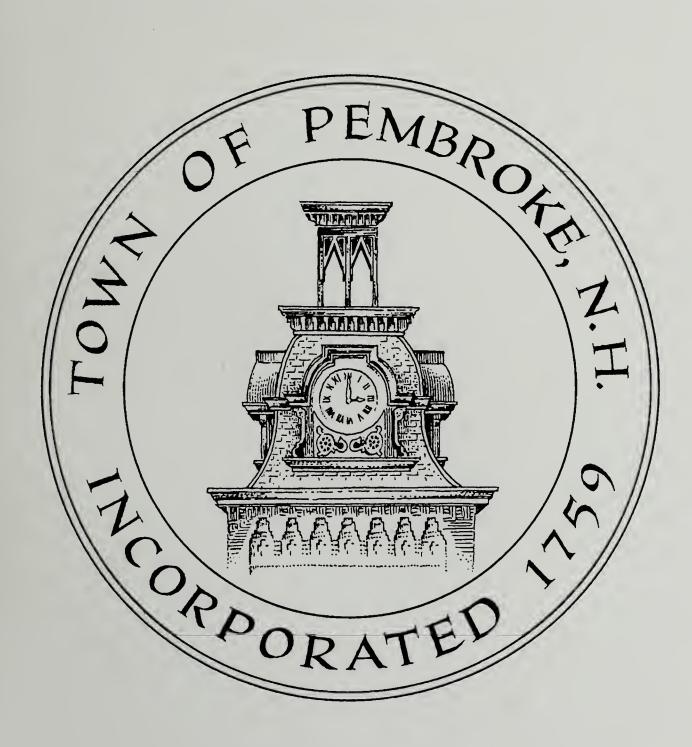

## **BOARD OF SELECTMEN**

The Board of Selectmen meets on Monday evenings, 7:00 p.m., at the Town Hall. The Board normally deals with several issues at each meeting and the agenda for each meeting is prepared by David Stack, Town Administrator. If a resident wishes to make a formal appointment to discuss a matter with the Board, we ask that you please contact David Stack at 485-4747. Time is also set aside at each meeting for citizen's comment.

Here is a look back at the highlights from ten years of prior messages from the Board of Selectmen:

1990 - 1990 may well be the year that is remembered as the Year of Challenge. The Board of Selectmen was challenged both by residents and the economy to establish procedures that would provide the most economical approach to the operation of the Town. It became very apparent early in the year that both imagination and management would be the key words for all departments. The challenge would be to provide needed town services, ensuring public safety and planning for future needs, all the while being mindful of difficult economic times. The upside of the economy was that bids for road projects came in substantially lower than projected and we were able to accomplish more for less outlay. The upstairs in the Town Hall was reconfigured with moveable partitions into five attractive and functional office for the use Planning and Land Use Department. Through imagination and management, the project was completed by the employees of the Planning Department and a very low cost to the Town. The downstairs meeting room was named the "Paulsen" Room.

1991 - "The design of Phase 1 of the Rt.106 sewer extension was initiated. Sewer service is needed on Rt.106 to attract business to that area. The creation of an Economic Development Committee to look at ways to attract business to Pembroke. Energy audits were performed at the Police Station, Fire Station and the Highway Garage to find ways to cut energy costs. The audits were fully funded by a grant the Town received from the Governor's Energy Office. Implemented a tin and aluminum can recycling program at the Solid Waste Facility and continued improvements at the facility."

1992 - "The Budget Philosophy: What is it really that the Board is saying to the residents of Pembroke when we present a budget for consideration and approval? The Board is saying "THIS IS THE LEVEL OF SERVICE" that was provided to you for the past year and the costs attached to that "LEVEL OF SERVICE" and this is the "LEVEL OF SERVICE" that the Board proposes for the coming year with the costs attached. The "COST OF SERVICE" is a year long management function of the Board of Selectmen, Town Administrator, and Department Heads. It is our combined responsibility to be certain that the "COST OF SERVICES" are prudent. It is what is expected of us and it is a responsibility that we take very seriously. The "LEVEL OF SERVICE" is what the residents of Pembroke have decided that they want to maintain and are willing to approve in the annual budget.

1993 - The Board conducted an in depth study and review of all Town personnel positions. Through the study, the Board became better aware of the functions and roles that each position performs and was able to make adjustments to better meet the needs of the Town. In the fall, Lou Bouffard, the Town's Police Chief and employee of thirty years retired, and after a lengthy and thorough search Thomas Iverson was hired as our new Chief. The Economic Development Committee conducted a Business Visitation Program and is in the process of developing a Business Directory.

1993 - The \$2,600,000. Rte. 3 and 106 Sewer Extension Project is well underway and the Planning and Land Use Director and the Economic Development Committee are meeting with developers to promote development. The Board hired a consultant to reassess all of the utility properties in Pembroke with a resultant increase of \$9,000,000.in taxable valuation. In the fall the Town brought back the Household

Hazardous Waste Collection Day. During the first year of his administration, the Police Dept. instituted its own DARE Program directed by Off. Scott Lane.

1995 - The major portion of the Rts.3 & 106 Sewer Extension Project has been completed and the new pump stations are on line. The project will be expanded to include the lower portions of Beacon Hill & Brickett Hill roads. New meeting room space was created on the second floor of the Town Hall. Architectural studies were performed on the Police Station and the Highway Garage. Following a study of the Buck Street schoolhouse and the building formerly housing Don's Physical Fitness Center, the Board voted to keep the Buck Street schoolhouse and sell the Fitness Center property.

1996 - Following a vote at the annual Town Meeting the Board requested that the name of the Post Office be changed to The Pembroke Post Office. The request was denied but the Postal Service agreed to install letters on the building identifying the building as Pembroke/Allenstown with the official location being Suncook. The Board approved the use of the meeting rooms in the Town Hall by Pembroke organizations.

1997 - The Highway Department Facility Study Committee was formed. Also, a committee was formed to study the feasibility of establishing an optional fiscal year and semi-annual tax collection for presentation to the 1998 Town Meeting for approval.

1998 - The Highway Garage Committee has developed a proposal to be put before the 1999 Town Meeting. The Board met with a group of interested residents and representatives from the elderly housing field to explore the feasibility of the construction of elderly housing in Pembroke. The Board created a Trust Fund for the restoration and future maintenance of the Town Clock. The Town Administrator continued to work with the Suncook Village Merchants Association to address the concerns of the Village District and to help promote & market the downtown business area.

1999 - Voters present at the 1999 Town Meeting approved appropriation of \$230,000 for an addition to and improvements of the Highway Garage. Phase I of the Town Clock restoration was completed. Phase II, estimated to cost approximately \$100,000, will commence in the Spring. The Town is working with the Pembroke Congregational Church on the proposed construction of elderly housing on church owned property located behind the Town Hall and proposed new Library. Fire Chief Richard Chase announced his retirement and Harold Paulsen was appointed Chief by the Board.

The Board accomplished many of its goals for the year 2000, including:

*Police Station Study Committee* - The Board formed a study committee to explore alternatives for the rehabilitation of the existing police station facility or the construction of a new facility. The Committee has met several times and has conducted tours of police facilities similar in population to the Town. The Committee plans to present its findings in the fall of 2001 and to develop a proposal for consideration at the 2002 Town meeting.

*Capital Improvement Program (CIP) Process* - The Board and staff worked with the Planning Board to develop a new process for the Capital Improvement Program (CIP) to include representation from various Town boards and departments.

**Highway Garage Project -** The Board and Town Administrator worked with the Highway Department and the contractor to complete construction of a new Highway Garage addition.

**Town Clock Restoration Project -** The 2000 Town Meeting granted funding to complete the restoration of the Town Clock. The Project is scheduled to be completed in the spring/summer of 2001.

**Citizen of the Year Award -** The Board formed a committee to develop the criteria for choosing the Citizen of the Year and the proper forum for the presentation of the award. The award had not been given out for a few years and will be re-instituted in 2001.

**Streetlight Conversion Program -** The Board and Town Administrator worked closely with Public Service of New Hampshire to bring the streetlight conversion program to its completion.

The meeting was opened at 11:00 a.m. by Moderator Thomas E. Petit.

A motion was made to read and act on Articles #1 and #2 and the remaining articles to be read and acted upon at the deliberative session on March 18, 2000 at the Pembroke Academy auditorium.

**ARTICLE #2:** Are you in favor of the adoption of the following amendments to the existing Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Pembroke as proposed by the Planning Board:

#### AMENDMENT #1

To amend Chapter 143 of the Code of the Town of Pembroke, entitled Zoning, to add a new section following Section 143-45, to be known as Section 143-45.1, Parking Requirement Waivers. Also, to amend Chapter 143 of the Code of the Town of Pembroke, entitled Zoning, Section 143-48, Location of parking spaces within the B2 district. Recommended by the Planning Board.

Explanation: Permits the Planning Board to reduce or eliminate parking requirements if practical difficulty or hardship is found, and allows the Planning Board, rather than the Zoning Board, to reduce or eliminate the required on-site parking within the B2 district provided certain requirements are met.

#### AMENDMENT #2

AMENDMENT #1 PASSED

To amend Chapter 143 of the Code of the Town of Pembroke, entitled Zoning, to add a new section following Section 143-30, to be known as Section 143-30.1, Office Conversions. Recommended by the Planning Board.

Explanation: The purpose of this section is to permit the conversion of existing residential units into non-residential professional and business office space. The intent of this district is to allow for professional/business office space to be located in formerly residential units. It will enable existing buildings to be adapted to new uses and to allow a more flexible pattern of residential and business development. The business use shall not significantly change the residential character or function of the property to the extent that the use will be objectionable to other residential uses in the neighborhood. Mixed residential and office units will be permitted within a single building. The boundaries of the district shall be measured to a depth of five hundred (500) feet either side of the center line of Pembroke Street beginning at the boundary of the L/O District and running to the boundary of the B1 district.

#### AMENDMENT #3

To amend Chapter 143 of the Code of the Town of Pembroke, entitled Zoning, to add a new section following Section 143-44, to be known as Section 143-44.1, Adult Entertainment Uses. Also to amend Section 143-8: "Definitions" to add definitions cited in new Section 143-44.1.

also to amend Section 143-63; "Special Conditions for Specific Types of Signs" to create a new subsection to be titled "W:Adult Entertainment Use Signs". Also to amend Section 143-62: "Dimensional Table of Signs" to include adult entertainment use of signs as only permitted in the C1 District in accordance with Section 143-63 W. Recommended by the Planning Board.

Explanation: The purpose of this section is intended to pro-actively control the location and concentration of adult entertainment uses in the Town of Pembroke. Without this amendment, such uses may be located in any commercial area in Town. The intent of this amendment is to protect the public health, safety and welfare (including but not limited to protection of property values, separation of incompatible land uses, location of such uses near major regional highways, and prevention of blight and crime) and to control the location and concentration of adult entertainment uses.

This Chapter restricts the locations of adult uses to nonresidential areas and prohibits their location in close proximity to one another or to facilities primarily devoted to use by children and families, thereby limiting the absolute number of adult uses in Town and, in addition, effectively preventing the concentration of such uses.

#### DELIBERATIVE SESSION MARCH 18, 2000

Moderator Petit opens the meeting at 10:48 a.m. with the results of the ballot vote held on Tuesday, March 14, 2000 and then read Warrant Articles #3 through #19.

**ARTICLE #3:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred ten thousand dollars (\$210,000) for the purpose of constructing a new water well and pump station, one hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000) of such sum to be raised through the issuance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the Municipal Finance Act, RSA 33:1 et seq., as amended; with the balance of sixty thousand (\$60,000) to come from the Pembroke Water Works Capital Funds and savings accounts; to authorize the Selectmen to issue, negotiate, sell and deliver said bonds and notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon and the maturity and other terms thereof; and to authorize the Selectmen to take any other action or to pass any other vote relative thereto. The cost of borrowing and repaying the bond or note will be paid with Pembroke Water Works funds. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee. (2/3 ballot vote required)

**ARTICLE #4:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one million six hundred thousand Dollars (\$1,600,000) for the purpose of constructing a new library building, up to one million dollars (\$1,000,000) of such sum to be raised through the issuance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the Municipal Finance Act, RSA 33.1 et seq., as amended; furthermore to authorize the withdrawal of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) plus all accumulated interest to the date of withdrawal from the Library Building Capital Reserve Fund; with the balance of five hundred thousand

dollars (\$500,000) to come from donations raised for this purpose; to authorize the Selectmen to issue, negotiate, sell, and deliver said bonds and notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon and the maturity and other terms thereof; and to authorize the Selectmen to take any other action or to pass any other vote relative thereto. Recommended by Board of Selectmen, Library Trustees and Budget Committee. (2/3 ballot vote required)

Marilyn Ross and Daryl Borgman speak for article #4

Peter Tennant, architect for the project gives a brief explanation about the proposal. Ron Caron asks if the footprint could be made smaller and have a second floor added. Peter Tennant explains that they would then need to use about 1,400 sq. ft. for an elevator, stairs and second means of egress, and they would have to add more staff. Keith Momberger asked what the \$110.00 per sq. ft. cost includes. Peter Tennant states that the \$110.00 per sq. ft. cost is for the building only and the rest of money is for everything else. the overall cost is relatively low because of the easy site work. Norinne Field asked what the architect's cost is. Peter Tennant states that it is 7 percent of the total cost of the project which comes out to \$88,480. This includes building and landscape architect fees and engineering fees. Clark Hartford asks if the staffing costs will go up and what will happen with the current library building. Marilyn Ross explains that the library committee plans on adding just one part time position, the school district owns the building so they will decide what will happen to the building after the new library is built. Glenda Lemoine asks if the library will be open longer hours after the new building is built. Marilyn Ross states that the library is open 36 hours a week and that the commission has no plans to expand the hours of operation. Rosemary Michaud and Richard Kelsea stated that they were concerned about what might happen if the commission does not raise the \$500,000 in donations to complete the project. Redmond Carroll stated that the commission should come back next year with a smaller building proposal. Ted Natti stated that the commission should come back with the proposal after they have raised the \$500,000 in donations. Peter Mehegan, Ayn Whytemere, Dan Stauffacher, and Drew Neilson speak for the article. Thomas Colburn spoke in opposition to the article. There was a motion made to vote on the article.

**ARTICLE #11:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed forty-five thousand dollars (\$45,000) to purchase a backhoe and to authorize a withdrawal of a sum not to exceed forty-five thousand dollars (\$45,000) from the Town Equipment Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose. Recommended by Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee. (Majority vote required)

Victor Martin speaks in opposition to the article, asks how old the current backhoe is and states that a good backhoe should last 25 years. Road Agent Henry Malo states that the backhoe is 12 years old and that there is a problem getting parts when they get to be 15 years old, it is in need of refurbishing and that will cost approximately \$30,000.

#### **TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS**

The Trustees would like to take this opportunity to summarize the key changes in the Trust Funds for 2000. In the trust funds under the authority of the Selectmen and actions at Town Meeting, two additions were created this year. One fund is for public donations for the construction of a new cupola on the Town Hall. The other fund is for monies raised from donations for the Town Library. On the School District side, a new capital reserve fund was created for the maintenance of district owned roadways such as Belanger Drive and the entry road to the Three Rivers School.

The Trust Fund's common stock holdings which generate income for the awarding of scholarships each year saw record earnings for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2000 and \$14,500. was awarded to college bound graduates from Pembroke Academy. In addition to the usual number of stock splits seen each year the scholarship portfolio saw corporate spin-offs, a merger, a name change and one holding taken private. Proceeds from the stock taken private resulted in an impressive capital gain which was subsequently allocated to new holdings. The trustees added five new stocks to the portfolio including Texaco, Northern Border Partners, SBC Communications, 3M, and Dupont. All of these activities are seen as positive for the trust and are expected to improve future earnings and return on investment.

It has become our practice not to include copies of the MS-9 forms for Trust Reporting which had been published in the Town Report for a number of years. Instead, we will continue to provide a "Schedule of Trust Balances" and a Statement of "Change in Trust Assets" to disclose both the balance and summary activity in the funds for the past year. MS-9 forms continue to be prepared and filed with the State Department of Revenue Administration and the Office of the Attorney General, Division of Charitable Trusts. Copies of those submissions are available upon request from the Trustees.

A "Supporting Schedule of Unexpendable Trusts Funds" for both the Cemetery Perpetual Care and the Scholarship Trust Funds which was included in the Town Report last year have left out this year because there were no changes in either fund.

#### **AUDITOR' S REPORT - 1999**

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

March 17, 2000

Board of Selectmen Town of Pembroke Pembroke, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Pembroke, New Hampshire, as of December 31, 1999 and for the year then ended. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the general purpose financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall general purpose financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general purpose financial statements referred to in the first paragraph do not include the Pembroke Water Works (enterprise fund), which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The omitted fund has assets, liabilities, operating revenues and operating expenditures of \$1,610,947, \$2,599, \$389,838 and \$352,588, respectively.

The general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group, which should be included in order to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amounts that should be recorded as general fixed assets are not known.

As described more fully in Note 10 to the financial statements, the Town does not accrue the current portion of accumulated vacation or sick pay in the General Fund in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. The effect on the combined financial statement of this departure from generally accepted accounting principles cannot be determined.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omissions described in the fourth and fifth paragraphs and subject to the effects of such adjustments if any, as might have been determined to be necessary had we been able to satisfy ourselves as to the matter discussed in the third paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to in the first paragraph present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Pembroke, New Hampshire, as of December 31, 1999 and the results of its operations and the cash flows of its proprietary and similar trust fund types for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The accompanying combining and individual fund financial statements listed as supporting schedules in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Pembroke, New Hampshire. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

<u>Status</u> - Software support came on site and was able to correct the unbalanced trial balances.

#### **COMBINED STATEMENTS-OVERVIEW**

There is an overall logic that is followed within the combined statements themselves:

**Exhibit A** - Combined Balance Sheet, All Fund Types and Account Groups Reports, as stated in the title, presents a snapshot of the financial condition of all funds and account groups at year end.

**Exhibit B** - Combined Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balance - presents the activity for the year for all governmental funds along with all <u>Expendable</u> trust funds.

**Exhibit C** - Combined Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balance -Budget and Actual - presents the activity for the year compared to budget for the General fund and all budgeted Special Revenue funds.

**Exhibit D** - Combined Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Retained Earnings - presents the activity for the year for all Enterprise funds and <u>Nonexpendable</u> trust funds. As the intention is that these funds be accounted for "in a manner similar to private business enterprises", the format of the statement may be more familiar to those readers who are associated with financial reporting in the business world.

**Exhibit E** - Combined Statement of Cash Flows - presents the various sources and uses of cash for the Enterprise funds and <u>Nonexpendable</u> trust funds for the year.

## **CEMETERY COMMISSION**

The Cemetery Commission obtained signs identifying each cemetery in Pembroke as a means of eliminating confusion among people who are unfamiliar with the names of the town's eight public burial places. Superintendent of Cemeteries Henry Malo installed posts and mounted the signs.

Mrs. Phyllis Longver, Camp Historian of J. S. Durgin Camp #7, Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, identified a Congressional Medal of Honor recipient who is buried in Pembroke. Brevet Major William H. Appleton (1845-1912) of Suncook was awarded the medal for gallant action at the siege of Richmond during the Civil War. Research by the Cemetery Commission confirmed that Major Appleton is buried in the Appleton-Badger tomb in Evergreen Cemetery. Thanks to Mrs. Longver's help, the U.S. Department of Veterans' Affairs will supply a tablet identifying Appleton as a medal recipient, and the Commission will mount the tablet on the tomb in the spring of 2001.

The Commission has completed the paving of active driveways in Buck Street Cemetery, the town's most frequently-used cemetery. A U-shaped paved driveway now provides access to the currently used sections of the cemetery.

Perry Brothers Monument Company generously donated the necessary repairs to damaged monuments in all the Pembroke cemeteries for the year 2000. The Commission gratefully acknowledges the substantial contribution made by Terry and Sarah Anne Perry to the welfare of Pembroke's cemeteries.

As usual, the Commission removed all American flags from town cemeteries after Veterans' Day. The Commission will place new flags on veterans' graves by Memorial Day, May 28, 2001. The Commission would appreciate knowing of any veteran's grave that is not currently marked.

The Commission solicits contributions or bequests to the Cemetery Improvement Fund, administered by the Trustees of Trust Funds. Enlargement of the fund through gifts will provide an endowment for cemetery upkeep and improvement. Such an endowment will relieve the town's cemeteries from dependence on fluctuating town budgets and will help to keep our historic burial places a source of pride and beauty for the community. Gifts or bequests should be made care of the Pembroke Trustees of Trust Funds and designated for the "Cemetery Improvement Fund."

PLEASE - After reading this, **go home and check to see if yours work**. If you don't have any please go out and buy at least one If you have only one, go out and buy another. Every smoke detector comes with instructions in where to place them and they generally provide good directions as to the rooms that need them most.

#### **Smoke Detectors make great gifts**

During the year we responded to 325 emergency calls.

We took delivery of our new rescue truck. Thank you for authorizing this purchase last year from our Capital Reserve Fund. It allows us to not only provide you with better service but also provides support service to our firefighters.

We are asking you this year to authorize withdrawing funds to purchase a replacement unit for two forestry vehicles. It provides for purchasing a truck chassis, utilizing some present components and equipment, purchasing materials from outside sources, and firefighter labor to complete the unit.

YOUR FIREFIGHTERS contribute countless hours to training, building vehicles, maintaining vehicles, maintaining the fire station and many other activities without charge to you. I want to publicly thank all them for their commitment to the Town and for all the hours you have put in for training and other activities.

Special thanks to the Auxiliary, our spouses and our family members. The Auxiliary actively supports us during emergencies. They also support and sponsor many of the department functions. Our spouses and our family allow us to provide our time in serving the Citizens of Pembroke. Without them we would not be here for you.

### FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing <u>ALL</u> outside burning.

Fire permits are required for any open burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow where the burning will be done. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are eleven Forest Rangers who work for the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. During the 2000 season Forest Rangers were busy assisting communities with suppression of difficult and remote multi-day fires. Forest Rangers have also investigated numerous complaints regarding violations of the timber harvest and forest fire laws, and taken enforcement action to ensure compliance. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our office at 271-2217, or for general information visit our website at www.dred.state.nh.us.

There are 2,200 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the state. Each town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention, and law enforcement. The 2000 fire season was below average as referenced in the statistics below. Despite this, our network of fire towers and detection and patrols were still quite busy with fire towers being first to report over 135 fires. These fires were quickly and accurately reported to the local fire department for their prompt and effective suppression efforts. Wild land fires occurring in areas where homes are situated in the woodlands area a serious concern for both landowners and firefighters. Homeowners can help protect their homes by maintaining adequate green space around them and making sure that houses are properly identified with street numbers. Please contact the Forest Protection Bureau to request a brochure to assist you assessing fire safety around your home and woodlands.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection system and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. These factors are critical in controlling the size of wild land fires, keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible. Due to permitting and fire safety concerns, please contact you local fire department <u>BEFORE</u> using portable outdoor fire places and vessels, including those constructed of clay, concrete or wire mesh.

Please contact your local fire department before doing <u>ANY</u> outside burning.

## **HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT**

**PROJECTS:** The major reconstruction project for the year was High Street. The Department also continues to perform the regular task of snow removal, sanding, refuse removal, brush cutting, ditch clearing, grave opening/closing, and center line and cross walk painting. We continue to replace many culverts and repair or replace catch basins.

**SOLID WASTE:** The Department currently has eleven employees certified for operation of a solid waste facility from the State. We are looking at improving the transfer station for the safety of the employees as well as the residents that use it. The hours for residents at the transfer station on Saturday currently are: April1 - October 31, 8:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. and November 1- March 31, 8:00 a.m. -12:00 p.m.

**SAFETY COMMITTEE**: The Highway members on the Safety Committee are Victor Ranfos III, and myself Henry Malo.

In closing, I would like to thank all of the Pembroke residents for their support of the Highway Facility Addition. This project is now completed and is a wonderful asset to the Town. Also, I would like to thank The Highway Employees and Fleet Mechanic for a job well done.

# TOWN LIBRARY REPORT

The Pembroke Town Library strives to provide exemplary and free library services to all citizens of Pembroke. Presently, 1434 library patrons utilize these services, which represents 21 % of Pembroke's population. The library is open 36 hours per week, which includes two evenings and Saturday hours.

Presently, the library has 16,000 volumes of books, 217 audio tapes and 328 videos. It subscribes to 3 newspapers and 56 magazines. The children's section (8X8ft) is seriously inadequate for its usage and for the weekly story hours it hosts. This year over 50 programs were presented with a combined attendance of approximately 1,300 children. Programs with guest entertainers are held at a local church hall which can accommodate the numbers attending. The summer reading program continues in popularity with 95 participants. Adult programs this year included two NH Humanities Council presentations and the library's ongoing book discussion program.

Staffing of the library has been stable, with 2.25 FTE's. The library technician position was filled by Lorraine Good. The Board of Trustees regretfully accepted the resignation of Trustee Elizabeth Bouchard; the position was filled by Donna Martel. Susan Lonergan replaced Elsie Brison on the board who had served for 6 years and chose not to run for another term. A new NH library law allows libraries to appoint alternate trustees to fill in for absences or resignations. Marie Brezosky was appointed to an alternate position.

Ten volunteers provided over 800 hours of service this year. Major duties included the bar coding of all library materials and preparing books for shelving. Trustees, staff and volunteers enjoyed a shared picnic on the grounds of the new library in May.

The bar-coding and data entry of all library materials was completed and the library went on line with their new automated circulation system in September. The new system provides automated check-out/in of all materials and accurate cataloging and record keeping functions.

New features at the library include the publication of a quarterly newsletter, "Library Footnotes", and a subscription to the McNaughton Plan, a book-leasing program that provides new books on a loan basis. The first Library Book Award was presented in June to Katherine Charlton, a P.A. Junior, who demonstrates leadership and academic achievement. This will be an annual award to a P.A. Junior student.

The Trustees provided four library displays at community events - Old Home Day, P.A. Blood Drive, Election Day, and Christmas in the Village. Over 300 discarded books were donated and delivered to four facilities in need of library materials - an assisted care facility, the Veterans' Home and two NH correctional facilities.

Free passes to two museums were added this year - the Currier Art Gallery and the Seacoast Science Center at Odiorne State Park, the latter donated by the Pembroke Women's Club. The library's free passes are popular and used often by Pembroke residents.

### TOWN LIBRARY REPORT (CONT.)

Registration of the library's newly formed Friends of the Library group, "Proprietors of Pembroke Library", was completed in December and meetings will begin in early 2001.

The building of the new addition to Pembroke Academy was somewhat disruptive to the library through August, when the project was completed. This year, the only building maintenance problem was with the library's sewer system, and required digging up and replacing the sewer line between the library and Pembroke Street - an unanticipated expense.

The library's building program was the major project for trustees and building committee members for the year. After numerous presentations and hard work of many, the bond issue for the new library was defeated at March Town Meeting by a narrow margin. Because of the continued interest in the project and the obvious need for a dedicated and enlarged library facility, the project has continued. A revised plan will be presented at the 2001 Town Meeting. Fund-raising activities continued - including book sales, an antiques/collectibles appraisal program, and raffles. A major fund drive began in October with neighborhood presentations, home visits, and mailings for pledges and/or donations. Presentations were made to the Planning Board and Budget Committee. A 12-page pamphlet was designed and printed, and other mailings are being developed for winter/spring fund-raising.

The library trustees are grateful for the assistance and support the library receives each year. This year special thanks are extended to the following: the faithful staff end volunteers - Boy Scout Troop 270 for assisting with annual book sale - Rick Stewart and Mark Reynolds for helping with the library's web site - P.A. Teacher, Carol Ward and students for spring planting -the Town Hall, Pembroke Congregational Church and St. John the Baptist Church for meeting spaces - Michal Smiglowski for design work on building program publications - Gerry Fleury for June meeting presentation on library trust funds - volunteers who assisted with the new newsletter - Donation Depot for donations of shelving, files, display cases, etc. being stored for new library - and all the volunteers serving on the building program committees: Building, Public Awareness, Fund-Raising and Technology.

## PLANNING AND LAND USE DEPARTMENT

#### **Planning Board**

In 2000, the Planning Board reviewed a total of twenty three development plans involving subdivisions or commercial sites. Of the subdivisions approved, four were minor applications and five were major, resulting in the overall addition of 36 new residential lots. The Board reviewed and approved thirteen commercial site plans. New businesses that were approved to locate in Pembroke include Gendreau Microsystems, Greenlands Equipment Corporation, and Rymes Heating Oils Corporate Headquarters. Business expansions included Keeler Family Realtors, Central Gas Company Pleasant View Gardens, NH Tile Distributors, and Creative Building Associates.

Onc of the major duties of the Planning Board is to review the Capital Improvement Program and submit its recommendations to the Selectmen. This year, the Board appointed a subcommittee made up of representatives of the Budget Committee, Selectmen, Planning Board and School Board. The subcommittee met with all Town Departments to review capital needs of the Town. The 2001 to 2006 CIP is the result of many meetings and intense review by the subcommittee and Planning Board. The CIP is a budget planning tool that, when employed properly, helps the Town to plan for major expenditures, keeping the tax rate at a fairly consistent level instead of spiking from year to year. It is the Boards hope that this new CIP process will be a useful tool for the Town budgeting process. In the coming year, we hope to have members of the also public involved on the subcommittee. All interested parties should contact Kerrie Diers, Director of Planning & Development.

The Board holds work sessions on the second Tuesday of every month and conducts regular public meetings the fourth Tuesday of every month at 7:00 p.m. in the Town Hall.

#### **Code Enforcement**

2000 was an extremely active year for construction in Pembroke. 1999 was the most active year in record keeping history, however, 2000 was not very far behind. Residential housing starts are still very strong and commercial development continues with additions at the Commerce Park, Pembroke Animal Hospital, and a large Greenhouse Addition at New England Flower Farms. The completion of the largest construction project of the year was the Additions and Renovations to Pembroke Academy.

#### Zoning Board of Adjustment

The Zoning Board of Adjustment currently consists of five regular members and two alternates (three alternates are permitted), who serve as volunteers to interpret the Zoning Ordinance. The Zoning Board of Adjustment has the power to grant Variances, Special Exceptions, and hear Appeals from Administrative Decisions.

A variance is the establishment of a use which is otherwise prohibited in the zoning ordinance. Variances are relief from regulations which, if strictly applied, would deny a property owner all beneficial use of his land and thus possibly amount to a confiscation.

A special exception is a use of land or buildings that is permitted subject to specific conditions that are set forth in the Ordinance. All special exceptions must be made in harmony with the general purpose and intent of the zoning ordinance and be made in accordance with the general or specific rules contained in the ordinance.

The Board also has the power to hear and decide Appeals if it is alleged that there is an error in any order, requirement, decision or determination made by an Administrative Official in the enforcement of the Zoning Ordinance. An appeal from an administrative decision must be made in the time period established in the ZBA's rules of procedure.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment heard 13 cases in 2000 in comparison to 21 cases in the year 1999.

The 2000 ZBA hearings can be broken down as follows:

In the year 2000, 3 Equitable Waivers were issued by the ZBA. An Equitable Waiver of Dimensional Requirement is a tool which the ZBA uses when a lot or other division of land, or structure thereupon, is discovered to be in violation of a physical layout or dimensional requirement. The Zoning Board of Adjustment shall, upon application by and with the burden of proof on the property owner, grant an equitable waiver from the dimensional requirements, if and only if the board makes all the findings outlined in RSA 674:33-a.

## **Economic Development**

Throughout the year 2000, the Pembroke Economic Development Committee continued its business retention and business recruitment program in a number of ways.

The EDC focused on business retention and outreach by:

- > Publishing the <u>Pembroke Business Newsletter</u>, which featured articles on business resources, profiles of three Pembroke businesses and information on current development activities.
- > Producing the 2000 edition of the Pembroke Business Directory.
- > Sponsoring the Pembroke Business Connections events held at D ' Agnese & Keeler and Bank of New Hampshire, Suncook.

The EDC focused on business recruitment by:

- > Commencing a study of the vacant commercial property in Pembroke.
- > Participating in Capital Region Development Council workshops.

In September, the EDC hired TF Moran and Cold Stream Real Estate Advisors to inventory and evaluate current commercial property and to come up with alternative development strategies for the Town. In February , 2001, the consultants will be conducting a charrette, which is a planning forum that solicits public input. The result of the study and charrette will help shape future zoning and economic development plans. If you are interested in participating in the charrette please contact Kerrie Diers, Director of Planning & Development at Town Hall.

The PEDC meets the third Thursday of every month at 7:00 p.m. in Town Hall. New ideas, suggestions and public participation are always welcome.

## PLANNING AND LAND USE (CONT.)

### Assessing

In the spring, the Town's Assistant Assessor, Isabelle Racine, retired after twenty plus years of service to the Town and the Town's assessor for over twenty-two years, Donald Dollard, retired as well. The Board of Selectmen selected Municipal Resources, Inc. to provide assessing services to the Town. The Assessing Department was merged into the Planning and Land Use Department in an effort to provide even better service to the residents of the Town.

## **Conservation Commission**

The year 2000 marked a very exciting year for the Pembroke Conservation Commission. We gained a number of new members and started new projects that we hope will help shape the future of Pembroke's conservation lands:

## \* Conservation Land Management Plan:

The Conservation Commission has hired a consultant to create a management plan for all of the conservation properties held by the Conservation Commission. The consultant will conduct a detailed inventory of all of the properties by "cruising" the properties to determine what types of trees, wildlife, recreation trails and wildlife exist on the properties. From the forest types map, the consultant will then suggest possible management strategies for each property .We hope to be able to manage the conservation properties in a sustainable manner for recreation, wildlife, education, and other public purposes.

## \* Open Space Trail System Plan:

The Conservation Commission will work with the Central NH Regional Planning Commission to inventory existing recreational trails and open space. The plan will propose additional trails to create a municipal trail system and will also identify critical open space that the Conservation Commission should target for preservation through acquisition or conservation easement. This project will commence in February, 2001 and be completed by June 2001.

## \* <u>Regional Resource Conservation Commissions:</u>

The Conservation Commission belongs to this regional organization of conservation commissions. They meet on a quarterly basis to discuss conservation issues on a regional level and to learn about what other conservation commissions are doing.

The Conservation Commission continues to review NH Department of Environmental Services wetland applications and conducts site walks of affected properties. The Commission also comments on proposed development plans for the Planning Board. The Commission meets the first Thursday of each month at 6:30 p.m. in the Town Hall.

## POLICE DEPARTMENT

January started with a sigh of relief knowing that Y2K had come and gone and we're all still here able to read another Town Report. While no major problems arose thanks to all the diligent work and planning by Town of Pembroke employees. It should be recognized that because of this planning we were better prepared in the event any problems had occurred.

During the month of May, the Board of Selectmen voted to create a Police Station Study Committee. The members were chosen from a broad spectrum of Town residents including a representation from various Town boards. The Committee will be responsible for determining the adequacy of the present facility for current and future Police Department use. If the present facility is adequate for future use, develop cost estimates for renovations expansion. If the present facility is inadequate for future use, find alternative location(s) and develop estimates for new construction or renovation of an existing building. Since June the Committee has met each month and have been successful in hiring a consultant from the H.L. Turner Group in Concord to assist the Committee with their research. The H.L. Turner Group's specialty is designing police stations. The Committee members include, Chairman William Boudreau, Co-Chairman Jane Bates, Carl Allgeyer, Nicholas Halias, Jocelyn Carlucci, William Mackenzie, Ronald Clouser, Gerry Belanger, Lt. Scott Lane and myself from the Police Department. The Police Station Study Committee once again shows volunteerism at its best. I want to thank all the Committee members for their hard work while participating in this important study.

The Department roster underwent changes with its part time personnel. In June, part time Officer Paul Colby resigned after he accepted full-time employment as an Officer with the Hillsborough Police Department. In October, we also accepted with regret the resignation of part time Officer Robert Farley who had been employed with the Department since May of 1995. Our Department will continue to work with Rob in his capacities with the Pembroke Fire Department and NH State Fire Marshall's Office.

In closing, I would like to thank the citizens of Pembroke for their continuing support. I want to thank the members of the Pembroke Police Department for the extraordinary work that was done and accomplished during the past year. We are committed to delivering quality service to our citizens in an effective, responsive and professional manner.

The Town of Pembroke is fortunate to have an experienced police department. Our officers collectively have over 125 years of law enforcement experience. Many police departments in the State are having problems with officer retention. Turnover is virtually unheard of with our full-time personnel. One of the areas that your police department excels in is career development. We encourage our officers to remain current in the latest police tactics, techniques and practices. We also encourage them to develop and maintain their own areas of interest and expertise. This practice brings a valuable resource back to the department. This pro-active approach to training can be attributed in part to our high employee retention rate.

In 2000 our officers completed over 600 hours of in-service training. Some of the courses that were taken are: Criminal Investigation, Child Abuse and Exploitation, Sex Offender Registration, Video Interviewing, Evidence Spoliation, Gay & Lesbian Adolescent Issues, Tactical Training, Firearms Instructor, Cap-Stun Re-certification, Legal Issues, Police Prosecutors School, Juvenile Detention, Warrants and Complaint, Patrol Operations, Incident Command System, OHRV Operator Training, Hostage Negotiations, Suicide Intervention, First Responder to School Emergencies, Horizontal Gaze

Nystagmus, DWI Detection, Breath Test Operator, Skid Control School, Law Enforcement Management, Budget Development & Administration, Constructing Police Facilities symposium for Small Departments, Stress Law Enforcement, Police Internal Affairs, Supervisors Academy, Conducting Physical Fitness Testing, and The Essential Assistant.

### **Community Education**

Since 1995 the Pembroke Police Department has included a Drug Abuse Resistance Education (D.A.R.E.) Program Report in the yearly Town report. The D.A.R.E. Program remains the corner- stone of our community education effort. There is, however, other activities we do that deserves recognition. If you are interested in any of the programs listed below please contact the department.

<u>N.R.A. Eddie Eagle Gun Safety Program</u> - This program is presented yearly to the students at the Pembroke Hill School. The program, developed by the National Rifle Association teaches kids what to do if they find a gun, "Stop, Don't Touch, Run Away, Tell an Adult!

<u>Red Ribbon Week</u> – The last week in October is set aside as National Red Ribbon Week. The program was developed to honor and remember Drug Enforcement Officer Enrique Camarema who was killed by a drug dealer. It is a celebration of student's commitment to stay drug free. Each year the Department participates in the celebration at the Three Rivers School.

<u>American Red Cross Blood Drive</u> – Each year the Department sponsors a Red Cross blood drive.

<u>A.A.R.P. Elderly Phone Fraud Prevention</u> – Sgt. Larry Houghton is a certified instructor with the American Association of Retired Persons. He will present their elderly fraud prevention program to any group in the Town that is interested.

A.A.R.P. 55 Alive Elderly Driving Course - The Department sponsors and host this driving program designed to refresh elderly drivers on the rules of the road and driving tips. It is on an as needed basis.

<u>Classroom Presentations</u> - Each year Pembroke Officers speak to students in classrooms throughout the Pembroke School District. Topics range from arrest processing, child abuse investigation, motor vehicle law, and law enforcement forensics and career opportunities in law enforcement.

<u>Bike Safety Rodeo</u> – It has been several years since the department has sponsored a bicycle safety rodeo. Off. Gaskell has recently been certified as a Rodeo Coordinator. We are recommitted to bring the rodeos back in the spring of 2001.

<u>Police Station Tours</u> – Each year we give station tours to Girl and Boy Scout groups as well as school classes to help kids become more familiar with officers and the police department.

### D.A.R.E. Program Report: Officer Gary R. Gaskell, D.A.R.E. Instructor

The graduating D.A.R.E. Class of 2000 was the first class that I taught as an Instructor for D.A.R.E. 1 am looking forward to teaching in the years to come. This year we were able to start back with the first and third grade programs in the Village and Hill Schools. When asked if I was still interested in becoming an Instructor for D.A.R.E., my answer was yes. I would have to attend an oral board at the State Of New Hampshire D.A.R.E. Coordinators Office. This oral board was to decide if I would be selected as an instructor and accepted to the Instructor's school. Well, I made it through and I am very pleased to say that I am proud to work with the children in our schools.

This program designed by the Los Angeles Unified School District to be a cooperative effort between the school, police and parents. The lessons the children receive are somewhat repetitive from the school, police and parents. Meaning that the best way to learn something is to go over it again, again and again. What the parent teaches at home, the school reinforces and what the school reinforces, the police then, come in and meet your children, spend time with them and again reinforce issues of saying NO to DRUGS AND VIOLENCE.

When it comes to being in the schools there are a few very important people to thank. Without these people the funding for the program would expire. No tax dollars are funding the Pembroke D.A.R.E. program which is funded solely funded by donations. Pembroke Police Department is now in its seventh year of involvement with the D.A.R.E program. Very special thanks goes out to the PEMBROKE WOMEN'S CLUB who has been our number one source for continuing this program for our children. Also, Linda Manter and the Re-Max Connection continue to donate to the program. Lastly, many thanks to the parents and the children of Pembroke for giving their support for the Pembroke D.A.R.E. Program. Have a great year.

### Burglary Summary and Statistics: Detective Dwayne R Gilman

The Pembroke Police Department investigated twenty burglaries in 2000. This is half of the reported burglaries in 1999. Fourteen of these burglaries were residential properties and six were commercial. The largest amount of total loss in residential burglaries was \$75,517.70.00. The total loss for commercial burglaries was \$5,465.00. Six arrests made on these burglaries along with arrests in four burglaries from 1999. Although most of the buildings were unsecured at the time, proper lighting and security measures would help in reducing this crime. There were a reported sixty-nine thefts in the Town of Pembroke from motor vehicles and other property. Please lock your vehicles and other property at night. Do not leave personal property in your vehicle that has any value. The idea of "It won't happen to me" has been proven to be wrong several times this year. Don't give us the chance to say, "I told you so".

## **RECREATION COMMISSION**

The Recreation Commission oversees the maintenance of Gamelin Memorial Field. Facilities at the Park include: basketball; four ball fields (one lighted) for baseball, softball and soccer; beach volleyball; fitness course; playground, picnic area; pavilion; and a boat launch area. Each year the commission supports: a soccer league for children (grades kindergarten-6), biddie basketball (grades 4-6), Little League baseball and softball, summer recreation softball, summer recreation basketball (grades 7-12), youth field hockey clinic, tennis lessons, a fishing derby, a summer recreation program, summer swimming, an annual antique fire truck show, D.A.R.E. golf tournament, Almost Home Day Road Race, Old-Home Day activities, and various groups or individuals from those who have used the park facilities for gatherings.

This past year a new slide was purchased which will be installed in the spring. This will be a welcomed addition to the playground. Materials for phase II of the irrigation system were purchased along with a aluminum bleachers. Youth soccer began the construction of a building for storage. The building is located behind the backstop on the open field. The Amogskeag Rowing Club prepared their site for placement of a dock to be used bu club members. This is to the right as you enter the park. We are excited to have A.R.C. establish their home next to the park and look forward to the Northeast Regatta in the fall.

Becky Wing directed our summer recreation program. More than 180 children registered with an average attendance of 80. Children entering grades 2 - 8 were accepted at the cost of \$2 a day. Scholarships were made available for families with financial difficulties. Allenstown helped finance the program as 40 students from that town attended. Becky was assisted by Karen Misenhelmer, Sara Bacheldar and ten teen counselors. Throughout the summer children were involved in sport activities, arts and crafts and weekly field trips. Most of the trips were to new destinations and related to the weekly theme. Both the children and the parents seemed to adjust well to the changes which made it an exciting summer for all those who attended.

New Hampshire College hosted our summer swim program. Sue Danualt directed the program for the fifth year. More than 70 children registered for free swimming lessons in the different ability levels. The commission would like to thank Ray Prouty, who arranged the pool schedule to accommodate Pembroke, and adjusted the cost schedule to make it possible for Pembroke youth to enjoy this program in an Olympic-size pool.

Helen Fryer coordinates a program for senior citizens. Residents over 55 have opportunities to attend many events and programs with speakers, pot - luck luncheons, and special trips throughout the year. The commission would like to recognize Helen for her continued work each year with the M & M group.

Out intent next year is to create a parking area near the entrance of the field, pave under the pavilion, replace roofs on men's dugout, purchase set of bleachers, continue with phase II of the irrigation system for the four playing fields, and work with the Amoskeag Rowing Club in their building plans.

Every year Henry Malo and the Highway Department assist the summer work crew on various projects. The town is very fortunate to have someone of Henry's caliber. He and his staff are very easily approachable and have helped in many ways. The commission also wants to recognize Jim Boisvert and the Allenstown Highway Department for their continued support and help when needed.

In closing, we thank the many leagues and people who used the park this part year and cooperated in keeping the park clean and that all residents can be proud of.

## **PEMBROKE WATER WORKS**

This year Pembroke Water Works mailed its second annual Water Quality Report to the water users. The report was also available at various public places. The report is part of the provisions of the Safe Drinking Water Act Amendments of 1996, which is intended to share with water users and the public the quality of drinking water. The Water Works was required to test for seventy seven (77) contaminants and only four(4) contaminants were detected. The test results showed no known violations to state and federal standards.

There was an increase of seven (07) single family homes and four (4) businesses to the water system during 2000. Nine hundred feet of water main was added on Alexander Drive. A total of three (3) hydrants were added to the system, two (2) at Alexander Drive and one (1) on High Street in front of the Village School. The well at Route 3 was refurbished and a new service line was installed at the Village School and Pembroke Academy.

The Superintendent and crew spent the spring and summer repairing water main and service breaks at two road projects. One project was on High Street in Pembroke and the other was in Allenstown on Notre Dame Avenue. They also spent much of the spring and summer connecting services to new residents and businesses. The crew responded to nearly 300 Dig-Safe calls. Responding to these calls is very time consuming but very necessary as it saves unnecessary repairs, and most of all, can save lives.

The Board received a 99 year lease from the State of New Hampshire for anew well site in Bear Brook State Park. The Board is now awaiting approval to drill new well. The well will replace a well that is no longer usable.

The crew spent considerable time on maintenance at the three well sites, both maintaining drives and roads leading to the wells, as well as repairing the pumps and maintaining the interior of the buildings.

#### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

YEARS ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2000 AND 1999

#### NOTE A - ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies of Pembroke Water Works ("the Water Works") are as follows:

#### Business Activity

The Water Works provides water service to residents and businesses located in the towns of Pembroke and Allenstown. This provides a customer base of 2,042 accounts representing 3,220 individual units.

#### Accounting Basis

The Water Works uses the accrual method of accounting for all revenue and expenses.

#### Property and Equipment

These assets are carried at cost. Maintenance repairs and minor renewals are expensed as incurred and renewals and betterments are capitalized. When an asset is retired or disposed of, the related costs and accumulated depreciation are removed from the accounts and any gain or loss on the disposition is credited or charged to income. Provision is made on the straight-line method for depreciation by annual charges to operations calculated to absorb the costs over the estimated useful lives of the assets.

The cost of water mains included under the caption "Water distribution equipment" reflects only those costs actually expended by the Water Works. In prior years, the Water Works acquired title to additional mains located in housing development areas. The cost of such mains has been borne by the developer. Under the standard contract provision mains installed in development areas become the property of the Town after a specified period of time. The cost of mains so acquired is not reflected in the property and equipment accounts.

#### Inventory

Material and supply inventory is valued at the First In - First Out (FIFO) method.

#### Allowance for Doubtful Accounts

The Company considers accounts receivable to be fully collectible; accordingly, no allowance for doubtful accounts is required.

#### **Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### NOTE B - EASEMENT AGREEMENT

In August, 1973, the State of New Hampshire granted to the Water Works an easement and right of way for the construction of a well and pumping station on land situated in Bear Brook State Park. Under the terms of the easement agreement, the Water Works is obligated to supply up to 50,000 gallons of water a day indefinitely to the State at no charge.

#### NOTE C - MUNICIPAL INVESTMENT

During fiscal year 1985 Pembroke Water Works constructed a new water main on Route 106 from Pembroke Street to the Concord City Line. The town of Pembroke voted to authorize \$200,000 for this construction and issued this amount to Pembroke Water Works. This increased the municipal investment to \$213,693 at December 31, 1985. The total construction cost of this project was \$213,815.

#### NOTE D - CAPITAL RESERVE FUND

During fiscal year 1986, Pembroke Water Works established a \$750 per unit tap fee to finance construction, reconstruction, acquisition of needed water works system equipment, improvements and/or the acquisition of land for water system expansion. The fee is only charged to Pembroke, Allenstown and Hooksett applicants; the town trustees of trust funds hold monies. The fund amounted to \$90,075 and \$72,038 at December 31, 2000 and 1999, respectively.

#### NOTE E - DEFERRED COMPENSATION PLAN

During 1988, the company established a deferred compensation plan available to all employees in accordance with section 457 of the Internal Revenue Code. The plan is administered by a third party.

Charles Thompson talked about the incorporation of the 1995 Pembroke Education Endowment Fund, a private non-profit fund regulated by the Attorney General's Office. Its purpose is to enhance the education opportunities of students in the Pembroke schools. Mr. Thompson asked that citizens read the brochure and consider making a donation to the Pembroke Education Endowment Fund.

Bill Nunnally congratulated Mrs. Whitbeck and wanted to state publicly for the record "the wonderful job Mrs. Hancock and the teachers are doing at Three Rivers School, thank you." Mr. Nunnally stated his "son is extremely excited about school, my wife and I see the positive self esteem and continuous thirst for learning in our children and their friends. And we think that speaks wonderfully of the future of our children and our town and thank you."

Tom Haley gave an update on the expansion of Pembroke Academy. The building is officially connected, state and local fire marshals have been in. An open house is in the planning and students are expected to begin moving to the new building in April.

Moderator Petit thanked everyone and announced the Annual Town and School District Election would be on Tuesday, March 14, 2000 from 11:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M. at the Pembroke Village School. The Annual Town Meeting is Saturday, March 18, 2000, 10:00 A.M. at Pembroke Academy.

The Pembroke School District Meeting was adjourned at 12:05 P.M. Motion made by Bill Nunnally and seconded by David Freeman-Wolpert.

### REPORT ON COMPLIANCE AND ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING BASED ON AN AUDIT OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS PERFORMED IN ACCORDANCE WITH GOVERNMENT AUDITING STANDARDS

December 18, 2000

I have audited the general purpose financial statements of the Pembroke School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 2000, and have issued my report thereon dated December 18, 2000. I conducted my audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and <u>Government Auditing Standards</u>, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

### Compliance

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Pembroke School District's financial statements are free of material misstatements, I performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants, non-compliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of my audit, and accordingly, I do not express such an opinion. The results of my tests disclosed no instances of non-compliance.

### Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing my audit, I obtained understanding of the Pembroke School District's internal control over financial reporting in order to determine my auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing my opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control over financial reporting. My consideration of the internal control over financial reporting would not necessary disclose all matters in the internal control over financially reporting that might be material weaknesses. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one of more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that misstatements in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. I noted no matters involving the internal control over financial reporting and its operation that I consider to be material weaknesses.

This report is intended for the information of the Audit Committee, management, and federal awarding agencies, pass through entities. However this report is a matter of public record and its distribution is not limited.

I extend my thanks to the officials and employees of the Pembroke School District for their assistance during the course of my audit.

### Appendix on Internal Controls

This is an Appendix to the December 18,2000 Pembroke School District report on internal controls and compliance based on an audit performed in accordance with <u>Government Auditing Standards</u>. The following are items that came to my attention during the audit regarding the design and operations of internal controls and compliance with laws, regulations, and other provisions of contracts and grants:

### 1. Inventory of Fixed Assets

Criteria: Inventory of fixed assets represents a significant control tool in monitoring the School District assets and is essential to prepare reliable financial statements.

- Condition: The School District does not have a schedule of assets controlled by the School District. Schedules of assets purchased by federal grants has been maintained. The School District would need to implement the new reporting model for years beginning after June 15, 2005 as required by the <u>Governmental Accounting and Financial Reporting Standards</u>: Statement 34 Basic Financial Statements and management's Discussion and Analysis for State and Local Governments. This new model requires fixed assets to be included although it would not require retroactive infrastructure reporting.
- Cause: The normal practice of governmental units in New Hampshire has been to expense the fixed asset as purchase, and not to maintain any detail schedule of assets in use.
- Recommendation: The District cause an inventory of these assets as soon as practical. The existence of fixed asset records will not only aid district officials in their control of these assets, but should be an invaluable tool in long range planning. General accepted accounting principles require fixed asset reporting as part of the general purpose financial statements and the audit opinion is being qualified due to the omission of this schedule.

Management Response: Fixed Asset Inventory completed in November, 2000.

- 2. Unsecured Cash
  - Criteria: The internal control procedures are designed to safeguard the assets of the School District.
  - Condition: The bank balance as per the bank statement at times was over the amount insured by federal bank deposit insurance. At one point during the year the balance reached \$1,719,097.
  - Cause: The need for manageable request from the town for the money appropriated results in large deposits, and large tuition bills result in large deposit balances.
  - Recommendation: The cash flow should be analyzed to insure that the cash balance is maintained at its lowest possible amount. The School District has joined the New Hampshire Public Deposit Investment Pool. The District has taken the practicable steps to reduce the risk of uninsured deposit. No further steps are considered necessary.
  - Management Response: Working with new treasurer to insure that cash is managed and protected.

### 3. <u>Student Activities</u>

Criteria: The School District has established policies for the student activity fund.

- Condition: The student activities accounts are controlled by the principal. On occasions the student activities fund is used to pay regular bill of the school district, and a subsequent request for reimbursement is made of the School District's Treasurer.
- Cause: The approach appears to be easier or faster than going through the internal control procedures established at the SAU to control disbursements.

Recommendation: The regular School District disbursements should be handled by the procedures established by the SAU, and only student activity disbursements go through the student activity fund. It is recognized that (on a very limited basis) an emergency may arise in which student activities funds might be used in such a manner. Procedures and approvals should be established for those instances.

Management Response: New procedure to be written, distributed and enforced.

## SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS REPORT

Education is a topic of great importance to almost everyone. The media covers its successes, failures and funding woes assiduously. Political candidates cite it as a major plank in their campaign platforms. Education is at the heart of our achievements and our future as a society; it has a profound impact on our daily lives from early childhood through our retirement years.

Recently University of New Hampshire Professor Thomas Newkirk wrote an article regarding the commonly expressed belief that our schools are in an "educational recession." With his permission, I would like to share Professor Newkirk's thoughts with you. I found his perspectives to be both interesting and thought-provoking and hope you do as well.

Professor Newkirk feels that two myths permeate the debate on public education. The first is that we are in educational decline. The second is that even if we aren't in decline, demands of the 21st century will be dramatically higher and our schools are not ready to meet those demands.

It is, of course, tempting to look back to an educational Golden Age – invariably the years each of us was in school – and then trace a downward line to the present. Yet the most reliable records of national achievement show that students' reading and writing ability has remained remarkably constant for the general population with modest improvements for minority students. In mathematics, a special area of concern for many, students have posted small but steady increases over the past decade.

Even opinion polls suggest that the dissatisfaction with schools may be more illusory than it seems. When the general population is asked to evaluate U.S. schools with a grade, only 19% gave an A or B. When the same group was asked to rate their own school system, 44% gave top grades. Yet when parents of children in school were asked to rate the schools their children attended, 72% gave top grades. So while there may be a generalized dissatisfaction about American schooling, communities and parents for the most part view their own local schools positively.

The second debate states that, even if there is no real basis for claiming an actual decline in educational attainment, critics feel the current standard of achievement is inadequate for the demands of jobs in the 21st century. Without dramatic increases in literacy levels, we won't have enough qualified workers for the more complex jobs being created and our economy will suffer. Yet again evidence suggests otherwise. Recently, the National Educational Testing Service Published a study entitled <u>What Jobs Require</u>. The study concludes that "averaging all occupations, the literacy requirements in 1986, 1996, and 2006 were and are projected to be successfully addressed. The increases in literacy demands since 1940 have been more than offset by higher graduation rates and increasing enrollments in post-secondary education." The report concludes there is no crisis in literacy preparation.

In the early 1980's the United States Department of Education published the report <u>A</u> <u>Nation At Risk</u> which warned of a "rising tide of mediocrity" which would undermine the economic vitality of the country. Schools were blamed for what the report called "an act of unthinking, unilateral, educational disarmament." These have turned out to be poor and inaccurate predictions. The students who attended those "mediocre" schools are in the workforce now posting productivity gains that are the envy of the industrial world. Schools sometimes receive blame during economic downturns, but with the resurgence of the economy, they usually do not receive credit.

Professor Newkirk certainly does not mean to make the case for complacency. There is serious work to be done to close the societal, racial and economic achievement gap, to recruit and prepare a new generation of teachers in response to the looming shortage, and to move all students beyond a basic level of achievement. There are still too many students unprepared for advanced education and the job market. However, these problems demand patient, thoughtful local action which must involve – not simply blame – educators. While we need "distance runners," indestructible and in for the long haul, a crisis mentality only breeds "sprinters," seeking quick but unsustainable fixes. We will make little progress if we persist in denying the factual record that most public schools are succeeding and improving while continuing to create the myth of crisis.

Jon Marston, a long time Pembroke teacher (and PA varsity baseball coach) and I are the administrators at the building. That is how I come to be writing this year's annual report for all three buildings, K - 8.

We have had a few staff changes since our last report but our staffs have been quite stable for these economic times. First, I would like to acknowledge the retirement of Mrs. Bev Sarapin who had been a long time teacher in the Pembroke School District. She was a member of the Hill staff for many years and we appreciate her time and dedication to her students. At Hill/Village we added Mrs. Jill Krunklevich as a kindergarten teacher for the 2000-2001 year. Mrs.Krunklevich had been a long-term substitute with us when Ms. Colpitts was on leave. Ms. Becky Hirtle joined us last year at Hill School in the second grade. Ms. Hirtle had previously completed her student teaching with us and also had worked with us as an assistant. We welcome both of these people to our staff and hope they remain with us for a long time. At Three Rivers, Ms. Lynn Peterson, a Language Arts teacher, left to take another position. The Artist in Residence program was again held at both Hill School and Three Rivers. At Hill School quilt artist Merrilyn San Soucie worked with students designing and sewing quilts. These quilts were displayed at the New England Images Quilt Show in the fall in Lowell, Ma. The students were recognized for their original works by the quilt judges. At Three Rivers worked continued on the hang out space under the direction of Ron King.

Our schools continue to make use of volunteers and have been recognized by the state through the Blue Ribbon Awards. We appreciate the help and support we have always gotten from the community. We also encourage anyone who is interested in volunteering to contact the school in which you would like to volunteer. We are aware that there may be potential volunteers in the community who do not currently have students in our schools and therefore don't have regular contact with us. Please feel free to call and make inquiries.

We continue to make consistent progress on the state assessment. At the third grade level this is the most noticeable in the area of math. We have made changes in our math curriculum and those changes have yielded very good results. In the area of Language Arts the 2000 testing was the first year that we were at or above state average on the open ended or essay questions. These questions indicate the level of comprehension students have of material that they have read. They really test the higher order thinking skills. This is an area we have chosen to emphasize because we feel it is one of the most important in a student's education.

At both Hill and Three Rivers the annual road races took place. These two events promote physical fitness and are tremendously popular with the students. At Hill School we continue to use this as a fund-raiser for school projects. Our thanks to Craig Stam and Mark Thomas for establishing these traditions.

At Three Rivers we continue to offer a variety of extra curricular activities for the middle level students. We have soccer, basketball, skiing, softball and baseball in the area of team sports. In addition we have band, chorus, art club and skiing among other activities.

As always we would like to thank the community for their support. We appreciate how lucky our students are to be in a community that has worked hard to provide them with the resources needed for a good education. I'd also like to thank the Pembroke School Board and Superintendent Tom Haley along with his staff for their ongoing support. I also want to acknowledge all of the people who work in the offices, the custodial department, food service and transportation. It takes everyone working together to make our district the great place that it is for children to be everyday. Lastly, I would like to thank the teachers that I have the privilege of working with on a daily basis. ## TOWN MEETING WARRANT PEMBROKE, NH

# TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF PEMBROKE, IN THE COUNTY OF MERRIMACK, IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Pembroke Village School on Tuesday, March 13, 2001 from 11:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. for the casting of ballots; and at Pembroke Academy, in said Pembroke, on Saturday. March 17, 2001, at 10:00 a.m., to act upon the following articles:

#### BALLOT ARTICLES MARCH 13, 2001

- 1. To choose all necessary officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. Are you in favor of the adoption of the following amendments to the existing Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Pembroke as proposed by the Planning Board:

Amendment #1: To amend Chapter 143 of the Code of the Town of Pembroke, entitled Zoning, to amend Section 143-45.1, Parking Requirement Waivers.

**Explanation:** The purpose of Amendment #1is to clarify that under RSA 674:21(h), the Planning Board may modify the parking requirements of the zoning ordinance if it finds that a) practical difficulties may result from strict compliance with the regulations, b) an alternative proposal is appropriate for the circumstances and use of the property, c) the purposes of the zoning ordinance may be served to a greater extent by the alternative proposal. and d) good cause is shown. This will allow the Board greater flexibility when reviewing commercial development proposals under site plan review where alternative parking schemes would result in a better overall development design.

Amendment #2: To amend the Code of the Town of Pembroke by deleting and repealing Chapter 143, Article XII, Impact Fees, and replacing it with a new Article XII, to be entitled Impact Fees, which provides for collection of impact fees, the demand for which is generated by new development.

**Explanation:** The purpose of Amendment #2 is to replace the current Impact Fee Ordinance with one that complies with a recent NH Supreme Court decision concerning impact fees. The amendment will allow the Planning Board to continue to assess impact fees on new development and will allow the Planning Board to continue to work with developers to complete off-site improvements which are necessary as a result of the development.

#### TOWN OF PEMBROKE DELIBERATIVE SESSION MARCH 17, 2001

- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of nine hundred ninety-seven thousand dollars (S997,000) for the purpose of constructing a new library building, eight hundred thousand dollars (S800,000) of such sum to be raised through the issuance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the Municipal Finance Act, RSA 33:1 et seq., as amended; furthermore to authorize the withdrawal of one hundred forty three thousand dollars (S143,000) plus all accumulated interest to the date of withdrawal from the Library Building Capital Reserve Funds; to authorize the withdrawal of fifty-four thousand dollars (\$54,000) plus all accumulated interest to the date of withdrawal from the Library Donation Trust Fund; to authorize the Selectmen to issue, negotiate, sell and deliver said bonds and notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon and the maturity and other terms thereof; and to authorize the Selectmen to take any other action or to pass any other vote relative thereto. *Recommended by Board Selectmen and Budget Committee*. (2/3 ballot vote required).
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) to be added to the Sewer and Water Extension Capital Reserve Fund previously established and to authorize the transfer of the December 31 fund balance in that amount for this purpose. *Recommended by Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee.* (Majority vote required)
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and ten thousand dollars (\$110.000) to be added to the Town Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established. *Recommended by Board Selectmen and Budget Committee.* (Majority vote required)
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixty-eight thousand two hundred dollars (S68,200) to be added to the Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established. *Recommended by Board Selectmen. Not recommended by the Budget Committee.* (Majority vote required)
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand seven hundred fifty dollars (\$15,750) to be added to the Fire Department Small Equipment Fund previously established and to authorize the transfer of the December 31 fund balance in that amount for this purpose. *Recommended by Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee.* (Majority vote required)
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) to be added to the Library Building Capital Reserve Fund previously established and to authorize the transfer of the December 31 fund balance in that amount for this purpose. *Recommended by Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee.* (Majority vote required)
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to be added to the Sidewalk Construction/Repair Capital Reserve Fund previously established. Recommended by Board Selectmen. Not recommended by the Budget Committee. (Majority vote required)

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purchase of a new computer accounting and assessing system and to raise appropriate the sum of eighty-eight thousand dollars (\$88,000) to be placed in this fund, and to authorize the transfer of the December 31 fund balance in that amount for this purpose, and to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend. *Recommended by Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee.* (Majority vote required)
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to purchase a flail mower for the trackless tractor and to authorize the withdrawal of a sum not to exceed twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) from the Town Equipment Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose. *Recommended by Board Selectmen and Budget Committee*. (Majority vote required)
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed eight thousand dollars (\$8,000) to rehabilitate French's Cemetery and to authorize the withdrawal of a sum not to exceed eight thousand dollars (\$8,000) from the Cemetery Maintenance Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose. *Recommended by Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee.* (Majority vote required)
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$5,069,246** which represents the operating budget. Said sum does not include special or individual articles addressed.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to change the purpose of the existing Solid Waste Closure Capital Reserve Fund to the Solid Waste Facility Maintenance/Closure Fund and to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend. (2/3 vote required)
- 15. To see if the Town is in favor of amending the Code of the Town of Pembroke, Chapter 133 thereof, entitled Solid Waste Management, to expand the hours of the solid waste facility, set fees for certain uses of the facility, and regulate the amount of trash accepted from commercial/residential mixed-use properties.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to accept from the Captain Andrew Buntin Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution a certain property identified as Pembroke Park, so-called, located in the Town of Pembroke as a gift, subject to the following conditions: 1) The deed shall provide that the park shall be maintained and preserved a s a park and as a memorial to those who fought to preserve the nation and the union. The Civil War monument and two artillery pieces, known as cannon, along with other war memorials, shall be maintained and preserved at the location in perpetuity, and these memorials shall neither be sold nor otherwise removed from the park; 2) The Captain Andrew Buntin Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution shall retain the right and privilege to hold the annual fund raiser at the park, at no cost to the Chapter; and 3) If, at some future time, the Town of Pembroke should find itself unable or unwilling to continue its ownership, then the park, with its monuments and appurtenances shall be gifted by the Town to a non-profit organization in the Town of Pembroke, willing to assume that honor and duty under the same conditions.

- 17. To see if the Town is in favor of the State of New Hampshire constructing a new bridge connecting Buck Street in Pembroke to Turnpike Street in Allenstown. The Town of Pembroke will then assume all future maintenance and replacement costs for the bridge.
- 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

1. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

2. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to accept gifts and donations from any source on behalf of the School District.

3. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of up to \$50,000, from surplus, to be added to the Special Education Trust Fund previously established, and to authorize the use/transfer of up to \$50,000 from the June 30, 2001 fund balance for this purpose.

4. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of up to \$20,000, from surplus, to be added to the School Roadway Trust Fund previously established, and to authorize the use/transfer of up to \$20,000 from the June 30, 2001 fund balance for this purpose.

5. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of up to \$20,000, from surplus, to be added to the School Building Capital Reserve Fund previously established, and to authorize the use/transfer of up to \$20,000, from the June 30, 2001 fund balance for this purpose.

School Board recommends approval Budget Committee recommends approval

6. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of up to \$10,000, from surplus, to be added to the Major Equipment Trust Fund previously established, and to authorize the use/transfer of up to \$10,000 from the June 30, 2001 fund balance for this purpose.

School Board recommends approval Budget Committee recommends approval

7. To see if the District will vote to authorize the withdrawal of \$47,475 from the School Building Capital Reserve Fund for the purposes of field irrigation at Pembroke Academy (\$22,000), hallway painting at Three Rivers School (\$7,975), carpeting at Hill and Village Schools and ceiling tile replacement at Hill School (\$9,000), fencing and playground safety edging replacement at Village School (\$8,500).

8. To see if the District will vote to remove the term "major" from the title and purpose of the Major Equipment Trust Fund previously established.

9. To see if the District will vote to authorize the withdrawal of \$27,300 from the (*Major*) Equipment Trust Fund for the purposes of purchasing grounds maintenance equipment (\$2,300), a replacement fire alarm panel for Village School (\$6,000) and a replacement phone/intercom system for Village School (\$19,000).

10. To see if the District will vote to approve the cost items as set forth in the collective bargaining agreement reached between the Education Association of Pembroke and the Pembroke School Board for the 2001/02, 2002/03 and 2003/04 fiscal years, which calls for the following estimated increases in salaries and benefits:

Year 2001/02	\$380,739
Year 2002/03	\$358,844
Year 2003/04	\$353,755

and further to raise and appropriate the sum of \$380,739 for the 2001/02 fiscal year, such sum representing the additional costs attributable to the increase in salaries and benefits agreed to by the Pembroke School Board and the Education Association of Pembroke.

[This article asks whether voters wish to modify the existing A.R.E.A. Agreement with Pembroke Academy. The most significant change would grant one member of the Allenstown, Chichester and Epsom School Boards voting status on the Pembroke School Board for all matters related to the governance of Pembroke Academy. Other changes nullify the exclusion of certain Epsom students and bring the Agreement into compliance with current statute.]
