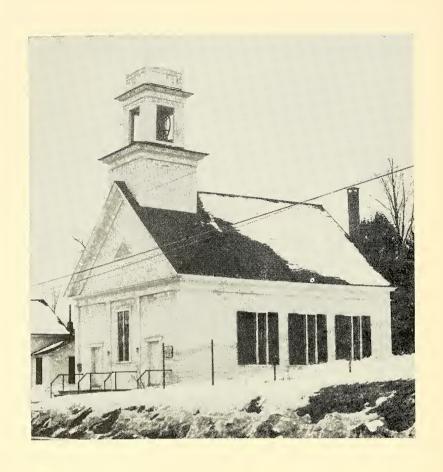

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Croydon, in the County of Sullivan, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, (polls not to close earlier than 6 o'clock in the afternoon) to act upon the following subjects:

- ART. 1. To choose one Selectman for three years, Highway Agent, two Auditors, Library Trustee for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, and all such officers and agents as may be necessary for the transaction of the Town's business for the ensuing year.
- ART. 2. To bring in votes on the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board.
- ART. 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Planning and Zoning.
- ART. 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.
- ART. 5 To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Class V Highways and Bridges and raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the purpose.
- ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Class V roads and vote to raise and appropriate \$680.43 for same; the State to contribute \$4,536.18.
- ART. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for summer and winter road maintenance.

- ART. 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for General Expense of the Highway Department.
- ART. 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of Town Dump.
- ART. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for cutting brush.
- ART. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for upkeep of cemeteries.
- ART. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Capital Reserve Fund to be used for new equipment.
- ART. 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street Lights and Lighting Town Buildings.
- ART. 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Social Security on Town Employees for the ensuing year.
- ART. 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$76.56 for White Pine Blister Rust.
- ART. 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire all necessary sums of money for use during the year in anticipation of Taxes.
- ART. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Insurance.
- ART. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.
- ART. 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to help support and maintain the Lebanon Regional Airport.

- ART. 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 to defray the cost of Library, including Librarian's Salary, heat, etc.
- ART. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Newport Area Home Health Agency.
- ART. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Regional Association.
- ART. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Lake Sunapee Board of Trade.
- ART. 24. To see if the Town will vote to create a Capital Reserve Fund to defray the expense of solid waste disposal in the Town following the prohibition of continuing use of an open burning dump in Town as detailed in Regulation 2 of the New Hampshire Air Pollution Control Commission and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 as the Town's 1971 contribution to said Capital Reserve Fund.
- ART. 25. To see if the Town will vote to create a Solid Waste Disposal Study Committee of five, four citizens and one selectman of the Town, to be appointed by the Selectmen to investigate and study the matter of solid waste disposal in the Town following the prohibition of continued use of our open burning dump; said committee to present a preliminary report to the 1972 Town Meeting.
- ART. 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to defray the necessary expenses of the Solid Waste Disposal Study Committee if such committee is established by vote of the Town in passage of Article 25 of this Warrant.
- ART. 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for resurfacing or rebuilding existing paved roads.
- ART. 28. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to install toilets in the Town Hall.

- ART. 29. To authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any tax acquired properties at their discretion. The receipts for such sales to be deposited in the General Fund.
- ART. 30. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to list all assessments in the Town Report.
- ART. 31. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue Surplus Food distribution.
- ART. 32. To see if the Town will vote to establish additional mid-week dumping hours on Wednesdays from 4:00 P. M. to 6:00 P. M. from May 1 through October 31.
- ART. 33. To see if the Town will vote to restrict the Public Beach at Rocky Bound Pond to the use of the residents of the Town and their guests. The use of the Beach shall be restricted to the hours of 8:00 A. M. to 9:00 P. M. excepting for the launching and retrieving of boats. Residents shall be defined as tax payers of the town. A guest shall be defined as anyone being accompanied by a resident. Be it further understood that the Town accepts no liability for the use of said Beach.
- ART. 34. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF POLICE DEPARTMENT

Since the Fall of 1970 when I took over the duties of Police Chief I have endeavored to update your police department.

The Town has furnished the Police Department with a radio which has enabled the department to keep in touch with State Police and, by way of relay, with Newport and all neighboring towns. We hope to add one more crystal in the radio to enable us to communicate directly to Newport.

I have worked closely with the State Police on breaks and entries, accident investigation as well as several other situations where help was needed. Arrests have been made by this department for D. W. I. and motor vehicle inspection violations. Warnings have been issued for speeding and other misdemeanors. Several highway accidents were investigated and results reported for disposition. I have investigated many complaints by town citizens.

I believe the strong point of the Croydon Police Force this year has been the consistent and methodical patrol of all areas of town. In this era of high crime rate, this persistance appears to have been very rewarding. The incidents of breaking and entering, burglary, vandalism and other misdemeanors have decreased this year in the Town.

I hope, with your help to continue this work for our Town.

The agency has sponsored Immunization Clinics about once a month except during the summer months. Last year 464 children attended the clinic. We have sent and received referrals to and from the Medicare intermediary. Blue Cross/Blue Shield, and the various Welfare Departments, both state and local. We refer patients to such services as Crippled Children Clinics in Claremont, Convulsive Clinics in Manchester, Mental Health Clinics in Claremont, Surplus Food Service, the Clothing Service, the Community Action Program and the Planned Parenthood Association in Lebanon. We also follow upon the state immunization records for each child advising those who are delinquent to see their doctor or come to the clinics. All the above are achieved to a large degree by way of consultations which are not counted as charge visits.

MICROFILMING

All of the permanent records of the Town and School District, now in the care of the Town and School Clerks, were filmed during the week of November 30th at the Town Hall, by the New England Archives Center of Holyoke, Mass. The Town Records are nearly complete with but a few inexplicable gaps such as four years of Vital Statistics during the Civil War. However, more than half of the School Records are missing. We had a total of 10 school districts in 1830 and it is understandable that these small books in private homes throughout the town have been lost, regrettable though it may be.

10,555 pages and a few maps were put on 8 reels of of 35mm film. This film and a viewer will be at the Town Clerk's Office for immediate reference. A duplicate set of 8 reels will be stored temporarily at the First National Bank in Newport. This is for safe keeping and may be copied at any time should the need arise. I have been assured that the film, properly stored, should last 200 years. (I'll take their word for it.)

CROYDON SURPLUS FOOD DISTRIBUTION

Report January — December 1970

Surplus food is distributed in the Town of Croydon once a month in a program sponsored by the federal government and in cooperation with the State of New Hampshire and Sullivan County. The distribution is handled by the Selectmen from their office at the Town Hall. Croydon's program is the third smallest in the county serving an average of seventeen persons per month in eight households last year. The food is delivered to the town hall in bulk and then is alotted and distributed. The cost is incurred in paying for the delivery to the town and in the local administration of the program. The following is a breakdown of the items distributed in the last year and the amounts of each. Included is a monthly listing of the number of people served.

REGULATIONS CONCERNING THE RENTAL OF TOWN HALL

When renting the Town Hall the fee has been established as \$10.00 in the summer and \$20.00 in the winter. For this fee the only facilities available will be the heat in the winter and water in the summer. This does not include the use of the stove, hot water or contents of the cupboards. The Good Neighbor Club will rent the use of a sixty cup dripolator, hot and cold water and the stove for a fee of \$5.00 providing a member of the Club is available to turn the gas and water on and off. One half of all fees received for this service will revert to the town to help defray expenses of the Town Hall. The contents of the cupboards and/or the refrigerator are not available under any circumstances for public use.

Parties renting the Town Hall are responsible for all janitorial services. In the event that the Selectmen do not feel that the hall was left in a condition comparable to that prior to renting, they shall engage a janitor and the charges for same shall be borne by the Leasee. The Leasee shall also be responsible for any and all damages incurred during the rental period by them.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of Croydon:

MINIMUM STANDARDS

By action of the State Board of Education "September 1, 1972 is the effective date for schools to begin implementation of Minimum Standards and Recommendations for New Hampshire Elementary Schools for School Approval."

In order to comply, Croydon would need to add services in:

- 1. Music
- 2. Art
- 3. Guidance Counseling
- 4. Librarian
- 5. Physical Education

It is assumed that schools with small enrollments will join with other schools in sharing these specialized services. Next year we will be asked to provide a plan as to how and when compliance with the Standards will be met.

A sum of money has been included in the 1971-72 Budget for music instruction. If approved, this would indicate a start in one area of service not presently provided.

VILLAGE SCHOOL

Twenty-one students are attending Grades 1-3 under the capable guidance of Mrs. Ettabelle Lewis. We are fortunate to have her services.

SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Croydon, qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said District on the 3rd day of March 1971 at 7:30 p. m. to act upon the Articles set forth in this Warrant—not covering the election of District Officers. Said Officers will be elected on the 9th day of March 1971 at Town Meeting in said Town Hall and voting will be by official ballot and check lists.

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
 - Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
 - Article 3. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Article 4. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- Article 5. To choose an Auditor for the ensuing year. (Article 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 will be acted upon at Town Meeting.)
- Article 6. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 7. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for School District Officials and Agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.
- Article 8. To see if the District will vote to instruct the School Board to make arrangements to have power steering installed and maintained on the 1970 International School Bus presently leased by the District and to raise \$1.25 per school day or an annual sum of \$225 for said purpose. (This Article is not recommended by the School Board.)

Article 9. To see if the School District will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the School District the benefits of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapter 302 and 332 of the Laws of 1955.

Article 10. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the School District will authorize the School Board to execute on behalf of the School District the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the School District will designate the School Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

Article 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.
