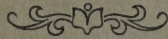

*COMMISSIONERS' REPORT*

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In accordance with the Public Statutes of the State of New Hampshire, the Commissioners of Sullivan County submit their Annual Report for the year ending December 31, 1929, together with the reports of the Superintendent of the County Farm and House of Correction, Treasurer, Clerk of the Superior Court, Sheriff, Solicitor, Chaplain, Physician and Auditors for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1929.

We are pleased to still have Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Grout as Superintendent and Matron of the Sullivan County Farm at Unity. Affairs at the institution are being conducted in a very able manner under their supervision.

The number of inmates has been much larger than in previous years; much sickness has existed, resulting in the death of a large number of elderly people. The farm is in a good state of cultivation, the crops as a whole have been good. The herd of cattle, composed of about eighty head of thoroughbred Holsteins, is in fine condition. We hope the people of our County realize that this herd of State and Federal tested cattle for tuberculosis and abortion is one of the best in our State, and that during the year we have a large number of young bulls for siring purposes for sale, which we will sell to the farmers of our County for a reasonable price.

There has been added this past year to the already modern equipment of up-to-date machinery at the farm a portable saw mill, whereby all the lumber can be sawed on the premises with a great financial saving to the County on account of having sawdust for bedding purposes and the slab wood for fuel; also causing a great saving of labor

drawing the logs to the saw mill three miles away and the lumber back up the hill. We have purchased a Caterpillar tractor for farm use, which is a great asset to the labor problem of the farm. The general business depression all over the County has increased expenses for the poor away from the farm, as usually they could earn a part of their living if they had work.

Our relations with the Overseers of the Poor have been very pleasant, and we wish to thank them for the interest they have taken in the performance of their duties.

We wish to express to Mr. and Mrs. Grout our feeling of appreciation and deep gratitude for their many acts of kindness to the people in their charge, also the interest they have displayed at all times in the betterment of conditions at the institution; to Dr. Sanders for his prompt attention when called to administer to the sick; to our Herdsman for the excellent care of the stock; to the Head Farmer and his assistants for the wonderful crops raised; to the nurse in charge of the hospital for her care and kindness to the sick, and to all others for the faithful performance of their duties we extend our thanks.

Chaplain, who not only gives us spiritual advice but has been very kind to the inmates who were not able to attend services. And Dr. Sanders, who has always been at the beck and call of the inmates either day or night, has always given them the attention he has given the wealthy class and has never failed whenever called regardless of the time of day or night.

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*To the Commissioners of Sullivan County :*

During the nine months of my holding office as Solicitor of Sullivan County, from April 1, 1929, to December 31, 1929, the office of your Solicitor has been active and busy.

Since taking the oath of office as Solicitor I have had but one term of Superior Court to attend and that the September Term, 1929.

The Grand Jury at the September Term of Superior Court, 1929, returned eleven indictments for the following crimes :

- 1 for arson.
- 2 for statutory rape.
- 1 for assault with intent to rape.
- 1 for assault with intent to kill.
- 6 for larceny.

In the larceny cases pleas of guilty were entered by each of the respondents, and in every instance but one the offenders were given House of Correction sentences and in that one instance a suspended sentence at the House of Correction was given.

In the arson case a jury trial was had and after ten days of hearing the evidence the jury brought in a verdict of guilty and sentence of not less than three years nor more than five years at hard labor in the State Prison in Concord was imposed by Court.

Only one of the statutory rape cases was tried by a jury and in the case that was tried the jurors were unable to agree upon a verdict.

In the other statutory rape case the respondent and the prosecutrix were married before the case came on for trial.

The respondent pleaded guilty to aggravated assault, a fine, costs and suspended jail sentence was imposed by the Court and a trust fund was established for the benefit of the prosecutrix and her child.

The respondent in the case of assault with intent to rape was tried by a jury, found guilty, and sentenced to not less than five nor more than eight years at hard labor in the State Prison at Concord.

The respondent in the case of assault with intent to kill was acquitted after a jury trial.

During the first nine months of your present Solicitor's term of office he prosecuted twenty-six violations of the State liquor laws and was successful in securing a conviction, or pleas of guilty, in the Municipal Courts in all but one case, and in that case the respondent was acquitted after trial in the Newport Municipal Court. Two of the respondents convicted in the Claremont Municipal Court appealed their cases and in one of them a jury trial was commenced in the Superior Court. After the State had put in its case the Solicitor, with the consent of the Court, not proessed the case because of the insufficiency of the evidence offered by the State.

Your Solicitor has prosecuted numerous misdemeanors in the Municipal Court which are too numerous to mention.

A civil suit was brought by your Solicitor, at the request of the County Commissioner, on behalf of the County against Horace Fowler of Newport, the suit being for Fowler's board and care at the County Farm in Unity, and the suit will be entered at the February Term of Court.

The successful administration of the Solicitor's office depends in a great degree upon the cooperation of the Sheriff, his Deputies and the Police Officers of the different towns in the county, and your Solicitor is pleased to state that excellent cooperation has been rendered by the Sheriff, his Deputies and the Police Officers.

Your Solicitor entered upon his duties green and unfamiliar with the work but he has found ready help and assistance from the office of the Attorney General at Concord,

N. H., and from those in local authority who have had more experience than he in the enforcement of the criminal laws.

In closing this my first report I wish to take the opportunity of thanking the Commissioners for their courtesy and helpfulness to the Solicitor in the performance of his duties, and to all other State, County and Town officials for their valued assistance to the Solicitor.
