

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Rumney in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Rumney on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at two o'clock in the afternoon, at which time the polls shall be open and shall close not earlier than nine o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following articles: all articles not on the ballot will be acted upon at seventhirty o'clock in the evening.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of its highways and bridges.
- 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Library.
- 5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department.
- 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of Cemeteries.
- 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Common and the daily raising and lowering of the flag.
- 8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street Lights.
- 9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the LaMott-Kenneson Post No. 76, American Legion for Memorial Day and other patriotic purposes.
- 10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Care of the Town Dump.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$527.35 to secure from the State \$3,515.65 to be expended for Town Road Aid.
- 12. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.

- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$336.00 for the Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$585.00 for the Lakes Region Mental Health Center.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$630.00 to subsidize the LaFontaine Ambulance Service in cooperation with surrounding towns.
- 16. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to refinish the Library floors.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the use of the Planning Board.
- 18. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to use \$2,326.40 of the Highway Equipment Reserve Fund towards the purchase of a new truck and raise and appropriate a sum sufficient to pay any balance, and also authorize the Selectmen to sell or trade in the present highway truck.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept Cemetery located on Mr. C. A. Grimes' property at Stinson Lake.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the Pemi-Baker River Valley regional planning agency. This agency will have membership of at least two of the municipalities in the Pemi-Baker River area. The objective of this agency will be to plan for and encourage regional planning analysis, provide consensus on major problems of regional concern and assist in the effectuation of projects which extend beyond the boundaries of a particular town.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer, lease, rent, sell or otherwise dispose of any real estate or mineral rights acquired by the Town at any of its Tax Collector's sales.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 23. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing Beano be adopted in this town.

24. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The summer reading club, "Mystery of the Hidden Staircase," attracted several of our younger readers who found fun and rewarding contents in the "mysterious objects." We were fortunate to again have Mrs. Betty Morrill's story each week. This was enjoyed by children of all ages.

A sale of discarded books was conducted during the summer months.

Gifts of records have been received from both Columbia and RCA Victor and as the number of records borrowed ascertains, our music lovers are availing themselves of this new service.

A new bound volume of town reports was added, making our set complete from 1876-1965.

The bookmobile continues to give service with 4 visits this past year. The State Library is readily available as a source of reference material. Through them 29 films were loaned to our borrowers.

Assistant staff members, Mrs. Muriel Kenneson and Mrs. Georgia Duquet have given invaluable cooperation and service.

This is your library, please plan to visit it in the near future.

## REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

New Hampshire is the fastest growing state in the northeast in terms of population increase. It is also an industrialized state and this growth is likely to continue, all of which means more families and homes. Our growing summer population is scattered throughout the state with a phenomenal increase in vacation homes.

Many new homes and practically all cottages are being located in woodlands and abandoned fields and forests crowd into the back yard of our village streets. In a state where the forests cover 86% of the land surface, it is necessary that everyone be aware all through the season, which comes with the disappearance of the snow until the snow comes again, of the need to be careful with outdoor fires and fire sources.

The following action will help:

- 1. To teach our children the danger of lighted matches.
- 2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn
  - a. You need a written permit from the town fire warden for all debris burning except when the ground is covered with snow, Cooking fires in outdoor fireplaces or in charcoal brasiers in your own back yard is permitted on notification of the warden.
  - b. The warden is forbidden by regulation to allow burning of household rubbish on grass by householders between 9:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M.
  - c. Have equipment on hand to control the fire before you light the match.
- 4. Promptly report any fire out of control to your fire warden or fire department.

Help to keep our town out of the fire occurrence column and save our tax dollars for useful purposes.

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Rumney qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 8th day of March 1969, at eight o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to enter into a lease agreement with the Longwear Foundation for a period of five (5), seven (7), or ten (10) years for the purpose of renting adequate facilities for a Kindergarten.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) for the support of a Kindergarten for the ensuing year.
- 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Hereby submitted is my annual report as your superintendent of schools.

Since my last report was submitted a number of changes and new ideas have been forthcoming.

The teacher turnover in Russell School was not as great as had been anticipated and we replaced only 2 staff members. Mr. Stearns resigned to accept a position in Bristol and Mr. Dore a former principal in Wentworth was elected for his position. The vacancy created when Mr. Dore moved from the position as fifth and sixth grade teacher was filled by Mr. Ayer. He is a graduate of Plymouth State College and had returned from a tour of duty with the Armed Forces Services overseas. Miss Ashley continues to be of valuable service as a helping teacher. It means a great deal to have someone available to work with children who for one reason or other may be falling behind the rest of the class. Another unanticipated problem was the enrollment in the first grade. We had planned on about 25 pupils but 31 appeared the first day of school. There now are 32 pupils in the room. This number of pupils is too many for a teacher alone to handle effectively, especially in the first grade. The school board very wisely used some of the Title I ESEA funds to provide her with some part-time assistance. Since starting this program last fall it has worked well and I am sure the pupils have benefited a great deal from the help.

If this trend in enrollment figures should continue there will be a real problem of space in a few years. The board already is working on a committee to study what might be done with grades 7 and 8 in the years ahead.

A group is also working on a plan to have a kindergarten in Rumney. I am not entirely sure as to what progress has been made but a report will probably be given at your school district meeting and a recommendation made. I personally approve of the idea. There is much evidence to support the thesis that children make better progress and adjustment to the school situation who have had kindergarten. Studies show that it takes about 3 or 4 years of school before children who start first grade with no kindergarten catch up with those who have.

You will notice the budget for books has increased this year. The teachers have requested additions to our reading program to strengthen it in terms of both basal and supplementary readers. In addition to the above we want to add some new math books in the upper grades that include more so-called modern math. The books we have are of an original 1962 edition and should be replaced anyway. These two items along with various workbooks and textbook replacements account for these portions of the recommended budget.

The school building itself is now in a good state of repair. The school board has carried on a regular program of maintenance and repairs to the point where there should be no major expenses in the immediate future.

Mrs. Lyon's lunch program is still considered to be one of the best in the State for schools of our size. This is indicated by the percentage of the participation.

Many pages could be written about the AREA high school. This will not be attempted here. The citizens of Rumney have a right to feel as they do on any side of the question. My primary concern would be that the high school students are offered a better education with a broader curriculum offering. You can be assured that as your superintendent I shall do everything I can do to see that this happens.

### EXPLANATION OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Chapter 189, Section 48 Revised Statutes Annotated of the State of New Hampshire, requires that the school district annual report show the total amount paid to the superintendent of schools as per the following quotation: "Reports. Each superintendent of a supervisory union shall annually prepare a report of the total salary paid to the superintendent, showing in detail the amount paid by the state and each local school district, and their share of same. Said report shall be filed with the school board of each school district involved and shall be included in the annual report of the respective school district as a separate entry. A like report and entry shall be made for each assistant superintendent, teacher consultant, and business administrators, if any is in service in the union."

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the school for the previous school year ending June 30th. The salary of \$11,500. which was received by the superintendent of schools of Supervisory Union #48 during 1967-68 school year was made up as follows: \$4500.00 paid by the State of New Hampshire and \$7,000.00 pro-rated among the several school districts. Allowances of \$1300.00 for travel within the union was also pro-rated as stated above.

### RUSSELL SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT 1968-1969

It is my pleasure to submit the Russell School report to the Town of Rumney.

There are two new faculty members at Russell School this year. Mr. Peter Ayer is teaching science in grades five through eight, as well as junior high level reading. Mrs. Earline Kerr has been retained as a teacher's aide for the first grade because of the exceptionally large class this year. Other faculty members include Mrs. Ruth Tilson, Miss Susan Dalziel, Mrs. Esther Wheeler, Mrs. Amy Merrill and Miss Nellie Ashley as teacher's aide, chiefly in the area of reading.

Reading inventory tests have been given to all students in Russell School. It is hoped that such tests will aid in the eventual reorganization of the reading program, one more suited to individual needs, abilities and interests. In line with this, a complete series of reading texts, including supplementary materials, is being built up in order that the very vital reading skills may be formulated in a sequential manner. As in the past the School Board, as the representative of the people of Rumney, has exhibited excellent cooperation in displaying a sincere interest in quality education.

Russell School has had a physical education program for grades five through eight under the direction of Mr. Stanley Shupe of Plymouth State College. The resources of the college library have been utilized by several students and it is hoped that some demonstrations in the college's new science facilities may be possible. In addition, field trips are being planned to the Squam Lakes Science Center in Holderness and to the State House, with other trips desired later in the year.

In closing, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the teachers of Russell School for their excellent efforts in providing a high standard of education for our students. I would also like to thank the school nurse and members of the school lunch and custodial staff for making the school a better place in which to learn. Finally, the PTA, School Board and community as a whole, deserve special thanks for their continued support and interest in the development of their future citizens.

### 7th & 8th GRADE STUDY COMMITTEE REPORT

The 7th and 8th Grade Study Committee, authorized at the 1968 March School Meeting, consists of five members, Milton Hanks, Arthur Morrill, Betty Glover, Allen Grass and Gladys Ackerman. A suggestion was also made at at the March, 1968 meeting, for the School Board to continue investigation of Kindergarten possibilities. The School Board decided that this committee should also handle this matter.

At our first meeting we discussed the Committee's purpose. We decided that our purpose was to see what steps Rumney could take in the future if a growth occurred in our school population.

We compared the Education provided by our school with other schools in this area and found that other than Shop, Home Economics, and other optional study areas, that our facilities and curriculum are adequate.

The School Census as of September 1, 1968, in figures by actual age, is included for your information. Our present school population is 145.

Working with the assumption that Rumney could possibly increase its school registration, as other surrounding towns have done, we investigated possibilities of increasing our present facilities. We found that the present school has been built with the heating system at one end of the building so that four rooms (which our present furnace would heat) —two up and two down or gym and/or auditorium—could be added on. We did not investigate the cost of an addition as construction costs would depend upon what facilities were proposed and costs differ from year to year. If such an addition were feasible, one possible financial help could come through students tuitioned to Rumney by other towns.

Mr. Neil Andrew, Chief of the Division of Vocational and Educational Department, State Board of Education, met with us and discussed what facilities are necessary to provide a good Home Ec.

and Vocational Program. He informed us that per pupil costs for these facilities would be high for a school population such as ours. He also brought to our attention the fact that students who have completed one year of high school could be tuitioned to a Vocational High School such as in Lebanon.

To continue the investigation of Kindergarten possibilities, we again contacted the Library Trustees who felt that the water situation prohibited use of the Library even though the heat problem has been solved.

The Longyear Historical Society has offered to the Town of Rumney the use of the Old Village School for educational purposes. The committee has looked over the school, obtained estimates on improvements which would have to be made for safety's sake as well as making the building practical for school purposes (blackboards, sanitation facilities, painting, heat, lights,) and met with Mr. Richard Malloy, Technical Director of Longyear Historical Society. A Lease Agreement has been drawn up for your consideration. This Lease can become legal only if The District decides to make a Kindergarten a reality, thereby authorizing the Rumney School Board to sign this agreement by affirmation of the Article in the School Warrant.

As a committee we recommend that The District delve deeper into the possibility of providing Home Ec. and Vocational Courses for our 7th and 8th grades. We feel these courses would encourage children with an aptitude in these areas to continue with their education. We would like to suggest that another committee be elected to further study the cost of providing such facilities of tuitioning elsewhere and the School Board be represented thereon.

We also recommend that The District take advantage of the facilities offered by the Longyear Foundation for Kindergarten use. We found that there will be an average of 20 Kindergarten children who would benefit from this program. They would learn the basic necessities here, so that their real learning could begin when they start First Grade.

### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

Jan. 1, 1968 — Jan. 1, 1969

The Nurse visited the school 38 times during the school year.

Inspections were made for signs of illness, infectious diseases, skin, hair, and scalp infections, cleanliness, malnutrition, orthopedic and follow-up home visits were made where necessary.

First Aid supplies were bought and taken to the school. First Aid Care was given when needed, when theh nurse was in school.

Dr. Jauback examined the children's teeth and Clinics were held at his office in Woodsville for ones he wanted to go to the Clinic. The State Dental Hygienist visited all classrooms and talked on Dental Hygiene. She showed film strips and demonstrated brushing their teeth in the proper manner.

The Tine T. B. Test was given to all first grade children. There were no positive reactions. The T. B. Testing Program is limited to 16,000 New Hampshire First Graders and their family household, if any positive reactions appear.

An Immunization Clinic was held at the school. 85 children received Immunizations. A second Clinic was held in June at Warren Medical Center where 12 more children were taken by the nurse for needed immunizations.

Hearing and Vision Screening Tests were done on each child and notices sent home on all who failed the test advising parents to see their family physician for further tests or treatments.

A Pre-School Registration was held at the school.

Health Records are kept on each child.

Home visits were made when necessary for convenience with parents.

Referrals were made to Guidance Clinics, Mental Health and Hearing Clinics.

Each child weighed and measured and recorded on his or her Health Record.

The Nurse attended Workshops, Evenings, State Teachers' Conventions, School Nurses Sections.

The Nurse also attended Conferences with Guidance Psychologist in Concord - 6 evenings. Also attended Conferences with Welfare Workers.
