9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Health Department.
10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Vital Statistics.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Maintenance - Summer.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Winter Maintenance.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Road Aid necessary to obtain State Aid.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Libraries.

15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Poor.

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.

17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Aid to Soldiers and their Families.

19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Cemeteries.

20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Old Meeting House Assn.

22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Schools.

23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civilian Defense.

24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street Lighting.

25. To see how much of the Parsonage Funds the town will vote to spend for preaching for the ensuing year.

26. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

27. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell Tax Title Property.

28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for defraying expenses involved for a committee of three to work with the Selectmen in regards to locating an industry in the town.

29. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Committee of three to handle all the business of the Fire Department.

30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Centennial for the town of Danville.

31. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

TOWN MEETING - MARCH 10, 1959

At two o'clock in the afternoon March 10, 1959 a legal meeting was called to order by the Moderator for the purpose of acting on the Town Warrant.

The Warrant was read by the Moderator who then declared the polls open for the election of officers for the ensuing year.

BUSINESS MEETING

The business meeting was called to order at 8:00 P. M.. Melton Sanborn read the report of the Budget Committee:

Article 3. Voted to raise and appropriate \$1,700.00 for Town Officers' salaries.

Article 4. Voted to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for Town officers' Expenses.

Article 5. Voted to raise and appropriate \$125.00 for Election and Registration expenses.

Article 6. Voted to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for the Town Hall and other Town Buildings.

Article 7. Voted to raise and appropriate \$250.00 for the Police Department.

Article 8. Voted to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for the Fire Department.

Article 9. Voted to raise and appropriate \$25.00 for the Health Department.

Article 10. Voted to raise and appropriate \$20.00 for Vital Statistics.

Article 11. Voted to raise and appropriate \$2,500.00 for Town Maintenance - Summer.

Article 12. Voted to raise and appropriate \$2,264.43 for Winter Maintenance.

Article 13. Voted to raise and appropriate \$229.68 for State Aid.

Article 14. Voted to raise and appropriate \$300.00 for Libraries.

Article 15. Voted to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for Town Poor.

Article 16. Voted to raise and appropriate \$1,200.00 for Old Age Assistance.

Article 17. Voted to raise and appropriate \$60.00 for Memorial Day.

Article 18. Voted to raise and appropriate \$100.00 for Aid to Soldiers and their Families.

Article 19. Voted to raise and appropriate \$250.00 for Cemeteries.

Article 20. Voted to raise and appropriate \$50.00 for The Old Meeting House Association.

Article 21. Voted to raise and appropriate \$2,700.00 for the County Tax.

Article 22. Voted to raise and appropriate the amount of money for schools as was voted in school meeting.

Article 23. Voted to raise and appropriate \$76.16 for abatements.

Article 24. Voted to raise and appropriate \$300.00 for Civilian Defense.

Article 25. Voted to raise and appropriate \$100.00 for Street lighting.

Article 26. Voted to pass over article.

Article 27. Voted to spend the interest and income from the Parsonage Funds for preaching for the ensuing year.

Article 28. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the town in anticipation of taxes.

Article 29. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to sell Tax Title Property.

Article 30. Voted to raise and appropriate \$50.00 for the committee of three and the selectmen for defraying expenses involved in trying to locate an industry in the town.

Article 31. Voted to pass over.

Article 32. Voted to pass over.

Article 33. Under this article Mr. Butters made a motion which was seconded and voted that the moderator appoint a committee of three to make up a Testimonial to Alliston Tewksbury and Herman Sanborn, two deceased inhabitants who have been life long residents and office holders in the town to be spread on the records of the Town. Voted to accept the land on deed having been given to the Town of Danville by Ruth Thorsen. Meeting closed at 9:00 P. M.. There were 350 names on the check list, 125 ballots cast.

Mr. Alliston E. Tewksbury in his 94th year and Mr. Herman E. Sanborn in his 80th year have lived in Danville all their lives and both have served in Town offices and affairs with true loyalty to this Town.

One could not exaggerate, nor again would minimize their good deeds, except for us remaining to follow their good examples. They will both be greatly missed and leave behind them the well known admonition, "Go Thou and do likewise".

CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT

It is with pleasure that I present this report to the town. Let me explain that there are two methods by which the Civil Defense Director can obtain articles through Civil Defense. Some articles are obtained under "Federal Surplus Property". The cost of these articles to the town is usually about 7 cents on a dollar of the cost of the article to the state. In many cases it is even less than 7 cents on the dollar. The cost to the state is determined by the transportation costs in getting the articles to Concord, and the costs at Concord of warehouse handling.

In the past year, under this "Surplus Property" plan, Danville has received a 5000-watt generator, which would provide light and heat in the Town Hall and in the Fire House, and would sound the siren in case of a power failure. Also, under "Surplus Property", we obtained a Chevrolet Carryall car, plumbing supplies for installing running water in the Town Hall, and many items for the Fire Department.

The other method of obtaining articles is under "Matching Funds". This means that the government, through the state, pays one half of the actual cost of the item. Under this plan, Danville received a two-way communication radio. In case of a natural disaster or a nat-

ion-emergency, we would be in communication with Concord and surrounding towns. Each Sunday we broadcast and receive Civil Defense information from Concord. The cost to the town for this item under "Matching Funds" was \$148.96. Also, under this plan, we received a portable resuscitator, complete with oxygen cylinders, for \$169.00.

More recently, with the help of your donations, a hospital oxygen unit was purchased, for home and ambulance use; and may I add that our Ambulance Service was called upon nineteen times last year.

With the Civil Defense Rescue and Ambulance vehicle that we now have, we are well equipped for ambulance service, should it be needed.

Through your individual donations, I received \$112 toward the resuscitator, and \$49.75 toward the Home and Ambulance Oxygen unit, making a total of \$161.75. By your individual donations, you made it possible for your Civil Defense Director to procure many other items for our town, from Concord, and still keep within the Civil Defense budget of \$300.

I feel that through Civil Defense, Danville is better equipped and prepared to assume the safety and well-being of our people during a natural disaster or an enemy

attack. The Civil Defense program, during the past year, has brought to the town of Danville many needed items at a very small cost.

It is the responsibility of each one of us to take an active part in our Civil Defense. Being prepared, and training, are the means by which we can minimize possible loss of life. Take a First Aid course soon!

In closing, I want to express my thanks for your support of Civil Defense in 1959.

SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Danville, New Hampshire qualified to vote in district affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 7th of March 1960, at eight o'clock in the afternoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or Agent of the district.
6. To hear the Reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of the schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State foundation aid fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
9. To see if the School District of Danville will vote with the other Districts of Supervisory Union #14 to provide for the services of a Helping Teacher as provided in R. S. A. 186:11, XXII, XXIII, XXIV; as amended 1957, R. S. A. 252:2; to commence July 1, 1960.

10. On petition of Eleanor Goldthwaite and nine other legal voters of the School District of Danville, the school board is petitioned to insert the following article in the warrant for the annual school district meeting to be held in March of 1960.

To see if the district will raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$100,000.00 for the construction, equipment and furnishing of a new elementary school and the acquisition of any real property that may be necessary for it's location and to authorize the school board to execute any and all contracts including the selection of an architect or agreement necessary, proper and advisable in connection with the construction and equipping of this school.

And in order to provide such funds to authorize the school board to issue and sell notes or bonds for all or and part of the sum so appropriated in the name of and on the credit of the district under and in accordance with the Municipal Budget Act and amendments relating thereto; and to delegate the school board the authority to fix the time and place of payment of the principle amount of each note or bond and to sell the notes or bonds, and to take such other action with respect thereto as may be necessary or advisable.

11. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The Nurse's role in school health in recent years has undergone drastic changes. She no longer is the only one to check fingernails, teeth, etc.. This is more the province of the teacher who is with the child daily. Minor cuts and bruises are also taken care of by the teacher.

Danville is most fortunate in having teachers interested in health education and this interest is carried out to a great extent in the classrooms.

What does the School Nurse do? Occasionally I am asked this question. It is a hard one to answer as each day brings new and unusual requests. It is a specialized service with many diversified channels. A recent study at B. U. on the graduate level reveals that school nurses do 131 jobs.

This past year all children received routine check-ups on height and weight, hearing and vision. In addition, patch testing and urinalysis were done on each child whose parents were interested.

The child with special problems received the most attention, in order to bring him or her up to maximum in health, so that the highest scholastic ability for that child may be attained.

I would like to thank all people and groups who have helped make my job easier by offering their services and financial help.

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Danville:

I herewith submit my report on the status and needs of our schools:

The schools are providing an adequate education for the pupils at the present time. This I believe is due in large part to the staff. However, they have not received the help they should have, nor do they have all the aids and guides they need to better provide for the various learning experiences that should be presented in the classroom. This is not the responsibility of any one in particular but the fact is evident and therefore we should analyze it carefully.

To begin with, just what type of education do you want for your children? Are you satisfied when they will be able to read the newspapers or magazines, to keep an account of money earned and spent, to be able to write a letter; or do you desire that they might be given the type of education to be able to go to college or other school of specialization. Do you wish them mass educated, or do you hope for some specialized and individualized type of education. Do you want them trained to cope with a home and job or educated to work, think and act as an alert free citizen?. Answers to these questions are important be-

cause they provide the School Board and Superintendent, as well as the staff with a framework within which to work. Where do our schools fit in relation to the previous questions? Presently I would say somewhere in between. There are things being taught in the classroom that could just as well be learned at home. This means homework and time spent at home with your children learning what material was presented at school, as well as giving the child information in conjunction with it. You the parent are a teacher as well as the person at school. There are things that should be presented in the classroom that are not presently provided. This is due to many factors, such as classrooms too large to provide individual attention, teachers not having a specified area in which to work and many more.

By now you have an idea of what my philosophy is. To state it a little more clearly, I would like to see each child prepared to cope with the complexities of twenty years hence; and to be able to sift the good from the bad, be prepared to make decisions based on past knowledge and skills and provide a worthwhile home, as well as provide civic responsibilities as called upon. It isn't necessary to review the terrific progress of the last twenty years to create a concept of what the next twenty years

will be like. This is being done for you every day. Children should have a more specialized and individualized education to withstand, understand and help formulate the future.

What are some of our needs? Those that should be provided as soon as possible are:

1. Reduction of class size to 25 or a maximum of 30.
2. The development of a program of minimum essentials - This would provide criteria for promotion or non-promotion and assist in the establishment of a certain block of work for the year.
3. The development of a program of studies in each subject area and in each grade - This will help to unify what is taught from grade to grade as well as act as a guide for the teachers.
4. The development of a basic series in reading, arithmetic, science, social studies, English, spelling, etc. - This will eliminate gaps in learning and provide better basic material for the pupils.
5. A study and re-valuation of our reporting procedure. Does this present method tell you, the

parent, what you really should know? I personally do not feel that it does.

6. The development of an adequate permanent record system.
7. Adequate supervision of staff and schools - It's humanly impossible to cover this area adequately. An addition to the staff is necessary to carry on adequate and thorough assistance for the staff. I have averaged 2,000 miles a month between 8:00 A. M. and Midnight, attempting to make the rounds.

I have found it necessary to recommend a helping teacher. This person could carry on some of the office functions I am presently doing, thus permitting me to be in the schools more frequently, and as the New Hampshire R. S. A. 186:11 states "To give helpful advice, counsel, and assistance to teachers, pupils and parents...as a constructive means of improving the educational growth and development of children, solving pupil problems of retardation and maladjustment, adopting the program of studies to meet the needs...bring resources outside of the school to classroom teachers, pupils, parents and community.

The following should be studies and considered:

1. A class for the mentally retarded
2. A better guidance program
3. Classes for the academically superior
4. A program for inservice training for teachers

To conclude, I will exert every effort to see that the best is provided for your children within the framework you create. It will be a pleasure to continue working for you as I have confidence that you want your child to be able to compete with any other child, regardless of the place or community in this shrinking world of ours.
