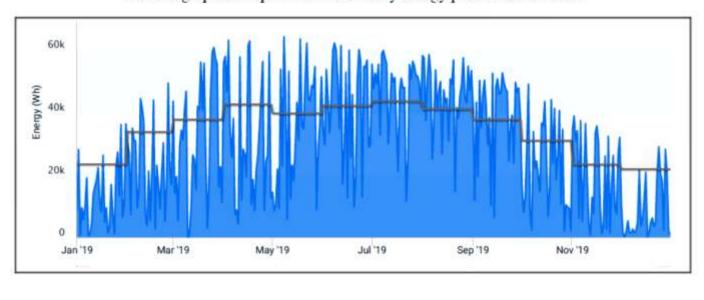
In that role, the Buildings Committee evaluates building issues, recommends projects, reviews bids when appropriate, and makes recommendations to the Selectboard. In addition, the Buildings Committee provides information to the town's residents regarding large and/or complex projects. This information-sharing can take the form of public meetings, web pages, mailings, and other appropriate formats. The Buildings Committee meets approximately monthly, generally on Mondays at 6 PM in the Nelson Town Offices. Meetings are held more or less often as needed.

Prevent Forest Fires



It is unlawful to...

- Burn brush or other materials when the ground is not covered by snow without a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden.
- Burn in an outdoor fireplace without a fire permit.
- Kindle certain categories of fires between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. except when raining. When raining, a fire permit is still required. Please check with your local Forest Fire Warden to determine allowable burning times.
- Kindle a fire for any purpose on land of another without written
 permission of the owner or owner's agent and a written permit from the
 Forest Fire Warden of the town, except in authorized recreational areas
 where suitable fireplaces are approved by the Forest Fire Warden.
- · Fail to totally extinguish any fire before leaving it.
- Discard matches, cigarettes or other burning substances from vehicles or otherwise.
- Throw any flammable waste material on, near, or adjacent to a public highway or private way in or near woodlands.
- Fail to report a forest or brush fire or fail to respond to a Forest Fire Warden's call for assistance.

Violations of the law (RSA 227-L) are subject to the following penalties:

Violation - May be fined up to \$1,000

Misdemeanor - May be fined up to \$2,000 or imprisoned up to one year or both.

A Quick Guide To Open Burning

All burning must be conducted in accordance with state laws, state rules, local ordinances and under a "Permit To Kindle Fire" issued by the local Fire Warden or authorized agent.

Materials Not Acceptable for Burning:

- Construction & demolition debris
- Tires
- Household trash
- Packaging materials
- Plastics
- Coated or laminated paper
- Coated or treated cardboard
- Oily rags
- Animal, vegetable and kitchen waste
- · Used Oil, gasoline and hazardous waste
- Brush greater than 5 inches in diameter
- Any wood that has been painted/stained, glued, or treated in any way

Materials Acceptable for Burning:

- Campfire wood
- Charcoal
- Clean pallets

If generated on-site

- Brush (less than 5 inches in diameter)
- Clean lumber scraps (private single family residences only)

1, Election of officers

To choose one commissioner for a term of three years, and to see who the District will elect for the offices of auditor, moderator, clerk, treasurer. Nominations for commissioners, Harold Roeder; auditor and moderator, John Halter; treasurer, Robert Maden; clerk, Sally Ripley.

Motions to approve were appropriately made and seconded, vote was affirmative.

Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Village District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of 20,000.to be added to the *Dam Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of dam maintenance, repair, and/or replacement.* This fund was established in December 2008. 15,000.is to be raised from taxation and \$5.000. from unassigned fund balance Motions to approve were appropriately made and seconded. vote was affirmative.

3. General operating expenses

To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000. for Village District expenses. This article does not include appropriations contained in special or individual articles addressed separately. (Majority vote required) Commissioners described how the state raised our dam risk level too high and that the fees have gone up.

Motions to approve were appropriately made and seconded. vote was affirmative.

Gate Upgrades

To see if the District will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,500. for gate upgrades. This sum to come from unassigned fund balance. No amount to be raised from taxation. Commissioners recommend passage of this article. (Majority vote required). Motions to approve were appropriately made and seconded. vote was affirmative.

Insurance

To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800. for the purpose of funding the annual liability insurance for the Village District.

Commissioners recommend passage of this article. (Majority vote required)

Motions to approve were appropriately made and seconded. vote was affirmative.

Next Annual Meeting Date

To see if the District will vote to hold its next annual meeting on April 11, 2020 at 9:00 a.m. at the Chapel-by-the-Lake in Munsonville, NH.

We asked if the 11 th. was the Saturday of Easter weekend. Someone looked up on the phone calendar to check when Easter will be. Yes, it does fall on Easter weekend. Amended the date to April, 18 th. At 9 am, 2020.

Motions to approve amended version were made and seconded. vote was affirmative. Motions to approve were appropriately moved and seconded. vote was affirmative.

Motions to adjourn at 9:23 were made and seconded. vote was affirmative.

Discussion continued as Carol Newcombe asked if we could lower the lake level later. Phil Hamilton responded "no" as the Fish & Game dept. want to leave the eggs out of water after such a late drawdown. Also asked was could we lower the lake by 5 feet sometime in the near future. Bob Woods will call Fish &Game. Likely not as they like to have the water brought up as soon as possible after the ice goes out, and suckers in the brook are good for the ecosystem.

Phil said that the dam engineer said the dam's in pretty good shape; we will get a written report soon.

Our town roads are more than a means of simply getting from one place to another; they also provide
the important links within the community that make our
town whole. As a courtesy to the many people who
walk, run, bicycle, drive, ride horseback, visit, parade,
provide maintenance, perform rescue, or otherwise use
the roads within our town, we remind everyone that in
Nelson we SHARE OUR ROADS. Please observe this
and respect everyone's equal right and responsibility to
use our roads sensibly and safely.

Here are some common-sense tips and safety advice to follow.

Driving on Our Roads



- Obey posted speed limits on all roads, noting lower limits in congested areas.
- Stay on the right side of the road and maintain a safe distance when following.
- •Be alert to others on the road, and slow down as you give walkers, runners, bicyclists, horseback riders, and others a wide berth. And always remember to be alert for children.
- Be aware that dogs may accompany those sharing the road and may not be on leashes.
- When approaching a curve or dip'rise in the road, slow down and stay to the right
- Be patient and pass, or let others pass, with caution, when safe to do so.
- When traveling on dirt/gravel roads, be aware that dust and small rocks may be flung up by your wheels.
- •Don't trust GPS navigation in Nelson. "Shortest route" may lead you down what locals would call a logging road, and many roads won't show up at all.

Walking/Running on Our Roads

- Wear bright, reflective clothing, and add blinking lights when it is dark.
- Walk/run against traffic where safe, along the side of the road. Stay as far to the side as possible.
- Always look for an escape route. If a car for some reason gets too close to you, it's good to know where to go.
- When walking/running in a group, move along no more than two abreast on the left side of the road.



- When walking/running with a dog, make sure it is under control at all times.
- Try to make eye contact with a driver coming by you so you are sure he/she knows you are there.

If you rent out property, especially short term in the summer, please pass this information along to your tenants.

Cycling/Riding on Our Roads

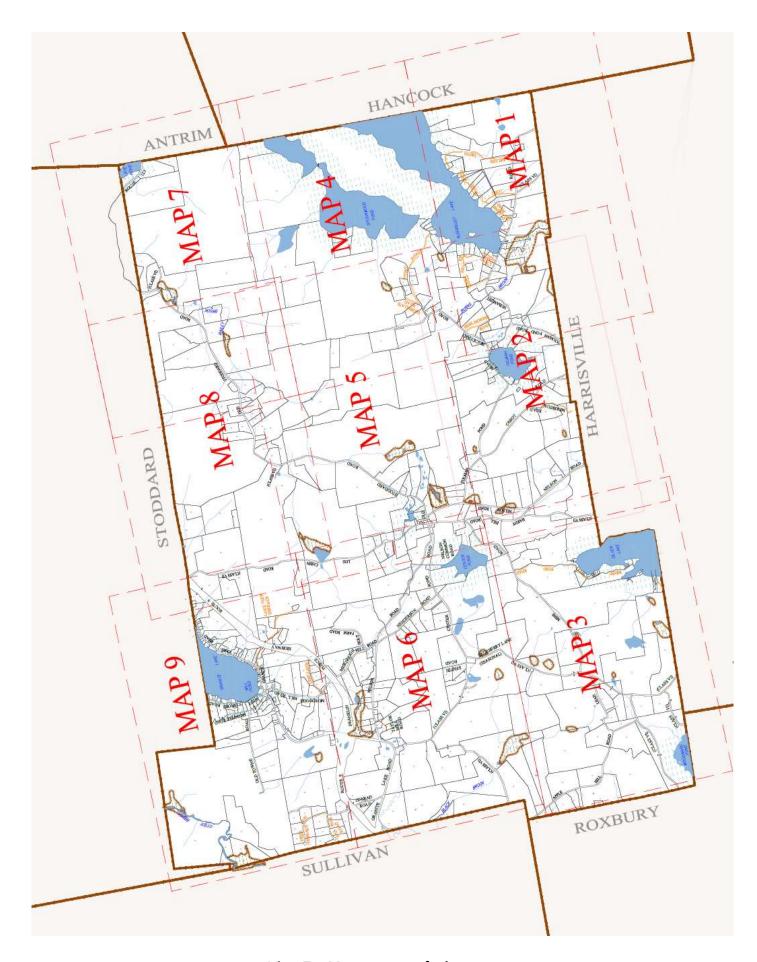


- Always wear a helmet and bright clothing. Wear reflective clothing and use blinking lights when it's dark.
- Ride on the right side of the road, with the traffic, staying as far to the right as possible.
- Watch for oncoming cars that may pull onto the right side of the road to pass a slower vehicle or something else on their side. The driver may not have checked for cyclists or riders on your side.
- Check behind you constantly, making a habit of looking over your shoulder before every intersection, fork, or driveway.
- Be aware that riding toward the sun makes it difficult for drivers to see you as they come up from behind into the sun themselves.

Remember that even though you may be eager to 'get home' or 'get back to the lake' to the comfort and safety of your own home you may be driving by someone else's home, where the same refuge is sought, to get there. Please respect the comfort and safety of all our roadside homes.

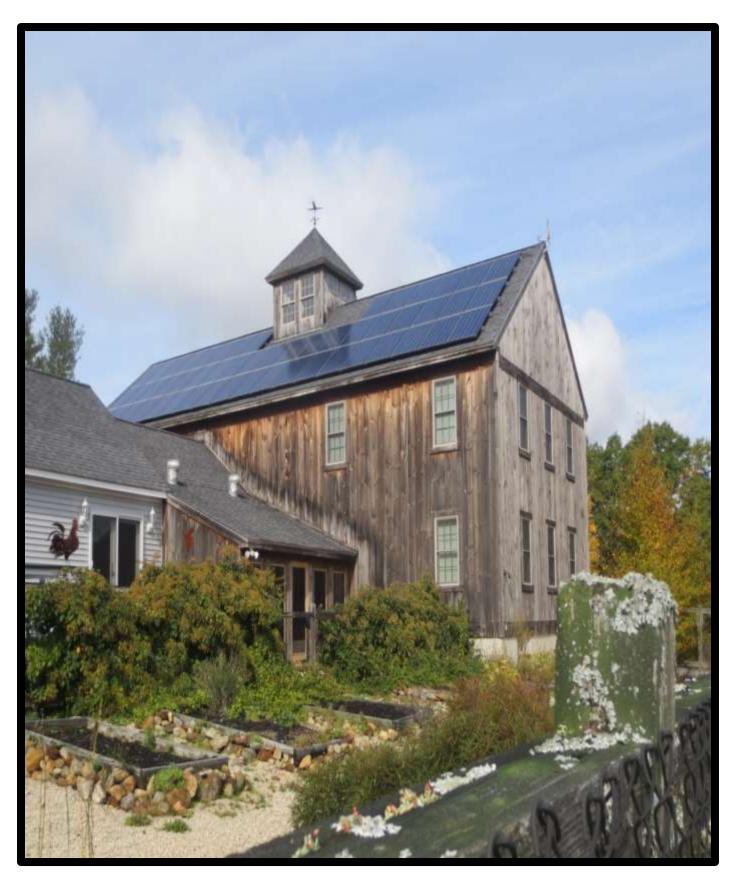
