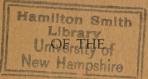

NEW DURHAM TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

- To the inhabitants of the town of New Durham, in the County of Strafford, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:
- You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said New Durham on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:
- Article 1. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money on the credit of the town to pay its just debts.
- Article 2. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deed.
- Article 3. To see what per cent discount the town will vote to allow on property taxes, if any, and on what dates such discounts shall be allowed.
- Article 4. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid for construction, to be expended on the King's highway, the town to raise \$533.08, the state to give \$2.132.31.
- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to have a committee appointed to report at the regular 1944 town meeting on ways and means of developing the town's great natural assets. This committee to consist of a chairman of the board of selectmen and the moderator of the town meeting, ex officio and three others to be appointed by the moderator.

- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money to redecorate the upper hall and other minor expenses.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to accept the budget estimates as recommended by the budget committee.
- Article 8. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of same.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to lay aside \$2,935.00 out of surplus money to pay the outstanding serial notes (3) when due, same to be invested till the several notes are due.
- Article 10. To chose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing. One selectman for three years, one trustee of trust funds for three years, and one library trustee for three years.
- Given under our hands and seal, this 23rd day of February, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and forty-three.

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(b) Administrative Problems

Many problems have arisen since the last school report was issued. It was impossible to anticipate all these problems.

The Office of War Price and Rationing demanded a survey of transportation routes with a view toward determining their necessity in order to qualify for gasoline and tires. All of your routes were approved.

At the time this is being written the Office of Defense Transportation is about to launch a more intensive survey to the same end.

The manpower shortage has had and will continue to have a very important effect on schools. On October 1, 1942, there were still many teaching vacancies in the schools of New Hampshire. Due to the constant shifting of teachers from low salaried positions to higher paid positions, the number of teachers that have left the profession for war industry and the number that have joined the armed services or otherwise left the profession there is a very grave danger of a large number of schools finding it necessary to consolidate. This constant shifting of teachers within the state has also caused a delay in determining the amount of State Aid which will be sent to the treasurer of the school district next December. I certainly cannot anticipate any real relief on this score during the next school year.

The cost of books, supplies and fuel have advanced from 15% to 25%. On some of these items there is still some choice in quality and price. On other items it is necessary to use substitutes or use nothing.

PART IV. School Plant

The Ridge school is in a very good state of repair. With some very minor repairs and whitening of the ceiling it will continue to be one of the best lighted and usable school buildings in the district.

The Plains school needs alteration. The ratio of window glass to floor area is one to eight as compared with a standard of one to five. In addition to this fact the rays of the sun never shine in the present classroom windows. The light was measured on the inside row of seats at noon on a bright day with snow on the ground. The light was found to be barely enough for reading. It needs no great imagination on my part to realize that on any day with bare ground or on any cloudy day the children are either going to strain their eyes or the lights are going to burn all day.

I suggest that when an unexpended balance occurs in the school budget that this be used to rectify this condition by placing new and larger windows on the opposite side and closing up the present window spaces. This could be done in three installments: (1) changing windows in upper grade room, (2) changing windows in lower grade room and (3) remodeling the entrance to dress up the whole building.

Farmington high: Arline Dyer, Freda Smith, grade nine and Flora Aiken, grade eleven.

Rochester high: Doris Bolles, Betty Lambertson, Barbara Berry, grade nine and Robert Bickford, grade twelve.

(c) Roll of Honor for Attendance

The following seven pupils, as compared with five pupils for 1941-42, were neither absent nor tardy for the school year ending June 30, 1942; Lawrence Corson (1), Joseph Keniston (1), Lurene Wentworth (2); Harold Keniston (1), Francis Laney (3), Doris Melanson (1), and Freda Smith (1).

PART VI. Auxiliary Activities and Special Reports (a) Report of School Health Work

To the Townspeople, School Board and Superintendent of Schools:

There were a few cases of measles, German measles, and whooping cough in New Durham during last school year but no very large epidemic at any one time.

Hot lunches were served all last winter with the help of Federal Surplus Commodities and Federal W. P. A. money for a paid cook. A complete meal was served and the children loved it. The large decrease in the number of under-weights shows the benefits of the program. This year, due to the cancellation in Washing-

ton, D. C., of all W. P. A. Projects, it is more difficult to have the cooking done and the teachers are doing what they can with Surplus Commodities.

Several unusual activities were necessary last year. One boy was taken to a physician to have a dislocated hip reduced. A girl was found with acute appendicitis and gotten under treatment with hospitalization and successful operation. One child was taken to Hanover for final check-up following successful eye operation. Another was taken to a specialist with a serious eye infection and successfully treated. One family was gotten into school and kept there only by constantly getting needed clothing for them from any and every source. There seem to be a few cases of real need in New Durham just now.

Many tonsil and adenoid cases were taken to Wolfeboro for operation during June and July. Several others planned to go but were unable to complete plans early enough in the summer to get into the clinics. There will be another chance again this year according to plans. Several cases were taken or sent to dentists for dental work, mostly emergency work and not a complete job. This is only a very small part of what every pupil in New Durham needs so very badly. At present there is no money and no available dentist to undertake the work for all the pupils.

In spite of all the corrective work done, there were many New Durham children who could have none. A report of the defects and corrections will show how far we were able to go:

(b) Hot Lunches

Again for the year 1942-43 commodities are available for hot lunches. Please note that the commodities are not designated as surplus. The feeding program in schools is under the Agricultural Marketing Administration which continues to furnish certain products. Lunches were started somewhat late due to transportation difficulties. It is necessary to purchase certain products in order to prepare a palatable lunch and allowances have been made in past budgets for this item.

The future of the A. M. A. feeding program is as uncertain as most food problems. Allowances have been made in the budget for increased purchases of materials for the lunch due to the uncertainty surrounding A. M.

A. products. The Federal Government stopped furnishing help to prepare these lunches and therefore the teachers now teach with a book in one hand and a kettle in the other hand.

(c) War Activities

The war has its effect on every phase of life. This is a total war and it must be a permanent peace. The children in our schools today will be the protectors of our way of life in the future. They are aiding, in the present emergency, in various ways. A large amount of scrap was collected in each school which has been turned into the war effort. War saving stamps are being bought by pupils. The observation post is being manned by school children one day each week. Regular school studies have been given renewed emphasis by the war. The study of geography has a different point of view. The study of arithmetic has been given renewed applications with the advent of rationing, victory taxes and increased income taxes.

Your teachers have been called upon to perform the actual distribution of rations and have completed the task without a complaint.
