Proceedings of the County Convention,

CONCORD, N. H., January 11, 1899.

The representatives of the various towns of the county met and organized in convention, as required by law, with the following officers: Chairman, Thomas Cogswell; Secretary, Charles F. Story.

Meeting then adjourned until January 25, at 10 o'clock a. m., at the Sergeant-at-Arms' room, State House.

CONCORD, N. H., January 25, 1899.

Convention met at State House, the Chairman presiding. Voted to adjourn to Friday, February 3, at 9 o'clock a. m., at the Court House, Laconia.

LACONIA, N. H., February 3, 1899.

Convention met at the Court House, the Chairman presiding. The roll was called and Clough of Alton, Garland of Barnstead, Johnson of Belmont, Emery of Centre Harbor, Morrill of Gilford, Cogswell of Gilmanton, Smith, Story, Kellogg, Foss, Ashman, Goss and Simpson of Laconia, Lang of Meredith, Hunkins of Sanbornton and Holmes of Tilton were

present. A recess was taken to view the County Farm and surroundings.

Convention convened at the County Farm, and on motion of Holmes of Tilton it was voted to empower the Commissioners to buy the 36-acre lot now owned by J. W. Mathes, at a price not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00).

On motion of Emery of Centre Harbor, it was voted to elect a committee of five to investigate the subject of electric lighting for the County Farm and out-buildings; also to report about boilers, hydrants and water supply. Story of Laconia, Morrill of Gilford, Emery of Centre Harbor, Clough of Alton, and Lang of Meredith were elected to serve on said committee.

On motion of Clough of Alton, it was voted that the Commissioners be empowered to purchase necessary shelving for the Register of Probate's vault.

At the suggestion of the chair a committee was elected, consisting of Goss of Laconia, Johnson of Belmont and Simpson of Laconia, to report on the advisability of buying the 50-acre lot now owned by Mathes and Perley.

The following resolution was introduced by Lang of Meredith and passed unanimously: "Resolved, That the thanks of the Belknap County Convention be and are hereby extended to the County Commissioners, Mr., Mrs. and the Misses Weymouth, for the excellent dinner served and the many courtesies extended."

On motion of Holmes, it was voted to adjourn, subject to the call of the chairman.

LACONIA, N. H., March 6, 1899.

Convention met at Court House at 1.30 p. m., Chairman presiding. Holmes of Tilton, Emery of Centre Harbor, Lang

of Meredith, Cogswell of Gilmanton, Clough of Alton, Ashman, Foss, Kellogg, Smith, Goss, Simpson and Story of Laconia were present.

On motion of Clough of Alton, it was voted that the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) shall be raised by taxation for each of the years 1899 and 1900.

On motion of Clough of Alton, it was voted that the special appropriation of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00), voted by the County Convention of 1897 for the purpose of building a boiler house, be transferred to the general fund and used for such other purposes as the Convention may vote.

On motion of Holmes of Tilton, it was voted that the sum of twelve hundred and ninety-three dollars (\$1,293.00) be appropriated out of the treasury for the purpose of installing an electric light plant at the County Farm, and that the County Commissioners and a committee of the Convention be instructed to construct the same, if in their opinion no better arrangements can be made with the Laconia Electric Light Co. for lighting.

On motion of Ashman of Laconia, it was voted that two members of the Convention be appointed to act with the County Commissioners in regard to lighting. Story of Laconia was appointed by the chair, and on motion of Lang of Meredith, Cogswell of Gilmanton was elected to serve.

On motion of Ashman of Laconia, it was voted that the County Commissioners be authorized to put in steel shelving in the Register of Probate's and Clerk of Court's vaults, at an expense not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000).

On motion of Holmes of Tilton, it was voted that five hundred dollars (\$500) be raised by taxation in the year 1899 for the payment of the Mathes lot.

On motion of Emery of Centre Harbor it was voted to indefinitely postpone the purchase of the the 50-acre lot, so-called.

On motion of Ashman of Laconia, it was voted that the

County Commissioners be authorized to make necessary repairs on boiler and piping at the County Farm.

On motion of Holmes of Tilton, it was voted that the County Commissioners be authorized to sell and convey the Sanborn lot, so-called, situated in Meredith, for such sum and at such time as they deem for the best interests of the county.

On motion of Story of Laconia, it was voted that the incoming County Commissioners and the incoming Sheriff be instructed to investigate the condition of the county jail and procure plans and specifications for such alterations as they think necessary and report at some future time to this or some other convention.

On motion of Holmes of Tilton, it was voted to adjourn,

Commissioners' Report.

In compliance with the laws of the state the annual report of the Commissioners is herewith submitted, together with the reports of the superintendent of the county farm, treasurer, clerk of the supreme court, solicitor, sheriff, jailer, physician and auditors.

The appropriation for the current year was \$30,500. The amount paid out by the Commissioners for the support of external poor for the year ending Dec. 31, 1899 was \$12,745.72.

The county farm, house of correction and jail has been under the management of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Weymouth, superintendent and matron. They have given excellent satisfaction, and are so well known throughout Belknap County that they need no recommendation at our hands, and their services have been secured for the next current year.

In accordance with a vote of the County Convention, the Commissioners have purchased the Mathes lot, so-called, at an expense of \$500, which is quite an addition to the farm as it connects the ox pasture with the home farm, making the farm contain about 350 acres in one body.

The condition of the farm at the present time is excellent; the fields are in a high state of cultivation and produced last year hay and fodder enough to fill the barn, which is 150x40 feet. It also produced about 900 bushels of ears of corn; 400 bushels of potatoes; 250 bushels of oats. There has been raised on the farm and slaughtered 4089 lbs. of pork; 2460 lbs. of beef; 564 lbs. of veal; 222 lbs. of poultry; 3160 lbs. of butter has been made, of which, after supplying all wanted

for use on the farm, over 1200 lbs. have been exchanged for groceries. In addition there has been raised :

The walls and fences are all free from weeds and bushes, and are in good repair.

The Commissioners have moved the hydrant in front of the house on to higher ground so as to obviate the danger of freezing from surface water; they have also had another hydrant placed in the rear of the main house so that it can be operated for both house and barn and all the outbuildings. We have installed electric lights throughout all the buildings at an expense of about \$400, thus doing away with all lights by kerosene oil, we now feel that risk of fire is greatly diminished. We have also had the space between the wings of the main buildings concreted so as to prevent the surface water running into basement, at a cost of \$90.95; also have had the lightning rods all thoroughly repaired, at an expense of \$24.50, all of which improvements have been paid and charged to the expense of running the farm. It has not been necessary to make any but minor repairs to any of the buildings. The Commissioners are happy to state that the buildings are now in good condition and need no repairs.

By vote of the County Convention, we have had metallic

furniture put in the vaults of the Clerk of the Court and Probate office. You now have as near a perfect system of keeping all records as it would seem possible to obtain. The expense of this has been \$1000. The present year we have made a contract with the Laconia Electric Lighting Company to furnish electric lights at the farm for the minimum price of \$200 per year for five years, which we think more advantageous than to have a plant at the farm.

Solicitor's Report.

At the May Term, 1899, thirty cases were on the continued docket, twenty-one of which were for the illegal sale of liquor and one perjury case growing out of the violation of Chapter 112. The number of persons who were indicted on the foregoing indictments were five, and four of them have fled the state. Learning where the respondent was who was indicted for committing perjury, at my request the officers of the state where he was located promptly had him arrested and he was brought to our county and confined in jail, and afterwards entered a plea of *nolo contendere* before the court, which plea was accepted and the court imposed such fines and costs and made such orders thereon as justice and the welfare of the state seemed to require. One other party was also located and confined in jail and at this term of court entered his plea of *nolo* to all cases against him, and was sentenced to pay a fine and costs, with a jail sentence suspended during good behavior. Not knowing of the whereabouts of the other three respondents, their cases were placed on file subject to the call of the Solicitor.

Of the remaining seven cases on the docket, two were for adultery, and the respondents having left the state and their whereabouts being unknown, the cases were placed on file with the usual orders made in such cases. One other indictment was for violation of the pauper law, the respondents being residents of Vermont, the same marking was made. Two others were for practicing medicine without a license, and the cases were continued. In one other case the respondent broke jail and fled, his whereabouts are unknown up to the present time, the case is placed on file nisi; one other con-

tinued case was for peddling teas, coffees, etc., without a license, this case was reserved and sent to the full bench for a decision and was afterwards dismissed by order of the court. The remaining case was for contempt of court in not appearing to testify before the grand jury, and was placed on file during good behavior.

Forty-nine new indictments were found by the grand jury, one appeal was sent up from the town of New Hampton from a Justice of the Peace decision, and one case was brought forward by the Solicitor. The appeal case was dismissed, no parties appearing in court to prosecute the same. The case brought forward by the Solicitor has not yet been determined. Fourteen liquor indictments were found against one party who left the state before the grand jury made its report, and has not since returned, Nine other liquor indictments were found against one other person who was sentenced to pay fine and costs, which order was complied with, a jail sentence of six months and \$100 fine was also imposed, not to be brought forward except on the call of the Solicitor; one other liquor indictment was found against a woman, who having left the county, plea of *nolo* was accepted and the case placed on file. The remaining indictments were: five for breaking and entering, five for false pretenses, six for robbery, one bawdy house, three for adultery, two for arson, one for assault on an officer, two aggravated assault. There were five jury trials on the above indictments, in which all of the parties were convicted, three were sent to state prison for various terms, and two to jail. Two of the indictments were marked not to be brought forward nisi, six not to be brought forward on payment of costs, two were dismissed, nine continued, one received a sentence of a year in jail, and one a year in jail, not to be brought forward nisi.

At the November Term, 1899, twenty-five continued cases were on the state docket, fifteen of which were for violation of Chapter 112 of the Public Statutes and being unable to locate one of the respondents, fourteen of the cases were

marked not to be brought forward nisi, the other liquor case was continued. The remaining cases on the continued docket were disposed of as follows: one case has been partially heard before the court, six were marked not to be brought forward nisi, one continued, one nol prossed, and one committed to the insane asylum.

The grand jury returned two indictments for the abuse of a female child under sixteen years of age, and the cases were continued to await the decision of civil cases growing out of the same offense; two for forgery in which the respondent plead *nolo*, and was sentenced to two years in state prison on one indictment, and one year on the other and to pay costs, and on the payment of costs mittimus not to issue except on the call of the Solicitor; three for obstructing an officer, a plea of *nolo* was entered, and upon payment of cost the cases were marked not to be brought forward; one cruelty to animals, fine \$10 and costs; one keeping liquor for sale, continued; one keeping cider for sale, fine \$10 and costs; thirteen for violation of the liquor law against one person, who was sentenced to pay fines amounting to \$470 and six months in jail, upon payment of cost and one fine mittimus not to issue except upon call of the Solicitor. There was presented to the grand jury a complaint against a person for being a tramp with the result that the grand jury returned no bill by reason of insanity and the respondent was committed to the insane asylum.

It will be noted that for all violations of Chapter 112, where complaint has been made, your Solicitor has labored to secure indictments enough in each case so that no person indicted could continue the business in our county, the respondent has been made to pay costs and such fines as his circumstances would permit and made to understand any further violation of the law would certainly bring confinement in jail. In addition to the above indictments I have through the medium of the police court, closed three saloons or places where beer or whiskey was sold.

In conclusion, the law requires that besides the above report I should give statistics regarding the crimes and misdemeanors in my county and such recommendations as in my judgement the public good requires. I have no statistics at hand with the exception of the report of the City Marshal of Laconia, which report shows the following number of arrests :

The large number of arrests for the misdemeanor of drunkenness will be noticed, and I am convinced, after the careful examination of the circumstances, that they are largely chargeable to the sale of liquor by travelling agents to individuals, to be delivered in some other state. I caused one of these agents to be arrested; but after a careful examination of the law I was forced to the conclusion that there was nothing in our statute which prohibited a person from taking an order for spirituous or malt liquors for individual consumption (not for sale) of the purchaser, the goods to be delivered and paid for in a state in which sale was legal. I am informed, on what I deem to be creditable authority, that over one hundred packages were received by different public carriers in this city within ten days of Christmas and New Years. Until there shall be some law which will prevent such orders being taken, I am satisfied drunkenness will increase and more liquor will be consumed from this method of sale from year to year.

Auditors' Report.

We submit herewith our fifth semi-annual report of the audit of the several accounts as required by law.

We have examined the several accounts of the county commissioners for services and expenses from January 1, 1899 to July 1, 1899, and are of the opinion that the sums charged for services are for time actually spent in the business of the county, and that the sums charged for expenses are reasonable.

We have also examined the accounts of the treasurer, and find them correct with proper vouchers for all payments made by him. We have compared the orders paid by the treasurer with the records of orders drawn by the county commissioners and find that they agree and that the treasurer had paid all orders drawn by them.

The treasurer had on hand January 1, 1899, as the last report shows, \$13,669.88. He has received from all sources, including \$5,969.06 advanced by the bank, \$6,071.61, making a total of \$19,741.49. He has paid out on orders drawn by the commissioners, \$14,910.06; on orders by the court, \$3,596.51, for coupons on bonds \$1,080.00, making a total of \$19,586.57, which leaves cash on hand, \$154.92.

We have also examined the accounts of Herman C. Weymouth, superintendent of the county farm, from January 1 to July 1, and find his total receipts from all sources are \$430.66, which he has on hand.

We have examined the several accounts of the county commissioners for services and expenses from July 1, 1899, to January 1, 1900, and are of the opinion that the sums charged for services are for time actually spent in the business of the county, and that the sums charged for expenses are reasonable.

We have also examined the accounts of the treasurer and find them correct with proper vouchers for all payments made by him. We have compared the orders paid by the treasurer with the records of orders drawn by the county commissioners and find that they agree and that the treasurer has paid all orders drawn by them.

The treasurer had on hand July 1, 1899, as the last report shows, \$154.92. He had received since then from all sources, \$33,842.83. He has paid out on orders drawn by the commissioners, \$11,193.31; on orders by the court, \$2,480.87; on temporary loans, \$7,987.40 and coupons on bonds \$940.00, making a total of \$22,601.58, which leaves cash on hand, \$11,396.17.
