

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room in the Town Building on the 11th day of March, next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, one Park Commissioner for three years, one Park Commissioner for one year, a Town Treasurer, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library and one Trustee of Trust Funds.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to change the time of the business meeting of future annual Town Meetings from 10:00 A. M. to 7:30 P. M.; and that the following question be placed upon the ballot to be used at said meeting—"Shall the hours of the business meeting be changed from 10:00 A. M. to 7:30 P. M. for future annual Town Meetings?"

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, relative to playing Beano in the Town of Littleton, and that the following question be placed upon the ballot to be used at said meeting—"Shall the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town?"

ARTICLE 4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' Salaries, General Expenses, Elections, Municipal Court, Town Building, Police Department, Forest Fires, Sewers, Streets and Highways, Street Lights, Vital Statistics, Sidewalks, Town Garage, Superintendent of Public Works, Health Officer, Hospital, District Nurse, Public Dump, Welfare, Old Age Assistance, Parks and Playgrounds, Community Center, Civil Defense, Social Security, Blister Rust, Fire Department, Damage by Dogs, Garbage Disposal, Special Highway Account, County Tax, Public Library, Cemeteries, National Holidays, Advertising, Region Association, Planning Board, Recreation, Debt Retirement, Interest on Indebtedness and all other necessary expenses.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1958 and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Two Thousand Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$2,250.00) to purchase from one Dwyer, a certain parcel of land, with the buildings thereon, situate in the Town of Littleton on the southerly side of the main highway leading from Littleton toward Lisbon; this parcel of land to be reserved solely for the purpose of a future sewage disposal plant, when such a plant is deemed necessary by the Town of Littleton.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) to purchase necessary new highway equipment, namely, trucks, sidewalk plow, snow loader and other necessary highway equipment.

ARTICLE 8. To see, if the Town votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town the sum of money so raised and appropriated; and for this purpose to authorize the issue of serial notes of the Town under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to rebuild and reconstruct Union Street from the Town Building to the compact line near Art's Ark; the Town to be reimbursed for one-half of the cost by the Federal Government and for one-quarter of the cost by the State of New Hampshire.

ARTICLE 10. To see, if the Town votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) as the initial sum needed to start the reconstruction of Union Street.

ARTICLE 11. To see, if the Town votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town the sum of money so raised and appropriated; and for this purpose to authorize the issue of serial notes of the Town under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act.

ARTICLE 12. To see, if the Town votes in the affirmative on Article 10, if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000) to construct a sewer line on Union Street in connection with the reconstruction of Union Street.

ARTICLE 13. To see, if the Town votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town the sum of money or raised and appropriated; and for this purpose to authorize the issue of serial notes of the Town under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Seven Thousand Three Hundred and Seventy Dollars (\$7,370) to construct a sewer line on a portion of Highland Avenue and a run-out along Beacon Street.

ARTICLE 15. To see, if the Town votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town the sum of money or raised and appropriated; and for this purpose to authorize the issue of serial notes of the Town under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Ten Thousand Three Hundred and Twenty Dollars (\$10,320) to construct a sewer line from the Hospital corner, so called, along the Bethlehem Road to the Bethlehem Line, and an extension to take in the Badger Street section.

ARTICLE 17. To see, if the Town votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town the sum of money so raised and appropriated; and for this purpose to authorize the issue of serial notes of the Town under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell and convey in the name of the Town any real estate now or hereafter acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to empower the Planning Board to regulate the subdivision of land in accordance with Sections 19 to 29, Chapter 36 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955; and such regulations to be published as provided by law, and before adoption a public hearing to be held thereon.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road known as the Walker Hill Road from the Lisbon Road, Route 302 south, to the Lisbon Town Line for a total distance of 5,650 feet.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road known as the Mount Misery Road from the old Choquette farm to a point where the Mt. Misery Road joins the Mann's Hill Road, known as Hopkins' Corner, for a total distance of 11,450 feet.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road known as the Farr Hill Road from Arthur Kenney's to the Four Corners, so called, being the junction with the Broomstick Hill Road, for a total distance of 2.950 feet.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road known as the Cross Road from the Slate Ledge Road to the Williams Road, for a total distance of 5,450 feet.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road known as the Towne Road from the North Littleton Road to the intersection with the Broomstick Hill Road for a total distance of 9,000 feet.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road known as the Alder Brook Road from the McCoy place to the Bethlehem line for a total distance of 4,200 feet.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road off the Mt. Eustis Road past the old Wells place for a total distance of 1,950 feet.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Sixteen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$16,500) to renew the present plank deck of the Beacon Street Bridge with a steel and hot-top decking.

ARTICLE 28. To see, if the Town votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town the sum of money so raised and appropriated; and for this purpose to authorize the issue of serial notes of the Town under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Australian ballot system for election of Town Officers is hereby rescinded and the non-partisan ballot system is legally adopted; and that the following question be placed upon the ballot—"Shall the Australian ballot system for election of Town Officers be rescinded and the non-partisan ballot system be legally adopted?"

ARTICLE 30. To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, and to choose and elect any Agents or Committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

ARTICLE 31. To hear the report of Agents, Auditors, Committees, including the Planning Board, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

SECOND ANNUAL REPORT OF LITTLETON PLANNING BOARD

To the Citizens of Littleton:

The Planning Board is a continuing body with members serving five years, the appointments being made by the selectmen. Robert A. Harris was reappointed to fill the 1957 vacancy. During the year thirty meetings were held, a minimum of four being required by state law. The board currently meets at least twice each month. In April, the board, consisting of the following members, elected the officers named:

The year 1957 has seen all departments of the Town of Littleton strive to improve their services to the citizens and to provide for a better future for the town and its people. The planning board has worked on a number of programs that are designed to promote the efficient and economic development of the town, as well as to cope with some of the present problems, and the following report is a summary of some of these projects.

CONSULTING FIRMS EMPLOYED

After interviewing applicants from six firms that were considered qualified by the N. H. Water Pollution Commission, the engineering firm of Camp, Dresser and McKee of Boston, Massachusetts, was recommended to the selectmen for conducting sewage treatment system studies for Littleton. Mr. Joseph Lawlor has been assigned by the company as project engineer.

Invitations were sent to six professional planning agencies to submit proposals for preparing suggested zoning ordinances along with such studies as were needed. The firm of Conklin and Kulski of New Haven, Connecticut, was selected for the project with Mr. Julien Kulski in charge of the project. During the months of August and September, Mr. Mark Hardenburg moved to the area to conduct such field work as was necessary.

OFF STREET PARKING

During the year, the board has assisted the selectmen in starting the off street parking program as voted at the 1957 town meeting. Lots have been started at the Community House and on Pleasant Street and with the coming of good weather they will be improved and parking meters will be installed on some of the spaces. The delay caused by administrative matters prevented work on the Union Street lot during 1957, but the selectmen propose to prepare this lot for use as soon as the weather permits. Importance of this lot being ready for use this year is emphasized by the projected construction of Union Street. A proposed lot on Mill Street is being negotiated with the property owners and it is hoped that this may be ready for the public in the near future. Of the \$50,027.77 available in 1957 for the

street parking program, consisting of parking lot serial notes and meter receipts, there was a balance on hand as of January 1, 1958 of \$17,531.71. This balance plus future meter receipts will be used to carry on the off street parking program.

TRAFFIC CONTROL

The matter of improved traffic control at the various Main Street intersections is still being studied by the selectmen and the planning board with assistance from the N. H. Department of Public Works and Highways. Lack of any final plans made it impossible to ask for a specific appropriation at the 1957 town meeting, therefore any improvement beyond moving the monument had to be postponed until 1958. It is planned that traffic lights proposed for the Cottage, Main and Union Street intersection will be included as a part of the reconstruction of Union Street and the cost included in that project of which Littleton pays only 25%. Increased traffic makes this town improvement one that is urgently needed for the protection of the lives and property of our people.

SWIMMING POOL

The selectmen, as voted at the last town meeting, purchased for the town the Chiswick Inn property and have now turned it over to the park commissioners as an addition to Remich Park. This land is to be incorporated into the park system for use by the people and also to provide a suitable site for a swimming pool, should the town or a group of civic organizations propose to install such a recreational facility. Careful disposition of the buildings by the selectmen brought a return to the town of nearly \$2,000, thus reducing the original purchase price of the property.

RIVER POLLUTION ELIMINATION

Article 25 of the 1957 town meeting warrant which was voted in the affirmative directed the selectmen to start preparing plans for a complete sewage disposal system for the town, and to apply for an interest free loan from the federal government to pay for the project. That application for a loan of \$19,000.00 prepared with the assistance of the firm of Camp, Dresser and McKee was approved by the federal government in February, 1958. Therefore, the engineering firm was unable to proceed with any definite plans or surveys on the project during the past year.

During this delay, however, the time has been used by the project engineer for some preliminary studying which will serve to speed the progress of the project now that federal funds have been received.

The new construction on Pleasant Street and Oak Hill Avenue has been designed and built in such a manner that the sanitary sewers, now separated from the storm sewers, will tie into the new system with no change whatsoever. Plans are now being reviewed for new construction on Union Street to insure that the proposed sewers on that street can be included in the complete sewage disposal system without any further changes once the street is completed.

The project engineer has also made several trips to Littleton for the purpose of advising the selectmen and public works superintendent on possible improvements and additions to our present sewer system as well as assisting in selecting a site for the future treatment plant. This area on which the selectmen now hold an option for the town is located between the river and the Lisbon road across from the Armory. The project engineer from Camp, Dresser and McKee believes that this site is adequate for the proposed sewage treatment plant for the Town of Littleton. Securing this area at this time is another step in a disposal system building program that will eventually remove the pollution from the Ammonosuc river. As pointed out in last year's planning board report, this project, while it may be voluntary for the moment, will become mandatory in the future to meet the pollution classification requirements imposed by the Water Pollution Commission.

Recommendation:

That the town purchase the proposed site for a sewage treatment plant for the town of Littleton.

TOWN DUMP

At the 1957 town meeting the voters acted on the following article that appeared in the warrant:

ARTICLE 22. "To see if the Town will vote to instruct the planning board to conduct a study of the problems arising from the present methods of disposal of rubbish, waste, garbage and other materials at the town dump. It shall be the duty of this group to study the use of sanitary land fill, incineration or other approved methods at the present location, and search for available sites for relocation; and to report on same at the regular town meeting of 1958, or an earlier special town meeting if so called. It shall also be the duty of this board to prepare the necessary articles for action at said meeting on adoption of proposed new methods or removal to a new site, and to provide for the raising of moneys for same." It was voted in the affirmative.

No doubt this action was prompted by the conditions that had prevailed at the dump for some time prior to town meeting. Operation had been very poor and maintenance had been very haphazard. A definite nuisance had been allowed to occur because of the lack of proper control.

Shortly after town meeting, the selectmen were able to employ an attendant and the regulations concerning the operation of the dump were revised. This made an immediate improvement in the operation and the appearance of the dump. Unfortunately, insufficient supervision has prevented this improvement from being permanent.

In studying this problem the Board considered three methods of disposal: incineration, sanitary land fill, and the open dump. Early in our review, the incineration method was ruled out because of the large capital expense involved. The cost of constructing a municipal incinerator would be prohibitively high for a small community and would be comparatively expensive to operate. Also, the problem of disposing noncombustible trash would still have to be taken care of in some other way.

A study of the sanitary land fill method indicated that this might have possibilities for future use in Littleton. For a town of this size it requires nearly \$20,000.00 worth of equipment and the entire operation can be handled by one skilled operator. The daily operating expense is estimated to be about \$20.00 per day plus the wages of the operator. It requires approximately one acre of land per year to accommodate the town's refuse and this land can be reclaimed for further use after seven years or more. But this land must be fairly free of large boulders and clay. In Littleton, this type of land is available mostly along the Ammonoosuc river valley on the southwest side

of town. This is also the area that will soon be the location of the new federal highway. Selecting a sanitary land fill dump site in this section of town at this time is impossible because of the uncertainty of the new federal highway's exact location and lack of knowledge of the effect of the road on the area.

As stated earlier, our present method of operating the town dump has not been as obnoxious as heretofore and also it is possible to use the area for a few more years before all the land is utilized. This is by far the most inexpensive way of disposing of waste material at this time. With proper supervision and control the dump can be operated without creating a serious nuisance. Transferring the operation of the dump to the Public Works Department of the town, where it properly belongs, should provide the means of securing proper supervision. Under the direction of the superintendent of public works, the daily operation of the dump can be closely controlled and any plowing, filling, leveling, grading, or any other work requiring the department's equipment can be closely coordinated with all other operations of town maintenance. Furthermore, the superintendent of public works can assign additional personnel when needed for short periods of time or can utilize the attendant on some other town maintenance work when he is not needed at the dump. This close control and supervision can certainly be instrumental in reducing the nuisance that has been associated with the dump in the past.

Recommendations:

That the selectmen transfer the operation of the dump to the public works department and that the attendant be assigned to the public works department, to be employed under the direction of the superintendent of public works. This recommendation was placed in effect by the selectmen in December, 1957.

That the dump be moved to a site that will eliminate the possibility of creating a nuisance and also be concealed from all main highways, this relocation to be undertaken after the federal highway is completed in the Littleton area.

That the present method of rubbish disposal be continued until more urgent town improvements are completed, at which time the question of other waste disposal methods can be reviewed.

ZONING

Realizing that the town has been without a zoning law since December, 1956, the board, as outlined in the program presented at the 1957 budget meeting, has directed much of its effort towards preparing a proposed zoning ordinance. Importance of this work has been emphasized many times in the past year when people found it very difficult to protect their property from the adverse effects caused by the actions of others. The instrument that best offers a landowner a real measure of protection of this kind is a zoning ordinance. Here is the democratic way of self-government as applied to the rights of a property owner and to the rights of his neighbors. Here we have a clear spelling out of what each man may do and what his neighbor may do. Here is the ordinance that allows a man to plan the future of his property, knowing that he is acting in conformity with his neighbors and with his community.

There are those who feel that this represents an abridgement of personal rights and liberties. This is not the case because there exists within the framework of a zoning ordinance complete freedom of action, just as we have in our modern traffic laws. We can travel any time, any place on our highway system with complete freedom so long as we conduct ourselves within the framework of the law. Just imagine what our highways could be without a law requiring that each of us drive to the right of the center of the road. Which way gives you the most freedom? As in the case of our traffic laws a zoning ordinance can bring greater freedom, protection, and order out of chaos.

A zoning ordinance, depending on the desires of the people, can have other provisions that are of great benefit to the town, some of

these could be:

The encouraging of building in areas easily served by new roads and utilities.

The discouraging of building in scattered, inaccessible areas involving excessive costs of road maintenance, school transportation and other town services.

The protecting of existing residential property values by preventing the encroachment of obnoxious and detrimental uses into residential areas.

The reserving of sites for industrial development and expansion.

The preserving of natural resources for agriculture, forestry, and recreation.

The fostering of a central business area for maximum customer convenience.

The controlling of additional streets and roads consistent with the needs of traffic.

The protecting of existing capital improvement, both public and private by promoting full and effective use.

The number of these policies, or any other that the town may choose to follow, depends upon the desires of the people as they vote on a proposed zoning ordinance.

The planning board, with the help of the professional consultant firm of Conklin and Kulski, the State Planning and Development Commission, the town counsel and others, is preparing a proposed zoning ordinance designed to meet many of Littleton's needs and to fulfill many of the requirements of a realistic pattern for future development.

The consultants' report containing the results of their studies, and their recommended zoning map and proposed zoning ordinance is nearing completion and will be delivered to the board as soon as printed.

This should be shortly after town meeting, then the people of Littleton will be given an opportunity to consider the proposed ordinances. Meetings with civic clubs, organizations and neighborhood groups will be held to consider the views of everyone and to explain the proposed ordinances in detail. Needed revision can be made at this time if such revisions are deemed necessary by the public. Then if enough interest is shown, the planning board will request that the board of selectmen call a special town meeting to allow the people to vote on the adoption of zoning ordinances.

Recommendation:

That the people of Littleton adopt a zoning ordinance that will afford them protection to their property and will guide Littleton's future development in an orderly and economic manner.

SUBDIVISION REGULATIONS

Nothing is as permanent as a street location. Once a street is laid out, the community must live with it for generations enjoying the

benefits of good design and location, or paying the penalty of unnecessary expense and inconvenience due to poor or haphazard developments. Thus, it can be stated, the interest of the owner or developer is temporary, when compared with the town's interest in a development, which is permanent.

The State Legislature provides means for a town to protect its interests whenever land is subdivided into an "urban" development. This legislation is Chapter 36, Sections 19-29 of the New Hampshire revised statutes annotated, which grants power to planning boards, when so authorized by town meeting action, to regulate the subdivision of land.

These excerpts taken from the State Statute serve to explain the purpose and function of this law:

"A municipality may . . . empower the planning board to approve or disapprove plats (plans) . . . showing new streets, or the widening thereof, or parks . . . Before exercising the powers . . . the planning board shall adopt regulations governing the subdivision of land within its jurisdiction. Such regulations may provide against such scattered subdivision of land as would . . . necessitate an excessive expenditure of public funds for the supply of such services. Such regulations may provide . . . for the proper arrangement and coordination of streets within subdivisions in relation to other existing or planned streets . . . may prescribe minimum widths, depths and areas of lots so as to avoid congestion of population, and generally may include provision which will tend to create conditions favorable to health, safety and convenience. Such regulations may stipulate as a condition precedent to the approval of the plat, the extent to which water, sewer and other utility mains . . . or other facilities shall be installed . . .

"All such regulations shall be published as provided by law for the publication of ordinances in the said municipality and before adoption a hearing shall be held thereon . . . Such regulations may be amended . . . whenever this action is deemed necessary or advisable by the planning board but only following a public hearing on the proposed amendment . . ."

In addition to the above, the law also provides for right of appeal by a subdivider. This appeal can be to the town meeting in some cases or to the courts, thus assuring the full protection of the rights of the owner and subdivider at all times.

Recommendation:

That the town, in order to protect its interests in all new developments, grant to the planning board the authority to control subdivision of land, in accordance with Chapter 36, Sections 19-29 revised statutes of New Hampshire 1955 annotated.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PLANNING

In time any community needs improvements and additions or changes in its public facilities such as streets, sewers, schools, public buildings or recreation facilities. A program of continuing community improvement is important to insure adequate future facilities and to provide for the general welfare of the community.

Such a long range program is of great significance in determining the kind of community that Littleton will be in the future. Whether we are a community that must struggle to meet each crisis that arises from changing times or whether we anticipate and prepare to meet changing conditions is dependent to a great degree upon proper planning of future facilities.

A community that keeps pace with the times can be an efficient and desirable town in which to live and can maintain control of its public finances more than a community that is unable or refuses

to plan for the future.

Proper programming consists of an orderly scheduling of capital expenditures geared to the community's ability to finance new public works and arranged to give priority to the most urgent needs. This is not a devising of new projects, but instead is a means of anticipating future needs and planning to meet those requirements in reasonable order.

This does not necessarily mean that a constant tax rate is guaranteed but it does give the people an opportunity to consider their future needs and to govern the kind and amount of future public services they wish to receive by their willingness to assess themselves to pay for these services.

As the various items of Littleton's present debt become fully paid, the remaining annual payments on the present debt will be reduced. Therefore, further projects on capital improvements may be undertaken from time to time and the payment for these future public improvements along with the present debt can be maintained at a fairly constant level if these projects are properly scheduled over the coming years. The benefits and satisfaction that the town can derive from these future improvements are in a large measure dependent upon the skill and care exercised in their selection. To achieve this goal of proper selection calls for a great degree of coordination and planning by the Selectmen, the School Board, the Park Commission, the Public Works Department, the Fire Department, the Police Department, the Water and Light Department, the Planning Board, in fact every town agency and each and every citizen.

This planning, this coordination, this scheduling over a period of years by the Planning Board in cooperation with all other town agencies, for programmed public improvements can well develop into one of the most important projects undertaken for the Town of Littleton.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

The members of the board sincerely thank all of those who have assisted us in the past year.

The cooperation and assistance given us by the Selectmen, the State Highway Department, the State Planning and Development Commission, the firms of Camp, Dresser and McKee, and Conklin and Kulski have been most helpful in our past year's activity.

The support and interest of the people of Littleton has been appreciated by the Planning Board. It welcomes your ideas, opinions and suggestions. Only through active and diligent citizen participation in the planning process can Littleton continue to be the kind of town you want it to be.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Littleton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1957, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Library, Municipal Court and Planning Board.

Financial Statements

Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1956-December 31, 1957: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1956 and December 31, 1957, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt increased by \$137,-069.10 during 1957.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$7,770.50, plus a revenue surplus of \$5,679.97, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$13,450.47.

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1957, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1957, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Parking Meter Account: (Exhibit B-4)

A summary statement of the Parking Meter Account is presented in Exhibit B-4.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit I)

A statement of long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1957, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit I.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

General Comments

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased by \$13,570.90, from \$6.645.96 to \$20.216.86 during 1957, as shown herewith:

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT 1957

For the third consecutive year the circulation figures of the library show a small but healthy increase. This year the increase is in the use of adult books. Several special groups provided with material during the year included the extension class in educational psychology and a group of AAUW members studying school libraries. Close cooperation with science teacher and classes resulted in the purchase of needed science books for research and general reading. Classes in history were also assisted in a reading project. Classes from St. Mary's-in-the-Mountains School came to the library for study and term paper material on four different occasions in March. Several grades from the elementary school visited the library for instruction and observation. Over 800 books were sent to the three schools for classroom collections.

Mrs. Burpee, assistant librarian, held three story hours for children. A summer reading club was active for six weeks under her direction, and an extensive Book Week celebration was held in November.

The library sponsored a free series of fifteen weekly lectures on music appreciation given by Mr. Bennett of St. Mary's-in-the-Mountains. The course was much enjoyed. Mr. Bennett used the record player belonging to the library to illustrate his talks. The library record collection, still small, is popular. Two hundred and seventy-eight records were loaned for home use in 1957.

The Littleton Great Books group, sponsored by the library, and now in its tenth year, continues to be well attended. One of the investors' clubs regularly uses the library for its meetings. In response to many requests a book deposit box has been placed on the library door-

step for the convenience of borrowers who wish to return books when the library is not open. It has proved an excellent addition. The box is used a great deal and as many as 52 books at a time have been found in it.

Thanks to the active board of trustees great progress has been made in improving the library building. A new oil heater replaces the old coal furnace and all but one of the basement rooms have been freshly painted. The heat is more satisfactory, dirt is reduced to a minimum, and better storage space created. Much needed new lighting has been installed on the main floor of the building. The rooms now have light enough to make night reading easy and comfortable.

The librarian spoke before the Garden Club and the U-Kan Club, and participated in panels before the AAUW and the PTA. She attended the N. H. Library Association annual meeting in Concord for two days, held a neighborhood meeting at the library in cooperation with the N. H. State Library, attended a Woodsville meeting on federal aid to libraries and a meeting in Franconia on inter-library cooperation.

A generous gift to the library was presented by Mr. J. P. Stetson, a summer visitor, as is his custom, and memorial books were given by All Saints Guild, Mrs. Hector Polson, Mrs. George Tewksbury, the Littleton Garden Club, Mrs. Howard C. Lewis and Mrs. Harold Young.

May I thank the board of trustees and the many patrons for their interest and help.

50th Annual Report of the Administrator To the Littleton Hospital Association

It is with pleasure that I present my annual report to the Littleton Hospital Association as follows:

Exactly the same number of patients were admitted to the hospital this year as the previous year, namely 1,121. One hundred ninety-five infants were born, a decrease of 15 compared with the previous year. The total days of service were 7,928 compared with 8,146 the previous year. The percentage of occupancy dropped from 48.1% to 46.4%. Two thousand one hundred and six X-Ray examinations were made compared with 2.110 the previous year. Nine thousand six hundred and seventy-nine laboratory tests were performed compared with 8,545 the previous year. The slight drop in the utilization of bed patient services was felt by the Littleton Hospital as well as many other hospitals in New Hampshire as shown by statistical comparisons. The summer of 1957, the season of expected above-normal activities, presented a slump in services rendered, with a consequent loss of revenue resulting in excessive monthly financial deficits. This situation of low patient census during certain unpredictable periods of the year causes a financial deficit never to be re-earned during a subsequent period of favorable or above normal activity. Our hospital staff must be maintained at a level to insure services in the fields of Nursing, Surgery, Laboratory, Radiology and others, whether or not the patient census is low. The loss in patient income, causing a net operating loss is thankfully offset by Trust Fund Income, donations from the Woman's Board and others, and appropriations from the Towns served by the hospital.

The attitude and team spirit of the hospital staff is outstanding during these periods of low census. We find technicians helping in other departments, nurses painting equipment or catching up on new procedures and tests, and in general preparing for the time when activity is more demanding.

In regard to gifts I would like to enumerate and acknowledge them individually. These were gifts paid directly to the hospital. One thousand dollars from an anonymous donor, \$200 from the Bethlehem Hebrew Congregation, \$85 from the V.F.W. Auxiliary for a new wheel chair, \$10 from the Littleton Colonial Club, \$10 from the Barretts Insurance Agency and other miscellaneous donations of less than \$10 each.

The Woman's Auxiliary Board purchased new dishes for patients' use, at a cost of \$339.69, painted the linen closet at a cost of \$36.00, supplied window shades at \$38.03, eight porch chairs at \$86.04, a General Electric Portable X-Ray unit at a cost of \$1,575.00, painted the exterior of the Nurses' Residence at a cost of \$352.50, paid for all the mending of linens at a cost of \$269.30 plus the purchase of all types of linens, sheets, pillow cases, patient gowns, doctors' gowns, diapers, etc., at an approximate cost of \$1,200 for an approximate total of \$3,897.46.

Expenditures, other than the normal expenses, included new X-Ray equipment at a cost of \$10,784.77, ambulance entrance repair at \$1,005, roof repairs at \$1,611.15, oxygen-analyzer at \$190 and an air compressor for the croupette at \$145.87.

As a result of the installation of the sprinkler system the previous year, it was possible to increase the amount of fire insurance on the buildings and contents by \$294,000 to a total of \$460,000 apportioned as follows: Building \$320,000, Contents \$65,000, Nurses' Residence \$30,000, Contents \$5,000, Boiler House & Laundry \$25,000 and Contents \$15,000. However, notwithstanding the reduced fire insurance rate, the cost of insurance coverage has risen from \$125 to \$200 per

month. This increased cost includes the increased cost of fire insurance, Public & Professional Liability insurance, Compensation insurance, and the new sprinkler leakage insurance coverage.

During the past fiscal year, one change took place on the Medical Staff. Dr. W. G. M. Hume was appointed to Active Staff Membership from Associate Staff Membership.

A written disaster plan was formally revised and approved during the year and trial disaster tests are planned for the near future.

Fire resistive areas for oxygen and anesthetic storage were provided as required by the N. H. Board of Underwriters.

Four of our nurses attended an institute in Hanover concerning the evacuation of patients in the event of a fire. Mrs. Miller and Mrs. MacDonald attended a Civil Defense Instructional Session at Portsmouth.

Plans contemplated for the coming fiscal year include the painting of the outside trim of the hospital building, the replacement of the roof on the Nurses' Residence, the replacement of the pipes in the trench leading from the boiler house to the hospital, and the possible replacement of the elevator.

In closing, I would like to point out to the association that the hospital is more than blessed with the hard working and loyal department heads, such as Mrs. Alphonsine Miller, our wonderful Director of Nursing Services, Mrs. Victoria MacDonald, Surgery Supervisor, Miss Glenice Dearborn, Chief Laboratory Technician, and Mrs. Marcia Mitchell, Medical Records Librarian and of course all the employees who serve in these departments plus the housekeeping, maintenance and laundry services.

My sincerest thank you to the Board of Trustees, the Medical Staff, the Woman's Auxiliary, the Staff of the hospital and all the friends of the hospital that extended their support.

REPORT OF THE LITTLETON PARK COMMISSIONERS

The year 1957 was for us of the Park commission a very busy one.

Albert Orr, who had been our caretaker for the parks and playgrounds, resigned because of ill health. We were as sorry to lose him as he was to leave us.

We were very fortunate to replace Mr. Orr with Arthur "Art" Tunney. Art, whose praises have been sung in The Courier previously, is doing a swell job. He gives us the use of his trucks, and he is more than generous with his time.

Among the events and activities planned was the Easter Egg Hunt.

Another event that was a huge success was the annual Fishing Derby which was attended by several hundred boys and girls and parents. We were very grateful to the merchants of Littleton for their liberal support, also the townfolk who served at lunch stands, gave food for free lunches, and for numerous other services.

Some of the improvements in the parks areas have been: repairs and construction of fireplaces in Dells Area; additional picnic tables; and cutting brush and cleaning out the Dells pond. We added a 13 inch plank on the dam: this raised the pond and beautified the spot. Every summer weekend and evenings finds this picnic area crowded with tourists.

Fill from Pleasant street was put in at Remich park for a parking area that is still under construction. The entrance to this area will be from Park avenue. Also at Remich park two fireplaces were constructed. We replaced the old waterpipe which had frozen and burst, with new pipe and added two drinking fountains. We replaced the old wooden bleachers, which were condemned, with new steel ones. The old heating plant was replaced and we now have a new oil burner.

The inside of the grandstand was painted and cleaned up this fall. Also we insulated same.

The Chiswick Inn property was turned over to us January 20 by the selectmen. Further development in this area will be made.

The Common now has swings, a large slide and sand boxes. We will add a teeter board this summer, and also repair the field house.

The very popular swim program will be carried on this next summer. "Crow" Enderson will be back. We think this program is very important as many children have learned to swim.

We are planning a larger summer program such as baseball, volley ball, pony rides, high jump, basketball and games for the small fry, as well as Art's hayrides and picnics.

Our winter program is now in full swing with the Mt. Eustis ski tow running. The skating rink is crowded now.

We hope to have the ski tow at Remich park operating so the small children can have the use of it this season.

We will replace several trees this spring. Several of the pines were taken down as they were diseased. We will replace them with hardwood.

We wish to thank everyone who has helped us in any way.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

To the Citizens of Littleton:

The school board of Littleton School District presents herewith its annual report. Included in this report will be found the audit of finances for the year 1956-1957 by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission showing a balance of \$3,835.84 as of June 30, 1957; budgets and estimated receipts and expenditures for this year and next year; and written reports by the superintendent of schools and the principal of the high school.

The budget request for the year 1958-1959 is higher than that of the present school year due to increases in salaries and various instructional expenses. Minor increases are requested for transportation and special fund activities.

The board has received the Engelhardt report relative to need for additional space and has made its contents available to you through the Littleton Courier and the library. After studying the report, the board voted to insert an article in the school district warrant requesting an appropriation of the necessary funds to employ an architect with engineering services to explore the structural problems and costs involved in building an addition to the present elementary school or in connection with construction at a new site.

To carry on the school program and meet the needs as well as meeting standards set up by the State Department of Education, we recommend an appropriation of \$340,846.80 for the ensuing year.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1956 and June 30, 1957, are presented in Exhibit A-I. As indicated therein the Net Debt decreased by \$41,913.35 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1957.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures— Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1957, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$5,706.33, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$1,892.13, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$3.814.20.

Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1957, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1957, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Building Fund Account: (Exhibit B-3)

A summarized statement of the Building Fund account is presented in Exhibit B-3.

Statement of Bonded Debt: (Exhibit C)

A statement of the bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1957, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit C.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Littleton:

It is with pleasure that I submit to you my annual report relative to your schools.

This past year brought very few changes in the teaching staff in our schools. Only four teachers had to be replaced. Two of these were in the high school and two in the elementary school.

Mr. Herbert S. Fay of Lancaster, N. H., a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, with 18 hours of advanced study at Colorado State College of Education, and with three years' experience in Colorado and Nebraska, was elected to teach Business Education subjects replacing Mr. Westley G. Rollins, Jr. Mr. Rollins resigned to accept a position in Connecticut.

Mrs. Bertha E. Buckley of Berlin, N. H., a graduate of Mount Holyoke College, and with advanced credits from the University of New Hampshire, Plymouth Teachers College and Keene Teachers College, and with 17 years' experience in northern New Hampshire, was elected to teach Mathematics in the Junior High. Mrs. Buckley replaced Mr. William H. Grass, Jr., who was transferred from this position to the principalship of the elementary school after the resignation of Mr. Edward A. Clay. Mr. Clay resigned to accept a principalship in Connecticut.

Mr. Roger A. Frechette of Conway, a graduate of Keene Teachers College this past year, was elected to teach Social Studies in the junior high school, to replace Mr. Wendell Tetley, Jr., who resigned in June to go into other work.

Mr. Richard J. Enderson of Littleton, a graduate of Keene Teachers College this past year, was elected to teach a sixth grade in the elementary school to replace Mrs. Frances Hutchinson who resigned in June. The University of New Hampshire Testing Service is still being used to administer the guidance battery of tests to pupils in the upper grades. This year tests were administered to pupils in Grades 8, 9 and 11. Tests were previously given to pupils in Grades 9 and 11. Beginning next year these tests will be given to all pupils in Grades 8 and 11. Pupils in grades one through eight are tested for mental maturity periodically and annually for achievement.

The special reading program is still being carried on under the teaching of Mrs. Helen Selby. A study is being made of the Gillingham system of reading for those pupils who have special reading difficulties. If needed and found practical, an effort will be made to introduce it into our system.

The school lunch program has now become a vital part of the school program. Close to six hundred children are participating in this program daily.

A subject of some concern to all school districts in New Hampshire is that of "Minimum Standards for Secondary Schools" as set up by the State Department of Education. Littleton will have no difficulty in meeting these standards, however, the Department of Education has made some recommendations that will necessitate adjustments. It strongly recommends: teacherpupil loads be kept close to 125 pupils, library needs be organized and a teacher be appointed to supervise the work, assistance be given the principal in the field of guidance, and that the business curriculum be continuously examined and changes made as the needs of the pupils change. Smaller communities in the area may well find that it is impractical or uneconomical to try to meet these standards on their own and may look toward Littleton to join with them in arriving at a common solution to the problem.

Committees have been formed and groups are working on ways to further improve instruction in our sys-

tem. Areas being given serious consideration at this time are reading, mathematics and the sciences.

The large size of classes in the lower grades in the elementary school is causing some concern. It is difficult for a teacher to do her best work and give all pupils the attention they need and are entitled to receive when the size of a group exceeds thirty pupils. The Littleton School Board is to be commended for its action in recommending that the pupil load in an elementary classroom shall not exceed thirty-five.

The Engelhardt report has been received, studied, published in the Littleton Courier, and copies have been made available to the public through the courtesy of the public library. There seems to be no question that additional space is needed on the elementary level if classes are to be kept down to a teachable size. The time is not too distant when the two rooms in the high school building now being used by the kindergarten classes will be needed for high school groups. There is much work to be done and careful planning will be necessary.

I wish to take this opportunity to commend the board for its interest in the welfare and education of Littleton youth as evidenced by its concern in matters of curriculum on both elementary and secondary level, its interest in the welfare of teachers, and its willingness to actively participate in group study of many educational problems.

The support and cooperation of parents and friends of the school as individuals and through the various service organizations of the town is appreciated. Many helpful suggestions and recommendations have been made, some of which have already borne fruit.

In closing, I wish to thank the school board, teaching staff, other school district personnel and the citizens of Littleton for their cooperation and support.

I hereby submit my eighth annual report as principal of Littleton High School, for the year beginning September 1957.

REGISTRATION

The total registration for the high school is 292 plus 129 in the junior high school, making a total of 421. This represents an increase of thirteen in the high school with the junior high school remaining the same. Eleven have withdrawn from school to date.

CURRICULUM

Our curriculum is based upon the philosophy that certain basic studies should be required of all pupils,

these include English, Mathematics, Science and Social Studies. The depth and degree of which these studies are pursued is determined by the ability, the educational aims and the future plans of the pupil.

This year a course in Art was sponsored by the Neighborhood Art Association of Franconia and has proven very worthwhile.

The curriculum is divided into five programs, namely—College Preparatory, Business Education, Home Economics, Manual Arts and General. Health and Physical Education is required of all, and music, chorus-glee club and band may be elected by those interested in work in these areas.

GUIDANCE

The guidance program is based on the premise that good teaching and guidance are inseparable and that in the final analysis, it is the classroom teacher who is the most important in the program.

The program is headed by the principal who does most of the educational guidance. He is assisted in this by the college preparatory staff members who recognize particular talents in their classes and counsel with these individuals.

The personnel in the school with definite assignments in guidance are as follows:

The athletic coaches also do considerable guidance.

In addition to the above, Mr. Roland Smith works with boys in mechanic arts, and Mrs. Kane does guid-

ance with the girls through her home economics department.

A reasonably complete college catalogue and vocational library is maintained in the guidance room.

Guidance inventory blanks are given to the seniors early in the year and the information obtained forms the basis for further counselling on an individual basis.

In approximately March of each year registration forms are given to all classes from 8 through 11. The registration material includes the school's program of studies and information on courses, the registration blanks for the particular class and an introductory letter to the parents which is given each student, but before it is taken home this information is gone over by staff members for group guidance in explaining the program. A suggested schedule is made out by the individual student. It is then brought home for discussion and returned signed by the parents. The registrations are then given to the various subject matter teachers who study and make recommendations concerning the choice of their subject. Those not recommended to pursue a course are advised to consider other subjects which more nearly approximate their ability and interest. Parents are also advised of any suggestive changes in the program.

A number of college and school representatives visit the school each year and talk with prospective students. (Grades 10-12). General Electric Company also sends a representative who talks with math and science majors concerning the apprentice program. (Grades 10-12). The military services present their materials and discuss their program, as do the social security and employment representatives.

TESTING

The testing program begins in elementary school

and is recorded on the permanent record of each student. Testing in grades 7 and 8 includes: The California Mental Maturity and the California Achievement Tests of Basic Skills. This year grades 8, 9, and 11 received a battery of 5 tests administered by the University of New Hampshire Testing Service which tests included: The California Occupational Interest Inventory, Primary Mental Ability, Clerical Speed and Accuracy, Mechanical Reasoning, Cooperative Reading Comprehension Test. In the future we will test grades 8 and 11.

The American Council of Education Psychology Test is given all sophomores. These tests form an integral part in the guidance program.

PLACEMENT AND FOLLOW-UP

Prospective employers are urged to contact the school on job openings and many do work with the school in attempting to place people in positions commensurate with their ability. A complete report on each graduating class is made and it is encouraging that a number of people who have been out of school several years have returned for help and guidance.

ACCREDITATION

Littleton High School is accredited by the State Department of Education and the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

The object of the Littleton Chapter of the National Honor Society of Secondary Schools is to create enthusiasm for scholarship, to stimulate a desire to render service, and to promote worthy leadership and character. 

Forest Fire Prevention is Everybody's Business

New Hampshire faces a continuing challenge in its forest fire problem—97 percent of all our forest fires being man-caused and preventable—a serious indictment of interest in our own welfare and that of our neighbor. Both the State and the towns are striving diligently to effectively meet the challenge through education of the public to the threat fire presents to our woodlands; by maintaining a well trained corps of wardens and deputy wardens in every community and by providing ample opportunity for all who wish to dispose of unwanted waste materials. Carelessness and perverseness, however, continue to be the big hurdles.

Thoughtlessly discarded lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles, by hikers, hunters and fishermen; careless burning of debris during hazardous periods in dangerous locations; illegal burning; improperly extinguished debris, camp and cook fires—all result in serious loss of property, disruption of industry and farm work and unnecessary expenditure of town and state funds.

To meet the challenge successfully, the state, your community and your local forest fire warden need YOUR thoughtful and cooperative effort—the rules are simple.

- Don't burn at home—use your town dump and avoid all fire problems.
- 2. If you do burn, be sure to secure a written permit from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow. Permits are required for open debris fires, home incinerators, outdoor fire places and camp fires. Your warden is instructed to permit burning if weather conditions, site and type of burning are safe.
- Be sure that all lighted material—cigars, cigarettes and matches
 —are completely out before discarding them. Use ash trays in
 automobiles.
- Make certain that your debris, camp and cook fires are completely out before leaving them.

- Insist that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
- 6. Call the warden promptly when fire is detected and aid him to extinguish it.

REMEMBER—the fire you prevent might be the one which could burn YOUR property.

REMEMBER—FOREST FIRE PREVENTION is EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS and our MOST IMPORTANT UNDERTAKING.

Report from the White Mountains Region Association

"Twenty Years of Progress"-1938-1958

It is a pleasure to be able to report on the twentieth year of successful operation of your Region Association. Reaching this milestone shows a solid record of accomplishment and mutual cooperation between the towns and the Association.

For a long time nobody knew exactly how to prove that real hard cash was coming into the area from our efforts. However, for the last three years we've run an annual survey of people previously contacted in some way, to find out if they ever did come here and spend any money. Much as we've always believed in this work, we were still amazed at the extent of income indicated by the survey returns. Every time, just a few parties out of the survey sample would prove to have spent around three times as much in this region as the total of all the town appropriations! Careful estimates indicate over half a million dollars a year are being spent here by people contacted through Region publicity. If that sounds like baloney, remember that the whole state does a 210-million dollar vacation business!

Demands on our literature—in which every town is represented in every folder—have never been so heavy. To cite one example, our Fall Foliage promotion (remember those bright red 'leaves' you saw on the roads? We put 'em up) got attention from as far away as Texas and California, and we had to print up an extra 3000 foliage maps in a hurry. A card we had placed in Samsonite luggage stores across the country brought in another 3,000 replies in addition to our usual requests for Region folders. All told we've sent out as usual around 100,000 pieces of material, plus pictures, news stories, radio and TV 'plugs.' We've helped all we could to promote community events here at home, while spending a good deal of time at shows and exhibitions in major cities (we are adding a new one this year, Cleveland).

The 4-H Awards Program continues to be successful and popular, and over 75 clubs throughout the region are helped and encouraged through it in this very worthwhile work by cash awards, trophies, and magazine subscriptions to clubs, members and leaders.

A lot of work has been done on transportation, a very serious situation here. Active work has been done trying to save what we can of our rail passenger service. Much correspondence and attendance at hearings have been aimed at improving the airline service. We have been working with the bus companies planning a campaign with them, since the rail situation seems to be so shaky. We have kept in close touch with the highway situation, hoping Region roads may receive necessary attention.

The items above are brief highlights, and there is much more going on continuously. This is a full-time, year-round effort aimed at benefiting you and your town—that's the only reason this Association exists, to bring about conditions that bring in money that eases the tax 'bite' on your pocketbook. Your support makes it possible, and we thank you for it.
