TOWN MEETING – MARCH 10, 1970

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Barrington in the County of Strafford in said State, the following action was taken on the Town Warrant on Tuesday the 10th day of March 1970.

The meeting at the Barrington Grade School in Barrington was called to order by the Moderator E. Richard Rowell, at 10:00 A.M. and the polls were opened for voting on Article 1.

ARTICLE 1. The following officers were elected:

ARTICLE 2. It was voted to empower the Selectmen to appoint all other Town Officers. Motion: E. Caswell

ARTICLE 3. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,600.00 for the support of the town poor, old age assistance, aid to the disabled, and other town charges. Motion: E. Caswell

ARTICLE 4. It was voted to raise and appropriate the County Tax. Motion: F. Timm

ARTICLE 5. A motion was made that the voting on Article 5 be suspended until Article 17 was acted upon. Motion was not seconded.

ARTICLE 5. It was voted that the Town authorize the Selectmen to borrow up to the sum of \$100,000.00 in anticipation of taxes if necessary. Motion: R. Spinney

ARTICLE 6. It was voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 for the maintenance of town roads and bridges. Motion: D. Hatch

The Selectmen described the following items on which the appropriation would be expended: New bridge over Mallego Brook, two coats of paving oil on Smoke Street almost up to the Town Dump, repairs on Atwood and Mt. Misery Roads, second Crown Point Road upgraded, repairs on Austin, Young and Beauty Hill Roads, waste oil for dust control, and balance to be spent on snow removal.

ARTICLE 7. It was voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,450.54 for Town Road Aid, the State's share to be \$9,670.25. Motion: R. Spinney

ARTICLE 8. It was voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to be used in cooperation with State and Federal Funds for the control of White Pine Blister Rust within the confines of the town. Motion: D. Stevenson

ARTICLE 9. It was voted to raise the salary of the Town Clerk from \$125.00 to \$225.00 and the salary of the Town Treasurer from \$175.00 to \$275.00. The Selectmen stated that a study in connection with the salary of the Town Tax Collector will be made during the current year and an article will be inserted in the 1971 Town Warrant. Motion: E. Sharon

ARTICLE 10. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Library Association. Motion: E. Caswell

ARTICLE 11. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 for the proper observance of Memorial Day. Motion: R. Spinney

ARTICLE 12. It was voted that the Town would not raise and appropriate any sum of money for the town's participation in the Lakes Region Association. Motion: E. Caswell

ARTICLE 13. It was voted that the town continue its membership in the Rural Health Council and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,680.00 for the support of the organization's visiting nurse service. Motion: A. Turner

ARTICLE 14. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to

be placed in the care of the Trustees of Trust Funds to be made available to the Committee for the Proper Observance of the Town's 250th Anniversary when required to finance the project. Motion: G. Musler

ARTICLE 15. It was voted that the Town wishes to exclude from the plan service in any class or classes of position of Election Officials or Election Workers for a calendar quarter in which the remuneration paid for such services is less than \$50.00. Motion: A. Turner

ARTICLE 16. It was voted that the town will move to recommend that the name of the U. S. Postal installation in Barrington be changed from "The East Barrington Post Office" to "The Barrington Post Office". Motion: D. Hatch

ARTICLE 17. It was voted that Article 17 be amended to read, "To see if the Town will permit the Tax Collector to accept pre-payments on account of the annual property tax in multiples of not less than \$10.00. Motion: J. Varney. It was then voted that the Town will permit the Tax Collector to accept pre-payments on account of the annual property tax in multiples of not less than \$10.00. Motion: J. Varney

ARTICLE 18. It was voted by the Town that the Selectmen continue their study concerning the Building Codes of the Town of Barrington and report their findings at the next annual town meeting. Motion: E. Beal

ARTICLE 19. It was voted to abandon the Bodge Road so-called, running from the Second Crown Point Road to and joining the Pond Hill Road. Motion: D. Hatch

ARTICLE 20a. It was voted by the Town that a road running southeast from a point where it connects with Route 125 adjacent to the end of Rowell Rd., over Green Hill to the nearest adjoining town line, be closed subject to "Gates and Bars". Motion: R. Hayes

ARTICLE 20b. It was voted by the Town that a section of road which runs east from the Old Green Hill Road, east to the Gulf Road so-called, by the residence of one Adam Millette be closed by virtue of "Gates and Bars". Motion: A. Turner

ARTICLE 20c. It was voted by the Town that a road known as the Tibbets

Road be closed subject to "Gates and Bars", 2,000 feet from the intersection to Hall Rd., and Tibbets Rd., to the Lee Town line. Motion: G. Musler

ARTICLE 20d. It was voted by the Town that a so-called cross road (Known as the Lee Hill Road) running from the Lee town line, by the Adam's property, west to U. S. Route 4 be closed subject to "Gates and Bars". Motion: R. Fogg

ARTICLE 20e. It was voted by the Town that a road running from its intersection with the Hall Road, at a point where the Hall Road also intersects with the so-called France or Furnace Road, south to U. S. Route 4 be closed subject to "Gates and Bars". Motion: E. Caswell

ARTICLE 21. It was voted by the Town to accept all items in the budget not covered by articles in the Warrant. Motion: R. Spinney

ARTICLE 22. It was voted that the Selectmen appoint a committee to investigate the building of a gymnasium or civic center located in the central part of the town and to report their findings at the next town meeting. Motion: E. Seaver

ARTICLE 22. It was voted that the Selectmen decide on which unused roads should be closed subject to "Gates and Bars", abandoned, or the right of way modified. Their recommendations to be presented in the warrant at the next town meeting. Motion: G. Musler

ARTICLE 22. It was voted that the Selectmen contact the Lakes Region Association regarding the past two years' erroneous write-up. Motion: E. Caswell

It was voted to adjourn at 10:00 P.M. Motion: E. Caswell

TOWN OF BARRINGTON – SPECIAL MEETING

A special meeting called for the Town of Barrington, New Hampshire, was held in the auditorium of the Elementary School, Barrington, County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire on Monday, December 14, 1970, notice of the time and place for holding said meeting having been published in a paper in general circulation in the town and posted in a general meeting place.

There were present George T. Musler, Russell Fogg, Selectmen of Barrington, E. Richard Rowell, acting as Moderator and Anthony McManus, Esquire, Attorney.

E. Richard Rowell called the meeting to order, stating the purpose thereof, by reading the warrant which had been posted by the Selectmen. He stated they had received a petition signed by in excess of 100 registered voters to (1) appoint a zoning committee for recommending comprehensive zoning regulations and (2) transact other business. The petition had been dated November 25, 1970. Moderator Rowell cited RSA 39:3, which states, in part, as follows:

“...Upon the written application of fifty or more voters, or one fourth of the voters in the town, so presented in not less than sixty days before the next annual meeting, the selectmen shall warn a special meeting to act upon any question specified in such application....”

The purpose of said meeting, then, was to create a zoning committee or a planning board, either of which may have 5 members or 7 members. In either case, selectmen appoint one of their own members to the board, and the other members of the board have to be nominated from the floor, seconded, and voted upon by the voters.

Attorney McManus was called upon to explain the powers of a planning board and statutory requirements governing same. He stated that the town must follow the New Hampshire statutes, or they would have no authority to create this body. He advised that a planning board was more desirable than a zoning commission in that when a zoning commission's purpose is finished, they are phased out. There are more powers and authority given to a planning board, in addition to the powers granted to a zoning commission, which would be beneficial over a long period of time to the town. Specific terms of office were discussed, and they were dis-

covered to be statutory. They are as follows:

1 member	1 year position
1 member	2 year position
1 member	3 year position
1 member	4 year position
2 members	5 year position, each

Each year, one new position would be elected. The purpose of the planning board, generally, is as follows:

To promote the public interest in and understanding of a master plan (the first thing the planning board would undertake); to confer and decide what the needs of the town are in zoning; to formulate a master plan, set up districts, or to leave as is with one single district and make limitations on same (frontage size, what size lot, what type of sewer system for a certain type of lot, etc.); to promote interest and understanding of the master plan; to publish and distribute copies of the master plan; to be given the opportunity to attend planning conferences or meetings or hearings on planning legislation and to be paid reasonable traveling expenses; to be given the authority to make investigations in connection with planning and development of the municipality; from time to time, to make recommendations to public officials; to consult and advise with public officials and citizens to carry out the master plan; to accept and use gifts for the exercise of its functions; to gain information as it may properly require to carry out its work. The planning board may be authorized by ordinance to enter on land to carry out surveys as are reasonably necessary to maintain monuments, etc. Expenses shall not exceed the total appropriations for its operations. Before any ordinance is proposed, it shall be submitted to the voters of the town and there shall be at least two public hearings at least fifteen (15) days apart. Citizens shall have the opportunity to be heard. At least fifteen (15) days notice of the public hearing shall be published in a paper in general circulation in the town. After the first hearing has been held, the planning board shall consider all changes to the ordinance proposed and shall vote. The notice of the second hearing must include

either the text or changes considered at the first hearing. At least fifteen (15) days prior to the hearing, the time and place shall be published in the paper. The planning board shall vote on the final form to be presented to the town. The notice may include editorial revisions and textural changes. Official copies of the final proposed ordinance shall be placed on file and made available to the town voters at least two (2) weeks prior to the final meeting. The selectmen may, by statutory provision, and after public hearing, may remove a member of the planning board from office for neglect of duty, inefficiency or malfeasance in office. The selectmen shall appoint another person to fill the removed planning board member's place, for the remainder of his term. The selectman must file a written statement of the reasons for removal with the town clerk. The person removed will have the right of appeal.

Attorney McManus also discussed further differences between a zoning commission and a planning board. They are as follows;

A zoning commission may be voted out. A planning board may be rendered powerless by not voting any appropriations. A zoning commission could hold public hearings on the work they were doing, and they would make the recommendations to the town. The town would then have to go forward and hold public meetings before the final vote. The planning board is an autonomous group. It goes forward and holds the required public hearings under its own power. The authority for enforcement of the zoning ordinances could be put into the hands of the selectmen, or an official might be designated, under the title possibly of building inspector. The ordinance for zoning would be better presented article by article. It could come up in its entirety and be voted on as a whole, but it is not preferable to do it in this manner. The entire ordinance could be voted out because of one offensive article.

Carl Smith presented a speech at said meeting which encompassed the town of Barrington's specific problems as a result of the absence of zoning ordinances.

A discussion was held around the question of whether or not a building code would or could be integrated into the zoning plan. The

selectmen felt that the present building code could be up-dated at the same time zoning ordinances were presented to the town's voters.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED:

That the town appoint a planning board.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED.

That a seven-member board be appointed.

Nominations were then in order for six vacancies. Nominations were made and seconded, and all positions were opposed. The following members were elected by a show of hands:

The planning board chose their chairman from the members appointed by the town. The selectman who serves is ex-officio. He may discuss the planning board's business and may vote, but he may not be the chairman. These members are in office as soon as they are sworn in, but technically, their term is from annual town meeting to annual town meeting.

A reference to pay was brought up. The moderator stated that this should be a gratuitous gesture to the town.*

A motion was made and seconded that a recount be made on the Brown-Ward vote for the 2-year term. The moderator ruled the motion out of order due to several orders of business after this particular vote and also due to the fact that some people had already left the meeting.

A discussion was held from the floor concerning infractions of Robert's Rules of Parliamentary Procedure.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED:

To adjourn.

Adjourned accordingly.

TITLE: This ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the Town of Barrington Zoning Ordinance of 1971, hereinafter referred to as "this ordinance."

DEFINITIONS: For the purpose of this ordinance, certain terms are defined as provided in this section.

- A. Home produce and products includes everything of an agricultural nature grown, produced, conditioned or otherwise carried on the property of the resident and such articles as are manufactured or altered by members of the household and their employees.
- B. Trailer Park or Mobile Home Park means a parcel of land occupied by two or more trailers or mobile homes designed to be used for living purposes.
- C. Side Yard. An unoccupied space extending for the full length of a building between the building and the side lot line.
- D. Back Yard. A space, unoccupied, extending for the full width of the lot between the extreme rear line of a building and the rear lot line.
- E. Accessory Building. A building subordinate to the main building

and customarily incidental to the main purpose of such building.

F. Building. A structure, including all integral parts thereof, intended for use and occupation as a habitation, or for some purpose of assembly, business, manufacture, institutional, storage, ornamentation, or shelter to persons, animals or chattels.

G. Residence. A building used as a habitation or parts thereof used for access to such building.

(a) Single Family Residence means a building and accessories thereto used or adapted for use as a residence by one family.

(b) Multi-family Residence means a building and accessories thereto used or adapted for use as a residence by more than one family.

H. Lot. A parcel of land occupied by one building and the accessory buildings or uses customarily incident to it.

I. Frontage means that side of a lot abutting on a street or public way.

J. Mobile Home. Any vehicle used or so constructed as to permit its being used as a conveyance or transported upon its own wheels, used or intended for use for residential purposes, including structural additions, except parked and unoccupied camping-type trailers.

ARTICLE 1.

PREAMBLE:

In order to preserve the beauty and rural appearance of our town, to protect the health, safety and general welfare of the community, to provide adequate areas between buildings and various right of ways, to protect property values, to provide adequate public utilities and other public requirements, the following ordinance is hereby adopted by the voters of the Town of Barrington, New Hampshire in accordance with Chapter 31, Sections 60-89 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended.

ARTICLE 2.

DISTRICTS:

2. 1 For the purpose of this ordinance, the entire area of Barrington shall be established as an agricultural-residential district.
2. 2 Although no specific area has been set aside for business or industry, the establishment of such an enterprise that can be shown to be an asset to the town is encouraged.
2. 3 Off-road parking facilities must be provided by the business.

ARTICLE 3.

Agricultural-Residential District

3. 1 Frontage. Every building lot shall have a minimum frontage of 150 feet. Lesser frontage shall be permitted provided the average width of the lot measured at the approximate center is 150 feet from side lot line to side lot line.

3. 2 Side and Back Yards. A building shall not be located nearer than 20 feet of the property lines of any abutter.

3. 3 Minimum Land Area. A lot shall not be less than 40,000 square feet, with an additional 20,000 square feet for each family residence under a common roof.

3. 4 Building Lot Land Requirement. Building lots, having either a Community Water Supply or a Community Sewage System, meeting with the approval of the N. H. Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission and offered for sale within the town shall contain not less than 15,000 square feet, and the said lots shall have not less than 100 feet frontage, not less than 100 feet from lot line to lot line, provided they are located not more than 350 feet from a Public Lake or Public Pond, as defined in RSA 271, and the entire area of the lot must be within the 350-foot limitation.

3. 5 Land Uses Allowed.

(a) The buying, selling and exposing for sale of home produce and products.

(b) The office of a professional person.

(c) Taking of boarders or the leasing or renting of rooms or buildings.

(d) Customary home occupations carried on in the house by a resident person.

(e) Single-family and/or multi-family residences, including accessory buildings and buildings for agricultural purposes are permitted

in this district.

(f) Convalescent and nursing homes, churches, schools, playgrounds parks, golf courses, tennis courts, are permitted.

(g) Farming, including dairying, livestock and poultry raising, horticulture, truck farming, forestry, and other related agricultural enterprises, and the sale of the products realized from farming are permitted.

ARTICLE 4

MOBILE HOMES OR HOUSE TRAILERS:

4. 1 A single mobile home or a single house trailer may be located anywhere in the district provided all requirements of Article 3 are met.

4. 2 No trailer park or mobile home park for the use of mobile homes or house trailers shall be permitted in the district unless authorized by the Town of Barrington at an annual or special town meeting called for the Selectmen at the request of the Board of Adjustment. After such authorization, no permit shall be granted unless the park site meets all the requirements of Article 3.

ARTICLE 5

NON-CONFORMING USE:

Any non-conforming use of land, building lot or buildings may continue in their present use except that such non-conforming use shall not be changed, extended or enlarged except by special permit of the Board of Adjustment. A discontinuance of one year shall void the permit.

ARTICLE 6

ENFORCEMENT OF ORDINANCE PROVISIONS:

It shall be the duty of the Building Inspector to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

ARTICLE 7

BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT:

Within thirty days after adoption, the Board of Selectmen shall appoint a Board of Adjustment of five members, one member to serve for one year, one for two years, one for three years, one for four years, one for five years and thereafter, the Selectmen shall appoint one member for a

term of five years. Vacancies shall be filled by the Selectmen for the unexpired term. The duties of said Board shall conform to the provisions of Chapter 31 of New Hampshire Statutes Annotated; 1955.

ARTICLE 8

AMENDMENT OF ORDINANCE:

This ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal Town meeting when the amendment is published in the Warrant calling for the meeting, and when the amendment has received a public hearing which has been advertised and given a legal 15-day notice.

ARTICLE 9

FINE FOR VIOLATION OF ORDINANCE PROVISIONS.

Every person, persons, firm or corporation convicted by an authorized court having jurisdiction for violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not more than ten dollars for each day the violation may exist.

ARTICLE 10

SEPARABILITY CLAUSE:

The invalidity of any provision of this ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other provision.

ARTICLE 11

EFFECTIVE DATE OF ORDINANCE:

This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

ARTICLE 1. To choose by ballot and major vote one Selectman and one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years and two Auditors for one year.

ARTICLE 2. To vote by ballot to determine if the town is in favor of the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board.

ARTICLE 3. To vote by ballot to determine if the town is in favor of continuing 3 year terms of office for the Town Clerk, Tax Collector, and Treasurer.

ARTICLE 4. To choose all other necessary town officers.

ARTICLE 5. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,500.00 for the support of the town poor, old age assistance, aid to the disabled, and other town charges.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow up to the sum of \$100,000 in anticipation of taxes if necessary.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000 for the maintenance of town roads and bridges.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be used to replace the wooden bridge on Mallego Road.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,444.35 for Town Road Aid. The State share to be \$9,629.02.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 to be used in cooperation with State and Federal funds for the control of White Pine Blister Rust within the confines of the town.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for partial participation to the Lakes Region Association.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for the Library Association.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$225 for the proper observance of Memorial Day.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the town will consider a change in the method under which the Tax Collector is paid.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to continue the use of the services of members of the State Tax Commission for the purpose of assessing properties within the town.

ARTICLE 16. To see what the town wishes to do about the Selectmen's salaries.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the town will vote to continue its membership in the Rural Health Council and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,853 for the support of the town share of organization's visiting nurse.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 for the purchase of approximately 90 acres of land adjoining the present dump site in anticipation of a time when State Laws will prohibit the disposal of refuse by burning within the town.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the town will allow the Selectmen to work out an arrangement with the Madbury Selectmen to allow Madbury residents use of the town dump.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the town will approve an ordinance under which persons using the town dump are required to present identification.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell town property.

ARTICLE 22. To see what the town wishes to do after hearing the report of the Committee for Proper Observance of the town's 250th Anniversary.

ARTICLE 23. To see what the town wishes to do in the matter of a Community or Civic Center in Barrington.

ARTICLE 24. To see what action the town wishes to take after hearing the report of the Selectmen concerning the town's building codes.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the town will accept as a town road, that road known to some as the Meadow Brook Road a distance of 450 feet from New Hampshire Route 4 to a 50 foot turn around after hearing the report of the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the town will accept all other items in the budget not covered by articles in the warrant.

ARTICLE 27. To transact any other business that may come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN and DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1970 forest fire season was a quiet one in this area, quiet in part because of your continued cooperation and favorable weather conditions.

Fires that did occur were, for the most part, caused by debris burning, children, and smokers.

The elimination of these three causes of forest fires would drastically change this picture — to bring about this change we make the following suggestions:

1. When the ground is not covered with snow, a permit must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden. This permit covers waste burning, even if in an incinerator; grass burning, as well as garden trash and brush burning — such burning is restricted by regulation to prior to 9:00 A.M. and after 5:00 P.M. with the following exceptions:

Commercial or industrial burning is permissible at any time under normal conditions but only with the approval of the District Chief and a written permit from the Forest Fire Warden.

2. Fires caused by children can be prevented only with the complete cooperation of parents in the supervision of their children. Keep matches out of reach of children — this action will help to prevent fires and may save a life, the life of your child. Try to explain this to your child, won't you?

3. Forest fires caused by smokers can be reduced in number by the exercise of more care in the discarding of matches and smoking material whether from a vehicle or by a hiker. In all cases, make sure that the butt or match you discard is out, dead out. Smokey says, "Thanks for your help", and invites you to join with him in setting a good example for others in the prevention of fires and the protection of our environment.

REPORT FOR THE BARRINGTON PUBLIC LIBRARY

This past year has found that all the children's non-fiction books are now in the Dewey decimal system. All E books, J books, Y books; biography, autobiography, all ages; mysteries, all ages; now have shelf list cards and most catalog cards as well. All new books that come in, regardless of category, receive shelf list and catalog cards. Besides cards, each book is marked by an electric pencil as to its category.

Some of the adult non-fiction books have the Dewey decimal and we hope to make a big dent in the adult fiction this year.

The library was saddened by the passing of Mildred Mansfield, a faithful member and librarian, who gave over 20 years of service. She is greatly missed. A book has been placed in the library in her memory.

We have added 170 new books in 1970. The number should have been larger but the complete shipment still hasn't been received. We did receive a donation of books from Richard Whipple and the Garden Club. We have discarded approximately 100 because they were either outdated or worn out from usage.

It is no longer possible to run the library for the children during school hours with just one librarian as had been done occasionally a few years ago when Mrs. Mansfield was librarian and emergencies made it impossible for two to be present. Now emergencies can be weathered with just two, but it has been discovered that with the large number of pupils in school that in order to give them the best help possible, we need three working these hours, one checking in books, one checking out and one answering questions and helping to find books, and replacing books being checked in. We are fortunate in having as our third member, Mrs. Marilyn Smith. We appreciate her coming every Wednesday and helping when the children are there.

It was thought there would be no appropriation from the State this year, but we were pleasantly surprised to receive one hundred dollars to use for reference books.

As a member of the State Library Association we must issue and honor the new State wide library cards. At present we have issued six of these cards.

REPORT OF THE DOG OFFICER

1970 was a busy year for your Dog Officer. During that period, we processed 90 complaints and traveled over 150 miles. Some of the areas covered are listed as follows:

1. Investigated 11 cases of dog bite.
2. Picked up 40 stray dogs.
 - a. Returned 6 to their owners
 - b. Found new homes for 3
 - c. Turned 15 over to Veterinarians for disposal, and 16 to the Rochester pound.
3. Investigated 7 cases involving dogs hit by motor vehicles. Of these, 2 had to be disposed of.
4. Followed up on 12 dogs chasing deer.
5. Assisted in collecting 125 dog licenses.

The dog problem is a large one and growing all the time.

We were fortunate in working out an arrangement with the authorities in Rochester to gain use of the Rochester pound. In the long run this set-up will prove to save the town a considerable amount of money in terms of board for strays.

Again we remind you folks that Chapter 466:33 of the Revised statutes, annotated, state that it shall be unlawful for dogs to run at large between January 1 and September 1 of any year. Whoever violates this law can be fined \$25.00.

ANNUAL REPORT – RURAL DISTRICT HEALTH COUNCIL

January 1, 1970 – December 31, 1970

During the past year the Rural District Health Council has been providing visiting nurse service to the following seven towns: Northwood, Nottingham, Deerfield, Barrington, Strafford, Middleton, and New Durham. The nurses are building up a comprehensive health program including post-partum and newborn visits, immunization checks, family planning services and direct nursing services ordered by the physicians. We are hoping to expand our family planning services, to establish Child Health conferences and immunization clinics.

At present we have two part time nurses and a part time supervisor. Because of the geographical area and the travel involved covering the area, it is more feasible to employ the two part time nurses rather than a full time one. The administration and supervision of this program is contracted to the Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center in Portsmouth, N.H.

The District was fortunate in being able to recruit teachers to supplement the efforts of the veteran members of the staff. For the first time we are beginning to see some glimmerings that the teacher shortage is beginning to ease. However, teachers for the primary grades and for such specialties as mathematics and science are in short supply.

The State Board of Education has authorized the implementation of new minimum standards for the Elementary Schools of New Hampshire. These are to be implemented beginning in September of 1972. We respectfully refer you to the report of your school principal, where the needs of Barrington have been delineated in detail.

As is apparent to all who visit the school, the space for classrooms in the present building is at a premium. The fact that the AREA School program cannot be fully implemented at this time, augments the difficulty and makes space at a premium earlier than was anticipated. It has been recommended that a Building Committee be authorized for the District, and an article to authorize the appointment of such a committee has been inserted in the warrant for the consideration of the voters of the District.

We are pleased that the Barrington School Board has made it possible to innovate a program on an experimental basis regarding the use and effects of modern micro-film techniques on the elementary school level. This is attracting attention far outside the District, and it is hoped that in the long run Barrington will benefit greatly for this liberal attitude toward experimental program.

Your school board has continued to develop official policies regarding many areas of the operation of the school. It is to be commended for this effort, as it allows a framework in which the administration, teachers, pupils and patrons may work. School Board members have copies of these policies, and copies are also available in the Principal's and Superintendent's offices.

Since this is also a "legislative year", local citizens are urged to support their legislators in their efforts to obtain financial aid for their home districts. Districts which are growing rapidly, as Barrington is, need all of the outside resources obtainable to assist them in their expansion. Even fully funding the present statutes would mean a great deal to the local school districts, without adding other programs which would be only partially funded, as previously legislative actions have been.

In closing, we would like to express our appreciation for the cooperation received from local citizens, school board members, pupils and school staff.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Benjamin Franklin once spoke of the dualism in American Educational thought as the striving for balance between the "useful" and the "ornamental". Franklin's idea of the "useful" involved two types of learning: (1) the development of specific skills and (2) general understanding which enables a person to deal with the events of life more effectively.

So that our children may gain the necessary skills and understanding, we, the educators, parents, and taxpayers, must constantly re-assess their educational experiences so that the best combination of tradition and change is woven. The State Board of Education recently adopted a report entitled *Minimum Standards and Recommendations for New Hamp-*

shire Public Elementary School Approval to assist local school districts in this re-assessment process and also to provide a minimum standard of elementary education throughout New Hampshire. All local school districts must either be in compliance with the minimum standards by September 1, 1972 or have submitted by that date, an acceptable plan for implementing the standards.

For our school to meet the state requirements, we must accomplish the following:

1. Maintain a pupil-teacher ratio of 25 to 1 or less in grades 1-2, and 30-1 or less in grades 3-8.
2. Provide for Art, Music, Physical Education, and Special Education instruction which amounts to employing teachers in these areas on a part-time basis.
3. Provide for library and guidance services.
4. Provide for a full-time secretary.
5. Provide for a full-time supervising principal.
6. Provide 2,000 square feet, or the size of two regular classrooms for library facilities.
7. Access for the children to a basic collection of 6,000 library books.
8. A building program to construct the equivalent of four regular classrooms in order to provide the necessary space for the library and expanded health, guidance, and Physical Education programs, and to plan properly for immediate growth in enrollment.

It should be emphasized that these points are requirements and not recommendations. And while these requirements will certainly benefit our children, the question of financing them remains. In my opinion, we should ask our representatives to the General Court to introduce legislation placing a limit on the amount of money that can be raised from the property tax for the support of schools. The day when the costs of running our schools can be obtained almost entirely from property taxes has passed. If we are expected to implement the minimum standards, it seems only fair for the state government to provide a major portion of the necessary funds.

SCHOOL NURSE HEALTH REPORT – 1970

I accepted the position of school nurse in Barrington in January after the resignation of Mrs. Dorothy Wells, R.N.

I gave physicals to 330 pupils and sent notices home or made phone or home calls for defects noted.

Weekly trips were made to Northwood and Strafford to get and return the testing equipment. This was an inconvenience to all concerned, so The Barrington Woman's Club voted to sponsor a Fund for a new Titmus Vision Tester. Other organizations and businessmen will be asked to donate toward this worthwhile project.

A Rubella (German Measles) Clinic was held in April with 141 pupils receiving the vaccine. We wish to thank Dr. Howarth of Durham who administered the vaccine, and Mrs. Horn and Miss Thorn, State nurses, who assisted, with the help of volunteer mothers.

The pre-school clinic was held in April and 34 children were examined and tested.

In May the film "It's Wonderful Being a Girl" was shown to 5th and 6th grade girls, after permission slips were returned to school. A successful discussion period followed.

The Matching Funds Dental Clinic was held and care for 12 students was completed. The P.T.A. voted to sponsor this clinic and the Fluoride Clinic for next year.

We had 3 cases of impetigo and 3 cases of pediculosis, which were treated successfully. An excellent record for the number of students in school.

I found 41 vision defects and had 28 corrections.

I counseled 3 obese students and 2 insecure students.

Poison Ivy has been a problem this fall and spring and a recommendation has been forwarded to the School Board for action. There were only 5 cases of communicable diseases reported this school year. 15 home visits were made.

I want to thank all school personnel and parents for their cooperation during my first year as school nurse in Barrington.

1970 REAL ESTATE ASSESSMENTS

This booklet contains the names of the owners of real estate in the Town of Barrington as of April 1, 1970, together with the amounts for which each property was assessed for tax purposes as of April 1, 1969.

The assessed valuations for this year were based by the Selectmen on appraisals made by appraisers employed by the State Tax Commission. The 1970 assessment figure represents the appraised full value (sound value) of the property, the purpose being to equalize all individual assessments on this basis. Property record cards containing a description of each piece of property including the basis of the appraisal are on file at the office of the selectmen. These cards may be examined by any interested party.

If any property owner believes the assessment on his property this year is in excess of its full market value he may appeal to the selectmen, in writing, for abatement within four months of the receipt of his tax bill. Forms for this purpose may be obtained from the Board of Selectmen. Upon refusal of the Board to make such abatement he may, within six months of the receipt of his tax bill, upon payment of a \$10.00 application fee, appeal to the State Tax Commission, in writing, for abatement, or if he so desires may enter an appeal for abatement with the Superior Court of Strafford County. In cases where an appeal is made to the Tax Commission the commissioners themselves will examine the property in question to determine whether the original assessment was, in their opinion, proper. If not, the necessary adjustment will be made. A property owner dissatisfied with the Commission's decision may appeal to the Superior Court for abatement within three months from the notice thereof.

For purposes of economy and efficiency the Commission will allow appeals made to it to accumulate until the six month period for filing has expired so that all properties may be examined at the same time. Examination will be made as soon thereafter as other commitments will permit.

It is called to your attention that interest at $\frac{7}{8}\%$ per annum will be charged on all property taxes not paid by the due date specified on the tax bill and the filing of a request for review of assessment will not waive this penalty.

STATE TAX COMMISSION

TO ALL BARRINGTON PROPERTY OWNERS:

Revised Statutes Annotated 75:1 states: "The selectmen shall appraise all taxable property at its full and true value in money as they would appraise the same in payment of a just debt due from a solvent debtor, and shall receive and consider all evidence that may be submitted to them relative to the value of property, the value of which cannot be determined by personal examination."

This provision is the only legal basis upon which all taxable property should be appraised for the purposes of taxation and upon which all taxes should be assessed. The courts have determined that the phrase "full and true value" means sale value, or the price the property would sell for in a fair market between a willing buyer and a willing seller; i.e., a buyer who would buy but who does not have to buy and a seller who would sell but does not have to sell where the seller attempts to obtain the highest price possible and the buyer tries to purchase for the least amount. It does not mean an inflated value nor a deflated value but the price which the property would bring at a normal sale on April first, the date of the assessment.

The fact that a property owner makes no use of available municipal services or facilities, such as police, fire or schools, has no bearing upon the value of his property. Lack of services such as rubbish collection, street lights, sidewalks, repair and maintenance of private roads, etc., if affecting the value of property would presumably be reflected in the selling price. Because such services are not available is not sufficient reason to appeal for abatement.

The fact that a person performed his own labor upon his property or that low quality or used material entered into the construction of a building has no bearing on its worth other than as it affects the sale value of the property. The test is not what the property cost but what it would sell for in a fair market on the date of assessment, namely, April first in each year. The amount a person paid to purchase a piece of property, while evidence to be considered, is not conclusive of its value. A person may have paid more or less than the property is worth.

Property values change from time to time. Economic and social conditions affect the value of property and these are reflected in the sale value. The fact that such changed economic or social conditions increase the values of properties and thereby increase the taxes and work an inconvenience or actual hardship upon the owners may not be considered in the appraisal of property and assessment of taxes. All property is to be appraised upon the basis of its value for the use for which it is best adapted, regardless of the actual use being made of the property. It is possible that some types of property because of economic conditions have increased in value to a greater extent than others and if because of this the assessment on a property is increased by a larger percentage than on others this is not sufficient reason to appeal for abatement.

If a person feels that the appraisal of his property is greater than the price at which he could sell it if it were placed on the market he has the basis for asking for a review of the value by the tax commission. The legal test is whether the property of the complainant is assessed at a higher proportion of its value than all property generally in the taxing district.

Inasmuch as misinformation may have resulted in errors having been made by the real estate appraisers in the description of lands and buildings, the appraisers will be at the Selectmen's Office (School Building), Barrington, New Hampshire, on the following dates to make corrections:

The appraisers will explain the manner in which the value was computed to any person who desires this information. If differences of opinion between the owner and the appraiser as to the worth of a piece of property cannot be resolved after a second examination to be made by the chief appraiser in charge of the work, the matter may be brought to the attention of the Tax Commission or the Superior Court through abatement proceedings as outlined on the cover of the enclosed booklet.
