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REPORT OF LEMPSTER HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Lempster Historical Society was formed on June 29, 1959 by a group of interested persons who met in the Town Hall at Lempster Street, at 8 o'clock in the evening.

Mr. Walter Beckwith was chosen as the Society's President, and other officers elected included Elsie M. Barton first V. Pres., Charles S. Dow, 2nd. V. Pres., James J. Drew, Sec., Arline M. Allen, Treas., Executive board members: Harry Hanson, Helen Keniston, and William D. Thurber.

Donations and letters from interested persons were acknowledged; Fred Welch, \$2.00, Metta Bean, \$5.00, Louise Zuelke, \$5.00, Allen T. Wheeler, \$5.00, Wesley Hallett, \$5.00, Hugh Pollard, \$1.00, Hazel Morse, Bernice Young, Nellie Howe Kraich, Willard Hamlin, Florence Morse, Katie Taylor Nichols, Carl Parker, Sadie Holt, and Roy Roundy.

It was voted to solicit contributions instead of dues from members of the organization, and to have the secretary include a questionnaire in the mailing of the Old Home Day invitations.

The second meeting of the Society was combined with the School Reunion on Aug. 17, and the third meeting occurred on Oct. 19. Contributions from Jean H. Stowell of \$10.00, Nellie Howe Kraich, \$2.00, Mrs. Robert Rossiter, \$2.00, William D. Thurber, \$1.00, Mrs. Catherine McAfee and Mrs. Ellen Pearce, \$3.00, Bernice Young, \$1.00, Susie Russell, \$2.00, Leslie Allen, \$5.00, Ethel MacKenzie, \$1.00, H. A. Hawken, \$5.00, Lilla & Elsie Barton, \$2.00, James & Arline Allen, \$2.00 were recorded. Response to the questionnaires mailed out was reported as fair. It was agreed to concentrate on genealogies as inscribed on headstones in the cemeteries. Mr. Beckwith suggested the compilation of family data into an idex file, which should include up-to-date information. The Society will gratefully accept all date pertinent to the writing of an authentic history of the town and will transmit it to Mr. Beckwith.

The reserve fund in the Town Treasury now amounts to \$500.00 and will be used to pay for the cost of printing the history when it is completed. The funds in the Society Treasury will be used to assist Mr. Beckwith in the expense of gathering of data. More funds are needed and we solicit your assistance.

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lempster, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Union Hall, said Lempster, on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, at ten of the clock, in the forenoon, to open the polls for voting for candidates, and at one o'clock in the afternoon for open discussion of articles of Warrant.

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing; and to vote on the following question: "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in the Town?"

Article 2. To bring in your votes for delegate-at-large, alternate delegates-at-large, district delegates, alternate district delegates to the National Convention of the various political parties to be held to nominate party candidates for the President and Vice President of the United States.

Article 3. To receive all reports and act thereon.

Article 4. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes for the ensuing year:

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to deliver blank inventories at the time they appraise property for taxation.

Article 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money for the Town in anticipation of taxes.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Road Agent \$1.50 per hour and \$1.30 per hour for laborers and \$1.50 per hour for grader operator.

Article 8. To see what action the Town will vote to continue the Town Forest Committee and take any necessary action thereto.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$698.58 for T.R.A.; the State will contribute \$4,657.20.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,000.00 to pay on note for construction of Lempster Mountain Road.

Article 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to keep the Information Booth open from June 25, to Sept. 10, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to insure the dwellings acquired by Tax Collector's Deeds, and equipment and make any necessary repairs thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote a sum of money to continue and increase the Town History Fund established in 1955.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the Fire Department's annual expenses.

Article 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of equipment for the Fire Department.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase Liability Insurance for the Town and raise \$290.00 to cover expense thereof.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$350.00 for the Town's share of Social Security for its employees.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$32.00 for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Regional Association.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$150.00 for White Pine Blister Rust.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to sell the Perkins House and barn with approximately 10-15 acres.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$250.00 as Interest on long term notes.

Article 22. To see if the Town will appropriate \$200.00 to reassess town properties using Property assessment methods and records obtained from the State,

Article 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate to help maintain and support the Newport Hospital.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to divide equally between all the gas stations in town the gas used by the town road vehicles.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to put a 35 mile speed limit on Highway #10 from the State pit to the Goshen Town line.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to hold Town Meeting at night so more of the taxpayers could attend and act on articles in the Warrant.

REPORT OF FIRE WARDEN PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

The year 1959 was fortunate from a forest fire standpoint. New Hampshire had the best record in the nation. Fewer acres were burned, suppression costs were substantially reduced and damage to woodlands held to a minimum. The record resulted from a combination of favorable weather conditions, an alert warden service and a cooperating public.

Yet, despite all this, there still persists a disturbing note.

58%, or 6 out of every 10 fires in 1959 were caused by careless smokers and debris burners.

10%, or 1 out of every 9 fires was caused by children.

Careless, indifferent, thoughtless and independent minded individuals and failure of parents to properly supervise children and keep matches out of their reach, annually cause these unnecessary fires which cost large sums to extinguish and cause extensive damage. The climination of these three causes of fires would radically change this picture. The rules are simple —

- Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden
 —the law requires it.
- 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.
- 3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
- 4. Don't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes from moving vehicles—use your ash tray.
- 5. Don't burn at home—Use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of the Goshen-Lempster Cooperative School District, I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

All our teachers were retained this past year, so that we were able to open school in September with a complete staff of experienced instructors. Mr. Balla, who has done an excellent job as Principal of the school, returned to teach the upper grade room, Mrs. Newman as primary teacher, Mrs. Starkey as teacher of grades 3 and 4, and Mrs. Wirkkala grades 5 and 6.

Mrs. Rae Hodgman has been in charge of our school cafeteria. We have been privileged to have very fine luncheons, and all children who so desired, have taken advantage of this school service.

Mr. Harry Barnes was reappointed custodian of the building. We appreciate very much his fine work in keeping our school comfortable and clean. The building was thoroughly gone over during the summer vacation, and at the opening of school everything was in readiness for the children and teachers. Two more rooms were redecorated as a part of a planned schedule of maintenance.

The School Board has approved a plan which will require all first grade children to be tested previous to entering school for the first time. Children who are six years of age by September 30th must, according to law, be enrolled in school. Children whose birthdays fall between September 30th and December 31st must satisfactorily pass a pre-school test before being admitted. Children who become six years of age after December 31st must wait another year.

The Superintendent's office has made a four year survey of school enrollments beginning September 1960 to September 1963 inclusive. The results of this research are listed below:

I wish to thank the teachers and citizens for their fine cooperation and support throughout the school year. I have enjoyed very much my association with the Cooperative School Board. They have shown genuine interest in the teachers, children, and management of the school.

We shall continue to make every effort to provide a school program of which you may well be proud.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The school year 1959-1960 is fast coming to an end, thus again I have the pleasure of addressing another report to you on the success of a capacity program here at the Goshen-Lempster Cooperative School.

Our excellent staff has been completely retained, a compliment to working conditions in the district. Mrs. Doris Newman is teaching grades one and two. Mrs. Myrtie Starkey is teaching grades two and three. Mrs. Frances Wirkkala is teaching grades four, five and six. Mr. Balla, Principal, is teaching grades six, seven, and eight. Grade six is split only for English and mathematics. For their Social Studies and Science they are combined with grade seven to provide maximum unity in the school program.

This year a program of simplified French has been added to better prepare our students for high school. We are following the National Education Association recommendations in teaching foreign languages to elementary students through the spoken word only. This relieves the tedium of written assignments.

The Hot Lunch Program is continuing as one of the best in the state. Our excellent cook, Mrs. Rae Hodgman, and her helper, Mrs. Vivian Berlanger, are to be congratulated for the fine meals they have served in maintaining this high position.

The district is to be congratulated for the excellent bus service they have engaged. Mr. and Mrs. Campbell have maintained a fine standard of service throughout the year.

Our janitorial service is beyond reproach as is evidenced by the condition of the building. Mr. Barnes has created in the appearance of the building a compliment to his zeal far above anything I can add.

In conclusion I would like to extend my deepest gratitude to my fellow teachers for their help in making this a successful year. My fellow workers join with me in extending our sincere gratitude to the School Board, Mr. Stickney, Miss MacIver, the Parents Club, and all who shared in making this a most successful school year.

SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

School health services are designed to protect and improve the health of children, thus aiding their growth and development, and enabling them to benefit fully from school experiences. School health services add to, but in no way replace the health care parents can and should provide for their children. These services are patterned to encourage parents to devote attention to child health, to acquaint them with health problems of which they are unaware and to encourage them to use the services of their physician, dentist and various health agencies. Both schools and parents are concerned with protecting and promoting the health of the child and with helping him realize the need of assuming responsibility for his own health as he becomes older.

During the course of the school year various programs relating to health are carried out. These programs create within the child an awareness of the importance of his own health as well as the health of others. These programs include a testing program for vision and hearing; general inspections, including weighing and measuring of the children; immunization clinics for the prevention of diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, smallpox and poliomyelitis; Tuberculin Patch testing for the detection of persons who may have had contact with tuberculosis at some time or another; an excellent dental program which includes not only corrective dentistry but educational experiences as well; the hot lunch program, a very important part of the daily school program.

The success of the School Health Services program is very dependent upon the interest of the community. We have that interest in Goshen and Lempster, and it is shown by the fine cooperation of the parents, the school personnel, the Parents' Club and interested individuals. The Parents' Club is responsible for our very fine dental program. I would like to express my appreciation for this interest.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of Goshen-Lempster Cooperative School District No. 5 qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Goshen-Lempster Cooperative School, Lempster, on the Nineteenth day of March, 1960, at two o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing five years.
- 3. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 4. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization and building funds, together with other income; the School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 7. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to appropriate receipts from federal lunch reimbursements, tuition, gifts and other receipts from miscellaneous sources, in addition to the original appropriation for 1960-61, for the lunch program, general expenses, equipment and improvements.

- 8. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the U.S. Government and/or state agencies.
- 9. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.
