State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Orford, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Orford on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

First to adjourn to act on he School District Meeting.

Articles

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year: Also to choose one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds and one Library Trustee for three years.
- 2. To hear the budget of the Town and raise and appropriate any money recommended herein or pass any vote relative thereto.
- 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.
- 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges for the ensuing year.
- 5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the removal of snow and care of Town Winter Roads for the ensuing year.
- 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to insure Town property.
- 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Electric Lights.
- 8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Orford Free Library and Orford Social Library.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

TOWN WARRANT — (Continued)

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the distribution of inventory blanks until the Selectmen appraise the property.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell and administer property acquired by Tax Deed, or otherwise.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70.00 for the use of the Dartmouth Lake Sunapee Region.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$472.11 for that purpose.
- 14. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Fire Department.
- 15. To see if the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the revised laws relating to playing games of Beano, shall be adopted in this Town.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to cover the expenses of Memorial Day.
- 17. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Common.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for a Community Center Memorial Fund.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the control of Pine Blister Rust.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to build a new fence of suitable design on the Easterly side of Orford West Cemetery, also to put the two main driveways in reasonable condition, raise and appropriate money for the same, and take any other vote relative thereto.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to continue the grading and reseeding of the old part of West Cemetery, and appoint a committee to do this work.

- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to build a road to the land acquired through the State at Upper Baker Pond.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to build the Newcomb Bridge.
- 24. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for improvemnts to the Town Dock Area.
- 25. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 26. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

To the Inhabitants of the School District of Orford qualified to vote in District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said District, on Tuesday, the 12th of March, 1957, at nine o'clock, in the morning, to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Article 3. To choose a member of the School Board for three years, and to fill any vacancies which may occur on the School Board.
 - Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board, and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- Article 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

WARRANT — (Continued)

- Article 9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to the original appropriation for 1956-57, a sum of \$450.00 to be made available to the school district prior to July 1, 1957, in order to meet unanticipated obligations due principally to necessary textbooks, instructional supplies and equipment because of added pupils.
- Article 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to the original appropriation for 1956-57, a sum of \$100.00 to be made available to the school district prior to July 1, 1957, in order to meet unanticipated obligation due to the Federal Milk Program.
- Article 11. To see if the school district will authorize the School Board to appoint a long range planning committee of a size it deems advisable to study both the immediate and long range problems facing the Orford School District, said committee to report at the next annual meeting or at a special meeting called for the purpose.
- Article 12. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for expenditure by the School Board for planning the improvement and enlargement of the school plant, including a study of sites, the employment of an architect and engineers for preliminary building studies, and payments toward the purchase of land or of construction or of equipment.
- Article 13. To see if the School District will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the School District the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapter 301 and 332 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$74.68 to defray the School District's share of the cost thereof.
- Article 14. To see if the School District wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.
- Article 15. To see if the School District wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis.

WARRANT — (Continued)

Article 16. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the School District will authorize the School Board to execute on behalf of the School District the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the School District will designate the School District Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

Article 17. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and-or United States.

Article 18. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Orford

To the School Board and Citizens of Orford:

I present herein my third annual report as Superintendent of Schools in Orford. In preparing the report I have freely used material from the report made to me by Mr. Elmer Fulton, Principal.

The School Buildings

In last year's report I emphasized the need for increased school facilities. That need has become even more evident during the year. The high school has the largest enrollment in its history. A good program has been offered, but under serious space handicaps for both teachers and pupils. At the Ville school the classes in both rooms have been larger than they should be, particularly when there are two grades to a room. The estimates for 1957-58 indicate that the situation will be even more acute.

I quote below from Mr. Fulton's report:

"Supervisors from the New Hampshire State Department of Education, while commending us for excellent work being accomplished under handicaps, indicated strongly that both the agriculture department and the home economics department were operating in areas too small to meet present recommendations, and that the school lunchroom was badly overcrowded.

"The size of classes increased to a point where three or four high school units average 34-36 pupils in spaces which formerly accommodated groups of 20-26. This situation can be alleviated by providing another teacher and at least one more classroom equipped with regulation desks and chairs.

"The assembly hall situation has now become acute. Assemblies are held in the study hall-library combination. This room, even as a study hall for 42 pupils, is below state minimum standards as to square feet per pupil. Assemblies of the school now crowd over 100 pupils and teachers into this same area.

"Physical education, which will be more heavily demanded by New Hampshire high schools of the future, is not attempted because of lack of personnel and large activity room near the school. Pupils who indulge in athletics and make the teams are, of course, under trained supervision."

It is very encouraging to note that the people of Orford are aware of the acute building situation and are doing something about it. The Parent-Teacher Association appointed an excellent School Study Committee to investigate the whole problem and prepare a report. I have had the privilege of working and consulting with that committee. From the way that it is approaching the problem, I am confident that it will come up with well-founded recommendations. I hope that its report will be studied by all the citizens of Orford.

The science room at the high school was materially improved by alterations during the year. More pupils can now be taught and in a more effective way.

The 1957-58 budget as adopted by the School Board makes provision for several important improvements that will help to alleviate the present situation.

They are:

l. Alterations on the second floor of the Ville school to provide another classroom. These alterations in the present unfinished area will include necessary walls, ceiling, lighting, fire escape and toilet facilities. In addition, a new heating plant is included. The present plant is in bad shape, and heats only the first floor. The present cafeteria is dependent upon the wood-burning cook stove for its heat.

2. At the Street School:

- a. Enlarge the cafeteria somewhat by extending it into the unfinished portion of the basement. This is very important with the greatly increased use of the Cafeteria. About 130 meals are served each day.
- b. New lighting and regular classroom furniture for the agriculture room. This will not only improve the room for the agriculture classes, but will also provide a room that can be used for regular academic classes during that part of the day when it is not being used for agriculture.
- c. Re-designing and altering the home making room to provide better and more adequate facilities for the increased number of girls who are taking this important subject.

I sincerely hope that the School District Meeting will approve expenditures for the above items. They are not the answer to the whole problem, but they will certainly be steps in the right direction.

Cooperative School District

It is becoming increasingly difficult for small communities to operate high schools that offer good programs. As higher state standards are adopted by the State Department of Education for high school approval, the difficulty will increase. As pointed out elsewhere, it would be almost impossible for Orford to finance its present high school program if it were not for the tuition pupils who constitute almost 65% of the high school enrollment. Over the past several years greater numbers of such pupils have been attracted to Orford High School. Yet, Orford has no guarantee that they will continue to come.

In its long range planning, Orford should give serious study to the possibility and desirability of forming a Cooperative School District with some of its neighboring communities. This report is not the place to describe such districts in detail. In brief, they are set up by state law to enable small school districts to combine into a larger one in order to jointly meet and finance their school needs, both as to program offered and as to facilities. They are thus able, for instance, to establish and finance high schools that are large enough to offer good programs and to do so economically.

Playgrounds

The committee study mentioned above will, I feel sure, mdicate the need for larger playgrounds. In the meantime, the grounds that we have should be improved. In the 1956-57 budget, funds were provided for improving the playground at the Street School. In that the contractor could not get at the work until late in the summer, it was decided to postpone it to the summer of 1957-58. The money will, therefore, be held over. The original plans for improvement may be changed as a result of the current building study.

Teachers' Salaries

The teachers are the schools. The quality of instruction depends in very large measure upon their proficiency and their morale. Obviously, the physical facilities, textbooks, supplies and equipment are important elements in helping the teacher do his or her best work. Or ford is fortunate in its teachers. It is lucky that some of its positions were not left unfilled for this year.

In spite of advertisements, articles in papers and a great number of inquiries by mail, telephone and in person to colleges, teachers' agencies and to individuals, we had great difficulty in getting candidates for our vacancies. In fact, because we had been unable to find a home making teacher up until almost time for school to open, it had been decided to eliminate that subject and substitute some other in which teachers are not so scarce. Very fortunately, however, Mr. Fulton learned about Mrs. Saladino through another teacher. He persuaded her to return to teaching. We are most fortunate in having her with us. She signed her contract one week

before school opened — "too close for comfort." It would have been almost tragic to give up home making when so many of the girls are interested in the course.

Orford has, of course, given salary increases. If, however, it is going to be in a position to attract and retain teachers it must make more liberal increases. It should also establish a salary schedule so that the teachers, both prospective and those now on the staff, will know what they can expect to receive if they stay in Orford. The P. T. A. study committee has studied the question of salaries as well as of buildings and will recommend a schedule for School Board consideration.

Teacher Needs

As noted above, the 1957-58 budget makes provision for fixing the agriculture room so that it can also be used for academic classes. It is essential that we also have an added high school teacher. The estimated pupil load for 1957-58 can not be handled by the present staff. In fact, the teachers and principal are far overloaded this year. The added teacher can carry some of that load.

Also noted above is the Board's plan to add a class room on the second floor of the Ville school. That work should be done during the coming summer. We might get by without using it in 1957-58, but we cannot be certain. The population study made by the study committee (an excellent study made chiefly by Rev. Maughan) clearly indicates that we must have the room by September 1958 in order to divide the first and second grades.

Tuition Pupils

In last year's report I emphasized the importance that high school tuition students play in our being able to offer our present program, and the part that their tuition plays in school finances. Figured on the basis of the tuition pupils we now have, we will receive \$21,000.00 in tuition for this year. This is about one third of the total amount Orford will spend on schools for the year. Certainly it will pay from a financial point of view and from the point of view of being able to offer Orford students a good high school program to continue to attract tuition students. To do this we must have the facilities, the program and the teachers.

Teacher Changes

Mrs. Ethel R. Millen, of the Ville School, retired at the close of the 1955-56 school year after rendering excellent service to Orford since 1947. We all miss her and pay tribute to the work that she did. At the same time, we wish her good health and happiness in her retirement. Mrs. Martina Day Stever, who received her degree in elementary education from Plymouth Teachers' College in June, 1956, was elected as Mrs. Millen's successor.

Mr. Richard A. Simoneau was elected to succeed Mr. Malcolm Hartwell who resigned to accept a better paying position elsewhere. Mr. Simoneau teaches French and social studies. He has his Bachelor's Degree from Plymouth and has done one year of graduate study. He was in the Army for two years.

As previously noted, Mrs. Nellie Saladino was elected to teach home making, English and consumer education. She succeeds Mrs. Mary Wilson, who also resigned to accept a position elsewhere. Mrs. Saladino is a graduate of the three year home making education program at Keene, and has had seven years of teaching experience.

The new teachers are all doing an excellent job. We certainly hope that we can retain them.

Conclusion

In concluding I want to express my thanks to the School Board, the school staff and to the citizens of the community for their support and cooperation.
