TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Peterborough, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Town on Tuesday, the second day of March next, at eight of the clock in the forenoon (Polls close at 6:00 P.M.), to ballot for Town Officers and other questions required by law to be decided by ballot. Pursuant to the authority of RSA 39:2-a and the vote of the Town on March 10, 1970, all business other than ballot questions will be recessed until 7:00 P.M. Tuesday, March 9, 1976, at Peterborough Elementary School, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board, or take any other action relating thereto. (Ballot Question)

Article 3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees or Officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept legacies and gifts to the Town in Trust or otherwise by any individual or individuals, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Office, Town House, Legal Expense, Street Lighting, Water Charge, Patriot Purposes, Vital Statistics, Local Planning, Old Fire Station, Board of Adjustment, Health, Conservation Commission, Highway Summer, Highway Winter, Public Works Summary, Highway Garage, Police Department, Fire Department, Ambulance, Library, District Court, Welfare Department, Parks, Recreation Department, Sanitary Landfill, Civil Defense, and for any other charge arising within the Town.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow in anticipation of collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town, negotiable notes therefore, said notes to be paid in the current municipal year from taxes collected during the current municipal year and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Eighteen Thousand Dollars (\$18,000.00) to cover the interest on the notes, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the paying of the Town Debt and Interest the sum of Three Hundred Twenty-Three Thousand Nine Hundred Seventy-Five Dollars (\$323,975.00) for repayment of sewer bonds and Fifteen Thousand Six Hundred Seventy-Five Dollars (\$15,675.00) for repayment of the Space Committee Loan, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote that commencing with the 1976 Annual Town Meeting to be held on the second day of March next, that members of the Peterborough Planning Board shall be elected by nonpartisan ballot and in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 36:4 RSA as amended and revised by the 1975 Session of the General Court under Chapter 228:1, or take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the

following priority purposes and in amounts indicated, or take any other action hereon:

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Four Hundred Seventy-One Dollars and Seventy-Seven Cents (\$1,471.77) provided that the State of New Hampshire appropriate Nine Thousand Eight Hundred Eleven Dollars and Seventy-Nine Cents (\$9,811.79) for the construction of Class IV and V highways, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to accept from the State of New Hampshire Twenty-Seven Thousand Two Hundred Seventy-Seven Dollars and Eight Cents (\$27,277.08) in Block Grant moneys restricted to highway usage, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Three Thousand Three Hundred Seventy-Five Dollars (\$23,375.00) to replace a dump truck and plow, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$3,200.00) to replace the 1960 welder, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) for continuation of the street improvement program, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$3,300.00) to replace the 1974 Plymouth Cruiser, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Six Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$1,680.00) to hire an additional member of the Police Department as a crossing guard at Main Street-Concord Street Intersection, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to add to the capital reserve fund for an aerial ladder, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars (\$2,700.00) to refinish the tennis courts at Adams Playground, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to purchase a combination snowblower-lawnmower for maintenance work at Adams Park, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to transfer and use the sum of One Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars (\$1,900.00) from the income of the Albert W. Noone fund for capital improvements in beautification at Adams Playground, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the moderator to appoint a committee of seven citizens (including the three library trustees) to explore the

need for expansion of the Town Library and if necessary to formulate plans for said expansion, acquire options on land, and report back to the 1977 Town Meeting for action, and further to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for the committee to carry out its work, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to install a sanitary sewage main on Currier Avenue between Route 202 and the

Balog residence, or take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Eight Hundred Fifteen Dollars (\$2,815.00) for curb and sidewalk work on sections of Main and Depot Streets, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Eight Thousand Dollars (\$28,000.00) for renovations on Hunter Farm Road, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) to be used at the Selectmen's descretion for Bi-Centennial purposes, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) for the restoration of the War Memorial, or take any

other action relating thereto.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey a parcel of land not to exceed three acres in size on Evans Road to the Masonic Lodge for a price to be determined by the Selectmen, but not less than its fair market value, providing the grantee assume all legal, survey and appraisal expenses, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Seventy Dollars (\$170.00) for White Pine Blister Rust Control, or take any

other action relating thereto.

Article 29. Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Sixty-Two Dollars (\$2,062.00) for the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service, or take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Nine Hundred Twenty-Six Dollars (\$2,926.00) for the support of the Monadnock Region Association, or take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to convey a certain portion of the Shadow Lane right-of-way to Ronald L. & Madelyn M. Rauer for a price to be determined by the Selectmen providing the grantee assume all legal expenses, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 35. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to Administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deed, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 36. To transact any other business that may legally come before this



SELECTMEN'S REPORT 1975

We reviewed a few previous reports to see if there might now appear some points of comparison which make 1975 an outstanding year.

Not particularly. There were no major sewer construction projects, no sweeping reappraisals of properties, no radical legislative programs implemented. Of course there was the now usual road betterment project continuing Old Street Road — an expensive but excellent segment in terms of present and long range benefit — and the also usual distress over the cutting of trees and the disturbing of "quo". For the water department, there occurred the abrupt necessity to start improvements and future planning for the so-called high system, and this we did. There were other works, visible and not so visible, which kept our town a good place to live in — many hours of deliberation and decision in boards and committees providing good planning, good development, good administration and even good recreation. A fairly smooth and successful year.

Not exactly. Underlying every month were cost factors which finally demonstrated that the town was too closely budgeted. We did not succeed in exerting enough control to prevent a deficit position in all departments except recreation, and that was solvent by less than 100 dollars. The amount expended in excess of appropriations for town affairs was \$27813 — or about 4 percent. As a whole, however, the town did not "go into the red" simply because there were several functions showing surpluses and several unencumbered funds which could be, and were, applied against the operating deficit — actually finishing with a small overall surplus for the year. In 1974 we ended up with a similar surplus, but the difference now is that we have experienced some departmental deficits.

The Department of Revenue Administration advised us last year that a town the size and complexity of Peterborough should not budget so closely as to obtain surpluses of only several thousand dollars. Too many unexpected things can happen. For some years, we have been strongly urged by savings-minded groups to avoid raising funds which expenditures later proved unnecessary. It was argued that this was a taxpayer hardship — regardless of the fact that a "running surplus" from year to year provided constant reimbursement through the credit side of the ledger. We know now that regarding actual costs of the past year as reliable guides for a "tight budget" — even if higher estimates are made — makes us vulnerable to unanticipated inflation. The 1975 budget appropriations were so conservative that for the fifth consecutive year the town's rate of increase in taxes raised versus the school district and the county was lower. A tax rate reduction was actually achieved. This drew congratulations from our taxpayers and, incidentally, from the Governor of the State.

While increases in the costs of most services and supplies were either fully expected and budgeted or blocked by our control efforts, some notable exceptions against which we had little defense were increases in heating oil by 8 percent and in electric power by 37 percent — and great pressures for miscellaneous additional expenses including editorial urgings to continue to "go first class" despite small deficits.

On the "positive" side of the year's experience, Peterborough continued its development — at a slow rate of growth, adding approximately a million dollars to its taxable property values. Also of benefit to the town was the failure of the attempted overturn of the 1974 reassessment. This now assures all taxpayers of a stable assessment through the next several years, until another complete reap-

praisal is made. Values, as demonstrated in transactions over the past eighteen months, are substantially above the April, 1974 levels.

Also positive were the numerous unselfish services of many volunteer individuals and groups and the continuing good work of town staff and employees. We feel fortunate in all of this, and we are looking forward to a successful year ahead.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC WORKS RELATIVE TO ADMINISTRATION

Town House Trees Parks Cemeteries Town Office Highway Department Water Department Sewer Department

Engineering

The following is a brief report of the departments that I have administered for the past year.

Town Office

For the first time in three years the Town Office workload has returned to routine business.

Town House

Space continues to be a scarce commodity in the Town House as every available space is being utilized for office space at this time.

Any future office requirements in the building will mandate a remodeling and interior partitioning of the lower hall. Much thought along this line will be persued in the coming year.

Highway Department

The early season dry-up coupled with unusually good weather late into the year allowed the department to accomplish a substantial amount of maintenance work and reconstruction during the past year. Crews continued to ditch roadsides right up to the first snow storm just before Christmas.

Among other late in the season projects was the excavation of an abnormal number of frost heave boulders from country road surfaces.

Storm drains were cleaned both in the Spring and Fall. For the first time the basin cleaner was utilized to open outlets of culverts. This experiment worked well enough to be incorporated into the permanent maintenance schedule for future years.

The rebuilding program was again in full swing as Old Street Road between the Cemetery and East Hill Road was completely reconstructed.

Grove Street Extension was rebuilt to enter Route 202 at right angles and the railroad embankment was eliminated.

Curbs and sidewalks were installed on Main Street and Granite Street.

New hot top pavement was applied to Old Street Road between East Hill Road and Cheney Avenue, Pine Street from Cheney Avenue to Route 101 and High Street between MacDowell Road and MacDowell Colony.

Safety improvements were made by eliminating two narrow sharp curves on MacDowell Road just west of the Perry residence, and at Sand Hill four corners.

Short sections of Mountain View Drive, Four Winds Road, Old Greenfield Road, Bogle Road and Holt Road were reconstructed and resurfaced.

The usual mileage of sealing was applied to the streets scheduled for surface treatment during the summer.

Water Department

Fourteen new consumers were added in 1975.

Two thousand feet of 8" main was extended along Old Street Road by Paul Bourgoine to serve his proposed development in that area.

The high system project received a temporary setback when, after the booster for Kaufman Drive was put in service, it was found that inadequate pressure developed on Cheney Avenue and part of Old Street Road.

The entire high system was restored to Cunningham Pond pending the outcome of a study by Whitman-Howard Engineers of Boston.

Sewer Department

Two thousand feet of new sewer main was extended on High Street from the Country Club to MacDowell Colony. The work was financed by MacDowell Colony under the guaranteed mainline extension program.

The treatment plant again received operational approval from the Environmental Protection Agency.

Landfill

Again this year salvage rights at the landfill were sold to the highest bidder. The bid was slightly higher than last year and may indicate a trend for private business to enter the recycling field on the local level.

Five years of operation has used approximately three acres of land.

Trees and Forests

Sixty-five dead trees were removed from Town rights-of-way this year.

Only nine new trees were planted under the beautification program. More property owners could take advantage of the program.

No seedlings were planted this year as emphasis was placed on developing a complete forest management program for department maintained woodlands. William A. Bean, Jr., supervisor of Wood and Timber, is assisting the department with the technical aspect.

Beautification projects were completed by Boy Scout Peter Galbraith at the Fly Pond corner and by Town crews as a part of the Sand Hill four corner project and by Han-Sons Construction at the Old Street Road Cemetery as a part of that road project.

Parks

Putnam Park again received excellent care from Ted Brayton and Teixeira Park was well maintained by Bud Grant.

New picnic tables will be installed in both parks in the coming season.

The Town's newest park, Mercer Park in Pineridge, is shaping up slowly as it is a spare time project. A series of small waterfalls will be installed and the area thinned out and pruned above head level in the Spring. Picnic tables will be placed in this woodland park also.

Town Garage

Crews completed the storage lanes behind the garage as a spare time project this year and now all stock is inventoried at this location.

Also completed was the cold storage sheds housing water and sewer supplies. These were constructed mostly from materials salvaged from the old salt shed.

Siding on the new salt storage shed is still needed as it is foolish to be continually nailing tarpaper on a building of that size.

Engineering Department

Future sanitary sewage systems are on the drawing board and will be completed as time allows. Several projects have been designed and approval received from

the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission. When construction money becomes available these plans will be activated.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation to the Selectmen, the office staff, my foremen and crews of the Department of Public Works, fellow department heads and their personnel, and to the citizens of Our Town for their understanding and support throughout the year.

3. NOTE PAYABLE - GENERAL

The note payable to bank at December 31, 1975 was a 4 1/2% note for renovation of town house and fire station and construction of highway garage, payable in annual installments of \$15,000, plus interest, through 1976.

4. LONG-TERM DEBT - GENERAL

General long-term debt at December 31, 1975 represented the unpaid balance of the 4.10% sewer construction bonds. The bonds are payable in annual installments of \$185,000, plus interest, through 1980, and in annual installments of \$180,000, plus interest, from 1981 through 1990.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT For the Year 1975

Statistics may be interpreted in many ways. Our statistics show activities that can be documented such as the number of materials charged across the Circulation Desk, registration figures and amounts of materials purchased.

What statistics do not show is the tremendous amount of activity taking place daily within the Library; ie; the use by patrons of the card catalog or micro-film reader; constant referral to our Reference Collection; reading of magazines and newspapers from our Periodical Collection or browsing through the town histories in the McGilvray Room.

During the past year, public library and school cooperation greatly increased with discussions, class visits to the public library, book talks at the school, issuance of teacher cards for special subject loans, inter-library loans, borrowing equipment, reference service and union listing of non-fiction titles in the Conval High School Library.

Activities for children were varied: a "Right-to-Read" program jointly sponsored by the Library and the Recreation Department brought "paperbacks in the park" to many children by staff members Joan Butler and Ann Geisel. Films were shown at a "Summer Film Festival" by Joan Butler preceded by Frances Russ telling stories. "Hiking Through Historic New Hampshire" was the theme for this year's Summer Readers' Club whose 53 participants read 490 books. The Little Red Wagon visited us twice and helped give out Reading Certificates to those 31 members reading the required number of books.

Monadnock Manor was included in our Adult Services Program being developed by Ann Geisel who also presented films at the Scott-Farrar Home and brought armfuls of large-print books to both places. Any retirement or nursing-home facility in the area may participate in this program by contacting the librarian.

Helen Richardson, a twelve year staff member, resigned in May to be married. Her dedication and loyalty has been an inspiration to all: patrons and staff wish her well.

Joan Butler received a scholarship to attend a Public Library Techniques course in cataloging at the University of New Hampshire during the summer.

Ann Geisel was appointed Assistant Librarian in November and is in charge of developing Adult Services and Programs.

The librarian spoke before a Children's Literature class at Keene State College and attended a number of Southwest District Advisory Council meetings and workshops. Accompanied by different staff members, she attended conferences conducted by the New Hampshire Library Council and the New England Library Association during the spring and fall.

An award for maintaining high standards as a Service Center under the Statewide Library Development Program was presented to the Library by the State Library Commission in February.

Many patrons and friends have given suggestions, books, time and funds to further the services of the Town Library.

To them, and to our conscientious Board of Trustees and loyal, hard-working staff, our sincerest gratitude. Their dedication to the community has made our Town Libary one to be used with pride.

CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT FOR 1975

Undoubtedly the highlight of Civil Defense activities this past year was the completion of our new headquarters. This was activated by the generosity and cooperation of the Board of Selectmen. After approval, as to required safety factors, by State and Federal Civil Defense officers, the room, being the old coal bin, was accepted and green light given.

Work began on April 18, 1975 and completed by May 24, 1975. The labor for this work was furnished by the Peterborough 210th Engineers Detachment under the able supervision of Sgt. Red Phelps with no charge to Civil Defense. Our sincere thanks go to the National Guard unit for their grand contribution. We now have a very comfortable and functionable EOC. Again, we wish to thank Bellows & Nichols Co. for their long contribution of their basement room for Civil Defense use.

On September 27, 1975 we helped divert another bad flood situation at the North Dam which was threatening the Countryside Motel. Our heavy truck with winch operated by Tom Tewell was brought into play.

On November 17, 1975 we attended, with Selectman Ashford Peters, an Evaluation Seminar on Civil Defense status of Emergency Preparedness.

Other than keeping abreast of increasing State and Federal requirements, we have had a productive year.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT — 1975

Once again, it is our privilege to report on the activities of the Fire Department. During 1975, the fire department answered calls for 93 incidents, 11 drills and 12 meetings. The fire loss for 1975 was approximately \$405,000.00, with \$400,000.00 loss occurring in December with the Transcript Printing Company building fire. The calls for 1975 may be categorized as follows:

Many of our calls were for alarm malfunctions. During 1975, the fire alarm system was enlarged to two circuits and taking in many of the automatic sprinkler systems between the New Hampshire Ball Bearing plant in South Peterborough to New England Business Service in the north. This improvement was done at no cost to the town as the industries that benefited shared the cost. This change will cause an increase in alarm malfunctions but will also alert the fire department as to a possible fire in as short a time as possible. This change is important as time is our most important factor in controlling a fire.

During 1975, we took delivery of our new 2,000 gallon tanker and have looked at nine used ladder trucks. We bid on one truck in Pennsylvania but were not the successful bidder. We intend to continue searching for a ladder truck in the New England, New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and Maryland area.

In addition to fire fighting, we also made 356 calls with the ambulance and traveled 9475 miles making these calls. All members operating on the ambulance are members of the fire department. Thirteen members have received EMT training and are volunteers as are all members of the fire department.

The members have been active in various parades with our antique equipment at the museum. We erected a sign that was made possible by some interested citizens and engraved a stone in memory of Dyer F. Brown and family.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN REPORT

Upon the recommendation of town selectmen and city councils, the Division of Forests and Lands appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town and city every three years. The town or city warden is responsible for maintaining a force of men and adequate equipment to suppress any wildfire that occurs in his town or city during his term of appointment. The fire warden must authorize all open burning when the ground is not covered with snow. No open fires can be authorized between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., unless it is raining, without the additional permission of the state district fire chief.

Any person wishing to kindle an open fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the forest fire warden. Camp and cooking fires also require the warden's permission.

The Division of Forests and Lands, through its Forest Fire Service, assists all cities and towns in meeting these requirements by training the warden and deputy forces in wildfire suppression tactics, making hand tool suppression equipment available at fifty percent of cost, supplying pieces of Federal excess property for use as fire attack vehicles and sharing up to fifty percent of the cost of wildfire suppression costs.

Wildfire prevention is also a joint state, city or town program. Smokey Bear is available from the Forest Fire Service for local fire prevention programs. Posters and Junior Ranger kits are available for distribution by local fire departments upon request to the Forest Fire Service. Each forest fire warden is expected to carry on a continuous wildfire prevention program within his town or city.

REPORT OF OVERSEER OF PUBLIC WELFARE

In 1975, eighteen requests were approved for direct relief from applicants who were not at the time of the request eligible for any assistance except that which is provided for by the local community. These requests exceeded by five the number approved in 1974, and were in most instances temporary awaiting approval of State Assisted Programs, or of an emergency nature.

Three Hundred Fourteen Dollars and Ninety-Seven Cents (\$314.97) were received from: Common Trust Fund D, the John Q. Adams Fund, Almon T. Hovey Fund, Asgood Fund, and Malinda Upton Fund, and was distributed in time for Christmas. Inaddition, One Hundred Sixty-Seven Dollars and Sixty-Eight Cents (\$167.68) was received from the Overseer of the Poor Trust Fund, and expended in the interest of human rehabilitation.

The costs of State and Federal Programs, administered from the State level continue to increase in these inflationary times. In July there was a change in the rate of Federal Matching Funds for Medical Expenditures, and although only 1.1 percent, this along with increased State payment to Nursing Homes is a factor in the increased expenditures in this category. In addition there were two adjustment charges during the year from the State for people who were the financial responsibility of Peterborough rather than the original town.

Local communities are going to have in the future, more financial responsibility for the support of children placed through Court Orders. A law, effective August 28, 1975, incorporates a new classification of children; "persons in need of supervision". Under this statute Judges may order these children directly to foster homes, group homes, schools, or institutions. These placements cost several times more than regular foster care, and the Legislature has reaffirmed its position that local communities and counties should continue to pay for children placed outside their homes by defeating a Bill that would have required the State to pay for these children.

REPORT OF PLANNING BOARD

The year 1975 has been a significant milestone in the planning process of the Town of Peterborough. In January, a professionally prepared Master Plan for the Town was adopted by the Planning Board. In March, extensive amendments to the Town's Zoning Ordinance were overwhelmingly voted by the Town Meeting. In June, soils maps for the entire community were completed and are now in the process of being reproduced for community use. Eighteen meetings and eight public hearings were held by the Board. The only major commercial development for the year was the Arista Chevrolet-Oldsmobile, Inc. garage on Route 202 South. Nine minor subdivisions were approved by the Board and the moratorium on multi-lot subdivisions was repealed on June 16, 1975. A further refinement of the Land Subdivision Regulations, based on the recommendations of the Town Planner, were enacted in December of 1975 with special emphasis on cluster housing regulations.

There are three cluster housing proposals presently before the Planning Board, as follows: The Hancock Homes, Inc. twenty-three unit proposal at the corner of Pine and Wilton Roads, the Lloyd Reynolds eighteen unit proposal off of Prospect Street, and the Keenan Construction Corporation's forty-six lot proposal off of Old Street Road. The Board also made five recommendations to the Board of Adjustment concerning special exceptions to the zoning ordinance and approved four discretionary easements under the Current Use Taxation Legislation.

The 1975 Town Meeting requested the Planning Board to prepare Building Code for consideration by the Town on or before the 1976 Town Meeting. A subcommittee of the Board, consisting of Paul C. Cummings, Jr., Harlan E. Karr and Jere T. Morris, has been working on that project. The task proved to be larger than anticipated and the Planning Board is asking the Town for further time to consider the Building Code problems. The State of New Hampshire has adopted an electrician licensing law effective July 1, 1975 which requires electricians to conform with the applicable regulations of the National Electrical Code or other safety codes which have been approved by the American Standards Association. The State has also adopted a state wide plumbing code with provisions no less stringent than the BOCA basic plumbing code as promulgated by the Building Officials and Code Administrators International, Inc. This plumbing code became effective on January 1, 1976. The BOCA Building Code is a formable document of almost five hundred pages in length. The Planning Board has considerable doubt as to whether or not the Town of Peterborough is ready for such a complicated set of regulations which will affect almost every householder in the Town. Any law is only as good as the enforcement behind the land in the Board's opinion, a full time building inspector with the necessary expertise would have to be hired by the Town to enforce the building code. In view of the State Legislation concerning electricians and plumbing codes, the Planning Board respectfully requests further time to consider a Building Code for this community.

The Planning Board expects to adopt further amendments to the Land Subdivision Regulations to carry out the recommendations of the Master Plan and also expects, during 1976, to codify and reprint the ordinance booklet to incorporate the many amendments since the last printing in 1971.

In April of 1975, Richard C. Johnson retired as a member of the Peterborough Planning Board, after ten years of dedicated service. The following resolution was unanimously adopted by the Board:

"WHEREAS, Richard C. Johnson served on the Peterborough Planning Board

beginning in 1965 and until his retirement in 1975, and

"WHEREAS, Mr. Johnson was a devoted, conscientious and constructive member of the board, and

"WHEREAS, Mr. Johnson's service on the board substantially contributed to the betterment of our community through his fair and impartial judgment on the many issues he was called upon to consider,

"THEREFORE, the Peterborough Planning Board on this 16th day of June, 1975, takes official recognition of the retirement of Mr. Johnson, and extends to him its sincere thanks for his decade of dedicated efforts on behalf of the Town of Peterborough.

"ALSO that this Resolution shall be made a part of the official record of the Peterborough Planning Board, and the Chairman is directed to send a copy to Mr. Johnson".

1975 REPORT OF THE PETERBOROUGH CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The year 1975 has been a progressive one for all those concerned with the conservation and preservation of New England's natural heritage. New Hampshire, with its sea shore, mountains and rural assets of scenic and historic note, has made marked strides toward physical protection and possession of its major areas, although still lacking adequate overall legislative protection and regulation of open space, inevitably hampered by an ever present conflict of local and statewide interests.

As an area community, Peterborough has joined enthusiastically in the last year's accomplishment toward the legal establishment of a State Reservation for Monadnock Mountain and its environment, including Gap Mountain. Likewise, interest is now turning to the projection of the Monadnock-Sunapee Trail.

In Our Town itself we find residents looking for unpolluted streams and ponds for fishing, canoeing, or swimming, trails for hiking, riding, or skiing, and back roads for bicycling or snowmobiling. There are a dozen areas to be enjoyed with uncommon natural scenic or historic features as well as flora and fauna. Your Conservation Commission, with other organizations, is endeavoring to make these areas available and to preserve them. The more that people join in supporting and encouraging these conservation activities the more our rural setting will be perpetuated and, consequently, enjoyed.

Conservation zones or greenbelts along the banks of our ponds and streams safeguard their charm for lasting public satisfaction. Peterborough, with the good fortune of such natural assets, can well afford the use of the "conservation deed", a significant new legal vehicle which would unite the several interests of landowners and nature lovers for their mutual benefit. Since land so deeded would be handled through an experienced agency such as the Conservation Commission, it is to be hoped that landowners will rise to the opportunity of perpetuating natural areas with assurance of management which will continue to be effective and flexible even in the face of changing times.

Your Commission now manages various tracts of land and greenbelts. "Swampwoods" is the largest; still undeveloped is a mile and a quarter greenbelt along the Contoocook River: the smallest is a half acre of wetland near Noone Pond. In mid-November a tract of some 130 acres of forest land was given by its owner to the

town for management by the Commission.

Significant of this interest in open space — the great outdoors to the urban dweller — and to further such growing aims, the Human Environment Institute at Sargent Camp, a part of Boston University, held a two day session in early December, open to everyone concerned, on the development and use of local trails for recreation and enjoyment of the countryside. Your Commission participated in this discussion, which dwelt on how and where to lay out trails in order to provide enjoyment of nature by all seekers.

Your Commission has its necessary duties to perform—to preserve open space, to prevent pollution, to care for and patrol areas entrusted to it. Filling or dredging of wetlands is destructive without proper surveillance. Consequently, necessary procedures were established in the Spring for joint approval with Town Officials. Similarly, controls to prevent pollution of our streams must be set up and applied to development of properties and, periodically, to the use of all neighboring facilities. In all of this the soil mapping accomplished by the recent D of A Soil Conservation Service Survey of the Town, financed jointly by the Ford Foundation and the Spaulding Potter Trust, will be of inestimable assistance to owners, builders and town officers.

Conservation being pretty much an affair of mutual benefits, the Commission will welcome any and every opportunity offered to perpetuate Peterborough's charm through easement or gift to the community.

RECREATION COMMITTEE REPORT

To the Board of Selectmen Gentlemen:

A recent inquiry by the Peterborough Recreation Department, as to the purpose for the establishment of the National Recreation Association in 1906, perhaps best explains the true value of community recreation. Since the Peterborough Recreation Committee believes, as the NRA, that the purpose of community recreation is the same today as stated by the National Recreation Association's early founders: "That every child in America shall have a place to play in safety. That everyone in America, youthful or elderly, shall have an opportunity for the best and most satisfying use of his leisure time."

Peterborough's place to play in safety is Adams Playground, a twenty-six (26) acre public park. This is the center of activity on a year round basis for local residents. A recently constructed outdoor basketball court is now known as the "Grand Central" of Adams Playground. Though the town's four tennis courts, outdoor swimming pool, three baseball diamonds, combination soccer-football lighted field, two open playgrounds, ice skating rink, toboggan run, and an arts and crafts hut, also offer splendid recreational opportunities for all ages.

The Committee believes that recreation, like education, is for all men everywhere, from the cradle to the grave. Our recreation programs are intended to allow everyone the opportunity for personal growth in skills and human understanding while enhancing human relations.

Hence, it would be a fallacy to view recreation as solely physical. Thus perhaps the shortest and best definition of recreation is the creative use of leisure time. Recreation cannot be thought of as just sports and games. The Committee believes that recreation must be a cross section of all human activities and interests. And indeed the department will continue to strive to promote programs that help foster the physical, spiritual and educational values of mankind. Values that render wholesomely to "character" and "citizenship".

The Committee would like to express its sincere appreciation to the American Legion Cheney Armstrong Post 5, Radio Station WSCV-WSLE, Rotary Club, Knights of Columbus, Jaycees, Peterborough's Public Library, Peterborough's Board of Trade, Phi and Thu Chapters of Betha Sigma Phi, Welcome Wagon, the local AARP, Lion's Club, and the many self-sacrificing program volunteers, whose time, thought, or fianness enable the Recreation Department to offer services that we otherwise could not afford. This same gratitude is also extended to the many local merchants, whose businesses and industries, have unfailingly supported community recreation, and whose sponsorship has rendered to Peterborough a boon in recreation service.

The Recreation Committee is also grateful to the Contoocook Valley School Board, and School Superintendent William Page, for enabling the Recreation Department to open up further dimensions of recreational interests.

Thanks to a Special Article acceptance by the town's people in 1975, Adams Pool is now in the best condition that it has been for years. The replacement of pipe below the deck and refinishing cement work, along with the purchase and installation of two lifeguard chairs, has provided our children with the finest addition in safety first recreation in '75 at Adams Park.

Regarding the installation of drainage pipe at Adams Playground, this project is still pending on the provision that the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation agrees to reimburse the town for 50 percent of the total cost. Hopefully, this project will get its start by early Spring.

Finally, the Committee believes that the "hallmark" to a meaningful Recreation

Department rest in its "programming." We further believe that recreation plays a vital part in our personality make-up. That recreation can be taken with us wherever we go. And that we may retire from our jobs but, not our recreation. This we believe.

REPORT OF THE PETERBOROUGH ZONING BOARD

The Peterborough Zoning Board considered sixteen cases during 1975.

Under Article II, Section 2, concerning lot size, set-backs, and frontage in the family zone, three cases were heard involving four requests for variances. The Board granted two set-back variances to allow for additions to existing dwellings and one variance concerning frontage requirement in the subdivision of two lots. The Board denied an application for variance in lot size in the family zone.

Under Article III, Section 1d, in which certain uses are permitted in the general residence zone by special exception, the Board denied two applications on the ground that the proposed uses were improper in the general residence zone. The Board granted four special exceptions with conditions respecting proposed uses, signs, water supply and pollution control, parking, and construction plans.

Under Article III, Section 2, concerning lot size, area, frontage, and set-backs in the general residence zone, the Board granted two variances, one relating to

frontage and one relating to side setback requirement.

Under Article V, Section 2, allowing certain uses in the commercial district by special exception, the Board granted two such exceptions with conditions respecting landscaping, siting, parking, and fire protection.

Under Article VII, concerning continuance of a non-conforming use, the Board granted a special exception in the general residence zone to change a pre-existing

non-conforming use.

In considering two appeals from administrative decisions of Town Officials, the Board of Adjustment denied a request for proposed establishment of new veterinary clinic in family zone, and granted permission for a twenty square foot sign for a business which was operating on Grove Street prior to a change in zoning from commercial to general residence which affected the property.
