#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lincoln in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at High School Auditorium in said Lincoln on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. How much money will be raised for Public Library?

4. How much money will be raised for Police Department?

5. How much money will be raised for Town Maintenance?

6. How much money will be raised for the Fire Department?

7. How much money will be raised for Public Health Department?

8. How much money will be raised for Miscellaneous Expense?

9. How much money will be raised for Support of Town Poor?

10. How much money will be raised for Public Cemetery?

11. How much money will be raised for Transients?

12. Will the town vote to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 and interest to take up Water Bond due April 1, 1938?

13. How much money will be raised for maintenance of Water Department?

14. How much money will be raised for Street Lighting?

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of Taxes?

16. Will the Town vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 and interest to take up water construction note as voted at the last annual Town Meeting?

17. To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$130.13 for T. R. A. Work, the State to contribute \$520.52.

18. Will the town vote to change the method of payment from bonds to notes for the construction of new bridge over the West Branch of the Pemigewasset River?

19. To see if the Town will vote to borrow the sum of five thousand seven hundred fifty dollars and ninetythree cents (\$5,750.93) to pay its share of the expense of building the State Aid Bridge over the Pemigewasset River to the Daniel Webster Highway, giving its note therefore, payable five hundred dollars (\$500.00) semi-annually, with interest.

20. To see if the Town wishes to recognize the one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the signing of the Constitution and appropriate money for the same.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise approximately \$200.00 for extension of Water Main on La-Brecque Street.

22. To see if the Town will vote to construct water system on Pollard Road, North of the Annie Temple residence.

23. To see what action the Town will take in extending the water residence on Pollard Road.

24. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise not exceeding \$8,000.00 for construction of the two preceding articles, and to take any action that may be necessary to effect the purposes of any votes passed under the two preceding articles.

25. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the Town Hall property.

#### **Annual Report of Lincoln Library Trustees 1937**

184 new books have been placed in the library during 1937. Of these 90 are fiction; 56 are non-fiction and 38 are Juveniles. In the choice of fiction we have tried to maintain a balance between light fiction and novels of a more serious nature, including historical novels.

The 56 books of non-fiction include works based on History, Travel, Economics, Sociology, Science and Biography. A few plays and books of poems have been ordered.

The Juveniles have been chosen for boys and girls of all ages.

Subscriptions to the following magazines have been made: Time, Commentator, National Geographic, Readers' Digest, Consumer's Digest, Popular Mechanics, Good Housekeeping, Better Homes and Gardens, Woman's Home Companion, Child Life, American Boy, American Girl.

In addition to the purchase of the above books, the librarian's salary has been paid, membership in the Junior Literary Guild has been maintained and heat and light have been provided for the library.

The total number of books and magazines circulated for the year was 8,990.

As usual people have been most generous with their donations of books and magazines for which the trustees wish to express their thanks and appreciation. Books were presented by Mrs. Martin Brown and Mrs. Katherine S. Henry. Magazines for the Reading Table were presented by Mrs. Katherine Henry, Miss Blanche Haley, Mrs. Roland Lane and Mrs. William Herrick.

From the librarian's fund obtained from fines, necessary library supplies have been purchased, a new rack for periodicals has been installed and a magazine index system has been introduced enabling the librarian to give better service in locating articles from back numbers in our magazines.

The floor has been refinished and this month we expect to have all the furniture varnished.

The trustees welcome any helpful suggestions, both as to the selection of new books and the conduct of the library.
