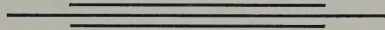

To the inhabitants of the Town of Orford, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Orford on Tuesday, the 13th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

First to adjourn to act on the School District Meeting.

Articles

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year: Also to choose one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds and one Library Trustee for three years.

2. To hear the budget of the Town and raise and appropriate any money recommended therein or pass any vote relative thereto.

3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges for the ensuing year.

5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the removal of snow and care of Town Winter Roads for the ensuing year.

6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to insure Town property.

7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Electric Lights.

8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Orford Free Library and Orford Social Library.

9. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

10. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the distribution of inventory blanks until the Selectmen appraise the property.

11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell and administer property acquired by Tax Deed, or otherwise.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70.00 for the use of the Dartmouth Lake Sunapee Region.

13. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$473.40 for that purpose.

14. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Fire Department.

15. To see if the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the revised laws relating to playing games of Beano, shall be adopted in this Town.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to cover the expenses of Memorial Day.

17. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Common.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for a Community Center Memorial Fund.

EXCERPTS FROM OLD PAPERS

Town of Orford — 1956

I am afraid I have come to the end of quotations from Old Papers in the Town Vault. Some papers are not for me to make public. Some very personal, like the bonding out of children, one a baby, to be bound out until it reached the age of twenty-one. At that time the child is given "one Sunday suit and one workaday suit and fifty dollars."

My interest in the papers was to file them in such a way any one could be easily found — or at least I hope so. But in sorting them out I felt some items were so unusual as to be of interest to many.

Warrants for Town Meetings are practically all now in chronological order, as are check lists — from which directories of the Town could easily be made for any year, or maybe geneologies found, early births, deaths and marriages; for instance, the children of Solomon Mann were:

Phoebe Mann, born Nov. 25, 1785.
Emelia Mann, born Feb. 23, 1790.
Solomon Mann, born March 9, 1792.
William Mann, born Sept. 8, 1794.
George Mann, born Sept. 10, 1796.
Almira Mann, born April 8, 1799.
Hiram Mann, born Dec. 20, 1801.
Parkhurst Mann, born June 20, 1806.

Lists of scholars and school teachers, from the first school up to and including 1850, as the papers I filed were for the year 1850 and earlier. A few of the very early marriages were:

Josiah Moulton — Sally Taintor, April 5, 1792.
David Corliss — Sally Quint, July 25, 1792.
Isreal Day — Sally Davis, Dec. 14, 1791.
Atherton Wales — Diadema Palmer, Dec. 27, 1791.
Solomon Morey, Jr. — Olive Durgy, April 26, 1792.
Samuel Wimple — Lois Williams, Nov. 17, 1791.
Isreal Williams — Phoebe Durgy, May 12, 1791.

There were many, many tavern keepers in Orford — even the illustrious Alexander Strong was issued a license as Tavern Keeper in 1793. These licenses were issued for the term of one year. In Town Warrant of 1832 mention is made of Inn of Daniel P. Wheeler. In 1798 one license read "We approbate Nathaniel Hopkins a Retailer of Wines & Spirituous Liquors at Capt. Joseph Pratt's store on the River Road in Orford."

I found a copy of the Independent Democrat, published at Concord, N. H., March 7, 1861, containing in full the Inaugural Speech of Abraham Lincoln. (I think a collector's treasure.) Needless to say there are many comments on Mr. Lincoln's speech. The entire front page of this paper is devoted to a speech made by the Honorable Henry Wilson of Massachusetts, in the U. S. Senate, February 21, 1861, on Slavery. Mr. Lincoln's Inaugural Address is printed on the third page and consists of almost two columns.

I also found a copy of *The World*, New York, Wednesday April 8, 1868, and a copy of *The American Traveller*, Boston, Mass., Saturday Morning, June 6, 1868, with articles on the Impeachment trial of President Andrew Johnson.

I have enjoyed the work I have done on these papers and most sincerely thank the Selectmen for the privilege of handling and filing these records.

BE A GOOD CITIZEN — COOPERATE

Smoking and debris burning caused more than 50 percent of the forest fires occurring in the state of New Hampshire in 1955 — 235 fires out of a total of 463 originated from these two sources. Lighted smoking material and matches thrown from moving vehicles along the highway or dropped by fishermen, hunters, hikers, berry and flower pickers accounted for 26 percent; debris burning in the wrong place or at the wrong time by those who failed to heed all pleas for safety or refused to recognize the logical, sensible rules and regulations set up under legislative authority governing the use of fire in or near woodlands accounted for more than 24 percent. This is inexcusable.

Everything possible is being done officially to remedy the situation. Since 1909 there has been a statute on our law books which requires everyone to secure written permission from the local forest fire warden before starting a fire in or near woodlands or where fire can be communicated to woodlands, unless the ground is covered with snow. A never ending program of educational work is being carried on by your local warden and state officials to inform the general public both of the value and necessity of securing the required permit for such burning. Much progress has been made, but there are still many who fail or refuse to cooperate. The value of our permit system was definitely proven in this district during the 1955 calendar year. Local district wardens issued 959 permits for debris burning fires. That's a lot of permits. The records show only 2 permit fires got out of control. This proves several things — while wardens were liberal in the issuance of fire permits, accommodating every applicant so far as possible, they were cautious, following closely directives outlining overall policy governing the issuance of burning permits and thoroughly instructing permit users. The latter, too, fully appreciating their responsibility in using their permits, governed themselves accordingly. Result? Much burning done legally and safe.

But what of the smokers? Despite all the efforts of those officially charged with the responsibility of preventing fires, too many were careless or thoughtless in disposing of smoking material and matches. Why? It is difficult to say. Autos are now equipped with ash trays. Why not use them. The crushing out of a cigar, cigarette and the complete extinguishment of matches before being discarded is an easy chore.

If the costly habits of the careless and indifferent smoker and debris burner could be overcome, more than half of our annual forest fires would be eliminated. Will YOU do YOUR share to bring this about?

Remember

1. Get a written permit from your local warden before starting your debris burning or camp fire. The law requires it.
2. Make certain they are dead out before leaving them.
3. Become a safe smoker by extinguishing smoking material and matches before discarding them.

REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

The following is a report of activities carried on for the Town of Orford by the N. H. Department of Health, Bureau of Public Health Nursing, for the year 1955.

In the months of May and October 1955, the children of Orford first and second grades had the opportunity of receiving the Salk Polio vaccine at a clinic held at Hanover. About 15 children took advantage of this opportunity. The clinics were financed by the National Polio Foundation, conducted by the N. H. Department of Health with splendid cooperation from school officials, local Health Officer, local March of Dimes chairman. My sincere thanks to all who helped in any way to give the children an opportunity to participate in this program and have protection against this dreaded disease.

Home visits have also been made in the Town on mothers, infants and pre-school children. Arrangements have been made for children to attend Cripple Children's Clinics, Mental Hygiene Clinics, Heart Clinics as necessary and follow up as necessary.

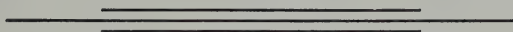

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Orford

To the School Board and Citizens of Orford:

I present herein my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools in Orford. In preparing the report I have used freely from the report made to me by Mr. Elmer Fulton, Principal.

Tuition Pupils and the School Building

Orford High School continues to attract increased numbers of high school tuition pupils from other school districts. In the school year 1951-52, there were thirty tuition pupils, last year forty-three, and at the beginning of the present school year fifty-four.

For this school year 1955-56 we anticipate that the cost of operating the High School, exclusive of Capital Outlay, will be about \$29,150.00. If all high school tuition pupils now in school remain with us we will receive about \$16,350.00 in tuition. This means that our tuition receipts will have paid for almost 56% of our current high school costs.

This is, of course, a very significant item for the taxpayers of Orford. It is particularly significant when we recognize that if we had no tuition pupils and were to continue to offer the same high school program of studies we should still have the same number of teachers. This may seem strange, yet for the current school year we are able to accommodate the tuition pupils without having any additional class periods in any subject. In fact, it is questionable whether Orford could economically justify some of the courses if it were not for the tuition pupils. At present they constitute 63% of the high school enrollment. In some of the courses there are only 1, 2 or 3 Orford pupils.

Of course, if the enrollment continues to increase either because of Orford or tuition pupils we will need not only additional teachers, but also more and better classrooms.

Orford attracts tuition pupils largely because it offers a good high school program. Sixteen of the tuition boys, for instance, are in the agriculture courses as opposed to six Orford boys. In other words, sixteen of the forty-nine tuition boys are apparently there because of the agriculture program. Other important factors are proximity and transportation facilities.

In our long-range planning, we must give consideration as to whether we can continue to attract tuition pupils if we do not offer as good facilities as some other communities where they might go. We, for instance, have no gymnasium; our athletic fields are not good; our cafeteria and assembly hall facilities leave much to be desired; our science facilities are inadequate; the State Department of Education has recommended that we increase our shop space for the agriculture program and, also, get more shop tools.

The School Board has made provision in its 1956-57 budget for improvement of the athletic field, for a start in improving the science room, and for two pieces of additional and needed shop equipment. I sincerely hope that the School District Meeting will approve these items, for they are steps in the right direction. A gymnasium and improved assembly hall and cafeteria facilities can come only through added construction. It is very important, therefore, that any planning of a community building should give serious consideration to school needs.

Curriculum

An important change in the High School courses was made when the course in sociology was replaced by a course, "Current Problems in Democracy." This new course is more comprehensive than the old one, it deals with more specific current problems, and is recommended by the revised state program of social studies. The course, taught by Mr. Malcolm Hartwell, will alternate yearly with U. S. Constitutional History.

Already begun, but only in initial stages, is a more systematic program of testing for the schools of Orford. When in complete use, we will be able to better appraise than is now possible the work done, the effectiveness of the school program, and the needs of individuals.

A school library is a very important part of the school. Our library and reference shelves need much more material than they now contain. Gradual steps are being taken to improve this situation.

Maintenance of the School Plant

It is necessary, of course, and particularly when buildings are as old as those in Orford, that a considerable amount of money be spent to maintain and improve the buildings. During the current budget year some of the more important things that have been done are as follows:

New roof on the main building of the Street School.

New and improved lighting in the Orfordville School.

Painting:

Classrooms, cafeteria and hall at Ville School.

High School toilets, window sills, and cafeteria at the Street School.

Replacement or new storm windows for both buildings.

Exhaust fan in Street School cafeteria to carry off odors.

The program of painting and other repairs and improvements should be carried on. The Board has made provision in its 1956-57 budget for such work. Major items will be further painting in the Street School and, as mentioned previously, improvement of the play area.

Teachers and Salaries

We were very fortunate in having to replace only one teacher this year. We were equally fortunate in securing Mr. Albert Plante, who succeeded Mr. Richardson, as the replacement. We wondered at one time whether we were going to secure anyone.

Mr. Richardson's resignation was received in April 1955. I wrote to over forty commercial teachers' agencies, teachers' colleges and replacement offices of universities and state departments. Most of them replied that they had no candidates interested in the salary that we could pay. We also inquired of other superintendents, principals and teachers. As I recall it, we had a total of three applicants. Two of them I certainly would not recommend. In order to employ Mr. Plante we had to get a special permit from the State Department, for, in spite of his general excellence he lacks two or three of the courses in education that the state requires. By June he will have completed the courses that he must have if we are to be allowed to re-employ him for next year. We hope that he will want to return.

The plain fact is that if during this period of critical teacher shortage we want to attract and retain good teachers we must be in a position to compete salary-wise. In 1954-55 median salaries were as follows:

The above figures include both large and small high schools. The statewide medians are, therefore, somewhat higher than might be expected from only the small schools. Never-the-less, the discrepancy between statewide and Orford salaries is greater than it should be, particularly for high school men. The budget for 1956-57 makes provision for an increase for all teachers. We will, however, still be below state medians, especially at the high school level.

Another factor to take into consideration in regard to salaries is that our teachers teach full programs without any free time. In addition, particularly in the High School, they

carry a heavy assignment of after-school activities without added compensation. In many schools today this is not the case.

Conclusion

In concluding I want to express sincere appreciation to the members of the School Board, the members of the school staff and to the citizens of the community for their continued support and cooperation.
