

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Boscawen in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Boscawen on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To choose a delegate to the Constitutional Convention.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
 - (a) Town Officers' salaries.

(b) Town Officers' expenses.

(c) Election and Registration expenses.(d) Expenses Town Hall and Other Town Bldgs.

(e) Police Department.

(f) Fire Departments.(g) Moth Extermination.

(h) Health Dept. including District Nurse.

(i) Sewer Maintenance and Rubbish disposal.

(k) Town Highway maintenance.

(1) Street Lighting.

(m) Libraries.

(n) Town Poor.

- (r) Interest on Notes.
- (s) Insurance Premiums.

- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for Blister Rust Control.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$532.89 for Town Roads Aid or Class V Highways.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for W. P. A. Projects.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,650.77 to reimburse the town for labor and materials used completing Water Street for State acceptance as a State Aid Road.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to cover the town deficit of the previous year.
- 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for payment on principal of Town Debt.
- 10. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes on short term notes an amount not exceeding \$25,000.00.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to transfer money from one appropriation to another.
- 12. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

BOSCAWEN PUBLIC LIBRARY

The schedule at the Library maintains these hours the year round, namely:—Tuesdays, 2:00 to 4:30 o'clock; and 6:30 to 8:00 o'clock. Saturdays 2:00 to 4:30 o'clock.

Penacook Branch maintains these hours, namely:—Wednesdays 3:00 to 8:00 o'clock.

The circulation has greatly increased and during the winter months when many people were unemployed, the library proved very helpful. The circulation averages about 300 books weekly and much credit is due the librarian and her assistants.

Sub-stations still continue at the High St. school and the Water St. school, where books for adults are available, also an added Sub-station at the Merrimack County Farm.

The Vacation Reading Club was conducted as usual with 32 registering at Boscawen and 30 at Penacook. Through the cooperation of the school teachers and librarian the pupils have become more interested in the use of the library. National Book week was observed at the Penacook Branch with the meeting held at the Main Street school in the assembly room. Miss Katherine Pratt, field worker for the Public Library Commission reviewed several books in reference to animals. Mrs. Marjorie Sturm of Concord gave a chalk talk. The librarian, Mrs. Marjorie Emery awarded the certificates to the boys and girls who completed the work required in the club.

In the town hall at Boscawen an interesting program consisting of one act plays, musical numbers and recitations were presented by the pupils of the Water street, High street and Plains schools. The librarian presented the certificates to the boys and girls. There was an attendance of about 150 at each entertainment. The Penacook Congregational Church enrolled in the reading contest, also the Boscawen

Congregational church, for the first time, with an enrollment of 17.

The librarian attended the District meeting at Canterbury, accompanied by one of the trustees, Mrs. Alice M. B. Ranney. Mrs. Emery was re-elected Secretary and Treasurer. Mrs. Emery attended several sessions of the summer library school at Manchester also the annual meeting of the New Hampshire Library Association held at New London, when she was re-elected Secretary of the Association. Others attending the meeting were Edward Webster, library trustee, Mrs. Webster and Mrs. Villa H. Wight.

The librarian and her assistant, Mrs. Emma Flanders had an attractive booth at the Community Fair sponsored by Ezekiel Webster Grange, which portrayed "Books in the Home."

Circulation this past year has been 20,145; an increase of 5,346 over last year. Adults—fiction 11,077; non-fiction, 1,591; Juvenile—fiction, 3,781; non-fiction 2,230; magazines, 1,466, an increase of 499 over last year.

305 books have been added—28 by gift and 277 purchased. We would express our thanks to the donors, Mrs. Llewellyn Fletcher, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Webster, Miss Marion Dickson, Mrs. Wiggin, Mrs. Margaret Harris, Frank L. Gerrish Estate, Rev. Asa M. Parker and Miss Lucy K. Gage.

First town reports from the year 1857 to date have been collected and bound in six volumes.

Frank L. Gerrish, one of the donors of the library and a valued trustee for many years, died December 1, and is greatly missed by his associates in the library work.

During the Christmas season the library was attractive with two lighted trees and wreaths.

- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officers and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.

- 9. To see if the district will raise and appropriate fifty dollars (\$50.00) for expense of administration.
- 10. To see if the district will raise and appropriate eightythree dollars and forty cents for insurance.
- 11. To see how much money the district will raise and appropriate for transportation of children living less than two miles from school.
- 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens:

This year the School Board is using for the first time the Warrant for the District Meeting which was prepared to fit the Budget Form used by all State Aided Districts.

Under Article 8, the entire budget, except Special Appropriations Proposed, is open for discussion, and for amendment if desired. "Special Appropriations Proposed" are presented under added articles in the Warrant.

In the budget for 1938-39 the Board is asking for \$6 more than last year for the Support of Elementary Schools and \$160 less for Other Statutory Requirements. Under Special Appropriations, Expenses of Administration is \$100 less. The amount needed for insurance has not yet been definitely figured. Assuming that it is no higher than last year the amount asked for is \$254 less than in last year's budget, as printed. At last year's meeting \$1,225 was added for steam heat and new toilets at the Plains School, also \$750 for transportation of children living under two miles from school. The Warrant contains an article under which similar action on transportation may be taken this year, if desired.

The total amount required last year to meet the School Board's budget and special appropriations was \$18,664.96. This year, assuming that the same amount is raised for insurance and transportation under two miles, \$17,185.96 is required, which is \$1,479.00 less than last year. Since, however, estimated income this year is \$1,468.26 less than the final estimate at last year's meeting, the budget calls for a school tax only a few dollars less than last year.

State Aid for the coming year is \$390.26 less than estimated a year ago and no balance at the close of this year is anticipated. The balance of \$1,250 estimated for June 1937 turned out to be a surplus (cash balance, plus accounts

due us) of \$1,031.36 when the books were closed June 30. This surplus was not the result of too generous appropriations at the previous annual meeting, but because Penacook Union School District paid us \$1,947.07 in settlement of balances due us on the transfer of the territory embraced within the former Special District, No. 7, to Boscawen Town District.

Most of the tables in last year's Superintendent's report covered only the four schools in the north end of Boscawen while this year all eight schools in town are included. The membership in the four schools last year was about the same as the previous year, but cases of tardiness were less than half as many. The children attending high school in the fall of 1937 are fifty-seven, ten less than the previous year.
