### TOWN WARRANT

### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

### To the inhabitants of the Town of Jackson in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house in said Jackson on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes:

- 3. Maintenance of summer highways and bridges.
- 4. Snow removal from highways and dooryards and sanding highways.
  - 5. Street lighting.
  - 6. Old Age assistance and J. H. Hodge account.
  - 7. Poor relief.
  - 8. Maintenance of Cemetery.
  - 9. Memorial Day exercises.
  - 10. Library.
  - 11. Maintenance of Church and Parsonage.
  - 12. Fire Protection.
  - 13. Memorial Hospital.
  - 14. Sidewalk Construction.
  - 15. Eastern Slope Region.
  - 16. A sum of money for Town Garage.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the J. S. O. C.
  - 18. The sum of \$70.00 for White Mt. Region Association.

- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,149.00 for construction or reconstruction of a section of five mile circuit between Route 16Å and so called Strahan Hollow on East side Wildcat River.
- 20. To see what part, if any, of available State Aid Highway Construction funds Town will vote to recommend to use for reconstruction of that part of Carter Notch Highway beginning at Route 16A, opposite Jackson Church and ending at driveway leading to Wentworth Castle, so-called, at top of Falls Hill. Such reconstruction appears necessary if working plans are to be made for sidewalk construction here from proceeds of "Georgia A. Wentworth Riverbank Improvement Fund." The accumulated income balance from this fund now stands at \$3,000.00, which increases annually by the amount of \$500.00.
- 21. To see if the Town will raise the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300) to raise the Iron Mt. Road at entrance to Route 16.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$192.59 for T. R. A.
- 23. To see if Town will vote to recommend using any available Town Road Aid funds to widen and reduce grade of Thorn Hill Roadway beginning with its junction with Route 16A near Thorn Hill Lodge and ending with private side-road leading to saw mill on Meserve Farm.
- 24. To see what sum of money, if any, Town will vote to raise and appropriate to further or increase permanent improvement reconstruction of Thorn Hill Roadway as set forth in Article No. 23 (above).
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,152.16 to reimburse the treasurer for over-expenditure on summer maintenance of highways and bridges.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,341.96 to reimburse the treasurer for over-expenditure on winter maintenance of highways.

- 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for skating rink.
- 28. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the improvement of hazardous places.
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to impose a summons of \$0.20 on poll taxes uncollected after October 15, 1948.
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selctmen to borrow not exceeding \$6,000.00 in anticipation of taxes.
- 31. To act on any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

# Report of Superintendent

To the School Board of Jackson:

The school was greatly improved last summer by refinishing the floors, rewiring and installing new lights. The pupils have the advantage this year of a Music Supervisor, Miss Golden E. May, once each week. You, as a school board, and the people of Jackson have made possible better educational opportunities for the elementary pupils.

This year, as the result of the new State Aid Law, the Jackson School District received \$517.86 from State funds. This is only a part of the increased cost of the school. This State money is granted for the support of both elementary and high school education.

The PTA has given playground equipment, and is helping to finance milk for each child in cooperation with the Federal School Lunch Program.

The teachers this year are Mr. John Miner of Springfield, Massachusetts, teacher of grades 5-8, and educated at Boston University; and Miss Judith Rogers of South Euclid, Ohio, teacher of grades 1-4, and educated at Haflins College, Virginia and Wheelock College, Boston, Massachusetts There are 11 pupils in grades 5-8, and 17 in grades 1-4.
