TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Kensington in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Kensington on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. The Selectmen's estimate of expenditures for the ensuing year is \$31,706.31.
- 3. To see if the Town wishes to allow a discount on taxes paid within 30 days or 60 days after presentation of tax bills.
- 4. To vote on the basis of payment and the amount thereof to be paid the Tax Collector for the collection of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will grant the Selectmen authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not exceeding \$600.00 (Six Hundred Dollars) for the purpose of purchasing radio equipment for use of the Kensington Volunteer Fire Department.

- 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to acquire land west of the New Kensington Cemetery from Harold and Rachel Smith and raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$100.00 (One Hundred Dollars) for same.
- 8. By petition of George A. Cole and fourteen others. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the purchase of a new tanker and pumper fire engine and necessary equipment, said engine to meet specification as drawn by the Board of Fire Engineers; and for this purpose, to raise a sum not exceeding Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) by issue of serial notes of the Town, under and in accordance with, the provisions of Chapter 33 (Municipal Finance Act) of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated as amended, the discretion of fixing the date, maturities, interest rate or discount rate, the place of payment, the form and other details of said notes to be delegated to the Selectmen.
- 9. By petition of George A. Cole and nine others. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 (Five Thousand Dollars) to be set aside until the town has enough money to buy a fire engine.
- 10. By petition of George A. Cole and nine others. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to end all snow plowing of private driveways.
- 11. By petition of Elmer C. Brewer and nine others. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,500.00 (Fifteen Hundred Dollars) for the purpose of making improvements to the Hobbs Road.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 (Fifty Dollars) as authorized by RSA 31:4, para. XIX for the annual budget of the

New Hampshire Seacoast Regional Development Association.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Business meeting starts at 7:00 P.M. Polls will close at end of business meeting.

The circulation of the library continues to climb in a satisfactory manner but it is of even more importance that the number of families in town using the library has shown an amazing increase. Three years ago about 20 families in town were regular borrowers but in 1963 we find that 110 families have at least one member using the library on a regular basis. Fifty-four new borrowers signed the register during 1963.

There were 130 books added to the library during 1963. Books were given to the library in memory of Marion Prescott by the children of the Elementary School, Ruth Sawyer, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Smith, Mr. and Mrs. Parker Blodgett and Katherine Cram Webster. The Exeter Library, The Davis Library, Mr. and Mrs. Norman Hatch, Mr. Cleveland Webster, Mrs. Walter Spalding, Mrs. Edith Keough, Mr. Cecil Comfort, Mrs. Walter Greenwood, Mrs. Mary Boulanger and Daniel McKnight have donated books to the library during 1963. Mrs. Charlotte Lamson gave a book in memory of James S. Mackay. The generosity of these people is greatly appreciated.

In October of 1963 a Friends of the Library group was organized. Mrs. Andrew Mertinooke was elected Chairman and Mrs. George Garneau was elected Secretary-Treasurer. They have organized committees to help in the library. Service to shut-ins has been one of the successful projects, cataloging, book mending and various clerical tasks have been carried on by this group.

A book return depository has been installed in the library from the Esther Warner Fund. Books may now be returned during times the library is not open to the public.

A table and six chairs were purchased for the children's corner from the Nellie Hilliard Memorial Fund and the rest of the fund will be used for children's books. The Social Library Trustees have authorized the construction of new shelving for the children's corner and this will add a great deal to the appearance and use of that section of the library.

We are continuing to buy most of the library books through the Centralized Book Purchasing Cooperative of the State Library. This not only enables us to buy books at a greater discount but the librarian is able to examine books before purchasing. The Shieling Trust group is still buying books to be owned jointly by the five libraries in the group. This fund will be spent by next summer and as soon as all the books have circulated among the participating libraries they will be divided between the libraries and each library will have their share to keep as part of their permanent collection.

The librarian wishes to thank the volunteers who have given so generously of their time to help improve the services of the library. Jean Mertinooke, Theresa Garneau, Carolyn Brewster, Ann Greenwood and more recently Shirley Thiverge have been most faithful in coming in on Tuesday mornings to help.

KENSINGTON VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT Fire Chief's Annual Report — Year Ending Dec. 31, 1963

During 1963, the Fire Dept. responded to alarms and emergency calls as follows:

House Fires	5
Auto Fires	2
Forest Fires	5
Mutual Aid calls out of town	5
Miscellaneous, rubbish, etc.	3

In addition there were six occasions when one or more members of the Dept. were sent to investigate the smell of smoke, but found no fire. Also, at the request of the Chief of Police, an engine and three men were dispatched to aid in quelling rioting at Hampton Beach on Labor Day. The Mutual Aid calls listed above included 2 from Exeter and 1 each from Kingston, East Kingston and Amesbury (this for a house fire in South Hampton).

The average number of men reporting at these fires was 12, and the average attendance at monthly drills was 8. A total of 280 man hours was spent on fires and drills, excluding the forest fire of October 7-20. On this fire alone, over 700 man hours were expended by the 68 firemen and other residents of Kensington. Since this does not include the 14 other Fire Departments which also responded, it does not give a true picture and was therefore not considered in the averages.

One of the greatest lessons learned during the forest fire threat last fall was the extreme necessity for radio communication between various departments and between the units of each department. Only superhuman effort on the part of a handful of men saved considerable Fire Department equipment from being destroyed, simply because they were unable to quickly summon aid which could easily have reached them if the necessity could have rapidly been made known. The replacement cost of this equipment alone would have exceeded the cost of the radio equipment for which the Town Fire Engineers have requested an additional sum of money in this year's Fire Department appropriation.

Damage resulting from all fires, except the October 7th forest fire, was considerably less than in previous years. This is no reason, however, to relax on fire prevention. Don't give fire a chance to start, and the resulting damage will continue to be small.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

During the past year New Hampshire faced the greatest forest fire threat to its woodlands in more than sixty years. The continued drought brought home to our citizens, as never before, the potential threat of destructive fires to their beautiful and valuable forests, homes and livelihood. In true American tradition of meeting a common threat by volunteer effort, this fire danger was minimized by active prevention, patrol and a relinguishing of personel rights for the common good. It was the greatest demonstration of public cooperation ever experienced by those responsible for local and state fire control. The ready forces of volunteer fire services kept the losses low. For their effort and public response the general fire service expresses its heartfelt thanks for a job well done.

Prevention however, is not just an activity for the bad fire years. It must be practiced until it becomes a part of our public conscience — a habit. Just plain carelessness with fire causes too many of our fires.

The following practices and suggestions will help:

- 1. Always have a permit for out door burning and burn within the terms of the permit and in a safe place Burn late in the afternoon when the wind is down or on rainy or damp days. Check your fire and if winds develop extinguish it promptly.
- 2. Carry your rubbish to the public dump it's safer. A neglected backyard incinerator causes many fires.
- 3. Never discard lighted cigarette or match. Make this is a year round habit regardless of the safety of your surroundings.
 - 4. Children caused fires are now a major concern.

Keep matches away from them and teach them to respect fire and not make it a subject of play.

Lets all join with "Smokey the Bear" and "Keep New Hampshire Green" and growing in 1964.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Kensington:

I hereby submit my sixteenth annual report. The teaching staff for 1963-1964 follows:

The district is fortunate to have the same experienced and dedicated staff of teachers again this year.

The enrollment as of December 20 was as follows:

This is a total enrollment of 107. With another large first grade expected next year, it would appear that a teacher should be added to the staff so that there will be a teacher for each of the first four grades and a teacher for grades 5 and 6 making five classroom teachers in all for 1964-1965.

A portion of this report is a statement by Mr. Frederick King, Teacher Consultant for Supervisory Union 16. He presents some of the work which he is doing in his role as supervisor of elementary education. He reports as follows:

"In the constitution and by-laws of the New Hampshire Association of Teacher Consultants there appears as part of the purposes 'to promote means of bringing the highest educational standards to the communities'. One of the items that affects educational standards most is the responsibility that the teacher consultant has for providing leadership in curriculum development.

"One of the areas of the curriculum that has given us a chance for a great deal of in-service work is that of mathematics. You may hear young primary grade children speaking of 'sets', 'equations,' 'base ten' and 'inverse operations'. There is no cause for alarm. The children are probably a part of an arithmetic program being tried in the grades.

"The trend in arithmetic is toward a more meaningful, exciting and discovery presentation. It has been labeled 'modern mathematics", but merely means that approaches and some of the content are new.

"As teacher consultant I have tried to provide opportunities for teachers in this area to become familiar with some of the new methods. Last spring many teachers took an extension course in modern mathematics sponsored by the University of New Hampshire and held in Exeter. This fall I held a series of meetings where teachers could view some films in new mathematics approaches and discuss them. I have encouraged teachers to watch a weekly television program on the same topic. Many opportunities have been provided for sharing ideas, materials and techniques. I am happy to say that teachers are taking seriously the roles that they may play in new mathematics presentations.

"Curriculum change of a major nature is a slow process. One does not rush the school system into a new program without all the in-service background mentioned above. New mathematics is not in an experimental stage. The research, as well as some of the practice in the elementary classroom, has been going on for twenty years or more. Now, however, new text materials have been written for the elementary grades. We have tried some of these in our classroom this year on an experimental basis with consumable forms. At this writing an extensive testing program of arithemetic concepts is underway. I am attempting to evaluate the results and reach some conclusions about the programs being used.

"The final step is the formation of a committee made up of selected classroom teachers and principals with the teacher consultant acting as co-ordinator. This group will have regular meetings twice each month. It will be the job of the committee to make a text-book selection in mathematics that we can use in the school years ahead. This is a big responsibility and will take many hours of working, thinking and talking before any results will be realized. The goal will be to select the best possible program for the highest educational standards we can achieve in mathematics.

"Another important area which I should like to mention briefly is that of providing students with a wealth of materials both of a non-fiction and a fiction nature. Many educators feel today that library provisions in elementary schools are an essential and basic service. Our children today require a full range of materials, accessible to and serving all of the children. Research has shown that learning takes place faster when it is reinforced with many supplementary materials. In schools sufficiently large enough we are either moving toward or now have a centralized school library. In the smaller schools we shall attempt to build up classroom collections necessary to provide proper sources to aid children in their 'quest for knowledge'. I am working closely with teachers and pupils not only to aid in the building up of these services but to provide help and guidance in the use of them.

"These two mentioned areas of work indicate some of the curriculum development that is taking place. Continuing along with these are the classroom visitations, teacher conferences, classroom demonstrations. supervision of the testing program, preparation of guides and bulletins, and any of the other 'service roles' that the teacher consultant feels are aimed 'to promote means of bringing the highest educational standards to the community.'"

Even though the Kensington School District did not qualify for State Foundation Aid under the state formula this year, it is encouraging to note that the amount of Federal Aid under Public Law 874 has increased. During the school year 1962-1963, \$1,532.00 was received and it is expected that during this school year, 1963-1964, about \$4,100.00 will be received. The number of federally connected pupils has increased from twelve to twenty this year.

I am sincerely hoping that Congress will pass legis-

lation which will permit prayers and Bible reading in the school room.

In the light of recent events, we should all rededicate ourselves to the task of inculcating love of country and patriotism in the hearts and minds of our school children.

The Parent-Teacher Association continues its support of the school program.

I call your attention to the reports and tables which follow.

It is gratifying to receive the continued support of the citizens, the members of the School Board and the teachers.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Child health is a community concern, but parents have the primary responsibility for the health of their children. Good health services exist where there is cooperation among parents, the school and community agencies.

Although Speech Therapy is available, some parents seem to consider such help a disgrace to themselves and to their children. Probably nine out of ten cases of speech difficulties in children are correctable. They all need attention, however, since very few ever recover spontaneously. Many will become worse if neglected. The ability to express oneself today is of increasing importance — so why handicap a child needlessly?

A society changing as ours is today increases the uncertainty and unpredictability of life which is shared by all generations. Some of our children, first grade through senior high, show this anxiety in their unstable behavior. We are fortunate in our area to have psychiatric and Family Service Agency help, but the needs for stable emotional health are far from met. The increase in numbers of disturbed children far outdistance the available services. The schools and communities cannot solve these problems alone. Help is needed from the State and Federal levels.

Naturally, your School Health Services deal with problems, but our report is not all in this category. We are pleased to write that on the whole we are above the average community in health and protective

measures, and that most of the children are healthy and happy. We can thank the excellent cooperation we receive from school boards, administrators, teachers, parents and community agencies in bringing this about.

One request we would like to make is for better community education at the adult level in all phases of physical and emotional health. In this way, the family will be better prepared to instill in its children good health habits and practices.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

To the Superintendent of Schools:

As the music supervisor, I have tried to include, in my teaching, as many as possible of those musical activities recommended for today's school music program.
