## TOWN WARRANT

### The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Ipswich in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Appleton Academy Auditorium in said New Ipswich on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the town will vote to accept the budget to raise as estimated therein the necessary funds to transact the town's business for the ensuing year.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1200.00 for a resident physician.
5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
6. To see if the town will vote to raise \$698.51 for T. R. A.
7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5000.00 to rebuild, cap and oil a section or sections of highway within the town, selection of location or locations to be made by a committee of five persons, consisting of the selectmen, the road agent, and some impartial citizen chosen by the other four, this sum to be the only appropriation for such work this year.
8. To see if the town will vote that beginning

with the annual town meeting of 1955 and thereafter the transaction of all town business except the election of officers shall be adjourned to 7:30 p. m., or take any action thereon.

9. To see if the town will instruct the Electric Light Commission to provide the same rates to all farm and domestic users of electricity, or take any action thereon.

10. To see if the town will vote to pay \$64.64 for work of grading and filling done on dump in 1953. It was recommended this work be done and this surplus of \$64.64 be used for this purpose.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for rental and maintenance of the Page Hill Dump. If the town leases or rents this dump, in so doing they will assume all responsibility, such as fire or mishaps, and plow out the snow so it can be used the year round.

12. To see if the town will vote to accept Old Age and Survivors Insurance for all eligible town employees. And to raise the sum of \$300.00 to defray the town's share which is estimated at 2% of the town's payroll.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$10,000.00 (ten thousand dollars) to purchase a new fire truck with its associated equipment and to build an addition to the fire station to house the same.

14. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be used in the development, maintenance and supervision of the recreation field, or take any action therein, and to choose one member onto committee to serve for five years.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00, to be used in co-operation with State and Federal funds, for the control of White Pine Blister Rust within the confines of the town.



16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$186.00, (1/100th of 1% of the valuation of the town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southwestern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region.

17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of New Ipswich:

I respectfully submit my seventh annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

### **Instruction,**

Mrs. Pearl Thompson, Principal of the Central School and her staff are continuing to do a superior job of instructing our young people. Proper attention is being given to the development of the fundamentals with as much time devoted to individual problems as large classes and multiple graded rooms will permit.

The teachers and I are eager to discuss in detail with parents any area of the educational program offered at the Central School. It is recommended that parents avail themselves of every opportunity to learn how the reading program is developed through the grades; how penmanship and spelling are taught; what makes a good arithmetic program and how our language program is developed and integrated with the social studies. This information can be obtained better by discussion and conference, than by means of a written report.

Miss Elsie Wheeler, Music teacher and supervisor, is continuing her fine work both at the Central School and at the Academy. Our music activities cover a five-point program consisting of singing, listening, rhythm, creating and performing. In singing, the songs range from simple melodies which help first graders to learn to carry a tune, to part singing in the upper grades. A growing library of records, including several albums given recently by an interested parent, and a new victrola, contribute greatly to an appreciation of good music. The rhythm band, marching, skipping and clapping to music as well as participating in singing games, folk and square dancing all have a place in the music program. Creating, either by dramatizing a song, responding to rhythms, or composing a melody develops

self-confidence in the participants. In performing the children gain poise by singing as a class, as a small group or as an individual. They take part in various holiday programs, play in the rhythm band and in grades 4, 5, and 6 play the song flutes. The song flutes help develop music reading and theory. One of the primary purposes in using these simple instruments is to stimulate interest in later playing band or orchestral instruments.

Through the cooperation of Mr. Hjalmar Maki, Principal of Appleton Academy, we are able to combine our instrumental work conducted by Mr. Edward Hamilton with that of the Academy. Thus all pupils from grades 5 through 12 have an opportunity to learn to play an instrument. The cost of the instruction is provided by the School District and Appleton Academy. This program has been in effect only a short time but despite that, it was possible to assemble a band of fourteen pieces in May 1953 to play for the Memorial Day Assembly at the Academy. The Central School pupils progressed to the point where they were able to play in the Christmas Pageant at the Congregational Church.

The development of a good instrumental program is dependent largely upon the cooperation of the parents. Instruction at school is not enough. Much practice is necessary at home to develop any degree of proficiency.

This Fall we introduced into our schools a supervised program in Art Education. Again with the cooperation of Appleton Academy, we were able to employ Mrs. Dorothy Messenger, recent graduate of the Massachusetts School of Art, to act in the capacity of Art teacher and supervisor in both the Central School and the Academy. The cost of this instruction is shared between the two schools. Mrs. Messenger does the actual teaching in grades 3 to 6 in the Central School and acts as consultant and advisor to the teachers in grades 1 and 2. All pupils in grades 7 and 8 partici-

pate in the art program and those in 9 through 12, elect it if they desire. This is a one day program at the present time and we have quickly noted that more time should be purchased so that grades 1 and 2 can have the direct benefit of this art instruction.

The medium of art gives a child an opportunity to express himself in a way that no other school subject can do. He is able to develop confidence in himself by creating something that is completely a part of him. In the short time this program has been operating we can see some excellent work being accomplished.

While we have been stressing the academic and cultural development of our children we have not overlooked their physical development. This Fall, we were fortunate in obtaining the services of Mrs. Linna Korpi, graduate of the University of Minnesota and holder of a B. S. Degree in Physical Education, to conduct a supervised physical education program two days per week in the Central School. This program includes activities for grades 1 through 6. The year's program is divided into the following units of work — Playground Games; Fundamentals of Ball Skills and Fundamentals of Rhythm and Balance. The children are given an opportunity to develop qualities of leadership, sportsmanship, cooperation, self-control and understanding.

### **Health Supervision**

Miss Sybil Beatham, School Nurse and Dr. Claire Cayward, School Doctor, exercise close vigilance over the health of our children. Annual physical examination and frequent visits to the school and homes keep the parents informed of any irregularities in the health of their children. The parents have been most helpful and cooperative in assisting us to carry on an effective health program. The School Nurse Report reveals the details of her work.

### **Lands and Buildings**

While the work carried on this past summer was

largely that of maintenance, we were able to start the fencing program that has been mentioned the past several years. A six foot chain link fence was erected along the boundary of the line adjacent to Mr. Lampi's property. A more adequate parking area was developed and this separated from the play area by a three foot chain link fence. A six foot chain link fence was erected along the brook adjacent to the little people's play area and extending to approximately the location of the well. This is the first step in a program of fencing that will eventually enclose all of the school property.

For many years the basement of the Central School has been flooded with water at certain seasons of the year. This condition became so serious at times that it was impossible to use this area. A sump pump was installed, in an effort to keep the water table below the top level of the floor and thus keep the floor dry. To date, this seems to be the solution to our problem.

Since our school has grown so in size, and it has become necessary to stagger our recesses and to provide space for physical and musical activities, we are using the basement space to a much greater extent than in the past. This has created a serious sound condition that is decidedly undesirable for those classes and teachers who are trying to carry on class work in the rooms above. Realizing that something should be done immediately to relieve this strain upon child and teacher, the School Board has provided a sum of money in the budget to sound-proof the ceiling of the basement. This was seriously considered when the new addition was constructed, but lack of funds made it impossible.

### **School Enrollment**

In my report last year some space was devoted to the discussion of the probable increase in school population in the New Ipswich Central School over a period of years. Our census of school children this fall indicates that we will continue to have large enrollments

for several years and that we should devote some serious thought as to how we are going to house them. Despite the fact that two rooms were added recently we will find ourselves in a very embarrassing position by 1956-57 unless some careful planning is done between now and then.

We opened school this fall with a total Central School Enrollment of 142 pupils. Some individual grades were quite large, consequently we had to continue our policy of running multiple graded rooms and splitting grades until such time as we have more space.

Following is a preview of possible room and grade assignments over the several years subsequent to this year.

Despite the fact that there is a change in school population during the year, the survey conducted this fall indicates that our increased enrollments are primarily caused by births in families of natives rather than an increase caused by transients.

It would appear from the above survey that some

provision for additional classroom space should be seriously considered for the opening of school in 1956. From 1956 on, the enrollment will increase from approximately 174 pupils to 205. If two rooms are added in 1956 it will be noted that by 1958, each room will contain approximately 30 pupils.

This increased enrollment poses another problem for the School District to consider and that is one of providing an adequate space to carry on the school lunch program.

We have been very fortunate in being able to use the facilities at Appleton Academy over the past several years. However, it is apparent that the Academy's school population is growing and will continue to grow in the same manner as ours, and that the Cafeteria facilities will not be large enough to handle the school lunch program. Consequently, in any building program that may be considered, serious thought should be given to providing space for a Cafeteria. At this writing our Cafeteria is really not large enough to do the job as conveniently and efficiently as it could be done.

### **Finance**

The School Board's Budget for 1954-55 calls for a net increase of \$9,093.24 over last year's. This increase is reflected in an increase in tuitions for Appleton Academy for the next three years of \$6,995; \$150 for elementary tuitions at Greenville; Teachers' Salaries and Fixed Charges \$1,348.99; Additions and Improvements \$500, and Equipment \$447. Decreases in Repairs and Replacements and other areas of the budget reduces the net increase to the figure mentioned above.

### **Conclusion**

I wish to thank Mr. Hjalmar Maki, and his staff, for the splendid cooperation that they have given to me, and the many services they have rendered the School District of New Ipswich this past year. I also wish to extend my appreciation to the New Ipswich School

Board, the staff at the Central School, and parents and friends for their help and cooperation in carrying on a sound and efficient educational program.

## SCHOOL NURSE REPORT

I made thirteen visits to the New Ipswich Public School during the year of 1952-1953. There were some cases of chicken pox after the Christmas vacation, but there were many colds throughout the year. These are difficult to evaluate for each cold may be the forerunner of a communicable disease, or may be just an upper respiratory infection that soon passes away.

The children were weighed and measured twice during the school year and most made a satisfactory gain while some are much overweight. By means of the Snellon Chart I tested the vision of the children and sent notes to the parents of those children who showed a loss of vision.

Mrs. Irene Birschall, New Hampshire Tuberculosis Nurse, gave Patch tests for Tuberculosis during April to ninety pupils and eight teachers in both the Central School and Appleton Academy. She was very pleased with the cooperation shown in carrying out this work, and remarked favorably about the reduction of positive reactions obtained. X-rays were taken of those four pupils who reacted and all were negative for tuberculosis.

I assisted Dr. Cayward when he examined the children. The following defects were found:
