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TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Clarksville in the County of Coos in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Clarksville on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges in anticipation of taxes.
- To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to build a fireproof vault in the basement of the town hall, the same to be paid for by funds now in the new equipment account.
- To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be used with a similar amount raised by the Town of Pittsburg to run the town lines between Clarksville and Pittsburg.
- To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of \$150.00 from the Town Hall and Garage Account to build a cement box and put a roof over the Town Hall spring.
- 8. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to contract the plowing and sanding of the town roads for a period of three years if they consider it to be in the best interests of the town, and to enter into a contract for same on such terms and conditions as they, in their discretion, may deem to be in the best interests of the town.
- 9. To see if the Town will appoint a committee to look into the advantages and disadvantages of a planning board and zoning or do or act anything in relation to the same.
- 10. To bring in your votes on the following articles on the ballot:
 - Art. 1. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appro-

priate the sum of \$87.95 for the White Mountain Region Association.

Art. 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$165.00 as a contribution to the Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service to be used along with contributions from other towns in the area for Mental health care in the Upper Connecticut Valley.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Housing the school program and providing sufficient space for pupils is becoming an ever increasing problem. With changes taking place within the basic curriculum of elementary and secondary education and the addition of related services for pupils to include music, physical education, health, library, audio-visual, combined with an increase in the school population, however slight, local communities are now faced with school plants that are or are becoming inadequate to meet all these changes and needs.

Although revisions in school facilities have been made through the years to accompodate the changing school program, this has not been accomplished without the sacrifice of existing space or the increasing demand on the local taxpayers.

Vocational education is now becoming an important aspect in the secondary program. Rapid changes now taking place in occupational opportunities and vocational fields available to a student upon graduation are having a direct effect on the responsibilities of the secondary school program. Since a major function of education is to prepare a student for the future and to assist him in securing gainful employment, thought must be given to present vocational education programs and to their possible expansions to best meet the needs of those students who may not be financially able or desire to pursue a formal four year college program.

The concept of shared services by local and north country area school districts has made possible the sharing of a speech and hearing therapist as well as workshops for local teachers in the areas of art, audio-visual, and reading. The sharing of school facilities on a tuition basis has long been carried on by local districts and this year the voters in a number of districts will be asked to establish a planning committee to investigate the feasibility of a long term tuition contract under an Authorized Regional Enrollment Area (AREA) concept.

With the increasing expansion of educational programs and facilities it is strongly recommended that local districts continue working together in meeting these needs and in providing the most financially feasible solutions.

COUNSELING SERVICES DEPT.

Testing programs for achievement, ability, intelligence and interest take up a good percentage of the school counselor's time. In this report I will try to explain the implication and importance of these tests.

The first testing in the school year is required by the State of N. H. and records ability and achievement for grades 4, 6, 8 and 10 — the tenth grade takes an additional (SCAT) School and College Ability Test under this program. 310 students were tested in this program totaling 2,399 student test hours.

Next there is the (PSAT) Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test given to juniors and seniors planning some form of education beyond high school. 48 of our students took this testing totaling 144 test hours.

For college bound students there is the (ACT) American College Tests and the (CEEB) College Entrance Examination Board (SAT) Scholastic Aptitude Test and Achievement Tests. These tests are taken on Saturdays throughout the school year and involve the juniors and seniors. Some 30 of our students will take these tests this year totaling about 150 hours.

The (NMSQT) National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test is given to college bound juniors and if a student should qualify he would receive a \$1,500.00 merit scholarship. This year about 20 of our students will be tested covering about 60 test hours.

The (NEDT) National Education Development Tests record a student's intelligence and achievement in grades 7, 8, 9, and 10. The areas covered are English, math, social studies, science and vocabulary. 220 of our students are tested in this program totaling 1,320 test hours.

This year for the first time we will test our students "interests" — their likes and dislikes. This test, the (OVIS) Ohio Vocational Interest Survey, will be given to all seventh grade students and will total some 228 test hours. The interest survey results will be used with the other test scores and the students school marks to help determine what subjects in high school will best suit his needs.

In the 1970-71 school year over 700 students will be involved in these testing programs totaling more than 4,300 student test hours.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR VER-SHIRE SCHOOLS & SHOPS

Colebrook, New Hampshire

This program has provided an increasing opportunity for the students to participate in activities and experiences which may lead to productive employment. For some, the employment will be in private business and industry. For others, it will be in a sheltered employment situation.

The Specific Goals have been:

- 1. to instill a sense of personal worth and self-sufficiency;
- to identify and develop any skills and talents that can lead to productive employment in a secure environment;
- 3. expand the opportunity to socialize with others and gain community awareness and support.

Such goals have been more readily achieved in a setting other than the academic classroom, at home or in isolation from peers. Thus the socialization in a class with others who have similar needs has expanded limited surroundings and developed positive outlooks in an actual job environment.

Academics, as such, has not been abandoned since many trades and skills require certain academic skills which must be learned and practiced. It has been demonstrated that if certain students are unable to sufficiently develop a trade or skill they still are benefitting from an opportunity to work and socialize outside of their neighborhood environment.

Some of the Objectives that have been met:

- a. We have identified and evaluated present skill levels, strength and weakness of students in the program.
- b. We have developed and identified skills in the program of activities specifically designed for the students.
- c. We have aided the students to adjust and to function within the limits of their weaknesses,
- d. We have taken the basic steps in preparing the students as far as possible for possible productive employment in a community work setting.

The procedures which have been used to accomplish the above objectives include skill tests designed to establish competency

levels in sorting, shaping, discriminating colors, sizes and weights, making craft articles, sewing, cooking, leather, ceramics, wood working, upholstering, and furniture refinishing. In addition, procedures have been employed by the instructors to maintain and continue where possible, existing academic skills. These include instructions in basic skilled work in counting, reading, and lettering. The students have learned to understand the basic elements involved in keeping time, figuring wages and appreciation of the value of money earned as well as preparation for community involvement by having learned good work habits and acceptable employer-employee relations as well as the worthy use of leisure time.

The activities used in the workshop were deliberately chosen to develop work habit training, eye-hand coordination, finger dexterity and to afford the student access and training with tools in the sheltered shop setting. Each student has progressed to his present level of achievement at his own individual rate of speed.

The simplicity of the beginning task gives the student a feeling of success. This success has, in turn, encouraged the student to make greater effort in the next operation. The students' attention span has increased and they have a greater capacity to tolerate frustration as the result of their ability to master more complex activities. The students who have found success attainable in earlier products have moved ahead to more complex activities depending on the ability of their performance.

The program has been considered a pilot project and the local school officials, Northeast Kingdom Mental Health Service staff, have adopted positive elements of the project for other programs and hope to see it broaden both in scope and in number of students served by the program.

SCHOOL HEALTH

The objectives of a school health program are to perform the necessary functions to maintain and promote good health of the pupils in our schools.

The following services are performed each year: checking heights and weights, vision and hearing; physical examinations for all students in grades 4, 8, and 11 and athletics; T.B. skin tests as recommended by the state T.B. Association; necessary immunizations; pre-school clinics for incoming first graders; and continuous supervision of general health.

A dental health clinic sponsored by the local towns and the state in what is called a Matching Fund Program was held two mornings a week from January through May. Fifteen youngsters received treatment at these clinics.

In April, eighty-six youngsters in grades 1-4 were immunized against German Measles with vaccine made available by the state.

Starting in November, a Speech and Hearing specialist equipped with a mobile lab, visits the area once a week to work with some of our students who have speech and hearing problems. This is made possible by North Country Education Service, a Title III Project.

Every year we strive to improve the school health program. With everyone working together, it is hoped that we can achieve our goal in this endeavor.

VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE

Vocational Agriculture is a four year program at Colebrook Academy. Beginning with the ninth grade, students in the program receive introductory instruction informing them of basic agriculture and opportunities available in that field. Second year students are instructed in the basic principles of agricultural sciences involving shop, laboratory, and field trips. The objective of the first two years is to give the student an understanding of the economic importance of agriculture and a chance to learn of careers that the industry offers.

Third and fourth year students receive specialized instruction in dairy and forestry and are required to perform practical work in both fields. In addition, fourth year students are also required to take a course in farm mechanics to develop skills ranging from wood-working to engine rebuilding. A 40 acre school woodlot also provides an area for third and fourth year students to do practical work in forestry and sugar bush management.

A new Cooperative Education Program was started this year for fourth year students through the aid of federal funds. This program gives the student on the job training in mechanics, dairy, forestry, and related areas through released time from the last periods of the school day. As a new program, it has been unusually successful and at present there are 28 on the Cooperative Education Roster. Since this is a year round program, all students are required to do supervised summer placement work in a field of their choice and to keep records of the same.

The local chapter of the Future Farmers of America has been active since 1931. This is an intra-curricula organization that teaches students leadership, good citizenship through association, and development of skills through field and judging trips. The chapter also sends delegates to the national F.F.A. conventions where skills are further displayed and more skills obtained.

Enrollment in this department has doubled in the last three years.
