

TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Conway, County of Carroll, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Kennett High School Auditorium at Conway, New Hampshire, on Tuesday, the 6th day of March, 1973, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Article 1 and Article II will be by official ballot, and the polls shall open for balloting at nine o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before 7:00 o'clock in the evening. The remaining articles of the warrant shall be acted upon at 7:00 o'clock in the evening or at the closing of the polls if the meeting shall vote to keeep the polls open to a later hour

- ARTICLE I. To choose all necessary officers, and to vote on the zoning ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board.
- ART. II. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$205,000.00 for the new Swift River Covered Bridge, and to borrow and hire said money in accordance with the Municipal Finance Act, said money to be in addition to the \$295,000.00 voted by the Town at the 1971 Annual March Meeting, making the bonding authority for this purpose a total of \$500,000.00. (RSA 33:3, 8, 8-a, a-8-b) Recommended by Budget Committee.
- ART. 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes:

- ART. 4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$58,143.00 for expenditures on the new Swift River Covered bridge, and authorize withdrawal of that sum from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. Recommended by Budget Commission.
- ART. 5. To see if the Town will vote to construct a new entrance and parking lot on the south side of the Conway Public Library. \$9,300.00. Without recommendation by Budget Committee.
- ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the interest accumulated to the Mary E. Banfill School Trust Fund to the Conway School District and hereafter annually, according to the conditions of the fund. Recommended by Budget Committee. \$395.21
- ART. 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire upon the credit of the town such sums of money as may be needed, such sums not to exceed the combined School, Town and County tax budget, in anticipation of taxes for Town, County and School purposes.
- ART. 8. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell real estate in the Town to which the town has title by Tax Collector's Deed, such real estate to be sold and conveyed on or before December 31, 1973.
- ART. 9. To see if the town will vote to discontinue street vending in the township of Conway. Agreeable to a petition signed by David Badger and others. Submitted by Budget Committee without recommendation.
- ART. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500. and authorize and direct the Selectmen to publish and distribute to each taxpayer a list of all property in the Town of Conway, including property held by the Town for non-payment of taxes, showing Map and Lot number, owner, and valuations assessed as of April 1, 1972 and April 1, 1973. Agreeable to a petition signed by Maurice Lovejoy and others. Not recommended by Budget Committee.
- ART. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000. for a watertight shed at the Town Dump, to be used to store paper which is to be recycled. Agreeable to a petition signed by Donna Cianciola and others. Submitted by Budget Committee without recommendation.
- ART. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to be paid to the North Conway Airport Authority for the maintenance and plowing of the airport runway for the winter of 1973-1974. Agreeable to a petition signed by Mary Louise Tyler and others. Submitted by

Budget Committee without recommendation.

ART, 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,500.00 for the purpose of financing a Town of Conway National Bicentennial Celebration on July 4, 1976; Such sum to be placed in a Trust Fund for this sole purpose. And that the permanent five man 4th of July Parade Committee of North Conway Post No. 95. The American Legion: be authorized to act as the temporary National Bicentennial Parade Committee and to enter into contract, on behalf of the Town of Conway, with whatever musical marching units the Committee deems necessary for this occasion: The total amount contracted, not to exceed \$6,000.00 It also to be understood that this Committee is temporary until a permanent Committee is appointed by the Selectmen. All details as to time, place, etc., will be decided upon by the permanent Committee. The purpose of this article is only to guarantee that finances will be available for payment of the musical units so that contracts can be entered into with these units while they are still available. Agreeable to a petition signed by Dana A. Haley and others. Recommended by Budget Committee.

ART. 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to help defray the expenses of the Fourth of July Parade and Fireworks in North Conway as sponsored by North Conway Post No. 95, The American Legion; the total cost of which is about \$2,500.00 Said American Legion Post to pay the balance of the cost and to make no appeal for contributions for this purpose as has been done in the past. Agreeable to a petition signed by John Pandora and others. Recommended by Budget Committee.

ART. 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,380.11 as the Town of Conway's participation in the White Mountains Region Association. Submitted without recommendation by Budget Committe.

ART. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the Home Health Agency. Recommended by Budget Committee.

ART 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,530.00 to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service, Inc. Agreeable to petition signed by Pamela T. Fisher and others. Recommended by Budget Committee.

ART. 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to help defray the expenses of the Water Safety Program as carried on by the Conway Chapter of the American Red Cross. Agreeable to a petition signed by George W. Reny and others. Recommended by Budget Committee.

ART. 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 to be expended, in addition to any private or federal money which might be available, for the purpose of building

water supply ponds with attached dry hydrants to be used for fire suppression in rural areas, said water supply facilities to be the first portion of a program entitled "Plan and Inventory, Water Supplies for Rural Fire Suppression, Conway, N. H., 1972. Agreeable to a petition signed by Arthur A. Desjardins and others. Submitted by Budget Committee without recommendation.

ART. 20. To see if the Town will vote to release any claim to land, taken for a road under R.S.A. 234:23, in North Conway on the Easterly side of Main St., from the intersection of Pine St. and Main St. to the property of the Boston & Maine Railroad. Agreeable to a petition signed by Charles W. Whitaker and others. Submitted by Budget Committee without recommendation.

ART. 21. To act upon any further business that may legally come before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The year 1972 has been both a challenging and a productive year for the Town. We have continued to refine its management to meet the peoples' needs. In addition to an annual growth rate of 12%, we are receiving more and more visitors each year, which places great emphasis on the need for future planning of services and land use, if we wish to maintain the basic character and well being of Conway.

As of April first the Town's net valuation was set at \$45,394,000 an increase of \$3.5 million in a twelve month period. This increase enabled the Selectmen to hold the tax rate increase to \$.01 per \$100 of assessed value:

For the first time, the Selectmen and the School Board decided to conduct a joint census in considerably greater detail than before. The result showed an increase in the official population figure, from 4978 to 5594, which will mean more money coming to us from several State and Federal revenue sharing programs. Since the Town is growing so rapidly, another census will be conducted in 1973.

Last summer we were able to survey and establish the road boundaries of a number of town roads. In Conway: East Main St., River St., Pollard St., Wilder St., Greenwood Ave., Chase Ave., Farrington St., Pleasant St., the north end of Washington St., Oak St., Hillside Ave., and Muster Road. In North Conway: North Main St., with work partially done on Mason Road, Swett St., and Mechanic St. This work cost \$12,800 which will reduce the balance in the Trust Fund for Survey of Streets, but we will have more than enough left to carry out the proposed program for 1973. Planned for survey this summer in Conway are: Main St., Lake St., Tasker Hill Road, Quint St., West Main St., Kennett St., and Mill St. In North Conway: Grove St., "A" & Depot St., Artist Falls Road, Valley View, and Kearsarge Road. This survey work is all based on the original street layout. The need for the program arises from the fact that most of the street rights-of-way were never established by permanent boundary markers in the ground.

As many of you know, the Mt. Washington Valley Incinerator was not in operation for several periods during the year. This was because of a fire in the main building and reconstruction of the fire pit and pit screen. The cost of repairs after the fire was 80% covered by insurance, and the redesign and construction work in the pit

allows easier access for ash removal. Furthermore, the incinerator can now handle domestic glass. This makes the separation of household glass unnecessary, although commercial glass from bars, restauants, hotels and other businesses will still have to be separated and collected separately.

The other major construction projects during 1972 involved the Conway Village Sewer, Oak Street and Neighbors Row in North Conway and the entrance to Birch Hill on the West Side. A fantastic effort was made by the Conway Water Precinct to complete the sewage lines before winter set in. Except for completion of the pumping station and the purification plant, the project is largely completed and expected to start operation next August. Oak Street was completely rebuilt with a new drainage system and catch basins. Neighbors Row was rebuilt with the embankments graded to facilitate drainage and snow plowing, and the entrance to Birch Hill was widened to allow better access to the West Side Road.

The plans for the construction of the new Swift River Covered Bridge have been completed and accepted by the N. H. Highway Department. The construction bids have been and will be opened before Town Meeting. The Town will be asked for an additional bonding authority of \$205,000 because construction costs have increased and the 1971 estimated cost was based on a bridge with a clear span of 150 feet, a 24 foot roadway and no sidewalks. The present design calls for a 180 foot clear spand and a 26 foot roadway with sidewalks. The final total estimate is \$540,000, with approximately one-third paid by the State and \$58,143 from revenue sharing money received to date.

By computerizing the Town payroll this past summer we saved 10-12 man hours per pay period. Previously, it took 12 to 16 hours to write the pay checks and carry out the related bookkeeping. Today the same work can be accomplished in 2-3 hours. With the increased work load in the Town Office, we have been able to avoid hiring extra help by this change. An even greater saving resulted from having computerized our tax records two years ago, and this system continues to work well.

During the year, Jim Simonds gave 230 acres around "Pudden" Pond to the town. Two smaller parcels are expected to be given in 1973. The erosion control project was completed in East Conway and another is planned for the east bank of the Saco, just upstream from the "First" Bridge in North Conway.

Looking ahead to 1973, Conway can expect better television reception with the anticipated installation of cable TV lines. As soon as the Swift River drops in the early summer, construction of the new Covered Bridge will begin. The bridge will be designed for

20 ton loads with a 26x14 foot traveled way. The south end of the bridge will be located just upstream of the present bridge and the north end will be angled upstream for a straight entrance and clear visibility. On each side will be a covered 5-foot walkway for the safety of pedestrians and children on bicycles

This summer we plan an extensive road construction program: \$15,000 to be spent for general maintenance and \$59,000 planned for the reconstruction of the Conway Streets, of which \$11,000 is in escrow from the Conway Water Precinct and Audley Corp. and \$32,973.93 will be contributed from Highway Subsidy funds if the Town so votes. Work is planned for the following streets in Conway village:

In 1974 we plan to rebuild Farrington Street with new drainage and catch basins and resurface Rte. 16 from the intersection of Rte. 113 to the Steel Bridge, Lake St., Oak St., River St., Hillside Ave., Muster Road, Kennett St., and Mill St.

We would like to remind all resident voters in Conway that everyone must re-register this year during the spring. Also, many of you do not file for your Old Age or Veteran's exemptions in time to receive the tax benefit. Those qualifying for the Old Age exemption must file each year, while Veterans need only file once. However, we urge everyone to do this in April.

I have enjoyed serving the Town of Conway for the past three years. I hope that I have listened to your direction and helped to answer your questions and solve your problems. I want to thank all those interested citizens of Conway, my fellow Selectmen and the great crew at the town office for their help, patience and cooperation.

Report of Library Trustees

The library services continue to expand, and the growth this year has been very gratifying. There has been so much business to transact that the trustees have held seven meetings instead of the usual four; individual trustees and the librarian have devoted much of their time to the interests of the library.

At town meeting last year we asked for \$5700 to begin renovation of the basement. That amount was appropriated. The purpose of this was to provide a room for exhibiting the displays in the so-called Curio Room now being made into a Children's Room by gift of the Lucy Family in memory of their parents. But when we studied the matter of applying for a federal grant as a member of the State Library Development Program, we found that the conditions of such grants would make the relatively small operation of ours more expensive for the town than an independent operation. So we did not expend the \$5700, but did engage an architect to draw up plans for the work we should like to complete eventually, and his bill is \$1500, received this year and included in this year's budget. This year we are asking for \$4,800, under renovations and repairs, to fulfill a requirement of SLDP membership that the library must have running hot water; to install a good toilet for boys, to do some very necessary inside painting, and to provide a hook-up with the new sewerage system - in addition to \$500 for general maintenance. In a special article we are asking for \$9300 to begin the work on renovation of the basement: to provide an entrance to the building from a parking lot at the rear, an entrance hall, and stairway to the first floor.

The amount expended for books was \$2,908.56, though only \$2,500 had been budgeted and appropriated. The explanation of this is that the trustees voted to begin using the interest on memorial funds for the purchase of books each year, and the interest had been accumulating for a number of years. In 1973 the anticipated amount of interest is \$48,26.

We appreciate many advantages as members of the State Library Development Program for the past two years: Library of Congress cards, all classified for all books purchased, provided free, thus saving much time that the librarians can devote to other activities, besides being very convenient and economical; the book-buying meetings (at Bartlett, Jackson, Chocorua, Tamworth, Madison, and Conway Libraries) have been most helpful to the librarian in deciding what new books to purchase, as there are several hundred books brought for examination, and reports are given on the most noteworthy new books. Mr. Ralph Riley, the North Country District Consultant of the State Library, with office in Littleton, is available

for information and advice; a representative of our trustees goes to the meetings of the North Country District Advisory Council to present facts about our library and learn of the activities and problems of other libraries. The secretary has served as this representative since the library became a member of the program. Federal grants are also available to members.

Work on the Children's room is progressing; right now the heating system is being installed. The door from the stack room to the corridor outside the Children's room was cut through the wall last spring.

We take great pride in the gowth of our services. The report in "New Hampshire Library Statistics" of January 1, 1973, (always a year in arrears) shows that only one town in New Hampshire (Amherst) with population comparable to that of Conway had a circulation greater than that of Conway — even though our Public Library serves only Conway Village for the most part. We are glad that in recent years more and more residents of other sections of the town are availing themselves of their right to use the library in Conway; and in the past year we received \$223 in non-resident membership.

We are especially proud of our Outreach Program to Carroll County Shut-ins (the visually handicapped and physically debilitated), which was inaugurated in December, 1971, by Mr. Charles R. LaCasce, Adult Services Social Worker in the Welfare Department. From a small start it has grown during the year, with the support of many devoted volunteers, to a program serving 68 shutins and with a circulation of about 100 tapes a week. The number of tapes circulated between May 1, and December 31, 1972, was 1648. Our newly elected trustee, Rev. Ralph Seaver, who is minister to the elderly in the First Church of Christ, Congregational, has been of great help in the program. Mr LaCasce has been indefatigable in his efforts: every Monday morning he comes to the library with several volunteers and makes copies of the tapes made by the readers. Persis Berry and Golden White have been readers ever since the start, and Helen McBrearty made a tape a week for a year before she moved away from town. Other readers now are Dr. James Andrews, and Mr. William Fennel, who recently took the shut-ins on a tour of Wales, and who is going to make a tape a week while traveling abroad this summer. Rev. C. Weston Jones, a former minister in Conway, now living in North Fryeburg and badly crippled, is able to provide tapes of religious emphasis, much valued by the shut-ins. Church services have been taped: and so was last year's Fourth of July parade. Three tapes a week give three hours of listening.

There are eight volunteers distributing tapes regularly, and each one has a substitute available. At least two couples work 2½ hours

each week to help copy the tapes. Five tapes a week go to the County Home for those from the northern part of the County, and five different ones for those from the southern part. There have been four parties for the shut-ins, for which volunteers have provided transportation — one at the library. Mary Kennett and Kay Reed have been involved in this part of the program, which the shut-ins have enjoyed very much. It has been helpful in getting the members acquainted with one another and with the volunteers, and thus provides them with interests outside their homes.

There has not been a single volunteer drop-out.

The library received a federal grant of \$17,000 in May, 1972, which must be spent entirely on equipment — and within a year. So far \$11,035.84 has been expended, and to keep the commitment Mr. LaCasce expects to spend the remainder of the grant for hardware, extra tapes, and spare parts before May 1, 1973.

Many different activities have been fostered by the library; story hours for children at least once a month, a program of book reviews by William James, a talk on Food Buying for Quantity and Economy by Marion Stocking, moving pictures by Ernest Kroner; films on ecology, skiing, and Communist countries, and "Nanook of the North"; marionettes for Children's Book Week; Open House for Thomas Jenks Day, and for National Book Week; a book sale sponsored by the Conway Woman's Club in the summer, and a tea with the same sponsors at Mrs. Shumway Marshall's in December to raise money for the Christmas decorations provided by the Club. We are most appreciative of the interest and help of this club.

There has been a different exhibit every month: Art — a group of local artists, Kennett High School students, Eleta Kindergarten, James Reed (a schoolboy with some of his grandfather's paintings), water colors by Kathleen Andrews; water colors and enamels by Lucille Michaud; Japanese Collection by Mrs George Lopes; Decoupage, by Blanche Ostroski; a contest for children "If I Were an Artist" with prizes; books on China; Children's Book Showcase; Large Print and Talking Book display; an exhibit at the Carroll County Trust Company of books called "Family Favorites."

Headstart came in to visit several times. Other visitors were the Girl Scouts, and the Eleta Kindergarten.

We are grateful for the interest and generosity of all those who have helped us in these services, and we commend the devoted members of the staff: Margaret Marschner, librarian; Ethel Towle, asst. librarian; Loraine Duncan, Center Conway librarian; and special assistants Anna Carroll, Amy Gardner, and Tracy Gardner.

Report of Conservation Commission

On November 29th, 1972 the conservation commission received in the name of the Inhabitants of The Town of Conway, the deed to approximately 230 acres of land east of the Maine Central Railroad and south of the village of North Conway. This was acquired by a gift from Mr. James G. Simonds of Eaton and funds from the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation and involved no expense by the town. A long range management plan for this area is being drawn up and in February an open meeting was held to discuss possible future uses for the property with the general public.

The Whitaker Woods have been surveyed and the boundaries marked. Signs similar to those used by the Forest Service have been placed at main entrances to the property. A long range management plan for this area is also being prepared.

The commission has been offered several parcels of land in Conway for conservation and recreation uses and is currently evaluating and working on them. One of these has frontage on the Saco River which offers a good potential as additional swimming area for the townspeople.

Work has continued on establishing the exact location and title of the Conway Common lands. A request has been sent to the Ford Foundation for funds needed to complete this project.

The commission has continued its work investigating various places in the town where dumping, dredging, filling, or otherwise severely changing a wetland area have been affected or proposed.

On Saturday, November 4th, a day-long meeting of The New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions was hosted in Conway by the Jackson, Bartlett and Conway Conservation Commissions.

Report of Forest Fire Warden and District Chief

In New Hampshire, forest fire control is a cooperative Statetown program. The Town Forest Fire Warden, appointed by the Director, Division of Resources Development upon recommendation of the Selectmen and the State's District Forest Fire Chief is responsible for fire suppression and other related duties. The State shares equally with the town in the cost of most forest fires, except illegal and careless fires, which are charged to the responsible party. The State further provides fire detection services, prevention programs, fire training for town wardens and crews, and back up equipment for fire suppression.

By authority of the State, the Town Forest Fire Warden controls all outside burning in his town. Any person wishing to kindle a fire when the ground is not covered with snow must obtain a fire permit, free of cost, from the Town Forest Fire Warden. No permits will be issued for fires between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. unless it is raining except for commercial purposes.

Please be careful when using fire, remember it can be an extremely useful tool when under control but once allowed to run wild it can become a diastrous and devastating force. Only you can. prevent a forest fire.

Report of Police Commission

The Police Commission, acting upon procedural guidelines enacted by the original commission three years ago, grew with the activity of the Conway Police Department this past year.

With the addition of Commissioner Francis Deasy, who brought to the Commission many years of experience gained in prior precinct and town offices; the commission working closely with the Conway Board of Seletcmen and Conway citizens have added more depth to the administration and day to day operation of the Police Department.

Increased activity of the department has resulted in the Conway District Court adding a Saturday day session to the established Monday night court. Criminal case load in the court has increased from 364 cases in 1969 to 1234 in 1972.

The area of education has been stressed by the Commissioners, allowing Chief Lane to make available to every man within the department schooling in all levels of law enforcement procedures and innovations by providing funds and recognizing the need for professionally trained officers for the department, we foresee shortly, college-credited degrees among present members of the department.

We feel with the increase in population and complex problems facing the growing town of Conway that the need for a professional and well-trained police department is a priority that we will continue to strive for and support.

Report of Chief of Police

The Conway Police Department experienced a very active 1972. We were very active due to increases in tourism, traffic, residential influx and all the other factors that go into attributing for increased community activity.

The Department did receive and handle a lot more telephone calls and complaints in 1972 than in previous years, however, our percentage of increase in criminal complaints did not increase as greatly as in past years. 1972 showed that we had a 30% increase in criminal complaints, which was substantially lower than the 43% increase the year before. However, the number of arrests made and summons issued by this Department in 1972 was considerably higher than in 1971, 43.7% more, or a total of 1070.

The increase in arrests and summons is reflected to the increased amount of training and education of the police personnel of the Department. The members of the Department attended numerous schools and training programs throughout the year. Members of the Department attended schools in Breathalyzer operation. Forensic Medicine, in-service training programs on juvenile delinquency, drugs, DWI (drunk drivers) six weeks training programs (State Police Academy) and various college level courses in Human Behavior, Social Psychology, Criminal Law, and Criminalistics I and II. All this training and education has made every member of the Department more aware of his duties and responsibilities of a police officer as well as making him more capable of applying these duties and responsibilities daily, so that our professional character will be maintained.

With the approved manpower increases for 1972 Michael Glavin was appointed as Inspector and Steven Holt, Minard Anthony, and William Scaletti have been added to the Department to fill vacancies and to increase approved manpower strength.

The second quarter of the year was a rather confusing time for the Department with myself being on sick leave due to a back injury resulting from an automobile accident. This left the Department to be supervised during this period of time by the Sergeant of Police, Robert Macomber. Sergeant Macomber did an excellent job and spent many, many long hours seeing to the smooth operation of the Department.

During the summer of '72, the Governor's Commission on Crime and Delinquency, funded a program of summer Police Cadets, so that we could hire four young youths for 10 weeks to work directly with the patrolmen. This funding amounted to \$3,200.00 the entire cost of the project. Another federally funded program that we were able to obtain in 1972 under the Safe Streets Act, Highway Safety

was a 50/50 funding on one additional man and his equipment and an additional cruiser and its equipment, for a total of \$5,391.75.

As previously reported in the past to you our never ceasing attempt to put the "uniform on the street" was again instituted in that during the summer we hired one part-time patrolman for beat patrol in both Conway and North Conway and also with the purchase of two Walkie-Talkies, of light weight design, the patrolman in the car was able to present himself more frequently upon the streets.

With the inception of a full-time Investigator for the Department, many more hours were spent away from the courtroom and on patrol, by each partolman.

This year it is our intent to increase the number of superior officers within the Department so that there can be superior officers on duty during all of the highest activity periods of the week.

Each superior officer (Sergeants) will be those officers in the Department that can successfully pass competitive examinations showing that they have a higher amount of knowledge of the laws of New Hampshire and more than average knowledge of law enforcement procedures. Due to increased rules and regulations required by the State of New Hampshire into the qualifications of police officers, we are intending on increasing our patroling police officers by one so that we may be able to maintain nearly most of the time, full time officers on duty without using part-time officers as frequently as in the past. We are not trying to eliminate part-time officers, who do a tremendous job for us, but we are trying to maintain our coverage of the community with personnel who have dedicated their full-time employment as Conway Police officers. It is pretty obvious that part-time officers do not and cannot receive the same amount of training and education in law enforcement as full-time officers do.

We have all heard many times on our radios, televisions, and other audio-visual media and have read in all types of periodicals about the national slaughter upon our highways in this country and that now we have nationally and state-wide programs to get the DRUNK off our highways. Thirty thousand drunken drivers are killed each year on our highways, and they kill many more innocent persons so that the drunk, the people they kill, and other causes of highway fatalities comes to a shocking slaughter of some 60,000 per year. The program in New Hampshire is called Alcohol Safety Action Project (ASAP). This is a federally financed program of the Department of Transportation in Washington, D. C. The program among other things includes a specially trained team of 10 State Troopers all of whom have received specialized training in the operation of the Breathalyzer as well as formal instruction in identifying drinking drivers. Before the project is over with nearly 300 local

and state police will be certified breathalyzer examiners and identifiers of drunken drivers throughout New Hampshire. Presently the State of New Hampshire by law has given law enforcement the right to do breath examinations of suspected drunk drivers. This is done on a Breathalyzer which is a sound scientific system for determining the blood alcohol content of an individual. Due to the fact that this Department has five persons who have been certified by the Director of Public Health to operate a breathalyzer instrument ASAP gave to this Department a breathalyzer which if purchased by us would have meant an expenditure of nearly \$1,000.00. These operators plus all other members of the Department have worked diligently to rid our highways of these potential killers. We went from 9 persons arrested for drunken driving in 1971 to 67 in 1972. This may not have been a determining factor but the streets and highways of the Town of Conway have not had a highway fatality of any cause for more than 26 months.

Without taking up much more of the space in this report I would like to sincerely thank all the citizens of the Town of Conway for your assistance, backing and confidence extended to us through the past year. May 1973 be another year that we can continue to be your protectors of life and property. Thank you.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Board of Selectmen Conway, New Hampshire Genltemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Conway for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1971, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, District Court, Public Library and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

GENERAL FUND:

Comparative Balance Sheets - December 31, 1970 and Decem-

ber 31, 1971: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets – General Fund – as of December 31, 1970 and December 31, 1971, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased from \$130,720.20 (revised) to \$163,467.02 during 1971.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in current financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative statements of general fund appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1971, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4) a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$62,295.52, plus a revenue surplus of \$38,577.01, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$100,872.53.

LONG TERM INDEBTEDNESS:

Comparative Balance Sheets - December 31, 1970 and December 31, 1971: (Exhibit A-5)

Comparative Balance Sheets showing the outstanding long term indebtedness of the Town as of December 31, 1970 and December 31, 1971 are included in Exhibit A-5. As disclosed therein, the long term debt decreased by \$16,000.00, from \$81,000.00 to \$65,000.00, during the fiscal year ended December 31, 1971.

Statement of Annual Debt Service Requirements: (Exhibit A-6) A statement of annual debt service requirements (principal and interest) as of December 31, 1971, is contained in Exhibit A-6.

TREASURER

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures:

(Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of general fund receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1971, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1, Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1971, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

OTHER DEPARTMENTS AND AGENCIES

District Court: (Exhibit E)

A statement of the account of the District Court for the fiscal year 1971 is presented in Exhibit E.

Public Library: (Exhibit F)

A statement of the activity in the Public Library Account during 1971 is presented in Exhibit F.

Highway Bond Issue Fund: (Exhibit G)

The unexpended balance of the Highway Bond Issue Fund at December 31, 1971 was \$33,987.04 and consisted of savings bank deposits, as indicated in Exhibit G.

Hubbard & Davis Public Forest Reserve Fund: (Exhibit H)

The unexpended balance of the Hubbard & Davis Public Forest Reserve Fund at December 31, 1971 was \$2,443.29 and consisted of bank deposits as indicated in Exhibit H.

R. Maranville Fund: (Exhibit I)

The unexpended balance of the R. Maranville Fund at December 31, 1971 was \$578.70 and consisted of savings bank deposits as indicated in Exhibit I.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such test of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

Verification of uncollected and unredeemed taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. Consequently, the amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in the report are subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Cash in Bank:

An analysis of the bank statements for 1971, disclosed that surplus funds in excess of current requirements were left in non-interest bearing checking accounts for extended periods. We again recommend that all surplus funds be invested by the Treasurer in accordance with the provisions of RSA 41:29.

Due from Conway Fire Precinct — \$13,837.25 Due from North Conway Lighting Precinct — \$3,262.65 Due from Center Conway Fire Precinct — \$1,181.69 Due from East Conway Fire Precinct — \$28.00

The preceding amounts represent overpayments to the precincts during the fiscal years 1970 and 1971. These overpayments occurred because payments to the above precincts during those years included not only the amount of the assessments levied against the Town by each precinct, but also its respective share of the State collected

business profits taxes which were received by the Town. It must be noted, however, that these taxes were automatically credited to the precincts when the municipal tax rates were set and approved by the Tax Commission. Consequently, only the amount of the original assessment made by each precinct should have been remitted by the Town.

These overpayments, as listed above, should be recovered from the precincts. In the future, payments to the several precincts should be limited to the assessments levied against the Town.

Due from Trustees of Trust Funds - \$9,995.95

The above amount represents the following reimbursements due the Town from the Capital Reserve Fund established for Survey of Streets and Tax Maps.

Highway Bond Issue Fund: \$33,987.04

We once again direct your attention to the provisions of Section 3-a, Chapter 33 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, relative to the disposition of unexpended bond funds. The unexpended proceeds in the Highway Bond Issue Fund should be disposed of in the manner stipulated by the aforementioned law.

Due to Center Conway Lighting Precinct - \$389.84

This amount represents precinct taxes assessed in 1970 and 1971 and not remitted to the precinct as of December 31, 1971.

District Court:

Per R.S.A. 502-A:9, "payments to cities and towns shall be made monthly, on or before the fifth day of each month, and shall cover the net receipts as aforesaid of said court for the month preceding with a detailed statement of the amount, date, and from who all money has been received." The Conway District Court has not made payments to the Town on a timely basis during 1971.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Section 27, Chapter 71, of R.S.A. require that the auditors' summary of findings and recommendations (letter of

transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. Publication of the Exhibits contained in this report is optional, but this letter must be published in its entirety.

We extend our thanks to the officials and office staff, of the Town of Conway for their assistance during the course of the audit.


