TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Chesterfield on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at 6:30 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects: (Polls will open at 10 A.M.—Close not earlier than 10:00 P.M.)

Article 1. To vote by Australian Ballot for all necessary Town Officers.

Article 2. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 4. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums, as approved by the Budget Committee, for:

1. Town Officers' salaries	\$3,085.50

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,200.00 for street lighting. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote raise and appropriate the sum of \$482.94 (six cents per \$1,000.00 of the Town's equalized valuation) to the Monadnock Region Association, an agency to advertise, promote, and preserve the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the other 37 Towns of the Monadnock Region. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$624.00 as its fair share of the operating cost of the Elliot Community Hospital. (\$400.00 approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,122.47 for Town Road Aid, thereby receiving an additional \$7,483.14 from the State.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$12,000.00 for Winter Maintenance of roads. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,000.00 for Summer Road Maintenance. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a new Fire Truck of Class A specifications like the one purchased in 1961 and now in the Center part of Town. Cost not to exceed \$15,700.00 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,700.00 this year. The balance to be paid in ten yearly payments of \$1,400.00. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$3,000.00 to continue the Road Improvement Plan on our Town Highways. The location of the work to be under the supervision of the Selectmen in cooperation with the Road Committee. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum not to exceed \$16,000.00 for the purchase of a Four Wheel Drive Front End Loader, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 this year. The balance to be borrowed on long term notes and to be paid in five yearly payments of \$2,700.00. (Not approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$18,000.00 to erect an addition to the Town Hall, consisting of kitchen, Selectmens' office, waiting room, Town Treasurer's room, toilets, and meeting room. \$2,000.00 to be raised by taxation, the balance by long term notes of \$2,000.00 per year. (Submitted without recommendation.)

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to improve the Town Hall by making the following alterations:

1. Insulate all ceiling and floor space.
2. Remove stage and utilize space for modern flush toilets and kitchen facilities.
3. Renovate and enlarge present south toilet area for office of Selectmen. North toilet area to be used for furnace room and office space for Town Treasurer.
4. Install oil fired heating system to heat entire building. Credit allowance on present system to be included in any cost estimate.
5. Complete such wiring, painting, roof repair, and other necessary repairs that the Selectmen and Building Committee deem necessary, so long as the total cost does not exceed \$9,000.00.

The Building Committee to be appointed by the Moderator and to consist of no more than three members, exclusive of Selectmen.

The nine thousand dollars to be raised in the following manner: \$3,000.00 to be raised by taxes in the year 1964, the remainder to be borrowed on short term notes, to be paid off at the rate of \$2,000.00 per year over the next three years. (Submitted without recommendation.)

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of

\$2,500.00 to install flush toilets off the small meeting room of the Town Hall. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 to defray the cost of the Spofford Bridge. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 (three hundred dollars) to erect and letter a permanent memorial marker at the site of the first white settler in West Chesterfield. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,000.00 to improve the road leading to the residence of Henry Hellus from Route 9. (Not approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise an amount of money not to exceed \$4,000.00 for the purchase of land and the development of it for cemeteries. (Submitted without recommendation.)

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$100.00 to defray any costs which may arise in connection with the purchase of land for cemeteries. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to use part of the Road Improvement money necessary to widen the road known as Canal Street in Spofford, opposite the residence of Harry Allen.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to repair and re-set head stones and markers in the Town Cemeteries. The sum for this purpose to be taken from the interest of the Etta Hubbard Trust Fund left for the upkeep of cemeteries, commencing with the Atherton Hill Cemetery.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to choose Delegates to the Constitutional Convention.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote on the question "Shall sweepstake tickets be sold in this city or town?"

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$150.00 from Horatio Colony, the income from same to be used for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Warren Burial Lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 29. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

TOWN MEETING, 1963

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire, called at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 12, 1963.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, James E. O'Neil at three o'clock in the afternoon and the Warrant through Article 1 read by him. He then declared the polls open for voting by ballot for Town Officers.

At 6:30 P.M., Norman L. Amidon as Assistant Moderator and Mildred W. Gauthier as Assistant Clerk took their oaths of office before the Clerk and at 6:45 the Moderator called the meeting to order for acting on the Articles of the Warrant.

Harry E. Winn, School District Moderator explained the procedure to be taken in regard to the tie vote for School Board Member.

The Articles of the Warrant were then disposed of as follows:

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid W. Pearson and supported by Joseph James to dispense with the reading of the rest of the warrant. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 2. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Glenn B. Chickering to use the same method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year as in the past. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clifford E. Chickering and supported by George E. Joslin to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. Glenn B. Chickering as Chairman of the Budget Committee reported that they had had three meetings and one public meeting and that their report is given on pages 28 to 31 of the Annual report and that they would be glad to answer any questions. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Joseph James to adopt the report as given. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 5. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clifford Amidon and supported by Winford Chickering to amend the

amount of "Expense of Fire Dept." in this article to read \$3500.00. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by Clifford Amidon to amend the \$3500.00 to \$4200.00 for work needed on the Center Station to get the Village on an E2 rating. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Glenn B. Chickering and supported by Russell Johnson to raise and appropriate the following sums:

Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 6. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by H. Claude Mowry to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,200.00 for street lighting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Joseph James to raise and appropri-

ate the sum of \$475.74 (six cents per \$1,000.00 of the Town's equalized valuation) to the Monadnock Region Association, an agency to advertise, promote, and preserve the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the other 37 Towns of the Monadnock Region. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Joseph James to amend the Article to read \$400.00 instead of \$617.00. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. Voted by voice vote on Article as amended to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 as the Town's fair share of the operating cost of the Elliot Community Hospital. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by Glenn B. Chickering to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,120.75 for Town Road Aid, thereby receiving an additional \$7,471.64 from the State. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 10. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert E. Woodman and supported by George E. Joslin to raise the sum of \$12,000.00 for Winter Maintenance of Roads. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George E. Joslin and supported by Winifred Cray to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Joseph James to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,000.00 for Summer Road Maintenance. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 13. Motion made by Barbara Hall and supported by Russell Johnson to vote the Article as read. This motion and its second were both withdrawn. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Grace Welcome to table Article 13 until Article 14 is taken up. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 14. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Joseph James to amend the Article to

use whatever amount is necessary to complete the bridge work and the balance to be used under the supervision of the Selectmen in cooperation with the Road Committee. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. Voted by voice vote on motion as amended, to raise the sum of \$3,000.00 to continue the Road Improvement Plan on our Town Highways and to use whatever amount of this is necessary to complete the bridge work and the balance to be used under the supervision of the Selectmen in cooperation with the Road Committee. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 13. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by H. Claude Mowry to amend the Article and raise \$2,000.00 on long term notes and raise \$3,000.00 this year. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the negative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Barbara Hall and supported by Ronald Guyette to build the bridge and re-open the road leading from West Chesterfield to Cobleigh Corner, and raise and appropriate the money by authorizing the Selectmen to withdraw the W.C. Bridge capital reserve fund of \$2,500.00 plus interest, and to borrow the sum of \$4,000.00 on long term notes to be paid in two yearly payments; and to raise the balance, not to exceed \$1,000.00 by this year's taxes. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 15. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul E. Welcome and supported by Oscar Ericson to pass over this Article concerning raising a sum not to exceed \$16,000.00 for the purchase of a Four Wheel Drive Front End Loader, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 this year. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and the Article passed over.

Article 16. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winifred Cray and supported by Lawrence Thomas to install lights in the hall if there is enough money available under this appropriation. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Motion made by Paul E. Welcome and supported by H. Claude Mowry to pass over the Article and H. Claude Mowry called for a paper ballot. This resulted as follows:

The Moderator declared the Article passed over. This Article was to see if the Town will vote to raise a sum not to exceed \$3,500.00 for the purpose of installing a furnace, new toilet facilities and insulating the ceiling in the Town Hall.

Article 17. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Lawrence Thomas and supported by George E. Joslin to pass over this Article to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed one thousand dollars to be used for reduction of the grade and correction of the hazard which exists on that portion of Welcome Hill road fronting on the property of Ralph Yeaw. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and the Article passed over.

Article 18. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Russell Johnson to pass over this Article concerning purchasing a new fire truck of Class A specifications like the one purchased last year. Cost not to exceed \$15,700.00 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,700. this year. The balance to be paid in ten yearly payments of \$1,400.00. The Moderator declared the vote passed in the affirmative and the Article passed over.

Article 19. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George E. Joslin and supported by Paul E. Welcome to pass over this Article concerning raising and appropriating the sum of \$2,000.00 for the repair and improvement of the "Old Swanzey Road," beginning at the intersection of the road leading to Stone's Mill (left) down to Hines Meadow. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and the Article passed over.

The meeting was recessed at 9:55 and turned over to the Planning Board for a public hearing on Articles 20, 21 and 22, after which the Moderator called the meeting to order again and continued disposing of the Articles.

Article 20. Motion made by Lester Chickering and supported by Harold Foster to pass over the Article. H. Claude Mowry asked for a show of hands. There were 23 hands in favor of passing over the Article and many hands against.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by R. Willard Beebe and supported by Leonard Laskowski to accept the following amendment to the Zoning Ordinance:

(1) To add Section C to Article II, to read as follows:

"C. After a public hearing and subject to approval of the Board of Adjustment, use of land and/or buildings for a commercial business or enterprise may be permitted pro-

vided such use will meet the following requirements:

- (1) It will not create local traffic congestion.
- (2) It will not be offensive to surrounding property owners in the form of lights, noise, smoke, dust, odors or fumes.
- (3) Any new commercial building or structure will not block the view of surrounding property owners.”

Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 21. Voted by voice vote on motion by R. Willard Beebe and supported by Lawrence Thomas to amend the Article to read “Trailer Coach” wherever the word “trailer” appears. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Joseph James to accept the following amendments as amended to the Zoning Ordinance:

- (1) To add, as a second paragraph in Article III, Section D, the following:
“No Trailer Coach or Mobile Home will be permitted in this area.”
- (2) To revise the first sentence of Article IV, Section B, to read as follows:
“B. A single Trailer Coach or Mobile Home may be located anywhere in the Town, except in the area specified in Article III, Section D, provided it meets the minimum standards as follows:”

Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 22. Motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Robert Woodman to pass over the Article. After discussion, Robert Woodman withdrew his support and the Motion was then supported by Robert Callahan. H. Claude Mowry asked for a show of hands and this resulted as follows: “Yes” had 18 votes and “No” had many hands up. The Moderator declared the vote carried in the Negative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by R. Willard Beebe and supported by Harry E. Winn to accept the following amendments to the Zoning Ordinance after the Moderator ordered a correction because of printer’s misprint to read “No emission” instead of “any emission.”

- (1) To add Section E to Article III, to read as follows:
“E. Subject to the approval of the Board of Adjustment, a home occupation may be permitted within the area specified in Section D, provided:

1. It is conducted by a resident of the premises.
2. Not more than one person not residing on the premises is regularly employed in connection with such use.
3. Adequate provision is made for off-street or off-road parking.”

(2) To add Section E to Article X, to read as follows:

“E. Home Occupation means any use conducted entirely within a dwelling or an accessory building which use is clearly incidental and secondary to the use of the dwelling for dwelling purposes and does not change the character thereof, and in connection with which there is no emission of noise, vibration, dust, fumes or smoke beyond the lot line. Any goods sold at retail shall be those manufactured on the premises.” Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 23. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George E. Joslin and supported by Glenn B. Chickering to ratify, approve and confirm the action of our Fire Departments in joining our Town to the Southwestern New Hampshire District Fire Mutual Aid System in 1958, and in agreeing that our Fire Departments may give and receive outside aid as provided in RSA 154 as amended. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 24. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George E. Joslin and supported by Glenn B. Chickering to repair and reset head stones and markers in the Town Cemeteries. The sum for this purpose to be taken from the interest of the Etta Hubbard Trust Fund left for the upkeep of cemeteries; commencing with the Atherton Hill Cemetery. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 25. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clifford E. Chickering and supported by Anna Hubner to have three new members appointed by the Moderator to fill the vacancies in the Historical Committee. This Committee to carry on with their program of locating historical sites within the Town, as recommended by them in their report of 1948, and bring an article in to the 1964 Town Meeting regarding the placing of a suitable marker at the roadside near the site of the home of the first settler. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 26. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul E. Welcome and supported by Lawrence E. Thomas that in sell-

ing old equipment such as Highway or Fire equipment for which the Town has no further need, that said equipment should be advertised and sealed bids asked for; that the bids should be opened on a specified date inviting any interested parties to be present at that time, and recommend that the money from such sale be put into a fund to purchase new equipment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 27. Voted by voice vote to amend the Article to read "That the Moderator be empowered to appoint a Committee of 5 citizens to work with the Selectmen to get information and figures on securing suitable land in the Spofford and Chesterfield areas for establishing cemeteries with perpetual care, the Committee to bring in its report and recommendations at the next Town Meeting." The year 1963 was a busy year in Chesterfield construction-wise. A total of sixty permits were issued. Seven permits were issued for new homes, five permits for trailer homes, seven summer homes, two new motels and a club house for the Spofford Yacht Club. The Evangelical Free Church is expanding and a new garage was built on Route 9. The balance of permits was for garages, additions and alterations.

FIREWARDS' REPORT

During 1963 we received 73 calls requesting assistance at fires. 437 pieces of apparatus were dispatched to handle these requests. For a comparison, during our first year, 1956 we dispatched 21 pieces of apparatus. A great example of the acceptance of Mutual Aid.

The Dispatchers handled approximately 30,000 telephone calls, over 400 in one 8 hour shift during the dry season in October. Our Radio log sheets show a total of 15,799 fire transmissions and 14,482 police transmissions. Our Fire radio network has 178 units, 23 police cars equipped.

We find an increasing amount of home monitors being put into service. Many departments are fully equipped with each member having one. Those living adjacent to the stations have wired house speakers from their Base sets. These home monitors have proven a valuable addition to the Depts. both for local fires and quick response for a Mutual Aid Call.

26 Stations have now been equipped with Tone decoders and the initial phone calls are being handled by the Dispatch Center. Additions are expected to be added to this number following Town Meetings.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

TO THE CHESTERFIELD SCHOOL DISTRICT

When last year's report was submitted, a new four-room addition had been in use about three months. There was a vacant classroom that was available for use when and if needed. The extra room is now being used because it became necessary to divide another grade into two sections and employ an additional teacher.

It was pointed out in the next to the last paragraph of last year's annual report that Chesterfield eventually and probably in the very near future will have to make a decision in regard to their educational program. The future looks the same this year and the choices remain the same. To repeat them, they are: (1) A decision as to whether to continue as a Grade 1-8 system versus a Grade 1-6 system. The former or Grade 1-8 system would eventually result in another building addition. (2) Arranging long-term tuition contracts for high school pupils or joining a cooperative school district.

Class size is at a point where it is not economical to divide the grades, but the classes are too large to be taught effectively. Mr. Bellavance and I are studying a plan for departmentalization for grades five, six, seven and eight which may tend to temporarily alleviate the problem for the upper grades. The plan will be submitted to the school board for approval and if approved, it will be used for the school year 1964-65.

As larger classes graduate from the elementary grades, increased high school enrollment and tuition costs are the result. There is an increase from 79 last year to 88 this year and the forecast for next year is 95.

The budget submitted at the annual meeting last March showed an estimated June 30th balance of \$5,000.00. The net end-of-year balance actually was \$14,935.00, a difference of \$9,935.00 which was used to reduce the amount to be raised by taxation. The actual amount raised by taxes was \$146,304.07 rather than \$158,199.50.

This year's budget shows an increase of \$7,555.00 which includes the deficit appropriation to be spent this current year. The amount of \$7,555.00 represents a 4.8% increase which compares very favorably with the usual 6 to 8% increase.

Chesterfield teachers participated with the other teachers of Supervisory Union No. 60 in a workshop held at the Walpole High School on September 3, 4 and 5. The teachers studied and discussed ways and means of how to keep the public better informed in regard to what is being done in the schools.

CHESTERFIELD SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

REPORT

July 1, 1962 – June 30, 1963

The Hot Lunch Program opened September 10, 1962, with Mrs. Louise Scharles as Manager and Mrs. Elli Herrick as her Assistant.

The reimbursement rate from Federal Funds remained at 5¢ for each Type A meal served. Under the Special Milk Program we received 4¢ reimbursement for each ½ pint of milk served. Each day we served from 190-230 balanced meals.

School Lunch Program Menus are made up in advance for the entire month and copies are given to each child and teacher; thus the parents know what the children are eating each day. Normal portions are served to the children according to their ages in presence of their class teachers. Children with good appetites can return for second servings.

Thanksgiving and Christmas Turkey Dinners with all the trimmings were served with the extra help of Mrs. Ethel Mills.

From the Government we received Surplus Commodities, which made it possible to keep up the present rate of 25¢ a meal.

Due to the increased number of children eating Hot Lunches it was necessary to purchase more Dinnerplates and Cutlery.

Also this year the School Lunch Program was managed without financial help from our township.

However, while writing this report, I consider it my duty to call attention to the facts, that the reimbursement rate was reduced from 5¢ to 4¢ per meal by the Government and also the Special Milk Program reimbursement was reduced by 2%.

Due to the reduced Government Support and higher cost of food, I believe it's questionable to be able to keep up the present rate of 25¢ per meal including milk, without support from other sources.

Our Principal Mr. Bellavance and his staff as well as Mr. Davis, our custodian, were always helpful supporting our program. I wish to thank them all and also Mrs. Elli Herrick, my assistant, for helping to make the Lunch Program a success.

Since dental health appears to be a particular problem with our students, it is hoped that with the help of the Dental Hygienist, the problem will soon be eliminated.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the citizens of Chesterfield:

School doors opened to a group of children slightly larger than the previous year. However, the new addition easily accommodated all those who entered. Even then one classroom was left vacant.

This condition did not remain. Grades 1 and 2 were found to be too large. We had expected this to some degree so provisions had been made to split these two grades into three groups. This did not wholly remedy the situation; therefore, thought was given to dividing grades 1 and 2 into four groups. Eventually this was done. As a result, our last empty classroom was used.

Previously, the complete faculty had consisted of eleven teachers. Now there were twelve: Mrs. Barbara Lammela, Grade 1A; Miss Dorothy Martin, Grade 1B; Mrs. Dorris Parker, Grade 2A; Mrs. Willa Moore, Grade 2B; Mrs. Eleanor Fuller, Grade 3A; Mrs. Eleanor Scripture, Grade 3-4B; Miss Judy Parody, Grade 4A; Mrs. Dorothy Dunn, Grade 5; Mr. Raymond Jobin, Grade 6A; Mr. Norman Blue, Grade 6B; Mr. George Adams, Grade 7; and Mrs. Joan Hurst, Grade 8. This number constitutes $1\frac{1}{2}$ teachers over the previous year. The reason for the increase lay in the extremely large size of some of the classes, especially in the lower grades where education is rightfully thought to be very important.

Curriculum

Under the previous arithmetic plan being taught in our school, the students were expected to memorize by rote a large number of rules and their applications. Though this approach was certainly well developed over the years, it had many failures when it came to what we call true learning. By this I mean it reduced the development of reasoning and enhanced memorization. Though memory is certainly an asset as we know it, there are times when sound reasoning must and should take over. It is said that what you understand you retain and that which you only memorize for a specific purpose is eventually lost. The latter part of this statement is true in respect to the old arithmetic.

With the new approach, which has been incorporated in all grades this year for the explicit purpose of better preparing our students, we hope to establish a base for reasoning rather than memorization. By doing so there is every reason to believe that our students will be challenged rather than bored, that they will eventually achieve far beyond their present levels, and as a result they will be able to compete more intelligently than was previously possible.

School Library

The school library was established with the help of the Chesterfield P.T.A., the Chesterfield School District, and the students in the 7th and 8th grades. All spent time and money in either the preparation, planning, or actual running of the library.

Our library presently contains nearly two thousand volumes. Though this is quite an improvement over the number previously available, it should be brought to your attention that many are not suited to an elementary school or are in very poor condition. We are also far below the recommended twenty-eight hundred volumes for a school our size. However, through funds from the Chesterfield P.T.A. and regular school funds, progress is being made.

N.D.E.A.

Every year the town appropriates money to match similar funds from the government. This makes it possible to buy equipment for science, arithmetic, languages, and guidance. We have, in previous years, bought materials to improve instructions, especially in science and arithmetic.

Now we hope to buy two pieces of equipment, an overhead projector and a tape recorder. Both of these can be used in all grades and also for many subject areas. With their use, a better

means of presenting some materials will be made available. This, in turn, will lead to a better education being offered to all the students in our school.

Maintenance

It has been felt by many in the community and by all visitors that our school is one of the cleanest in the area. This condition was accomplished through the efforts of Mr. Merton Davis and Mr. Edwin Wilkins. Both have spent many hours each day maintaining the building in its present state.

In addition to the regular maintenance, it was possible this year to paint one classroom, the two bathrooms in the main building, and the kitchen. This practice will probably be continued each year so that all our classrooms will be kept in good condition.

Christmas Program

Our annual Chesterfield School Christmas Program was held on Friday, December 20, in the school auditorium. Mrs. Madeline Tole, our new music teacher, directed and presented the program which represented some aspect of all the great religions. Many thought this to be a good idea and offered numerous flattering remarks.

In addition to the time put in by the teachers and Mrs. Tole, many of the children spent hours making hats, costumes, and large Christmas cards. Others decorated the stage and auditorium while some were rehearsing their parts and their songs. All of these were done with enthusiasm and a spirit which can only be found during the Christmas season.

SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

School District Meeting
Chesterfield Central School
Chesterfield, New Hampshire

March 9, 1963

The Meeting was called to order at 3:00 p.m. by the Moderator, Harry E. Winn, and the Clerk read the Warrant through Article 1. The Moderator then declared the polls open for balloting for the necessary School District officers.

Esther D. Bevis, Phyllis Henchey and Anna C. Hubner, ballot clerks, appointed by the School Board, took the oath of office from the Moderator.

The Moderator appointed Kenneth Wiggin Assistant Clerk, and Wayne Winn Assistant Moderator. They took the oath of office from the Moderator.

At 8:00 p.m. the Moderator again called the meeting to order and the Clerk read the remainder of the Warrant.

The Articles of the Warrant were then disposed of as follows:

Article 2. Voted on a voice vote on a motion made by Clara B. Wellington and seconded by James E. O'Neil that the Article to determine and appoint the salaries of school board members, and the truant officer, and to fix the compensation of any other officer or agent of the district be passed over. Motion declared by the Moderator to be passed in the affirmative.

Article 3. Voted by voice vote on a motion by Fred Korradi and seconded by James E. O'Neil that the Article to hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto be passed over. The motion was carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. Voted by a voice vote on a motion by Robert Woodman and seconded by Fred Korradi that the Article to choose agents, auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant be passed over. The motion carried in the affirmative.

H. Cluade Mowry, Clerk, asked the privilege of the floor to pay tribute to Agnes B. Chickering, retiring School Board Member, for her long, faithful and valuable service to the School District, and ask a rising vote of thanks by the citizens of the

district. There being no objections, he requested that this action be noted in the minutes of the meeting as a lasting tribute of her service. The standing vote was unanimous.

Through the efforts of Anna C. Hubner, a United States flag, flown over the nation's capital, was secured and accepted by Mrs. Agnes B. Chickering in behalf of Chesterfield Central School.

Article 5. Voted by a voice vote on a motion made by Anna C. Hubner and seconded by Joann Morse that the balance on hand on June 30th from the new addition building fund (1962 bond issue) be used to pay off the Ashuelot-Citizens National Bank note and the balance be used to pay off the bonds due in 1964-65. Motion declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. Voted by a voice vote on a motion made by Clara B. Wellington and seconded by Anna C. Hubner that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$168,849.50 for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officers, Auditors and Agents, for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriations of any sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, together with other income, the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. Voted by voice vote on a motion made by Clara B. Wellington and seconded by George E. Joslin to pass over the Article concerning the acceptance of a teacher consultant for Supervisory Union #60 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,093.50 to be used with similar appropriations for 1963-64 from the other districts in the Union to pay that portion of salary and travel in excess of the \$2,500 to be received from the State of New Hampshire. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. Voted by voice vote on a motion made by Fred Korradi and seconded by Arvid Pearson to authorize the School Board to enter into a tuition contract with the Keene School District for tuition at Keene High School. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. Voted by voice vote on a motion made by James E. O'Neil and seconded by Fred Korradi to authorize the School Board to enter into tuition contracts with Alley Hicks School, Austine School, and with the Brattleboro School District for tuition at Brattleboro High School and the other named schools.

Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 10. Voted by voice on a motion made by James E. O'Neil and seconded by Fred Korradi to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept and use in the name of the district, such advances, grants in aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States government or any department or agency thereof, or any state or private agency. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. Voted by voice vote on a motion made by Glenn Chickering and seconded by Clara B. Wellington to raise and appropriate four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) to be made available prior to June 30, 1963 as a deficit appropriation for teacher's salary caused by the employment of an additional teacher to assist with the heavy pupil enrollment during the present school year. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. Voted by voice vote on a motion made by James E. O'Neil and seconded by Lester Chickering that the School District give to the American Legion Post #86 ten (10) or as many as needed of the obsolete light fixtures from the Central School, and to give to the Town for use in the Town Hall as many as needed. Motion carried in the affirmative.

James E. O'Neil moved that the Moderator name a five (5) member committee to study all educational school problems and bring in recommendations. Seconded by Winford Chickering. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Winford Chickering moved that the Moderator be responsible for seeing that the names of the committee members be published in both local papers. Seconded by Lester Chickering. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Paul Welcome moved that the Building Committee for the new addition to the Central School be given a vote of thanks for the splendid job it did. Seconded by Joseph James. Motion carried in the affirmative, and a standing vote of appreciation was given the committee.

At 9:03 p.m. the meeting was recessed by the Moderator.

At 9:15 p.m. the Moderator declared the polls closed.

A count of the ballots showed 147 votes cast, resulting as follows:

For Moderator: Harry Winn had 104 votes, Kenneth Wiggin, George Barrett, Paul Lawton, and H. Claude Mowry each had

one vote. James E. O'Neil had 2 votes. Harry Winn was declared elected Moderator for the coming year.

For Clerk: H. Claude Mowry had 112 votes, Wesley Darling and Anna C. Hubner each had one vote. H. Claude Mowry was declared elected Clerk for the ensuing year.

For member of the School Board for the ensuing three years: Leonard A. Leskowski had 70 votes, Dorothy W. Thomas had 70 votes, Agnes Chickering had 2 votes, Lester Chickering, Esther Bevis, and Alice Kaiser each had 1 vote, and two ballots were blank. A tie resulted which was not broken.

For Treasurer for the ensuing year: Evelyn Winn had 116 votes, Grace Welcome and Barbara Hall each had 1 vote. Evelyn Winn was declared elected Treasurer for the ensuing year.

For two Auditors for the ensuing year.: Warren Allen had 39 votes, George Barrett had 24 votes, Karl Johnson had 19 votes, Joann Morse had 3 votes, George Marrow had 3 votes, Marilyn Hoag had 3 votes, Dorothy Thomas had 3 votes, Ray Clark had 2 votes, Prudence Mitchell, William Dittrich, William Mitchell, Winford Chickering, Marilyn Johnson, Lester Hadlock, Robert Goodell, Bruce Gauthier, Joyce Winn, Inez Laskowski, Jean Hubner, Paul Lawton, Robert Fredericks, Paul Welcome, Barbara Hall, Malcolm Sullivan, Ann Hall, Arvid Pearson, Dorothy Spaulding, Grace Welcome, Phyllis Henchy, James E. O'Neil and Anna C. Hubner each had one vote. Warren Allen and George Barrett were declared elected auditors for the ensuing year.

Harry Winn took the oath of office as Moderator from the Clerk, H. Claude Mowry. H. Claude Mowry, Clerk, and Evelyn Winn, Treasurer, took the oath of office from Harry Winn, Moderator.

At 10:12 p.m. the Moderator declared the meeting adjourned.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

During the past year New Hampshire faced the greatest forest fire threat to its woodlands in more than sixty years. The continued drought brought home to our citizens, as never before the potential threat of destructive fires to their beautiful and valuable forests, homes and livelihood. In true American tradition of meeting a common threat by volunteer effort, this fire danger was minimized by active prevention, patrol and a relinquishing of personal rights for the common good. It was the greatest demonstration of public cooperation ever experienced by those responsible for local and state fire control. The ready forces of volunteer fire services kept the losses low. For their effort and public response the general fire service expresses its heartfelt thanks for a job well done.

Prevention however, is not just an activity for the bad fire years. It must be practiced until it becomes a part of our public conscience—a habit. Just plain carelessness with fire causes too many of our fires.

The following practices and suggestions will help:

1. Always have a permit for outdoor burning and burn within the terms of the permit and in a safe place. Burn late in the afternoon when the wind is down or on rainy or damp days. Check your fire and if winds develop extinguish it promptly.
2. Carry your rubbish to the public dump—its safer. A neglected backyard incinerator causes many fires.
3. Never discard lighted cigarette or match. Make this a year round habit regardless of the safety of your surroundings.
4. Children caused fires are now a major concern. Keep matches away from them and teach them to respect fire and not make it a subject of play.

Lets all join with “Smokey the Bear” and “Keep New Hampshire Green” and growing in 1964.
