

4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the town in anticipation of taxes. 5. To hear reports of Auditors and Committees and to act thereon.

6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any Real Estate by public sale acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Nine Hundred and Seventy-One Dollars and Seventy-Three Cents (\$3,971.73), to purchase a new chassis for Engine (No. 3).

By request of Fire Engineers.

8. REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record year of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year, we experienced a rainfall deficiency of more than ten inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong, dry winds, characterized 1964 as one of the most hazardous years in the past half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963, the number of fires showed only a slight increase and more remarkable was the fact that the area burned dropped from 2,280 acres in 1963 to 900 acres in 1964. Early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming reality. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in this community who responded and fought our fires so efficiently. Our state is now 86% wooded and its economy — both industrial and recreational — is greatly dependent on this forest resource. The responsibility for adequate protection of this great area — 4,350,000 acres — is everyone's responsibility and prevention is one of our most effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense.

- 1. Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out.
- 2. Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.
- 3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches are out.

A major portion of our preventable fires this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to escape; (2) children playing with matches; and (3) smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

We wish to thank you for your very fine cooperation during the past fire season and with your continued cooperation we are confident that we can improve our fire record in 1965.

REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Police Department is pleased to submit to the residents of the town of Hampstead, its annual report for the year 1964.

The department investigated a total of 44 automobile accidents during the year. This represents an increase of 25 over the preceding year of 1963. This is a clear indication of the tremendous increase in vehicle traffic on the highways of the town and the subsequent increase of necessary police patrol work. One has only to look back a few short years to 1957 when the first report of this administration showed only 3 auto accidents during the same length of time. Of these reported auto accidents during the year, there were 19 injures, 12 requiring hospitalization and one fatality.

Court cases during the year showed a marked upswing compared to 1963. Officer in court cases totaled 71 during the year compared to 56 during the preceding year. The larger majority of these cases resulted in findings of guilty. The increased difficulty in obtaining such findings necessitates the police officer of today to be more and more versed on the law and its functions.

In April the Police Department Blue Network system was installed. At present there are three phones installed with tentative plans completed for the installation of the fourth unit. The residents are urged to report any and all police matters on this system. It is also requested that no other subject matter be discussed on this system to insure its top efficiency.

Considerable new equipment has been purchased by the Police Relief Association and turned over to the town. Among these items were 2 Smith and Wesson Police Revolvers, 2 two-way radios, 2 sirens, 4 police winter uniform coats, a portable stretcher carried in the chief's car at all times and a polaroid camera used for accident and criminal investigations. The association is pleased to relieve the town of such burdens and all we ask in return is continued support at our annual functions.

The annual Halloween Party was held under the joint efforts of the PTA and the Police Department. As usual we feel proud of the fact that complaints during this period were at a minimum. We can also feel equally as proud in knowing that a small part of this trouble free period was our responsibility.

Residents are urged to license their dogs prior to April 1st. Considerable time is expended annually by the department in getting dog owners to obtain licenses.

Thanks are extended to the officers of the department, the residents of the town, both newcomers and longtime, and heads of various town agencies for their assistance and cooperation. Only by the assistance of my companion officers can we maintain an efficient department ready to assist either night or day.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

The Hampstead Public Library has had a definite increase in circulation this past year in fiction and non-fiction books. Since the School Library has been organized, the children's books have dropped off, but it will pick up again in the summer.

Books in the children's and young people's room have been weeded out and about 200 were discarded because of their condition. Some of the classics have been replaced, and new books are bought as soon as the money comes in. This has all been done by the Book Consultant, Mrs. Rachel Sanborn and the chairman of the Trustees, Mrs. Clinton Kirkness. In time we will go through the whole Library, weeding out the old books and keeping it up to date.

The Bookmobile comes every 10 weeks, leaving around 200 books. We are very grateful for this service. Books of any kind and material, such as reference books for High School students, may be obtained at any time from the State Library, and the office in Exeter, and I will be pleased to order whatever is wanted.

The Friends of the Library have donated many new reference books, such as: The World's Great Religions, Shakespeare in his Age, The Story of N. H., Nature Notebook, Modern Biology, and The Earth Beneath Us; for which we are very grateful. I wish to express my sincere appreciation to them for their assistance in mending and repairing books and taking out all discards from the file. Last spring The Friends also came in and cleaned the Library.

In April, National Library week was observed. The children came from the school in groups and they were welcomed by Mrs. Clarence Nadeau, and then were introduced to the Librarian. Refreshments were served by Mrs. George Sakash, Chairman of the Friends of the Library and her assistants. Short stories were read by Mrs. Kent White, to the pre-school age and lower grades, and to her I express my thanks. Many gifts of books and magazines have been gratefully received this year by the following donors: Mr. Carl Bannon, Mr. Thomas Fraser, Mr. Everett Thomas, Mrs. Horace Tarleton, Mrs. Harold Shedd, Mrs. Alice Mosher, Mr. A. Frederickson, Miss Shirley Ayer, Mrs. Edna St. Germaine, and Mr. John Garland.

Anthology of the World's Best Poems has been donated by Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Ingraham. Mr. Marshall Griffith has loaned us a collection of Antique Books from the Oldshade Antique Shop, and they are in use continually. We certainly do appreciate these collections.

Through the kindness of the Grange, Woman's Club, and the Friends of the Library, a revolving bookcase has been added to the Library, on which we keep the latest books.

I wish to extend my thanks to Mrs. Bertha Whiteneck, Mrs. Esther Orcutt, Mrs. Clinton Kirkness, and all others who have assisted me with my work.

To the Trustees, I express my appreciation for their splendid co-operation.

The Library is open every Tuesday and Saturday from 2 p.m. to 7 p.m., except on holidays.

REPORT OF THE HIGH SCHOOL STUDY COMMITTEE

The Hampstead High School Study Committee is pleased to present this progress report to the citizens of Hampstead.

It is the hope of this committee that every citizen in Hampstead will give this, and subsequent reports, serious thought to help determine the needs of our future citizens. The ever-increasing number of school children and cost of operating schools is a national and local problem, and we are giving careful consideration and study to all aspects of providing a modern education for the children of our town.

The committee, appointed by the School Board, met for an organizational meeting on August 31, 1964. Donald Duston was elected Chairman, Mrs. Robert Noyer, Recording Secretary; other members include Mrs. Warren K. Ross, Paul Gibbons, and Andre Fleuriel. The School Board presented a tentative outline of the purpose and scope of the committee's duties. Ways and means of acquiring necessary information for a meaningful evaluation was discussed. It was suggested that the committee meet with a member of the Timberlane Cooperative School District Planning Board and a representative from the State Department of Education in the near future.

Mr. David Rockwell, a member of the Timberlane Cooperative School District Planning Board, spoke at the following meeting, and familiarized the committee with the Timberlane study. He suggested that our major areas of concern should be: enrollment data and projections, curriculum recommendations, and finance. He stressed the importance of a thorough investigation of possible plans for secondary education. Three alternatives were cited: 1) continuing the present contract with Pinkerton, 2) joining Timberlane Cooperative School District, and 3) providing our own town high school. The committee believes that an investigation of such scope will require a considerable length of time. Intensive study of enrollment, transportation, curriculum, cost, and zoning will be undertaken before any recommendations are made, and the committee welcomes constructive suggestions from the voters at any time.

Mr. Damon Russell, Director, Administrative Services, State Department of Education met with the committee on December 10, 1964. He outlined the order of investigation the committee should follow and a discussion period was held.

On January 18, 1965 a committee meeting was held at which time it was proposed that meetings be requested with the Superintendent of Union 55 and the Board of Trustees of Pinkerton Academy for discussion.

On February 3, 1965 the committee were guests of the Board of Trustees of Pinkerton Academy at a meeting held for informal discussion with Mr. Hackler and School Boards representing students at Pinkerton. The purpose of the meeting was to acquaint School Board members with Pinkerton's finances, curriculum, and future plans. The problem of increasing enrollment was discussed and the trustees expressed an interest in meeting with the Hampstead School Board and High School Study Committee to explore future needs for our students. This meeting will be held in the very near future.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Hampstead:

I am presenting herewith my Ninth Annual Report as Superintendent of Schools in Hampstead. Reports from the Principal and Supervisors will discuss more in detail the activities of the school. Statistical reports are listed separately.

Personnel

Ten teachers joined the Hampstead School system this current year. They were: Rodolphe Simon, Jr., grades 7 and 8. a graduate of Plymouth State College with teaching experience in Candia, N.H.: H. Lewis Stone, grade 6, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire; Patricia Zangari, grade 6, a graduate of Lowell State College: Patricia Brouillard, grade 5, a graduate of Riviere College; Mrs. Regis Fanaras, grade 5, a graduate of Lowell State College with teaching experience in Tewksbury, Mass., and Salem, N.H.; Mrs. Shirley Bevington, grade 3, a graduate of the University of Massachusetts; Ruth McCarthy, grade 2, a graduate of Hunter College: Mrs. Joan Willard, grade 2, a graduate of Gorham State College, with teaching experience in Bethel and Yarmouth, Maine; Freda Clark, grade 1, a graduate of Plymouth State College: Nina DiPietro, grade 1, a graduate of Boston University.

All teachers have continued membership in local, state and national professional organizations.

It is important that we meet the minimum salary set by law in Massachusetts, which is \$5,000. Seven of our new teachers this year come from our neighboring state. There is still a shortage of qualified teachers and because most of our applicants for Union #55 positions come from Massachusetts, we have no alternative but to meet the minimum if we want satisfactory teachers and quality education. There is a travel problem as well for these teachers which accentuates our problem. Higher salaries will cause less teacher turnover.

Curriculum

The reports of our various supervisors on the following pages gives you some idea of what is being accomplished in our school system.

Most important in improving education is a good teacher in an uncrowded classroom. We need, also, a curriculum that will meet the needs of all children. We must provide modern and up-to-date textbooks. We need various audiovisual aids to supplement the program. We need extra services for the special students. We need supervisory help for teachers. We want to teach and work in an atmosphere of cleanliness that is safe for our children.

I am very happy to say that we have adopted and carried out the above program to a marked degree. For this coming year we are continuing all our programs and will continue our adoption changes in language arts, modern math, reading and science in order to meet changing needs and use textbooks that will include the latest teaching techniques.

The achievement of our children continues to be above the national norm.

Housing

Our elementary school enrollment continues to rise. You were fortunate to have constructed additional classrooms. This year it was necessary to open up one more classroom after school opened in September to relieve the load in grade 5. We will need two more classrooms for next September, an additional fourth grade and an additional seventh grade. We have two classrooms each in grade 3 and grade 6 which causes this problem.

It will be necessary to complete the second floor of the new addition to accommodate this need. It would appear that you should be set for elementary housing for the immediate future. If there is a real increase in population to warrant three classrooms per grade, then you will have a different situation. There has been some talk and some inquiries about the Timberlane Cooperative and whether or not it would be wise to petition for annexation. It would appear best to study the values of joining the cooperative, to study the future housing needs at Pinkerton, to compare various costs, and to study especially what might be best for your children.

The cooperative movement has become very popular for small school districts. It is an attempt to give them equity and control and to equalize the educational opportunities for all New Hampshire school children.

Your secondary students have done well at Pinkerton. Whether or not the future holds better prospects for them by joining the Timberlane Regional School District is something you should investigate.

Appreciation

Appreciation is expressed for the continued support and cooperation of the Parent-Teachers Association, the Civic Club and all other groups and individuals.

I wish to thank the School Board, Principal, teachers and children for their cooperation in working for a better educational system for Hampstead.

REPORT OF SPECIAL EDUCATION CLASS

To the Superintendent of School and the School Boards of Plaistow, Hampstead, Atkinson and Newton:

I hereby submit my fifth annual report as teacher of the PHAN Special Class.

This year the PHAN Special Class is located in the Pollard School. September found us in a large, cheerful room with vast window area and private toilet facilities and sink which proved very helpful. Because it was necessary to divide some large classes in Plaistow and add new teachers, our class was re-located to another classroom of approximately equal facilities.

Our class in September composed of 14 pupils, ages 8 to 16, had six girls and eight boys. There is a wide gap between the teenage and elementary groups, both physically and socially. There is a definite need for two separate classes. Two special education classes are being proposed for the school year 65-66. Anticipated enrollment will be approximately 18-20 students; therefore, two classes will be necessary to meet state requirements.

Miss Martha Smith of Salem, N.H., a senior at Keene State College, is completing nine weeks of practice teaching with the PHAN Special Class on January 22. She has conducted the reading and arithmetic groups at the lower levels besides assisting the teacher in numerous ways. This has made it possible for all reading and arithmetic groups to meet with a teacher every day.

Our television set has proved very helpful especially in our social studies and science fields. We regularly have TV classes in "The Story of the Granite State," "Exploring Nature," and "Land and Sea," as well as "Art at Your Fingertips." The older group also enjoys the "Careers" program and "Current Events." We are all taking five Field Trips in New England via television.

Health and cleanliness are stressed in the classrooms. Mrs. Banks, our school nurse-teacher, has presented several films and filmstrips in Health Education.

Arts and crafts projects this year began with woven reed baskets made by each pupil. Following this 10,000 popsicle sticks were used in the production of oxcart planters, banks, jewelry boxes, bread baskets, and fruit baskets. Plaster of paris was used for molding creche figures. Each pupil made a set of six creche figures which were then hand painted. A few were made as class gifts. Four older boys painted five of the large plywood figures used in the outdoor creche at the Pollard School. Styrofoam ornaments were molded and decorated for Christmas trees. Woven pot holders were also made.

We are always appreciative of the cooperation of different individuals and organizations who help us fulfill our needs. This year, I wish to mention in particular the Plaistow-Atkinson Lions Club which provided seventy-five dollars worth of craft materials chosen by the teacher and the Hampstead Parent-Teacher Association for its generous gift of \$100, which made possible the purchase of a good record player and additional craft supplies.

I wish to convey my appreciation to Mr. Thomas Caron for his cooperation and continued thanks for the guidance and support of the Union staff.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

To the School Board, Superintendent of Schols, and citizens of Hampstead:

It is with pleasure that I submit my second annual report as Supervising Principal of the Hampstead Central School.

The 1964 school year was marked by growth. Student enrollment increased over 10% from the previous year. Our school staff numbered twenty-one people, including teaching and non-teaching personnel. An addition was begun on the school building. The new section will consist of eight classrooms, one multi-purpose room, and boys' and girls' lavatories. The first floor will be completed for occupation early in 1965, and the second floor will be finished at a later date.

The high school building was prepared to house four classes. The upper room was partitioned and the small, lower room was used as a classroom. Grades six, seven, and eight, were located in the high school building.

Increased enrollment necessitated the division of two classes. Grades five and six were divided. Grade six was divided prior to the opening of school in September, and grade five was divided during the month of November. Mrs. Regis Fanaras, a teacher with several years experience in Supervisory Union No. 55, was hired to teach one of the divisions of grade five.

Changes were noted in the area of curriculum. The Greater Cleveland Mathematics Program was adopted, and is being taught in grades one through six. A new Scott-Foresman reading program was introduced in grades one, two, and three.

Educational field trips were held in all grades as a part of the curriculum. The trips were supervised by teachers and parents. The eighth grade outing was held at Nantasket Beach.

A Specialty Fair was held in May with pupils in grades four through eight preparing individual projects, and primary grade pupils preparing class projects. Award ribbons were presented to all participants.

The Central School was represented in an inter-scholastic athletic program with boys' teams in basketball and baseball, and girls' teams in basketball and softball.

Graduation exercises for the eight grade were held on June 18, 1964, at the Congregational Church. Twenty-five pupils received diplomas. Mr. Wendell V. Davis, Superintendent of Schools, was the speaker. A reception for the graduates was held in the gymnasium following the program.

National Education Week was observed the week of November ninth through thirteenth. Open house was held at the school during the week. The following week a workshop for parents was offered. The teachers reviewed the curriculum and teaching methods and materials used at their respective grade levels.

The Book Fair was also held during National Education Week under the sponsorship and direction of the Hampstead P.T.A. Mrs. Mary Smith supervised the program. Pupils from grades five through eight participated in the Annual National Spelling Bee sponsored in New Hampshire by the Manchester Union Leader.

The testing program included Otis Mental Ability Tests, administered in grades two, four, and six; Metropolitan Readiness Tests and S. R. A. Mental Ability Tests administered in grade one; Stanford Achievement Tests given in grades two through eight; and the Orleans Algebra Prognosis Test, given in grade eight. Also, basic reading tests were given and various individual diagnostic tests were administered. The results of the Stanford Achievement tests showed that 79.7% of the pupils taking the test scored at or above grade level.

The annual New England Reading Conference was held at Poland Spring, Maine. Attending from the Hampstead Central School were: Mrs. Charlotte Zimmer, Miss Margaret Roehrig, Miss Patricia Brouillard, and Mr. Richard Grey.

Supervisory Union No. 55 began the preparation of a series of curriculum guides in all subject areas. A number of teachers from the Central School participated in this program.

School children were transported by Mr. Frank Howard of Hampstead. Milk was purchased from the Wason-Mac-Donald Company of Haverhill, Massachusetts.

In the Fall, health examinations were given to pupils of grades 1, 3, 5, 7, and pupils new to the system. Examining physicians were Dr. Raymond E. Moore, M.D., and Dr. William R. Hart, M.D. Mrs. Wanda Scholl, R.N., school nurseteacher, assisted. Also, all pupils were weighed and measured and given sight and hearing tests by Mrs. Scholl.

Starting in September, speech therapy was available to children in need of this service. The program was conducted by Mr. Vincent Raciti, speech therapist. Mr. Raciti tested all of the children in the school prior to beginning the program to determine those in need of therapy. This testing program showed that sixty pupils were in need of some form of therapy. Mr. Raciti was able to provide treatment for twentyfour of these children during his weekly visits to Hampstead. Pupils from all grade levels receive treatment.

The school library has continued to grow. In addition to books purchased by the school district, a number of books have been donated to our library. We would like to extend a word of thanks to the many people who have contributed books. Presently, the library contains well over one thousand volumes, including fiction, non-fiction, and reference books.

On behalf of the staff and pupils, I would like to offer a sincere thank you to the Hampstead P.T.A. for their many generous gifts and services. The children of Hampstead have benefited from the work done by this devoted organization.

REPORT OF THE REMEDIAL READING TEACHER

"The use of books for pleasure is the most satisfactory recreation; without having acquired the power of reading for pleasure, none of us can be independent."

Recreational reading is seldom done by pupils who read below their grade level; and critical reading is usually impossibly difficult for them. To bring these pupils, with reading skills difficulty up to their grade level, has been the work of your Remedial Reading teacher this past year, and a degree of success has been attained with eighty per cent of the group.

Children are assigned to Remedial Reading classes based on the following:

- 1. I Q
- 2. Achievement Level
- 3. Reading Level
- 4. Entering school from another area, where methods differ.
- 5. Illness, which has meant a long absence.
- 6. Failure to master certain important reading skills.

These children are tested very carefully, to see just what the difficulties are. Then, in small groups of four or five, intensive work is done to build up these skills. When there is evidence that the child is doing better work, in the remedial group as well as in his homeroom, he is re-tested. If he reaches grade level, he is released from remedial class, to make room for someone else who needs help. This testing and releasing goes on in every group, all year.

Each child is given an oral reading test, as well as silent reading tests. Oral reading tests are indispensable for disability diagnosis. They analyze reading skills which cannot be evaluated in a silent reading test, such as word attack; context clues; word and letter reversals; omissions; syllables; derivatives; word calling, etc. While silent reading tests are necessary for a thorough disability analysis, they can never replace the oral tests as a means of showing the presence or absence of fundamental reading skills.

The silent reading tests are comprehension tests and diagnostic tests. The comprehension tests tell the grade level at which a child reads; the diagnostic tests show what skills the pupil has not mastered.

The remedial groups had a total of 53 pupils during the year.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL HEALTH PROGRAM

To the Superintendent of Schools and the School Board of Hampstead:

I hereby submit my first annual report as school nurse-teacher.

Cursory examinations are done at the beginning of the school year and after each vacation period for the protection of the students. This exam includes inspection of the throat, teeth, glands, head, arms and hands.

The yearly medical examination for all students in grades 1, 3, 5, 7, and those new to the school is done in November by Dr. Raymond Moore, M.D., and Dr. William Hart, M.D., assisted by your school nurse-teacher. Parents and guardians are notified of all defects noted and a successful "follow-up" program is carried out. This year 162 pupils received physical examinations.

A Tuberculin Skin Testing Program is held every other year under the direction of Miss Constance Martin, R.N., Tuberculosis Nurse, assisted by the school nurse. This year grades 1, 5, 6, 7, 8, and all school personnel were tested.

Heights and weights are checked annually on all students and carefully recorded. Also, the vision and hearing abilities of these students is tested each year and any variation is immediately brought to the attention of the parents. In addition to this, grade five is tested for color perception.

Pre-school registration is held in May whereby it becomes the task of the school nurse-teacher to acquaint herself with all incoming pupils and their parents or guardians. Any disabilities they may have in regard to their physical or mental being should be noted at this time so that a successful and happy school relationship will exist.

In addition to caring for daily cases of children who become ill or injured in some manner, your school nurseteacher acts as a valuable resource person for teachers and pupils when teaching in the field of health. She conducts programs on personal hygiene, smoking, etc., whenever called upon. She frequently serves as a link between home and school when health and mental problems, which may have an influence on children's work at school, are involved.

Finally, may I express my sincere appreciation to the School Board, Superintendent of Schools, Assistant Super-

intendent, Principal, Teachers, parents and friends, for their fine cooperation and understanding in all of my endeavors. With continued support, this health program will grow and its reflection will be noted in the youth of your town.

REPORT OF THE MUSIC SUPERVISOR

As Music Supervisor in the Town of Hampstead, it has been my task to instill in the students a better understanding, appreciation, and knowledge of what might be termed general music; concentrating my efforts on the specific needs, interests, aptitudes and abilities of the children.

The addition of a part-time music supervisor has enabled me to follow through in greater detail and depth a five-fold program, consisting of singing, playing, listening, rhythmic and creative activities through the media of the classroom teacher.

It is also important that such outside activities as music festivals, concerts, and field trips be correlated with the normal in-school program. In the Spring, my predecessor, Mr. Williams, took a select group from Hampstead, together with other surrounding towns, to the annual N. H. Music Festival. Also, a Memorial Day program and a trip to Boston to attend a "Pops" concert were held.

The annual Christmas program performed for parents and friends was held at the gymnasium December 22, 1964.

In conjunction with the program to prepare curriculum guides in Union No. 55, the music supervisors are in the process of preparing a guide for music. The guides will be examined by classroom teachers before they are made final.

We, in the Music Department, would like to thank everyone for their assistance and cooperation.
