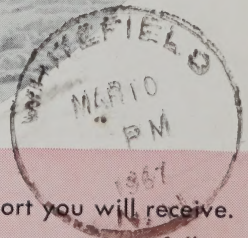



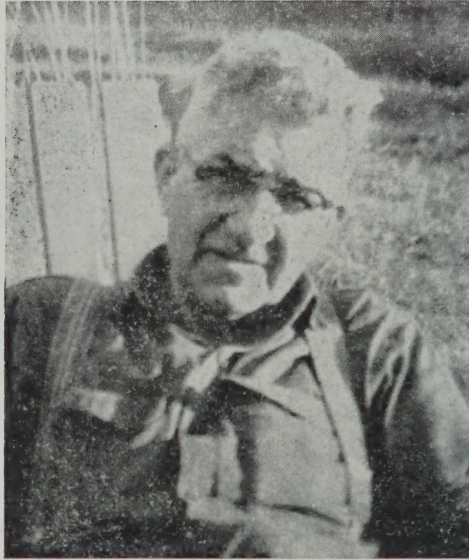

## RALPH M. DEXTER

November 22, 1897—December 15, 1966

**A devoted member of the Whitefield Highway Department 1936—1966**

### **To A Fellow Citizen—A Tribute:**

From the Halls of Congress, from those of Concord, and finally to the Town Hall at Whitefield—many and different are the contributions that make American Government function. Oft forgotten, yet most important of these, is the silent service, day after day, year in and year out, of the dedicated public employee. Ralph M. Dexter of Whitefield, New Hampshire, was such a man. From 1936, when he was engaged to drive the Town's first, real highway truck, to his sudden passing in December of last year, "Dek" as he was popularly known, served the residents of our North Country community faithfully and well.

During the three decades that "Dek" was on the job, he saw his Department, consisting of himself and the "old" truck evolve into the expanded, mechanized, and back-saving today of the grader, payloader, and four-wheel drive vehicle. In winter, over those three decades, "Dek" saw the plow, sander, and salt replace the snow roller and snow shovel—indeed, how many generations of school children have ridden safely to their appointment with education behind "Dek" and his plow on how many frosty mornings!

It is thus a privilege to dedicate the 1966 Whitefield Town Report to the memory of Ralph M. Dexter, in appreciation of his long service to this Town and its Citizens.

## To Our Fellow Citizens—A Report:

Your Board of Selectmen, Town Officials, and Trustees take pleasure in submitting to you this report on the affairs and financial condition of the Town of Whitefield for the year ended December 31, 1966, along with the Warrant for your action at Town Meeting.

The twelve months of 1966 were extremely busy ones at Town Hall. Much that accounted for the conferences, planning, and traveling by your Town Officers, now appears as articles in the Town Warrant. As in the past we shall reserve discussion of these items until Town Meeting as doing so here could fill many pages. Our sole comment on the Warrant at this time, and we believe the same will be evident to you, is that no community today, however small, is an island unto itself! The greater part of our activities at Town Hall are the result of federal and state legislation, events which though far removed from Whitefield by distance, nevertheless affect our daily life.

Among what we are pleased to number as accomplishments for the year, was a long term lease with the Maine Central Railroad on a large gravel deposit, adjoining the Whitefield Regional Airport. As demands for such material for road building and general construction continue to grow, known existing deposits are disappearing rapidly. This lease, on advantageous terms, should assure the Town an adequate supply of both sand and gravel for many years to come.

With the last Western Union telegraph pole relocated, the Whitefield Regional Airport's new runway stood complete in September. The dedication ceremony on July 20th represented the culmination of the generous gift of property by the late Frank S. Dodge, twenty years of devoted and unflagging en-

thusiasm by the Whitefield Airport Commission, and almost three years of design, engineering, and construction. In addition to that of Frank S. Dodge, the names of Harold Keir, Randall Spalding, Ada Taylor, Captain Roger Crowley, George Benjamin, and Doug Woods, among others, will long be remembered whenever mention is made of the "North Country's gateway to the world," as Governor John King referred to our airport in his address of dedication.

Executive Airlines scheduling three direct flights daily from Boston, May through October, made Governor King's statement a reality. Those who have had an opportunity to visit Boston's Logan International Airport and view the sign reading "Whitefield, N.H." high on the board with those of New York, Los Angeles, Rome, Paris, London, etc., were mighty pleased! President Whitney of Executive Airlines plans to resume direct service again to Whitefield early in the spring and there appear to be possibilities of even further extension of service.

Current shortages of copper and federal funds may make it necessary to defer Phase Two—beacons and runway lighting, of the Airport Project. Though Aeronautics Director Crowley, the Airport Commission, and your Board of Selectmen have filed representations against this delay, we recognize the problem of Viet Nam must come first.

Encouraging news concerning the Airport has been the rapidly growing interest in our new Industrial Park located adjacent to the old runway. Long term land leases have already been made with the National Forest Service and Shirley and Dick Mahn's White Mountain Air Service, with respective buildings now erected. The Forest Service building is to be an air tanker base and the Mahn's, a sales and storage hangar for aircraft. Recently, negotiations were completed with Miles Pond Wood Products, Inc., a subsidiary



of the famed S. Bent and Brothers, chair manufacturer, of Gardner, Mass., to lease one site and option others for a square stock mill to be erected this spring. If other inquiries, which we are receiving with frequency, are any indication, the Whitefield Regional Airport may well become one of the most valuable pieces of real estate in the North Country.

It might be said that 1966 was a "dedicated year" in Whitefield for in addition to the Airport Program, the Nuroco Woodwork Company of Norwalk, Conn., which purchased the Whitefield Industrial Corporation's building last year, held a gala Dedication-Open House in September. Nuroco, now in full production, has proven a great asset to the community's economy and a fine endorsement of its industrial climate.

Planning and building, the backbone of progress, goes forward in Whitefield. Our new Regional High School is now seventy percent complete. Last month, after a year of meetings, data collection, and the filing of applications, your Selectmen were successful in obtaining a \$14,000.00 engineering advance from the Department of Housing and Urban Development. This is to cover plans for a new sewage system, in compliance with federal and state statutes prohibiting the pollution of the Johns River. Also in the discussion stage is a comprehensive land plan for Whitefield, in which we would be joined by Lancaster, Northumberland and, possibly, North Stratford. The establishment of local Planning Boards and the preparation of an over-all community plan are being increasingly required by the U.S. Government for participation in federal funds.

About the Square . . . we hope you have noticed our new waste containers, the generous gift to the Town by the Mt. Washington Grange; additional spruce trees, the gift of Mrs. Walter Bradley; and the new lilac bushes, presented by Mrs. R. E. Spalding. On

the Common, the old cement benches were replaced by new lighter, portable ones. We hope they don't prove too portable!

On the highways and byways, Road Agent Fred Hill and his crew continue to grade, straighten and improve. The new equipment, purchased and leased, has enabled your Highway Department to operate more efficiently and economically. In particular, it has permitted an increasingly greater return on oiling and TRA operations.

No summary municipal report would be complete without some mention of taxes—the lifeblood of government. Detailed planning by your Selectmen and the cooperation by the Town's operating departments made possible \$17.00/thousand of valuation to \$15.30. The County Commissioners also favored us with a 23.8% decrease in the County levy, from \$2.60/thousand of valuation to \$2.10. However, an unanticipated 50% jump in the Regional School appropriation, from \$18.40/thousand of valuation to \$27.60, wiped out the Town and County credits for an over-all tax increase of 18.4%.

The inability of the Legislature to implement the school building aid formula, a disappointing drop in Sweepstakes revenue, and other causes and effects which would fill volumes, have been advanced as explanations of our mounting school costs. These have no place in discussion here. One fact, however, should be clear to all—local property tax revenues were never intended to carry the high and ever increasing cost of education as demanded by the modern world. Sometime and somehow, we, the people of New Hampshire, must face the fact that the present means of financing education are inadequate and that others must be found—your Selectmen hope it will be soon!

With a final expression of appreciation to our co-

workers in all the departments of the Town for their cooperation and, particularly, to our fellow citizens, without whose encouragement and support this report of a prosperous and progressive Whitefield would not be a reality, we are . . .

**STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**  
**TOWN WARRANT**

---

To the inhabitants of the Town of Whitefield in the County of Coos and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs. You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday the fourteenth day of March next, at two o'clock in the afternoon to act on the following subjects. The polls shall open for voting at nine o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before six o'clock in the afternoon.

1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman to serve for a period of three years, a Town Treasurer, Highway Agent, two Library Trustees, one Trust Fund Trustee to serve for three years, and all other necessary Town Officers.

2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for:

- a. General Government
  - 1. Town Officers' Salaries
  - 2. Town Officers' Expenses
  - 3. Election and Registration Expenses
  - 4. Municipal Court Expenses
  - 5. Expenses Town Hall and Other Town Buildings
- b. Protection of Persons and Property
  - 1. Police Department

  - 3. Moth Extermination, Blister Rust, Care of Trees
  - 4. Insurance
- c. Health
  - 1. Precinct Water and Hydrants

  2. Town Road Maintenance
  3. Street Lighting
  4. General Expenses of Highway Department

3. To see if the Town will vote to grant to the Women's Study Club, American Legion, Lions Club, Morrison Hospital Auxiliary, Mount Washington Grange, Rotary Club, Chamber of Commerce and all church organizations for public purposes, the free use of the Town Hall.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money by temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through tax collector's deeds, or otherwise, until rescinded.

6. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote under Article Six of the Annual Meeting of March 13, 1962 to, "Authorize the Selectmen to take down the old brick factory office building and to salvage any material of value."

7. If foregoing Article 6 is voted in the affirmative, to see if the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen to negotiate with Nuroco Woodwork, Inc. the sale of both the "old brick office building" and the former "Mellin Quincy paint shed" located across the road therefrom, both being on the west bank of the Johns River, and such concomitant real estate and other interest as the Town may have in said land and buildings.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding Twenty Thousand dollars (\$20,000.) for the planning and construction of a Town Highway Garage for the protection and service of the Town's highway equipment, with said sum being less any amounts realized from the sale of land and buildings under foregoing Article 7. Further, to

authorize the Selectmen to borrow for this purpose said sum not in excess of Twenty Thousand dollars (\$20,000.) and amortized at not less than ten (10) years in accordance with RSA Chapter 33 and Amendment thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Seventy-five Hundred dollars (\$7,500.) for the purchase of a new heavy-duty truck, 2½ to 3 ton capacity, with said sum less amount realized from the sale or trade of the Town's 1959 Mack truck. Further, to authorize the Selectmen to borrow for this purpose a sum not to exceed Seventy-five Hundred dollars (\$7,500.) to be amortized at not less than three (3) years in accordance with RSA Chapter 33 and Amendment thereto.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Fifteen Hundred dollars (\$1,500.) for the purchase of a new Police Cruiser, said sum representing the difference between bid price and sale or trade value of the present cruiser.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of Four Thousand dollars (\$4,000.) to purchase a Galion Grader, which amount represents the balance on a bid purchase price of Fifty-five Hundred dollars (\$5,500.) as a \$1,500. rental charge already paid will be credited to the purchase. Further, to authorize the Selectmen to borrow for this purpose Four Thousand dollars (\$4,000.) to be amortized at not less than three (3) years in accordance with RSA Chapter 33 and Amendment thereto.

12. To see if the Town will vote to re-open the Town Road from the Whitefield Regional Airport to State Route 115 in Jefferson to expedite the continued leasing of industrial sites at the Whitefield Regional Airport. The re-building of the Town's approximately

7,000 feet of roadway to be contingent upon the Town of Jefferson's affirmative vote to re-open approximately 3,000 feet of roadway from Route 115 to the Whitefield town line. Further, to authorize the Selectmen to borrow for this purpose a sum not to exceed Seven Thousand dollars (\$7,000.) to be amortized at not less than ten (10) years in accordance with RSA Chapter 33 and Amendment thereto.

13. To see if the Town will vote to empower the Selectmen to negotiate Industrial Land Leases at the Whitefield Regional Airport Industrial Park with the advice and approval of the Whitefield Regional Airport Commission and consistent with Federal and State Agency regulations and, further, to ratify such existing leases as have been consummated. Proceeds from said leases to be paid over to the Whitefield Regional Airport Commission for maintenance and future improvements to the airport.

14. To see if the Town will enact an ordinance regulating and restricting the height of structures and objects of natural growth, and otherwise regulating the use of the property in the vicinity of the Whitefield Regional Airport by creating airport approach zones and other restricted areas and establishing boundaries thereof; defining certain terms used therein; and providing for reinforcement; establishing a Board of Appeals; and imposing penalties; in pursuance of authority conferred by Chapter 424 RSA.

15. To see what action the Town will take in regard to winter maintenance without charge of Church, Industrial, Hospital, and Post Office driveways and parking areas.

16. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Planning Board of five members with duties as set forth in Sections 1-15 Chapter 36, RSA 1955, to make



a study of the Town's development and report to the Town appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the Town's best development. The Board shall consist of one Selectman and four other citizens appointed by the Selectmen, as provided in Chapter 36, N.H. RSA 1955.

17. If foregoing Article 16 is voted in the affirmative, to see if the Town will vote to participate in the Federal and State Urban Planning Assistance Program (701 Program) and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Twenty-two Hundred and Eighty-five dollars (\$2,285.) as the Town's one-quarter share of total costs. (Note: This amount is predicated upon the action of the towns of Lancaster and Northumberland, and possibly North Stratford, in participating with Whitefield in the program and engaging the same Planning-Consulting Firm.)

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate an estimated sum of Two Thousand dollars (\$2,000.) for a basic domestic water supply at the Whitefield Regional Airport Industrial Park. (Note: It is anticipated that costs will be self-liquidating as two customers are waiting to contract for the service.)

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate funds at the rate of One dollar (\$1.00) per resident based on the 1960 census, said amount totaling Fifteen Hundred and Eighty-one dollars (\$1,581.), as Whitefield's contribution toward present service and future development of the non-profit White Mountain Community Services Program. (Note: This mental health service, based in Littleton, is already serving the community on a free basis and will request an annual appropriation.)

20. To see if the Town will vote to create a Capital Reserve Fund, so-called, under authority and provisions of RSA Chapter 35:3 for the purpose of pur-

chasing items of capital equipment and to transfer to such fund One dollar and such surplus and uncommitted funds as may appear on the books of the Town at the end of its fiscal year, December 31. (Note: This fund will be administered by the Trustees of Trust Funds with money transferred to it and appropriations made from it only by vote of the Town at any regular given annual meeting of the Town.)

21. To see if the Town will vote to provide for all full-time employees, Group Life Insurance, Accident and Sickness Insurance, Medical, Surgical and Hospital Benefits as provided by the New Hampshire Municipal Association, and to raise for such purpose, annually, the sum of One Thousand Six Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$1,650.) and such additional amounts for such purpose that may be necessary from year to year to provide these benefits.

22. To see if the town will vote to have all dog owners restrain their dogs from running at large, and affix a penalty not exceeding Ten Dollars (\$10.00) for a breach thereof, under RSA 466:39. (By Petition)

23. To transact any other business that may lawfully come before said meeting.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Whitefield for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1966, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

***Scope of Audit***

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Library Treasurer, Municipal Court, Trustees of Trust Funds, Cemetery Association and Regional Airport.

***Financial Statements***

***Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1965 —  
December 31, 1966: (Exhibit A-1)***

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1965 and December 31, 1966, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Surplus increased by \$6,122.94 in 1966.

***Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit  
A-2)***

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

***Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)***

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1966, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$3,479.03, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$3,087.35, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$391.68.

***Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)***

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1966, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1966, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

***Municipal Court: (Exhibit E)***

A statement of the accounts of the Municipal Court for the fiscal year is included in Exhibit E.

***Regional Airport: (Exhibit I)***

A statement of the activity in the accounts of the Regional Airport during the fiscal year ended December 31, 1966, is presented in Exhibit I.

***Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit J)***

A statement of outstanding long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1966, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit J.

***Audit Procedure***

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

***General Comments******Current Surplus***

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased by \$197.46, from \$26,049.40 to \$25,851.94 in 1966, as shown herewith:

***Trust Funds:***

If the annual report of the Trustees of Trust Funds was completed prior to the date of audit, much time could be saved when the auditors are engaged in their work with a resulting saving to the Town in expense incident to the audit.

***Uncollected and Unredeemed Taxes:***

It is noted that there were uncollected taxes on the warrants of 1963 and prior years as follows:

It is again recommended that the Tax Collector and Board of Selectmen examine these uncollected lists, and that such taxes thereon as appear to be uncollectible be abated by the Board.

The inclusion of uncollectible taxes on these prior years' warrants annually in the Balance Sheets tends to distort the true picture of the Town's financial condition.

The Tax Collector should also deed to the Town all properties represented by unredeemed tax liens from tax sales on account of the levies of 1963 and prior years, the two year redemption period having expired on all of such unredeemed taxes.

***Airport Commission:***

It is recommended that one cash book be maintained for the Regional Airport account and that all receipts and disbursements be entered therein.

***Conclusion:***

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955 require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Whitefield for their assistance during the course of the audit.

### ***MORRISON HOSPITAL ASSOCIATION***

Already certified as a participating hospital under Medicare, Morrison Hospital hopes shortly to be certified as an Extended Care Facility, the second segment of the Health Insurance for the Aged Program which began January 1, 1967. The standards as set forth by the Social Security Administration are rigid in both categories with the result that the Morrison Hospital Association has had to make numerous changes in its methods of operation and its physical plant. These changes, difficult as they may be, are designed to improve patient care which is the goal your community hospital constantly tries to achieve.

During the first part of 1966, Morrison Hospital again found itself without the services of two full-time physicians, and it is here that a great deal of gratitude must be expressed to Dr. Jorge A. deVillafane who carried on alone from early in January until Dr. M. E. Becker Jr. joined the staff the middle of July. As a result, hospital census and gross earnings from service showed a drop from the previous record year, but the excess of expense over income was almost completely reduced by other revenue such as contributions, grants and income from investments and trust funds. And, once again, summer residents of Whitefield, guests of The Mountain View House and various charitable trust agencies donated generously in an amount close to \$13,000 during the 1966 hospital fund-raising campaign.



Most noticeable alteration to the physical plant was the construction of a new fire-proof stairway at the West end of the hospital building. This new exit addition meets the prescribed standards for Medicare and also provides added protection for patients and staff personnel in case of emergency. Among newly-acquired equipment is a photo-copying machine purchased by the Women's Auxiliary which, during the course of the year, also helped pay for a new medications dispensary, bought a new refrigerator for the kitchen, replenished the hospital linen supply and installed new bedside lamps in the majority of patient rooms.

What lies ahead looks promising; but not without difficulties. However, with the continued support, advice and cooperation of the Board of Trustees, hospital staff, government and state agencies, and, most of all, the people it serves, Morrison Hospital can expect to grow with change in the interest of community health.

**POLICE DEPARTMENT**

To The Board of Selectmen:

I hereby submit my annual report for the year 1966.

This is my tenth year as your Chief of Police and I would like to express my sincere appreciation to all the Selectmen under whom I have served, the officers who have worked with me and demonstrated unequalled loyalty, and to the citizens and summer residents of our town, who have given their cooperation at all times.

We mention, with pardonable pride, the fact that in the past ten years there has been no fatality in our town as the result of a motor vehicle accident. The many licenses we have recommended for suspension to the Motor Vehicle Department, the arrests we have had to make, and the many warnings we have given out each year, have all helped to keep this unblemished record which we hope to preserve.

During 1966 a total of 207 cases were brought before the Whitefield Municipal Court. Of these, 173 were brought by Whitefield police officers; the remainder by state police and conservation officers. The Whitefield Police Department cases were as follows:

- 80 Motor vehicle violations. (Speeding, yellow line violations, etc.)
- 53 Minors in possession of alcoholic beverages. (This is a record number and does not include offenders under 17 years of age, of which there were many, who were not brought before the court because of their age).
- 9 Driving while under the influence of liquor.
- 9 Drunk and disorderly.
- 5 Giving beer to minors.

- 9 Brawl and tumults (Fighting).
- 2 Resisting arrest.
- 1 Taking car without consent of owner.
- 2 Bound over to Superior Court.

In the interests of all the residents of Whitefield, we would like to urge the dog owners to demonstrate a sense of responsibility in curtailing the freedom of their animals, whose activities in many instances are a safety hazard to others. New Hampshire law requires that all dogs be licensed by May 1st of each year, regardless of whether or not they leave the owner's property. Failure to comply with this law carries a penalty of \$15.00 and, however reluctantly, we will be obliged to enforce the statute if dog owners fail to license their animals with the Town Clerk.

The Motor Vehicle Junk Yard Law, which went into effect on July 8, 1965, defines a junk yard as a place of storage for two or more vehicles no longer intended for legal use on the highways or no longer in condition for legal use on the highways, and/or, it is a place of storage for parts or material equal to two or more vehicles.

Your Police Department contacted a number of persons in violation of this law, not all of whom complied with the notice. It will be necessary this year to prosecute violators who refuse to comply. New Hampshire R.S.A. 372:1 carries a maximum fine of \$10.00 for each 24-hour period one is in violation of this law. The intent of this law is to keep our towns and cities free of the blight of the junk car and it would seem to us that personal, as well as civic, pride should be sufficient to inspire people to police their own properties.

### **WELFARE DEPARTMENT**

We are pleased to report a budget surplus for the year ending December 31, 1966.

During 1966 we recovered a portion of our outlay to the amount of \$327.78. For this reason and because of the excellent cooperation from the state and county officials we were able to keep our welfare costs to a minimum, in spite of the fact that we were obliged to transfer a sum to Veterans' Aid because of heavy demands on that area of aid to the needy.

Surplus Food, which is distributed at the Police Station on the third Tuesday of each month to eligible recipients, was dispersed during 1966 to 35 families, comprising 123 individuals:

In 1966, 193 visits were made in the community, and they are classified as follows:

Three children attended Crippled Children's Clinics, and six children attended the Pediatric Cardiology Clinics.

At the Spring clinics, 504 immunizations were administered.

In the Heaf testing program for the detection of tuberculosis, 193 individuals participated.

There is a crucial need at this time, for communities to develop an over-all plan that will insure continuity of nursing service from the hospital to the home, or from the home to the hospital.

Nursing is one of the essential services in any community health plan or program.

The citizens in any community or area, have a direct responsibility, therefore, to make sure that needed continued nursing care is provided for men, women and children as they move to any place where care may be given.

Each community needs to develop or improve a community centered or area centered plan, which will enable its citizens to have better and more complete nursing care available to them and their families when needed.

How many of your citizens who should be receiving benefits from the Medicare Program are unable to do so because you do not have a community centered or area centered plan to meet their needs?

Now, is the time for action by all citizens of your community.

It is always a pleasure to serve the Citizens of Whitefield, and I extend my gratitude to them for their cooperation during the past year.

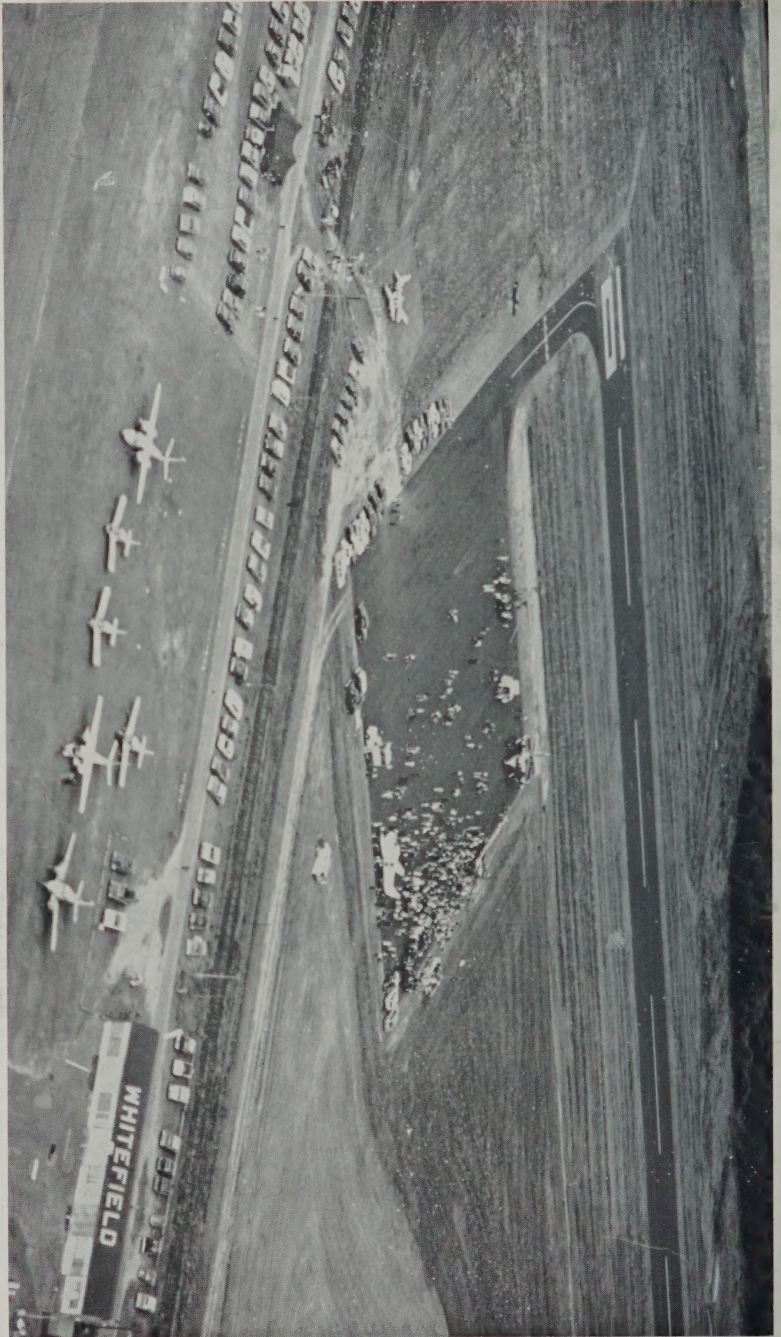
