## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

---

To the School Board and Citizens of Warren:

I have the honor to present my fourth annual report as Superintendent of schools. The scholastic and financial years end June 30 and the statistics to which I call your attention are for the year ending June 30, 1925.

The teachers this year are as follows: Grammar, Frances White; Intermediate, Isabelle Nelson; Primary, Myrle Kinney; Glenciff, Natalie Smith; East Warren, Plymouth Normal School Cadets. The teachers are devoted to their work and good school progress is being made. At the East Warren school an arrangement has been made with the Plymouth Normal School whereby the school is taught by a senior cadet under the direction of a critic teacher who visits the school frequently. This plan has been working very well.

The enrollment last year was 117 different pupils. The attendance averaged 94.3 per cent of the membership. The average for the state for this period was 94.2. The attendance for the previous year was 91.2. The interest shown by the children in the attendance contest has been a large factor in this improvement. The contest is being conducted again this year. Five pupils completed the work of the 8th grade last June.

After the experience with the time-saving school calendar, the School Board has adopted a similar one for this year. This plan provides more frequent but not too long vacations, allowing a week at Thanksgiving, two weeks at Christmas and a week of vacation after each seven weeks of school for the remainder of the year.



The objectives of education in a democracy have been summarized by a committee of American teachers under seven headings: 1—Health, 2—Command of Fundamental Processes, 3—Worthy Home Membership, 4—Training for Vocation, 5—Citizenship, 6—Worthy Use of Leisure, 7—Ethical Character. The teachers have cooperated with the superintendent in an attempt in unifying the work of our schools in accomplishing these objectives. It is our purpose to make our educational activities a means of achieving these purposes. For each individual pupil the work of education may be considered as directed toward developing purpose and personality for the good of the pupil and the society in which he lives. Thus we may hope that our school work will result in happy serviceable lives.

The supervisory activities of the superintendent have been expended in classroom visits, follow up interviews, personal conferences and frequent school inspection.

Miss Underhill is serving as district nurse, and good results continue to come from this work. Her activities in establishing health habits have been a help to the teachers and of much benefit to the children.

A dental clinic was held last Spring. Miss Underhill gave much time to this undertaking and was a large factor in its success. The Pythian Sisters, both by their interest and assistance, did much for the clinic. They paid for the work done on 14 children. Forty-four children attended and the work done was as follows: No. teeth filled 104, No. teeth extracted 34, children having teeth cleaned 36, Treatments, 6. These clinics offer unusual opportunities and I hope another may be held in the near future.

In closing may I express my appreciation of the loyal cooperation of the teachers, the kind and understanding support of the School Board and the cooperative attitude of parents and citizens.
