ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT**State of New Hampshire**

To the inhabitants of the Town of Benton qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Community Building in said Benton on the first Tuesday of March next (the 6th) at seven-thirty o'clock in the evening to vote and act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk; one Selectman for a term of three years; one Treasurer; one Tax Collector; one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years; one Sexton; one Auditor; and all other necessary Town officers and agents for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$159.16 as the Town's share for construction of highways (Town Road Aid) as provided in Chapter 241 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$84.14 for the White Mountains Region Association.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the Cottage Hospital Volunteer Ambulance Service.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for support of the White Mountain Community Services, Inc.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal of \$4,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as a set-off against budget appropriations for Town Road Construction; and, further, to authorize the Selectmen to make a reduction in the amount if estimated entitlements are reduced.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to approve the sale on June 30, 1972 of a 1966 Chevrolet dump truck with plow and sander, and of an inoperable 1960 Chevrolet dump

truck for use as parts, to James W. Elliott and Bruce J. Enderson, d/b/a E & E Contractors, for the sum of \$2,250.00; if approval is not received, conditions of the sale require return of the \$2,250.00 plus accumulated interest to said Elliott and Enderson.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize payment of \$2.00 per hour for hourly labor performed for the Town as of this date.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to make any alterations in the amount of money to be raised and appropriated for the ensuing year as recommended in the budget and will vote to raise and appropriate all sums so determined.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of officers and agents as printed in the Town Report.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money for current indebtedness of the Town during the ensuing year in anticipation of taxes collected for the year 1973 and to be paid therefrom.

Article 12. To see if the Town will authorize a discount on current property taxes paid before a date set by the Selectmen if all previous taxes are paid, and to set the amount of said discount.

Article 13. (By petition—Article A) To vote by Ballot to have article in town warrant and to give all town voters a chance to bid on any and all property that the town sees fit to dispose of, and make bids to Selectmen to be opened on a said date and that all bids will be open to public place at time of opening on said date.

Article 14. (By petition—Article B) To vote by ballot to see if voters will vote to allow the playing of Beano and card games in Town Hall and to set a minimum fee for same.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Community Building in said district on the 6th day of March, 1973, at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose one Member of the School Board for a term of three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of other officers or agents of the district.
6. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for, and to receive, in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and/or State of New Hampshire.
10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

I herewith submit my eighth annual report to the voters of the Benton School District.

Your school board is recommending a budget for 1973-74 of \$29,414.54. This figure represents an increase of \$1,835.60 over last year's budget, which is approximately a 6.6% increase.

For the first time in several years our tuition payments for in-state students has decreased. Our breakdown for next year, which does not provide for any new students, is as follows:

Elementary	18 students @ \$700	\$12,600
Junior High	4 students @ \$800	\$ 3,200
High School	7 students @ \$975	\$ 6,825

Over areas where increases are noted are transportation, \$200—Supervisory Union expenses, \$49.60—Special Education tuition, \$923—total District liability for special education transportation, \$923—and a deficit appropriation of \$765.

Considering the status of our inflationary economy and the spiralling costs of everything, our Benton School budget is in line.

May I take this opportunity to thank the Benton School Board and the voters for their support during the past year.

SUPERVISORY UNION #23
REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent.

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the schools for the previous school year ending June 30. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union #23, during 1972-1973, will receive a salary of \$18,775.00, which is made up as follows: \$2,500.00 to be paid by the State Department of Education and \$16,275.00 prorated among the several school districts. Allowance of \$1,500.00 for travel within the Union is also prorated as stated above.

REPORT OF THE WHITE MOUNTAINS REGION ASSOCIATION
SUMMARY PROGRAM OF THE WHITE
MOUNTAINS REGION ASSOCIATION
1972 — (35th Year)

The officers and directors held two meetings to re-assess the goals and projects of the Association to make them more meaningful for the 1970's. Out of these two, eight hour sessions came agreements on five programmatic objectives. They were the need to insure a quality environment, orderly development, improved public transportation facilities, vocational training, and the need for a community college. The first objective has received the most attention since these sessions were held. In this regard the Association sponsored a workshop on air pollution in Berlin.

The Association has spoken out on the need to preserve the small family farms and, thus, it has actively supported the Open Space Bill, HB44. The Bill permits selectmen to tax land upon current use instead of its potential value. The Association spoke out in support of this Bill at a senate hearing in Concord and contacted the state senators and representatives in the region notifying them of the Association's position on the subject.

The Association sponsored a very successful sewage conference in Waterville Valley. Billed as a "sharing of ideas" the conference dealt with some new concepts in sewage treatment such as combining wood wastes with sewage to make fertilizer.

The Association organized a hearing on regional planning in Twin Mountain and worked with the Town of Carroll in setting up what turned out to be the most successful snowmobile hearing in the State.

Finally, as an integral part of its annual meeting the Association, held a very exciting panel discussion on "Development/Environment." Gov. Frank W. Sargent of Massachusetts, a former commissioner in the Department of Natural Resources there, addressed the group following the annual dinner on a theme in keeping with the theme of the meeting, "Best Use of Our Natural Resources."

Non-environmental Association activities for the past year included: help in preparing background information for the Berlin and Whitefield Airports for the hearings in Concord before the Civil Aeronautics Board; creation of a new Association logo and a very successful fall foliage shunpike folder; continued promotion of the off season through news releases and the sponsorship of several canoe races, the most ambitious and successful of which was the New England Canoe Slalom held in Campton. Also, the Association assisted a group in Berlin develop a plan for a hotel trade learning course.

In preparation is a canoeing folder, which, if enough advertising can be sold, should be out well before Spring of 1973.

Organized a meeting and prepared a statement regarding the then proposed visitor's information center on the Kancamagus Highway with the U.S. Forest Service.

Presented awards to 4-H Clubs in both Coos and Grafton Counties.

Appeared on six radio programs, attended one travel show in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, and spoke before several groups in the Region.

Inquiries for the year totaled 5,501.

Wrote 45 news releases and 126 personal letters.

Also wrote five newsletters, "Recreation Pressures in the White Mountain National Forest," "New Year's Resolution!," "Our Open Space", one on the "Sewage Conference", and a personal newsletter by John P. Wilson.
