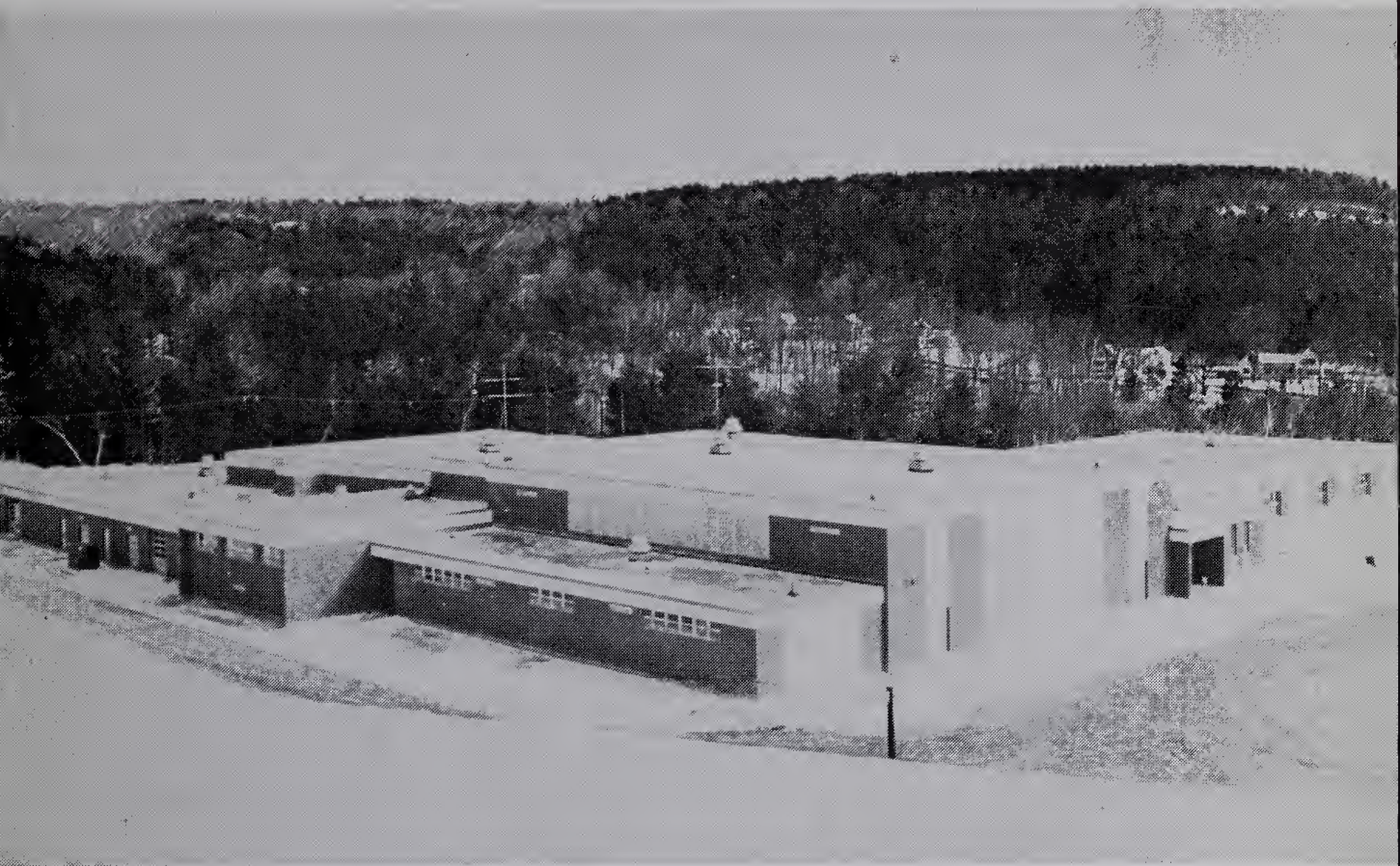

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WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wilton in the County of Hillsborough and State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to appear at the Town Hall in said Wilton on Tuesday, the 7th day of March A. D., 1972, at 10:00 A. M. to choose all necessary town officers and to vote on proposed amendments as to the Town Zoning Ordinance and Zoning Map (polls will not close before 6:00 P. M.) and at 6:30 P. M. on the same day at the Wilton School District Auditorium adjoining Whiting Park to act upon the following subjects:

1. To hear the reports of Town Officers, Agents, and Committees and to pass any vote relating thereto.
2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
3. To see what action the Town will take in regard to real estate taken over by the Town for non-payment of taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as prepared by the Budget Committee or make any alterations relating thereto.
5. To see if the Town will authorize the Tax Collector to appoint a deputy or deputies, under the provisions of Chapter 41, Section 38, of the Revised Statutes Annotated of New Hampshire, or take any action relating thereto.

6. To see if the Town will vote to close, subject to gates and bars, that portion of the town road known as "Bennington Battle Trail" from the point where it presently ends just to the west of the driveway to Mid Hill Farm, so-called, (the old Nettie West Place), westerly along the northerly boundaries of Town Lots #112-A and #111, and along the southerly boundaries of Town Lots #114 and #87, to the southeasterly corner of Town Lot #85, and to discontinue that portion of said "Bennington Battle Trail" from said latter point northwesterly and westerly to the southeasterly corner of Town Lot #83, or take any other action relating thereto.
7. To see if the Town will vote to form a committee to investigate the possibility of changing the Town Fiscal year from January 1st to December 31st to July 1st to June 30th, as per Chapter 31, Section 94A, of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended, the committee to be appointed by the Moderator, and to report its findings and recommendations to the Town at the next annual meeting.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,000.00 to purchase the leased H 60B Hough Payloader, \$7,000.00 to be raised by a one year note and the balance to be raised by taxes, or take any other action relating thereto.
9. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regards to renovating the banquet room into an all purpose room for the Town committees and also what methods should be taken to dispose of all existing equipment, or take any other action relating thereto.
10. To see what sums of money the Town will raise to defray expenses for the ensuing year.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT TO THE CITIZENS

In our report to the citizens of Wilton for 1971 we would like to present a short summary of the activities that your Board of Selectmen has been involved in.

In March the Board signed an agreement with the State to allow the N. H. Public Works & Highways to advertise and receive bids on the Island Bridge. The old bridge was demolished the 1st week of July and construction on the new bridge was started. The bridge was then officially opened and dedicated on October 29, 1971. The total cost of the bridge was \$180,000 with Wilton's share being \$60,000.

The last part of July the Wilton Highway Dept. started the construction of the water and sewer lines, and road to the new Wilton-Lyndeborough Co-op High School. The water being completed the last week of August and sewer completed the 12th of September. The road was surfaced the middle of November.

On September 29th, the Board received the Wilton Tax Rate. The Tax rate was approved by the Tax Commission at the rate of \$4.30 per hundred which represented a 25% increase over the 1970 Tax rate. The valuation of property was doubled to keep the rate under the \$8.00 per hundred rate set by the State. This set our rate at \$4.30 per hundred instead of being \$8.60 per hundred.

In November, the Board signed a lease equipment agreement with R. C. Hazelton Co., of Manchester for a H 60B Hough Payloader. The Town's present loader is 9 years old and has serious transmission problems. The lowest estimate for repairs was \$2,000 and could be twice that amount if all necessary repairs were made. The Board was reluctant to spend this amount of money on the present machine which has 8,000 working hours on it and could continue to have repair problems. The Board met with nine members of the Town Budget Committee. We discussed the various solutions with the Committee and it was felt by all concerned that the solution was a lease purchase agreement.

This was done and 100% of the lease payment will be credited toward the purchase price if the Town votes to purchase the machine at Town Meeting.

Following nearly 2 years of negotiations, the snagging and clearing of Stony Brook became a reality. This should now relieve the flooding problems which continually plagued the residents of Forest Street. This was started and completed in November under the direction of the Army Corp. of Engineers and was funded by the United States Government. We are deeply indebted to Rep. James Cleveland for his efforts in bringing this job to a successful conclusion.

We would like to thank all of the citizens who helped our Board in any manner during the past year. We would also like to give special thanks to all our Town Departments who helped make our job a little easier. It was a pleasure serving as your Selectmen for 1971.

The Winter Maintenance expense for 1971 was high due to the many storms and repairs needed.

I was elected Road Agent March 9, 1971, but winter was still very much with us. The last storm was not until April 7. The last quarter of the year brought us our first snow on Nov. 21, with five more snow storms by Dec. 31, 71. Much sanding and salting was needed for the sleet storms. Our sander is very helpful, but due to the amount of Hills and roads we must cover, a second sander would be most useful. It would enable us to cover all areas much sooner. We are doing our best to keep the sidewalks useable this winter with the equipment we have.

Summer Maintenance this year was most unusual. Aside from the normal duties, we installed the water, sewer and the road for our new school. Also a new sewer line under the new bridge and sidewalk. All this was made possible with the efforts of my fine young, but experienced crew who worked very diligently to complete this work on time.

Resurfacing was done in many areas, but mostly to Maple St. and parts of Prince and Dale St. Also Highland St., Curtis Farm Rd. Burton Highway and Kimball Heights. Our Roads are badly in need of sealing. Much shoulder and culvert work needs to be done to keep water off of our roads, in order to preserve them.

The T.R.A. work was to complete the Abbott Hill project and commence to reconstruct Curtis Farm Road.

At the Dump we are trying to create a situation acceptable to all, and with everyones cooperation, it has worked out nicely. By dumping in the proper place and no burning during dump hours, has made usage a little more pleasant and much easier. It also makes it less expensive to maintain.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who has helped me in my many endeavors. The townspeople who placed their confidence in me last Town Meeting Day and the full and part time help for their fine cooperation.

WILTON POLICE DEPARTMENT

This activity report, covering the year 1971, is provided in a form more uniform with other reports submitted by other law enforcement agencies. It is more comprehensive than has been provided in the past without the confusing details. Anyone wishing to learn the details of our activity may do so at anytime by visiting the station in the Town Hall.

The past year has shown a large increase in criminal activity in town. However, this increase follows the increase shown by FBI reports covering the entire nation. I am pleased to report that this department has a record of clearing crimes which is considerably above the national average, again as reported by the FBI. This record is tangible evidence of the hard work by all members of your police department. For example, Wilton had 32 cases of breaking and entering reported this year. Of these, 18 were solved or cleared, or 56 percent. The most current Uniform Crime Report provided by the FBI indicates the national average for this type of crime to be 19 percent. Other areas of crime in which your police department is above average are shown in the following table.

REPORT OF THE WILTON FIRE DEPARTMENT

In 1971 we had our usual number of fires. Although it was a very hot and dry summer and the potential for a conflagration in wooded areas was present we were fortunate in escaping this problem.

The loss of buildings due to fire was a problem in 1971 as we had a house, storage shed and a trailer destroyed by fire. Some of these buildings were insured and the owners were reimbursed to some extent.

This year the new Wilton-Lydneborough school was completed and the heat detection warning system was installed and connected to the Wilton fire alarm system. This system proved its value a few days after it was installed, giving a warning that there was a potential fire in a storage closet in the building.

The department purchased an additional 500 feet of 4" hose this year and a distributor valve to be used with this hose. We also purchased additional coats and hats, mainly to replace ones that were worn out and unusable.

The departments 1929 Chevrolet forest fire truck gave out on us this year and has been sold. Thought should be given to replacing this vehicle as we now have nothing to get into the woods for forest fire fighting.

I wish to thank the men of the department and my deputies for their help and the many townspeople who contributed to the functions of the Wilton Fire Department.

Fire Warden's Report

LEST WE FORGET - IT CAN HAPPEN HERE

Disastrous forest and brush fires that destroy hundreds of homes are more prevalent on the west coast with their dry seasons and strong dry hot winds but 25 years ago this fall is the anniversary of a disaster that devastated large areas of northern New England leaving villages in ashes with rows of cellar-holes and chimneys in a number of summer vacation home locations. Many lives were lost on that destructive day of October 23, 1947 nothing could stop the wind driven flames.

It is true that such conditions are unusual for New Hampshire but they happened once, they can happen again. The fuel for fires is all around us. All it takes is a firebrand. Only by cultivating a habit of carefulness with fire at all times can we meet the challenge of protection when dry conditions prevail. Please let these reminders be your guide:

1. Never, either when walking, riding or driving, discard a firebrand – a lighted match or a glowing cigarette.
2. Always obtain a permit for any outside burning. The burning of household rubbish is not permitted if your town has rubbish collection. Burning of grass or garden litter can be dangerous. See your warden first.
3. If you camp or picnic, be sure open fires are allowed and if they are, put them *dead out* when leaving.
4. *Most important:* Instruct your children in the danger of the lighted match. A lighted match and dry grass or forest litter is a dangerous combination which leads to destructive loss and can lead to tragedy.

The past year – 1971 was a favorable year for the control of fires. There were too many fire starts in some towns. We thank those who remembered and ask others to heed Smokey's message.

REPORT OF THE WATER COMMISSIONERS

There was the usual maintenance of replacing pipes due to their being filled with rust.

Samples of water have been sent to the State Water Pollution Commission once a month for testing, and all have been satisfactory.

The department extended a 6-inch line for 350 feet to the home of Edward Sullivan, on Burns Hill, and also installed an 8-inch line to the new High School, along with two hydrants at the school's expense.

A slightly used backhoe and loader combination was purchased, with 50% of the cost to be paid by the Highway Department through a rental program.

In late November the Army Corps of Engineers cleaned Stony Brook, and as a result left the 12-inch water main exposed more than usual. The department discussed this matter with various experts and a decision was reached to lay a new 12-inch river crossing three feet below the river bed in order to eliminate any future problems with ice build-up. The estimated cost of this was \$5,000.00, and as of December 31, we haven't received the bill.

He was ably assisted by the Assistant Director, Miss Marcia Tuttle; Instructors, Miss Bonnie Cheever, Mr. Gordon Blagbrough, and pool guards Deanna Hutchinson and John Whippie. SYNOPSIS OF ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

March 9, 1971

The polls were opened at the Town Hall at 9 A. M., and by vote taken remained open until 7 P. M. A total of 795 ballots were cast, and the locked ballot box was taken to the High School Auditorium by the Moderator and Town Clerk with police escort for counting after the discussion of the warrant.

The evening meeting opened at 7:30 P.M. The following were appointed: Auditor: Leslie N. Center. Library Trustee: Roy W. Smith. Corder of Wood: Harland H. Savage Sr. Surveyor of Masonry, Brickwork and Stonework: Leroy V. Tuttle. Surveyors of Lumber: The old board. Members of the Nashua Regional Planning Board: Paul Warner and F. Stanley Hallet.

Article No. 1. The reports of Town Officers, Agents and Committees were accepted as printed in the Town Report, with the expiration dates for the Auditors being reversed.

Article No. 2. The matter of real estate taken over by the Town for nonpayment of taxes was left up to the Selectmen.

Article No. 3. The Selectmen were authorized to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article No. 4. This was taken up with No. 10.

Article No. 5. The Tax Collector was authorized to appoint a deputy or deputies.

Article No. 6. The Selectmen were authorized to set up a committee to oversee the disposition of municipal records, this committee to consist of the Selectmen, Clerk and Treasurer.

Article No. 7: The Wilton School District was authorized to elect its officers at the annual Town Meeting.

Article No. 8: The Town was given the responsibility for the Town Pound and the entrance to it, to the rear of the Wilton Center Unitarian church, but with no appropriation it was suggested that someone with civic pride clear it, and perhaps have the town mark it next year.

Article No. 9: The matter of revaluation of all town property by agents of the State Tax Commission or other qualified assessing firms, for which no amount had been placed in the budget, was defeated on a ballot vote — Aye 30; No 193; blank 2.

Article No. 10: Principal changes in the budget included an increase in town officers' salaries to provide \$300 more for the tax collector; and increase of \$500 for Town Hall expenses to purchase new chairs.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Carl E. Bowers

According to custom, I am presenting my second annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

When school opened this fall, we were able to assign all pupils to regular classroom facilities. This was made possible with the moving of the Wilton-Lyndeborough Co-operative students to their new school. We are very fortunate to have this additional space, since the effective date for implementation of Minimum Standards and Recommendations goes into effect September 1, 1972. In order to meet these standards, we were able to provide a central location for library services as phase one in meeting the needs of the pupils and staff. As a result of the additional space, we are able to utilize the Music Room for its intended purpose. The old Science area is presently being used for art classes for grades 3 through 6.

New staff members include Stanley Woodmansee, Music; Miss Pamela Ohnesty, Art; Gregory Wood, Grade 5; and Mrs. Wendy Carlton, Grade 4.

Instrumental Music is being offered to the pupils in Grades 4 through 6 by a New Hampshire Music Company under the direction of Henry N. Allain. Thus far we have twenty pupils who are taking lessons on the various instruments. Another two years should give us the nucleus of a good elementary band.

During the summer months much work was done on the interior of the old High School Building. Classrooms were painted cheerful colors, bulletin boards were replaced where necessary, chalkboards painted and the floors were cleaned and sealed. Panic hardware was replaced on doors where necessary. Various cost estimates have been received and more will be solicited so that we may present a prevent-

ive maintenance schedule for this building, that could take place over the next few years.

Once again I would suggest that serious thought be given to extending the Cooperative School District from Kindergarten through grade 12. There were 27 Cooperative School Districts in the State as of July 1, 1971. Dresden and the Wilton-Lyndeborough Cooperative are the only two that function from grade 7 through 12. The Winnacunnet Cooperative operates for grades 9 through 12. The remaining 24 are organized for grades 1 through 12 or Kindergarten to 12.

With the Cooperative being organized from Kindergarten to 12, we could receive better utilization of staff, especially in the area of instruction, and less duplication in the areas of transportation and maintenance.

Under Health Services we have budgeted for a full time School Nurse who will be shared with the Wilton-Lyndeborough Cooperative School. The Minimum Standards require a full time nurse with enrollments of 750 children. We meet this requirement by sharing the nurse's salary between the two school districts. I would be remiss if I did not call your attention to the excellent services we are receiving from Mrs. Elizabeth Stevens, our School Nurse. Dr. Owen Mathewson is presently serving as our school Physician. For a comprehensive listing of the services provided, please refer to the Nurse's Report.

As I conclude this, my second report, I wish to thank the School Board, Faculty and Staff, Town Officials, Parents and Friends who have helped to make this a successful year of progress in the improvement of educational opportunities for our youth.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

According to custom, I am presenting my second annual report as your Superintendent of Schools. The opening of the new Wilton-Lyndeborough Cooperative Junior-Senior High School, September 13, 1971, was a very busy day, but also a very happy day for both students and faculty.

Our new Principal, Charles E. Hamel, Jr., and Robert Dion, Guidance Director, worked most of the summer preparing for the opening day. The teachers also met, prior to the opening of the school, to work on the curriculum with the principal and guidance director.

New members on the staff are as follows: David Angelo, French I-IV and Spanish I; James B. Churchill, Boys' Physical Education 7-12; Henry C. Dodge, Industrial Arts 7-12; Ralph A. Dwire, Industrial Arts 7-12; James P. Huston, Mathematics 7-8; Mrs. Frances McCaffery, Librarian and Resource Center; Miss Janice L. Progen, Girls' Physical Education 7-12; and Stanley P. Woodmansee, Music 7-12.

With the many improvements and our new facilities and equipment, we are looking forward to an excellent program. With these facilities and the additional teacher, we were able to broaden our offering in the Industrial Arts area from grade 7 through 12. When one enters the new school, it is quite evident that we have a fine art department and many students with artistic talents.

Adult Education Classes are now being offered as another service to the adult population of the area. The courses offered will depend on the communities' needs and interests.

Driver Education is now being offered for the first time, at no cost to the District. This program is subsidized by the students and state department.

During the coming months, we should give some attention to the planning for an Athletic Field near the school. This field would not only be used for soccer, baseball and

track, but for physical education and other youth programs throughout the year.

We are looking forward to the opening of the cafeteria, which will also serve as the central kitchen for the Wilton and Lyndeborough Elementary Schools.

Under Health Services we have budgeted for a full-time School Nurse, who will be shared with the Wilton School District. The Minimum Standards require a full-time nurse with enrollments of 750 students. We meet this requirement by sharing the nurse's salary between two school districts. I would be remiss if I did not call your attention to the excellent services we are receiving from Mrs. Elizabeth Stevens, our School Nurse.

I would certainly be remiss if I did not call your attention to the excellent job that our head custodian, Edward Schmidt, Jr., is doing. It has taken many hours, during these past few months, not only to get the school ready for opening day, but to keep the 54,000 square feet clean and in its original condition.

As I conclude this, my second report, I wish to thank the School Board, Faculty and Staff, Town Officials, Parents and Friends who have helped to make this a banner year in the improvement of educational opportunities for our youth.
