#### TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

Polls open 10:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Strafford in the County of Strafford in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Strafford Elementary School in said Strafford on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at ten of the clock, in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Please Note: All Articles except #1 will be taken up at 8:00 P.M.

- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Public Welfare including Old Age Assistance.
- 4. To see if the Town will accept Town Road Aid and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,231.46 to which the State will contribute \$8,209.73.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Highways and Bridges.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to complete the section of Class II Highway, presently laid out for completion by the State Highway Dept. (from Ernest Brown's residence to the intersection of Province and Northwood Roads) at an estimated cost to the Town of \$50,000, one quarter (\$12,500.00) to be raised at this meeting, and the other three quarters by three notes, in the amount of \$12,500.00 each, for the next three years, and raise and appropriate same.
- 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,168.00 as the Town's share for Class II Highway Construction of Province Road and be eligible for TRA and

#### Class V Funds.

- 8. To see what sum of money the Town wishes to raise and appropriate to the Capital Reserve Fund for improving Water Street and docking facilities at Bow Lake.
- 9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for maintaining Bow Lake Beach at the dam.
- 10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for maintenance of the Bow Lake Fire Dept.
- 11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for improvements to the Crown Point Fire House.
- 12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the repair of the Center Strafford Fire House.
- 13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the White Pine Blister Rust Control Program.
- 14. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for observance of Memorial Day.
- 15. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the Lakes Region Association.
- 16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for operating the Town Library.
- 17. To hear the report of the Library Building Committee and recommendation and if approved, raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00.
- 18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,800.00 for control and operation of the Town Dump.
- 19. To hear the report and see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$943.00 in the support of the Rural District Health Council.

- 20. To hear the report of and see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,300.00 as a donation to the Center Barnstead Fire Dept. for providing Ambulance Service to the Town of Strafford.
- 21. To hear the report of the Sesquicentennial Committee, its successful enterprise and an estimated financial conclusion and a Merit Award from your Townspeople.
- 22. To hear the report of the Town Conservation Commission and to see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to the Town Conservation Fund.
- 23. To hear the recommendation of the Center Strafford Fire Dept. for the purchase of two self-contained breathing apparatus units and see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for same.
- 24. To see if the Town will grant 2% discount on taxes paid within thirty-five days of mailing of tax bills.
- 25. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 26. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

#### FLAG DESIGN

The Strafford flag shall be of a pale yellow with a blue field, the field bi-sected by red and white stripes. The lower right portion of the field contains a yellow royal crown, the upper left an over-shot water-wheel. A circle in the center of the flag encloses a low mountain profile, increasing in height from left to right in green. At the base of the mountain is a lake in blue. The rim of the circle is yellow with the words from left to right: Settled 1732, Bow Lake, Center Strafford, Crown Point, inc. 1820. Below the circle, almost spanning the flag, is a yellow banner with the Legend: Strafford, N.H. The left hand tag carries the date 1732, the right hand tag the date 1820.

#### Meaning:

#### I Colors -

- a. Pale Yellow denotes colonial background of town.
- Green stands for the importance of the forest throughout the town's history.
- Blue stands for water power and water in the town's life.
- d. Yellow from the Strafford coat-of-arms, the family which gave the town its name.
- e. Red & White combined with the blue stands for the soldiers, sailors and marines of Strafford who have fought in all our nation's wars.

#### II Symbols -

- a. The mountain stands for Parker Mountain, the major prominence of the Blue Hills which is the principal landmark of the town — stretching almost ¾ of the town's width from the Barnstead Road to the Farmington border.
- b. The over-shot water-wheel symbolizes the Center Strafford portion of the town, which today has the last remaining water-wheel in town.
- c. The crown stands for the Crown Point section of the town, settled when New Hampshire was a Royal Province.
- d. The lake represents the Bow Lake section of the town, scene of early water power activity in the town's history, and a major town landmark.

#### III Dates -

- a. 1732 The year the town was settled.
- b. 1820 The year the town was incorporated.

## CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

Members of the Commission have made a careful study of town records for the purpose of definitely determining what roads have been closed subject to gates and bars, and which ones have been discontinued. Findings have been indicated by color code and notations on a map which may be seen at the Town Office. Roads subject to gates and bars serve as fire access roads and may be used for recreational activities such as snowmobiling, horseback riding, trail biking, etc. Discontinued roads are not for public use.

Our two Foresters have walked and marked the boundary lines of the McCabe property acquired last year. The house has been declared a hazard, due to advanced deterioration. Signs have been posted as a warning of danger to any who might be tempted to enter. As soon as possible the building will be razed and the cellar filled in.

A check for \$500.00 was received from the Spaulding Potter Charitable Trusts, (through the 50% matching funds program), and was added to the \$1,000.00 voted by the town. This is to be used for the acquisition of land for Open Space purposes.

Through a Spaulding-Potter grant for educational purposes we were enabled to provide subscriptions to an excellent magazine, "The New York Conservationist", for the Strafford School and the Strafford Library.

This grant also made possible the purchase of a projector and screen to be used for educational programs.

Poison ivy control has been continued with excellent results. Work has been concentrated in public cemeteries, near churches, Grange halls, village roadsides, swimming, recreational and parking areas.

We would like to give credit here to Camp Idlepines directors and girls for work which they performed as a community service. After the Bow Lake dam and surroundings were cleared of poison ivy they carried out a clean-up campaign in the area. They also painted the gatehouses, (valued as

historical landmarks), which had been shingled and repaired by local volunteers. Materials were provided by the Bow Lake Community Club. Our thanks to all of these.

Of greatest significance to the town is the contemplated acquisition by the Commission of a large tract of land which would be extremely valuable for a Town Forest and Wild Life Conservation Area. This will be further mentioned at the Town Meeting.

We are keenly aware of the many dangers which threaten our natural environment. We urge each individual to conscientiously do all in his power to add as little as possible to pollution of the world around us, (remembering that "pollution begins at home"), and beyond that, to work constructively and cooperatively to achieve the highest possible standards of quality for the Town of Strafford.

## SESQUICENTENNIAL COMMITTEE REPORT

The committee sponsored production of the first town flag, purchased uniforms for three Strafford policemen, erected a flag pole at the Strafford School, and completed its major obligation — the task of earning funds to publish "A History of Strafford" — the town's first history.

Commemorative coins, plates, bookends, and an anniversary program were produced and sold as a major source of income. These sales, coupled with advance history sales and profits from the anniversary events, financed the observance of the 150th anniversary at no cost to the taxpayers. There will, indeed, be substantial profit to the town when sale of the history is completed.

## REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

The fire season of 1970 was not a quiet one in this area, on the contrary, it was a very busy time with some towns reporting a greater number of fires than in past years. This record is not good.

Both state and towns are striving to meet this challenge. Results show that we are not doing enough, we must do more in the matter of fire prevention education, a more active inspection program and a more prompt, complete investigation of fires where definite cause is not known with court action where the need is indicated.

We must insist that minor children are given needed supervision, this is a parent's responsibility.

Your Warden and District Chief stand ready to help in this work.

Our gratitude to all who have helped in forest fire prevention and suppression this past year and we look forward to this continued help in our effort to improve our good prompt detection system and fast suppression action. This, coupled with a good prevention program, will improve our fire record.

Follow these simple suggestions to help:

Set a good example for others by observing fire permit laws and regulations; take your debris and waste to the town dump; keep matches away from children and be sure your smoking material is dead out when discarded.

## REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The Strafford Planning Board was reactivated by the Selectmen last March. This action was a follow-up to the creation, in September of 1969, of a group of interested citizens who were invited by the Selectmen to meet with them during the Fall months to discuss some of the planning needs of the Town and in what ways assistance could be provided to the Selectmen.

The Planning Board, as its first order of business, reviewed the land use and zoning ordinances of towns of similar size and closeness to center of population as Strafford.

A proposed zoning and land use ordinance for Strafford was proposed by the Board, two public hearings were held, and the proposed ordinance published in a local newspaper.

The ordinance was passed, 153 to 73, at a Special Town Meeting on September 8th, 1970.

The Board also drew up sub-division regulations and held an informational meeting on their proposal for interested townspeople. These sub-division regulations are now in force at the time of this printing.

Both the land-use and zoning ordinances, and the subdivision regulations are contained elsewhere in this Town report.

## RURAL DISTRICT HEALTH COUNCIL January 1, 1970 - December 31, 1970

During the past year the Rural District Health Council has been providing visiting nurse service to the following seven towns: Northwood, Nottingham, Deerfield, Barrington, Strafford, Middleton, and New Durham. The nurses are building up a comprehensive health program including postpartum and newborn visits, immunization checks, family planning services and direct nursing services ordered by the physicians. We are hoping to expand our family planning services, to establish Child Health conferences and immunization clinics.

At present we have two part-time nurses and a part-time supervisor. Because of the geographical area and the travel involved covering the area, it is more feasible to employ the two part-time nurses rather than a full-time one. The administration and supervision of this program is contracted to the Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center in Portsmouth, N.H.

During the past few years the town has seen a steady growth in its number of year-round residents and a corresponding increase in dwellings, associated buildings, and real property. Recognizing that the town will continue to grow, and taking into consideration requests from the townspeople, the Selectmen took action to establish a small local Police Department to cooperate with the State Police and to respond to local problems and calls for assistance. I was appointed Chief by the Selectmen on May 2, 1970, the same time Carl Brown and Harold Irving received reappointments as Special Town Officers to give the town a three-man police force. To supplement this small force the following men were appointed as Auxiliary Policemen: William Porter, Win Hayes, Al Berry, Steve Leighton, Dick Allard, Bill Rainey, Irving Bickford, and Lauren Pierce.

This first Annual Report shows that the bulk of our responses during the past year were concerned with answering and investigating complaints followed by accidents, breaking and entering, and larceny. Our non-responsive duties included traffic control for the Memorial Day Parade, the fireworks display at Bow Lake, and routine patrol including vacant home and cottage checks. The Department

was extremely busy during the Sesquicentennial Week when our efforts centered on traffic control, parking, assisting the Strafford Relay Team, and providing a communication network for the week's activities. Plans are now underway to conduct a training program for the Town Officers which will be carried out cooperatively with the State Police and Strafford County Enforcement Officials.

A two-way radio has been acquired to provide instant communication with adjoining towns, the county, and State Police frequencies. The Strafford Sesquicentennial Committee purchased the initial uniforms and designed and provided a town shoulder patch for the force. We are in good shape for basic equipment. Looking to the future, the town will probably have to consider the possibility of acquiring a cruiser to carry out our increased work load. There is also a need to codify the various town ordinances and bring them together in one publication.

The past year has really been a period of organizing our procedures in order to best serve the town. We feel that a good start has been made and with your continued support the Department will provide the services you desire.

## **ARTICLES PASSED AT TOWN MEETINGS**

## March 10, 1959

- Art. 16 Motion made by George Foss that the Selectmen be authorized to appoint a building inspector to hold office for the term of one year, and by vote fix and regulate his compensation as authorized by Section I, Chapter 156, N. H. revised Statutes Annotated, 1955. Motion seconded and vote carried in the affirmative.
- Art. 17 Motion made by Marjorie Foss, seconded by Oscar Pratt, that the building regulations as set forth in Article 17 be adopted. Vote carried in the affirmative.

## **BUILDING REGULATIONS**

## 1. MINIMUM BUILDING AREA

Every dwelling unit to be used by a single family shall have a minimum ground floor area of five hundred (500) square feet.

## 2. FOUNDATIONS

All structures shall be set on solid foundations of cement, brick, stone or other acceptable masonry except that in special cases where buildings are to be used for accessory use the Building Inspector may waive the requirements of this section and permit the use of wood, metal or masonry piers.

## 3. OUTSIDE WALLS

These shall be constructed of material commonly used for outside construction and materials customarily painted shall be painted.

## 4. SEWERAGE

A private sewage disposal system is required. The type, size and construction of all septic tanks and drain fields shall be approved by the State of New Hampshire.

## 5. CHIMNEY CONSTRUCTION

Chimneys shall extend at least three feet above the highest point where they pass through the roof of a building and at least two feet higher than any portion of the building within ten feet. No chimney shall be built, erected, or altered below the roof having wood or other combustible materials within one inch of the chimney and no chimney shall have its base resting upon any floor or beam or any combustible material. Factorybuilt chimneys that are approved as a result of tests and listing by a nationally recognized testing laboratory shall be installed in accordance with the condition of approval.

## 6. AMENDMENT

This ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal Town Meeting when such amendment is published in the warrant calling for the meeting.

## 7. ENFORCEMENT

Upon any well-founded information that this Ordinance is being violated, the Selectmen shall, on their own initiative, take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance by seeking an injunction in Superior Court or by any other appropriate legal action. Whoever violates any of the above regulations shall be punished upon conviction by fine not exceeding ten dollars (\$10.00) for each day of each violation.

## 8. EFFECTIVE DATE

April 1, 1959

Building Regulations are authorized under Sections 2-5 inclusive, Chapter 156, N. H. revised Statutes Annotated 1955.

March 9, 1965

Art. 15 Motion by Albert Leighton that anyone wishing to build a dock or pier be required to obtain a permit from the Selectmen. Seconded and voted in the affirmative.

## ZONING AND LAND USE ORDINANCE TOWN OF STRAFFORD, NEW HAMPSHIRE

## **PREAMBLE**

## ARTICLE 1

In order to preserve the beauty and rural appearance of our town, to protect the health, safety and general welfare of the community, to provide adequate areas between buildings and various rights of ways, to protect property values, to provide adequate public utilities and other public requirements, the following Ordinance is hereby adopted by the voters of the Town of Strafford, New Hampshire in accordance with Chapter 32, sections 60-89 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended.

## DISTRICTS

## ARTICLE 2

- 2.1 For the purpose of this Ordinance, the entire area of Strafford shall be established as an Agricultural-Residentail district. Area A. The exceptions, by definition, are State Lands, and areas set aside for Conservation, Areas B and C.
- 2.2 Although no specific area has been set aside for business, or industry, the establishment of such an enterprise that can be shown to be an asset to the town is encouraged. Off-road parking facilities must be provided by the business.
- 2.3 Application for any non-conforming uses shall be made to a Board of Adjustment for approval or disapproval.

## **GENERAL PROVISIONS**

## ARTICLE 3

- 3.1 For sanitary protection all sewage disposal systems to be installed within the town limits shall be made in such a manner that they will not be a nuisance, or detrimental totthe public health. Determination of these factors shall be made under the existing laws of the State of New Hampshire. Reference-- RSA 149 Amended.
- 3.2 Persons planning to install sewerage systems shall at the time of applying to the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control commission make duplicate application to the Selectmen.
- 3.3 An owner or occupant of land shall not permit fire or other ruins to be left, but shall remove the same within six months. RSA 155-B.
- 3.4 Except for the purpose or in connection with the construc-

tion of a building for which a building permit has been issued, or for grading on the same site with material removed, or for other non-commercial uses no person shall remove sod, loam, sand, gravel, clay and stone without first obtaining a permit from the Board of Selectmen. No permit will be granted without there first being a public hearing. Said hearing to be held no later than forty five (45) days from date of application for said permit. A permit will only be granted with a restriction that the site shall be restored through landscaping and revegetation.

- 3.5 No permit to build will be issued by the Building Inspector or Selectmen until a plat, or plan, showing the location of the structure of house, appurtenaces and water and sewage systems, in relation to the property lines, has received the approval of the Planning Board. Such permit application shall be acted on by said Board at their next regular meeting or within thirty (30) days from date of submission. If not acted upon, it will be assumed that the permit has been granted.
- 3.6 No building or land shall hereafter be used and no building or part thereof shall be erected, moved, or altered except in conformity with the provisions of this Ordinance.
- 3.7 The Planning Board shall have the power to approve or disapprove subdivisions in accordance with RSA 36. The Town Clerk shall on passage of this Ordinance file formal notice with Register of Deeds for Strafford County of the authorization of the Planning Board to approve or disapprove subdivisions and the date of said authorization.
- 3.8 Signs in any district shall not be placed within 25 feet of any right of way and shall not exceed six (6) square feet except by special permit of the Board of adjustment. Flashing or animated signs are prohibited.
- 3.9 A building permit granted under this Ordinance shall not be good for a period of more than one year.

## **ARTICLE 4**

## Agricultural - Residential District

A building may be erected, altered or used, and a lot may be used or occupied for the following purposes, and in accordance with the following provisions:

## A. LAND REQUIREMENTS

1. Frontage — Every building lot shall have a minimum frontage of 150 feet provided that, where lots are located on the exterior of a curving street, a shorter front dimension shall be permitted provided that the average width of the lot measured across its center shall be at least 150 feet.

- Front Yard Between the nearest right of way and the extreme front of any building there shall be a distance minimum of 40 feet.
- 3. Side and Back Yards A building shall not be located nearer than twenty-five feet of the property lines of any abutter and not nearer than fifty feet from any structure on an abutter's property.
- 4. Minimum Land Area A lot shall not be less that 40,000 sq. feet, with an additional 20,000 square feet for each family unit under a common roof, except as set forth in Section 4-a 4-b below.
  - (4-a) Building lots, having either a Community Water Supply or a Community Sewage System, meeting the approval of the N. H. Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission, and offered for sale within the town shall contain not less than 15,000 square feet, and the said lots shall have not less than 100 feet frontage, nor less than 100 feet from lot line to lot line, provided they are located not more than 350 feet from a Public Lake or Public Pond, as defined RSA 271, and the entire area of the lot must be within the 350 foot limitation.
  - (4-b) Notwithstanding the area, frontage, and dimension requirements, hereof, a single, detached one-family dwelling, or lawful building other than a single family dwelling, may be constructed and used on a lot having less than the prescribed basic minimum area and/or minimum dimensions "provided that all other requirements of this Ordinance are complied with" if said lot, prior to the date of the adoption of the requirements in quotation was lawfully laid out by plan or deed, duely, recorded in the Strafford County Registry of Deeds.

## **B. LAND USES ALLOWED**

- 1. The buying, selling and exposing for sale of home produce and products.
- 2. The office of a professional person.
- Taking of boarders or the leasing or renting of rooms or buildings.
- Customary home occupations carried on in the house by a resident person.
- 5. Single-family, two-family, and three-family residences including accessory buildings and buildings for agricultural purposes are permitted in this District.
- Convalescent and nursing homes, churches, schools, playgrounds, parks, golf courses, tennis courts, stores are permitted.

7. Farming, including dairying, livestock and poultry raising, horticulture, truck farming, forestry, and other related agricultural enterprises, and the sale of the products realized from farming is permitted.

## PROHIBITED USES

## ARTICLE 5

- 5.1 Any business or industry or structure which would be seriously detrimental or offensive to the owners of adjoining property or to the town or which would tend to radically reduce property values of other property is prohibited except by special permit by the Board of Adjustment.
- 5.2 Any land uses that may be injurious or dangerous to the health or safety of the community are prohibited.

## MOBILE HOME

- 6.1 A single mobile home or single trailer may be located anywhere in the district provided it meets all frontage, front yard, side yard and back yard, minimum land area, and sewerage disposal requirements that are specified in this Ordinance for building and lots located in the district.
- 6.2 No Trailer Park or Mobile Home Park for the use of mobile homes of house trailers shall be permitted in the district unless authorized by the Town of Strafford at an Annual or Special Town Meeting called by the Selectmen at the request of the Planning Board. After such authorization, no permit shall be granted unless the park site meets all the requirements of Article 6.1.

## NON-CONFORMING USE

## **ARTICLE 7**

7.1 Any non-conforming use of land, building lot, or buildings may continue in their present use except that such non-conforming use shall not be changed, extended or enlarged except by special permit of the Board of Adjustment. A discontinuance of one year shall void the permit.

## **ENFORCEMENT**

## ARTICLE 8

- 8.1 It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance.
- 8.2 The Building Inspector or Selectmen shall issue all building permits requested when such permit is in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance. All such permits to be valid must be signed by two selectmen or the Building Inspector and one

Selectman.

8.3 On passage of this Ordinance, it shall be unlawful to erect, alter, or relocate any structure without first obtaining a permit from the Building Inspector or Selectmen.

## BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

## ARTICLE 9

- 9.1 Within thirty days after adoption, the Board of Selectmen shall appoint a Board of Adjustment of five members, one member to serve for one year, one for two years, one for three years, one for four years, one for five years and thereafter the Selectmen shall appoint one member for a term of five years. Vacancies shall be filled by the Selectmen for the unexpired term. The duties of said Board shall conform to the provisions of Chapter 31 of the New Hampshire Statutes Annotated; 1955.
- 9.2 In addition to the general powers granted to the Board of Adjustment by Chapter 31, it may, in harmony and subject to the provisions of this Ordinance:
  - a. Permit a non-conforming temporary use for an initial period of not more than two years.
  - b. Waive the frontage requirements in this Ordinance where there are unusual conditions of street curvature, topography or sub-surface conditions. In such cases, however, the average width of the lot shall be at least equal to the frontage requirements.

## ARTICLE 10

10.1 This Ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal Town Meeting when the amendment is published in the Warrant calling for the meeting, and when the amendment has received a public hearing which has been advertised and given a legal 15 day notice.

## ARTICLE 11

11.1 Every person, persons, firm or corporation convicted by an authorized court having jurisdiction for violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined not more than ten dollars for each day the violation may exist.

## **ARTICLE 12**

## Saving Clause

The invalidity of any provision of this Ordinance shall not effect the validity of any other provisions.

## **ARTICLE 13**

## When Effective

This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

## **ARTICLE 14**

For the Purpose of this Ordinance, certain terms are defined as provided in this section.

- A. Home produce and products includes everything of an agricultural nature grown, produced, conditioned or otherwise carried on the property of the resident and such articles as are manufactured or altered by members of the household and their employees.
- B. Right of Way means all town, state and federal highways and the land on either side as covered by statues to determine the widths of the rights of way.
- C. Trailer Park or Mobile Home Park means a lot occupied by two or more trailers designed to be used for living purposes.
- D. Front Yard. A space extending for the full width of a lot between the extreme front line of a building and the nearest side of the right of way.
- E. Frontage means the length of the lot bordering on the public right of way and/or private right of way. Developments on private roads are subject to the same zoning regulations as those on public roads and private roads shall conform to the requirements of Land Subdivision Control Regulations, Section 4.
- F. Non-conforming structure. A non-conforming structure is a structure the use of which in whole or in part, does not conform to the use regulations of the district in which the structure is located.
- G. Non-conforming Use. A non-conforming use is a use in any structure which does not conform to the use regulations of the district in which such use exists.
- H. Lot. A lot is any undivided parcel of land in legal separate ownership or any part thereof designated by its Owner or Owners as a separate lot.
- I. Building Lot, A lot on which is placed a building.
- J. Side Yard. An unoccupied space extending for the full length of a building between the building and the side lot line.
- K. Back Yard. A space, unoccupied extending for the full width of the lot between the extreme rear line of a building and

the rear lot line.

- L. Accessory Building. A building subordinate to the main building and customarily incidental to the main purpose of such building.
- M. Structure. A combination of materials to form a construction that is safe and stable, including among others but not limited to dwellings and shall include any part thereof.
- N. Building. A structure, including all integral parts thereof, intended for use and occupation as a habitation, or for some purpose of assembly, business, manufacture, institutional, storage, ornamentation, or shelter to persons, animals or chattels.
- O. Dwelling. A building used as a habitation or parts thereof used for access to such building.
  - (a) Single family dwelling means a building and accessories thereto used or adapted for use as a dwelling by one family.
  - (b) Two family dwelling means a building and accessories thereto used or adapted for use as a dwelling by two families.
  - (c) Multiple dwelling means a building and accessories thereto used or adapted for use as a dwelling by more than two families or by any unit or group other than a family as defined herein.
  - (d) Seasonal dwelling means a dwelling used for a part of a year.
  - (e) Dwelling unit means one or more rooms arranged for the use of one or more individuals living together as a single housekeeping unit, with cooking, living, sanitary, and sleeping facilities.

## SUBDIVISION REGULATIONS OF THE TOWN OF STRAFFORD

## SECTION I

## AUTHORITY

Pursuant to the authority vested in the Strafford Planning Board by the voters of the Town of Strafford by vote of the Special Town Meeting, September 8, 1970 and in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 36, Sections 19-29 New Hampshire RSA 1955, as amended, the Strafford Planning Board adopts the following Regulations governing the subdivision of land in the Town of Strafford, New Hampshire.

## SECTION II GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 2.1 TITLE. These Regulations shall be known and cited as SUBDIVISION REGULATIONS OF THE TOWN OF STRAFFORD.
- 2.2 JURISDICTION. These regulations shall pertain to all land within the boundaries of the Town of Strafford and shall be in effect from the time of their adoption by the Strafford Planning Board.
- 2.3 ADMINISTRATION. The Planning Board of the Town of Strafford shall administer these regulations.
- 2.4 PENALTIES. Whoever, being the owner or agent of the owner of any land located within a subdivision, transfers or sells any land by reference to, or exhibition of, or by any other use of, a plat of a subdivision, before such plat has been approved by the Planning Board and recorded or filed in the office of the Register of Deeds of Strafford County shall forfeit and pay a penalty of \$500 for each lot or parcel so transferred or sold and the description by metes and bounds in the instrument of transfer shall not exempt the transaction from such penalties. The Town through its solicitor or other official designated by its Selectmen may enjoin such transfer or sale or agreement and may recover the said penalty by civil action, including reasonable Court costs and attorney fees.
- 2.5 SEVERABILITY. If any section, sub-section, sentence, clause or phrase of these regulations is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or illegal, such invalidity shall not effect the validity of the remaining portion of these regulations.

## SECTION III DEFINITIONS

- 3.1 BOARD. The Planning Board of the Town of Strafford.
- 3.2 EASEMENT. A grant or reservation by the owner of land for the use of all or a portion of such land by others, including the public, for a specific purpose or purposes, and which must be included in the conveyance of land affected by such easement. The usage of the word "easement" for land platting purposes in these regulations means that such easement area is included within the dimensions and areas of the lots or parcels through which the easement may run, and is not to be separated therefrom as in the case of a right of way.
- 3.3 LOT. A parcel of land capable of being occupied by one principal structure or use, and its accessory structures or uses, and as shown and identified as such on a plat. The number of lots in a subdivision will be considered to be the total number on adjacent land with the same subdivider whether the subdivision is made at one time or serially.
- 3.4 PLAT. The final map, drawing or chart on which the subdivider's plan of subdivision is presented to the Board for ap-

proval, and which, if approved, will be submitted to the Registrar of Deeds of Strafford County for recording.

- 3.5 RIGHT-OF-WAY. A strip of land occupied or intended to be occupied by a street, crosswalk, water main, sanitary or storm sewer main, or for other special use including public use. The usage of the term "right-of-way" for land platting purpose in these regulations shall mean that every right-of-way hereafter established and shown on a record plat is to be separate and distinct from the lots and parcels adjoining such right-of-way, and not to be included within the dimensions or areas of such other lots or parcels.
- 3.6 ROADWAY. The finished road surface between the shoulder breaks.
- 3.7 STREET. Street, avenue, boulevard, road, alley, highway, and other way exclusive of driveways serving not more than five adjacent lots.
- 3.8 SUBDIVIDER. The registered owner or the authorized agent of the registered owner of a subdivision.
- 3.9 SUBDIVISION. The division of a tract or parcel of land into two or more lots for the purpose, whether immediate or future, of sale, rent, lease, or building development. When appropriate to the context of these regulations, the word "subdivision" shall relate either to the process of subdividing or to the land or area subdivided.

## SECTION IV EXEMPTIONS

The following types of subdivisions are exempt from the requirements of these regulations.

- 4.1 AGRICULTURE. A bona fide division or partition of exclusively agricultural or timber land into parcels of five acres or more, for continued exclusive agricultural or timber purposes.
- 4.2 COURT ACTION. Partition of lands by will or through action of a court of competent jurisdiction.
- 4.3 PUBLIC TAKING. The division of a tract or parcel of land by public taking, such as the creation of a right-of-way across the property.
- 4.4 ADJOINING PROPERTIES. The sale or exchange of parcels of land between owners of adjoining porperties for the purpose of adjusting boundaries: provided that additional lots are not hereby created and that the original parcels or lots are not reduced below the minimum size requirements by these regulations.
- 4.5 UTILITY RIGHTS-OF-WAY. A bona fide division of a tract of land in order that one or more of the resulting parcels may be used as part of an electric transmission line right-of-way,

or other public utility right-of-way.

4.6 LIMITED SUBDIVISIONS. Any subdivision of not more than 4 lots or not requiring new streets; the extension or widening of existing streets or roads; or the extension of municipal utilities; provided that no lots are created with areas or frontages less than those required by the zoning ordinances of the Town of Strafford and these regulations.

## SECTION V PROCEDURE

- 5.1 APPLICATION. Whenever any subdivision to which these regulations are applicable is proposed to be made, and before any offer to sell, and before any contract for the sale of such subdivision or any part thereof shall have been negotiated, the subdivider shall apply in writing to the Board for preliminary approval of such subdivision. The application shall conform to the specifications contained in these regulations, and may be filed with either the chairman or secretary of the Board.
- 5.2 PRELIMINARY LAYOUT. Three copies of the preliminary layout as described in Section VII shall be filed with the Board along with the application for preliminary approval. The Board will study the preliminary layout in connection with the topography of the area, the general requirements of the community, and the best use of the land to be subdivided and that of adjoining areas.
- 5.3 REVISION OF PRELIMINARY LAYOUT. The Board before taking formal action shall hold discussions with the subdivider, and may hear and confer with other parties whose interests may be affected by the proposed subdivision. After such discussion, the Board shall communicate in writing to the subdivider the specific changes, if any, which it will require in the preliminary plan, and the amount of construction or improvements it may require as a pre-requisite to the subsequent approval of the subdivision plan. The Board may disapprove of the preliminary layout in its entirety, but shall state its reasons for such disapproval.
- 5.4 FINAL PLAT. The subdivider, after official notification by the Board with respect to the preliminary plan and the changes, if any, to be made therein, shall within one year thereafter file with the Board drawings of the final plat together with other required information as described in SECTION VIII. Before the final plat shall have been approved or disapproved, the Board shall hold a hearing with the subdivider on the plan, and may hold a public hearing. Notice of any such hearing shall be sent to the subdivider by registered mail, with return receipt requested, and to all abutters by certified or registered mail, stating the time and place of such hearing, not less than five days before the date fixed thereof.
- 5.5 FILING. The final plat together with application for approval and all other information required shall be filed not less

than five days before any regular meeting of the Board with either the chairman or secretary of the Board who shall furnish the subdivider with a receipt for same.

- APPROVAL. The Board shall consider any final plat submitted to it within 30 days and shall act to approve or disapprove thereof within 90 days from the date of submission in accordance with Section 23, Chapter 36, N. H. RSA 1955, as amended. If the Board approves the plat, the chairman or secretary of the Board shall transmit a copy of the plat with such approval endorsed in writing thereon to the Registrar of Deeds of Strafford County, and to the subdivider.
- FAILURE TO TAKE ACTION. The Town Clerk shall be the Town officer who shall issue a certificate of failure on the part of the Board to take action on approval or disapproval of a plat submitted to it, as provided by Chapter 36, Section 23, N. H. RSA 1955, as amended.
- APPROVAL OF PLATS OF EXEMPTED SUBDIVISIONS. Where the approval of the Board is a necessary prerequisite for recordation of any plat exempted from these regulations, the chairman and secretary of the Board are hereby empowered to make such approval; provided, however, any question of the exempt status of a subdivision hereunder, shall be submitted to the Board for its determination.
- COSTS. All costs pertaining to a subdivision and the approval of same shall be borne by the subdivider, prior to the Board's approval.

## SECTION VI GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

CHARACTER OF LAND

UNSAFE LAND. The Board shall prohibit or restrict subdivision of any land which is found by the Board to be unsafe for development by reason of its being subject to flooding, erosive action, unstabilized slope or fill, or otherwise located in a situation so that safe healthful development cannot be maintained on the land.

6.1(2)UNSUITABLE LAND. The Board shall restrict subdivision of land which is found by the Board to be unsuitable for development by reason of high water table, bed rock or other

impervious strata close to the surface, or excessive slope.

PART OF LOT. The Board may permit, as to unsafe and 6.1(3) unsuitable land, that it be platted as part of a lot in which there is sufficient safe and suitable land to satisfy the requirements of

these regulations as to minimum lot size.

PONDS, STREAMS, AND WETLANDS. In cases not controlled by an agency of the State of New Hampshire, the Board will not normally permit the filling or dredging of any part of a pond beyond the normal high water line, including adjoining swamps, marshes and bogs; the obstruction or partial obstruction of the normal flood bed of any stream or natural waterway; the change of course of such streams or waterways; or the filling of any adjoining swamp, marsh or bog. This provision will not be deemed to prevent the normal improvement of beaches or of the bed of a stream or waterway for proper drainage.

- 6.2(1) LOT AREA. No lot shall be created in any subdivision with an area less than 40,000 square feet with an additional 20,000 square feet for each family unit under a common roof. 6.2(2) FRONTAGE. Every building lot shall have a minimum frontage of 150 feet, provided that, where lots are located on the exterior of a curving street, a shorter front dimension shall be permitted provided that the average width of the lot measured across its center shall be at least 150 feet.
- 6.3 GRADING AND DRAINAGE. Lots shall be laid out in relation to the topography, and graded sufficiently to provide adequate drainage for the purpose intended without diversion of water onto other lots or onto property adjoining the subdivision. Excessive grading and destruction of natural cover will not be permitted.

## 6.4 STREETS

6.4(1) ARRANGEMENT. Streets shall be logically related to the topography so as to produce usable lots, reasonable grades and safe intersections in appropriate relation to the proposed use of the land. The arrangement of streets in the subdivision shall provide for the continuation of the principal streets in adjoining subdivisions, or for their proper projection when adjoining property is not subdivided. So far as practicable, the arrangement should avoid excessive street grades without extensive cut and fill.

6.4(2) INTERSECTIONS. Streets should be laid out to intersect as nearly as possible at right angles, and no angle of intersection of less than sixty degrees shall be permitted. Streets entering opposite sides of another street shall be laid out either directly opposite one another or with a minimum offest of 125 feet between their center lines. Intersecting property lines at street intersections shall be joined by a curve of at least 20-foot radius.

6.4(3) WIDTHS. No street right-of-way shall be less than 48 feet in width, and may be required to be more; whether the street be new or existing. The width of the roadway shall be not less than 18 feet with gravel shoulders extending 3 feet from each side of the roadway to the shoulder break. Dead-end streets shall be provided with a turn-around at the closed end with a right-of-way with a minimum radius of 60 feet and with a roadway consisting of the area of a circle with a minimum radius of 45 feet to the outside edge, or equivalent turn-around area.

6.4(4) ACCESS TO WATER. All subdivisions with frontage on bodies of water shall provide access at suitable intervals for fire

fighting equipment to said bodies of water.

6.4(5) DRAINAGE. A drainage swale at least 3 feet in width and 16 inches in depth at its midpoint below the street center line grade shall be constructed in each street right-of-way on each side of the roadway unless the street is provided with curbs and gutters; or unless topography and/or soil conditions makes such swales impracticable or unnecessary. No water shall be permitted

to run across the street on the surface but shall be directed into ditches or catch basins, and shall be piped underground in a pipe of sufficient size to carry thennormal flood flow of water; provided that no such pipe or culvert shall be less than 12 inches in diameter.

6.4(6) ROADWAY SURFACE. The roadways of streets in subdivisions with not more than 10 lots may have gravel surfaces. All other roadways shall be of hard-surfaced bituminous material.

6.4(7) ROADWAY CONSTRUCTION. All roadways shall be constructed in accordance with the following specifications:

- A. The foundation shall be prepared in accordance with good local practice for the soil conditions encountered to provide a sound base.
- B. The base course shall consist of not less than 12 inches of bank-run gravel, or better material, free from clay, loam or organic matter.
- C. The finish course shall consist of fine gravel, or better material, and free from clay, loam and organic matter.

## 6.5 SEWAGE DISPOSAL AND WATER SUPPLY

- 6.5(1) ON SITE. Each lot, regardless of its location, shall be adequate to provide for on site sewage disposal and water supply unless public or community systems are available or are to be supplied by the subdivider. Each lot in all subdivisions shall satisfy the requirements of the State of New Hampshire for sewage disposal systems near shorelines. Each lot shall also be adequate for on site water supply in accordance with the recommendations of the Manual of Individual Water Supply Systems issued by the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare or any revision therof.
- 6.5(2) COMMUNITY WATER-SUPPLY AND SEWAGE-DIS-POSAL SYSTEMS. The design of any community water-supply or sewage-disposal systems to be provided by the subdivider shall be approved by appropriate officials of the State of New Hampshire before the Board will approve the subdivision.
- 6.6 BUILDING LINES. No building shall be constructed on any lot within 40 feet from the right-of-way of any street or within 25 feet from the lot side or back lines. Provision for maintaining such building lines shall be established by covenants in deeds of the lots.
- 6.7 EASEMENTS. Easements shall be provided as required by topography and use for utilities and other special purposes as foreseen by the Board or subdivider. Such easements shall have satisfactory access to public right-of-ways, and shall in general, have a width of not less than 20 feet.
- 6.8 PARKS AND PLAYGROUNDS. Areas set aside for parks and playgrounds to be dedicated or to be reserved for the common use of all property owners in the subdivision, whether or not required by the Board, shall be of reasonable size and character for the intended use.
- 6.9 RESERVE STRIPS. Reserve strips of land which, in the opinion of the Board, show an intent on the part of the subdi-

vider to control access to land dedicated or to be dedicated to public use shall not be permitted.

- 6.10 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF FACILITIES. The Board will approve no subdivision with a community water-supply or sewage-disposal system subject to control by the State of New Hampshire until provision satisfactory to the State is made for the continued operation and maintenance of such systems. The Board encourages, and may require, the subdivider to establish a community association to provide continued maintenance of such community utilities, streets, parks and playgrounds and beaches as may not be dedicated to public use and accepted by the town.
- 6.11 BOND. Before approval of a subdivision by the Board, there shall be filed by the subdivider a bond or other assurances acceptable to the Board in an amount sufficient to cover the cost of the preparation of streets, the extension of public water and sewer lines, if available, the construction of community utilities, if any, and the completion of essential drainage. This bond or other assurances shall be approved as to form and sureties by the legal counsel of the Town, and conditioned on the supply of service to each lot, as sold, within one year from the date of sale and on completion of all required improvements within 5 years from the date of the bond.
- 6.12 STREET NAMES. Streets which join or are in alignment with streets of abutting or neighboring properties shall bear the same names. Names of new streets shall not duplicate, nor bear phonetic resemblance to the names of existing streets within the Town and shall be subject to the approval of the Selectmen.
- 6.13 VARIANCES. Where in the opinion of the Board strict conformity to these regulations would cause undue hardship or injustice to the owner of the land, a subdivision plan substantially in conformity with these regulations may be approved by the Board; provided that the spirit of these regulations and public convenience and welfare will not be adversely affected.

## SECTION VII THE PRELIMINARY LAYOUT

Subdividers shall file with the Board three copies of a preliminary layout at a scale of not more than 100 feet to the inch showing or accompanied by the following information:

- 7.1 Proposed subdivision name; name and address of owner of record; subdivider; designer; date; north point and scale.
- 7,2 Names of owners of record of abutting properties; abutting subdivision names; streets; easements; building lines; alleys; parks; public open spaces; and similar facts regarding abutting property.
- 7.3 Location of property lines and their approximate dimensions; existing easements, buildings, water courses, ponds or standing water, rock ledges, and other essential features.

- 7.4 Existing water mains, sewers, culverts, drains and proposed connections or alternative means of providing water supply and disposal of a sewage and surface drainage.
- 7.5 Location, name and widths of existing and proposed streets with their approximate grades and typical profiles; building lines; and the elevations of sufficient points on the property to indicate the general topography.
- 7.6 Boundaries and purposes of proposed permanent easements over or under private property.
- 7.7 Location of all parcels of land proposed to be dedicated to public use and the conditions of such dedication; location of all parcels of land proposed for community use and the conditions of such use; and a copy of such private deed restrictions as are intended to cover part of or all of the tract.
- 7.8 Preliminary designs of any bridges or culverts which may be required.
- 7.9 Temporary stakes or other markers shall be provided on the property to facilitate inspection.
- 7.10 Where the preliminary layout submitted covers only a part of the subdivider's entire holding, a sketch of the prospective future street system of the unsubmitted part will be furnished and the street system of the submitted part will be considered in the light of adjustments and connections with the street system of the part not submitted.

## SECTION VIII FINAL PLAT

- 8.1 SPECIFICATION FOR FINAL PLAT. Six copies of the final plat shall be submitted for approval. The drawings shall conform to all requirements of the Registrar of Deeds for Strafford County for recording. Each sheet shall have adequate space for the necessary endorsement by the proper authorities. The final plat shall show:
  - A. Proposed subdivision name or identifying title, the name and address of owner of record and subdivider, the name, license number and seal of the designer and/or the name and address of the surveyor, date, scale and north point.
  - B. Monuments, street lines, building lines, pedestrian ways, lot lines, easements, areas to be dedicated to public use, areas for community use, and areas the title to which is reserved by the subdivider.
  - C. Sufficient data to determine readily the location, bearing and length of every street line, lot line, boundary line, and to reproduce such lines upon the ground. Designation and area of each lot.

8.2 OTHER DATA. The subdivider shall submit in triplicate all drawings and specifications required for the construction of all required improvements; such assurances and bonds as the Board may require; shall set reference monuments consisting of concrete or stone markers or of drilled holes in ledge or in large boulders so located that at least one corner of each lot may be reached by a survey line no more than 1,000 feet long; and shall set permanent boundary markers, such as iron pipe, on the property to mark each lot and area as identified on the plat.

## SECTION IX

## **AMENDMENTS**

These regulations may be amended or rescinded by the Board but only following a public hearing on the proposed change. The Chairman or secretary of the Board shall transmit a record of any changes so authorized to the Registrar of Deeds of Strafford County.

As was brought out in last year's District Report, a plan for implementation of the State Minimum Standards must be initiated no later than September 1, 1972. This does not necessarily mean that all facets of the document must be met

by then, but the District should have long range plans in meeting these requirements.

The following is an inconclusive summary as to how Strafford stands on some of the stipulations of the Minimum Standards at present.

- The pupil-teacher ratio for grades 1-2 shall be 25-1 or less.
  - a. We are at the 25-1 level now, thus operating at capacity.
- 2. The pupil-teacher ratio for grades 3-8 shall be 30-1 or less.
  - a. Because of the double grades we have, we are not fulfilling this requirement.
- 3. A broad and well-balanced curriculum is offered.
  - a. Needs emphasis in the Art and Physical Education programs.
- 4. Library Services Schools enrolling 150-300 children shall provide at least 1000 sq. ft. of library space or the equivalent of one regular classroom. Teachers and pupils must have access to 6,000 books.
  - a. We are consulting with the State Department to determine the feasibility of library space.
  - b. Our library collection falls far short of the necessary number. Long range planning would seem essential in this area.
- 5. Guidance Services shall be provided for all pupils.
  - a. We do not have a guidance program.
- Special Education services shall be provided to all children who differ from the average to a significant degree in intellectual, emotional, or physical characteristics.
  - a. We are providing for the education of our physically handicapped children.
  - b. The intellectually handicapped may need some form of specialized instruction.
- 7. In schools with between 150-300 children enrolled, the Elementary Principal shall have at least one half time scheduled for supervision of instruction and other leadership responsibilities.

- a. Our principal is teaching full time.
- b. Guidance services can be provided by the Principal.

The above summary, of course, does not include all the details of the Minimum Standards, but does indicate some of the main things which must be considered in any long range planning.

As one is aware, the initial schooling that a child receives becomes most crucial in the ensuing years. Many times a child will start out lagging in Grade 1 simply because he or she is not adequately prepared for the process of learning. A relatively new program geared to alleviate this problem has been rapidly gaining state-wide acceptance. The Readiness Program focuses on the developmental age of a child and gears the program to fit his needs. A child who experiences success in school in his primary years will increase his chances for success in the years that follow.

As in the case of any new program the success of it lies with all the people involved. In this case the teaching staff, the parents, the students, and the administration.

The following is a brief summary of how we stand with the AREA School:

For the 1971-72 school year the sending districts requested a phasing in of grades 9-12 into the Rochester AREA School. If allowed, this would mean incentive aid from the state for each child attending. However, due to lack of progress as far as any building program is concerned, the state refused to allow this implementation. Until such time that the AREA is in operation, students are allowed to attend other schools with the District responsible for tuition up to the "state average." It now appears that it will be at least two more years before Strafford can be absorbed under the AREA plan.

In closing, the undersigned would like to express their thanks to the citizens of Strafford, the School Board, the Staff, and the Students for their cooperation during the past year.

Notices were sent home or phone calls made in cases where defects were observed. Vision and hearing tests were repeated when necessary.

Our Rubella Clinic, German Measles, held on March 24, 1970 was successful with 60 children from kindergarten through grade four, innoculated by Dr. Charles Howath of Durham.

A dental prophylaxis clinic was held at the school from April-May, with Ann Huckins as the hygienist. One hundred ten children were checked and received fluoride treatments. The Strafford School PTA sponsored this program.

Pre-school clinic was attended by seventeen children who will begin first grade in the Fall.

Plans are already underway for next year's prophylaxis clinic. Ann Huckins has agreed to be the hygienist and this program will begin in mid-October, to enable a better follow-up. There is a need of assistance and education in dental health habits, so I hope to work with the lower grades, one through four, especially.

Thank you, and I look forward to being with you again in the Fall.
