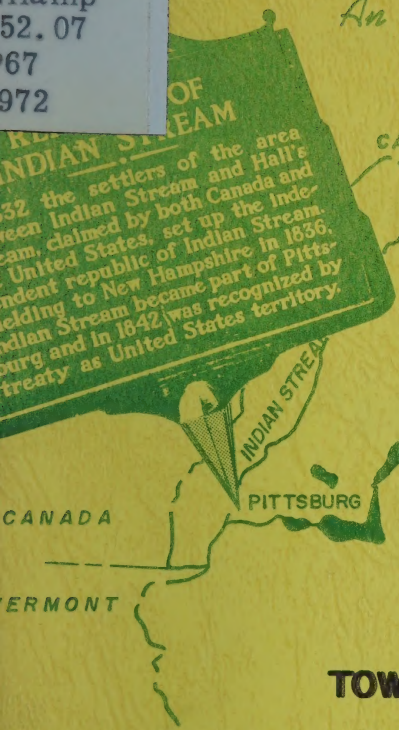

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pittsburg in the County of Coos in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pittsburg on Tuesday, the Sixth day of March, next at 10:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To bring in your ballots for the election of one Selectman, for three years; one Road Agent for the Lake District, one Road Agent for the Middle District, one Road Agent for the Lower District, a Town Clerk, a Treasurer, three Auditors, one Overseer of the Welfare, a Library Trustee, for three years; and one Trustee of the Trust Funds.

Also on a separate ballot you must vote on: Are you in favor of authorizing the Planning Board to become active again?

2. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectman authority to appoint all necessary Town Officers not listed under Article 1.
3. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise money for same.
5. To see if the Town will vote to elect a committee to set a date and manage the Old Home Day observance.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1000 for the Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service, Inc.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$531.63 for the White Mountain Regional Association.
8. To see if the Town will vote to establish a conservation commission under the provisions of R. S. A. 36A, and that the Selectmen shall appoint said commission, to consist of three to seven members, within thirty days of the said annual meeting and that said Selectmen shall also designate, for the purpose of calling the first commission meeting, a temporary chairman.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a contract, in the name of the Town, for the purpose of contracting for aerial photography and property maps for the Town.
10. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to appropriate from Revenue Sharing funds to pay for part of the mapping program.

## **Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service, Inc.**

### **REPORT OF SERVICE RENDERED IN THE TOWN OF PITTSBURG**

Mental health services for the town of Pittsburg were significantly expanded during the past year - both counseling individuals and families, and services to the Pittsburg school.

Sixteen residents of Pittsburg received counseling, either at the Colebrook office or in their homes, and the school has been visited frequently to develop plans for assisting students with problems. Among the services being given to students are psychological evaluations; individual counseling; counseling with families, either at school, home or in the clinic office. Plans for helping the child in the classroom are discussed with the teacher and with other helping agencies such as speech therapy and the school nurse.

Because the agency is locally based and operated, patients can be helped quickly, with the result that very few residents need to go on to New Hampshire Hospital or other resources out of the area.

Pittsburg's contribution to Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service helps in obtaining matching funds from state and other sources; and it insures that the staff is consistently available when needed. Costs are kept at a minimum without impairing quality of care and per capita costs for our area are far below those of other rural mental health programs.

Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service, Inc. meets all state and professional standards for such programs and is a full member of the New Hampshire Association of Community Mental Health Agencies.

Our full staff is prepared to respond to your requests.

## Report of the Fire Department

During the past year the Fire Department was called out eight times; one was out of town, four were chimney fires, one false alarm, and two major property damage. The department has held its regular monthly meetings, as well as holding eight training sessions. Seven men attended fire schools of one or more days at Berlin, Concord, and Colebrook.

We have replaced the old army tank truck by outfitting a 1952 Reo ten-wheeler with all-wheel drive received from the N.H. Forestry Department with a tank and Chrysler Marine pump received from the same source. This increases our pumping capability tremendously. The new pump can fill the tank in a minute and a half, and our water capacity for all three trucks is about 2300 gallons. We have also added three more on the red phone network.

We feel we are much better equipped than the average town department anywhere in the state. Much credit is due the men who give of their time to improve and maintain the equipment and constantly improve their techniques.

Over the next few years we are hopeful of having a planned all year water source throughout the town, which will substantially add to our fire fighting capability, especially in cold weather.

As usual, we wish to remind people that fire prevention is worth ten times more than the cure. Please use caution when handling fire or using fire-producing materials. We recommend that every home have at least two five-pound fire extinguishers capable of handling Class A, B, and C fires. Keep them

handy to sources of fire (stoves, furnaces, fireplaces, garages, etc.) and be sure everyone knows how to use them. The first few minutes of any fire can mean the difference between a smudge and an empty cellar hole.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank each and every man in the department for a fine year's work. Also, we'd like to thank Mr. Emery of the State Fire Marshal's office for his assistance in training material. Let's all work just as hard in the coming year to have as few fires as possible, and to increase our ability to handle them.

## AMBULANCE REPORT

As of last Town Meeting a vote was taken that the Selectmen appoint a committee of five, including one Selectman, as an ambulance committee. This committee appointed, consisted of the following; Burnham A. Judd, Carl Carlson, Martin Hewson, Beatrice Little, and Lou Young.

The state required a medical board, consisting of five to represent this district. Our representative was Craig Hubbard, until his reenlistment in October. Then Nathalie Wright was elected to replace him.

Because of the Funeral Directors having to discontinue the ambulance service, the Administrator of the Upper Connecticut Valley Hospital and the Selectmen of the surrounding towns, got a district organized.

Then on July 14, 1972, the Jenkins Funeral Home gave their ambulance to the town of Pittsburg, in memory of Ralph Jenkins.

We have at the present time, sixteen licensed attendants, that have completed ten hours Basic First Aid and sixteen hours Advanced First Aid. We have presently eleven people taking the Emergency Medical Technicians training course in Colebrook, which is a 72-hour course.

The Old Home Day Committee came up with the idea of an Auction in benefit of the Ambulance Fund. The results were so successful that we would like to make this an annual event. Please save all your goodies for Old Home Day.

We now have an active Pittsburg Volunteer Ambulance Corps., which is having monthly meetings and have practice sessions and runs.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The educational program at Pittsburg School has had a number of changes introduced in the past few years. Most significant has been the revision of the junior high and high school science programs. General science for grades 7, 8 and 9 has been replaced with a program called "Introduction to Physical Science" (IPS). Through the assistance of NDEA federal funds and local support, the entire course has been up-dated and an interesting and exciting science program is being provided.

A number of grades in the elementary school are participating in a problem solving approach to science. The school district was fortunate to have been chosen to participate in the program, at no cost to the district, by the Educational Development Research Center in Newton, Mass. The program develops a broad interest in science which also requires that a pupil use his other skills in arithmetic, language arts and social studies.

For the past two years, the school district has received a federal grant to help implement a career education program in the high school. As a result, a great deal of printed materials on career occupations were purchased through the funds and a program built into the curriculum whereby people with different occupations from Pittsburg and the surrounding communities will be asked to come to school to discuss their occupations and various fields of work with interested youngsters.

Educational field trips, a rare occurrence in the past, are now being realized as a worthwhile educational experience and the

caliber of the trips to Concord and Boston this past year are to be commended.

Pupil services being offered at the school include speech therapy, library services, music, health services and guidance services which all add to the total educational program at Pittsburg School.

Athletics, an important outside part of the school program, is helping develop character and a good sportsmanship attitude for life. Congratulations are also in order for the high school track team for winning the Class "S" state track meet last fall.

Although classified as an "Approved" high school, the Pittsburg School District can stand proud on the educational program it provides for its youngsters, both on the elementary and secondary level.

## GUIDANCE COUNSELOR'S REPORT

Guidance is a continuous developmental process which ideally should enable each student to understand himself better, to make sound decisions, to develop healthy attitudes and to achieve an awareness of his responsibility to himself and to others. Listed below are some of the activities directed toward these ends which have been initiated during the past year.

1. Each student's Cumulative Record Folder is being up-dated.
2. A Profile Sheet has been developed for each student in Grades 9-11 inclusive. This sheet contains information gathered concerning the student's ability, aptitudes, achievements, attitudes, interests and personality. The development of these sheets is an ongoing process with new information being added as it is obtained.
3. A Career Development Program utilizing one period a week has been instituted in the Pittsburg seventh and eighth grades, and the Stewartstown eighth grades.
4. A follow-up by phone or personal contact has been made in the case of each of last year's Seniors in order to ascertain exactly what they are doing as related to what they had intended to do.
5. A system of referrals for handling special cases in cooperation with the Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Services Inc. has been set up. Each re-

ferral necessitates at least one home visitation on the part of the Guidance Counselor.

6. In a number of cases, evening interviews have been held with students (past or present) and/or their parents concerning Educational or Career plans.
7. A Guidance Inventory Survey intended to predict needed changes which could possibly prevent certain students from becoming problems or drop-outs has been administered to every Pittsburg student in grades 9-11 and to Freshmen in Colebrook.
8. A Strong Vocational Interest Survey has been administered to individual Seniors who were completely unsure of future plans. The results of these Surveys have been discussed with each student concerned.
9. Arrangements have been made for students to meet with representatives of colleges and also representatives of the Armed Services.
10. The Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery has been administered to nearly all students 9-12 and the results are being discussed with each student concerned.
11. Juniors planning to continue their schooling after finishing high school took the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Tests in October and the results have been discussed with each student concerned.

12. Over 200 individual interviews have been held with Seniors concerning their future educational or career plans.
13. Similar conferences with Freshmen, Sophomores and Juniors have been, or are being, held.
14. Educational and Career Information has been made increasingly available to students.

I hope that the activities described above will give you some idea of the work that is being done in Guidance.

## SCHOOL HEALTH

The objectives of a school health program are to perform the necessary functions to maintain and promote good health for all the pupils in our schools.

Each year the following services are performed: checking heights and weights, testing vision and hearing, physical examinations for students in grades 4, 8, 11 and those participating in athletic sports, T.B. skin tests as recommended by the T.B. Association which included all personnel in Supervisory Union 7 this year, immunizations as needed, pre-school clinics which include immunizations, physicals, T.B. and urine tests, home-visits for follow-through health care as deemed necessary, promotion of good mental health with the assistance of Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Services, first aid and emergency care, health teaching and counseling, and continuous supervision of general health.

The Matching Fund Dental Program sponsored by state and local monies was utilized again this year with many students receiving dental care.

This year the P.T.O. sponsored a program on venereal disease to junior and senior high school students through the Department of Public Health.
