SELECTMEN'S REPORT

To The Residents of the Town of Newington:

Your Board of Selectmen takes pleasure in submitting herewith the Annual Report of the Town of Newington for the year 1963. The Board believes you will find this a clear and concise summary. In the interest of economy and to avoid much unnecessary repetition we have eliminated the detailed summary of expenses. Explanation of any expenditure may be obtained at the office at the Civic Center and the town secretary will furnish typewritten breakdowns upon request by interested voters.

The selectmen found it possible to reduce the tax-rate by one dollar per thousand for the year 1963 and we hope we can maintain the low tax rates we are almost unique in producing. It is becoming increasingly difficult each year to raise the appropriation necessary to maintain our excellent school system and manage the town affairs. Your cooperation is appreciated and any suggestions will be welcomed. The addition of a part-time secretary to our staff has proven to be a great success. Because the work load in the office becomes increasingly heavy each year due to the numerous Federal and State forms, correspondence, distribution of real estate inventories, processing of same, bookkeeping, etc., we are recommending the secretary be hired on a full-time basis. We are sure that all departments that have utilized the services of the secretary will agree this has increased efficiency in office operation.

The Planning Board and Board of Selectmen have been working closely together. Elsewhere in the Town

Report you will find information on the 701 Long-Range Planning Program and we will keep residents informed of future developments. We take this opportunity to remind you that all residents are invited to the meetings of both the Planning Board and the Selectmen.

We take pleasure in reporting that after numerous conferences with the Army Corps of Engineers, the town received additional monies to compensate for excess cutting by the Corps in the town forest. You will be asked to vote to add this to the trust fund already established to be used for future improvement of town lands.

As you may know, ballot clerks are appointed at each regular town election to serve for the ensuing year. As it is our intention to appoint new clerks each year, will those of you who are interested in serving please leave your names at the town office so that we may have a pool from which to draw.

Shortly after the town meeting the real estate inventories will again be distributed. Please pay particular attention to the instructions at the beginning of the inventories and include as much information as possible in the description of your property so that we may identify it as to location, size and value. Incomplete information could well mean that your property could be over-assessed through no fault of the assessors.

You will note that there is an article in the warrant relative to electing all those town officers permitted by law to be elected, with the exception of the office of Fire Chief. We believe that in view of the extensive experience required of the Fire Chief, this office properly be filled by appointment of the Board

of Fire Engineers. However, we fel strongly that all other offices should be filled at the annual election, thereby allowing every qualified voter to run for the office of his choice.

LANGDON LIBRARY REPORT

Hours: Wednesday and Saturday — 2 - 5 P.M.

The library is pleased to report the accomplishment of two major projects to improve library service. First, the opening of a small branch library at the home of Mrs. John Mazeau in South Newington. Primarily, this is for the benefit of the school children who have long needed an accessible source of reference books for their school work. Approximately two hundred books have been transferred to the branch library's shelves on a rotation basis and a standard set of basic reference books is available. Thanks and credit are due Mr. John Elwyn Stone, a friend of the Library, for his timely donation of one hundred and fifty dollars. The Bookmobile will supply books regularly, as at the main library, thus enabling us to offer more fiction and non-fiction for adults. The branch library is in charge of Mrs. John Mazeau under the supervision of the main library and presently the days and hours are the same.

Already, the benefits of this needed service are apparent.

The second project was expansion of the children's room. The books and some of the cases from the stack room have been moved to the main library and former childrens' room. The former stack room has been renovated and adapted for childrens' use by adding new shelves and rearranging old ones. The projector and phonograph have permanent places where they may be used more efficiently. The reorganization of the childrens' room adds space and charm to the library. There is still further work to be done in arranging books.

Thanks are due Mr. Warren Witham for his interest and care of the urn and for his flower donations.

Your librarian has completed three sessions at the UNH Summer School. One more is required for graduation.

(Due to the unusually large number of ballots which must be completely counted before resuming the Town Meeting to consider Article 4 it is suggested that the Town Meeting be recessed until Saturday, March 14 at 7:30 P.M. This must be proposed and voted from the floor).

The polls will be open at Ten o'clock (A.M.) and unless extended by vote at the meeting will close at Six o'clock (P.M.).

ARTICLES

1. To choose in the manner provided by law, one Selectman to hold office for three years; a Town Clerk; Overseer of the Poor; Town Treasurer; Highway Agent; Collector of Taxes; Superintendent of Water Works; one Library Trustee to hold office for three years; one Trustee of Trust Funds to hold office for three years; Chief of Police.

2. To choose Delegates to the Constitutional Convention.

3. To vote on the question "Shall sweepstake tickets be sold in this Town?"

4. To choose Measurers of Wood; Surveyors of Lumber; Fence Viewers; a Pound Keeper; Constables and all other necessary Town Officers.

5. To see what action the Town will take for care and maintenance of Town land and buildings.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired or to be acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes, at a rate not to exceed the current bank rate.

8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$5,150.03 as provided in the Budget, to be added to the State Town Road Aid share of \$899.97, making a total of \$6,050.00 to be used for the purpose of improving Town roads.

To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated amended by Chapter 302 and 332 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$280.00 to defray the Town's share of the cost thereof.

16. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the

plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.

17. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis.

18. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the Town will Authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the Town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the Town will designate the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

19. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and to see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for all Town expenditures in the year ensuing, as included in the Budget.

20. To see if the Town will vote to elect by ballot at the Annual Town Meeting all officers except the Fire Chief and those officers required by law to be appointed.

(Planning Board, Board of Adjustment, Ballot Clerks, Civil Defense Director, required by law to be appointed).

21. To see if the Town will vote to license roller skating rinks and in order so do, amend the By-Laws of the Town pertaining to licensing dance halls, etc., adopted March 13, 1963, by striking out the same and inserting in place thereof the following:

(1) Prior to April 1 annually each owner or operator of a public dance hall, roller skating rink, bowling alley or outdoor theatre shall secure from the Selectmen of the Town a permit for operation of the same.

(2) That said permit shall cover the period commencing April first of the year of issue, or from the date of issue, through March 31 of the following year, unless sooner revoked.

(3) That the issuance of said permit shall not detract from any rights, privileges, or duties of the owners or operators of said public dance halls, roller skating rinks, bowling alleys or outdoor theatres in effect by virtue of ordinance, by-law, regulation or other law prior to the enactment of this by-law nor shall the issuance of said permit be construed to confer upon said owners or operators additional rights, privileges or duties not heretofore in existence.

(4) The fees for said permits shall be as follows:

- (a) Dance Halls—\$50.00 per year.
- (b) Roller Skating Rinks — \$25.00 per year.
- (c) Bowling Alleys:
 - (1) Year-round operation—\$10 per alley per year.
 - (2) Seasonal, or in connection with hotel or resort operations—\$4 per alley per year.
- (d) Outdoor Theatres — \$1.00 for each day of operation.

22 .To hear the report of the Town Clerk on the election of Town Officers.

23. To transact such other business as may legally come before the meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE
NEWINGTON VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

During the year of 1963 your Newington Fire Department responded to 11 emergencies, 5 of which were grass and wood fires. We were very fortunate this year in not having any major fires involving buildings in the town. This is, indeed, a good record and reflects highly upon the residents of the town as being fire-conscious at all times and doing their utmost to prevent fires.

In the months of April, May and June, 1963, the Fire Department participated in a Firefighters' Training Program conducted by the New Hampshire State Firefighters' training instructor. This instruction was in pump operation and hose work and the men did a very good job in this work. Possibly many residents saw the trucks on the highways pumping water from the various water holes and hydrants throughout the town.

Dial-Kaps were distributed to residents this year for use on their telephones which gave the number of the Fire Department and Police Department. Anyone who has not received this dial-kap may get in touch with us and we will be glad to furnish one to you.

We were able to purchase the equipment that we asked for in our budget and to put it into service. At this time I would like to extend credit to the Newington Volunteer Firemens' Association for the work they have been doing over the years in raising money for personal equipment supplies. That is, all the coats, helmets, boots and other gear that the firemen actually wear at fires have all been purchased by monies raised

raised and expanded by the Firemens' Association for the benefit of the fire department is between \$500 and \$600 dollars.

I would also like to express the appreciation of the Fire Department to the people who answer our red network phones, and also to the people who notify us in advance when they are going to burn rubbish, etc., on their premises. These calls save sending out a fireman to check smoke when it is spotted. We have men at the Air Base Tower on the flight line which overlooks Newington whose eyes are ever alert for any smoke or fire that might occur in Newington, as well as warning Stratham Tower, and any individual who might see smoke and calls the department to report this. Every report received has to be checked out unless we have been informed ahead of time that this is controlled burning and a permit has been issued. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated in this matter.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board met approximately twice a month during the recent year with an average attendance of six out of seven members. Largest project of the year's Agenda was the selection of a consulting firm to provide professional planning guidance in the preparation of a comprehensive development program for the town, thus taking the second step towards completion of our "Urban Planning Assistance Program." This program, otherwise known as the "701 program" provides professional assistance to communities of less than 15,000 population to help guide residential, commercial and industrial expansion. It was believed that actual work on this could be started in 1963 but the program was delayed, through no fault of the consultants. The two big factors leading to this delay were (1) the untimely death of the newly - appointed State Planning Director and (2) several towns submit plans to the government at the same time and every plan must be correct to the last detail before final approval is given. The fact that one town's plans were not submitted properly held up final approval for the rest of the towns involved.

The many changes in the immediate area during the last ten years are readily apparent. There are other large projects pending such as a second span parallel to the General Sullivan Bridge, Piscataqua River channel improvements and State plans for regional development in the seacoast area, all of which are bound to effect Newington.

In addition to the program underway, many items of more immediate nature were acted upon by the Board. Some of these, such as the Veterans Building

restoration, compilation of a town history, bicentennial celebration, improvement of town forest area and Carter's Rock area are included in this year's budget. Still under consideration is development of recreational facilities. It is hoped that these articles recommended by the Board for action will meet with the approval of the voters and will be endorsed at this year's town meeting.

Please keep in mind that everyone is invited to attend the meetings of the Planning Board and any suggestions will be welcomed.

*REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD**1963-1964*

The Newington School Board feels that, even though operating with a somewhat higher pupil load, the operation of the school has gone smoothly and efficiently. Without going into the details given in the Superintendent's report, we were able to obtain two skilled replacement teachers this year, and they with the principal, have meshed very well in all activities.

This summer we properly celebrated a well-earned retirement for our cherished primary teacher, Margaret Pickering, to whom our school is dedicated. The school must go on without her but the town has gained a worker. She is continuing her long association with the Langdon Library, enticing the children as well as adults into the soul satisfying world of books. Also, quite fittingly, she has accepted the tremendous and challenging task of compiling the history of the town. Those who may have been worrying about her getting into mischief with too much leisure time can now rest assured that her hours are well and fully occupied.

In addition to the formal curriculum, we continued the boys' basketball, girls cheerleaders, and instituted a competitive girls' basketball team. These, of course, only in addition to the regular physical education program for all students.

Early in the year, it was found necessary to purchase additional desks and chairs to accomodate extra children in the higher grades. Somewhat later a number of one-armed student-chairs were ordered, as a fire hazard, removed from dead storage in the Town Hall. These were donated to the Great Bay School for Retarded Children here in Newington and were found

to be quite suitable for some of their needs. It might appear that these two items indicate waste but our requirements have been more and more tending toward the larger sizes of equipment. It would seem that the average size of our youngsters is increasing, which is a national trend.

We have installed a hydrant in the boiler room of sufficient size to accommodate regular fire hose and in addition to its obvious advantages, it has made the flooding of the skating rink much simpler. Due to some minor conflicts, the Board approved certain regulations for the use of the rink and these have been posted. Also, in the area of what might be considered advances, the Board has taken out workmen's compensation insurance to protect all employees. So that you might realize that things have also been done to improve the pupil's lot, the shower room was built and is being put to good use.

To reiterate School Board policy: barring emergencies, all School business is conducted during our regular public meetings. These are held on the third Friday of each month at 7:30 p.m. at the school-house.

FURTHER FROM THE SCHOOL DEPARTMENT:

To those Newington residents who recall our former principal, Donald Brewster, it is believed the following letter will be of interest. It was written to one of his former pupils and I think it indicates the caliber of the teachers we here in Newington have had and can continue to expect.

JOHN R. MAZEAU

“Saigon, February 3, 1964

“Dear John:

I hope you will forgive my tardiness. I know it has been over a year since I received your letter but I have not forgotten you. I have been extremely busy and it has been almost impossible to answer all the letters of my former students. I usually put all the letters I receive in a box and answer them one by one. Somehow your letter and some others stayed at the bottom of the box for a long time. Since I used to tell you that people should always answer all the letters they receive I will begin practicing what I preach.

“For the past year I have been working with the education department of the Agency for International Development’s counter - insurgency program (That’s quite a mouthful, isn’t it?) and consequently travel quite a bit and no longer teach. This program that we are presently working with will eventually raise the standard of education and make more education available to more people. (We hope!) I have been to every province in Viet-Nam at least once and surprisingly

enough I have learned to speak Vietnamese so I don't need an interpreter. It is really an interesting experience to talk to people in a foreign language.

"My tour of duty with AID ends in July of this year but I expect to extend for some time after that. I also expect to return to Viet-Nam after this tour for at least another two years with either the American Embassy or the United States Information Service. I have not received an appointment yet but have received some very optimistic information and expect to return here after a few months stateside. (That should be quite an experience as I have not seen any of the new cars or television or any of those western conveniences for the last couple of years.)

"I am sure you are aware of the revolutions that have taken place here. Things here are pretty unpredictable but we are not affected too much. We continue working day after day with the one hope in our hearts, like free people all over the world, that we don't lose the war or the people to Communism, Peking Style! Believe me, John, nobody knows what inroads the Communists have made and are making in this part of the world. The American people are presently pouring millions of dollars into this country in an effort to counteract the deadly venom of the Communist viper. We are expending every effort and God only knows how we hope to be successful. I'm sure we will be! It is a life or death race that the free world cannot afford to lose. Everyone knows that — so, — we hope!

"I am enclosing some first issue stamps to help make up for the long time I kept you waiting for an answer to your letter. The picture on the booklet is Viet-Nam's first atomic reactor which is set up in DeLat, a beautiful little resort town nestled in the mountains about three hundred kilometers north of Saigon. The words on the top of the stamps say 'Peaceful Uses of Atomic

Energy.' Buu chinh Viet-Nam Cong-Hoa means Post Office of the Republic of Viet-Nam.

"I hope you are still doing well in school and continue to work as hard as always. Perhaps you would be interested in working in the Foreign Service after you finish your education. The best way to begin is to study foreign languages (French, Spanish, German and Russian are the most popular second languages) if you can when you go to high school. Naturally they are most helpful to people working overseas but a working knowledge of at least two foreign languages is a requirement for most good graduate schools. With improved transportation more people travel abroad, consequently foreign languages are more necessary today than, say, a century or two ago. Also, it is much easier to learn a second language while you are young, so it is never too early to start.

"Well, there are a million things I could tell you about, John, but I must hurry now as I am preparing to go to Hue. (A real old city just south of the seventeenth parallel.)

"I hope you and your family are all well. Please say hello to them for me. If you write again I will try to answer sooner.

*REPORT OF THE
SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS*

To the School Board and Citizens of Newington:

I wish to begin my report this year by paying tribute to a fine lady who has for over a quarter of a century given of herself to the youth of this community. Margaret Pickering has and will have more influence for good in Newington than any living person. Newington has indeed been fortunate to have had the services of such a teacher these many years. Mrs. Pickering is now enjoying a well deserved retirement, but I want her to know that her work and her dedication have become an inspiration to all of us connected with education.

Teaching Staff:

Mr. Donald Virgin continues as School Principal and teacher of grades five and six. He is a capable man and his past experience within the district has been invaluable since we have two new teachers in the school this year. Pupil records and individual cumulative record folders have been brought up to date by the Principal as a special project this year.

Miss Kaye Norton replaced Mrs. Davis in grades three and four. Miss Norton is a graduate of Farmington State Teachers College located in Farmington, Maine. This young lady has made a fine adjustment to the community and we are happy to have her teaching in this school.

Miss Betty Stimson with five years of prior teaching experience in grade one is teaching grades one and two. First grade teachers with experience are scarce and we count ourselves fortunate to have Miss Stimson as a member of the staff.

Mrs. Evelyn Vedeler continues to act as the remedial

reading teacher on a part-time basis — this teacher has proven to be a great help to the pupils who have unusual reading problems.

Handwriting continues to be taught by specialists from the Rhinehart system.

Mr. Charles Battis is the music teacher who gives instruction in this field one half day per week.

Mrs. Louise Young as in the past few years gives instruction in the art of ceramics to the children.

This staff of regular and special teachers enables the school district to present a full well rounded program of education to the pupils.

Curriculum:

Last year I reported a reorganization of the curriculum in the school which I can report has proven to be good for the children. The graduates have made a good record at the Junior High School this year. This year we are attempting to refine the changes instituted a year ago to the advantage of the teaching program.

The Trustees and the Librarian of the Langdon Library have continued to make the library available to the school on a regularly scheduled basis. In addition to this the officials at the library have cooperated to the extent of buying reading and research books as suggested by the teachers. Films from the University of New Hampshire, as chosen by the Librarian and the Teachers acting as a team, are also furnished by the library. We are indeed grateful for the cooperation of the Library officials.

Budget Analysis:

The 1964-65 Proposed School Budget has increased this year for the following reasons:

1. The minimum salary for teachers has been raised from \$4,100 to 4,300 to maintain a competitive posi-

tion in teacher salaries. We are not attempting to offer better salaries in this budget; we are attempting to pay salaries as good as those of surrounding school districts.

2. Textbooks have increased because we intend to introduce a co-basal reader series to give us more flexibility in the teaching of reading.

3. Teacher retirement costs have increased due to higher salaries.

4. Tuition costs have continued to increase though not as much as in the last few years due this year to a slightly smaller anticipated enrollment at the Junior and Senior High School level.

5. Supervisory Union expenses are also up due to the addition of an Assistant Superintendent to the staff and a salary increase for the Superintendent. It is hoped the Assistant Superintendent will enable my office to better serve the school by increased supervision of teachers and curriculum.

The shower installation approved in last year's budget has been completed and is currently being used by the boys in their interscholastic and intrascholastic programs.

In closing this report to you, I wish to say it continues to be a personal pleasure for me to serve you as your Superintendent of Schools. I also wish to extend my gratitude to the teachers; the school nurse; the custodian; the school transporter; the parents; the town officials and others too numerous to mention.

To the members of the School Board, with whom it has been my good fortune to serve, belong any bouquets for our accomplishments.

It is my pleasure to submit the following annual School Health Report. This report includes the health statistics from Sept. 1962 through June 1963.

Hearing tests, 67; 12 rechecked — 10 ok.; 2 seen by doctor.

Inspections (bimonthly) — teeth, 2; No. seen by doctor, 2. Tonsils enlarged, 2; No. seen by doctor 2 T & A, S.

Height and Weight, 201 (3x/yr.). Home visits or phone calls, 22.

Communicable Diseases known — Hepatitis, 1; German Measles, 4 and Mumps, 1. T. B. Patch Tests, 62 (all negative).

In addition to the regular testing and check-up routine, we had a special program for mothers and 4-6 grade daughters plus a film-strip on the care and proper brushing of teeth for grades 1-4.

I look forward to my Wednesday morning school visits with your children. When a child enters school his world expands and his Health Team which was formerly made up of his parents, family physician and dentist now includes the school administrator, teachers and nurse. Throughout his school years, significant information, recommendations, and treatments bearing on the youngsters physical and emotional health be-

come a part of a cumulative health record which is very helpful to various members of the school health team when working with your child.

Your cooperation as a member of this team in Newington Elementary School, is most helpful to all of us on the school staff and we appreciate it.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the School Board, Superintendent, Principal and Teachers for the cooperation extended me during the past year.
