Selectmen's Letter

The year 2003 has been a year of change for the Sullivan Board of Selectmen. As you know, Richard Labadie was elected to fill the vacancy left by Eric Martin. Being a long time resident of Sullivan and having served on the Board previously, Dick has added a dimension of knowledge and experience. Doug Washburn, who devoted many tireless years to the town, has taken a new job in the West which precluded him completing his term. We thank and salute Doug for his long-term dedication to the wellbeing of the Town of Sullivan and we wish him the best for the future. Michael Carney was appointed to the Board and will complete Doug's term until elections in March. Mike has brought youthful enthusiasm and further perspective; his help is greatly appreciated.

Fiscally, 2003 has been a good year for the Town of Sullivan. As you know, our entire town and all of its departments operate on a budget which absorbs only a fraction of your tax dollar. I am happy to report again this year that the town departments have done an exceedingly good job of keeping their budgets similar to those of last year. It is through the department heads' conscientious efforts and the number of you good citizens who have worked on a voluntary (without pay) basis that this has been and is possible. The various departments in our town also have needs. A number of years ago we (the citizens) responsibly recognized that departments would occasionally have very large needs and, to lessen the impact, we started a number of capital reserve funds. These funds enable us to have all or a portion of the required money set aside when such need arises. This system has continued to work well and we have been able to obtain a new cruiser for the Police Department, a new backhoe loader for the Highway Department, and for our Volunteer Fire and Rescue Department a newer rescue truck in 2002 and in 2003 a new "pumper" (fire truck). The good planning and saving by the citizens of Sullivan have made this possible and with an insignificant impact on our town tax rate. The citizens also, through their votes in 2003, have managed to restrain the spending of the Regional School District. The results are that the tax rate for 2003 has remained similar to that for the previous year.

In 2003, there was an increase in the interest and participation of our citizens in the various functions of town government. I think that these citizens have found their participation can make a positive difference and that everyone benefits as the level of participation increases. As you know, Sullivan has a "volunteer government" where in the members and officials participate primarily for the benefit of the general citizenry. Some positions offer token compensation but the reward of these jobs is the knowledge that you have helped your neighbors and made improvements to your community. Currently there are many positions in our government and its boards which need to be filled. I am encouraging our citizens to become more active participants. For the investment of a few hours

each month, you can make a difference to your community and our town. Anyone interested in participating in the town government should contact the Board of Selectmen.

Overall, Sullivan has done well in 2003. There have been significant improvements to our infrastructure and capital equipment. Controlled growth and increases in land preservation/conservation have continued to maintain Sullivan as a pleasant rural community. All of the town's departments and boards have made this possible without increasing the fiscal burden on our citizens. We are most thankful for the conscientious and diligent efforts.

The most significant event of 2004 will be the revaluation of the entire town. This activity is mandated by the State and necessary to assure the fairness of our taxation. Your cooperation with the assessors will be helpful and appreciated. Should any question or comment regarding this process arise, please feel free to contact the Board of Selectmen.

2004 Town Warrant

To the inhabitants of the Town of Sullivan in the County of Cheshire qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Sullivan Town Hall in said town, Tuesday the 9th day of March, next at 11:00 A.M. of the clock to act upon the following by written ballot: The polls not to close before 7:00 P.M.

ARTICLE 1

To choose all necessary Town Officers and School District Officials for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2

Are you in favor of replacement of amending Article II of the Community Planning Ordinance to add: "E. the wetland conservation district from the ordinance adopted by the Town is incorporated herein by reference"?

You are hereby notified to meet at the Sullivan Town Hall in said town, Wednesday, the 10th day of March, next at 7:00 P.M. of the clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 3

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred twenty-four thousand four hundred thirty-five dollars (\$124,435) to defray Town charges for the ensuing year. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 4

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred sixty-eight thousand five hundred seventy-five dollars (\$168,575) for the maintenance of highways and bridges for the ensuing year, as follows: \$122,130.43 to be raised by taxation and \$46,444.57 to be designated from the Highway Block Grant. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 5

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixty-two thousand dollars (\$62,000) for the reconstruction and resurfacing of bituminous-surfaced roads. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 6

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of forty thousand six hundred fifty dollars (\$40,650) for the operation of the Police Department as follows: \$40,050 to be raised by taxation and \$600 to be designated from the fund balance (surplus). (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 7

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-one thousand dollars (\$21,000) for the

operation of the Fire and Rescue Department. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 8

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) for deposit in the Capital Reserve Fund for reconstruction and resurfacing of bituminous surfaced roads. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 9

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twelve thousand one hundred dollars (\$12,100) to provide and maintain Public Library services, and authorize the Library Trustees to receive and use supplemental funds, as provided. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 10

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000) for deposit in the Capital Reserve Fund for Revaluation. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 11

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000) for the purchase of new pagers and portable radio equipment to be utilized by the Fire Department. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 12

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand three hundred fifty dollars (\$5,350) for deposit in the Capital Reserve fund for Fire Department Vehicles. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 13

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for deposit in the Capital Reserve Fund for a police cruiser. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 14

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand eight hundred dollars (\$3,800) for the care and maintenance of Town Cemeteries. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 15

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand eight hundred dollars (\$2,800) for deposit in the Capital Reserve Fund for major highway equipment purchase. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 16

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) for the purpose of purchasing forestry equipment and personal protection equipment. This is a non-lapsing appropriation per RSA 32:7, VI and will not lapse until the equipment is purchased or by the year 2008. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 17

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand eighty-five dollars (\$2,085) for the operation of the Planning Board. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 18

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500) for the operation of the Conservation Commission. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 19

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500) for deposit in the Capital Reserve Fund for major repairs to town buildings. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 20

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500) for deposit in the Capital Reserve Fund for cemetery expansion. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 21

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for deposit in the Forest Fire Equipment/Liability Trust Fund and authorize the Selectmen as agents to expend the fund. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 22

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for the purpose of paying

Southwestern New Hampshire Mutual Aid System for study and improvements made to the communications systems. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 23

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600) for the operation of the Recreation Committee. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 24

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of Land Conservation and to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) to be placed in this fund and appoint the Conservation Commission and the Selectmen as agents of the Town to make withdrawals from said fund or to take any action relating thereto. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 25

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400) for the operation of the Sullivan Office of Emergency Management. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 26

To see if the Town will vote to accept the Reports of the Agents and Committees as printed within the Town Report.

ARTICLE 27

To transact any business which may legally come before this meeting and to listen to opinions of a purely advisory nature as regards the conduct of Town affairs for the ensuing year

Article 6: Voted, by voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$93,485.00 to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 7: Voted, by voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 for deposit in the capital reserve fund for revaluation.

Article 8: Voted, by voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for deposit in the capital reserve fund for major repairs to town buildings.

Article 9: Voted, by voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$163,230.00 for maintenance of highways and bridges for the ensuing year, as follows:

\$120,899.00 to be raised by taxation; and

Conservation Commission

Town Forest

Extensive logging on Winch Hill just north of the Town Forest has changed the character of the town land. The Conservation Commission would like to have added the property to the town land, but a buyer appeared immediately to purchase it from the logger. Additionally, the dollars in the fund created with 50% of the proceeds from the Land Use Change Tax over several years would have covered only about half the asking price. Sullivan respondents to the Planning Board's household survey in the spring indicated overwhelming support for setting aside tax money for land protection, either by increasing the percentage of the Land Use Change Tax accruing to the Conservation Commission to 100% or by creating a capital reserve fund for acquiring high priority land.

We are trying to keep the old roads from eroding further. Keeping wheeled vehicles off the old roads is the first step. Additionally, we had planned to replace a culvert on the old Stoddard Road on the way to the Meeting House Rock during the summer of 2003. Wet weather postponed those plans until the summer of 2004. Beavers plugged up the culvert at the base of the old Stoddard Road in September and then built an extensive dam, which has created a pond over the road, a problem to be dealt with in the coming year.

Jewett Park

Volunteers cleared much of the park of brush. Stumps will be removed from the playground area and the land graded in 2004.

Roadside trash pickups

In May, more than 50 people helped remove almost a ton of trash from the roadsides. At the lunch following the morning's work, volunteers enthusiastically voted for a fall cleanup. In October, about 35 townsfolk helped clear the roads of more than 300 pounds of trash. No one knows why there was more roadside trash in 2003 than 2004. Again, everyone enjoyed the lunch following the morning's work. In recognition of the successful roadside efforts, Litter-free New Hampshire contributed 2 more Liberty elms to the town. These were planted along with the 4 previously earned, creating an allee leading to the entrance to the Sullivan Cemetery.

Hikes and trails

The Maurice Swett Trail leading to the Giant's Cradle was dedicated on a June hike in the presence of the family. An April hike took participants to Otter Brook Falls. In February, there was a loop hike to Bolster Pond the Otter Brook Preserve land of The Nature Conservancy. A temporary booklet of 4 maps of trails of Sullivan protected lands (Winch Forest, Piper, Olsen, and Otter Brook Preserve) is available for perusal at the Town Hall and at the Library. When funding can be arranged, a more formal booklet may be created and offered for sale.

The Maurice Swett Trail lost its sign when the logging equipment began creating a road for trucks on the old Cummings Road late in 2003. On January 10, 2004, there was a hike from Piper to the Giant's Cradle in Olsen, where the blazes for the trail are still visible. Logging will eliminate many of those during the winter operation, after which the trail will be reblazed.

Hazardous Waste Day

In 2003, there were 12 days during spring and summer when Sullivan residents could, without charge, dispose of hazardous materials at the Keene Recycling Center on Route 12. Dates for the fall of 2004 will be announced in the Keene Sentinel and the Sullivan Newsletter. It is a good opportunity to rid your household of toxic substances, such as paint and pesticides.

Wetlands issues

The Road Agent successfully applied for several Wetlands Permits, reviewed by the Conservation Commission and approved by DES, to replace culverts.

The Fire Department received a permit, reviewed by the Conservation Commission, to install a dry hydrant on South Road. The Conservation Commission also reviewed an application for a dredge and fill permit behind a dwelling on Arlen Drive.

Recognizing the importance of protecting wetlands to protect water quality and quantity as well as to maintain wildlife habitat and the natural beauty that makes Sullivan so precious to its residents, the Conservation Commission discussed and approved the Planning Board's ballot article to add a Wetlands Conservation District to the Community Planning Ordinance.

Conservation lands

Sullivan enjoys the benefits of the protection of more than 3000 acres through direct ownership by conservation organizations (The Nature Conservancy and the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests) and by conservation easements given by several local landowners. A parcel of 86 acres In Sullivan Center ensures the maintenance of large swath of wildlife habitat from South Road to Cross Road. Most of the previously protected land is located in the northern part of town and helps preserve the watersheds of Otter Brook and the Ashuelot River as significant wildlife habitat. Landowners thinking about protecting their properties from future development while continuing to use them for forestry or agricultural activities are encouraged to contact the Conservation Commission or one of the local land trusts.

School programs in conservation education

The Conservation Commission continues to support environmental education in the Sullivan Schools, contributing to a small part of the Harris Center naturalist educator's salary for time in the Sullivan School and providing some educational materials.

Membership and meeting times

Three members of the Conservation Commission attended the State organization's annual meeting to learn more about wetlands issues, invasive species, and land protection.

The Conservation Commission welcomes new membership, which is now up to 7 regular members and 4 alternates. The group continues to work on assembling a natural resources inventory, an important basis for the town's Master Plan. Meetings are held at 7 p.m. every second Tuesday in the Town Hall.

Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committee

2003 Annual Report

The Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committee (ARLAC) was established in 1994, one year after the Ashuelot River was enrolled into the State Rivers Management and Protection Program. Since then, members, who are nominated by local municipal officials, have been educated in a broad array of issues associated with the river and its watershed. It is the hope of the committee to be a resource that works well between the interests and concerns of the citizens in the watershed, and State authorities.

The volunteer river water quality monitoring program in conjunction with NHDES Volunteer River Assessment Program (VRAP) continued this year for its third season. ARLAC members, working with community volunteers, participated in a spring training session, leading into a five-month effort of sampling once per month from May through September. Again, analyses were done for E. whi, temperature, pH, total phosphorus, dissolved oxygen (DO), turbidity and conductivity, with the City of Keene again donating lab services for E. whi. Copper and chloride sampling were not repeated this year due to low levels found

in the previous year. Phosphorus testing, analyzed by the State Lab, was funded this year by the W.S. Badger Co. of Gilsum, and a grant funded by the Connecticut River Joint Commission enabled us to use our own water quality monitoring equipment, helping to ensure consistency in data. Again this year, Donna Hanscom of the Keene Waste Water Treatment Facility treated ARLAC and monitor volunteers to a summary presentation of the

sampling results. Continued monitoring and public education will keep the Ashuelot River the vital community resource that it is today.

A regular task for the Committee is to review and comment on state permit applications within the river corridor that may have potential impacts on the river. This year we submitted comments on projects proposed in Washington, Marlow, Gilsum, Keene, Swanzey, Winchester and Hinsdale.

The Committee also submitted comments regarding SB-87; a state bill that may allow the spreading of septage, biosolids, and shortpaper fiber within the 250-foot buffer currently afforded to protected rivers. ARLAC believes prohibition within the 250-foot buffer should be maintained.

This past year saw the State put together final criteria regarding the removal of dams. Since 2001, two dams have been removed along the Ashuelot, and with the possibility of two more removals in upcoming years, communities will better understand the importance of their removal while keeping environmental, cultural and historical impacts in mind.

The Committee meets each month, on the third Tuesday evening in the Keene Public Library. The Local Advisory Committee invites citizens and town officials to contact their local ARLAC representatives or the Southwest Region Planning Commission for more information.

Emergency Management

The year 2003 can be summed up in one word - PAPERWORK. Starting early in the year I was advised of the Homeland Security Grants. A program funded by the Federal Government in an effort to distribute funds in the form of reimbursements to all Cities and Towns for the purpose purchasing new equipment related to homeland security and preparedness. After our application was returned the paper started to fly. In the end this office had completed over 200 pages of documentation related to the Homeland Security Grants I & II for FY2003. The largest being the NH State Wide Needs Assessment at 158 pages. Due in part to my expert typing and computer skills, I estimate that it only took me four reams of paper, to complete the 200 pages. The result however will be in the form of \$3,562.00 in reimbursements to the Town in 2004. From a limited "Authorized Equipment List" these funds were used to purchase a Hurst Air Bag lifting system for Fire Department Rescue operations. Homeland Security Grants will also be available for FY2004 so I will commit (and will probably end up being committed) to perusing those funds in 2004.

This past year, Deputy Director Cheryl Labadie and I started updating our Basic Emergency Plan; in 2004 we will be required to change the format of our plan to model Federal Plans. Here comes some more paper.

Working with our Road Agent, Randy Smith and the Selectmen, this office purchased a number of detour signs and directional markers. The signs will be utilized when traffic is diverted through Sullivan from Route 9 or 10 in conjunction with our emergency traffic policy. The policy was developed as the result of large trucks traveling over some of the smaller town roads during a motor vehicle accident this spring. One oversize truck caught and pulled the power lines from a residence and a second collapsed a section of pavement. In part, this policy and detour signs are intended to keep the increased traffic flow and the heavy trucks restricted to Centre Street. If you encounter these signs along Centre Street and the road is not posted as "CLOSED", then local traffic is permissible.

You may have heard during times of heightened security alerts, severe or winter weather conditions to create a family disaster kit and review your family disaster plan, the Sullivan Office of Emergency Management can assist you with both of these. Just give us a call. I would like to thank all Town Departments and the Selectmen for their continuing support and willingness to work together.

Fire and Rescue Department

The year 2003 was quite an amazing year for the Town of Sullivan and the Sullivan Fire and Rescue Department (SFR), with the biggest event being the purchase and delivery of the town's new pumper. In addition to answering emergency calls, the department members were very busy with training and certifications. We acquired new equipment through departmental purchases, fundraising, donations, and grants. The officers put in many long hours on administrative projects to meet State, Federal, and NFPA requirements. We welcomed four new members: Heather Skrocki, Bob Guyette, Jim Long, and Jon Rau. Again this year, the department enjoyed working closely with the Board of Selectmen, Police Department, Highway Department, and our community members. Your support and encouragement is greatly appreciated by the membership.

The Calls

The department responded to 52 calls during 2003; this is down from a record number of 72 during 2002. As in past years the majority of these calls still continue to be for Emergency Medical Services. The following is a breakdown of the call handled by the department during 2003.

After one of our more serious calls this year, I had a resident ask me how are the members able to deal with the stress of responding to emergencies along with the type of situation we had just faced. My answer was that we rely on our training to help deal with the many different situations, but the stress and emotions do take their toll.

Most of our calls are of a serious nature and we respond accordingly. The emotions of individuals involved in an emergency are also felt by the membership; after all, you are our friends, neighbors, and relatives. Some situations do result in increased emotional stress for those who respond. This type of stress, which is common throughout all of the emergency services, can lead to other health problems if not kept in check and tends to increase with the number and types of calls to which we respond.

The department has a number of ways in which we deal with this stress. There may be a formal Critical Incident Debriefing; this usually occurs after a call that involves a fatality, multiple injuries, or children. A Critical Incident Debriefing is conducted by a specialized team of volunteers from outside the department. Another simple way is "Fire House Humor"; it's the little smile or laugh we may see while on-scene (the source completely unrelated to the call) or it may be in the form of being rewarded with a little humor by someone who is not involved with the call (although they may not see it that way at the time). One example is that of an irate driver I encountered during a motor vehicle accident on Route 9 (a tractor-trailer jackknifed across the road, pinned between the embankment on one side of the road to the guardrails on the other). Fortunately no one was injured but traffic was blocked in both directions. As we assisted in turning traffic around, I had the good fortune to meet a driver of a luxury car who was plainly irritated with me because he was being asked to turn around. He stuck his head out of his window and asked if I was in charge of the mess. I stated I was and asked if I could be of help (thinking he wanted directions). He stated that I could move the truck for him, offered a few other choice comments, and asked me to relay a profane statement to the driver regarding his anatomy and driving ability. The exchange did elevate my stress level but as I watched him proceed to back his own car into the guardrail, I conscientiously gave him a smile and said "have a nice day" as I pointed out his broken taillight....stress gone!

The Hours

As a volunteer department, almost 5,000 man-hours were donated by our members during 2003 in response to calls, training courses, in-house training, and for the operation of the department. These include:

The Training

Training remains the most critical element of any fire department and again in 2003 the SFR training was our number one priority. Members attended training courses at Meadowood Fire School, at the NH Fire Academy in Concord, at various Fire Departments around the region as well as in-house training. Some of the major training events we participated in this past year included a live burn in Roxbury, where members trained under live-fire conditions as a building on the property was burned for training and demolition purposes. Members were certified in Personal Protective Equipment and Self Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA). (You might have seen the Fire Academy SCBA trailer at the station - within the SCBA trailer is a maze of obstacles which fire fighters must negotiate while wearing full turnout gear and the SCBA; in total darkness. This trailer simulates conditions found in a smoke-filled home or building.) Regarding EMS training, Scott Lake, Al Jones and Heather Skrocki were certified as Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) in 2003, and members also attended Emergency Medical Services (EMS) continuing education at Cheshire Medical.

In-house training included live-fire training, accountability, apparatus pumps, drafting, water supply, driver training, forestry training and continuous EMS Training. Chief Bob Crowell, from Meadowood Fire School, conducted an evening of fire extinguisher training with live fire situations.

The Department

Department operations continue to become more and more involved and the amount of paperwork seems endless. Grant writing and working with Emergency Vehicles of Maine (EVM) on the new truck accounted for more than half of the 2300 man-hours.

When not involved in calls, training, weekly meetings or paperwork, the membership also participated in events such as Fire Prevention Week at the Sullivan School with demonstrations and many, many questions, or the Pumpkin Festival where over 1500 hot dogs were sold to raise funds for new pagers. In September the department hosted a Disaster Drill with Heather's Skrocki's Boy Scout Troop from Swanzey. The three-day event gave the boys the opportunity to practice their scout skills during a mock disaster, and learn some of the skills required for fire and forestry. The success of the drill with this one troop resulted in a number of calls from other troops wanting to participate in 2004.

Equipment Upgrades

The most exciting news for 2003 is by far the delivery of the Town's new Pumper, but before we get to that there were a number of other upgrades and additions, so here is the short version of a very exciting year. In 2003 we put into service two other vehicles. First was the

Heavy Rescue 32R1, purchased in 2002 from the Milford, PA Fire Department at a cost of \$10,000.00 Comparable vehicles ranged in price from \$25,000 to \$50,000 and, even at those prices, were either in worse condition or less equipped than Sullivan's new Rescue. The new 32R1 entered service in January. This vehicle carries our heavy rescue equipment, ice rescue equipment, Hazardous Materials equipment, extra SCBA equipment, lighting and additional EMS equipment. The walk-in body style can be used for fire ground operations or just a place where personnel or victims can get out of the elements. 6 to 8 adults wearing turnout gear or the entire first & second grades at the Sullivan School will fit in the back of the Rescue.

The second vehicle, a 1994 Jeep Cherokee was purchased and maintained in 2003 through a portion of funds donated to the department and serves as our EMS Squad; 32S1. This vehicle carries the majority of our medical equipment. Since entering service as a quick-response vehicle, we have seen an average decrease of three minutes in our response times to EMS calls.

Purchased upgrades include a new pediatric backboard, blood pressure kits, 2 mobile radios and various EMS supply items.

In December 2002, I received a gift of \$9,000.00 in memory of one of residents to be used for new equipment. At the request of the family, the largest portion of these funds (5,800.00) was to purchase and maintain the Squad in 2003. Other items acquired through the remaining funds include a new Sager Traction Splint system (\$230.00), a new base radio and siren controller (1,700.0), additional EMS supplies (300.00), hand tools and large diameter hose for use with the dump valve on the new Pumper (\$400.00), a short backboard and straps (\$72.00), and a new basket stretcher (\$465.00).

Last year the members of the Fire Company raised funds at the Pumpkin Festival and donated these to the town in the form of four new fire pagers. My thanks to all who participated and especially, to the families of the members who again this year gave us so much help.

Through the Sullivan Office of Emergency Management we applied for and will be receiving funds in 2004 from the 2003 Homeland Security Grant I & II, totaling \$3562.00. These funds are in the form of a straight reimbursement for the purchase of new equipment (in 2003) that increases the capabilities of the department. Only equipment from the "Authorized Equipment List" could be purchased and the funds could not be used to replace old equipment. Working with the Department of Safety, we were able to combine both grants for the purchase of a Hurst Air Bag Lifting System for use in rescue situations.

In addition the following projects were completed. The Dry Hydrant at Hill Top Campground was installed with the help from a number of people. I would like to thank Roger Sweet from the Conservation Committee who was instrumental in helping us obtain the necessary permits; Randy Smith and Paul Yawarski from the Highway Department who provided use of the town's backhoe and labor; and department members Mike Blanchard and Scott Lake who headed up the project and provided the remaining manpower at the time of the installation. I would also like to thank Charlie Toutant, owner of Hill Top for allowing us to install the hydrant in his pond.

The Dry Hydrant located at the bridge at Centre Street and Route 9 was also upgraded with fittings that match the new Pumper.

A rack for our folding tank was purchased from Emergency Vehicles of Main and installed on our Tanker. This rack allows personnel easier and safer access to the tank which is used large water supply operations.

Now for the big news: With the support and encouragement of the residents of Sullivan, on November 14, the town took delivery of the new Pumper bringing to conclusion a four-year project. Prior to the 2003 Town Meeting, a truck committee was formed to develop vehicle specifications, funding strategies and worked with no less than 9 manufactures. Over 26 sets of design specifications were developed with these manufactures in order to meet our initial goal of designing a truck that would not only be functional for many years to come, but would also provide for Fire Fighter safety, and include 8 new SCBAs with spare bottles; all at a price (yearly payments) that were equal to or less than our yearly deposit to the vehicle capital reserve. To accomplish these goals we chose Emergency Vehicles of Maine (EVM) as our manufacturer and Firematic to supply the SCBAs. At the 2003 Town Meeting voters approved the purchase of the truck only to have the vote nullified by the State DRA because the Warrant Article was not properly placed on the Warrant. A Special Town Meeting was then held where the article was again approved by the town. That is when the real work began. A number of marathon sessions were held with EVM to finalize the specifications. These included writing the details of items as minor as taillights to major items such as the pump, body and truck chassis. All had to be included in the specs. Many long hours, reams of paper, pots of coffee, phone calls, headaches and aspirin were consumed between March and the delivery in November. Let me be the first to say that it was all worth it. This new truck is indeed a remarkable state-of-the-art piece of equipment with many integrated systems and features not available from other manufactures. Some of these include compartments for the ladders and suction hoses that make them accessible by personnel at shoulder height, eliminating the need to climb or reach up on the truck for these items. Another is the integrated foam system that supplies Class "A" foam directly to the hose lines which effectively doubles the capacity of the 1250-gallon water supply. Upon delivery, the membership was required by EVM to train on the new truck with EVM as a condition of delivery. The new 32M1 entered service on November 29th. Throughout the process many residents and department members participated in all phases of the truck's acquisition devoting many long hours to the cause, but as with any committee, there is usually just one "point man" for each project. For the truck committee, this was Scott Lake, our Deputy Chief. Scott brought to this project a devotion to the goals and the commitment of time that was truly above and beyond. He was on the phone almost daily with EVM, Firematic, the finance companies, and who knows whom else. While at the same time, He completed his EMT Certification and participated in other department activities. Did I mention Scott also has a home life? I know undoubtedly that this type of dedication and commitment can be tough on the individual as well as family members. So speaking for the Town of Sullivan, the members of the Sullivan Fire and Rescue Department and myself, I would like to extend our sincere thanks and appreciation to Scott, Susan, Ryan and Nick for all you have contributed to the Town of Sullivan.

Major Equipment Issues

As reported in the 2002 Town Report, there were four major equipment issues facing the department; replacement of the Rescue, pagers, SCBAs and the Pumper. In 2003 three of these challenges were met with the purchase of the Rescue in 2002, and the purchase of the Pumper and SCBAs in 2003, leaving only the pagers which we would like to address this year.

At this 2004 Town meeting we will be asking you to consider a Warrant Article for \$7,000.00 for the purchase of new fire pagers and portable radios. This is one request we have put off as long as possible allowing us to address more critical issues such as the Pumper and SCBAs. Fire pagers are the critical link between your call for help and response from the department. Over the past year many members have missed calls and critical announcements because their pager failed to operate. To date, we have maintained these pagers, some dating back to the late seventies or early eighties, by the use of spare parts from pagers donated to us from other departments. We are at the point now where we are no longer able to have them repaired as they are obsolete, parts are no longer available, and we have exhausted our supply of used parts. At this time we have members who either do not have a pager or have one that works intermittently. The department has tried to address this issue with the donation of four new pagers this year, purchased through fundraising activities. Unfortunately our old pagers are failing at a rate faster than we can replace them through current endeavors. So again this year, we ask for your continued support in helping us address this challenge. The approval of this Warrant Article will allow us to purchase 15 new pagers and 4 portable radios, also in need of replacement. While approval of this article will not give everyone on the roster a new pager, we feel it will be sufficient for the near future. Beyond this, we will continue with our fundraising efforts to acquire additional pagers and make use of the remaining "working" pagers where the need is not as critical.

In closing I would like to thank the members and their families, the Selectmen and town departments, former Selectmen Doug Washburn, and, as always, our residents for you support. The year 2003 was indeed an incredible year for the Town of Sullivan and the Sullivan Fire and Rescue. Together, we have significantly improved the condition and capacity of YOUR Fire Department.

Forest Fire Service

2003 was a quiet year for the Forestry Department, with no fires and not much else to report. A wet spring and summer kept fire conditions in the Low to Moderate range.

The Wardens again ask for your understanding when it comes to out door burning. A copy of the Fire Permit Rules is available from the Wardens, at the Town Hall and at the Sullivan Country Store. We ask that if at all possible please burn your brush piles this winter during snow conditions.

Fire permits ARE required for all open burning when the ground is not covered with snow. This includes campfires, cooking fires, outdoor fireplaces and the burning of brush. The Department of Air Resources rules state that only untreated wood may be burned in brush piles. A special commercial permit must be obtained in order to burn treated materials such as those from a demolished building.

Reminder: All permits expired on January 1, 2004, and must be renewed.

New Hampshire law now prohibits backyard trash burning. RSA 125-N:4 took effect July 16, 2001, and as of January 1, 2003 is now enforced by the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) with assistance by the Wardens. This State law prohibits the burning of combustible domestic waste in burn barrels or in brush piles. If you have any questions about backyard trash burning please feel free to call me, or the DES at 271-2975 (Public Information Office), or 800-498-6868 (Air Resources Division).

In 2003 we applied for and were awarded \$1,500.00 from the FY2004 Volunteer Fire Assistance program. This type of grant is for matching funds for the purpose of purchasing a high-pressure portable forestry pump. \$1,500.00 would come from the grant to be matched with \$1,900.00 from Town funds. The cost of the pump is approximately \$3,400.00. This year we will be asking you to consider a Warrant article for \$2,500.00 for the purpose of purchasing this pump and for the purchase of additional personal protective clothing and equipment for the forestry department. This portable pump will give us the capability of supplying water in remote areas where the trucks are unable to go.

The Warden and Deputy Wardens would like to thank you for being careful with out door fires. You have helped to make a difference in our community. *THANKS*

Highway Department Report

JANUARY

This was one of the busiest winter months since Paul and I began working for the Highway Department. From January 1st through January 10th ice or snow arrived daily with an 18" snowstorm on January 3rd and 4th. The cold weather and gusty winds made for daily winging of snowdrifts.

I met with committees, boards, and the NHDOT six different times regarding curb cuts for a subdivision on Apple Hill Road.

Between the storms and meetings we kept busy by performing maintenance on equipment in order to be ready for the next storm.

FEBRUARY

There were ten occurrences of either freezing rain or snow during February; wind and drifting snow continued. D&E Tree Service was contracted to remove dead trees in between the winter storms on Gilsum and Church Streets along with South and Boynton Roads.

MARCH

There were only five ice or snowstorms during March and a delivery of 120 tons of road sand restored our depleting stock. D&E Tree Service was once again contracted to remove dead trees on Hubbard, South, and Rugg Roads. A delivery of 200 tons of 1 ½" stone prepared us for mud season and town roads were posted for weight restriction on the 17th. The John Deere backhoe received its' 1000 hour service from Nortrax Equipment Company (it was just one year ago this

month that negotiations for the backhoe purchase began).

APRIL

The month began with three small storms. We began grading and raking gravel roads on the 14th and pine siding was added to the sander hanger. Town buildings, the common, and the monument were tidied from snow plowing debris. Maintenance was performed on the sanders and they were put away for the season.

MAY

The paved roads were swept and the weight limit restriction on town roads was lifted on May 5th. Gravel roads were graded and raked and waterways were cleaned; potholes were filled on paved roads and a short section of pavement on Apple Hill was repaired. Gravel was purchased from the Cohen pit in Marlow; 677 cubic yards were hauled to town roads and the remainder was stockpiled at the garage.

Remnants from the Town clean-up day were taken to the Keene transfer station and Tire Warehouse.

The 2000 Ford F550 received a new coat of paint on its dump body and tire rims.

The process of obtaining a wetland permit for culvert replacement began and I attended a bridge seminar in New London.

JUNE

An additional 435 cubic yards of gravel was purchased and applied to gravel roads and the final grading, raking and addition of chloride to gravel roads was completed. Ditches were cleaned on Gilsum Road at Paquette Hill and bridges on Valley and Old Concord Roads were washed.

I met with a Department of Environmental Service (DES) inspector and Roger Sweet to discuss improvements to be made to Valley Road.

Hard-pack (290 tons) was applied to phase I of Valley Road to provide a wear surface in order to keep dust to a minimum and impede the return of potholes. Hay bales used for erosion control were replaced with 1 ½" stone as recommended by the DES.

JULY

Maintenance work to equipment was performed and a woodshed was constructed. Plow frames and wings were painted and put away.

More ditches on Gilsum Road were cleaned at Cannon Hill and an existing culvert was discovered and found to be full of gravel. The culvert was flushed; this will help to reduce the erosion problem on that section of road.

Corners and intersections were mowed to improve visibility and potholes on paved roads were filled.

AUGUST

The month of August brought numerous tropical rainstorms which caused several minor washouts that were repaired. Due to the clean and properly working waterways and culverts we did not endure the damage and loss of road as did Chesterfield and Westmoreland.

Phase II of the Valley Road project began; two short sections were dug up and rebuilt and I met with a PSNH representative to inquire about relocating utility poles. G&S Tree Service was contracted to remove dead trees on Cross, Bowlder, Ellis, and Valley Roads.

Two culverts that caused troubled during the winter months were replaced on Gilsum Road.

SEPTEMBER

Despite the continued rain, we began building footing forms for a 5-foot culvert head wall which would be used to replace a culvert on Valley Road at Meetinghouse Brook.

In preparation of the approaching winter months, 1400 cubic yards of road sand was purchased, hauled to the highway garage and covered with plastic.

OCTOBER

The work on Valley Road continued. Culvert headwalls were formed and poured at Meetinghouse Brook and the graveling and shoulder work were completed.

A total of 800 cubic yards of bank-run gravel, 364 cubic yards of stone tailings, 133 cubic yards of 1 ½" crushed stone, 2444 cubic yards of 1 ½" crushed gravel, and 220.97 tons of hard-pack were used in the phase II rebuilding of Valley Road. We finished the project on October 22nd; on October 23nd we received 2" of snow.

A failed culvert on Cross Road was replaced and potholes on gravel roads were filled with hard-pack.

We began filling the woodshed at the highway garage; it holds approximately 14 cords. The vehicles and sanders were readied for winter.

NOVEMBER

A failed culvert on Price Road was replaced and potholes on the paved roads were filled.

A boom mower was rented in order to mow the brush on roadsides. We were able to mow half of the Town roads with plans to finish the remainder in the spring of 2004.

DECEMBER

We assisted the Fire Department with the installation of a dry hydrant on South Road.

The snowplows received their first use of the season on December 2nd. On December 7th 19 inches of snow arrived which melted away by December 11th due to warm heavy rain. Once again on December 15th, 12 inches of snow arrived only to melt from the rain received December 17th.

This is a summary of work performed during 2003 by your local Highway Department. Paul Yawarski and I make every effort to improve our town roads. I would once again like to express my appreciation for the 2002 purchase of the John Deere backhoe; it has truly made a difference in our abilities to maintain the roads.

As always, sand is available for your walkways and driveways at the highway garage.

The library remains a member of the Nubanusit Library Coop and its video section. Sullivan Public Library hosted the January meeting of the coop.

Thanks to donations from the community, a DVD collection has been established at the library.

Snow removal from the library walkways has been transferred from the librarian's duties. The Fire Department Explorers and the Highway Department have taken charge of this responsibility. It is very much appreciated.

Ice build-up on the roof during March, 2003 contributed to water damage in the new addition. Fortunately no materials were lost. Tim Sargent cleared the roof and Al Henry inspected the electrical switches.

Two shrubs and several plants were donated by Roger and Ann Sweet and added to the flowerbeds located out front of the library. Roger and Max Goddard repaired and repainted the library sign. Mary Parker planted the flower boxes. The Friends of the Library purchased a hose which was quite helpful in watering the flowerbeds and boxes.

The summer reading program was *Reading Rocks the Granite State*. Story-time activities focused on geology and New Hampshire history. Eighteen children participated and 239 books were read.

The Child Evangelism Fellowship held a 5-day club at the library during the summer.

The Town of Gilsum won the 5^{th} Annual Weigh-In Challenge. Gilsum residents read 495 pounds of books; Sullivan residents read 268.5 pounds of books. The ice cream social was held in Sullivan.

The library computer was unavailable part of the summer due to a computer virus.

A small fire in November was due to faulty ballast. The Sullivan Fire Department responded to the call. Repairs were made by Hamblet Electric. Recommendations to change to electronic ballasts were made. Four other faulty ballasts were found in the main area of the library; current ballasts are dated 1974.

Home Healthcare continues to hold Wellness Clinics at the library on a quarterly basis. The Library Trustees and the Friends of the Library conduct monthly meetings at the library.

The library is grateful to the community of Sullivan for the many ways in which you show your support. You make working here a pleasure.

Planning Board

Meeting monthly, the Planning Board business included acting upon five subdivision applications and beginning the process of updating the 1995 edition of the Master Plan.

Three subdivisions were approved: a two-acre lot for Kevin Wheeler from Coffin land on Boynton Road; a seven-acre building lot from Parker land on Centre Street; three building lots on Atwood/Martin land off Centre Street, with a seven-acre wetland and a corridor for a possible road gifted to the Town.

A fourth subdivision for six building lots on Primrose land on Apple Hill Road was denied. Litigation is pending.

A fifth subdivision application for five building lots on the same Apple Hill Road land was declared complete, but the merits had not yet been decided by year's end.

The Master Plan update, although not yet complete, has brought into the discussion several citizens in addition to the Planning Board members serving on the subcommittee. Their deliberations resulted in: completion of a town-wide survey (20% response) indicating strong interest in land protection and a reaffirmation of community goals outlined in earlier Master Plans; a study showing enough unencumbered land is available along Sullivan's Class V roads for 280 build-able lots; a study of land in Current Use; a proposal for the addition of a wetlands conservation district to the Community Planning Ordinance (now scheduled to be on the ballot in March); a study of development density in various areas of towns.

The Planning Board looks forward to completion of the Master Plan in 2004.

Proposed changes to the subdivision regulations will be heard in 2004.

Proposed changes to the driveway application and regulations are pending, including the requirement that local permits as well as State permits be mandatory on State roads.

There are openings for alternate members, and the Planning Board always welcomes citizen interest in its meetings on the first Wednesday of every month at 7 p.m. in the town hall.

Police Department

The Sullivan Police Department had a fairly busy year in 2003. There were 416 calls for service, 209 emails, 204 faxes, 16 accidents, and 12 cases prosecuted in court (11 by the Regional Prosecutor and one by me). All twelve cases brought convictions.

There were 232 messages left on the Police Department answering machine; I responded to all of them.

Most of the complaints involved dogs; many concerned dogs barking for long periods of time. I ask that you please take action to quiet your dog if you hear him/her barking continuously for longer than ten minutes. Please keep your animals restrained or under your control and be sure that dogs are licensed.

Other complaints were of a domestic nature. These complaints must be handled according to new legislation in the State of New Hampshire which does not allow the police officer any discretion.

Speeding on the roads in town has increased this year; most of the accidents were a result of speeding. There was less patrolling of roads due to the loss of Denis Abrams to the Town of Swanzey and the strict State requirements new applicants must meet to become a police officer. I received four applications that did not meet the requirements.

In December, Jason Yarosz was hired to fill the vacant part-time position. Jason will attend the State Academy for part-time officers during February. Upon graduation and the fulfillment of other requirements, he will be able to perform the duties of a police officer.

The absence of a part-time officer has lead to an increase in speed and stop sign violations and the assumption that DWI offenders were not caught. I am hopeful that the addition of a new officer will limit the occurrence of violations.

The Cheshire County Dispatch undertook the task of dispatching all police in Cheshire County in 2003. Their phone number is 355-2000; this number can be used to contact me at any time. I can also be reached at the Sullivan Police Station 847-3100 or at home 847-9728. As always, the Emergency number is 911.

I thank the townspeople for their assistance and support during 2003 and look forward to serving you in 2004.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Sullivan, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 2003 as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. As is the case with many municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Sullivan has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Sullivan as of December 31, 2003, and the results of its operations and the cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Sullivan taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed as schedules in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Sullivan. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.
